Parsons Votes to Replace Auvil on Parks and Recreation Board

The City of Parsons Council voted on July 16th to replace former City Recorder Tim Auvil with City Council Member Seth

Town of Davis Approves Short Term Rentals

The Town of Davis has approved the first hort term rental business licenses since lifting the moratorium. A total of 13 locations were issued licenses during their regular council

meeting July 10th. Council Member Jennie Helmick said the Town should require proof that a separate State certificate is issued for each location applied for. "Even though their license from the State may not require that they have the name of every short term rental on it, we should require proof that they applied. Cause otherwise, they could have 10 licenses running under here and only paying taxes and stuff under one without proof," Helmick said. "So, all I'm asking is that we require proof for each one that they have added

to the one license." Dustin Luzier from Louie's Laundry and Apartments, LLC was present at the meeting. Luzier had applied for a business license for seven short term rental locations in Davis. "For instance, I have EIN," Luzier said. "Louie's Laundry and Apartments, LLC, that's my main company. Where I engage in the public is 285 Spruce Street, Thomas, I have one for there, 168 5th Street, here, for my store, and 1685th Street for Louie's Links. I have to have one for each one of those."

Luzier said that separate certificates or licenses were not required for rental properties because he would not have those regularly open to the public and constituted a private transaction. "I do not have to have one for each rental location," Luzier said. "You do not pay separate taxes on those. That's all to the county as far as what taxes go, but you don't have to have a separate license or application certificate for each rental location because you are not engaging with the public at that location. Residential, even short term rentals, is not engaging with the public," Luzier said. "So you do not have to have that, I can assure you."

Luzier said he did not intent to engage in renting short term rentals, but sought the license to protect his assets in the future. Luzier also said he did not trust the future actions of the Council. "In my location, all my locations I put on there, I never plan to rent short term rentals," Luzier said. "I don't plan to rent any of these out short term, but from the actions of what this Council has done in the past, if another moratorium is put in or zoning is ever in place, I want to ensure the value of my property is going to be as good, if not better, than somebody else's in the long run if its going to be grandfathered in, as was said in the past."

Helmick said she did not agree with issuing a license to a property that was not going to be

used for the purpose stated. "So you are asking us to issue you a municipal business license for a short term rental when you are not operating as a short term rental," Helmick said.

Luzier said that a license cannot be denied based solely on the fact that he did not intent to currently short term rent. "You cannot deny because you have to have business license before you can ever get started," Luzier said. ' You cannot deny on the basis of no business or no activity. According to what I know of State code and everything I have read on it, unless there is a certain Town ordinance that says if you don't do business we can pull your license. I don't see how you can say, you're not doing it so we will pull your license."

Davis Mayor Al Tomson said he agreed with Luzier on the point. "I agree with Dustin," Tomson said."We never required that before of anybody."

Luzier said the decision to apply for the license now as opposed to sometime in the future if he changes his business model, was to be grandfathered in and assure that the option remains open to him in the future. "Its easier now than what it is going to be in the future," Luzier said. "As long as I pay the business license and I meet all the requirements on that application, I don't know how you can determine a business from opening or starting and if you're saying I have to, I mean if I have to kick people out and rent a weekend, I'll do that if I have to do that. If I have to rent my places out a weekend a year to prove that I am doing that, I can arrange that."

Helmick said the Town was not like the State and said a license could not be issued for a short term rental if long term renters are in it. "With the Town, we are not like the State," Helmick said. "We require a business license for every location. If you've got a long term renter in there, we can't issue you a license for short term rental on that property."

Luzier countered Helmick's statement by asking if the requirement was on any application or Town ordinance. "Is that on the application?" Luzier said. "Is that in any town ordinance anywhere?"

Tomson said the license could be issued, regardless to the current use or renter status. "I believe, basically, that we can issue you a short term license, short term rental license even though you have a full time resident in there," Tomson said. "We've done licenses to people who were actively renovating their properties, but they were actively working towards making that a rental."

Tomson went on to say that the Town has never checked or questioned applicants in the past and he saw little reason to begin now. "They say they are going to do a short term

EMS Faces Major Budget Shortfall

The Tucker County Ambulance Authority is facing a huge budget shortfall, according to Board President Dennis Filler. Tucker County is not alone in what is shaping up to be a Statewide crisis of EMS providers shuttering their doors."We're not alone in the financial difficulties that EMS is having," Filler said.

According to Filler, stations across the state continue to shut down due to lack of funding with some of those entities contacting Tucker County about purchasing their equipment. "Will the State be making future EMS investments?" Filler said. "Obviously, we have financial difficulties. There are other organizations in the state that are shutting down and continue to shut down."

According to Filler, EMS is currently running a \$1.126 million budget on working capital of \$830,000 and has been rapidly exhausting a \$221,000 escrow account to make up for the shortfall. According to Filler, there is a chance of bankruptcy by year's end without drastic changes to the current operational mode. "Obviously that is way short of the amount of money that we would like to have if we were to run two stations 24/7," Filler said.

Filler said the new configuration would reduce the number of hours both stations are fully staffed and reduce the 24 hour staffing to one station with the other station staffed during peak hours. Filler also said the reduced schedule would not affect the organization's capacity to respond to two calls at once.

Filler said various EMS organizations and providers are in talks with the State. "I did get the announcement that there are meeting with the State and the EMS Coalition, EMS providers and that kind of stuff," Filler said. "So hopefully within the next two weeks we will get some more information about what's happening at the State level."

Simmons New Parsons City Administrator

Tucker County 911 Director Michael Simmons has been named as the City of Parsons City Administrator. The announcement came in the form of a vote by the City

of Parsons Council meeting Tuesday, July 16th.

Melissa Jones discussed the hiring

process and lauded Simmons as the best choice of candidates. "We had four interviews on July the 11th," Jones said. "I believe we have chosen the best person to become our new City Administrator."

Jones said Simmons had excelled as the County 911 Director and feels confident in

rental, we haven't checked to make sure that they do," Tomson said. "We haven't said, 'Are you going to start next weekend or six months from now?' We've just given them the license and I don't see why we shouldn't do it now.

Helmick continued to state that the Town required a copy of the certificate and that they had proof for his three businesses, but there was none for his short term rentals. Luzier replied that the City was asking for the impossible since by State code the short term rentals would be licensed under the LLC name and did not require separate certificates or filings. "There is no such thing," Luzier said. "You want me to pull something that is not there."

Luzier said the only reason he had to have a separate certificate for the laundromat in Thomas was because it engages with the public. Luzier also said that all of his units already have short term rental coverage, which is a more expensive insurance policy due to the increased risk of damage from more people being in and out of the units. "I'm scared if I don't do something now to protect my assets and my property, who knows what happens in two months, six months, three years, 10 years, 15 years."

Tomson summarized the issue to the Council and recommended approving all the applicants, except Craig O'Connor. "To summarize everything, there really isn't anything we should do now to prohibit or stop these short term rentals," Tomson said. "Regardless of what they are doing, except Craig O'Connor's."

Tomson said his issue with O'Connor's appli-

1 contractor killed, 3 WVDOH workers injured in work zones this construction season: Secretary Wriston says, "Slow down!" in work zones



CHARLESTON, WV – In the wake of the fourth worker being struck this year in the Mountain State's highway work zones, West Virginia Transportation Secretary Jimmy Wriston, P.E., is imploring motorists to pay attention and drive safely in work zones.

"Imagine, if you will, we're sitting here in my office working away, answering emails, taking care of documents and that kind of thing, and a semi-truck goes through this office at 70 miles an hour," Wriston said. "That's exactly what our workers are experiencing each and every day.

"When you go through these work zone, you have GOT to slow down."

On Wednesday, July 10, 2024, a West Virginia Division of Highways (WVDOH) mower operator and the driver of a pickup truck were seriously injured when the truck collided with the mower in the Interstate 79 median near Stonewood.

On Thursday, April 4, 2024, a woman working flag operations at a work zone on Route 340 South in Jefferson County was killed after another woman allegedly drove around a vehicle that had stopped in the work zone and ran over her.

On Thursday, March 14, 2024, WVDOH worker Jordan Swiger was setting up traffic cones near Clarksburg when he was hit by an impaired driver traveling too fast through the work zone.

"She hit me, and evidently I had at least a 60-foot flight path, according to different people," Swiger said following the incident. In addition to multiple broken bones and injuries, Swiger's skull was fractured in three places, leading to a three-week hospital stay.

Another WVDOH worker was treated and released from the hospital after being hit by a car while patching potholes on

Interstate 79 in Braxton County on Friday, March 29, 2024. The WVDOH District 7 worker was patching potholes on I-79 when a driver ran through the work zone, drove through the pothole that was being patched and struck the worker on the

"We have some of our lowest-paid individuals holding those flags and directing traffic, and they're responsible for every life, every soul, in that work zone," Wriston said. "It's serious, serious business.

"How could you possibly think it's okay to stick a key in the ignition, start your vehicle up, and drive through this office?" Wriston asked. "That's exactly what you're doing when you go through a work zone. You can't tell me you don't see those work zones, because they're EVERYWHERE."

Wriston said nearly all work zone crashes are due to driver error – speeding, distracted driving, or cell phone use. "This has got to be something that we address at our values level, our West Virginia values level," Wriston said. "We've got to show that we care about our fellow citizens."

Wriston said the WVDOH is actively trying to build safety into the design of every single highway project. "But the really critical part here, and this is critical, is the driver behavior."

Wriston said the WVDOH plans to partner with the state education system to emphasize safe driving.

"We're going to start training our citizens how to drive at a real early age. So that when you get to be of age to go get that driver's license it's ingrained in you. When you operate a vehicle, you've got to make good decisions."

With work continuing in all 55 counties across the state, the West Virginia Division of Highways and the West Virginia Department of Transportation remind the public of the importance of keeping everyone safe in work zones by keeping "Heads up; phones down!

Thayer, first Garrett College Board chair, dies

Believed creation of local college 'imperative' for community

Grantsville, MD – Diane Thayer, the first chair of the Garrett Community College Board of Trustees, passed away Saturday at Goodwill Retirement Community. Thayer – whose husband, the late Frederick A Thayer III, was a distinguished Garrett County jurist – was 90 years old.

"I thought it was imperative for a community college to be established in Garrett County," said Thayer in an interview celebrating the College's 50th anniversary in 2022. "I thought the technical programs were of prime importance to help the children of Garrett County earn a living in Garrett County. I'm a big fan of our community college in Garrett County and in the community college concept."

Thayer said the original Board of Trustees had a specific reason for selecting the site of the college's main campus in McHenry.

"That site was selected because it was equally accessible to the northern end and southern end of Garrett County," said Thayer, noting the location of the college has made it a central focus of county activity.

Thayer was appointed by the Garrett County Board of Education – the original controlling entity for the College – to be the first chair of the Board of Trustees. She is the longest-serving board chair in College history, serving in that role from 1969 to 1979, and retired from the Board in 1984.

"Chair Thayer played a critical role in both the establishment and suc-



cessful launch of what was then Garrett Community College," said Dr. Richard Midcap, Garrett College's president. "Our entire College community is saddened by her recent passing."

Thayer died just 12 days after another major figure in the College's history – Dr. Stephen J. Herman, GC's longest-serving president (1986-2006) – passed away.

"It's been a sad month for the College," said Midcap. "Our hearts go out to the Thayer and Hermann families."

One of Thayer's most cherished College memories was of the Class of 1973, which was the first graduating class.

"I can remember that first graduation," said Thayer during the 50th anniversary interview, noting it took place in the old gymnasium that was renovated and expanded to become the Performing Arts Center at Garrett College in 2022. "I congratulated the citizens of Garrett County for having the foresight to establish the community college. It was just an overwhelming emotion."

Thayer was a longtime parishioner of St. Matthew's Episcopal Church of Oakland and a volunteer at the Nearly New Shop and the nearby Transportation Museum. She was also an avid gardener and Pittsburgh Steelers fan.

Thayer graduated from the College of Wooster in Wooster, Ohio, where she met and married the future Judge Thayer. She taught elementary school in North Carolina while her husband studied law at Duke University School of Law. The couple eventually moved to Oakland to start their family.

July 24, 1823: Arthur Boreman, West Virginia's first governor, was born in Waynesburg, Pennsylvania. His family moved to Middlebourne, Tyler County, when he was still an infant.

July 24, 1919: Sam Taylor of Mercer became the County first West Virginia State Police trooper. During his tenure, Taylor tracked moonshiners and bootleggers, and helped set up new state police detachments.

July 24, 1929: Cornelius Charlton was born in East Gulf, Raleigh County. Charlton was killed in battle during the Korean War, and he was honored posthumously with the Medal of Honor.

July 24, 1942: Actor Chris Sarandon was born in Beckley. A film, stage and television performer, some of his credits include The Nightmare Before Christmas, The Princess Bride and an Oscar nomination for Dog Day Afternoon.

July 24, 1983: Kansas City Royals player and Glen Dale native George Brett was involved in the "Pine-Tar Bat Incident." After hitting a game-winning home run against the New York Yankees, the umpires ruled that Brett's bat contained too much pine tar and called him out. 

The national average for a gallon of gas rose two cents over the past week to \$3.52. The slight increase came as Hurricane Beryl hit the coast of Texas, a record number of Americans traveled by car over the July 4th

holiday, and oil costs continue to hover above \$80 per barrel. Today's national average is seven cents more than a month ago but four cents less than a year ago.

According to new data from the Energy Information Administration (EIA), gas demand dipped from 9.42 million barrels per day to 9.39 last week. Meanwhile, total domestic gasoline stocks fell from 231.7 to 229.7

million barrels, while gasoline production increased last week, averaging 10.3 million barrels daily.

At the close of Wednesday's formal trading session, West Texas Intermediate rose 69 cents to settle at \$82.10 a barrel. The EIA reports that crude oil inventories decreased by 3.4 million barrels from the previous week. At 445.1 million barrels, U.S. crude oil inventories are about 4% below the five-year average for this time of year.

Garrett College students complete CCMA program

Latest cohort tests out new hybrid course delivery module for College

McHenry, MD – Five students recently completed the classroom portion of the Certified Clinical Medical Assistant (CCMA) program at Garrett College. They are now working to complete their final externship hours before sitting for the CCMA national certification.

The CCMA program – which takes nearly a year to complete – consists of 426 hours of classroom and lab time, followed by 120 hours of externship. During the externship, students work with experienced medical assistants and phlebotomists in the field.

After externship completion, students are eligible to earn three national certifications through the National Healthcareer Association. They do so by sitting for the Certified Phlebotomy Technician (CPT), Certified Medical Administrative Assistant (CMAA), and Certified Clinical Medical Assistant (CCMA) exams.

"We're very proud of our first-attempt certification pass rates," said Program Coordinator Doug Beitzel. "We continue to maintain 95 percent pass rates over the last nine years we have offered this program, while the national average is 84 percent."

Beitzel said the College is adjusting its program format to reduce the amount of time students are required to be on campus to one day a week. The other two sessions most weeks will be on Zoom and can be done from home, according to Beitzel.

"We tested that format this year, and it seems to work well," Beitzel said. "We plan to fully implement this for the next class beginning in the fall."

Certified Clinical Medical Assistants are versatile healthcare professionals who are engaged in a variety of tasks in a medical office or hospital. Certified Medical Assistants can be found in a number of healthcare settings, including nursing homes, medical centers, laboratories, and hospitals.

"These professionals are involved in the clinical and administrative aspects of a hospital or practice," explained Beitzel. "Clinical medical assistants help

doctors and nurses by preparing examination rooms, taking and monitoring patient vital signs, interviewing patients for medical histories, preparing patients for X-rays, and assisting in medical procedures such as the administration of electrocardiograms."

Clinical medical assistants are allowed to perform more advanced duties such as drawing blood, administering injections and medications, and properly disposing of biohazards, added Beitzel.

Scholarship money is now available, and orienta-

tion dates are being set up for the fall program starting in September. Registrations are currently being accepted with limited space available.

DMC Food Farmacy Combats Food Insecurity

Elkins, WV - Davis Medical Center's population health program is preparing to launch its third Food Farmacy cohort, a program aimed at addressing food insecurity and improving health outcomes for patients with diabetes. It is designed to provide patients with access to nutritious food, and resources to better manage their condition and enhance overall well-being.

"Through our population health program data, we know that food insecurity negatively affects the health of residents in our service area, especially those with diabetes," said Dr. Catherine "Mindy" Chua, DO, MS, FAAFP, FNMN, CPE, FAAPL. "The food farmacy bridges the gap between patients struggling to afford nutritious foods, and successfully controlling blood sugar levels and preventing complications."

The 12-month program includes 6 months of interactive nutrition and health education, healthy meal planning and preparation, and monitoring of vital health statistics. During the second half of the program patients use new skills and education to build sustainable lifestyle changes.

"Patient outcomes were varied during our 2021 pilot program," said Dr. Chua.

"We tracked weight, blood pressure, hemoglobin AIC levels and quality of life metrics at specific intervals throughout the 12-month period and came away with learnings that have helped improve the program for the current cohort."

"Transportation, illiteracy, and personal motivation were patient barriers," said Chua. "We're working to overcome these challenges through the development of video "classes" and picture recipe cards."

The cost to operate the pilot program was roughly \$7,500. With the program doubling in size, Dr. Chua said they are working to offset the cost through grants,

volunteers, and community partners.

Community support and partnership for the Davis Medical Center Food Farmacy has been received from Citizens Bank of WV, Davis Health System Foundation, and Vandalia Health.

"As a community hospital, it's our role to improve the health and well-being of our population," Chua added. "The Food Farmacy is an innovative program supporting patients in achieving their best possible health outcomes. We look forward to watching it grow and change

Former Laker wrestler thriving at Coker Korenoski was GC district champ and Academic All-American

Hartsville, SC – Noah Korenoski's original plan didn't include college.

And then the plan changed.

"I was actually enrolled to be a linesman on electrical lines," recalled Korenoski, who graduated from Westmont Hilltop (PA) High in 2020 after 111 high school wrestling wins. "Then in April or May, [Garrett College assistant coach] Tanner Cahill called me wondering why I wasn't going to be wrestling in college."

Eventually, Cahill and then-GC head coach John Chambers convinced Korenoski to wrestle at Garrett. That decision led Korenoski to two NJCAA national tournament berths, a Gulf Atlantic 157-pound district championship, and an opportunity to continue his wrestling career at Coker (SC) Univer-

Chambers emphasized Korenoski needed to take advantage of the athletic and academic opportunities available to him at Garrett.

"He [Chambers] made a spreadsheet when I came in for my first advising meeting that listed out all the classes I'd take - it was just laid out in front of me," recalled Korenoski, who was a two-time NJCAA Academic All-American while with the Lakers. "He said, 'Noah, if you follow this plan you won't have a problem." I recently told him, 'Coach, I still have that spreadsheet."

Korenoski, who already has an undergraduate degree from Coker, will be wrestling this year as a fifth-year COVID senior in a master's degree program in administration and leadership. He helped the Cobras to a 9-5 record last season, including 4-5 in the Conference Carolinas.

"I can't describe the feeling," said Chambers, who resigned as wrestling coach after the 2022-23 season but remains an academic advisor at the College. "Here's a kid who wasn't even going to go to college who has already obtained a four-year degree and is now in a master's program."

Korenoski won the 157-pound Gulf Atlantic district title to earn his second consecutive national tournament berth in 2022. That individual crown helped the Lakers earn a share of the team title.

Korenoski – who earned a fifth-place finish at 157 pounds in the 2024 NCAA Division II Super Regional - was named to the Conference Carolinas Winter/Spring Academic All-Conference team in March with a 3.58 gradepoint average (GPA). He cited Garrett College with pointing him in the right direction.

"It was just a tremendous starting place for me," said Korenoski. "It ultimately led me to my success today."

Korenoski said studying and competing at a southern institution became a goal for him.

"I've always wanted to go down south," he said. "To call it home now is even more special. I've met people here who will be in my life forever."

Korenoski credited Chambers with helping him achieve his dream.

"Coach Chambers has been a big part of my success," said Korenoski, who asked Chambers to be one of his references in his master's program applica-

"It was an honor and a privilege for me to write a recommendation letter for Noah," said Chambers.

"It's crazy to think that I wasn't going to be a college student or athlete and here I am going into my fifth year of collegiate wrestling and going for a master's degree," said Korenoski, adding, "It's a journey – that's for sure!"


