# **Board schedules** two public hearings

Patrick The County Board of Supervisors determined at a recent meeting to hold two public hearings on June 12 - one is a proposal to amend the county's solar ordinances and the second concerns proposed comprehensive plan regarding Land Use.

The hearings begin at 6

"With regards to that particular solar ordinance. there was a tactical decision made on my part, frankly, to allow the ordinance to be adopted as it was presented given the exinto it prior to our (Guynn, Waddell, Carroll & Lockaby, P.C.) appointment as county attorney," County Attorney Mark Popovich

Because there was an understanding that a solar facility was on the cusp of submitting an application, Popovich said he felt it was important to have an ordi-

nance in place.

"Whether it was legally sufficient or not to at least have a stopgap measure (and) to have the ability to have a discussion with that solar organization," he said an ordinance was needed.

"As it turns out, the imchanges to the county's minent threat of an application wasn't as imminent as I had understood it to be," Popovich said and added that the Virginia Code section cited in the original ordinance specifically speaks to regulating solar facilities based on a zoning ordinance.

"Patrick County does not have zoning, so therefore treme amount of effort put it is not applicable in this particular instance," said.

> Popovich said there is an option for the board to consider solar companies based on whether or not they comply with the county's comprehensive plan.

# Judge, prosecutor appointed as Hazlewood prepares to step down

Patrick County Court Clerk Sherri Hazlewood submitted her resignation as a petition seeking her removal from office moves forward with a judge and a special prosecutor appointed to the case.

According to Hazelwood's criminal defense attorney Ward Armstrong, of the Armstrong Law Firm in Martinsville, Hazlewood submitted her letter of resignation. It is effective July

A petition to remove Hazlewood from her role was filed in Patrick County Circuit Court on April 14.

Phillip L. Hairston, a retired judge from the 13th Judicial Circuit, will preside over the case.

Pulaski County Commonwealth's Attorney Justin Griffith will serve as the special prosecutor.

The petition, which includes at least 545 signatures, alleges Hazlewood "has presented an unwell mental state during the 2022 year, directly affecting the office and county," and "has neglected numerous duties pertaining to the job of Clerk over the 2022 years resulting in copious orders not being filed and/or filed correctly."

The petition alleges Hazlewood has "had high absenteeism and has been out of the office for extended periods during the 2022 year. She has been negligent in her duties as Clerk and did not arrange any replacement for those duties during her incarcerations."

Virginia law states in part Circuit an elected official can be removed "for neglect of duty, misuse of office, or incompetence in the performance of duties when that neglect of duty, misuse of office, or incompetence has a material adverse effect upon the conduct of the office."

Patrick County Commonwealth's Attorney Dayna Kendrick Bobbitt said because Hazlewood is a local official, a special prosecutor was needed to handle the case. The special prosecutor would not receive additional compensation for services, but may receive reimbursement for "actual expenses incurred, as approved by the Compensation Board to be paid by the Compensation Board, provided such expenses are not otherwise reimbursed by the county or city which he is elected or appointed to serve or by the Compensation Board."

Typically, when a special prosecutor is needed for any case, the Commonwealth Attorney's Office begins by calling neighboring jurisdictions to ask whether they can handle the matter, Bobbitt said.

Before Griffith agreed to handle the case, Bobbitt said, "We have asked multiple neighboring jurisdictions to handle this removal proceeding, but all have declined for various reasons."

Additionally, Virginia law states that "any officer proceeded against shall have the right to demand a trial by jury. Therefore, Ms. Hazlewood has the right to demand a jury trial for the removal proceeding," Bobbitt said.

Bobbitt said that if Hazlewood is the prevailing party in that suit, the county could be responsible for legal fees incurred during the removal process. "Of course, this is ultimately up to the judge," she added.

The petition also cited Hazlewood's four arrests in 2022 as a reason for her removal.

# Single mom weighs options after a sudden loss of childcare



Amanda Hylton learned last week she would no longer have childcare for her youngsters, Khalani and Keziah.

The sudden loss of childcare and lack of options has created a crisis for Amanda Hylton.

A Patrick County native and a single mother, Hylton has lived in more populated areas of Virginia like Hampton Roads. She returned to the Stuart area because her older children wanted to attend Patrick County High School. Her eldest daughter, Maddy, will graduate later this week. Her eldest son, Caleb, is a previous PCHS graduate.

But Hylton's younger children, Keziah and Khalani, may not have that opportunity.

Hylton is a special education teacher in the Henry County School division. She accepted a job in that division because she thought there would be more children options available.

Her younger children had both been attending daycare in Henry County since they were 3 months old, Hylton said. Keziah is now 2 and a half years old, and Khalani just celebrated her first birthday.

Both have food allergies which require that each have an EpiPen to treat serious allergic reactions.

Recently, Hylton said she received an email from the childcare provider, noting the childcare agency's handbook stated medication could not be administered to youngsters in the facility. Upon learning that, Hylton said she emailed the director of the facility to determine whether the EpiPen and Benadryl "fell under that cate-

adding that she also learned the childcare providers working in the facility lacked Medication Administration Training (MAT) certification. As a result, the facility was not allowed to store medication or administer it - even in a life-threatening situation.

"I said, 'You never told me that" when Hylton registered her children to attend or gave the facility a copy of the children's Food Allergy Care Plan.

She explained the plan is a document created by an aller-

gy specialist for those at risk of suffering anaphylaxis, a life-threatening allergic reaction that typically occurs shortly after exposure to allergic substances.

MAT certification is not expensive, nor is it required for every worker in a facility, she said, adding she does not know why caregivers aren't required to be certified.

"It's kind of like getting CPR certified," she said.

Regardless, last week "basically, I was left with the option of dropping my children off without their EpiPen and Benadryl or I don't go to work," Hylton said.

She chose the second option and spent the entire next day calling various childcare cen-"I was told, 'Yes," Hylton said, ters in and around Henry and

# Board hears budget breakdown


Schools Superintendent Jason Wood presented a budget breakdown at the May 11 meeting of the Patrick County School Board.

Wood said the update was due to questions regarding the budget process.

"We're still waiting on a state budget, so we are preparing to send out contracts now with your approval tonight. So, our teachers and staff and everyone will receive contracts next week," he said.



The Patrick County School Board heard a breakdown of the budget on May 11.



Schools Superintendent Jason Wood said only 19 percent, or \$6.6 million, of the division's funds come from the county.

For the fiscal year 2022-23, Wood said 72 percent of the division's revenue came from the state. Patrick County gives about 19 percent, or \$6.6 million, with the federal government giving seven percent, and grants making up the remaining two percent.

"There's always the question about this time of how we are spending our money, and I just want to reassure everyone we follow the VSBA (Virginia School board Association) spending guidelines. Our budget this year, just like we'll

# WPPD awarded more than \$8 million for broadband upgrades

The West Piedmont Planning District, which serves Henry, Patrick, Franklin and Pittsylvania counties and the cities of Martinsville and Danville, was awarded a more than \$8 million grant from the Virginia Telecommunication Initiative (VATI).

The award was among the more than \$59.5 million VATI grants for 14 projects serving 20 localities throughout Virginia. The VATI program provides targeted funding to extend service to areas that are presently underserved by any broadband provider.

"In today's increasingly digital world, having access to high-speed broadband is no longer a luxury, it is necessary in order to fully participate in daily life," Gov. Glenn Youngkin said when announcing the awards. "These investments will allow us to reach underserved communities, grow Virginia's economy and close the digital divide across the Commonwealth."

VATI's goal is to create strong, competitive communities throughout the Commonwealth by preparing those communities to build, utilize, and capitalize on telecommunications infrastructure. This year's funding leverages more than \$118.6 million in local and private sector matching funds. "Closing the digital divide is paramount to grow-

ing Virginia's economy, supporting businesses and ensuring that all Virginians have the resources they need to thrive," said Secretary of Commerce and Trade Caren Merrick. "These investments will connect over 29,400 homes, businesses and community anchors, making critical strides toward achieving universal broadband in Virginia."

The Department of Housing and Community Development administers the VATI program, which provides targeted financial assistance to extend broadband service to areas that are currently unserved by a provider. Projects were selected through a competitive process that evaluated each project for demonstrated need and benefit for the community, applicant readiness and capacity, and the cost and leverage of the proposed project. The level of funding awarded is based on the infrastructure needs in the project area.

In this application year, VATI received 35 applications requesting more than \$300 million in funding. Since 2017, Virginia has invested more than \$798.7 million to connect over 358,000 homes, businesses and community anchors within 84 localities.

# Manufacturing **Sector Leads Initial Unemployment Claims**

The number of initial claims rose in the latest filing week to 3,336, their highest level since December of 2021 but still at typical pre-Pandemic volumes experienced in 2019, according to data from the Virginia Employment Commission (VEC).

For the filing week ending May 6, the figure for seasonally unadjusted initial claims in Virginia was 3,336, which was an increase of 602 claimants from the previous week. Over half of initial claims with a self-reported industry were from manufacturing; administrative and support and waste management; professional, scientific, and technical services; and retail trade. Continued weeks claimed totaled 12,769, which was little changed from the previous week but an increase of 70% from the 7,509 continued claims from the comparable week last year.

Eligibility for benefits is determined on a weekly basis, and so not all weekly claims filed result in a benefit payment. This is because the initial claims numbers represent claim applications; claims are then reviewed for eligibility and legitimacy.

In the week ending May 6, the advance U.S. figure for seasonally adjusted initial claims was 264,000, an increase of 22,000 from the previous week's unrevised level of 242,000. This is the highest level for initial claims since October 30, 2021 when it was 264,000. The advance number of actual initial claims under state programs, unadjusted, totaled 234,084 in the week ending May 6, an increase of 13,969 (or 6.3 percent) from the previous week. There were 185,815 initial claims in the comparable week in 2022. Looking at preliminary data, most U.S. states reported increases on a seasonally unadjusted basis. Massachusetts's preliminary weekly change (+6,375) was the largest increase. California's weekly change (+2,924) was the second largest increase. Missouri's preliminary weekly change (+2,447) was the third largest increase. Texas's weekly change (+1,471) was the fourth largest increase. Virginia's preliminary weekly change (+722) was the ninth largest increase.

The NMTC provides a modest tax incentive to private investors to invest in low-income communities. The programs' projects have spurred over \$42 billion in private investment and generated over one million jobs since 2000, but less than one in four NMTC jobs have been created in rural communities.

The Rural Jobs Act would designate \$500 million in NMTC investments for "Rural Job Zones." These zones are low-income communities that have a population smaller than 50,000 inhabitants and are not adjacent to an urban area. Under the new definition, Rural Job Zones would be established in 342 out of the 435 congressional districts across the country.

The bill would also require that at least 25 percent of this new investment activity be devoted to counties with persistently high rates of poverty and migration. There are approximately 400 counties in the United States facing per-

"I'm glad to introduce this legislation to bridge that gap and ensure that rural areas receive the same opportunities that have created good-paying jobs in cities across the country," said Warner - the single democrat in the group that also included U.S. Sens. Roger Wicker, R-Miss., Jerry Moran, R-Kan., and Mike Braun, R-Ind.

#### Active Shooter Response Training Program is open to first responders, civilians

The Criminal Justice Services Board awarded \$2.4 million for statewide Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training (ALER-RT) as a component of the Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) Active Attack Program, which educates first responders and civilians on responding to active shooter

emergencies. ALEERT embraces a community approach by providing consistent, evidence-based training to all law enforcement agencies and civilians to neutralize and survive attacks. All law enforcement agencies, private and public learning institutions, and faith-based organizations are eligible to register for in-person trainings that are hosted statewide, or virtual course offerings.

The comprehensive approach to emergency response and recovery reinforces the fact that public safety responders are one part of the nation's emergency management team and civilians can support response efforts when properly equipped with knowledge on what to do in active attack scenarios. The ALERRT program was named the National Standard in Active Shooter Response Training by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI).

The approved funding will provide DCJS \$1.55 million for one-time equipment acquisitions and three years of annual funding at \$288,000 per year. This funding supports 16 law enforcement courses and 48 civilian courses annually.

The "announcement demonstrates the Commonwealth's renewed commitment to ensuring Virginians and first responders are able to enroll in best-in-class courses that equip them with the skills they need to best respond to active attack events," said Gov. Glenn Youngkin. "This program will build a culture of preparedness by increasing consistent and coordinated first responder training and civilian education."

DCJS plans to offer a number of different law enforcement active attack courses to law enforcement agencies across the Commonwealth, civilian courses and webinars, as well as develop an age-appropriate eLearning series for K-12 students on personal safety.

# Patrick among localities to receive Virginia Tourism Corporation Grant for Tourism Marketing

In total, VTC awarded more than \$3.2 million for 236 local and regional tourism marketing programs across the state to help increase visitation and revenue for Virginia's localities through tourism.

Patrick County received a \$5,500 grant for Moonshine Heritage Trail. Patrick County partnered with Floyd County and Franklin County to supply \$5,500 in matching funds. The three counties are working with Olivia Garrett, Regional Programs Specialist of the West Piedmont Planning District Commission, in their efforts.

"The Moonshine Heritage Trial will help tell the stories from our collective past. From legal distilleries before prohibition to the midnight industry that spawned during it. The three counties involved in this first phase of the project were vital in making legal and illegal Moonshine. However, as we gather more stories and the documented history of then and now, we envision the expansion to our neighbors that border our counties to grow into all of Southwest Virginia and the entire state. This is a significant step forward as we begin phase 1 of our project. We want to capture the history and highlight some notable places along a designated path to help drive tourism to our localities. I am excited about this grant and the establishment of this trial." said James Houchins, Director of Tourism for Patrick County.

She also talked to the Human Resources Department at work and learned that she could not file the absence under the Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA), therefore "my job is not protected.

"With the lack of daycare in the area, what am I supposed to do," she asked rhetorically. "Do I lose my job? I've already not been able to pay my bills because they've been sick" and the time missed from work is unpaid.

"The kids have been sick a lot this

year, and I have no" paid time off left to cover any absences over the next few weeks, Hylton said, adding that meant she would not be paid for any time missed from work.

"I've used my credit card already to pay for gas, expenses, and food, and that was before this," she said. "What do I do? It's like, how do other people work?"

Hylton said she had even considered staying home and offering childcare to other parents, "but I need insurance and retirement. I'm literally at a loss of what I need to do."

group, Hylton said she sought advice from other members, but learned there were no options she hadn't already considered.

Sadly, "my kids are the ones who are

going to suffer," Hylton said, adding that

she had signed up to teach a summer school class, but had to cancel after losing

have it proposed for next year, is the exact same," he said.

Wood said the state suggests a division should spend 60-65 percent of its budget for instruction. Patrick County schools spend 64 percent.

Fifteen percent of the budget is spent n facilities, and the state suggests spending anywhere from 10-15 percent.

"Technology is 3- to 5- percent, and we are a little over at six percent because we are a division that is one-to-one with devices, which really, I think is a blessing for our students and families. They don't have to worry about that, and we are able to provide some instruction," he

The recommended spending amount for transportation is 3- to 5- percent, but the division spends seven percent.

"I think due to the geographic location of our schools, and we have a new fleet of buses at seven percent. Again, I think putting money there for the safety of students is a great place to put your funds," he said.

Wood said Patrick County schools are the lowest in the region for funds spent for administration at four percent. The state suggests spending 6 to 10 percent, and "we are the highest performing in the region, yet we have the smallest ad-

ministrative staff," he said. In Patrick County, including

the debt service, the division represents 44.8 percent of the county's budget.

"If you take out the debt service, then actual funds that we're able to put toward our county budget is just over 31 percent, and the average in the state is over 50 percent. So, most localities spend more than 50 percent of their budget toward their schools," he said.

Wood said Henry County spends 63 percent of its total budget on education, Floyd County spends 58 percent, and Carroll

County spends 63.5 percent. In other matters, the board:

"It looks at many areas - the size of your school, the demographics of your school, the free/reduced lunch numbers of your school - and it's just another testament of what a great job that we're doing," he said.

# Secure the Border

Ninth District U.S. Rep. Morgan Griffith

I voted in favor of H.R.2, the Secure the Border Act, which has passed the U.S. House of Representatives. House Republicans put forth this legislation in response to the catastrophic situation at our southern border.

For years, our nation has experienced massive surges of migrants at our southern border. Experiencing such surges, the Trump Administration implemented a robust immigration plan to stem the flow of illegal migrants. This plan included construction of a border wall, more resources for U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), tough detention and deportation policies for those crossing illegally, and a "Remain in Mexico" policy for immigrants seeking asylum, etc.

In his first 100 days after taking office, President Biden signed a series of Executive Orders reversing these policies.

Since President Biden took office, there have been over five million illegal crossings at the southern border.

Both human and drug smuggling have increased dramatically. It is reported that Mexican cartels are now making \$13 billion a year smuggling illegal immigrants into the U.S.

Drug trafficking – specifically fentanyl – has flourished with Biden's new policies. Cartels have adroitly managed to send in a wave of migrants to one border location, forcing border agents there to handle and process the illegal immigrants, thus leaving large sections of the border unattended and allowing the cartels to smuggle drugs in unimpeded.

In 2022, the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency seized over 379 million doses of fentanyl, enough to kill every American. And those are just the shipments of fentanyl the DEA stopped. There is no sign of the cartels slowing down the flood of illegal

Our open borders have also led to an historic number of unaccompanied minors living in our country, many being exploited and abused.

I chaired a recent Oversight and Investigations Subcommittee hearing where we discussed U.S. Health and Human Services' failure to competently manage the record number of unaccompanied minors in the care of the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR).

Due to ORR prioritizing fast tracking the release of unaccompanied children to sponsors instead of taking the time and effort to thoroughly vet those sponsors, there have been many reports of these children being forced to illegally work full time in slaughterhouses,

or as roofers, or other dangerous

and inappropriate professions, in-

stead of being enrolled in school.

And as if these problems aren't alarming enough, the House passage of H.R.2 comes as the Biden administration ends Title 42, which under certain circumstances allows for expedited removal of illegal immigrants.

This policy, which was put in place in March 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, has allowed U.S. officials to expel illegal immigrants more than 2.8 million times.

The Biden administration expects an explosion of new migrants at the southern border with the end of Title 42. In response, 1,500 active-duty soldiers are going to the southern border to assist CBP with processing, along with U.S. Secret Service agents and U.S. Marshals. Our policies are in desperate need

of reform.

H.R.2 will end the Biden Administration's flawed policy of catch In the two-plus years since, our and release, force the Biden Administration to restart the construction of the border wall, deploy needed technology to increase security to both the southern and northern borders, and provide funding to increase the number of border patrol agents.

> The legislation will also strengthen current law aiming to protect unaccompanied children human trafficking by requiring HHS to provide the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) with biographical information regarding the sponsors or family members to whom the minors are released and mandates that DHS follow up with the sponsors.

> Unaccompanied minors who have experienced severe forms of trafficking or who claim a credible fear of persecution will receive a hearing before an immigration judge within 14 days and the legislation allows DHS to hold an unaccompanied minor for up to 30 days to ensure a speedy judicial process.

> H.R.2 also aims to streamline our asylum process by specifying that asylum must be sought at a port of entry and increases the credible fear standard.

> It also makes illegal aliens ineligible for asylum if they have moved through through a safe third country without applying for protection there and allows DHS to remove aliens seeking asylum to safe third countries where they would have access to a full and fair asylum pro-

# Social Security Matters

#### Ask Rusty - Should Octogenarians Tell Social Security They Married?

Dear Rusty: We were married two years ago at age 78 and 81. Do we need to do anything with Social Security? Signed: Blissfully Happy

Dear Blissfully Happy: Congratulations on your fairly recent marriage and, yes, there are some things you should do. Specifically, you should contact Social Security to inform them of your marriage, see whether any additional benefits are available, and to make any changes needed to your contact information. Here are some things to consider:

· If a name change has occurred for one of you, that person should contact Social Security to report the change. A copy of your marriage certificate (and other ID) will be required, and a new Social Security card will

 If a change of address has also occurred for one or both of you, that must be reported. It's important that Social Security has the correct mailing address, email, and contact phone number for every beneficiary.

 If there are any other changes to the contact Information on file with the Social Security Administration for either of you (e.g., your banking information), the affected person should inform Social Security of the changes needed.

 Social Security will evaluate whether any benefit increase is available as a result of your marriage, which may be the case if one of you is entitled to a "spousal boost" (an additional amount from the other now that you're married). A spousal boost may be available if one has a monthly Social Security payment which is more than twice the other's benefit. Social Security can answer that question for you when you call.

You can contact either your local Social Security office (find the number at www.ssa. gov/locator) or call the national number at 1.800.772.1213 and tell them you need to inform them of your marriage and update your contact information. If you have (or if you create) an online "my Social Security" account at www.ssa.gov/myaccount, you can initiate changes to your contact information online, but you will need to call Social Security directly via phone to record your marriage and see if any changes to monthly benefits are available. All of this can likely be done without requiring a visit to your local SS of-

It is very important that Social Security be made aware of your new marital status and to ensure that they have the correct contact information for both of you. Even if the contact information is unchanged for one of you, the other should contact Social Security as described above to update their contact information and to determine if any changes to monthly benefits are appropriate as a result of your marriage. Doing so now will avoid future issues and will make sure you are both getting the correct monthly Social Security payments as a married couple. And if one of you is entitled to a higher spousal amount, you should ask for the increase to be applied retroactively (SS will pay up to 6 months retroactively). I suggest you call Social Security as soon as possible to inform them of your marriage and make any necessary changes to your contact information. This article is intended for information

# Patrick Pioneers

Rosa Elizabeth Hopkins Agee

Thank you to Suzanne Hopkins Hutchens for the following information about her aunt, Rosa Elizabeth Hopkins Agee, and to the late Beulah Wright Hopkins and her book, Central Academy 1910-1932.

Rosa Elizabeth Hopkins was born on the 20th of December 1899 on the "north side of the mountain" near Buffalo Ridge, Patrick County. Her parents. James Daniel Hopkins and Emily Louetta DeHart Hopkins, moved to the "south side of the mountain" at Howell, Virginia at the Crossroads in 1910. Rosa grew up in the home that was later owned by A.C. and Lillian Williams Carter. I have heard several folks say that this grand old home will be moved soon to avoid the path of the new fourlane for Highway 58; I sure hope this is the case.

Rosa attended nearby Central Academy where she excelled as a student. After graduating from school, she entered Harrisonburg State Teachers College where she studied Latin and Home Economics. Rosa graduated in 1921 with a Bachelor of Science degree and returned to Patrick County to begin her teaching career.

Suzanne Hopkins Hutchens' mother, Essie (Mrs. A.D.) Yeatts Hopkins recalled her memories of "Miss Rosa" in her journal.... "It was in late May 1919 that I first saw "Miss Rosa." She, with a part of other young people stopped at our place, the Yeatts, on their way to the Pinnacles on the Dan River. I was told the picnic was at the foot of the Pinnacles, after which the boys and some of the girls climbed the peaks. When they returned to our home in mid-afternoon, rather exhausted, our cold spring water was a welcome refreshment. All the girls were lady-like, yet full of fun and enthusiasm. "Miss Rosa" especially impressed me because of her kind smile. Her hair was dark brown, her skin fair and flawless with no hint of make-up, and her lips were a deep rose. Her eyes, her most striking feature, were large ovals of pure gray. Gentleness and kindness seemed to emanate from her when she spoke, so I knew instinctively that she was a person one could trust

and respect. In 1921 or 1922, a Presbyterian Minister, Mr. Roy Smith, began having preaching services in the Mayberry School, as the Brethren were doing once monthly, and Baptist had done with Mr. Billy Shelor as preacher. Soon afterward, Mr. Smith with "Miss Rosa," Miss Marion Talley and a few high school students from Central Academy, organized a Sunday School. Revivals were held and many conversions or professions of faith were made. Soon plans for a church in that community began to develop. When Mayberry Presbyterian Church was organized, one convert, Samuel Cephas Scott, the local merchant, gave the land for its location. Through community efforts and gifts of labor, material, and money from many sources -farmers, teachers, mail carriers, merchants, and perhaps the Presbytery -finally the completed building was dedicated in 1926. Throughout most of the twenties, the group from Central Academy led by "Miss Rosa" used her car for transportation to keep the Sunday School going at Mayberry. Around the mid-twenties, Mr. Smith introduced a younger man, Robert Childress, to this field. He was a moving evangelist who worked tirelessly toward getting the church built, and one who perfectly understood the mountain men. Although Childress came from Richmond to Mayberry about every other Sunday, except in the most severe weather, the cadre from Central Academy kept the Sunday School going while he was absent. Another summer, Miss Marion Talley and "Miss Rosa" spent several

weeks assisting Mr. Childress

with revivals at Mayberry, Free

Union, and Buffalo Mountain."

Mrs. Essie Yeatts Hopkins recalled that when she entered Central Academy in 1927 as a freshman, "Miss Rosa" was teaching Latin and Domestic Science -cooking, homemaking, and sewing. Mrs. Hopkins recalled, "teaching a group of farm girls, inexperienced in most tasks of homemaking beyond dishwashing, must have required a tremendous amount of patience. But "Miss Rosa" was equal to the task, remaining serene and without frustration even when sewing machine needles were broken or we let the applesauce scorch. Although the atmosphere was informal and pleasant, she always expected, and had, the complete respect of the girls."

Mrs. Beulah Wright Hopkins echoed the same sentiments about Rosa, "In considering teachers I knew in various stages of my education. I must select "Miss Rosa" for whom I feel most gratitude and admiration. Her wisdom, talent, intelligence, industry, and helpfulness made her the mainspring of the school for several years. Upon her expert direction, we learned to cut and sew clothing; to do various types of embroidery, trimmings, and handicrafts; and to plan, cook, and serve meals."

Rosa also taught Latin and served as the drama coach, producing plays as fundraisers for the school. In 1930, Rosa was appointed principal of Central Academy and served in that capacity until she married Epperly Agee on August 15, 1931. Agee had also attended Central Academy and went on to graduate at Virginia Polytechnic Institute (VA Tech) and teach agriculture at Burke's Garden, Virginia. On March 20, 1933, Annette

Elizabeth Agee was born to Epperly and Rosa Hopkins Agee and tragically, Rosa died nine days later. Annette was raised by Rosa's parents, J. D. and Emily DeHart Hopkins at the Crossroads, near the school where her mother had dedicated much of her life.

# Opportunistic William Byron scores third win of 2023 at Darlington

William Byron took full advantage of a late on-track incident between Ross Chastain and Kyle Larson to triumph in Sunday's Goodyear 400 Darlington Raceway and become the first three-time winner in the NASCAR Cup Series this season.

For Byron, the victory was sweet redemption for last season's spring race at the Lady in Black, where Joey Logano's bump-and-run denied Byron his first victory at the fabled speedway.

"Yeah, it's pretty amazing," said Byron, who earned the 100th victory for the No. 24 team. "My granddad passed away on Thursday, and just, man, I wish my family could be here. Just things have a way of working out, honestly. It just worked out that way today. We didn't have the best third stage. We just kept battling, and things just kind of come back around.

"Definitely didn't expect this. But just thankful for a great team, and, yeah, just things have a way of working out, and to come back here to Darlington and have it go exactly the other way."

It was a Lap 288 crash between Chastain and Larson—while battling for the lead—that gave Byron the opportunity to collect his seventh career victory.

Taking the inside lane, with Larson beside him, Chastain led the field to a restart after an eight-car wreck necessitated the seventh caution on Lap 281. Chastain drove hard into Turn 1, plowed up the track and wrecked both his No. 1 Chevrolet and Larson's No. 5.

Chastain took responsibility for the mistake that took him out of the race and relegated Larson to a 20th-place result.

"Full commit into Turn 1," said Chastain, who finished 29th. "I got really tight and drove up and turned myself. I wanted to squeeze him. I wanted to push him up. We'd been racing back and forth all day. But I definitely didn't want to turn myself."

The incident forced overtime, handed the lead to the driver of the No. 24 Hendrick Motorsports Chevrolet. Byron outran Kevin Harvick in the final two-lap dash.

In a race that included massive wrecks on Laps 194 and 281, Chase Elliott ran third, followed by Brad Keselowski, Bubba Wallace, Harrison Burton, Kyle Busch, Justin Haley, Ryan Blaney and Chris Buescher.

In sharp contrast to the aggressive battling between Chastain and Larson, Harvick, whose No. 4 Ford had sustained front-end damage during the Lap 281 wreck, gave Byron plenty of room after the overtime restart on Lap 294.

"We had a good car all day," Harvick said. "We just never could get up towards the front in our Sunny Delight Ford Mustang. Struggled in traffic today, but we were really good at the second half of the run and just struggled at the beginning of the run.





#### The World is Choosing Sides By Van Yandell

Proverbs 12: 15 "The way of a fool is right in his own eyes: but he that hearkens unto counsel is wise."

Growing up in a small Western Kentucky town in the 1950's and 60's was much different from today. I now live in a county with a population of 150,000. There are three high schools in the county, but I rarely see young people except those working in stores or restaurants. I find myself wondering where they are and what they're doing.

When I was growing up, any time the ball park wasn't muddy, we played baseball. There weren't enough of us to have a football team, but we could play baseball with smaller numbers. The first order of business was to choose our teams.

Two were always selected as the "team captains" and they would choose the players alternately from the group. Choices were made by which player was the "best, strongest and fastest." The teams were rarely evenly matched and, of course, everyone wanted to win. There was nothing official or significant about our games, but that winning spirit existed among us.

We recently heard of Finland joining NATO (North Atlantic Treaty Organization). With the current geopolitical condition, war seems to be on the minds of many and the world appears to be choosing sides. Just as we chose sides for our baseball teams, the sides (countries) today want to be teamed with the most powerful.

In just the last two years it seems the power momentum has shifted. Where the western (free) world was feared and respected among the nations; that is no longer the case. We are seen as weak and vulnerable because of our extreme state of division.

While the U.S. and other "civilized" nations have focused on social issues, other countries have been building up their military. An obvious shift in power and leadership has taken place. We may think we know what armament potential they possess but that may prove to be a fallacy.

The factions of the political left and right are becoming disengaged and disconnected in several countries. This extreme division is creating this weakness just as fighting and arguing among the players on our baseball teams usually resulted in a game loss.

Matthew 12: 25 "And Jesus knew their thoughts, and said unto them, every kingdom divided against itself is brought to desolation; and every city or house divided against itself shall not stand." The western world has become segmented into racial, social and economic people groups. The conditions that divide are many.

Extreme division never contributes to success. In our world today of nuclear weaponry, there will be no winner and the one to fire the first ICBM will simply be the last

Nonetheless, scriptural prophesy clearly points to a world war that will take place and will pale the first and second world wars (Zechariah 14: 12). We could see the current events such as the Russia-Ukraine war or the conflict evolving in the South China Sea or any one of the other developing situations as being temporary or nothing less than a development into a bigger war. Even the civil war in Sudan has its implications.

Ezekiel 38 and 39 tells us of a war called the War of Gog and Magog. Who Gog and Magog were vary from one Bible student to another. In my thinking they refer to a people and a place (Ezekiel 38: 2).

To briefly describe this coming war, we are told the armies of the north, along with others, will invade Israel. The western allies would likely join the fight resulting in a third world war. The Bible teaches, however, Israel will not need any help because God will crush the invaders (Ezekiel 38: 21-23).

In today's world starving for petroleum, some geologists believe a vast oil reserve is located under Israel and Russia covets that oil. Also, being on the eastern end of the Mediterranean Sea, Israel would serve as a strategic seaport for Russia's massive navy. Putin may see himself as the president of the world and is working to that

Considering the location of Ukraine, Russia may want that real estate to serve as a point of logistics and preparation to invade Israel thus fulfilling the Ezekiel prophesy. I realize this is just speculation but two and two still make

With other alliances taking place in the communist world, this choosing of sides appears to be on-going. Russia and China are becoming "bedfellows" along with Iran and South Korea. So far, much of the noise has been sabre rattling but as far as we know at this time, both possess (or are close to possessing) nuclear armament and both are brazened enough to use it. It only takes one "crazy" in close proximity to "the button" to begin the incineration or our world.

Jesus said in Matthew 24: 6, there would always be wars and rumors of wars. That has always been true but the potential for a world conflict is much more impending than ever before.

While this may be disconcerting to some, it is reassuring and evident what we have believed about the Bible and God is absolutely true and we are witnessing the truth happening before our very





# Historical Society to host Appalachian Trail author




In an upcoming special event, the Patrick County Historical Society welcomes T. Mills Kelly, history professor at George Mason University, to talk about his recently published book, "Virginia's Lost Appalachian Trail." Kelly's research brings to us the remarkable story of the founding of the original Appalachian Trail that runs from Georgia to Maine, but his particular emphasis is on the 300-mile section that runs through Virginia.

As Kelly notes, the "original" trail once


passed through Patrick County on its way north and south, a fact not realized by most modern hikers on the current route. Dr. Kelly has explored most of the original trail and has interviewed many hikers and dozens of people who lived in the area it traversed. Some early hikers noted not only the scenic beauty of the trail in Patrick, but the rugged climbing involved on some parts of their trek hereabouts as well. Kelly will explain some of the reasons why the trail was eventually relocated also.

Besides his career as a teacher and historian, Kelly is an avid hiker himself. He has a good feel for the natural environment associated with the trail, the early hikers who took on the difficult journey, and the local people who often welcomed and accommodated those "oddly dressed strangers" with food and lodgings as they passed nearby.
