Local Campground Receives National Praise

The campground locator site The Dyrt has listed Five River Campground in Parsons as the third best in the Southeast Region on their yearly top 10 list. The Dyrt's 12 state Southeast Region encompasses the states of West Virginia, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Kentucky, Alabama, Tennessee, Mississippi, Arkansas and Louisiana.

Owners John and Joyce Bowers offer four Airbnb rentals along with 176 mixed campsites, with many sits (including tent sites) located along the banks of Shavers Fork. The campground offers both RV and tent camping with no long term rentals on the property. "Most of the camping is riverfront," John Bowers said.

Five River Campground, according to the Bowers began out of a desire in 2004 to host a Bluegrass music festival. The first year of Pickin' in Parsons, the

Bowers had 10 campsites for a one day event. The festival has since grown to a five day festival with 25 nationally touring bands and attendees from 46 states and 12 countries, according to the Bowers. This year's event is scheduled for July 30th to August 3rd.

The Bowers said when they moved to the area, they were looking for somewhere to host a festival and did not initially intend to open a campground. As the festival grew, so did the campground, according to the Bowers. John Bowers described the campground as "an evolution" that sprung from the Bluegrass festival. "When we moved to Tucker County, we were looking for somewhere to have a Bluegrass festival," Joyce Bowers said. "Not a place to open a campground."

According to the Bowers, the festival hosts around 6,000 people every year from 46 states and 12 countries. Many international attendees come from Sweden, Australia and Japan, the Bowers said. For the past seven or eight years, the festival has drawn attendees from Tahiti, according to the Bowers. Pickin' in Parsons was also named the 2018 International Bluegrass Event of the Year, according to the Bowers. "It does bring people together of different back-

The Campground also hosts a Pow Wow. This year's event will offer Aztec dancers from Brazil, among the lineup. The cost of weekend entry, according to the Bowers, will be \$10 with the proceeds to be donated to the Baltimore American Indian Center. The Bowers

said that a different Native American organization is chosen for the dona-

tion of the proceeds. The Pow Wow is

scheduled for June 29th and 30th. The Bowers equated the experience of bringing people together through music to magic. Lifelong friendships have emerged from the events, even though they may only see each other once a

year, according to the Bowers. The campground also offers several amenities on the 60 acre property such as showers equipped with on demand water heaters, a laundry, flush toilets, full hookups, and some sites offer cable as well. Most of the campground had wifi available, according to the Bowers.

According to the Bowers, they work with local recreation companies such as Blackwater Outdoors and the Tucker County Convention and Visitors Bureau to assist and refer customers who are looking to explore outdoor recreation in the area.

During the Board's regular May 21st meeting, the Blackwater Public Service District provided an update on the progress of various water and sewer projects in Davis and Thomas. Board member and Davis Mayor Al Tomson provided the

update. Also present was Board Member Judy Cronauer and Region VII Representatives, Executive Director Shane Whitehair and Project Specialist Lisa

Fred Davis and Tucker County Commission President Mike Rosenau attended in the audience, as well. "These are huge projects for these small communities," Whitehair said. "As far as they have gotten with these is pretty substantial."

Tomson said that the sewer collection projects in Davis and Thomas were vital to the future of the PSD. According to Tomson, the collection systems of both towns were needing upgraded prior to consolidation in the future with the PSD. "It has to get done," Tomson said. "The money is there and for the PSD standpoint, we need to get the collection systems in order before we consolidate into the PSD."

Whitehair informed the board that the engineers are working on right of way agreements and easements. Region VII is also looking to procure the final \$2.7 million for the project, according to Whitehair. "There's a couple of options that we are pursuing," Whitehair said. "We still don't know exactly what the best option will be, but that is ongoing and hopefully we will know sooner rather than later."

Tomson said that the project in Davis to

update infrastructure is moving along with groundbreaking anticipated for the fall. "So our project is still moving forward for Davis," Tomson said. "We're still looking at potentially breaking ground in the fall. If not in the fall, it will be after winter in the Spring."

Thomas, according to Whitehair, have several water and sewer projects cur-

"We couldn't do it without Region VII," Tomson said. "Its new to us, we are learning as we go. You guys keep us straight and you're good at your jobs. We appreciate you."

> Whitehair commended the cooperation of Davis and Thomas in the process and said that both projects were "full steam ahead" towards completion. "We got good teams on both side, Thomas and Davis, and they are doing really well," Whitehair said. "Its full steam ahead."

Community Group Voice Concern Over Forest Service Clear Cut in Horseshoe Run


A group of residents have raised concerns over a U.S. Forest Service Forest Plan for the Upper Cheat River area north of Parsons, near Leadmine and Horseshoe Run. The project, slated for implementation the beginning of August, will encompass 33,991 acres of National Forest System land in the Upper Cheat River watershed, according to the Forest Service.

Julie Fosbender, a Natural Resource Specialist with the Forest Service, replied to a request from the Parsons Advocate. In her response, Fosbender said, "Before major actions (like wildlife habitat improvement through harvesting timber or constructing a campground) can be undertaken on a National Forest, we must consider the environmental impacts of that action, as required by the National Environmental Policy Act, and provide opportunities for the public to comment and review our study."

The goal of the project, according to the Forest Service, is mostly maintenance, wildlife habitat improvement and expanding public access. "This project aims to

move the Upper Cheat watershed closer to the Forest Plan desired conditions by improving forest health & age class

diversity, improving wildlife habitat, and

improving stream/riparian conditions and habitat," the Forest Service wrote.

John Coleman of the Horseshoe Community Group spoke to the Parsons Advocate about the concerns within the community in Leadmine and Horseshoe Run. Coleman was also one of the group that recently measured and submitted a Hemlock tree in the area to the state for inclusion on the West Virginia Big Tree Database. Coleman also said the area is home to a Red Oak that is estimated to be 260 years old. The Red Oak, according to Coleman has a circumference of 17 feet. "We've been trying to work with the Forest Service to get them to modify their project," Coleman said. "It involves a bunch of clearcutting right around us."

According to Coleman, the Hemock tree, located overlooking the Forest Service Horseshoe Campground, is the third largest on record at a height of 131 feet and estimated to be well over 200 years old. "There are now two state listed champion





trees in or next to the areas proposed to be clearcut in a Forest Service project in Tucker and Preston counties,"

According to Coleman, the Forest Service plan will clearcut 3,500 acres of forest stands in the Upper Cheat River Project, including where the recently found Hemlock tree is located. Coleman said the majority of the clearcut will be conducted on steeply sloped areas. "Most of the stands proposed to be clearcut are on what the Forest Service considers steep or very steep sloped raising concerns among local residents about the amount of flooding in the Horseshoe watershed," Coleman said.

Coleman said residents are concerned about flooding the area and the impact that the clearcutting would have on the area. "People are pretty concerned about flooding," Coleman said. "We got flooding in Leadmine and Shafer Town from Horseshoe Run."

Coleman said the community group would like the Forest Service to reconsider the amount of clearcutting on the slopes. Coleman said that he has been in contact with the Forest Service on the issue. "We would like the Forest Service to reduce the clearcutting on these steep slopes,' Coleman said. "So, I've been talking to them about that and haven't gotten much traction."

The Forest Service timeline showed that a public comment period was scheduled for March 1st of 2022 with an objection period beginning September 13th of that year. A final decision on the project is estimated for August 1st of this year to coincide with implementation, according to the timeline.

A number of comment letters had been received by the Forest Service during the 30-day comment period in March of 2022, according to the Forest Service. Objections given in the letters ranged from the impact on tourism, objections to logging, concerns over soil erosion in the rivers, protection of the largest trees and concerns over flooding from clear cutting including the impact on homes in the area, among others. Several letters in support of the project were also received, according to the Forest Ser-

Within Tucker County, according to the West Virginia Big Tree Database (revised 6/2/23), there are currently

five trees registered: a 77 foot tall Butternut tree in Parsons, a 97 foot tall Mountain Magnolia near Parsons, a 105 foot tall Mountain Magnolia near Parsons, a 86 foot tall Quaking Aspen near Davis and a 102 foot tall Northern Red Oak near St. George.

Of course, you can always appeal to the Circuit Court of Tucker County as a last resort, but unless you hire a good lawyer you'll lose and be required to PAY ALL FINES as well as ALL COURT COSTS! On Page 38 you'll find 5 pages on Signs (and flags): "Signs (and Flags) not expressly permitted under this code are prohibited" until the Zoning Officer approves and you pay the Sign Fee, which has yet to be announced! Is there really a sign and flag problem in Davis? On Page 49 you find that Emergency Shelters are not allowed without a permit! Really? On your own property?

Probably the most serious problem with this ZO is that even though Town Council was forced by residents to put it up for a vote, in the final draft the TOWN COUNCIL HAS THE POWER TO AMEND the ZO WITHOUT ANY PUBLIC INPUT!! 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WVDNR reminds public to leave young wildlife alone

Contact with wildlife can harm the animal and transmit disease and parasites

SOUTH CHARLESTON, W.VA. — With the arrival of spring weather and the emergence of young wildlife, the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources (WVDNR) is reminding people that possessing wildlife without a permit is illegal and that handling wild animals can spread disease and parasites that can be fatal.

"Watching young animals is a rewarding pastime and a great way to appreciate the beauty of West Virginia's natural resources, but we want to make sure folks know that wildlife viewing must be done from a distance," said WVDNR Director Brett McMillion.

Picking up, touching or even getting close to young wildlife can greatly increase the chance of the animal being harmed because predators are often attracted to the scent humans leave behind. Handling wildlife can also harm humans, as contact increases the risk of transmitting viral diseases and parasites, such as rabies, Lyme disease, roundworms and ticks.

"We receive a lot of calls about young wildlife, especially fawns, rabbits and birds that people think are abandoned or hurt, but that is hardly ever the case," said Vinnie Johnson, a WVDNR wildlife biologist.

Does leave their fawns hidden for hours while they search

for food. Fawns remain still while the mother is away, going undetected by predators because of their unique color pattern and near lack of scent. By approaching a bedded fawn, humans can leave behind a scent that can attract predators and put the animal at risk.

Young birds are often picked up because people assume they fell out of the nest. If the bird is pink and featherless and the nest is easy to reach, the nestling can be put back into the nest. Most of the time, however, the bird is fledging and has intentionally left the nest to learn how to feed and fly. These young birds are feathered and can hop or make short flights. Because of this behavior, people assume they fell out of the

"While wanting to care for an animal is to be admired, we want to remind people that the best thing to do is to leave young wildlife alone," said Johnson.

Possessing wildlife without a permit is illegal in West Virginia. Fines for the unlawful possession of a bear cub, fawn, squirrel, bird or any other wild animal range from \$20 up to \$300 and/or 10-100 days in jail.





Attorney General Morrisey Announces Pocahontas County Student as Statewide 'Kids Kick Opioids' Winner

CHARLESTON — West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey announced a Pocahontas County student as the statewide winner of this year's Kids Kick Opioids contest, a public service announcement partnership with elementary and middle schools that encourages students to raise awareness of prescription painkiller abuse.

Judges selected Mallory Koerber from Marlinton Middle School in Pocahontas County as the statewide winner. They chose Koerber's artwork from entries submitted by students across West Virginia.

Koerber's winning design features a drawing of a woman pulling back a curtain on her face to reveal the words, "Addiction is giving up everything for one thing. Recovery is giving up one thing for everything."

"Mallory's artwork hits the nail on the head. Addiction makes people give up everything for that one thing," Attorney General Morrisey said. "That's the heartbreaking reality of opioid dependence for people in active addiction and their families. But the rest of the message—Recovery is giving up one thing for everything—is the hope of every person in addiction and every substance abuser's family."

Koerber's design will soon appear in newspapers across West Virginia as the Attorney General's next public service announcement.

Judges also recognized Isabella Swayne from Andrew Jackson Middle School in Kanawha County and Catherine Tirona from St. Joseph the Worker School in Hancock County as the statewide runners-up.

Their designs will appear with Koerber's on the Attorney General's website.

The Attorney General received a total of 2,135 entries from 2,177 students at 71 middle and elementary schools across West Virginia. The submissions included a mix of drawings, poems and other designs aimed at promoting awareness.

"I congratulate Mallory, our runners-up and all our regional winners for their hard work and creativity in promoting awareness of opioid abuse," Attorney General Morrisey said. "We must reach kids at an early age and teach them about the dangers and serious consequences of drug abuse, and we must do everything possible to attack the root causes of addiction."

Judges recognized winning entries from 69 students overall. Those designs will be displayed in the State Capitol in the fall.

Kids Kick Opioids represents one of many initiatives through which the Attorney General has sought to combat West Virginia's drug overdose death rate, including a lawsuit against the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration that achieved sweeping reforms to the nation's drug quota system.

The Attorney General also has fought the opioid crisis with civil litigation, multistate initiatives, funding to target opioid abuse, criminal prosecutions, new technology, engagement with the faith-based community and education.

The West Virginia Board of Pharmacy, West Virginia Association of School Nurses and the Capitol Police assisted the Attorney General in judging the public service announcement contest.





Gov. Justice announces popular West Virginia Waterfall Trail surpasses 75,000 check-Ins

Three new waterfalls added to the trail as summer travel begins

CHARLESTON, WV — Gov. Jim Justice announced today over the Memorial Day weekend, the West Virginia Waterfall Trail surpassed 75,000 participant check-ins. The popularity of the nation's first statewide waterfall trail continues to grow, with data showing that visitors from all 50 U.S. states and 41 countries are now joining the fun.

As the summer season kicks off, the Department of Tourism is adding three more falls, bringing the total number of stellar stops along the trail to 43.

"It is absolutely beyond belief that our West Virginia Waterfall Trail has reached over 75,000 check-ins. We're talking about West Virginians and visitors from all 50 states and 41 countries who have explored these trails," said Gov. Justice. "I couldn't be more excited that we're adding three more incredible waterfalls to this trail. It opens up even more opportunities for folks to get out there and experience the breathtaking beauty right here in Almost Heaven."

The West Virginia Waterfall Trail has been nationally recognized by major travel publications such as Travel + Leisure, USA Today, Southern Living and Fodor's Travel. The trail continues to receive remarkable participation, as more than 10,000 prizes have been awarded to visitors for their adventuring efforts. Iconic favorites such as Cathedral Falls, Kanawha Falls and Blackwater Falls remain some of the most visited falls. The trail also features lesser-known hidden gems, including Seneca Creek Falls, Parkin's Waterfall and Loopemount Waterfall.

"We are absolutely thrilled to see the West



Virginia Waterfall Trail receive 75,000 checkins," said West Virginia Tourism Secretary Chelsea Ruby. "Our beautiful state is home to the most abundant collection of falls, and we are thankful to be able to share that with the rest of the world in a fun and engaging way. Whether you're just getting started or already completed the old list, there's another waterfall just waiting to be explored in Almost Heaven, West Virginia!'

Three New Waterfalls

Today, the Department of Tourism added three new falls to the trail. Each of these waterfalls has been made more accessible for visitors in recent months due to trail infrastructure improvements:

Clear Fork Rail Trail Waterfall

To find this deceptively unassuming beauty, watch for rail Clear Fork Rail Trail signs along WV Route 1, also known as Clear Fork Road. The closest access point to the rail trail allows for an easy walk to the base of the waterfall. Navigating toward the waterfall, GPS driving directions will take you to the parking area, just adjacent to the Larry Allen "Crocky" Holstein, Jr. Memorial Bridge. Once parked, head to the trail kiosk from the road and turn left to follow the wide gravel path – just under a quarter of a mile upstream. Since there is limited cell service in the area, be sure to download your route ahead of time.

While hikers and cyclists will hear flowing water as they pass by along the Clear Fork Rail Trail, you may not see the full majesty of this waterfall unless you take a moment to peer up into the canopy. From this perspective, you can appreciate the multi-tiered waterfall that extends like stairsteps at least 40 feet up the mountainside into dense forest cover. In spring or after a heavy rain, you will spot multiple smaller falls along this section of the trail.

White Oak Falls

Nestled within the lush forests of Mercer County, White Oak Falls can now be accessed with a 4-mile total out-and-back hike through a scenic valley along the Bluestone River. A partnership between the Mercer County Commission, the Nature Conservatory and Camp Creek State Park has led to trail expansions and improvements beyond Brush Creek Falls, giving way to the additional two miles connecting to the beautiful White Oak Falls.

After parking at the access point for Brush Creek Falls, continue down the trail past Brush Creek's rushing waters, another 1.75 miles to reach the more delicate White Oak Falls. This gentle cascade tumbles over tiered rock formations - where the White Oak Branch meets the Bluestone River. As you make your way back to the Brush Creek Falls parking area, you'll round out your hike at about 4 miles total, through both State Parks and Nature Conservancy land.

Devil's Sawmill

Head to Clay, West Virginia to explore the beauty of Buffalo Creek. Driving to the location of this waterfall, you will find yourself in the parking area of Rail Explorers, where - starting on June 8, 2024 - you can purchase tickets to ride the rails on their state-of-theart railbikes. Enjoy the views and scenery for about 5 miles until you approach the striking sight of Devil's Sawmill, which is a local

Waterfall wanderers hoping to check-in before Rail Explorer's grand opening on June 8, will need to hike or cycle to the site, which is also feasible, by parking at the Rail Explorers headquarters and traveling approximately 5 miles along the railroad to come upon Devil's Sawmill. Watch for rail bikes and wildlife along the tracks, as you trek or ride 10 miles total to see the falls.

How to Participate

Checking into the Waterfall Trail is a simple process made possible by Bandwango, a travel technology platform that makes checking in at each location quick and easy.

To get started, visit WVtourism.com/waterfalls and register to have the West Virginia Waterfall Trail passport delivered straight to your smartphone.
