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# **Streets Focus for Town of Davis**

Between record snowfall and vehicle enforcement, the Town of Davis has been focused on streets lately. Town of Davis Mayor Al Tomson updated the Town Council January 22nd during their regular meeting on the latest efforts the Town was engaged in.

Over the past two weeks prior, snow removal had been at the forefront of efforts following the heavy snowfalls in January. "If you look at the jobs for the past two weeks, you'll notice snow removal every day," Tomson said. "And they have been removing snow every day. They've been very busy doing that."

Tomson said that crews had been out several mornings at 3 a.m. work on the streets around Davis. "They've had three mornings where they have come in at 3 a.m. to clean up William," Tomson said.

The crews' focus, according to Tomson, was to clear intersection and plow out residents. "What they are doing is going around with the endloader, the skidsteer and the dumptrucks to try and improve the intersections," Tomson said. "And also to plow people out as much as they can."

City crews efforts, however, are hindered by vehicles around the town, Tomson said. "One of the big obstacles is cars," Tomson said. "They continue to be a problem in some of the streets."

Tomson said he planned to go around the town and have protruding vehicles towed to allow crews more room to work on the streets. "I am going to go around tomorrow with Jay Kennard and we are going to see if there are any vehicles that are protruding to the street and I'll get those towed," Tomson said. "So they have more room to work

and plow."

Tomson also said he plans to begin tagging nuisance vehicles around town once the snow melts. Once a vehicle is tagged, it will have two weeks to move before being towed. "The vehicles that are on the side of the road, that are not impeding the road, we will put signs on those and give people a certain amount of time, probably two weeks, to move them and then we'll have them towed if they don't get moved," Tomson said. "But we will probably do that when the snow melts."

The Town's efforts are focused on those vehicles that are not currently registered, Tomson said, with some vehicles lapsing in registration for more than seven years. "Its cars that are not legally registered," Tomson said. "We have some that the tags are from 2018."

The enforcement effort was delayed due to the time it took to coordinate with other entities, Tomson said. Tomson said his office coordinated with the Department of Highways, the Tucker County Sheriff's Office and the West Virginia Highway Patrol on the best way to proceed on the issue of the nuisance vehicles and parking. "It took a little while to coordinate with DOH and the Sheriff and the State Police," Tomson said. "That's all been done now. We're ready, just need a break in the weather."

# Kent St. Paving Project in Limbo

Davis resident Ben Herrick addressed the Town of Davis Council on January 22nd about the status of a paving project the Town was looking into for lower Kent Avenue near 1rst St.

Davis Mayor Al Tomson referred the question to Council Member Doug Martin who was looking into the cost of paving the section of road. Martin said he was in the process of obtain-

Tomson informed Herrick that a lot with the project was dependent of price. Tomson said he estimated the cost would be upwards of \$300,000 for the project. "So, we will see what the price is," Tomson said. "I think it is going to be 2 to \$300,000, which there is not money to do that."

Tomson said he didn't see the project happening because of other projects in line ahead of the paving project. "There are a couple of projects that are ahead of you," Tomson said. "So I don't see that happening."

However, Tomson did say he planned to submit the project as part of a grant submission once the Town's Sewer

Project is completed. "When the Sewer Project gets done, I am going to submit it as part of an AMLER Grant request to try to get funding to do it," Tomson

Again, Tomson said that the chances of the grant were not great, however. "And that is hit or miss," Tomson said. "I've done AMLER Grants before and not gotten them, but we'll keep trying."

Tomson said that the Town's Water and Sewer Projects were the top priority, but that the project would be submitted in the grant proposal for consideration. "But right now that's the best thing,"

have \$300,000 bill and we've got parts of Davis that still don't have water and sewer lines, which is a higher priority then paving Kent and that's about 900,000, which I am also going to put in the same AMLER Grant.'

Tomson told Herrick "not to hold your breath" on the issue, but did offer hope that if the estimates for the project came in low enough that the Town would consider a short term loan on the project. "I guess the message I have is not to hold your breath," Tomson said. "If the estimate comes in and you know its \$100,000 then maybe there's some way we can cobble it together and get a short term loan and look at doing that. But it is really going to depend on the price."

"Its a wait and see," Tomson said.

# **Davis Water Project Progresses**

Davis Mayor Al Tomson updated the Davis Town Council January 22nd on the status of the Town's Water Improvement Project. The update came from an update the Mayor had received from Thrasher on the status of the project on their efforts as the Town's engineers.

Tomson read from the report that a Ground Water Feasibility Study was being completed on behalf of the Town. "Moody and Associates are working on the Ground Water Feasibility Study and we hope to get the report in the next week or two," Tomson said.

The purpose of the study, Tomson said, was to explore the possibility of drilling ground water wells for the Town as a secondary water source in the future. "What we are looking at there, is to actually have some wells dug so that we can get water from the water table as opposed to just Wymers Creek," Tomson said.

The project is part of a grant, according to Tomson, but the cost will be the deciding factor in construction. "Its part of a grant, but we have to see what the costs come in to whether we can afford the construction," Tomson said.

The Town is still working with DOH to coordinate construction efforts along William Avenue, Tomson said. "We are still on track to get the Route 32 work completed in coordination with DOH and the maintenance schedule," Tomson said.

Tomson said there are lines on 5th Street and 3rd Street that will need to be replaced due to outdated lines and potentially hazardous materials. "We have at 5th and 3rd, we have sections of water line that need to be replaced," Tomson said. "They're ductile iron, they have lead joints and they protrude into 32."

As a result of the work along William Avenue, Tomson said the road will be reduced to one lane for approximately two months. "DOH will be digging up all of William Avenue," Tomson said. "I'll be a one lane road for approximately two months."

The need for coordination, Tomson said, was so Thrasher could have casings installed under the road without the need to tear it back up again later. "Thrasher is coordinating with DOH so that we can get the casings in that need to go under the road without having to go back and tear up a newly paved road," Tomson said.

According to Tomson, the Department of Highways will be taking the "DOH will be digging up all of William Avenue. I'll be a one lane road for approximately two months," Tomson said.

road down the bare dirt. "DOH is going to take off the paving and the concrete that's under the concrete is also going to be removed," Tomson said. "So everything that is applied by man is going to be removed and go down to the sub-

There will also be a public meeting held February 26th at 5:30 p.m. prior to the regular Town Council meeting, according to Tomson. The purpose of the meeting is to fulfill a Department of Environmental Protection requirement for the water project, Tomson said. "We need to advertise and hold a public meeting for the DEP requirements for our water project," Tomson said. "We are looking at that meeting tentatively being February 26th and doing it at 5:30. That's before a council meeting. So that meeting would be here at 5:30 and the council meeting would start at

Tomson said the Town is also awaiting quotes on ground penetrating radar for a rehabilitation project at the Wymer Run Dam. "She also says we've been waiting on getting quotes for ground penetrating radar, analysis and grouting work for the Wymer Run Dam rehab," Tomson said.

The analysis is needed due to a leak at the reservoir, according to Tomson. "We have a leak at the reservoir," Tom-

The GPR is being utilized by the Town to locate and determine the extent of damage to the dam and reservoir and how much material will be needed to repair the damage, according to Tomson. "The ground penetrating radar, what it will do is, it will pinpoint where the penetration is and it will also be able to map the void that's in the ground that needs to be grouted or filled," Tomson said.

Once the Town knows the extent of the damage, it will be in better position to solicit bids from contractors, Tomson said. "So once we know what we're dealing with the situation, then we can go to the next step and go to the contractor that is going to fill the void and say we think it need this much grouting, how much will it cost?" Tomson said.



# Canaan Valley Resort State Park will now allow Uphill Skiing



The Canaan Valley Resort State Park endorsed and will now allow uphill skiing at the Canaan Valley Resort State Park ski area. Uphill skiing shall be permitted during normal ski hill operating hours, 0900-430pm daily, during weekdays and non-holidays.

The Canaan Valley Resort State Park will sell an uphill season pass for a fee of \$50.00. The pass will be valid for uphill skiing only. The uphill pass will not allow the pass holder to ride the ski lifts.

Uphill skiing will be permitted on the slopes designated in the daily trail report. The trail report is visible on the Canaan Valley Resort Website. Uphill skiers should know that uphill skiing will not be permitted on unopened slopes

where snow-making or grooming operations are ongoing. The Prosperity and Darkside of the Moon slopes are available for uphill skiing whenever natural snow cover

Uphill skiers will only be permitted to ski downhill on open ski runs.

When going uphill, skiers should stay within 10 feet of the edge of ski runs. Uphill skiers shall avoid traversing into the middle of the ski slopes.

Uphill skiers may use skins, scales, or split boards. Uphill ski equipment must have metal edges and be equipped with ski breaks, leashes, or the standard manufacturer's safety equipment to prevent runaway skis.

## **Governor Patrick Morrisey Gives Update on Budget Shortfalls**

CHARLESTON, WV – At a recent press conference, Governor Patrick Morrisey addressed members of the media about issues with the state budget. Morrisey took to a whiteboard to lay out specific figures and line items that are contributing to the projected over \$400M deficit in fiscal year 2026.

The items discussed include:

Medicaid: \$153M came from one-time funding sources in FY2025 (budget gim-

Corrections: Requires an additional \$47M to get through FY2025 (prison guards, medical expenses, security).

PEIA: Additional \$62M of General Revenue Funding required in FY2026 – doesn't

factor in 14.47% premium increase. Education: Base increases of over \$100M due to School Aid formula, Higher Education formula, and HOPE Scholar-

ship costs. Tourism: Underfunded base budget by \$13M of one-time funding in FY2025. More highlights from Governor Morrisey's remarks today:

"I conveyed to you and said: we're going to be able to get through these budget challenges to the other side. But we've been learning a lot more over the last few weeks, and I'd like to provide even greater detail to you about what we're finding. I think, as you'll see on February 12, when we provide the formal budget, everything we say is gonna get backed up, so third grade math will understand what we're doing. I want to be really clear. This is important, that we are providing facts to people and to the public - these are not going to be disputable pieces of information."

"We're going to have to change how we do things. We can't rob Peter to pay Paul and push all the bills to future generations. We can't do that anymore. And that's a lot of what we've seen. We're going to be able to address things very, very differently."

It is intended to help anglers and their families decide: where to fish, what types of fish to eat, how to limit the amount and frequency of fish eaten, and how to prepare and cook fish to reduce contaminants. Women of childbearing age, children, and people who regularly eat fish are particularly susceptible to contaminants that build up over time. Individuals falling into one of these categories should be especially careful to follow the guidelines.

The advisory covers only sport fish caught in West Virginia waters. Safety regulations and advisories for fish in the marketplace are the responsibility of the United State Food and Drug Administration (FDA). 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# More than 13,500 New Businesses Started in 2024:

### Annual Report from the Secretary of State Showcases Strength of West Virginia Economy Anchored by Small Business Entrepreneurs and Real Estate

Charleston, W. Va. – WV Secretary of State Kris Warner and the WV One Stop Business Center are celebrating more than 13,500 new business registrations in 2024.

According to the WV Secretary of State's Business Statistics Database, 2024 was a particularly exciting year, with several industries experiencing significant new business growth and

In the small business sector, 'Other Personal Services' such as pet care, photofinishing, parking lots, and garages garnered the highest number of new business registrations in the state (702). Rounding out the rest of the top five are real estate (565); activities related to real estate (483); other specialty trade contractors (391); and residential building construction (352).

When comparing sectors to industry growth in 2024, 'Other Personal Services' was also second highest in new business growth at 32.94%, being outdriven only by the Charter Bus Industry, which led the state with 47.37%. Feb. 5, 1784: Nancy Hanks, the mother of Abraham Lincoln, was probably born February 5, 1784, in Hampshire County on Mikes Run in what is now Mineral County, although historical records relating to her early life do not

Feb. 5, 1889: Fiddler and self-taught physician James Franklin "Doc" White was born near Ivydale, Clay County. White served the community as doctor, dentist and midwife, delivering more than 1,800 babies.

Feb. 5, 1890: Coach Eli Camden "Cam" Henderson was born in Joetown, Marion County. He is a revered figure in Marshall University sports

Feb. 5, 1941: Actor David Lynn Selby was born in Morgantown. His stage and screen credits include the outdoor drama Honey in the Rock, and the television shows Falcon Crest and Dark Shadows.

Feb. 6, 2007: Selva Lewis "Lew" Burdette, a native of Nitro, died in Florida. Burdette was an outstanding major league baseball player who spent most of his career with the Milwaukee Braves. He won three games in the 1957 World Series, helping the Braves defeat the New York Yankees.

Feb. 7, 1867: West Virginia University was established by an act of the West Virginia legislature. The college, originally called the Agricultural College of West Virginia, opened its doors in September 1867.

Feb. 7, 1889: Nell Elizabeth "Pistol Nell" Walker was born at Sewell Mountain. Known as the "First Lady" of Fayette County, she served 12 terms as a member of the House of Delegates.

Feb. 8, 1892: Cartoonist Irvin Dugan was born in Huntington. For many years, his "Adam" cartoon character was a feature on the editorial pages of the Herald-Dispatch.

Feb. 8, 1915: Photographer Volkmar Kurt Wentzel was born in Dresden, Germany. He emigrated with his family to the United States at age 11. As a teenager in West Virginia, Wentzel took up with an eclectic group of people who had retreated to Youghiogheny Forest, a Preston County artist colony.

Feb. 8, 1918: Medal of recipient Herbert Honor Joseph Thomas Jr. was born. He excelled as a football halfback at South Charleston High School, and Herbert J. Thomas Memorial Hospital in South

Feb. 6, 1882: Poet Anne Spencer was born in Virginia but spent most of her youth in Bramwell, Mercer County. She became an acclaimed poet during the 1920s Harlem Renaissance. In 2000, two of her poems were included in the Library of America's anthology of 20th Century American poetry.

Charleston is named for him.

Feb. 9, 1843: Republican leader Nathan Goff Jr. was born in Clarksburg. In 1888, Goff lost West Virginia's most gubernatorial controversial election to A. B. Fleming. Goff 's initial 106-vote majority was challenged, and both men were sworn in on inauguration day. The case dragged on until 1890, when Fleming was determined to be the rightful winner.

Feb. 9, 1900: "Aunt Jennie" Wilson was born near Henlawson. Wilson was a Logan County traditional musician, considered a master of clawhammer-style banjo playing.

Feb. 9, 1950: U.S. Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's speech to a group of Wheeling Republicans launched the 1950s red scare. McCarthy, a Wisconsin Republican, claimed in his speech to have a list of 205 communists who worked in the U.S. State Department.

Feb. 10, 1904: Jay Legg was shot and killed by his wife, Sarah Ann, in their home in Clay County. The trial, conviction, appeal and acquittal of Sarah Ann led to a popular West Virginia folk ballad, "The Murder of Jav Legg."

Feb. 10, 2010: Frederick Appleton "Fred" Schaus, West Virginia University basketball All-American, coach, and athletic director, died at age 84 in Morgantown. Schaus coached WVU, 1954-1960, to a 146-37 record, and lost by one point in the 1959 national championship game.

Feb. 11, 1903: Artist Grace Martin Taylor was born in Morgantown. She produced an immense body of work in various styles and enjoyed a lengthy career at the Mason College of Music and Fine Arts in Charleston.

Feb. 11, 1904: Clarence Watson Meadows was born in Beckley. His mother hoped he would become a Baptist minister, but he ultimately entered politics, becoming the 22nd governor of West Virginia.

Feb. 11, 1911: The Charles Town Opera House opened. The 500-seat theater ushered in an era of entertainment and service lasting more than 30 years.

Feb. 11, 1923: Eight members of the Black Hand were arrested in Harrison County The Black Hand was the name and symbol of an underworld society of Italian immigrants that extorted money from other Italian immigrants.

Feb. 11, 1935: The first houses in the Tygart Valley Homesteads were ready for occupancy. One of three resettlement projects in West Virginia, the homesteads were intended to provide a new start for unemployed farmers, miners and timber workers.

Feb. 11, 1949: Singer and pianist Ethel Caffie-Austin was born in Bluefield and raised in Mount Hope. As "West Virginia's First Lady of Gospel," she performed around the world, taught countless students, earned the Vandalia Award and founded the Black Sacred Music Festival. She was inducted into the West Virginia Music Hall of Fame in 2020. She died in 2024.


