Tolbert apprehended in Dublin arrest ends weeks-long manhunt

DUBLIN - Shawn Michael Tolbert was apprehended by law enforcement authorities Aug. 30, a Dublin Police Department release said. News of Tolbert's arrest in Dublin brings a weekslong manhunt to a close.

Tolbert, 42, of Burkeville, was wanted by authorities in both Craig and Montgomery counties.

According to previous New Castle Record coverage, the ordeal was sparked Aug. 11 when he came to the attention of law enforcement due to the fact that his vehicle matched the description of a vehicle that was believed to have been used in a robbery near Buchanan. Although he was not involved in the robbery, Tolbert fled when an officer attempted to engage him. A chase ensued along Interstate 81, which ended with a crash in Craig County.

On Aug. 30, a town of Dub-

lin resident contacted the Dublin Police Department and notified authorities that based on photos from local media outlets, he had observed someone who appeared to match Tolbert's description.

A Dublin police officer in an unmarked vehicle verified Tolbert's location, which triggered the deployment of a Virginia State Police tactical team to a bus that was in a backyard. "They safely took the subject into custody," the release stated.

Tolbert's capture was facilitated by the Dublin Police Department, U.S. Marshals Service, Pulaski County Sheriff's Office, Virginia State Police and the Virginia Conservation Police.

Part of the search to appreend Tolbert included saturation patrols, foot patrols, K-9 units and drone searches, according to the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office.

A Virginia State Police spokesperson said last week that Tolbert had been hospitalized.

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Roanoke College releases latest poll

The Institute for Policy and Opinion Research at Roanoke College released the results of its most recent poll late last month.

As part of the poll, 640 adult Virginians were interviewed between Aug. 7 and 16 on a range of topics, including the war in Ukraine, abortion, Gov. Glenn Young's national spotlight and general feelings about current and former elected officials. The survey had a 4.5% margin of er-

Approvals, favorable/unfavorable, direction of Virginia,

According to the poll, Young-

kin's approval rating has increased to 55%. In May, it had been 53%. His disapproval remained at 35%.

President Joe Biden's approval rating also increased, going up to 39%. It had been 37% in June. The poll indicated that 25%

of respondents said that the country is headed in the right direction, up from 21% in May. Those who feel that the country has gotten off on the wrong track were at 72%. As for Virginia, 51% of respondents said that it is headed in the right direction, with 45% saying that it is headed in the wrong direction.

Abortion, Supreme Court

The poll indicated that 40% of respondents in Virginia believe that abortion should be legal under all circumstances, up from 35% in May. Those who feel that abortion should be legal under some circumstances was at 48%, down from 53% in May. Those in favor of a total ban on abortion was at 10%, down slightly from 11% in May. Youngkin, the national spot-

For the first time, the poll from Roanoke College asked Virginian about their opinions on Youngkin and the national spotlight given the speculation that he may run for president in 2024. The poll found that 36% of Virginians think Youngkin should run, while 54% do not.

In an early matchup for the Republican primary for president, the poll found that among Republicans 28% would vote for Youngkin, 62% for former President Donald J. Trump and 9% for someone else.

Russia, Ukraine

As the war in Ukraine continues, 73% of respondents said that they continue to follow the news either very or somewhat closely. The number is down

slightly from May. According to the poll, Democrats, 80%, followed the war more closely than Republicans, 70%. The number of those who believe the worst of the war is yet to come was 64%, down slightly from 66% in May.

The poll indicated that 45% of respondents believe that the United States should offer more support to Ukraine, but not at the risk of going to war with Russia. The number of respondents who feel that the United States is already doing enough to support Ukraine was at 36%.

The Blue Locusts' now available



LewisGale launches stroke prevention program

LewisGale Medical Center announced late last month that it successfully performed a permanent heart implant in a patient with non-valvular atrial fibrillation to reduce the risk of stroke.

Dr. B. Johns Hynes, a board-certified electrophysiologist with LewisGale Physicians—Electrophysiology, recently performed the first procedure at the center.

"Patients describe atrial fibrillation, often referred to as AFib, as a quivering or irregular heartbeat, called arrhythmia,3 Hynes said.

The procedure used technology known as WATCHMAN FLX to close off an area of the heart called the left atrial appendage to prevent harmful blood clots from forming in the appendage that could enter the bloodstream and potentially cause a stroke. By closing off the left atrial appendage, a release from the center said, the risk of stroke may be reduced, and, over time, patients may be able to stop taking blood thinners.

"Arrhythmias can lead to blood clots,

stroke, heart failure, and other heartrelated complications," Hynes said. "The majority of stroke-causing clots that come from the heart are formed in the left atrial appendage. That's why closing off this part of the heart is an effective way to reduce stroke risk."

The procedure is done under general anesthesia and takes about an hour, according to Hynes. Patients commonly stay in the hospital overnight and leave the next day. The implant is about the size of a quarter and made from very light, compact materials commonly used in other medical supplies, the release noted.

'Building upon a well-established cardiac program, this treatment serves as a safe and effective stroke risk reduction alternative for patients," Alan Fabian, LewisGale Regional Health System market president, said. "We are excited to offer patients a potentially life-changing stroke risk treatment."



News from the 9th: Presidents are not kings

Americans have long been skeptical of monarchs. We still celebrate July 4 each year, marking the adoption of the Declaration of Independence which catalogued our grievances against Britain's King George III. We celebrate George Washington precisely because he chose to be a president who retired after two terms rather than a king. Presidents throughout our history who were seen as overstepping the bounds of office have been compared to kings, and not in a positive way.

This national trait of ours is a healthy one. As Ronald Reagan said of freedom, "It is not ours by way of inheritance; it must be fought for and defended constantly by each generation."

Our republican form of government requires the engagement of its citizens. Further, it separates powers between the legislative, executive, and judicial branches and expects each to guard those powers from the

Nevertheless, the presidency has clearly accumulated great power of which the kings and queens of old could scarcely

In a spirit not of partisanship but of concern for our form of government, I offer some examples where recent presidencies surpassed their authority. Even if you or I agree with the goal, we should beware executive overreach.

Let's start with the Biden Administration. Under President Biden, the Department of Homeland Security has ruled that large swathes of the illegal immigrant population should not be eligible for removal from our country. Of course, we have seen the immediate consequences of this legally unsupportable position: much more illegal immigration. But it also damages the rule

of law in the long term. Congress writes immigration laws. Several presidents have sought bills to grant amnesty to illegal immigrants, but they have not passed Congress. President Biden's decision amounts to amnesty, but it is a decision he is not free to make.

His recent order canceling student loan debt at the cost of hundreds of billions of dollars

will likely be challenged in the courts. Its foundation in emergency authority is constitutionally dubious. During President Trump's

Administration, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) unilaterally issued a nationwide moratorium on evictions in September 2020. Congress had previously passed a set of protections from eviction during the coronavirus pandemic in the CARES Act. The eviction limits expired, so the CDC cited a vague law allowing its director to take "measures to prevent such spread of the diseases as he/she deems reasonably necessary" to issue its own moratorium.

The CDC continued to extend the moratorium under President Biden until the Supreme Court eventually blocked its enforcement.

President Obama's time in office was characterized by aggressive efforts to push the envelope of his legal authority. He entered the Paris climate agreement without seeking Senate approval as a treaty. His Administration issued guidance documents that sought to evade the steps for rulemaking required by law. Just this year, the Supreme Court found in West Virginia v. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) that the Obama EPA tried to usurp authority that did not belong to it in the regulation of greenhouse

President George W. Bush's time in office was consumed by the response to the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, but national security does not justify acting outside the law. The Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA) set rules for reviewing requests by intelligence agencies to keep track of suspects. I believe the Bush Administration went beyond the rules to allow the National Security Agency to eavesdrop on suspects, including Americans, without a warrant.

Preventing presidents from overreaching their authority can be difficult. One may sympathize with the president's goals or not want to side with the president's opponents. Nevertheless, keeping our republic requires vigilance against presidents of any party acting outside their legal and constitutional limits.

As a Member of Congress, I have sought to keep presidents within the law. Under Presidents Obama, Trump, and Biden, I have called for the review and repeal of the authorization of use of military force in Iraq to prevent it from being used for unrelated purposes. I have been an outspoken critic of the FISA court process.

Further, I have spoken out against regulations that do not follow the proper rulemaking process, and have supported legislation to keep the president, whoever he or she is, within the limits of their office.

A president is not a king, no matter how well-meaning he is. All citizens should seek to keep

shared the call out for communities to work together

to address what we can do to help the overwhelming number of victims addicted to opioid and similar drugs, fueled by the over prescribed pain killer Oxycodone.

Sobering statistics were shared by Macy about this epidemic that has touched virtually every one of us. Over 8 million people have Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) and one third of families are affected by the tragic consequences. According to the Yale Medicine website, "OUD is a chronic brain disease in which people continue to use opioids in spite of harms caused by their use." OUD often leads to the use of more dangerous and addictive drugs. In today's world, street drugs are plentiful and cheap with frequent dangerous adulteration with deadly ingredients. Besides addiction and

changes in brain chemistry,

opioids cause severe respiratory depression. When a user is alone, they can stop breathing and die within minutes. Lifesaving Narcan is an opioid reversal drug that is given intra-nasally to chemically reverse certain opioids. In keeping with Macy's proactive approach, quick training of Narcan use by the Virginia Health Department was offered to every person who walked in the door to her program. Our local social services offer this training in New Castle. One participant's shirt read "Acta non Verba" translated to mean "Act, don't Talk." Families and friends of the addicted can do much to help. Recovered addicts are especially effective at becoming part of the solution.

It was stressed that education about the disease of addiction is key to finding solutions. Individuals can make a difference in many ways. A story was told about a front desk staff member who showed extra kindness to a homeless person who sought medical help and how that small effort enabled the person to stick with the program and receive continued medical care. Thinking of OUD

cancer can help to reduce the stigma associated with it and help us to understand that lifetime care is needed as with other conditions.

Education of police and medical personnel is essential to treating victims with dignity and reducing the stigma associated with addiction. OUD can have a ripple effect on a person's life by exposing them to infectious diseases like AIDS and Hepatitis C as well as homelessness and prostitution. Webster defines stigma as "a mark of disgrace associated with a particular circumstance, quality, or person." Addiction or any of these collateral harms can cause stigmatization which further discourages the victim from receiving help. Macy suggests treating addicts as people, not as

"Raising Lazarus" contains the stories of individuals and grassroots organizations that are making positive steps in treating the disease of addiction. Clean needle exchanges are essential for preventing the spread of deadly infectious diseases. Macy shares that statistics prove

that those who use clean needle exchanges are more likely to get help than those who don't. Transportation networks are being implemented so that addicts can get to doctor appointments and counseling sessions until they get back on their feet. Medicaid expansion has helped to expand healthcare for the homeless. Telehealth has made it possible for those in rural areas to get help. Affordable housing and job opportunity are critical for people to recover from the cycle of addiction and relapse.

"Raising Lazarus" offers actions that every one of us can take to make a difference to people who are suffering in our own communities. In doing so, we have the knowledge that one person can truly make a difference.

INTERSTATE 81

INTERSTATE WIDENING CONSTRUCTION PROJECT EXIT 137 TO **EXIT** 141 – A \$179 million design-build project to widen both directions of I-81 between mile markers 136.6 and 141.8 from two to three lanes is set to begin. Starting in February and continuing into the early summer, work will be performed on the inside and outside shoulders along a five-mile section of both northbound and southbound Interstate 81 in Roanoke County and the city of Salem. The shoulders will be built up before barrier wall can be installed for road crews to work behind. Barrier wall will be installed along the shoulders in the spring and summer. Two lanes of I-81 traffic in each direction will remain open during the project with periodic lane closures scheduled during nighttime hours or outside of peak travel times as needed. Drivers can expect the following lane closures and upcoming impacts on northbound and southbound I-81: Nighttime lane

closures may be in place

and lane widths will be reduced to 11 feet.

From mid-March until mid-June, nighttime right lane and shoulder closures between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m., Sunday through Thursday

From mid-May to mid-June, alternating left and right lane and shoulder closures during nighttime hours between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m., Sunday through Thurs-

Nightly lane closures may be in place along the right lane with possible nightly ramp narrows as needed for guardrail and shoulder strengthening.


Northbound I-81 lane closures from mile marker 138 to 142

Northbound I-81 exit

and entrance ramp narrows possible at Route 311.

The project also includes replacing six bridges, widening two bridges, installing approximately 2.6 miles of sound barrier walls along northbound I-81, improving the southbound exit 137 off-ramp intersection at Wildwood Road and adding interchange lighting at exits 137, 140 and 141 are also included in the project. Expected completion in early 2026.



two kills, and two blocks. Annabelle Gregory aces and three kills while Randalyn Taylor played great at the net as the middle blocker with four blocks.


Freshman Daileigh Donithan played great defense with eight digs. Erin Snider was aggressive offensively with five aces and she also picked up 12 digs.
