Thrasher Provides Updates on Parsons Projects

The City of Parsons Council received an update on the status of several urban improvement projects from Thrasher representative Randy Watson during the Council's regular April 1 meeting. Watson provided updates on the Hamrick-Parsons Interconnection Project, Parsons Sanitary Sewer Project and the Parsons Water Improvement Project, as well as the City's long term improvement plans and plans for the Wastewater Treatment Plant.

Watson said that construction on the Hamrick-Parsons Interconnection Project is complete. Thrasher is currently closing out the project. Thrasher is collecting record drawings on the project for the City records and will have them available for Council in May, according to Watson. Other final details on the project include releases from the Department of Highways, Watson said. "We got the emergency interconnection between Hamrick and Parsons, that construction is done," Watson said. "We're just working on closing that out."


Design on the Parsons Sanitary Sewer Project is 90% complete, according to Watson. Required comments from the Department of Environmental Protection have been addressed, Watson said. Specification and contract documents are currently being worked on, according to Watson. "On the Parsons sanitary sewer improvement, the design is 90% done," Watson said. "We've addressed the comments from the DEP. We are required to send those to the DEP and they tell you what they want changed and whatever. We've done that."




A long term control plan is also being completed by Thrasher, Watson said. As part of the plan, Thrasher is looking at such items as future line placement, separation of storm water and sanitary sewer lines and future plans for the Wastewater Treatment Plant, Watson said. "We're also working on your long term control plan for your sewer," Watson said. "And what we do as part of the updates it will include any future sewer line replacements and separating storm and sanitary, as well as what we intend to do someday or suggest that you do at your wastewater treatment plant."

As part of the process, Watson said that Thrasher would like to sit down with the Council and discuss the Council's thoughts and expectations on future projects. "We'd like to request a workshop with Council for like before a Council meeting sometime so we can sit down and go over specifics of the review and your expectations of what the project would include, what you want to do," Watson said.

Virginia Company Proposes Data Center Between Davis, Thomas

Virginia based Fundamental Data has submitted preliminary applications to the State of West Virginia on a Data Center project near the Tucker County Landfill between Davis and Thomas. The move has surprised local and State lawmakers who have said they had no prior knowledge of the project before the application was submitted. "That one there caught me by surprise," State Senate President and Lt. Governor Randy Smith said.

Preliminary plans released by local news outlets have reported the site is slated to run on natural gas with a backup diesel storage on site of 30 million gallons. Local environmental group Friends of the Blackwater has begun a campaign to stop a house bill targeted at Data Centers and Data Center expansion in the State.

Smith said that a there are several tech companies looking to West Virginia to locate data centers capable of producing their own power to be self sufficient.

Renewable Gas Project to **Commence Construction May 1**

Construction of the Renewable Natural Gas Project at the Tucker County Landfill is scheduled to begin May 1, according to Tucker County Sold Waste Authority Presiding Chair Mark Holstine. Holstine gave an update on the project during a March 24th meeting of the Authority during the Director's Report.

"The renewable gas project, we have a date," Holstine said. "Supposedly, they are supposed to start the gas capture system May first is their target date to start

Holstine said that he is hopeful that

within the calendar year the system will by operational. "Hopefully, within the next calendar year, we will have something in operation," Holstine said.

A flare will be the first part to be placed in the system, according to Holstine. "They said the flare will probably be the first thing that goes up and it should be hid," Holstine said. "You shouldn't be able to see it from too many places, which will be a good thing."

Contractors for Renewable Natural Gas will be putting in wells and laying out lines throughout the landfill, Holstine said. "I guess they are going to start laying the wells out, putting lines in," Holstine said.

Landfill Addresses DEP Concerns

The Tucker County Solid Waste Authority continues to address issues stemming from a recent inspection from the West Virginia Department of Environmental Protection, Tucker County Solid Waste Authority Presiding Chair Mark Holstine said. The comments came as part of Holstine's Director's Report during the Authority's March 24th meeting.

"We are addressing the things that were brought to us in our latest DEP inspection," Holstine said.

Holstine said that some disagreement still remains following a meeting between representatives from the DEP and the Authority. The disagreement stems from whether the current board is responsible for the violations or whether the issues stem from how the landfill was constructed well in the past long before the current board took over. Holstine said, regardless, the Authority intends to take care of the issues as time and weather permits. "There's still

Landfill to Begin Construction of New Cell

The Tucker County Solid Waste Authority will soon be making plans to construct a new waste disposal cell at the Tucker County Landfill, according to Presiding Chair Mark Holstine. The announcement of the need for a new cell came as part of Holstine's Director's Report March 24th.

Holstine said the Landfill is within two years of the need for a new disposal cell. While that may sound like a lot of time, Holstine said that plans need to start being made soon for the construction. "We are within two years of a new cell," Holstine said. "Which means we are within a year of starting to construct a new waste dis-

A reduction of the cost of construction is going to be made by doing much of the work in house, Holstine said. "We are going to try to reduce the cost of the new cell by doing some stuff ourselves,"

The in house construction will require some capital output in the form of the purchase of equipment for the task, Holstine said. "That will require some capital outlet to buy equipment," Holstine said. "A crusher, a strainer. We can make our own rock for the protective cover if we can screen our own clay and save us some money."

Without the purchase of equipment or doing the work themselves, Holstine said the project is estimated to cost \$1.6 million, but by doing much of the work in house the Landfill can cut the cost in half. "We have a preliminary estimate of \$1.6 million for a new cell," Holstine said. "We can take almost half of that off just by producing our own protective stone layer over the liner. That's almost an \$800,000 expense in the estimate we

To complete the construction, the Landfill will need to purchase specialized equipment and has already begun purchasing some. "We are going to have to purchase probably a \$250,000 crusher to do that with," Holstine said. "We've already bought the hammer to help start."



In the near future, Holstine said that the Authority would be finalizing estimates from engineers. Over the next two years, Holstine said, the Authority will have a lot to do and it will impact their financial bottom line. "Over the next month to 60 days, we will be finalizing some estimates from the engineer," Holstine said.

"We've got a lot on our plate coming at us within the next two years to keep us in a positive cash flow, a positive net revenue at the end of the year. We're not going to have it as good as we've had it over the

"So those are the things that are on the horizon," Holstine said.

Scarce details on the project that are available have said that the center will not produce power for the main grid, only its own use. "There's a lot of these data centers that are looking to West Virginia that has microgrids on them, they produce their own power," Smith said.

Smith said he was notified when representatives from an environmental group went to his office over the application filing for the Center. According to Smith, part of the Center will be in Tucker County with the remainder to be located in Grant County. "This caught me by surprise, too," Smith said. "I was notified I think it was Tuesday that someone from one of the environmental groups in the State came to my office and that is how I found out that they had filed for a permit to put one in Tucker and Grant Counties. Part of it will be in Tucker and part of it will be in Grant according to the permitting."

There were two or three companies eyeing Tucker County for a Data Center, according to Smith. "I knew that was one of the areas, Tucker County was one of the areas they were looking at," Smith said. "They had about 11 counties that two or three of these companies were looking at. So it didn't take me by complete surprise because I knew that they were looking at different areas across the State."

While Smith found out about the Center through visitors to his office, many local officials found out about it when their phones began ringing from the press. Tucker County Commission President Mike Rosenau said he only knows what has been released in the press about the project, as does Tucker County Commissioner Fred Davis. "I was surprised when they released the press release on it because I basically found our about it through the press," Smith said.

Rosenau said that he found out about the Center through a phone call on Wednesday. The news took him by surprise. "Yesterday I got a call that said that a power plant company or a data center, one of the other, had put in a preliminary permit in Charleston for that area and wanted to know what I knew about it and I said I know nothing about it," Rosenau said. "So it was all a surprise to me, too."

Davis said that he only knows what he is hearing from others. According to Davis neither he, nor the Commission have been contacted by the company or any other entity about the project. "Say the truth, I don't know nothing about it," Davis said. "I got a phone call yesterday from another news reporter and I'm saying I've not heard nothing about it. I've been kept in the dark about it. I'm hearing about some kind of data center or something for power. That's about all I know about it from hearsay. Any official from that company or anyone else, I've not heard from "

Davis Mayor Al Tomson gave a written statement on the project. In his statement, Tomson proposed an alternative site for the project several miles from the current site. "A more suitable site exists just eight miles down the road at the Mettiki coal mine, away from residential areas. The current plan places the project less than a mile from homes in Davis, raising serious concerns about its impact on residents and the environment," Tomson wrote.

Tomson also stated that he supports economic development in Tucker County, but is concerned over the current site due to ecological impacts the Center may have. "I support economic development in Tucker County and

recognize the potential benefits this project could bring, including job opportunities and much-needed tax revenue. However, its current proposed location poses significant risks to local communities, threatens our pristine natural resources, and jeopardizes our delicate water supply," Tomson wrote.

Tomson closed his comments with an urging for an open dialogue with the local community and community leaders. "Community input is essential, yet this project has moved forward without it. It's time for an open dialogue—let's work together to find a responsible solution that benefits Tucker County without compromising our natural and community assets," Tomson wrote.

The Friends of the Blackwater in a related effort recently began a campaign to stop WV HB2014 which is an amendment to Chapter 5B. Economic Development Act of 1985. The Friends of the Blackwater have vehemently opposed the bill with calls from their supporters to reach out to lawmakers to oppose the measure. "A huge power plant - probably to support a huge data center is being proposed just a couple miles from Thomas and Davis that could impact Blackwater Canyon, the Wildlife Refuge and Dolly Sods. A facility like this could also impact the area with unwanted noise, toxic air pollution, bright lights, and traffic. Data centers are also known for their large consumption of energy and water. Communities across Tucker County cannot afford to lose either, we must protect our communities resources," an email from the Friends of the Blackwater states.

The amendments include the inclusion of sections pertaining to Data Centers and Data Center development in the State. The bill states the West Virginia is strategically positioned for the location of Data Centers for a variety of factors. "(7) West Virginia is strategically positioned as the best location in the United States to place data centers due to: (A) its close proximity to Washington, D.C., and the federal government; (B) its close proximity to the majority of the Nation's population; (C) its low tax rates; (D) it having the least restrictive regulatory environment in the Nation; (E) its supply of abundant energy and natural resources to power the data centers; and (F) its skilled and loyal workforce that has some of the lowest turnover rates in the Nation," the bill states. "As such, the state has a significant interest in encouraging the development and expansion of data centers, which can serve as drivers of broader economic growth. The Legislature finds that these externalities transcend local borders, including environmental concerns, energy consumption, and regional economic growth. Additionally, the provisions in this section align with the Legislature's goal of fostering a competitive, forward-thinking economy that benefits all residents."

The bill also establishes the High Impact Data Center Program. "(b) Program established. - The High Impact Data Center Program is hereby created and is to be administered as a program within the Division of Economic Development to encourage the continued development, construction, operation, maintenance, and expansion in West Virginia of high impact data centers. In order to effectuate the purposes of this section, the Division of Economic Development, or any agency, division, or subdivision thereof, may promulgate legislative rules, including emergency rules, in accordance with §29A-3-1 et seq of this code."

The bill also stated the need for more Data Centers in the U.S. due to the monopolization of China in the industry which makes the need a national security interest. "(3) The People's Republic of China is positioning itself to be the global leader of data centers and is investing in technology to encourage the flow of data toward China instead of toward the United States," the bill states.

The bill passed the State House with 88 votes for and 12 votes against on April 1. It now has to pass the Senate and signed into law by the Governor to become law.

Locals have also expressed concerns on social media over the job creation the facility is expected to create and who would be holding those jobs. Locals fear that any jobs created by the facility would go to out of state workers and not to Tucker County residents.

The facility is expected to begin operations in 2027 or 2028.

The Parsons Advocate reached out the Fundamental Data for comment on the project, but have not received a response by press time.

Thrasher is currently exploring options for the Wastewater Treatment Plant, Watson said. The Wastewater Treatment Plant is one of the subjects that Thrasher wishes to discuss during a work session meeting with the City in the near future, Watson said. "On the wastewater plant, we are doing preparations and viable options for the replacement or upgrading of your wastewater treatment plant," Watson said. "We have that meeting, we can go over it and really sit down and do what is a critical path to what you want to do."



some disagreement over the responsible party, maybe is the best way to put it on some of these," Holstine said. "But we are going to get it taken care of as time and weather permits."

Holstine said that overall, he felt the meeting went well and that the DEP came to better understanding of the situation and the unique circumstances that exist at the Landfill and with the Authority. "We did meet with the DEP," Holstine said. "It turned out to be a good meeting in the end and I think they understand where we're at, some of the reasons why we're where we're at preexisted our operation and we're doing everything we can do with the money we have at hand to take care of those issues."

Holstine said he feels there will be a more positive relationship between the entities moving forward following the meeting. "I think that was a positive meeting," Holstine said. "Looking forward to a little better relationship moving forward."

The highest concern coming out of the DEP inspection to Holstine concerns the use of the eco misters. The misters have been used by the Landfill to evaporate and reduce the amount of leachate the Landfill produces and reduce the amount of loads that have needed trucked out of the facility. The DEP has stated objections to the use due to over spray.

Holstine said that he is concerned that due to repeated problems with the DEP over the use of the misters, the use of them could be coming to an end which will greatly increase the amount of leachate the facility produces. "My concern moving into next year are leachate expenses with the repeated DEP inspection comments about the eco misters, I'm afraid the life, the useful life of the misters is coming

to an end," Holstine said. "We are most likely going to be running with just one eco mister, if not no eco misters come the near future."

Holstine said he anticipates that the cost of leachate disposal will increase greatly to amounts closer to what they were before the current board took over. In anticipation, next year's budget has already reflected an increase in the cost of leachate disposal, Holstine said. "With that, we have to anticipate higher leachate expenses," Holstine said. "That \$600,000 number was about where we were when we took over here."

The Authority has already seen an increase in the cost of leachate disposal from the harsh, wet winter the area had this year, Holstine said. In February alone, the facility hauled close to a million gallons of leachate from the weather conditions, according to Holstine. "Of course it was an extremely harsh winter. It was extremely wet, a lot of snow," Holstine said. "You're going to see the effect of that in next month's financials."

The amount of leachate hauled is anticipated to begin to taper off unless the weather conditions remain unseasonably wet, Holstine said. Regardless, without the eco misters to evaporate some of the liquids, the cost will still be higher to haul than what the Authority has seen since their inception, according to Holstine. "That will taper off," Holstine said. "If we have a wet summer, we have a wet fall, those numbers are going to stay elevated without the benefit of being able to try to evaporate some of that, you are going to see a definite impact on our financial statements."

There was no word when the eco misters would officially go offline.

A brief history of Earth Day

April 9, 1817: John Nuttall was born in England. He was one of the first operators to ship coal on the Chesapeake & amp; Ohio Railway in the early 1870s and founded the town of Nuttallburg in the New River Gorge.

April 10, 1848: John Kenna was born in Kanawha County. In 1883, the state legislature elected him to the U.S. Senate, unseating the powerful Henry G. Davis. Kenna is one of two West Virginians memorialized by a statue in the U.S. Capitol.

April 10, 1932: Entertainer Blaze Starr was born as Fanny Belle Fleming in Wayne County. The owner of a burlesque club rechristened her "Blaze Starr." Her story was the basis of the movie Blaze.

April 11, 1821: Congressman Jacob Beeson Blair was born in Parkersburg. Blair was the first West Virginian to be told by President Abraham Lincoln of Lincoln's support for making West Virginia a state.

April 11, 1847: Diarist Sirene Bunten was born in French Creek, Upshur County As a teenager she kept a diary about her daily activities, including emotional accounts of life on the West Virginia home front during the Civil War.

April 11, 1909: Writer Hubert Skidmore was born at Laurel Mountain in Webster County. In his novels, Skidmore depicted stoic endurance by mountain people in the face of misfortune and economic exploitation by outside interests.

Grilled Chicken Wrap

INGREDIENTS

For the Chicken Marinade:

- 2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts or thighs
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- · 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon cumin
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon smoked paprika, optional
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

For the Wrap:

- 4 large flour (white or wheat) tortillas
- 1 cup romaine or iceberg lettuce, chopped
- · 1 medium tomato, diced
- 1 small cucumber, sliced thinly • 1 small red onion, thinly sliced
- 1 avocado, sliced
- 1/2 cup shredded cheddar or mozzarella cheese
- · Fresh cilantro or parsley for garnish, optional

For the Creamy Garlic Sauce:

- 1/2 cup Greek yogurt or mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 garlic clove, minced • 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard, optional
- Salt and pepper to taste

INSTRUCTIONS

• Add the olive oil, lemon juice, minced garlic, paprika, cumin, oregano,

smoked paprika (if using), salt, and pepper. Mix to combine.

• Add the chicken breasts and coat them thoroughly in the marinade. Let the chicken marinate for at least 30 minutes (up to 2 hours) in the refrigerator for extra flavor.

• Preheat your grill (or grill pan) over medium-high heat. Lightly oil the grill grates. Grill the chicken for 6–7 minutes per side or until the internal temperature reaches 165°Fahrenheit and the chicken has grill marks. Once cooked, remove the chicken from the heat and let it rest for 5 minutes before slicing it into thin strips.

• Add the Greek yogurt, lemon juice, olive oil, minced garlic, and mustard (if using) to a small bowl. Season with salt and pepper. Mix to combine. Adjust the flavors to your liking.

• Lay a tortilla flat and spread a tablespoon (or more) of the creamy garlic sauce in the center. Add a handful of chopped lettuce, diced tomatoes, sliced cucumbers, and onions. Layer a few slices of avocado. Top with the grilled chicken slices and sprinkle some shredded cheese. Garnish with fresh cilantro or parsley if desired.

• Fold the sides of the tortilla inward, then roll it tightly from the bottom to the top. Tuck in the filling as you go. Slice the wrap in half diagonally for easy serving. Serve it immediately, or wrap it in foil to keep warm for later.



Facts and figures about autism

Autism affects families in myriad ways. Though its name suggests it's a singular condition, the term "autism" refers to a broad range of conditions characterized by challenges with social skills, repetitive behaviors, speech, and nonverbal communication.

The organization Autism Speaks is devoted to supporting and advocating for individuals with autism and their families. Learning about autism is one of the ways people from all walks of life, including those not affected by autism, can help organizations like Autism Speaks meet their missions. Though autism is a complicated subject, the following facts and figures can serve as a solid foundation for people who want to learn more about it.

· A 2021 report from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention indi-

cated that approximately one in 44 children in the United States is diagnosed with an autism spectrum disorder (ASD).

· A 2018 report from Canada's National Autism Spectrum Disorder Surveillance System estimated that one in 66 children and youth in Canada are diagnosed with ASD.

• The World Health Organization reports that global studies regarding the worldwide prevalence of autism vary significantly, though it's estimated that around one in 100 children across the globe is diagnosed with ASD.

· Autism Speaks reports that boys are four times more likely to be diagnosed with autism than girls. In fact, CDC data from 2018 indicates that one in 27 boys in the U.S. was identified with autism.

· Parents who have a child with autism have a 2 to 18 percent chance of having a second child who also is affected.

· Parents of twins should know that an autism diagnosis in one twin does not

necessarily mean the other child also will be diagnosed with autism. Autism Speaks indicates that, among identical twins, if one child has autism, the other will be affected about 36 to 95 percent of the time. Among non-identical twins, if one child has autism, the other will be affected about 31 percent of the time.

· Vaccines do not cause autism. Autism Speaks notes that extensive research conducted over several decades has concluded that there is no link between childhood vaccinations and autism.

Nearly one-third of children with ASD (31 percent) have an intellectual disability.

· Nearly half of children with autism wander or bolt from safety.

· Bullying is a significant problem for children with autism. Roughly twothird of children with autism between the ages of six and 15 have been bullied.

Congressman Moore Introduces Respecting Parents' Childcare Choices Act

Washington, D.C. – Today, Congressman Riley M. Moore introduced the Respecting Parents' Childcare Choices Act. This pro-family legislation significantly increases annual authorized funding levels for the Child Care Development Block Grant, which states disburse via vouchers to working-class families to help finance childcare. The bill also empowers families to choose the childcare option that works best for them, which can include paying a parent directly if they stay home and by eliminating burdensome regulations tied to paying a relative for childcare. Finally, the bill eliminates marriage penalties and codifies existing policy protections for faith-based childcare providers.

Congressman Clay Higgins of Louisiana joined Congressman Moore in co-sponsoring the bill. Identical legislation has been introduced in the Senate by Senator Jim Banks of Indiana.

The legislation is endorsed by Heritage Action for America, American Principles Project, American Compass, Independent Women's Forum, Catholic Vote, Family Policy Alliance, Students for Life, Susan B. Anthony List, March for Life Action, and the Bull Moose Project.

Congressman Moore issued the following statement: "For decades, conservatives have rallied around being pro-life, but far too often, the policy framework that came with it lacked strong, substantive ideas to reduce the burden on American families. Being pro-life means being pro-family, and with this legislation, we're empowering families to choose what works best

for them.

"This is just the first step I aim to take in ushering in a new era that makes raising a family great again."





West Virginia Department of Health Announces Change to Certified Death Certificate Process to Improve Access for Families



CHARLESTON, W.Va. – The West Virginia Department of Health (DH) is pleased to announce a change in its certified death certificate issuance process aimed at improving access to vital records documentation for residents. Effective immediately, West Virginia

Health Statistics Center will begin fulfilling all orders for certified copies of death certificates, even when the cause and manner of death are listed as pending.

This update eliminates delays for families who need official documen-

tation to handle urgent matters such as funeral arrangements, estate settlements, and legal affairs. By making this change, the Department aims to reduce bureaucratic hurdles and provide timely access to vital records during what is often a difficult and emotional time.

"Ensuring that families can access a certified death certificate, even when the cause or manner of death is still pending, is a critical step in reducing unnecessary delays during an already challenging period," said Health Secretary Arvin Singh, EdD, MBA, MPH, MS, FACHE. "By providing this service, we are helping West Virginians resolve these sensitive matters more quickly, making it easier for them to carry out funeral arrangements, complete legal processes, and settle estates without unnecessary delays."

Under West Virginia Code of State Rules § 64-32-15, certified death certificates are required to include certain basic information such as the name, date of birth, date of death, and the location of death, and remain valid and legitimate even when the cause or manner of death is still pending. The Department emphasizes that this change will not compromise the accuracy or legitimacy of the death certificate, which is an essential document for families and legal processes.

Electronic payment options are also now available for certified copies of birth, death, and marriage records. They can be obtained in person at the walk-up window, available from 8:30 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday through Friday. The cost remains \$12 per copy, maintaining accessibility and affordability for West Virginians seeking vital records for personal or official purposes.

Gardening safety for seniors
