

For more than 125 years, Craig County has **celebrated Labor Day**

Many today believe that Labor Day is just another "holiday," un-aware of its history. Here are some tidbits.

Labor Day is a public holiday and sometimes a day of festivities, held in honor of working people in the United States and Canada on the first Monday in September. In many other countries, it is celebrated on May 1.

Some believe that it began with Peter Mc-Guire, a man who is considered "the Father of the Labor Day Holiday," according to Purple Trail. McGuire was an Irish-American pioneer unionist who wanted citizens that "labored" all year long to be acknowledged and have a day to relax.

McGuire is quoted as saying the following statement during a Central Labor Union on May 18, 1882: "Let us have, a festive day during which a parade through the streets of the city would permit public tribute to American Industry."

September 1 was the chosen date because it's between the Fourth of July and Thanksgiving.

The first Labor Day parade was held on Tuesday. Sept. 5, 1882, in New York City.

It has been noted in history, that during the Industrial Revolution, Americans worked, on

What is foreign to Americans today was commonplace back then. Children as young as five and six regularly worked in factories and mills throughout the nation for pennies a day.

Many workers labored in unsafe, unsanitary conditions and even some "with insufficient access to fresh air."

In the late 18th-century, labor unions started rising and became more prominent and vocal for the American employees and began organizing strikes and rallies. They protested poor conditions and encouraged employers to renegotiate hours and their pay.

History reveals that on September 5, 1882, "Ten thousand workers took unpaid time off to march from City Hall to Union Square in New York City, holding the first ever Labor Day Parade."

Years later, many states passed legislation recognizing September 1 as a holiday. Congress, how-ever, did not legalize the holiday until 12 years later, "when a watershed moment in American labor history brought workers' rights squarely into the public's view. Then on May 11, 1894, employees of the Pullman Palace Car Company in Chicago went on strike to protest wage cuts and the firing of union representatives."

Then, victory was won, as President Grover Cleveland signed the holiday into law on June 28, 1894.

TAP needs help to keep families safe with plumbing rehabilitation

Our Indoor Plumbing Rehabilitation (IPR) program helps to ensure families have safe drinking water, eliminates hazardous outhouse trips and more. However, due to the pandemic, project material costs have skyrocketed. Without donations from supporters, IPR will not only have to turn down people who ask for help, it will have to drop some projects it has already started.

Since the pandemic began, IPR has received even more requests for help than usual. However, state and federal funding haven't increased, while the cost of materials like lumber has risen sharply. "It's been a struggle trying to get these projects

up off the ground," said PR program manager Liz Puckett.

IPR does its best to keep costs low. However, it often has to install new septic systems, drill new wells, or even rebuild badly damaged houses.

Willie Bell Ray benefited from IPR only because generous family members pitched in to fill gaps in the program's funding.

Ray, who is in her 70s, lived with her disabled son in a 50-yearold trailer. The trailer had no indoor plumbing. To avoid the hazard of walking down the hill to use the outhouse at night, she and her son used five-gallon buckets

instead. They also had to carry water up from the well to cook and wash dishes.

The trailer was so damaged that it needed to be fully replaced. However, IPR nearly had to turn Willie Bell down because material costs vastly outgrew the program's budget. They were only able to continue with the project because Ray's family supplied a new trailer. Now, she and her son have running water, a shower and a toilet.

Not everyone is as lucky as Ray to have a family support system. IPR has been unable to move forward with two projects this year because they exceeded budget. Both houses

Entrants can showcase bales into animals, structures, shapes and farmscapes. Other items such as corn stalks, pallets and pumpkins can be used alongside bales to create various scenes.

Guidelines and an entry form are available at bit.ly/3icRJqx. Participants are required to include a photograph of the decorated hay bale display with an application.

There are five classes: best promotional display for agriculture business or commodity; best

promotional display for community spirit; most creative; best agricultural theme; and best agribusiness, FFA, 4-H or school display. Winners will be selected in each category and receive a cash award.

Winners will be notified by mail, and hay bale photo entries will be displayed at the 2021 VFBF Annual Convention Nov. 30 through Dec. 2.

Last year's contest received 40 submissions. Winning entries included a hay bale honeybee encouraging people to "Bee a friend to pollinators"; a scene celebrating community spirit by honoring first responders; a tractor made of hay bales; and two creative 4-H displays featuring a hay bale cow and a farmer made of straw.

The displays are meant to create a lasting impression and typically are placed near schools, outside of banks, at Farm Bureau county offices and in people's yards.

"We've had people stop by and say, 'We can't wait to see what you're going to put up this year," said Joan Talley, a member of the Farm Bureau Women's Committee, which participates in the contest every year. "We strive to bring awareness by promoting community service, agriculture and Farm Bureau. It lets people know that we're not just another business along the road."





In less than 75 days, Virginians will head to the polls to select either businessman Glenn Youngkin or former Gov. Terry McAuliffe as the Commonwealth's next Governor. State residents will also decide the next Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General and House of Delegates.

A Salem political rally featuring former Va. Governor George Allen, GOP nominee for Attorney General Jason Miyares and GOP nominee for Governor, Glenn Youngkin, occurred on August 26 at CommU-NITY Church on East Main Street. All three politicians took the op-

portunity to passionately explain to local voters why it's important to nominate Republicans on November 2.

"Virginians are coming together and saying enough is enough. Everywhere we go, Jason and I find ourselves overwhelmed by the support. It's no longer Republicans versus Democrats. It's actually Virginians standing up and saying 'no.' This left liberal agenda has actually been at work trying to make Virginia the California east," Youngkin said. "That has no place here. This thing is neck and neck. Two weeks ago, there was an article saying that this election in America.

Why? Because we are not only voting on behalf of Virginia, but on behalf of the country."

Added Miyares, "Our murder rate has skyrocketed. It's the highest it's been in decades. People often ask, 'how did we get here?' It's because we have a far-left monopoly in Richmond with a criminal first, victim last mindset. And they are pushing policy after policy that is making Virginians less safe. The 14th amendment is one of the GOP's greatest legacies. The only way that we can change things is by electing a new General Assembly and a new Governor."

Republicans currently was the most important are the minority in both the Virginia House of Delegates and Senate. Additionally, just four of the 11 U.S. House seats are held by Republicans. The last Republican elected as Governor was Bob McDonnell in 2010.

Youngkin fervently rejects the actions of his opponent McAuliffe and Gov. Ralph Northam. While he doesn't support mandates, does advocate for hav- one of the main ones ing the choice to get the vaccine. McAuliffe has publicly said that vaccines and mandates are the best way to prevent disease and help reopen the economy.

A recent poll from the Wason Center for Politics shows Youngkin polling well in South-west Virginia while

Delegate Joe Mc-Namara and Delegate David Suetterlein were both present at the event to show their support. They, as well as everyone else in attendance, gave Governor Allen a standing ovation when he was introduced.

"I like Ronald Rea-Youngkin gan a great deal. He's who motivated me to get into organized politics. President Reagan talked about his election being a rendezvous with destiny. That's what we have here in Virginia, a rendezvous of the destiny of our Commonwealth. What vision do we want for our state? I think that it's one that exemplifies the ideas by Glenn, Jason and our party," he said.

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



Roanoke City and Alleghany Health Districts reports continued rise in cases; strongly urges precautionary measures

Roanoke City and Al-leghany Health Districts (RCAHD) continues to see a surge in COVID-19 cases locally. On Tuesday, August 31, the RCAHD announced that 715 cases had been reported during the prior week. As of September 3, approximately 430 additional cases have been reported in the last three days alone.

All counties in Virginia are currently at a high level of transmission of COVID-19. With the continued rise in cases, unvaccinated people should strongly consider staying home and more specifically, should avoid large crowds.

Fully vaccinated people should carefully consider their options when they are deciding whether to travel or be with others outside the home, especially in an indoor setting. People who have weakened immune systems, people who are taking care of the ill or elderly loved ones, who have children at home who are too young to be vaccinated, or people who simply want to be more cautious are encouraged to continue to wear masks, especially in indoor settings.



Rockets win football home opener with dominating performance against Auburn

It was a beautiful day for football in Craig County last Friday and the Rockets made it even better with a win in their home opener. Craig led from start to finish in a dominating performance against Auburn, winning 26-7.

"It was a beautiful evening for football at Mitchell Field," said Jim Fisher, who was pumped up for his first home game as head coach. "The facilities looked better than they have in many years, the numerous volunteers did a tremendous job getting things ready for opening night and a large crowd turned out excited to have a football team on the field again."

The Rockets opened up the game with a successful, surprise onside kick by senior Dylan Crawford. It worked out great as the Rockets recovered the ball, but fans in the bleachers didn't know the real story.

"Dylan made me look like a genius, but it was an accidental onside kick," laughed Fisher after the game.

The "Boys in Blue" then drove down the field and scored on their first home possession of the year, culminating with a 19 yard run by senior quarterback Brayden Frango.

Craig's second score of the opening period was set up when senior defensive end Nathan Fisher sacked the Auburn quarterback, causing a fumble recovered by senior defensive tackle Johnny Hutchinson. Craig only needed a handful of plays before Crawford scored on a tough three yard run.

The Eagles followed with their best drive of the half. They moved the ball to the Rocket three yard line but the Big Blue defense had a great goal line stand to deny the Eagles. Craig then drove the length of the field, down to the nine yard line, but time ran out before they could finish and the Rockets settled for a 12-0 lead at the half.

The second half began like the first half ended, with the Rockets marching down the field. Craig converted two fourth down runs to keep the long drive alive and ate up a big chunk of clock before sophomore runningback Trevyn Francisco scored on a 23 yard run.

Trailing 18-0 late in the 3rd quarter, the visiting Eagles felt compelled to go for it on fourth down from their own 34 yard line, Hutchinson was having none of it and had a huge sack for the Rockets. The hometown boys were then set up with a short field and quickly drove down inside the five where Crawford scored his second three yard TD of the night. Frango scored the two-point conversion, putting the Rockets up 26-0. Craig completely dominated the third quarter, scoring 14 points and hogging the ball for all but five plays.

The Rockets cleared the bench in the fourth quarter and the younger players gained valuable experience for the rest of the season. Auburn scored on a nine yard run late in the game to deny the Rockets a shutout.

For the second week in a row, Craig doubled up their opponent in yardage and first downs and this time those statistics showed up on the scoreboard.

"We were able to clean up the penalties and fumbles, and good things happened for us" said Fisher. "This offense is designed to be a clock eater and to deny our opponents the football. We are still having too many breakdowns in blocking assignments but we will work hard to fix those as well. We have not punted yet this year and I guess we should practice it a little more... but I just do not like giving the football to the other team."

Frango finished with 101 yards rushing on 14 carries while Crawford had 74 yards on 11 attempts. Francisco ran for 45 yards on nine carries and Zachary Peters had 38 yards on 11 as the Rockets rolled up 276 rushing yards on 53 attempts.

Meanwhile, the Craig County defense held Auburn to 87 yards rushing and 107 yards overall.

The Rockets are off this week with a bye and return to action at home on the 17th against Montcalm of West Virginia.

"I think we will finally have our new home uniforms before the Montcalm game and I hope that most of Craig County is there to help us break them in on the 17th," said Fisher.
