"Our regular days and hours will begin on Sunday 4/23 from 10a-2p, Mondays 7:30-4pm, Fridays 7:30-4pm, Saturdays 8-4pm and closed Tuesday-Wednesday," Perkey shared.

She is planning on having a lot of her homemade baked goods, such as, cupcakes, Danishes,

scones, muffins, galettes, cookies and numerous other items, and she has now partnered with Red Rooster Roasters from Floyd.

"We will be brewing a variety of their delicious coffees!" Perkey shared. "Our coffee menu consists of regular drip coffee, espresso-based drinks such as, Americanos, Breves, Lattes and Mochas, as well as Matcha and Chai tea lattes."

Beaudoin shared, "Our Kindling School fundraising team aims to choose fundraisers that both enrich the

The Kindling School began as a cluster of homeschooling families that agreed to school simultaneously, encouraging one another with shared homeschooling ideas.

"It quickly grew to include over 20 local families and 65+ students," Beaudoin said. "We utilize a hybrid format, schooling two days together and three days from home. At The Kindling School, we recognize that children learn in so many ways! We believe that the schooling options available to children should be as diverse as the kids themselves. We're happy to offer one more choice for Craig County learners."

Their school serves children aged 1 through 12th grade.

Beaudoin added that while they aim to accommodate all families who have reached out to them, they are growing

quite quickly. "For our 2023-2024 school year, all of our elementary and middle school classes are operating off of a waitlist," she said. "We do have openings in our high school classes, grades 9th through 12th." The Kindling School operates from the beginning of September until the end of May. "The Kindling School ascribes to a Christian worldview and hopes to kindle in our students both a love for Jesus and a love for exploring the World that the Lord ordered," Beaudoin explained. "Our shared curriculum covers Language, Math, Science, History, and Biblical History. Our students are also able to participate in many

chosen electives including sign language, ballet, forest survival, embroidery, Lego engineering, and baking!" "Our Kindling School advisory board aims to keep tuition costs affordable for any family who reaches out to us," she added. "If our families ever meet financial challenges or are unable to pay the full tuition amount, fundraisers such as our Kid-Made Market give us the financial capacity to ease the burden for families who may need an extra leg-up. No family will be turned away based on an inability to pay." All proceeds from the booth fees and from the sale of food will help to nurture the growth of the school.

found a license plate that said 'SHOOTER.' I recognized it as having been owned by the venerable Larry Hypes. Larry was a shooting legend. People would take their deer rifles to Larry so he could align their scopes. Coach Jayke Dowdy is giving the tag to Larry's grandson, Waylon Hypes, a student at CCHS. Larry passed away in 2014." The Rocket football and girls basketball teams would like to thank the Craig County Sheriff's Office, VDOT and Craig County Solid Waste Department. "The sheriff's office helped to coordinate things with the other entities and had deputies patrolling the area to help keep us safe," Fisher

said. "VDOT provided the trash bags, loaned us safety vests, and loaned us some road signs. Artley Bowman and the Transfer Station got us safety vests, gloves, and trash grabbers." The teams and coaches shared that they definitely want to keep their part of Rt. 615 clean. "We are proud of our county and our school. We do not want opponents and visitors seeing trash when they come to our school," Fisher explained. "I want to tackle the "beast" next. The beast is the Sand Plant Road as so much trash is on the sides of the road. Several of our opponents approach the school from that direction. I want to see it clean. I think the kids are onboard." shared Nolen. “We will have live music and various demos throughout the day with animals, drones, ATV safety, fire safety, and an area where you can play games too.”

Over 40 vendors and crafters have already signed up to be there.

“We will also have a Touch-A-Truck/Equipment area with lots of tractors, trucks, lawn mowers, and excavating equipment,” Nolen explained. “We will have live animals for you to see and learn about, demos, live music all day, games to play as well as cake walks where you can win some wonderfully homemade desserts and to wrap it all up, at 2:30pm we’ll hold a live auction of baked goods.”

All of their proceeds from the games and auction will go to support the FFA and Land Lab.

“Also, the Rocket softball team will be selling hotdogs as a fundraiser for their group so come hungry!” Nolen added. “Please share this with your friends and family!”

Nolen has had her students active with their new Land Lab. They have worked with Appalachian Vet to learn about best management practices regarding beef cattle, as they got hands-on experience using their recently purchased steers.

Currently, they are working towards phase poultry section of their Land Lab project, using a \$10,000 grant from Farm Credit that they recently received to expand their facilities. This includes the fence which will be made by Fence and Field, a 20-foot by 20-foot shale lot to put a barn on.

Their hopes are that they will be selling eggs in their current greenhouse or purchasing an additional future greenhouse as well.

Nolen explained that several middle school and high school FFA students attended a leadership conference at Virginia Tech to further develop skills that help them be successful student leaders.

They also attended a public speaking workshop at the Olde Dominion Agricultural Complex where they heard from Rhett Laubach.

They had a successful Pork Sausage Fundraiser, selling approximately 1,200 pounds of sausage this year and they extended their “thanks” to everyone for supporting the FFA through this fundraiser!

Before the yearend, they hosted a Christmas craft day at the school and invited elementary students.

“We had crafts, games, snacks, story time, and more which the kids really enjoyed!” Nolen added.

She was proud to share that they had a great competition in Front Royal.

“Our junior team consisting of Brooke Beers, Blake Hannah, Holley Givens, and Isaac Foster placed 4th overall and Brooke Beers finished 7th overall as a top individual,” Nolen said. “We had a fantastic day in Abingdon also. Both A teams consisted of Brooke Beers, Isaac Foster, Blake Hannah (Juniors) and Carter Calfee, Makenzie Lucas, Emmie Radford, and Cheyanne Bell (Seniors) placed third overall. Brooke was second place overall in the junior division and Carter was third overall in the senior division.”

Nolen continued, “We had a very busy, two-day competition at Virginia Tech. On the first day, our senior team placed 8th overall in judging. On the second day, the junior team placed 8th in the sheep and goat division, 10th in the cattle division, and 9th overall. We competed in a state meat judging competition and swept it away!”

The junior team consisted of Brooke Beers, Isaac Foster, Holley Givens, and Blake Hannah and the senior team consisted of Carter Calfee, Makenzie Lucas, Emmie Radford and Isaac Lucas.

The junior results, 2nd place individual in judging and questions from Brooke Beers, 2nd place overall team finish in judging and questions, 4th place overall team for the entire competition, 5th place overall individual for the entire competition was Brooke Beers, 7th place individual in judging and questions from Blake Hannah, 8th place overall team finish in quiz and

ID Senior results, 1st place individual in judging and questions from Emmie Radford, 1st place overall team finish in judging and questions, 5th place overall team finish in quiz and ID, 6th place overall in the entire competition.

Back at the school, they had a petting zoo for the One School One Book event at McCleary Elementary.

“We also visited the elementary school to talk about strawberries and had related crafts for Ag Literacy week. We read a book about strawberries, planted some seeds, made a strawberry craft, and served strawberry punch,” Nolen explained. “Then during FFA week, we talked to the elementary students about FFA and the fun and important things we do. We gave them some agriculture fun facts, FFA color snacks, and more.”

She added that they also served a baked potato lunch to their teachers to show their appreciation for all they do for them.

And now, they are preparing for the 2nd Annual Land Lab Fair.

“We are including an old-fashioned cake walk all throughout the day and an auction at 2:30,” Nolen shared. “With this being said, we are looking for donations of any and all baked goods to help make these events a success.”

Work Zone Awareness Week

To the Editor:

Each spring, the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) and other state DOTs recognize Work Zone Awareness Week to remind drivers of the importance of avoiding distractions and driving safely through work zones. We invite you to join VDOT as we promote our theme this year, “You play a role in work zone safety. Work with us.” for National Work Zone Awareness Week, April 17-21. This week is a reminder that work zone safety is a team effort by everyone working on and using our roadways. It is everyone’s responsibility.

Our employees and contractors put their lives on the line in work zones every day while working to improve travel for motorists in Virginia. This is true in mobile operations like mowing, paving and plowing snow, short-term work zones set up to replace bridges and culverts, as well as in our established work zones for long-term construction projects like widening I-81 from Roanoke to Salem, improving Route 58 at Lover’s Leap in Patrick County, or working on the New River Bridge at exit 105 in Montgomery County. Although signs, cones and safety vests can be effective in warning motorists of a work zone, these tools are no protection against a fast-moving vehicle or an inattentive driver. Last year, work zone crashes resulted in 22 fatalities in the state of Virginia. In fact, most work zone deaths are motorists, not workers, so slowing down and paying close attention in work zones can help all of us.

All motorists — whether a seasoned driver or someone new behind the wheel — should follow these instructions when driving through a work zone:

* Work zones are a sign to slow down.

* If you see the orange work zone warning signs, be alert for changing conditions ahead.

* Eliminate distractions and stay aware of your surroundings at all times.

* Follow Virginia’s phone down and move over laws.

In addition, to show support for National Work Zone Awareness Week, VDOT encourages you to participate in these activities during the week:

* Show us your Orange! Wednesday, April 19 is national “Go Orange Day.” Everyone is encouraged to wear orange in support of work zone safety across the country. Share your pictures with us on Twitter and Facebook! #GoOrangeVa

* Attend the vigil at the VDOT Worker’s Memorial on Afton Mountain on Wednesday, April 19 at 6 p.m.

News from the 9th: A successful first quarter

I want to take a chance to reflect on what I have been working on thus far and what we have accomplished in the House of Representatives.

I started this year securing significant changes to the House rules. The Holman rule was reinstated. It can be used to help control federal spending. I also fought to tighten the House's interpretation of germaneness, hopefully leading to smaller bills. The House also instituted my single purpose rule, which has never existed before

in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Committee Work

Since January, the Energy and Commerce (E&C) Committee, on which I sit, has wasted no time delving into the most pressing issues facing our nation. In these first three months, we've held over 20 hearings, including four Oversight and Investigations Subcommittee hearings which I have chaired.

The Committee has held roundtables, hearings, and I chaired a bipartisan joint field hearing in McAllen, Texas, to examine our country's fentanyl crisis and issues related to unaccompanied minors.

I introduced legislation to permanently schedule fentanyl analogues, which have been scheduled on a temporary basis. The HALT Fentanyl Act passed the full Committee on March 24 and now heads to the House floor for a vote.

The Committee spent considerable time examining the origins of the COVID-19 pandemic. For almost three years, questions on how the pandemic started have been unanswered.

The E&C Committee has brought in the heads of the National Institute of Health, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Protection, as well as a Government Accountability Office official and multiple academic experts.

I want to bring in Dr. Fauci, but the timing has to be worked out through the byzantine labyrinth of competition between various committees.

E&C is also focused on improving this country's energy approach, exploring ways to make energy more affordable, increase production, and removing bureaucratic red tape (see below H.R. 1).

The House Administration Committee, which I joined in January, has held a series of hearings examining both the successes and failures of the 2022 midterm elections.

Recently the Committee held a hearing on Luzerne County, Pennsylvania. The county proved to be wholly unprepared on election day. We heard testimony they ran out of paper ballots as early as 9 a.m. on election day. This is unacceptable and we must do better in the 2024 elections than we have done in the past.

Those directly responsible for elections in Luzerne County have yet to agree to come before the Committee to explain.

I believe it is time for the Committee to issue subpoenas.

Stonewalling by county officials should not be tolerated.

House Administration's Oversight Subcommittee has also launched an investigation into the January 6th Committee, created by House Democrats last Congress. In the initial stages of combing through the January 6th Committee's documents, the Subcommittee has found that some of their work appeared to push a pre-determined narrative despite having evidence to the contrary.

Legislation Passed

Republicans know that after two years of flawed energy policies by the Biden Administration, we must unleash American energy. After many hearings in several committees (see E&C above), House Republicans recently passed H.R. 1, the Lower Energy Costs Act. H.R. 1 has five objectives: reversing anti-energy policies advanced by the Biden Administration; increasing domestic energy production; reforming the

permitting process for all industries; streamlining energy infrastructure and exports; and boosting the mining and processing of critical minerals. Though the President has threatened to veto the legislation, I hope that the Senate will work with us pass a package that will lower energy costs for all Americans.

In a rare act of unity, the House passed S. 619, COVID-19 Origin Act, by a vote of 419-0. Having previously passed the Senate by unanimous consent, the legislation was signed into law by President Biden on March 20th. The COVID-19 Origin Act requires the Director of National Intelligence to declassify information relating to the origin of COVID-19.

House Republicans have also addressed the alarming trend of parents being forcibly shut out of their children's education by certain school districts. House Republicans passed H.R. 5, the Parents Bill of Rights Act, aiming to restore parents' rights by guaranteeing them the right to know what's being taught in schools and to see reading material; the right to be heard; the right to see school budget and spending; the right to protect their child's privacy; and the right to be updated on any violent activity at school.

If I had won the lottery when it was up around a billion dollars Roanoke College would have ordered football uniforms by now.

I had a list of schools and folks to help out if my number hit, and RC was near the top of the list. I was going to tell them to name a figure and I'd meet it if they agreed to start a football team.

I've been hearing the rumors for quite some time. Things like the new president, Frank Shushok, Jr., comes from Virginia Tech and he knows how football can help a school. I was told by a local contractor that RC had reached out about an estimate for what a fieldhouse on the Elizabeth Campus would cost. There's been a lot of smoke, and normally that means there's a fire burning somewhere.

Last week college officials made it official, RC has a burning desire to start a football team. It was reported that if the college can raise 1.2 million dollars to officially get the program started, they could have a jayvee team as soon as 2024 and a varsity team the year after.

I wrote a column back in October about how the time was ripe to add a football team at Roanoke College. Rather than try to cherry pick the selling points I decided to rerun the column in its entirety this week.

With enough money, this is a very "doable" project that would benefit the college, area players looking for a great place to play, and football fans of all ages who would enjoy ODAC football right here in their own back yard. And, I do continue to buy a lottery ticket every week and this week's Mega Millions jackpot would be more than enough to fund the project. It wouldn't buy the Commanders(six billion, can you believe it?), but it would be more than enough to put a team of Maroons in Salem Stadium.

So, without further explanation, here is the column I wrote back in October of 2022.

After a 35 year absence Roanoke College added men's and women's swimming in 2017. Since then the Maroons have added wrestling, men's volleyball and, most recently, cycling. The RC athletic department now boasts 21 different intercollegiate sports.

Isn't it about time for football?

The time has come for RC to add a football team. They have rivalries ready to go within the Old Dominion Athletic Conference. ODAC schools with football teams include Randolph-Macon, Bridgewater, Hampden-Sydney, Shenandoah, Washington & Lee, Ferrum, Averett and Guilford. The only schools in the conference without football are Roanoke, Lynchburg, Eastern Mennonite, Virginia Wesleyan, Randolph College and the two mostly women's schools, Hollins and Mary Baldwin. The Maroons would fit in nicely as the ninth ODAC school with a football program.

I think it would go over big. There are a lot of kids in

the Roanoke Valley who aren't Division I recruits who would love to play college football, and this would give them the option of playing at a school closer to home. You could make a pretty good Division III football team just from the kids in the greater Roanoke Valley, and I'm sure Roanoke College would draw attention from all over like they do in other sports.

Everything is set up to succeed. Salem Stadium would be one of the nicest, if not THE nicest, stadiums in the ODAC right off the bat. The Elizabeth campus, formerly the Lutheran Children's Home, has buildings that could be used for football dormitories right across the street from Salem Stadium. And, if they want to keep the existing fraternities and such as is, there's plenty of available space to build another dorm or two.

The college has three nice athletic fields right there on the Elizabeth Campus that could be used for football practice fields. They were used for college sports before Kerr Stadium was built, but since then I drive by there often and most of the time they're empty. And, if they are being used, they're usually soccer or lacrosse groups not even associated with the college. How many Division III schools would have three beautiful practice fields within walking distance of dormitories?

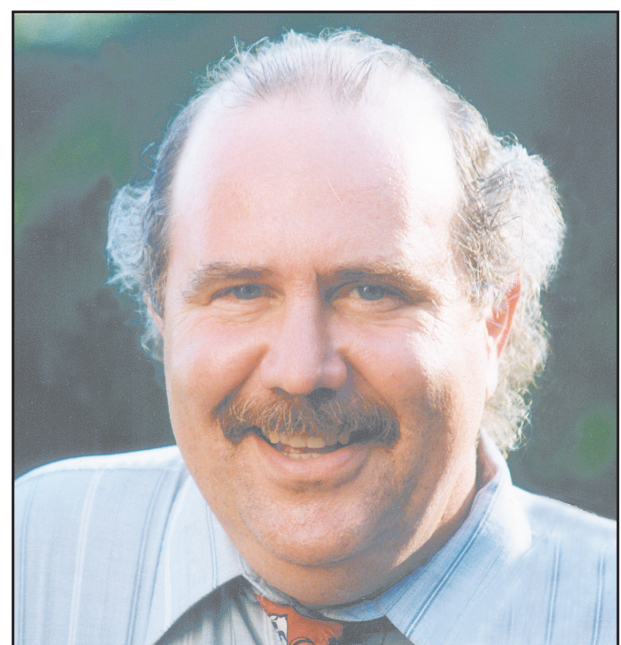
The idea would be to play games on Saturday afternoons or evenings, and if you can avoid the days Virginia Tech is playing at home that would be ideal. That would give area football fans another option within easy driving distance with lots of parking, and at a much more reasonable price. And, I would expect it wouldn't take long for the Maroons to be competitive with the pool of players available and RC's reputation for doing things first class.

The question most folks are going to ask is how much will it cost? Football isn't cheap, with equipment and travel and coaching and support personnel. But remember, you'd be adding 60 plus tuitions at whatever it costs to attend Roanoke College these days. When I graduated in 1974 it cost \$3,000 for out-of-state students like myself, but I assume it's more now.

I did a story years ago about the possibility of bringing football back. I imagine many of our readers don't even realize the Maroons fielded varsity football for over 60 years before it was discontinued during World War II. In fact, the last Roanoke College football game was played against Catawba College on November 13, 1942. That's exactly 80 years ago this Sunday.

When I did that story I interviewed several people at the college, including the late Elwood Fox who coached several sports at Roanoke College for many years. Fox played on the last football team at RC as a student and he had some great stories. I assume there's no one still alive from that 1942 team, as they'd have to be around 100 years old. I can't say that for sure but "Foxy" left us years ago in his 80s.

Another person I interviewed was the late Clarence Caldwell, who was treasurer of the college for many

years. I was expecting Clarence to say it wouldn't be a good idea because of the cost, but he was all for it.

Clarence was an RC graduate as well who was a student when they had football. He said the football games in the fall were the things that brought the student body together. They'd have a bonfire and pep rally the night before the games and the students would all be at the games on Saturday and it was a read "bonding" experience for the incoming students. He noted that's it's never been like that since.

And, getting back to the cost, he had no problem with that either. I remember Caldwell telling me that many studies had been done where football was big on bringing male students to the school. And, once they graduated, male students tended to give to their alma mater while female students were more likely to give to their husband's college. He cited that as a reason for elevating the basketball program in the '60s, when Roanoke started giving full basketball athletic scholarships, moved from campus to the Salem Civic Center for games and hired Charlie Moir to coach the team and build a program.

I know I'd be excited about Roanoke College having a football team, and recruiting some of the talent I've watched on the high school level stay right here to play. After watching the Stagg Bowl for many years we know Division III football is exciting and competitive, and to have a team right here in town to root for would draw some big crowds with ready-made rivalries like W&L, Ferrum and Bridgewater.

I think it would be a great idea, and the time is ripe. Just ask anyone who watched Coach Fox play 80 years ago.
