NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON **PROPOSED CHANGE IN CIGARETTE TAX RATE**

Pursuant to Virginia Code §§ 15.2-1427, the Craig County Board of Supervisors (the "Board") will hold a public hearing at 6 p.m., or as soon thereafter as persons may be heard, on January 6th in the Circuit Courtroom, Craig County Courthouse, 303 Main Street, New Castle, Virginia.

The purpose of the public hearing will be to receive public comment on the proposed reduction of the cigarette tax effective January 1, 2022 of forty cents (\$0.40) per pack of cigarettes to thirty cents (\$0.30) per pack on cigarettes sold in the county. Any person interested in the proposed tax reduction may appear at the hearing and present their views.

A copy of the full text of the Ordinance is on file in the office of the County Administrator of Craig County, 108 Court Street, New Castle, VA 24127, and is available for review during normal business hours. If you should need auxiliary aids, please contact the office of the County Administrator at least five days in advance of the public hearing.

Virginia Planning District Commissions awarded millions for broadband expansion \$640 million of the total of \$943

Twelve Planning District Commissions and Regional Councils (PDCs/RCs) in Virginia have been awarded \$570 million through the Virginia Telecommunication Initiative (VATI) for broadband expansion projects in Virginia. These awards, which comprise just under 80 percent of the \$722 million in total funding that was announced, will help fund 14 regional projects across the state in partnership with internet service providers. The projects also plan to leverage more than \$770 million in additional re-

The grant awards are part of \$722 million in state general funds and federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) dollars that are supporting 35 projects covering 70 Virginia localities to connect more than 278,000 households, businesses and anchor institutions to high-speed internet. The announcement of these awards by Governor Ralph Northam at the Goochland Fire and Rescue Station 6 was made to a gathering of local and state officials, first responders, locality staff and business partners. Virginia U.S. Senators Mark Warner and Tim Kaine, along with Congresswoman Abigail Spanberger, also participated in the event.

"As they do with so many efforts, Planning District Commissions across the state really stepped forward to partner with internet service providers to craft vital projects to expand broadband," said VAP-DC President Kim Callis. "The end result of these efforts will be critical access to high-speed internet by many more Virginians."

Administered by the Department of Housing and Community

Development (DHCD), VATI provides targeted financial assistance to extend broadband service to areas that are unserved by an internet service provider. During the VATI FY22 application round this Fall, PDCs were the lead applicants on 14 out of 57 grants (nearly 25 percent of all applications), asking for million in requests and proposing nearly 230,000 passings.

Planning District Commissions were enabled by state legislation in 1968 and most were established the following year. There are 21 PDCs/ RCs in Virginia made up of elected officials and citizens appointed by local governments. The purpose of Planning District Commissions is to encourage and facilitate regional solutions to problems of area-wide significance. This is done by promoting the efficient development of the physical, social and economic policies of all districts by assisting local governments to plan for the future. The PDCs of Virginia joined together to create the Virginia Association of Planning District Commissions in 1987 to share best practices and further regionalism across the Commonwealth.



"To my knowledge, we have had 13 first-aid calls and only had two of them that a fire department member has not been there to help out the rescue squad," he said. "Again, that is just another feather in our hat to show the caliber of members we have right now that want to help in every way possible."

Matheney continued, not about stepping back to say look what we have done but being there when somebody needs us, putting our hands in place in somebody's time of need. I know every one of y'all in this room feels the same way. I am blessed to be in the company of so many caring people."

In the 20 calls answered, seven were car wrecks, one car fire, six brush fires, four structures and three additional, an injured biker and two downed power lines.

Matheney noted proudly, "Out of our 20 members on the roster in just a year time, and one support staff, we averaged 11 people on every call. That is saying a lot, including new coverage

Matheney chose not to give gag gifts, which he is "known" for, however, his crew chose differently. He was presented with a Tshirt that read, "I never dreamed I'd be a sexy SOCCER DAD but here I am killin' it!" Laughter and hand claps were deafening.

'For those who don't know, I have never liked soccer, and now, lo and behold, I have three soccer players in my household," he said with a slight grin. "But I will be at every game, no matter how much I despise soccer."

"It was a very close race. We had every member on the roster that answered at least two of the 20 calls. There was more than half that answered over 50 percent of the calls and 10 members that answered almost 90 percent of the calls," Matheney said.

The second award was for "Fireman of the Year" which was voted on by the squad membership. Initially, it was a three-way tie, but final decision concluded the award went to Allen "Toad" Nicholson, who answered 16 out of 20 calls.

"Get a job!" someone hollered in jest as others joined in friendship laughter.

Jake Waller spoke on behalf of the Board of Directors. "I'd like to thank everyone for being here today and like Shawn said, 'I am just totally amazed how everybody has come together and pulled our department back together from

what happened to it."

As the evening came to an end, member Jonathan Slusher spoke for his squad, "Thank you, Chief, for everything you have done. Being a leader can be just as simple as pointing a finger around, but you get in there and lead the way you want your entire team to go, and I appreciate that and the department appreciates that. From the bottom of our hearts, we appreciate you."

"We have had some amazing times and I wouldn't want to spend it with anyone else, even with the long-hours," Matheney said. "I've preached over and over, that this is our family. our fire house family. We can call on them whenever we need, and I am proud of you."

Winter Gardening

Even though we are now freed from the mowthe-lawn and pull-theweeds scramble, winter brings some fun things to do outside.

The activity that springs first to mind is pruning.

Yes, winter is a fabulous time to do with (most of) the leaves off. I see so many people doing it in a fashion I think is wrong, I don't want to wade into that swamp. If you want to learn it, beg a hands-on lesson from a knowledgeable gardener whose yard you like. The online video https:// www.youtube.com/ watch?v=rl7pHemVye8 is pretty good. In a quick

seminars, I saw mountains of bad pruning on

So, onto mulching. Mulching in the late fall/ winter has a lot of benefits. You mulch for three main reasons: 1. Reduce weeds 2. Keep water in the soil 3. Keep the soil in place. Then there are the esthetic reasons for improving the looks of your yard with a nice, uniform-colored mulch. If you have kept up with the yard work enough this year to be worrying about looks at this point, give yourself a big mug of hot chocolate.

Winter mulches do help keep next spring's weeds down. Annual weeds have been throwing seeds around in your yard all year. If you put a good layer of mulch over those seeds, they will have a much harder time germinating. For perennial weeds, mulch will at least slow them down, but not necessarily smother them. Well mulched weeds are easier to pull in the spring though, I think (never read a study on this though).

Keeping soil moisture

in: Yes, plants in the winter need water, albeit a lot less when they are having to support foliage. Newly planted trees and shrubs should be mulched to reduce your winter watering chores if it gets dry. The place where you purchased trees and shrubs should have told you to keep them watered for 12 months after planting; which runs you into winter. Newly installed spring bulbs love a mulch too - again keeps the water in the soil and reduces weed competition. And there are some perennials which do well planted (and mulched) in the fall.

If you have never considered what bare soil will do all winter, think again. Remember learning about the dust bowl in school of the 1930's? Well, bare, un-mulched soil will leave town in a high wind, but also leaves courtesy of runoff - when we get the heavy downpours like we have in the last couple of years. Mulch softens the impact of raindrops on the ground and adds, in effect, rainwater storage which will slowly seep into the ground. Not only

do you get more water, its less pounding and compacting of the soil.

Winter mulch material should be something that is not going to blow around. Leaves make fabulous mulch, but they might need to be chopped up with the lawnmower to help them stay put. In theory, mulches will tax the nitrogen content of the soil underneath as the soil microbes that decompose that mulch will require some nitrogen. Fall/ winter mulches are good in that nitrogen usage of plants during fall/winter is about zero. One of my favorite good-looking mulches is pine needles. These guys don't form a surface 'crust' as easily as tree bark mulch does, and you could argue the lighter color blends into your

landscape better. Two other lighter-colored mulches are straw and old hay. Straw can be a little wiggly until it gets good and wet. Old hay varies in color quite a bit depending on how decomposed it is. If you put down a moderately thick layer (four inches), this should be enough to discourage most of the weed seeds which you will always find in hay. Six inches is even better. One final benefit of

mulches is that they keep soil temperatures and moisture content from fluctuating as much as it does in bare ground. The common advice for planting marginally winter hardy trees, shrubs and perennials for your growing area, is to mulch well in the fall. Sometimes a good winter mulch will allow you to grow a plant about ½ of a zone colder than where it is traditionally hardy.

Two mulches I do not recommend are landscape fabric and rock mulches. Landscape fabric is tough on your soil, keeping all organic matter out of your soil, and tends to repel rainfall. Organic matter helps the soil retain moisture, helps retain nutrients, and makes it easier for roots to travel through the soil. Rock mulches, to be successful, either require a layer of landscape fabric under them, or need to be put down very thickly (like four inches or more). That's a lot of rock.

Rocket girls pick up first win against Bath County

The Craig County girls cracked the win column last week when the Rockets took a 47-33 victory at Bath County. It was the first win for Brock Jones as Rockets' varsity head coach.

The Rockets got off to a slow start. Craig trailed 16-13 at the half before lighting up the scoreboard for 31 points after intermission.

"I believe some of that had to do with just practices for two weeks and not seeing other opponents in that time frame," said Jones. "We didn't adjust well at the start of the game. We were sluggish."

Jones had a heart-toheart with the girls at intermission, and that seemed to help. Craig came out smoking in the third period, winning that quarter 23-7.

"I had one of those 'Bobby Knight' meetings at half time, and the girls responded tremendously," he said. "The third quarter was the best scoring we're had all year. Our diamond press looked great and we played hard nosed defensive pressure for eight minutes, and it showed."

Statistically, Hannah Caldwell had nine points, 16 rebounds, and six steals. Sara Jones made her season debut with seven points, 14 rebounds, and 10 blocks. Lexxy Brookman had 10 points and 13 rebounds while Annabelle Gregory had eight points, six rebounds and half a dozen steals.

"We started to push the ball and drive and kick the ball against them," said Jones. "We're getting fundamentally better every day in practice."

On Friday the Rockets were back home to host Eastern Montgomery and things didn't go as well. The Rockets dropped a 57-34 decision in New

"We watched film on East Mont and I thought we were well prepared for them," said Jones. "We worked on the press break a lot during practice and we were not strong protecting the ball. We were out hustled and ball control was extremely weak against them."

The Mustangs muscled the Craig girls on the pe-
