
Also, the kids got to put their name in for drawings to win art supplies like, Cracklin' Clay kit, 3D





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
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'Raising Lazarus' and our own Beth Macy

Library Corner

Author Beth Macy got her graduate degree at Hollins University and served the Roanoke area as a reporter for the Roanoke Times for many years. You may have heard of the Hulu series "Dopesick," which grew from Macy's third book of the same title. Her fourth book is called "Raising Lazarus" and is a hopeful sequel to "Dopesick." Recently Beth spoke in Roanoke to a house of 400 attendees to launch this latest book. She shared the call out for communities to work together to address what we can do to help the overwhelming number of victims addicted to opioid and similar drugs, fueled by the over prescribed pain killer Oxycodone.

Sobering statistics were shared by Macy about this epidemic that has touched virtually every one of us. Over 8 million people have Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) and one third of families are affected by the tragic consequences. According to the Yale Medicine website, "OUD is a chronic brain disease in which people continue to use opioids in spite of harms caused by their use." OUD often leads to the use of more dangerous and addictive drugs. In today's world, street drugs are plentiful and cheap with frequent dangerous adulteration with deadly ingredients.

Besides addiction and changes in brain chemistry, opioids cause severe respiratory

alone, they can stop breathing and die within minutes. Lifesaving Narcan is an opioid reversal drug that is given intra-nasally to chemically reverse certain opioids. In keeping with Macy's proactive approach, quick training of Narcan use by the Virginia Health Department was offered to every person who walked in the door to her program. Our local social services offer this training in New Castle. One participant's shirt read "Acta non Verba" translated to mean "Act, don't Talk." Families and friends of the addicted can do much to help. Recovered addicts are especially effective at becoming part of the solution. It was stressed that

education about the disease of addiction is key to finding solutions. Individuals can make a difference in many ways. A story was told about a front desk staff member who showed extra kindness to a homeless person who sought medical help and how that small effort enabled the person to stick with the program and receive continued medical care. Thinking of OUD as a disease like diabetes or cancer can help to reduce the stigma associated with it and help us to understand that lifetime care is needed as with other conditions.

Education of police and medical personnel is essential to treating victims with dignity and reducing the stigma associated with addiction. OUD can have a ripple effect on a person's life by exposing them to infectious diseases like AIDS and Hepatitis C as well as homelessness and prostitution. Webster defines

stigma as "a mark of disgrace

depression. When a user is associated with a particular circumstance, quality, or person." Addiction or any of these collateral harms can cause stigmatization which further discourages the victim from receiving help. Macy suggests treating addicts as people, not as criminals. "Raising Lazarus" contains

> the stories of individuals and grassroots organizations that are making positive steps in treating the disease of addiction. Clean needle exchanges are essential for preventing the spread of deadly infectious diseases. Macy shares that statistics prove that those who use clean needle exchanges are more likely to get help than those who don't. Transportation networks are being implemented so that addicts can get to doctor appointments and counseling sessions until they get back on their feet. Medicaid expansion helped to expand healthcare for the homeless. Telehealth has made it possible for those in rural areas to get help. Affordable housing and job opportunity are critical for people to recover from the cycle of addiction and relapse.

year, recognize May 14-20 as National Police Week. During each National Police Week, we are reminded of what our brave policemen and women face every day.

Whether it's stopping a carjacker or arresting an armed robber, policemen and women put their lives on the line on a daily basis to protect their communities and keep their fellow Americans

Unfortunately, in the wake of civil unrest in the summer of 2020, the "Defund the Police" movement swept over our country. Some even went so far as the call for police departments to be abolished all together.

police Many departments were faced with funding cuts and hamstrung by new policies designed to limit police activity. What we saw in the aftermath was more crime, including that against our police

According to the FBI, 2021 saw the highest total recorded felonious killings of police officers since 1995 (excluding 9/11). According to the National Fraternal Order of Police, so far in 2023, 135 officers have been shot in the line of duty, up 52% from 2020. Fifteen of those officers have sadly been killed.

What I knew then and now is that this is the wrong course of action. Police officers are essential to keeping our communities safe and we must support our police departments, not turn our backs to them like some of my Democratic colleagues have.

During this year's National Police Week, House Republicans focused our legislative agenda on honoring our country's policemen and women and have since passed legislation to benefit these individuals. On Monday, we passed

a resolution to memorialize law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty. The resolution recognizes law enforcement officers across the United States in the pursuit of preserving safe and secure communities; the need to ensure that such officers have the equipment, training, and resources necessary to protect their health and safety while they are protecting the public; and the law enforcement community in general for acts of sacrifice and heroism.

On Thursday, we passed a second resolution stating that Congress recognizes and appreciates the dedication and devotion demonstrated

by the men and women of local law enforcement who keep our communities safe; and condemns calls to defund, disband, dismantle, or abolish the police.


We also passed two pieces of legislation. The first, H.R. 3091, Federal Law Enforcement Officer Service Weapon Purchase Act, directs the General Services Administration to establish a program under which a federal law enforcement officer in good standing may purchase retired service weapons from the federal agency that employs them.

The second, H.R. 2494, POLICE Act of 2023, establishes that if a noncitizen has been convicted of or admits to having committed any offense involving assault of a law enforcement officer, they may be deported to their home country.

Additionally, the House Administration Committee, on which I sit, held a hearing with U.S. Capitol Police (USCP) Chief Thomas Manger during police week to discuss the current status of the Capitol police force. House Admin has oversight of the U.S. Capitol Police Board, Capitol Police, and

the House Sergeant at

Arms. Our key takeaways from the hearing with Chief Manger that there should be greater transparency and accountability within the U.S. Capitol Police Board and that we need to invest in more training for our frontline USCP officers.







helps them to play safer.

Coach Jimmy Fisher, along with others, has visions of obtaining better equipment for the kids at the school to work out on. Community members and other alumni are hoping that their extension of requests

are being heard.
"This equipment is for every athlete, boys and girls," shared Fisher. "They will all have an opportunity to use this new equipment."

Charles Darling, a previous head football coach in the early '80s, heard of Fisher's intent and sent out

"Let us help Fisher to get this amazing weight room project completed!" Darling started in his appeal to others. "And, of course, I am going to ask ALL the guys who played for me 40 years

ago to head up this drive."

He said he believed that the concept of having a complete and functioning weight room in the school is a huge part of having a successful athletic program for every team and that those involved should be at least somewhat ashamed that it is now 2023 and this idea is just now being completed.

"The fundraiser has brought in a little over half of our needed goal of \$18,000," Fisher said. "We are still sitting at \$10,150 with only eight days left as of Monday, May 22.

"The 1983 and 1984 football teams were successful for many reasons, but the willingness to lift was a large part of our successes," he said. "We were in the old high school and only had a small section of the stage to use, but our teams were literally BUILT right there in that small space. Now, the school has given the weight room a new and much larger space, and Coach Fisher and his staff are working to build a much better weight room that will be available to the current Rocket athletes and then for the next bunch of generations of CC athletes."

He added, "Gentlemen, there is no question that Coach Fisher is making great headway with his lifting program, and I am sure that each of you have been following right here on the team's Facebook page as I have. If you are watching closely, you can see that many of these young guys are already showing physical improvements (must have something to do with 7 AM workouts).

Darling said the weight room is for all the "now and future little Rockets, and this is not a request to help Coach Miller, me and certainly not to help the guy that Bartlett brought in to ruin the football program, we need to help one of our own, Jimmy Fisher, finish this project!"

Darling has offered to donate a free T-shirt to every former football guy who will make at least a

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\$50 contribution to this project. He said that the T-shirt is being designed and everyone will be able to wear it with "Rocket Pride" wherever they happen to live.

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
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

CONSTRUCTION PROJECT EXIT 137 TO EXIT 141 - A \$179 million design-build project to widen both directions of I-81 between mile markers 136.6 and 141.8 from two to three lanes is set to begin. Starting in February and continuing into the early summer, work will be performed on the inside and outside shoulders along a five mile section of both northbound and southbound Interstate 81 in Roanoke County and the city of Salem. The shoulders will be built up before barrier wall can be installed for road crews to work behind. Barrier wall will be installed along the shoulders in the spring and summer. Two lanes of I-81 traffic in each direction will remain open during the project with periodic lane closures scheduled during nighttime hours or outside of peak travel times as needed. Drivers can expect the following lane closures and upcoming impacts on northbound and southbound I-81:

ADDITIONAL TRAFFIC IMPACTS: TRAFFIC SHIFT ON

WILDWOOD ROAD: Expect a traffic shift with narrow width on Wildwood road after exiting I-81 southbound heading towards Salem. Southbound and northbound I-81 exit and entrance ramp narrows possible at Route 311.

WORK ZONE SPEED: With narrow spacing in lanes due to barrier walls, lack of shoulders and lane shifts in various locations, drivers should adhere to posted 60 mph speed limits in the work zone and allow space when following a vehicle.

RAMP CLOSURES: Ramp closures are possible during nighttime hours, 12 a.m., to 5 a.m. Drivers should watch for message boards dates and times the ramp will be closed.

LANE CLOSURES: Alternating left and right lane and shoulder closures during nighttime hours between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m., Sunday through Thursday, are possible. Lane widths will be reduced to 11 feet. Nightly lane closures may be in place along the right lane with possible nightly ramp narrows as needed for guardrail and shoulder strengthening.

The project also includes replacing six bridges, widening two bridges, installing approximately 2.6 miles of sound barrier walls along northbound I-81, improving the southbound exit 137 off-ramp intersection at Wildwood Road and adding interchange lighting at exits 137, 140 and 141 are also included in the project. Expected completion in early 2026.

I-81 NORTHBOUND AT EXIT 105 NEW RIVER BRIDGE REPLACEMENT IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY - Traffic on northbound I-81 has been

switched onto the newly constructed bridge over the New River at the Montgomery/Pulaski County line. The old bridge is being demolished. Lane and shoulder closures may be in place near exit 105. Lane closure may be in effect during the week from 8 p.m. to 7 a.m. Shoulder closures may be in effect at any time during the week. Slow rolls may be performed on I-81 in the north and southbound lanes from mile marker 98 to 109. Speed limit is reduced to 60 miles per hour in the work zone. Shoulder closures will remain in place though the duration of the project. Project completion is estimated by summer 2023. SLOW ROLLS: A slow roll operation may be in place

daily, Monday through Friday, between mile marker 101 and 105 northbound and between mile marker 109 and 105 southbound, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. Slow rolls may be utilized periodically on both the orthbound and southbound lanes from mile marke 98-109 for structural steel deliveries and setting beams.

Scheduled slow rolls on May 16 northbound between 1 and 3 p.m. and 7 and 9 p.m., weather permitting. If weather delays this date, slow rolls may occur on May 17 and 18.

LANE CLOSURES: Nighttime alternating lane closures will be in place on I-81 northbound between mile markers 104-106 from 7 p.m. to 6 a.m. the following morning.

ROUTE 605: Alternating lane closures and flagging operations will be present on Route 605, located under the New River Bridge, for work overhead on the bridge.

I-81 PAVING OPERATIONS – Weather permitting, crews will be performing paving operations along Interstate 81. Right and left lane closures may be in place along northbound and southbound lanes during nighttime hours, 7 p.m. to 6 a.m. Drivers should watch for moving vehicles and equipment. Expect possible

I-81 BRIDGE DECK REPAIRS - Weather permitting, crews will repair bridge decks on Interstate 81. Between mile markers 170 to 95, right and left lane closures will be in place northbound and southbound during nighttime hours, 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. the following morning. Drivers should watch for signs and expect possible delays.

ROUTE 581 BRIDGE WORK **OVER** WILLIAMSON ROAD -Bridge work is underway on Route 11 (Williamson Road). Intermittent and alternating lane closures between the intersections with Rutherford Avenue and Wells Avenue are still possible. Intermittent daytime and nighttime lane closures between the intersections above may still be required utilizing flagging operations. Any impacts to I-581 will be minimal. Expected completion Spring 2023.

LANE CLOSURES: On Wednesday, May 10, alternating lane closures will be in place eastbound and westbound between Rutherford and Wells Avenue.

I-581/220 EXPRESSWAY OPERATIONS - Weather permitting, crews will pave, patch and repair pavement on various routes. Lane closures may be in place during nighttime hours, 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. the following morning. Drivers should watch for signs and expect possible delays.

I-581/220 LANE & RAMP CLOSURES FOR PAVING AND MAINTENANCE OPERATIONS IN ROANOKE COUNTY- Weather permitting, crews will be milling and paving along Interstate 81. Right and left lane closures will be in place along northbound and southbound lanes during nighttime hours. Drivers should expect possible delays.

ROANOKE CITY

13th STREET SE IMPROVEMENTS WITH DETOUR - A project to improve a portion of 13th Street SE in Roanoke is underway. Located in a residential neighborhood just east of downtown Roanoke, this project will improve traffic flow and connectivity along 13th Street SE from Tazewell Avenue to Norfolk Avenue. The project entails reconstructing about 0.2-mile of 13th Street as an improved, two-lane roadway with 10.5-foot-wide travel lane and a raised median. A new roadway will extend 13th Street to Norfolk Avenue and the intersection at 13th Street and Wise Avenue will be reconfigured to include a roundabout. Bike lanes, sidewalks, crosswalks and curb and gutter will also be added. Southbound 13th Street traffic has a detour in place using Norfolk Avenue onto 12th Street to Tazewell Avenue. This detour will be in place throughout the duration of this project. Signs will be posted to designate the detour route. Northbound 13th Street will remain open to traffic. Flaggers may be possible and the speed limit through the work zone is 25 mph. The project is expected to be completed in summer 2023.

LANE CLOSURES: Alternating lane closures maintained by flagging operations may be in place on Norfolk Avenue for concrete placement.

ROANOKE COUNTY

STARKEY ROAD AND BUCK MOUNTAIN ROAD ROUNDABOUT - On Tuesday, March 14, a road project to construct a single-lane roundabout at the tion of Route 904 (Starkey Road) and Route 679 (Buck Mountain Road) began. Drivers should be aware of a new three-way stop to be implemented in the work zone at the intersection. The new roundabout is expected to be open to traffic sometime this summer. Once the roundabout is open, drivers should still expect lane closures with flaggers controlling traffic for final paving, additional concrete pouring and pavement marking until the project is finished. Final completion expected in late spring 2024.

THREE WAY STOP: Stop signs will be in place on each road approaching the intersection. This means drivers on Buck Mountain Road who do not stop currently will be required to stop while the intersection is under construction.

FLAGGING OPERATIONS: Throughout the life of the project, flaggers may control traffic between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. daily so motorists should expect delays.

TRAFFIC SHIFTS: In addition, drivers should also be alert to traffic shifts and changing traffic patterns while the roundabout is under construction.

BLUE RIDGE PARKWAY CLOSURE - The Blue Ridge Parkway will be repairing slope failures and a culvert failure at mile marker 127.9. A 15-mile stretch of the Parkway, mile marker 121.4 to 136, will be closed to all uses including cyclists, pedestrians and drivers. Detour signs to detour traffic around the Bent Mountain section of the Parkway will be in place. Traffic will be rerouted to Route 220 south to Route 419 north to Route 221 south. Traffic traveling north on the Parkway would be reversed. The detour is expected to be in place until summer 2023.

BOTETOURT COUNTY

DALEVILLE INTERSECTION PROJECT FOR FIELDSTONE DEVELOPMENT ACCESS - Lane closures northbound and southbound on Route 220 in Daleville will be in place for construction of a median with crossover, a right turn lane and a new traffic signal. This work is associated with construction of the Fieldstone Development. Lane closures will be set up on various days in May 2023.

ROUTE 11 BUCHANAN BRIDGE PROJECT - A construction project on the Route 11 Bridge in the Town of Buchanan is underway. Water Street is closed for the duration of the project and drivers should expect periodic lane closures with flagging operations to be in place during daytime hours. Jacking project is underway through April 7 with work being performed during overnight hours, 9 p.m. to 4 a.m., Sunday through Thursday. Drivers should expect delays due to slow rolls being in place for up to 10 minutes at a time with lane closures periodically. Message boards are present to alert and update drivers. Expected completion in summer

PAVING OPERATIONS - Weather permitting, crews will pave, patch and repair pavement on various routes. Lane closures may be in place and flaggers may control traffic at times during daylight or nighttime hours. Drivers should watch for signs and expect possible delays.

CRAIG COUNTY

ROUTE 311 BRIDGE REPLACEMENT OVER MEADOW CREEK - This project is nearing completion. As of April 20, both lanes of the bridge opened to traffic. Signals and detour have been removed. Drivers may see residual work being performed as permanent signs are installed and other residual items are completed. Weather permitting, expected completion is May 2023.

PAVING OPERATIONS - Weather permitting, crews will pave, patch and repair pavement on various routes. Lane closures may be in place and flaggers may control traffic at times during daylight or nighttime Drivers should watch for signs and expect possible delays.

MONTGOMERY COUNTY

ROUTE 8 PEDESTRIAN IMPROVEMENTS -On March 13, work began to construct pedestrian improvements on Route 8 in Riner. The work zone will begin at the intersection with Route 669 (Union Valley Road) and will end at the current site of the Atlantic Union Bank. Drivers should expect shoulder and lane closures to be in place with flagging operations between the hours of 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. through the start of the project until May 24, end of the school year. Once the school year is complete, lane closures will expand in hours to 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. Expected completion is summer 2023.

ROUTE 813 BRIDGE REPAIRS - On March 20, work began to repair the bridge on Route 813 (Stones Keep Lane) that crosses over the Roanoke River. The bridge is located approximately .13 mile east from the intersection of Route 813 and Route 460E/11N. Drivers will experience daytime alternating single lane closures across the bridge with flagging operations in place. Expected completion is November 2023. *Work is suspended and will continue in July.

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

feeling 100 percent," said Wolfe-Carper.




BASEBALL SEASON ENDS WITH LOSS TO EAST MONT
