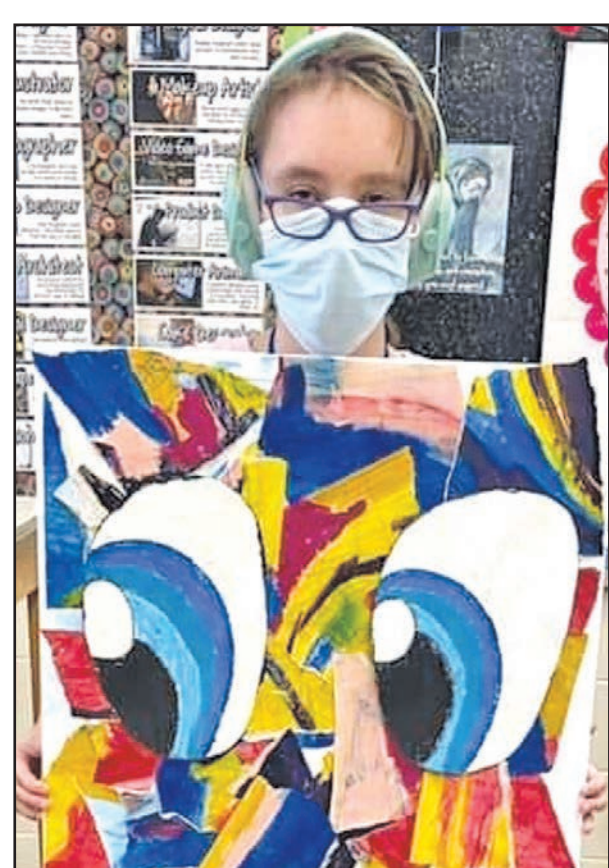
"My son is a huge basketball fan and Rockets fan!" Frazier said with a big smile. "He would get pretty upset when we would lose! We love our Rockets!"

She was an avid tennis player and co-captained two USTA tennis teams. Brenda managed a tennis flight at the

local athletic club where she was a member for over 30 years. Brenda was a member of the Henry Clay Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), and Martha Washington Chapter, of the Order of the Eastern Stars.

In addition to her husband and daughter, she leaves behind her Mother and an extended family. She is preceded by her Father, Robert Wesley Simmons.

Her parents managed the Paint Bank General Store, and her father was the Postmaster. Carolyn attended grade school in a two-room school house in Paint Bank, graduated from New Castle High School, and attended Radford College where her studies focused on accounting. Carolyn had a long career working as an accountant for private clients and businesses.

Carolyn married Robert Wesley Simmons on August 20, 1945, at Humphrey Chapel United Methodist Church, enjoying a loving 59 year marriage. While Robert was serving in the Army, Carolyn worked at the C&P Telephone Co. They celebrated the birth of their only child, Brenda, on July 23, 1947.

Once the family moved to Baltimore, Carolyn began her civic work for the city of Baltimore, and the State of Maryland, while her husband worked for General Motors. She was the President of the Women’s Civic League for consecutive terms, and a member for over 60 years. She worked closely with Mayor Kurt Schmoke, consecutive Baltimore Mayors, and Governors, starting with her close friend Governor William Donald Schaefer. Carolyn was the Chairman of the Breakfast of Flowers event held at the Sculpture Court at Walter’s Art Museum, and Agora at the Marburg Mansion. She enjoyed hosting “A Day at the Races” at Pimlico Racetrack, handing out the winning trophy on behalf of the Women’s Civic League. A tree has been planted in Carolyn’s honor at the Women’s Civic League Headquarters, on 9 Front Street, in Baltimore, Maryland. As a cherished Civic Leader, Carolyn focused her life on celebrating community, her love of Maryland and Baltimore, and all of its people.

Carolyn was the Chairman of the popular Flower Mart event at Mt Vernon Place in Baltimore. She created the famous “Lemon Bake Off,” with the wives of Baltimore Orioles players as judges. Carolyn, in collaboration with Governor William Donald Schaefer, assisted in the production of Flowermart Recipes and Reflections cookbook with proceeds benefiting Flower Mart. Carolyn was honored with the Volunteer of the Year Award, for her outstanding work and devotion to the Flower Mart.

As a travel agent, Carolyn took many cruises to the Caribbean on the QEII, her favorite ship. She especially enjoyed day trips to the beautiful islands and the friendly hospitality of the people.

Carolyn is preceded by her husband Robert Wesley Simmons, and her daughter Brenda S. Wilson. She leaves behind her granddaughter Julie Michelle Wilson, son-in-law Walter E. Wilson, siblings Christine Rose Looney, and Chalmus (Bobby) Rose. As head of the Rose Family, she leaves behind many nieces, nephews, and cousins.

August 2016 is a month that I will never forget. During those 31 days, many notable things occurred in my life, most notably getting hired at age 27 by Michael Showell, owner of Mountain Media, to replace Kelsey Bartlett as the editor of the New Castle Record newspaper. Kelsey could not have been more supportive and accommodating during the transition period. I asked her countless questions, and she was always gracious with her time, knowledge and resources.

Prior to starting my first day, one of my best friends, who also happens to be a writer, gave me some sage advice: “Shawn, be accessible to the Craig County community, take accountability when you make a mistake, have fun on the job and most importantly, never take anything personal.” While it would be a lie to say that there were no stressful moments or I was never pushed to the edge, at the end of the day, the low moments pale in comparison to all the awesome memories that I was able to experience.

Last week, this chapter in my life came to an end. Being the first African American in the company’s history to hold this

position is something that I never took for granted. Never was this truer than when students of color would reach out to me and say my presence in this position encouraged them to pursue a writing career.

I’d say I conservatively interviewed more than 1,000 people since 2016 for the New Castle Record. Narrowing the list down was extremely difficult, but I’d say my two favorite Craig County stories were the Annual Fall Festival and that time when Governor Ralph Northam came to town to speak directly to the community.

In this line of work, relationships are everything. As anyone who has co-workers can attest, nobody accomplishes things solely by themselves. While Pam Dudding’s name appeared on the front page pretty much every week, without the hard work of so many other New Castle Record employees, this paper would cease to exist.

My successor is Alexander Shedd, a 2020 George Mason University graduate. No stranger to journalism, Alex previously edited the student newspaper at GMU, and growing up, Alex’s mother ran a proof-reading service.

The first time I met Alex was in March at Sweet Donkey Coffee in Roa-

noke. When I asked him why he applied for this job, his response spoke volumes. I left our meeting extremely impressed with his candor, perspective, background experience and professionalism. It will take him some time to get acclimated to the Craig County community, but I have no doubt that sooner rather than later, Alex will exceed even his own expectations.

While I no longer serve in the capacity of newspaper editor, I will still be submitting articles regularly. My new writing occupation will require me to sometimes work in North Carolina, but I’ll also be working remotely out of my Roanoke apartment.

The New Castle Record provided me with something that no other job did previously: the ability to say that my passion is my full-time profession. Through this job, I’ve cultivated many relationships that I hope will last for a lifetime.

Words can’t express how appreciative I am of all the phone calls, text messages and well-wishes I’ve received over the last month. To the community of Craig County, serving as your editor has been some of the best years of my career. From the bottom of my heart, thank you!

Commander Craig Sherwin Givens, United States Navy Retired of Newport News, Va., formerly of Perrysburg, Ohio, 57, went to the Lord on April 1, 2022 after a courageous battle with ALS. Craig was born January 3, 1965 in DeKalb, DeKalb County, Ill. to Clyde Straley Jr and Nathalie Givens (née Strong). In 1969 the family moved to Somers, Westchester County, N.Y. where he attended Preschool and then Primrose Elementary School. The family moved in June 1973 to Perrysburg, Wood County, Ohio. He attended Elm Street Elementary School (now Toth Elementary School), Perrysburg Middle School, Perrysburg Junior High School and Perrysburg High School. He played in Big Red Football and Junior High Football. In high school he lettered in wrestling, football and track. On the track team he was a pole vaulter.



Craig was a member of the National Honor Society and graduated in 1983. He received a Navy R.O.T.C. full scholarship to Ohio State University. He was a member of Alpha Gamma Rho (AGR) fraternity and graduated in 1988 with a bachelor's degree in finance. He received additional schooling at Naval Post Graduate School from 1993 to 1995 in Monterey, Calif., receiving a bachelor's and master's degree in electrical engineering. In 1996 he attended Department Head School in Newport, R.I.

After graduation from Ohio State University, he was commissioned an Ensign in the U.S. Navy and served 20 years, retiring in 2008. His duty stations included San Diego, Calif.; Philadelphia, Pa.; Newport, R.I.; Monterey, Calif.; Yokosuka, Japan; Earl, N.J.; Norfolk, Va. and when he retired as a commander in 2008, he was an instructor at Dam Neck, Va. He served during the 1st Gulf War, Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom. He served a tour as executive officer on the U.S.S. Seattle (AOE 3), a supply ship that went out with the U.S.S. John F Kennedy battle group during Op-

eration Enduring Freedom. During Operation Iraqi Freedom he was the chief of staff to the commander, Destroyer Squadron 22 that went out with the U.S.S. Harry Truman battle group.

Since retiring he has worked as electrician and carpenter's helper for a home remodeler until he became ill with ALS. Craig was a past state officer for Ohio Society Children of the American Revolution, aging out at age 22. He was a member at large of the Ohio Society Sons of the American Revolution. He was also a member of Fallen Timbers Chapter of DeMolay.

Warner and Kaine announce \$232 million in federal infrastructure funding for Virginia transit

- Funding represents a nearly 30 percent increase in formula transit funds -

U.S. Sens. Mark R. Warner and Tim Kaine (both D-VA) announced the designation of \$232,426,060 in federal funds for Virginia transit systems. This largest-ever investment in Virginia transit was authorized by the Infrastructure Investments and Jobs Act negotiated by Sen. Warner and supported by Sen. Kaine. The funding will be awarded through the U.S. Department of Transportation's Federal Transit Administration formula programs and distributed to transit systems throughout the Commonwealth.

"Thanks to the bipartisan infrastructure law, Virginia continues to receive funding for much-needed transportation upgrades," the senators said. "This investment in the Commonwealth's public transit will make lives easier for every Virginian who relies on public transportation while creating

good-paying jobs for workers."

Because of this record investment in transit, Virginia is set to receive a 28.7 percent increase in funds over last year's total apportionment.

In specific allocations to southwest Virginia, the Roanoke area is expected to receive \$4,215,499; the Blacksburg area is expected to receive \$3,920,090; and the Lynchburg area is expected to receive \$3,668,754.

In addition to the \$232 million guaranteed for Virginia, the Commonwealth is expected to receive a portion of the \$280,270,139 in funding designated to the D.C. Metro Area, which includes Northern Virginia, D.C., and Maryland. This funding will be divided across transit agencies and localities within the area.

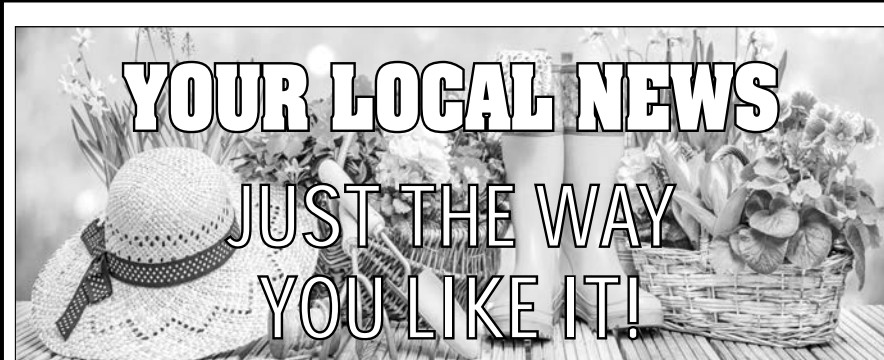

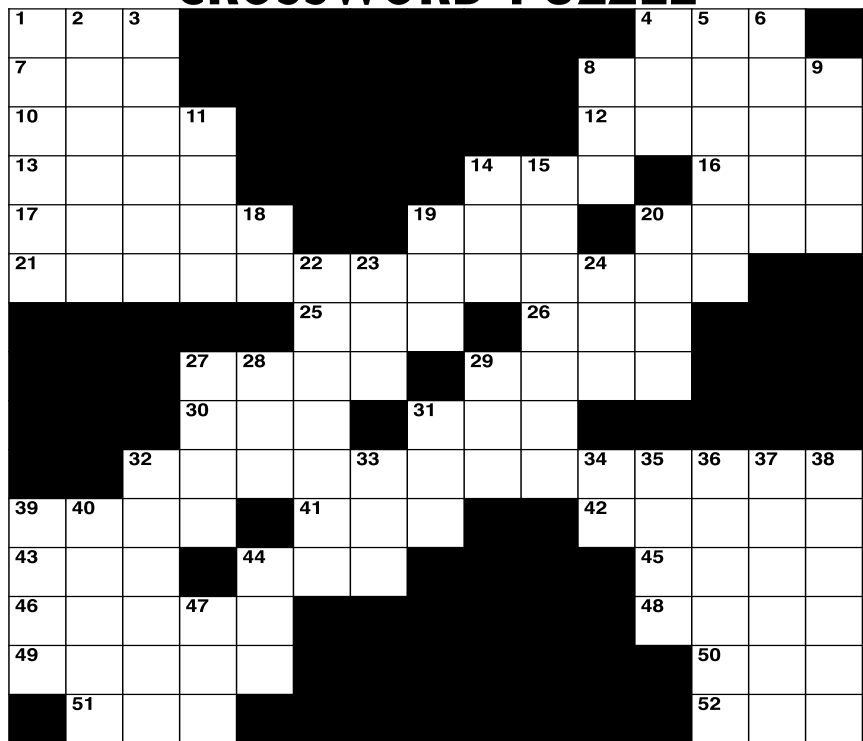

FUNDRAISER IS FOR ROCKET FOOTBALL TEAM

The Craig County football team is in the midst of a fundraiser for equipment and supplies for the fall season. Craig had to beg for equipment from surrounding area schools last year just to put a team on the field.

"It is not cheap to run a football program at any level and we need your support," said Craig

County coach Jimmy Fisher. "When I took this job last year we were in a tight spot with equipment and finances. We borrowed equipment from five other high school programs to be able to have a season. We are still in that tight spot.

"We still owe about \$3,000 from last season and have to spend over \$32,000 this season. That is \$35,000 we need to raise just to have football. That does not include items we need to help us get better, like headsets, tackling rings, chute boards, weight equipment, etcetera."

Craig currently has over 70 kids signed up to play football next fall but only 17 helmets, which

cost around \$350 each. Fisher has to order 45-50 helmets at a total cost of over \$16,000.

"As you can see, we really do need your help," he said. "No amount is

too small."
