Tennant Guilty of First Degree Murder, No Mercy

Robert Lee Tennant has been convicted October 24th of the first degree murder of his brother Edward Tennant, Jr. After two days of testimony and evidence, the jury deliberated for approximately a half hour before returning a verdict of guilty on the charge and issuing a recommendation of no mercy in the case.

In opening statements, Tucker County Prosecuting Attorney Savannah Hull Wilkins outlined the events of April 10, 2023 that lead to the arrest and charges. According to Wilkins, Ed Tennant was checking an electrical pole on a disputed property across the road from Robert Tennant's property. Robert Tennant drove his tractor to confront his brother at which time he shot him three times in the head with a .22 calibre target pistol. Tennant then returned to the house to call 911. Wilkins went on to say that Tennant denied being threatended by his brother and had planned the act for two days. Wilkins said Tennant even called prison his retirement plan. Wilkins asked the jury to maintain attention regardless to how hard the subject matter may become. "Please don't shut down or look away because its hard," Wilkins said.

In the defense's opening remarks, Attorney Brent Easton admitted that there was no question that his client shot his brother. The defense's opening statements focused on trying to convince the jury to consider lesser charges for their client with the focus on the lesser included charge of voluntary manslaughter. Easton brought up a series of disputes over the years the brothers had been embroiled in going back to an alleged incestuous child that was born when they were children. According to Easton. Tennant believed his brother fathered a child with with their sister when she was 14 and tried to blame it on him. "This is not a who done it case. The person who did it admitted to it. He admitted to it on a 911 call."

The first prosecution witness to be called was 911 Director Daniel Hebb. Hebb testified on the validity and authenticity of the 911 recording that was presented into evidence. According to Hebb, the call came in to the center at 12:44 p.m. In the recording, Tennant is heard to say "I did," when asked who fired the shots and identified the victim as his brother Edward Tennant, Jr.

This was followed by the testimony of Deputy Gidley of the Tucker County Sheriff's Office for the prosecution. Gidley was the first officer on the scene. According to Gidley's testimony, he arrived approximately 15 to 20 minutes from the time the call went out. When he arrived, he said he saw a blue Ford pickup with the driver's door open, a pool of blood underneath and a human figure laying in

front of it. Gidley said Tennant was at home and obeyed all commands to put his hands up and come across the river to be placed into custody. Tennant was placed into Sgt. Pyles of the State Police's cruiser following, according to Gidley. A gunshot residue kid was conducted as well, Gidley said.

It was also during Gidley's testimony that Tennant's statement was entered into evidence and played for the court. In his statement, Tennant is heard admitting to planning the act for the two days prior. "I've been plotting this since Saturday," Tennant said.

In the statement, Tennant also said he would have called 911 before he confronted his brother, but he was afraid he would, "get away." He also said in the statement that he wished he had shot his brother's dog as well. Tennant said he fully understood the consequences of this actions. "I fully understand what is going on," Tennant said. "That's the choice I made."

In regards to why he shot his brother, he said he did it because he was an a—h--- and that, "I learned over the years, take care of your own business."

During Gidley's testimony, it was stated that a handgun was discovered in the center console of Ed Tennant's truck buried under several items. It was also stated that the console was closed at the time of arrival and a photo of the interior of the console was shown to the court showing the disheveled state of the console and the items obscuring the handgun.

The next witness for the prosecution was Sgt. Pyles with the West Virginia State Police. Pyles was the second officer on the scene. The majority of Pyle's testimony collaborated Gidley's with Pyles arriving to assist in directing people and assisting at the scene.

Charleston Medical Examiner Dr. Daniel Shapiro appeared next via Teams to testify for the prosecution. Dr. Shapiro testified as to the manner and mode of the death. According to Shapiro there were three distinct shots: one distant shot to the back of the head that alone would not have been fatal; one distant shot to the forehead that would have resulted in substantial hemorrhaging and was fatal; and one hard contact to just below the nose that was indicative of muzzle contact with the skin.

The final prosecution witness was West Virginia State Police Forensic Lab Firearms Toolmark Examiner Philip Kent Cochran. Cochran testified that one of the casings recovered at the scene was fired from the weapon and one of the recovered bullets shared characteristics. However, Cochran said that two of the bullets were damaged due to being fired and were inconclusive.

On day two of testimony, the only defense's only witness was Tennant himself. Tennant took the stand in his defense. During his testimony, Tennant reiterated the story of his sister's incestuous pregnancy and how his brother tried to place the blame on him for years. Tennant then told the history of the disputed lot and the work he put into it.

Tennant's testimony then shifted to the weekend of the shooting. According to Tennant, his brother had been cutting down trees on the lot that Saturday. Tennant said he was so stressed he had not slept since. "He's just being smart with me," Tennant said. "He's just showing he's bigger than me. That he's my big brother."

According to Tennan's testimony he had only planned to confront his brother to ask him what he was doing and had no intention to kill him. "I decided I was going to confront him uno to uno," Tennant said. "I was going to ask him what he was doing with this lot."

Tennant said he never left the tractor and was never more than six foot from his brother at any time during the incident. Tennant also said his brother saw him coming. Tennant also said that he felt he was in danger because he had a machete under buckets of cement in the bucket of the tractor that his brother could have reached and thought his brother was going to reach for it, that is why he shot. Tennant denied placing the gun to his brother's head to pull the trigger.

It came out in court that the property under dispute by the brothers was deeded and owned by their father Edward Tennant. Sr.

Western Pocahontas Address Davis

Representatives from Western Pocahontas addressed a packed house at the Town of Davis Council Meeting October 23rd. Members of the public packed Davis Town Hall to listen to the future expansion plans of Western Pocahontas. Representatives VP and Project Manager Rich Flanagan and Master Land Planner from Planned Environments Roy Bechtol addressed the crowd on behalf of Western Pocahon-

Flanagan said the group has been working with Blackwater PSD and RK& K to help design the needs of the new sewer project. "We don't want to work in a vacuum," Flanagan said. "So we have been working with the Blackwater PSD and RK& K to provide them input for future growth and future development that we see coming along the area to help some of the current housing issues and help alleviate that in

the future."

According to Flanagan what was shared was only a preliminary plan and of a long term nature that may take 50 to 100 years to see complete. "What we are sharing with you is A plan," Flanagan said. "It is not THE plan. This plan is entitled to be a 50 to 100 year plan. Its not going to happen tomorrow. Its not going to happen next year. Its an evolution," Flanagan said. "We have to have a plan so we are moving in the right direction so that things just aren't happening haphazardly."

The project is slated to encompass 18,000 acres in Tucker County alone. "This is about 18,000 acres we are presenting in front of you," Bechtol said. "Its all within Tucker County." 5,100 acres of the 18,000 acres are designed to be green

space, according to Bechtol. "The first thing we did was a total environmental analysis," Bechtol said. "We took two, almost three years, to analyze all the wetlands, the streams, the environmental features, the geological, the archaeological sites, so on and so forth. So what you see in this plan interwoven through the whole plan is green."

Bechtol said that the project is aware of the need to respect the culture of the community. "We're trying to be sensitive to the native elements and yet create a plan that will be an exciting and wonderful place to live and that will respect the culture of the community," Bechtol said.

Bechtol said the plan is a starting place. "We understand it is a lot to absorb," Bechtol said. "But you got to start somewhere. You got to try to put what you have in the right place so it honors the land, it respects the slopes, it respects all the greenbelts."

81miles of trails are designed to encompass the property. "I think one of the most important parts is the trail networks and greenbelts," Bechtol said. "We have a connectivity of trails throughout the entire project."

Bechtol said their organization is trying not to let the community down. "One of the things we have tried to do, too, as a neighbor," Bechtol said. "Is try not to promise a lot of things. I know there are a lot of folks that have let people down."

According to Flanagan, his organization has been working with the DEP and OEM to obtain grant funding to rehab the Davis Center into a housing facility for State Park workers. Flanagan said the 40 bed facility is slated to have both dorm style housing and apartment styled units. "How do they help the workers at the State Park so that they don't have to use room there and they can also be seasonal workers up

here that aren't using other housing or don't have to use State Park Lodge Rooms to house those workers," Flanagan said. "They can actually have people that are bringing dollars into the community for the tourism industry."

Flanagan said the development is attempting to incorporate quality of life into the design. "We're not coming in and just making it your typical development," Flanagan said. "We're trying to incorporate quality of life, so if you don't want to get into your car, you have the ability to utilize the trail system."

According to Flanagan, the goal of the meeting was to be as transparent as possible. "Our goal is to be transparent when we can," Flanagan said. "Share with the communities what we can share. And try to be good neighbors and try to see the area grow and prosper whether that be you were born and raised here or you've chosen to uproot and move here."

Cole was placed under arrest and transported to TVRJ, where he was remanded into custody of the Division of Correction. the corresponding documents at this time. This crime occurred in Tucker County and all parties are considered innocent until proven otherwise in a court of law.





Oct. 30, 1825: Randolph McCoy was born in Logan County. In 1878, McCoy's accusation against a cousin of Anderson "Devil Anse" Hatfield for stealing a hog set off a deadly series of events in the Hatfield-McCoy Feud.

Oct. 31, 1877: Herman Guy Kump was born in Capon Springs, Hampshire County. He was the 19th governor of West Virginia, serving from 1933 to 1937.


Oct. 31, 1940: Gale Catlett, West Virginia basketball University player and coach, was born in Hedgesville. Catlett coached WVU to 13 20-win seasons before he retired in 2002.

Oct. 31, 1946: Labor leader Cecil Edward Roberts Jr. was born on Cabin Creek, Kanawha County. A sixth-generation coal miner and a fiery orator, Roberts has served as president of the United Mine Workers of America since 1995.

Oct. 31, 1951: Football coach Nick Saban was born in Fairmont. As a quarterback, he led Monongah High School to a 1968 state championship. He went on to coach Louisiana State Univerand the University Alabama to seven national championships (six with Alabama), the most of any coach in history.

Nov. 1, 1688: Morgan Morgan was born in Wales. Traditionally, Morgan was considered the first White settler of West Virginia, but others were likely here first. He settled in the Bunker Hill area in 1731, building a log house that still remains.

Nov. 1, 1848: Israel Charles White was born in Monongalia County. White was West Virgin-



Nov. 5, 1891: Alfred Earle "Greasy" Neale was born in Parkersburg. He was one of West Virginia's greatest all-around athletes.

ia's first state geologist, appointed in 1897 and serving until his death in 1927, working without pay for all but two of those years.

Nov. 1, 1961: The first non-commercial radio station in West Virginia, WMUL-FM at Marshall University, began broadcasting.

Nov. 2, 1859: John Brown was convicted of murder, treason and insurrection in the Jefferson County Courthouse at Charles Town. Brown's raid on Harpers Ferry galvanized the nation, further alienating North and South and drastically reducing any possible middle ground for compromise to avert the Civil

Nov. 2, 1952: Tri-State Airport in Wayne County was dedicated, with the first official landing made at 11 a.m. by Piedmont Airlines.

Nov. 2, 1996: Baseball player Toni Stone died. Born in Bluefield, she joined the Negro American League in 1953, becoming the first woman to play pro baseball in a previously all-male major league.

Nov. 3, 1947: Kanawha Airport (now Yeager International Airport) was dedicated. World War I ace Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker was among the dignitaries present.

Nov. 4-5, 1985: Heavy rains led to devastating floods in parts of West Virginia. Forty-seven people were killed, and several towns were severely damaged.

Nov. 5, 1922: Cecil Underwood was born at Josephs Mills in Tyler Underwood, County. West Virginia's 25th and 32nd governor, served as the state's youngest and oldest chief executive.

Nov. 5, 1927: Musician "Ellie" Mannette was born in Trinidad and helped popularize steel drum music worldwide. In 1992, he became an artist-in-residence at WVU, coordinating the school's steel drum program. In 1999, he was named a National Endowment for the Arts National Heritage Fellow, the nation's highest arts honor.

Apple Pie Dip

- Pour the cornstarch slurry into the pot with the apples and stir until the sauce has thickened.
- Use right away, refrigerate for 5 days or freeze until needed!
- Eat with pita chips, pretzels or whatever you choose.



HistoriCorps to Receive Award for Most Significant Save of a Historic Site

ELKINS, W.Va., Oct. 25, 2024 – The Preservation Alliance of West Virginia (PAWV) will be visiting the Histori-Corps project at the Blue Bend Recreation Area on Monday, October 28 at 10:30 a.m. to present an award for the Most Significant Save of a Historic Site for the 2024 West Virginia Historic Preservation Awards.

In 2023, the Mon Forest partnered with HistoriCorps, the Appalachian Conservation Corps and 20 volunteers to make critical repairs to the deteriorated pavilion, including roof repairs, flagstone repairs and repointing. Other projects included critical floor replacement of the Administrative building. In September 2024, HistoriCorps returned to the Blue Bend Recreation Area to complete the roof on the pavilion and perform minor carpentry and log repairs. This award recognizes their most recent

efforts to save the deteriorating historic picnic pavilion and celebrate their dedication to rehabilitating historic recreational structures in West Virginia.

The Blue Bend Recreation Area of the Monongahela National Forest, located in Greenbrier County, includes a picnic pavilion, over 20 camping sites, an elaborate system of retaining walls, two-stoned paved beaches, and a reservoir for recreational swimming. The Blue Bend Recreation Area was built by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the 1930s and was added to the National Register of Historic Places 30 years ago. The park is part of the legacy of noted forest recreation planner Herbert T. Stoddard.

West Virginia's small game and furbearer seasons open Nov. 2

Hunters and trappers are reminded to purchase their license and check their game

SOUTH CHARLESTON, W.Va. — The West Virginia Division of Natural Resources (WVDNR) today announced that hunting and trapping seasons for several small game and fur-bearing species are set to open in West Virginia on Nov 2

"West Virginia has a hunting season for everyone and our trapping opportunities just add to the number of options folks have for enjoying outdoor adventures in the fall and winter," said WVDNR Director Brett McMillion. "These seasons also provide an excellent chance for experienced hunters to share their knowledge, so we encourage everyone to invite a new hunter along for the adventure."

Small game hunting is allowed during West Virginia's deer seasons, except for the first three days of buck firearms season, when trapping fur-bearing animals is permitted. Hunters should note that during buck season, No. 4 shot or smaller and slugs can only be carried if the hunter is also legally hunting deer or bear. Legal firearms for small game hunting include combination rifle-shotgun (over-under, etc.). It is illegal to hunt with any centerfire rifle, rimfire larger than .22 caliber or air rifles other than .22 caliber. Additionally, shot larger than No. 4 or solid ball ammunition is prohibited in counties not open to buck firearms season.

Trapping Regulations

Trappers harvesting beaver, bobcat, fisher and otter must electronically check their catches within 30 days after the close of the respective season. A WVDNR-issued game check confirmation number shall be recorded in writing with the trapper's name and address and shall be attached and remain attached to each pelt or whole animal until sold, tanned, processed into commercial fur or mounted.

Trappers must also obtain a Convention on International Trade in Endan-

gered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES) seal for each bobcat and otter pelt harvested in West Virginia. Federal law requires this seal on all bobcat and otter pelts shipped to international markets. Trappers may obtain a CITES seal from the Elkins Operations Center or their local WVDNR district office. Contact information is available at WVdnr. gov/contact.

River Otter Research Project

The WVDNR is also reminding trappers about its otter research project to examine annual survival, harvest rates, habitat use and movement rates. Radiotagged otters are legal game during trapping season. Trappers who harvest a radio-tagged otter should contact Holly Morris at the District 4 office at 304-256-6947 to report the tag number and return the transmitter. More information about the otter research project, including photos of tags and transmitters, can be found on page 5 of the 2024–2025 West Virginia Hunting and Trapping Regulations Summary.

Successful otter trappers who deliver a legally harvested and electronically registered skinned otter carcass to a WVDNR district office will be eligible to receive a \$20 gift card. Call your local district office to arrange a pick-up if unable to deliver the carcass. Collected biological samples will assist biologists in making decisions regarding future trapping seasons.

Hunters 15 and older are required to have a valid West Virginia hunting license and form of identification while hunting. To purchase a hunting and trapping license, visit WVhunt.com. 

LEWISBURG, W.Va. – Greenbrier Military School Alumni Association members entrusted its museum and contents to the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine (WVSOM) on Oct. 18 during an official agreement signing.

The Greenbrier Military School Museum, located on WVSOM's campus in Lewisburg, W.Va., opened in 2001 to pay homage to the Greenbrier Military School, a private, all-male boarding high school and junior college that operated between 1812 and 1972, until the campus was purchased to be used as a medical school.

"[GMS] closed its doors and this campus transitioned into the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine. The GMS Alumni Association and WVSOM have been partners ever since," said WVSOM President James W. Nemitz, Ph.D. "With the signing of this new agreement, we ensure the continuity of that past into the future. Our action preserves the legacy of the Greenbrier Military School and its alumni, which includes two governors of West Virginia: Homer Holt, the 20th governor, and Jim Justice, the 36th governor."

The agreement — among the GMS Alumni Association, the WVSOM Foundation, WVSOM and the Greenbrier Historical Society — was created to memo-

rialize the former military school and to continue its legacy in the Greenbrier Val-

ley through charitable investments.

WVSOM will now be responsible for the operation, maintenance and repair of the museum. The agreement transfers a \$100,000 initial contribution to the WVSOM Foundation, the school's charitable organization, for upkeep of the facility.

Mike Ruth, president of the GMS Alumni Association, said the agreement is meaningful to former cadets because of the impact the military school had on them.

"The military school has significance for all of us. It means so much to us because it changed our lives, no matter how long someone was here. [West Virginia] Gov. [Jim] Justice was here for a year and a half, I was here for three and some people were here for seven. For a school to have such an impact and to see its legacy continue is really meaningful," Ruth said.

Ruth said he doesn't know of many military schools that have been closed for more than 50 years that have a membership as active as the GMS Alumni Association.

"We have our own museum and archives, and so many people keep returning to campus — whether it's during a reunion weekend or on their own," he said. "It's important to the individuals who went to school

here and to their families. It's amazing that we closed 50-plus years ago and are still doing this."

The military alumni association began supporting WVSOM through scholarships in 1992 and have consistency financially supported students at the medical school

ever since. The Greenbrier Military School Alumni Association Scholarship is presented to two students annually who excel academically and show strong leadership, determination and discipline. The alumni association also invests annually in Greenbrier County's two high schools.

Mt. Lions Volleyball Sweeps Tygarts Valley to End Regular Season



ERCC Celebrates Three Decades of Care at Beverly Pike Facility

ELKINS, W.Va. — Elkins Rehabilitation & Care Center has been a part of the Randolph County community for over 50 years, and now they are celebrating their 30th year in their current facility.

A lot has changed over the past three decades, but ERCC's commitment to providing superior, personalized healthcare to each resident and outpatient has remained a constant.

Administrator Tara Shaver said.

"Our dedication to complete compassionate care will continue for the next 30 years and beyond," Shaver added.

Prior to moving to its current facility in 1994, ERCC was in downtown Elkins. Since then, it has grown and expanded, Shaver said.

"We're really proud of this facility," she said. "Our staff work hard to keep it nice and clean."

Amenities like a restaurant-style fine dining experience are available to residents, staff and loved ones, Shaver pointed out. The facility also has a gym and a rehabilitation facility for inpatient and outpatient use, she said. There is also a beauty salon available to meet residents' needs, Shaver said. There is also a café and a chapel for prayer and silent reflection.

"We really love this building," Shaver noted. "It has given us a lot of room to grow and to expand to meet the community's needs."

Lt. Jay Manown's Final Mission

On Sept. 10, 1944, Naval Aviator Lt. Jay Manown was commander of torpedo bomber TBM-1C Avenger No. 17018 belonging to Torpedo Squadron (VT) 20 that took off from USS Enterprise (CV 6). Part of the second wave of a pre-invasion strike against Japanese forces and installations in the Palau Islands, the three-man crew consisted of Manown, Aviation Ordnanceman 1st Class Anthoney Di Petta of Nutley, New Jersey, and Aviation Radioman 1st Class Wilbur Mitts from Seaside, Cali-

As Manown dove the aircraft towards its target, several enemy antiaircraft batteries opened fire. Receiving damage that destroyed the underside and caused the loss of a wing and tail rudder, the aircraft was last seen smoking and spinning out of control, ultimately crashing into the water near Malakal Island.

All three members of the crew were lost in the incident. On Sept. 11, 1945, the three were declared killed in action (KIA) and posthumously awarded the Purple Heart.

Following the war, the American Graves Registration Service, the agency responsible for seeking and recovering missing American servicemen, conducted extensive searches of combat areas and crash sites in and around Palau, concluding their efforts

Investigators were unable to discover any evidence of the aircraft, and the crew was declared non-recoverable on July 16, 1949.

In 2003, the BentProp Project (now Project Recover), together Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency partner organizations, began looking into the loss of the plane as part of the mission to locate remains of American World War II service members unaccounted for during the Pacific campaign. In 2019, 2021 and 2023, excavations recovered remains and material evidence just off Malakal Island.

Last year, Di Petta was identified on Jan. 3, and Mitts on Feb. 23. Each was buried in his hometown; Di Petta on July 11, and Mitts on Sept 7. Their identifications supported the belief that Manown's remains had also been recovered, and he was identified May 23.

All three are memorialized at Manila American Cemetery on the Tablets of the Missing. Manown is memorialized by a marker at Maplewood Cemetery in Kingwood, West Virginia.

Kingwood, West Virginia native Lt. Jay Manown, who was shot down off the coast of the South Pacific island of Palau on Sept. 10, 1944, was buried in Kingwood on Oct. 29, 2024.
