### Parsons Police Assist in Stolen Car Case; Move Forward on Funding for License Plate Readers

Parsons Police Chief Kevin Keplinger updated the Parsons City Council on recent developments within his department on June 18th during the City's regular meeting. Included in the updates were a stolen car case out of Ohio and an email from Senator Manchin's office regarding a Congressional spending funding

Keplinger informed the Council of a case involving a stolen vehicle out of Ohio. Keplinger said he had received a call from Guernsey County,

OH Sheriff detectives regarding a stolen vehicle that was suspected to be in the area. "We received a call about a week and a half, two weeks ago from Guernsey County, Ohio," Keplinger said. "The Sheriff's department detectives there, on a stolen vehicle complaint that they felt might

request.

be in the area."

Keplinger credited Patrolman Gidley with making the break in the case when he recognized where the individual was located. "We conducted an investigation," Keplinger said. "Patrolman Gidley was able to recognize from some photos where that individual was located."

Keplinger said when a search warrant was served, the department found evidence including parts from the vehicle that are being utilized by the Guernsey, OH Sheriff Department in their investigation. According to Keplinger, the vehicle had been brought to the Parsons area to be parted out and sold. "Subsequently, a search warrant was served," Keplinger said. "We found parts for a vehicle that were going to assist the Guern-

sey County Sheriff's Department with their investigation into the vehicle that was brought here and then parted out and sold."

Several arrest warrants have been issued in the case, according to Keplinger, from multiple jurisdictions. "In the process of that, we were able to obtain arrest warrants for this individual," Keplinger said. "There are also arrest warrants out of Ohio for this individual and a parole violation out of Warren County for this individual. So we're kind of tying up that investigation."

Keplinger also informed the Council that he had received an email from the

Senator's office on Friday, June 14th regarding a \$50,000 request for Congressional Directed Funding for license plate readers for the Police Department. "One of my proposals to request for license plate reader cameras and different things, has been forwarded on, as one of his proposals," Keplinger

According to Keplinger, while the email was a good sign, it does not confirm that the request has been granted. "That doesn't mean that its a done deal," Keplinger said. "But when you look at Congressionally Directed Spending, that's kind of the big hurdle."

Keplinger said he was hopeful that he would have a determination by the end of summer, with disbursement of funds expected in the Spring. "We should know, hopefully by the end of summer whether that has been approved or not," Keplinger said. "I am optimistic with that, though that we will receive that funding by Spring of next year."

# County Commission Allocate EMS Funding; Pass Resolutions

The Tucker County Commission met Wednesday, June 26th to address a short list of business, including the allocation of EMS funds and a resolution for the Blackwater PSD. Tucker County Commission President Mike Rosenau was absent. Tucker County Com-

missioner Fred Davis chaired the meeting in Rosenau's absence. Tucker County Commissioner Tim Knotts was also present.

An allocation of funds in the amount of \$13,557.55 was approved by the Commission for EMS. In the motion, the Commission left \$100 in the account in order to keep it open for future use. "The release of EMS funds \$13,557.55," Davis said. "But then we will keep \$100 to keep it in the account to keep it open."

During his Commissioner Report, Commissioner Knotts emphasized the need to support EMS. "We need to be supporting our EMS," Knotts said. "Tucker Countians, you voted me in here, now I'm asking you, we need to be supporting our EMS with the flyers they send out or the fund raising cards."

Knotts said that the entity has a new board, leadership and management, but despite their ongoing efforts, support from the community is needed until such time as the State approves EMS funding. "We have a new board, we have new leadership, new management," Knotts said. "They're doing all they can, but they still need our support until we can get something approved from the State that we've been fighting for. Tucker Countians, please support EMS."

In other business, the County Commission approved a request for payment through resolution for the Blackwater Public Service District, according to Tucker County Administrator Sheila DeVilder. "The resolution for the Blackwater PSD, what that is, is a resolution to actually make a payment towards expenses for Blackwater PSD through Region VII," DeVilder said. "Expenses that they have paid out on behalf of Blackwater PSD."

The resolution, according to DeVilder, was required to make payments through a Community Block Grant Region VII obtained on behalf of the new Public Service District. "The funds that they are using

are the Community Block Grant funds," DeVilder said. "But it goes through Tucker County Commission, so we have to approve with a resolution and a request for payment everything that is done through that grant."


A motion for payment was made by Commissioner Knotts and approved by both Commissioners present.

A resolution was also passed on behalf of a grant obtained by Community Corrections. "(Community Corrections) did receive his grant when we went to Charleston," DeVilder said. "The grant that he was applying for, he did receive it."

According to DeVilder, all documents and contracts, regarding the grant, have been received. "We received the contract and all of the documentation."

The resolution, DeVilder said, was a formality that would allow documents to be signed without the need to come before the Commission as an agenda item everytime. It was mainly a time saving matter, according to DeVilder. "It usually requires that instead of coming back to County Commission every time you need to sign a document, a resolution allows the Commission President to sign documents as necessary when that grant is in actual full force and effect," DeVilder said.

The resolution approved by both Commissioners present in a motion by Commissioner Knotts, would allow Tucker County President Mike Rosenau to sign the documents independent of the other Commissioners. His signing powers would extend to all aspects of the grant including payments, contracts and vouchers, according to DeVilder. "So this resolution will allow Michael to sign all the documents as President for anything regarding that grant, whether its the grant contract, payment vouchers or anything like that in the future without having to come back to County Commission for approval each and every time," DeVilder said.



## Auvil Steps Down After 17 Years on Parsons Council

After 17 years of service to the City of Parsons, Tim Auvil has stepped down from the City Council. The move comes following Auvil's decision not to run for Recorder after being appointed to the post by Parsons Mayor Bruce Kolsun. The appointment was part of a reshuffling of duties following the resignation of Mayor Dorothy Judy that saw then Recorder Kolsun appointed Mayor and Auvil appointed Recorder.

Kolsun read the inscription during the plaque presentation on June 18th. "In

appreciation for your 17 years of outstanding, I will emphasize, outstanding, and dedicated, I will also emphasize dedicated, service" Kolsun said, "the citizens of Parsons of West Virginia."

June 18th was Auvil's last meeting as the Recorder for the City of Parsons Council. "This is your last meeting, unfortunately," Kolsun said. "And we will miss you and we'll miss your brain, too."

Auvil was given a plaque and a shirt at the presentation. Auvil will be replaced by Rick Lemon as Recorder on July 2.

### **News of Record**

The following criminal complaints have been filed in the Tucker County Magistrate office:

- WENDALL ALLEN MORGAN, of Keyser, was charged with one count of Persons prohibited from possessing firearms. According to the complaint, on Saturday, June 22, Deputy C.R. Summerfield of the Tucker County sheriff's Office (TCSO) was patrolling WV32 in Canaan when he observed a vehicle fail to obey a traffic control device. He initiated a traffic stop and the driver stated that he did not have his wallet with him but stated that his name was Wendall Morgan.
- Trooper G.P. Hahn of the West Virginia State Police arrived on scene and both officers observed a marijuana smoking device on the passenger seat. Morgan stated that he smoked marijuana before leaving his residence. Deputy Summerfield administered a series of field sobriety tests and Morgan showed no sign of impairment. While conducting a search of the vehicle Morgan stated that there was a handgun under the driver's side floor mat. Officers located a Taurus TCP 380 ACP concealed under the mat. They also located additional marijuana smoking devices, containers and baggies containing a green leafy substance that is consistent with marijuana
- Summerfield contacted Tucker County 911 and provided name and date of birth of Morgan and was advised that his right of drive a motor vehicle was suspended. After further investigation it was discovered that he was prohibited from possessing a firearm due to previous felony charges.
- SETH T. WILES, of Aurora, was charged with one count Aggravated DUI,
- One count Expired registration and one count no proof of insurance. The complaint states that on Wednesday, May 1 at approximately 1:40 a.m. Officer Victor Pyles was contacted by WVSPElkins Communications regarding an ight call from Tucker 911. The call was regarding a single vehicle collision which was said to have occurred on WV32 at or near Springhouse Road. Pyles was advised that the driver was possibly intoxicated and was injured. At 2:19 a.m. Pyles arrived on scene and began the crash investigation. The driver, who was being treated by EMS and ready for transport, was identified as Seth T. Wiles. Pyles gained a statement from the defendant that he must have fallen asleep and was attempting to drive home from work. He further states that he had 4 beers at Mama Mia's prior to the accident. Pyles could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverageatthetimeofinitial contact. Due to injuries, no field sobriety tests could be administered. He was transported to DMC for treatment.
- A registration inquiry through Elkins Communications advised that the registration was expired as of 7-2022. The officer spoke with Mrs. Wiles who stated she would provide insurance for the vehicle which she never did and no insurance information was inside the vehicle.
- Upon arriving at DMC the defendant was asked to supply blood for a CDDP Blood Kit to determine BAC. He agreed and a blood draw affidavit was filled out along with consent in the CDDP kit. Said kitwas sentto WVSPLaboratory fortoxicology. On May 29, the officer received the results of said blood test which showed the defendant had a BAC of .204.
- The defendant was found to have a BAC of .15 or above justifying the charge of Aggravated DUI. The vehicle has expired registration justifying the charge of expired registration and the defendant/vehicle owners, have failed to provide proof of insurance justifying the charge of no proof of insurance.
- JASONWILLIAMHEBB, of Harman, was charged with one count of Driving under influence of alcohol, controlled substances or drugs. According to the complaint, on Saturday, March 23 Deputy C.R. Summerfield of the Tucker County Sheriff's Office was dispatched to a multiple vehicle crash located on US 219 near Parsons. When he arrived on scene, he discovered a male subject, namely Jason William Hebb, and he appeared to be impaired. He was allegedly falling backwards into a ditch and his speech was slurred. Upon further investigation it was determined that Hebb had crossed the center line and struck 2 vehicles. Field sobriety tests were administered and Hebb failed them all.
- Summerfield obtained a search warrant for the defendant's blood and said warrant was executed at DMC. A CDDP blood kit was used and sent to WVSPForensic Lab for examination. Summerfield received the results from the blood kit and discovered that alprazolam, amphetamine, fentanyl, methamphetamine and norfentanyl were confirmed to be present.
- Summerfield initiated a follow up telephone call with the other drivers involved in the crash and was provided with medical records from DMC. One driver sustained acute cervical strain and mild gross closed head injury and the other driver had bruising to the area of the abdomen where the lap belt lays along with a seat belt burn to the right side of the neck.
- KELLY LYNN PENNINGTON, of Parsons, was charged with one count Domestic battery. The complaint states that on Thursday, June 27 at approximately 6:35 p.m., Tucker County 911 Communications dispatched any available Law Enforcement for a domestic in progress at 101 Price Street. Patrolman First Class N.C. Gidley, TrooperG.P.HahnandDeputyB.M. Gidleyadvised they would be en-route to that location. Tucker 911 advised that the altercation had been physical in nature.
- PFC. Gidley and Trooper Hahn arrived on scene at approximately 6:37 p.m. Gidley spoke with the victim who, in summary, stated that he had arrived at the residence to obtain some of his belongings and an

- argument began between him and the defendant. He stated that they argued as he went into the bedroom of the residence and as he bent down to get some belongings, she began striking him in the face. He advised she allegedly struck him with a closed fist and he attempted to shield himself by putting his hands up near his head. Pfc. Gidley observed blood on the right side of the victim's mouth. A mark was observed on the left side of the victim's neck by Trooper Hahn and Pfc. Gidley.
- Pfc. Gidley spoke with a witness who observed the incident and they stated that the victim and the defendant were having a verbal argument after the victim arrived to retrieve some of his belongings. The witness stated that when both individuals went into the bedroom, he went upstairs and immediately came back down. The witness stated that as he turned into the bedroom he observed the defendant striking the victim multiple times in the head. The witness stated that the victim had his hands up attempting to stop the strikes.
- Pennington was placed into custody by Pfc. Gidley for Domestic battery. She was then transported to the WVSPBarracks by Trooper Hahn for processing and then to the Parsons Police Department to await arrival of the on-call Magistrate for arraignment.
- All the above crimes took place in Tucker County and all individuals are presumed innocent until proven otherwise in a court of law.

# Fairmont State Board of Governors approves West Virginia Campus Self-defense Act Policy

During their June meeting, Fairmont State University's Board of Governors approved Policy #GA-08 "Policy regarding West Virginia Campus Self-defense Act." This policy provides implementation guidelines for the Campus Self-defense Act (sometimes called the "Campus Carry Bill"). The law was passed by the West Virginia Legislature in 2023 and will go into effect July 1,

"Fairmont State takes this law and the possession of concealed handguns on campus very seriously," said President Mike Davis. "In consultation with campus leadership, I established the Campus Carry Committee (CCC) in Fall 2023 to study and recommend relevant actions. The committee thoroughly researched and vigorously discussed the issues, resulting in an outstanding list of suggestions. The Board of Governors' approval of Policy #GA-08 formalizes Fairmont

State's approach."

From the beginning, the University has understood the complexity of this law and the importance of providing thoughtful and thorough communications—both written and in person.

"During our student forum, held near the end of the spring semester, we heard from both a student who owns firearms and another who had been affected by gun violence," said Davis. "Both students had an opportunity to respectfully express their perspectives in an ideologically neutral setting. I'm proud of them, of the Student Government Association for hosting that forum, and of all campus constituencies for the respectful way they've approached campus carry."

BOG Policy #GA-08 outlines where individuals who possess a current and valid concealed handgun license may carry their pistol or revolver on campus. It also outlines a list of exceptions including prohibiting weapons in residence hall rooms, at events of 1,000 people or more, at disciplinary hearings, and in areas where patient care or mental health counseling is provided.

The University will be fully compliant with the law by July 1. This includes placing signage on the doors of all spaces where concealed carry is prohibited and providing expanded FAQs on the Campus Carry website.

During July and August, additional signage will be posted, new infographics will be developed, and a robust communication plan will be implemented. Fairmont State's fall semester begins August 26, with new students set to move-in on August 22.

"My goal is that the Campus Self-defense Act will be a non-issue when the fall semester kicks off," said Davis. "Furthermore, the committee will closely monitor implementation efforts and recommend updates to our procedures. In the end, I am confident that as a university community, we will do everything possible to both keep all Falcons safe and make sure they feel safe."



Charleston WV - The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

July 3, 1863: At Gettysburg, Union troops in the 1st West Virginia Cavalry took part in a fruitless charge against Confederate infantrymen during the waning moments of that historic battle.

July 4, 1882: The steamboats Scioto and John Lomas collided on the Ohio River as they were returning from holiday excursions. The Scioto sank almost instantly, and 70 people drowned.

July 4, 1918: Poet Muriel Miller Dressler was born in Kanawha County. Her poem "Appalachia," published in 1970, was her signature piece.

July 4, 1928: West Virginia dedicated Droop Mountain Battlefield State Park. Droop Mountain was one of the most important Civil War battles fought on West Virginia soil.

July 4, 1944: Drummer Butch Miles was born in Ohio but grew up in Hinton and

Charleston. He became one of jazz's greatest drummers, performing with the likes of Count Basie, Frank Sinatra, Lena Horne, Ella Fitzgerald, Benny Goodman, and Tony Bennett.

July 5, 1896: Cartoonist Kendall Vintroux was born at Fraziers Bottom. He began his career with the Charleston Gazette when he submitted a cartoon about the town of Poca's first paved road. Many of his drawings are now in the collection of the University of Charleston.

July 5, 1923: Football coach John McKay was born in Everettville, Monongalia County, and graduated from Shinnston High. McKay is the winningest coach in University of Southern California history, leading his teams to a 127-40-8 record from 1960 to 1975, when he became the first head coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

July 5, 1950: Army Private Kenneth Shadrick of Wyoming County was one of the first U.S. servicemen killed in action in the Korean War

July 6, 1806: Statesman Charles James Faulkner was born in Martinsburg. Faulkner served in the West Virginia legislature, U.S. Congress (1851-59, 1875-77), as U.S. minister to France, and as an aide to "Stonewall" Jackson during the Civil War.

July 6, 1848: Historian Virgil A. Lewis was born in Mason County. In 1905, Governor Dawson appointed Lewis as the first director of the Bureau of Archives and History.

July 6, 1883: Judge "R. D." Bailey was born at Baileysville, Wyoming County. Bailey came



July 4, 1938: Musician Bill Withers Jr. was born into a miner's family of 13 children in Slab Fork, Raleigh County. In 1971, he released his first album, Just As I Am, including his first Grammy-winning song, "Ain't No Sunshine." In 2015, he was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

July 7, 1928: The Madonna of the Trail monument was dedicated in Wheeling. It is one of 12 such statues erected along the National Road to honor America's pioneering women.

The glass plate negatives survive today in several archived collections.






