

Love Thy Neighbor and CarePortal now in Craig County

On Tuesday, Aug. 15, Jordan Labiosa and Mayor Lenny McDonald hosted a meeting to introduce the Love Thy Neighbor Fund which is joining CarePortal to aid those in need in Craig County.

It was held at Lasterday, where proprietor Jasmine Brown, provided an array of desserts with homemade lemonade and tea.

Though three years in the making, Labiosa and McDonald have formed the nonprofit Love Thy Neighbor Fund which now seems to be the foundation of the beginning of a new relationship, bringing CarePortal to Craig County.

"The Department of Social Services (DSS) is so excited to have the CarePortal come to Craig," shared Craig County Department of Social Services Director "The Pat Franklin. CarePortal is a service that will allow greater needs to be met beyond what DSS can or could every do on our own. The Care Portal is more than a financial assistance program, it is a way to allow the community to

come to the aid of their neighbors and help hold them up and support them through rough times."

McDonald opened with a prayer thankful for the people who are already ready to serve and the explanation of the creation of the Love Thy Neighbor Fund.

Thy Neighbor Fund. "During COVID Jordan and I were sitting on our duffs an awful lot which meant that we would call each other and go to lunch each day and share the vision that he had for Craig County and what was possible," McDonald shared. "Not what was being done, but what was possible."

McDonald added with a laugh, "I learned really quick that Jordan doesn't sit still very well. So, we hatched a plan to start the Love Thy Neighbor Fund that would serve the needs of Craig County that could be uniquely met by forming this non-profit organization as there are some very unique things that a non-profit can do."

"Our fund is based on the Bible scripture of Matthew 22:39 that says thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself, so we tried to take that and put it into action," McDonald added.



The first public meeting of the joining of Love Thy Neighbor Fund and CarePortal was held on Tuesday, Aug. 15. Speakers were Mayor Lenny McDonald, co-founder of Love Thy Neighbor Fund, Pat Franklin, director of the Craig County Department of Social Services, Brandi Paige, with Southwest Virginia Crossroads Coalition for Orphan and Foster Care, Jordan Labiosa, co-founder of Love Thy Neighbor Fund, and Carrie Gooseman, adoption and resource family supervisor with the Roanoke City Department of Social Services.

They are a charitable nonprofit organization that has been launched in Craig County to live out this teaching.

McDonald listed three ways they have envisioned they can impact the county most effectively, adding value to its citizens.

Reduce the impact of poverty.


large. "With Craig having 25 percent living below the poverty line, that means they are one automobile accident away from a crisis. Clearly there is a need! And, the DSS has their hands full and overwhelmed sometimes," McDonald said. "Yet there are enough effective people who wish to serve in some way that we felt we could marry CarePortal with DSS, the school system and make a difference."

He added, "If we understand there is a need and we have the ability to fulfill it, Jordan isn't going to sit. He is going to jump on it

and find a way to make things better."

McDonald made the statement that if citizens educate people on financial literacy, then they have the opportunity to not just fix the crisis but to build the strategy for that family to have success and move forward.

"I am so excited that you are here, that you have a heart for service, that you want to help the Love Thy Neighbor Fund make a change for the better," McDonald shared.

Brandi Paige with Southwest Virginia Crossroads Coalition for Orphan and Foster Care has been a part of launching several CarePortals and Labiosa shared that she has been a useful resource and has helped trained many thus far in how to use the system.

Paige shared that when she drove to Craig for the first time, her breath was taken away with its beauty.

She added, "I wish I could take Jordan and put one of him every community that borders West Virginia and Kentucky as they are all like you, small communities that feel like they are forgotten."

"I live in Wytheville and cannot say enough about the difference made in it our community," Paige said. "Your heart beats for your community and the children in it and you

"You will receive a notification of a need and we encourage each of you to make a personal connection to that family because that is what the heart of CarePortal does," Paige explained. "It lets us go out on little mission trips and meet our neighbors right where they are."

A video was shared that said, "The mission field is in our backyard. It means meeting a need at just the right time. At other times the connection starts lifechanging relationships that change lives, transform communities, and reverse the fostercare crisis in our nation. That yes makes children a priority. Children have the power to change us."

"Ît is really shocking at the level of homelessness, incarceration, and even sex-trafficking that can be associated with the foster care system," Labiosa added. "If we can interact before they even enter the system and save those biological families, think about how many people we can run in their lives."

In April, I reflected on what we have been able to accomplish in the House of Representatives during the first three months of the year.

Now that it is August, let's look back through the rest of spring and summer.

Legislation passed

My legislation, the HALT Fentanyl Act, to permanently schedule fentanyl analogues, passed the House in May with bipartisan support, with a vote of 289-133. It is now pending in Senate. I hope they will vote on this important legislation soon.

Also in May, House Republicans passed H.R.2, the Secure the Border Act, in an effort to combat the humanitarian crisis at our southern border. Unfortunately, Biden Administration policies have led to increased rates of human

an historic number of unaccompanied minors living in our country, many being exploited and abused (see below). The House Republicans' bill will force the Biden Administration to restart the construction of the wall, deploy border needed technology to increase security to both the southern and northern borders, and provide funding to increase the number of border patrol agents. It will also strengthen current law aiming to protect unaccompanied children from human trafficking. In late April, House Republicans passed H.R.734, the Protection of Women and Girls in Sports Act of 2023, legislation to ensure that women and girls have a fair playing field in sports guaranteeing that schools adhere to Title IX's recognition of biology and genetics of an individual

at birth. This bill is about fairness, which is why I was an original cosponsor. Women fought for years for equal opportunities in sports. Why should women be forced to

and drug smuggling. sacrifice playing time and They have also led to scholarship opportunities? They shouldn't.

The House has also passed other impactful legislation, like the fiscal year (FY) 2024 National Authorization Defense the Federal Act, Aviation Administration Reauthorization bill, and the FY 2024 Veterans Affairs appropriations bill.

Committee work

The Energy and (E&C) Commerce Committee has worked hard on issues within its jurisdiction.

As Chairman of the E&C Oversight and Investigations Subcommittee, I have held 13 hearings since the beginning of April. One focus of the subcommittee is to provide oversight of the U.S. Department of Health Human Services and (HHS).

We have worked to hold HHS responsible for their abject failure to competently manage the record number of unaccompanied minors in this country. While we may disagree on what brought these kids to the U.S., once we have taken responsibility for these children, we have a moral obligation to ensure they have the care they need.

We have also explored emerging public threats like antimicrobial resistance (bacteria that is resistant to antibiotics) and how phage therapy (the process of using viruses that kill or weaken bacteria by attacking the bacteria) can combat this growing problem.

I am also a member of the Health Subcommittee and Energy Subcommittee. In the Health Subcommittee, we have held hearings covering our country's overdose crisis, a serious problem in our district and our nation. We also

continue to look for ways to lower our health care costs, whether that be Medicare or prescription drug costs. Ŏn the

Energy Subcommittee, we have held hearings about the need to secure our nation's power grid, a real problem in the age of everincreasing cyberattacks.

We have also looked at all of the above solutions in energy, including the future of nuclear energy in the United States. Nuclear energy is a dependable energy source and with the advent of small modular nuclear reactors, it is a potentially more significant electric provider for the future. That does not mean that we, and the rest of the world, will not need thermal coal.

I also serve on the House Administration Committee. The Committee continues to examine our country's elections and voting processes. In July, Committee passed the American Confidence in Elections (ACE) Act, which included my NO VOTE for Non-Citizens Act. The bill reaffirms it is a crime for noncitizens to vote in our federal elections and withholds some federal dollars from state/local jurisdictions that allow non-citizens to vote in their elections.

The Committee has also done oversight work over the U.S. Capitol Police (USCP), bringing in the USCP police chief, inspector general, and police board. I am investigating the sweetheart retirement deal granted to former Assistant Chief Pittman, which was revealed to the public through our hearings.

There is more work to be done between now and the end of the year. I will continue to take our Fightin' Ninth values to Washington.

Story about the peacocks -Part one: The secret lives of animals

Animals rarely give us a glimpse into the astounding stories of their lives. Birds are particularly amazing because they are so far removed from our own experience as mammals. They have feathers and they have hollow bones. They live high in trees with much exposure to predators and climate, yet they are successful. It seems that every time I try to intervene and try to help, everything goes wrong. As a wildlife rehabilitator once told me, the best thing you can do for wildlife is to keep them from being eaten by other wildlife and exposed to the elements. It's really the only thing you can do to ensure a positive action. Everything else you do is subject to your knowledge, your experience and some extreme luck.

The most happy of these stories is my interaction with the Peacock family that lives on my farm. I have been spending dusk sitting on my porch swing watching tiny fluff balls go to roost. They are less than 4 inches tall, flying straight up in the air like little helicopters by the sheer force of will and desire. They follow their gargantuan mother up into the highest branches of a giant silver maple tree in my yard every night. Going up is a series of amazing vertical flights from ground to limb, and limb to higher limb and on to the very top branches of the big Maple. Once they finally make it, they snuggle up under Mom's wings perched on a branch safe from predators. Their little heads peek out from between the feathers of her wings as if they have climbed up into her armpits if she had any.

Let me go back and xplain how these little fluff balls came to be. I acquired two female peahen chicks from another farm three years ago. They grew up into a pair of the most beautiful lady birds I had ever seen. They did everything in tandem and

acted as one unit from gliding around my yard, to roosting at night. The sisters were inseparable. Their big dark brown feathers and their beautiful emerald green shimmering necks are gracefully offset the expressive eyes in a white face topped by the little peacock crown. I could never get close to them but when I put feed out, they would always come, making sure that they were at a safe distance from me. Just out of reach from my fastest sprinting grasp.

One fall day I noticed one of the females staying particularly close to my henhouse which seemed a bit unusual. The next day she went in the henhouse to eat and I followed her. When she could not get away from me and really did not try very hard, I realized she was very ill. I did the thing that the wildlife rehab person told me to do. I took her inside where it was safe and warm where she promptly died within 10 minutes. Such fragile creatures, I thought. I worried so for her partner and I worried so the partner could also die of a broken heart. Being curious as always, I had to know what was going on. Now I know anything about Peacock anatomy and had not dissected a bird since poultry pathology lab in Vet school 35 years ago. I forged ahead with a complete necropsy. Everything looked totally normal except for one small part of her intestine which contained classical necrotic enteritis lesions. How I recalled this from vet school I do not know, but I thought it wise to send samples into our local diagnsostic lab to confirm the diagnosis. The only satisfaction I got out of the event was that I was right! I purchased medication and treated the entire flock just in case of chickens and the other Peacock.

Stay tuned for "The rest of the story" as Paul Harvey would say.






