Nashville comes calling, seeking local band for recording contract

In July, a local country band, Night Fury, went to Nashville...now Nashville is coming to them.

The band played in the Nashville Starborn Jamboree which featured 78 acts, but amid all the other music vying for attention, Night Fury made an impression.

Sam Old, steel guitar player for the group, said the band has been contacted by Don Reed Productions, the company wo promoted the show, about signing a

Although the band has not reached a decision, Old said the deal would result in an album being produced near the end of the year. Old said the band has about five songs under consideration for the first album which would feature original material.

"We didn't really expect this," Old said. "When I sent out the demo, I figured that was that. Now things are moving right along."

It was the demo tape which got Night Fury selected to play in Nashville.

"We were a little jittery at first," Old said. "It didn't actually hit us as to what we had done until we walked off the stage."

He said many people complimented them on

and quality of the music. Even though they have been playing together for just two years, Old estimated the musical experience of the band totals 100 years. The combined skill of bass player Rob Jaye, drummer Patrick Old, and guitarists Mike Carper and David Francisco, along with Sam, enable the band to sound as though it has been playing together for much longer than it actually has.


The experience and the stage presence is what Don Reed noticed in the video that was produced from the Nashville show, Old said.

"He said he had been watching video for the past two days. He liked how we presented ourselves, our dress, the whole show. He said it was very professionally done on our part, and we reminded him of the band Exile."

Don Reed Productions has extended an invitation to the band to play in another Nashville competition on Sept 11, and at the Cannery in Nashville on Oct. 15. Old said if Night Fury finishes in the top six at the Cannery, the band could appear on TV's the Nashville Network (TNN).

LANE WIDENING CONSTRUCTION PROJECT EXIT 137 TO EXIT 141 – The \$179 million designbuild project to widen both directions of I-81 between mile markers 136.6 and 141.8 from two to three lanes is underway. Work is being performed along a five-mile section of both northbound and southbound Interstate 81 in Roanoke County and the city of Salem. Barrier wall is in place along the shoulders. Two lanes of I-81 traffic in each direction are expected to remain open during the project with periodic lane closures scheduled during nighttime hours or outside of peak travel times as needed. Drivers can expect the following lane closures and upcoming traffic impacts in this area on northbound southbound I-81:

A D D I T I O N A L TRAFFIC IMPACTS:

WORK ZONE SPEED: Drivers should adhere to posted 60 mph speed limits in the work zone and allow space when following a vehicle. Narrow spacing in lanes due to barrier walls, lack of shoulders and lane shifts in various locations, are present.

TRAFFIC SHIFTS ON WILDWOOD ROAD: Expect work zone with traffic and narrow width on Wildwood Road after exiting I-81 southbound on exit 137 heading towards Salem. Southbound and northbound I-81 exit and entrance ramp narrows are possible at Route 311.

TRAFFIC SHIFT ON EXIT 140: Drivers may experience periodic lane closures that require a quick merge into traffic onto Thompson Memorial Drive from the southbound exit ramp of exit 140. Work zone located at bottom of the ramp for work on the I-81 bridge at the underpass.

RAMP CLOSURES: duration of this project.
Ramp closures are possible during nighttime hours, 12 a.m., to 5 a.m. Drivers should watch for message boards dates and times the ramp will be closed.

LANE CLOSURES: Alternating left and right lane and shoulder closures during nighttime hours between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m., Sunday through Thursday, are possible. Lane widths will be reduced to 11 feet. Nightly lane closures may be in place along the right lane with possible nightly ramp narrows as needed for guardrail and

shoulder strengthening. The project also includes replacing six bridges, widening two bridges, installing approximately 2.6 miles of sound barrier walls northbound I-81, improving the southbound exit 137 off-ramp intersection at Wildwood Road and adding interchange lighting at exits 137, 140 and 141. Expected completion in early

2026. I-81 NB & SB BRIDGE REHAB OVER ROUTE 100 AT EXIT 98 – Work is nearing completion on the I-81 rehabbing of the northbound and southbound bridges over Route 100 at Exit 98. Lane and shoulder

closures may be in place on Route 100 north and on I-81 northbound and southbound, 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. Flagging operations may also be in place on Route 100 north for up eight-minute slow rolls. Both northbound and southbound on and off ramps at exit 98 for I-81 traffic will remain fully operational for the duration of this project. Estimated completion date is summer 2024.

I-81 NB & SB PEAK CREEK MILE MARKER 95.7 - Repair work is underway on northbound and southbound bridges on I-81 over Peak Creek near mile marker 95.7. This repair work will require nighttime single lane closures for the duration of the project. Lane closures may occur nightly from Sunday night through Friday mornings between the hours of 8 p.m. and 6 a.m. For the deck overlay process, lane closures may be in place between Sunday nights through Friday mornings. For the southbound lanes these will occur between the hours of 7pm and 10am, and for the northbound lanes between the hours of 6pm through 9am. Details on these closures will be listed below on a weekly basis. Estimated completion is scheduled

for end of 2024.

ROUTE 605:
Alternating lane closures and flagging operations may be present on Route 605, located under the New River Bridge, for paving operations and work overhead on the bridge.

SLOW ROLLS: Slow rolls may be utilized periodically on both the northbound and southbound lanes from mile marker 98-109 for structural steel deliveries and setting beams.

I-81 BRIDGE DECK REPAIRS – Weather permitting, crews will repair bridge decks on Interstate 81 between mile markers 170 to 89, right and left lane closures will be in place northbound and southbound during nighttime hours, 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. the following morning. Drivers should watch for signs and expect possible delays.

Roanoke County SIDEWALK PROJECT ON SOUTHBOUND WILLIAMSON ROAD IN HOLLINS AREA - Work is nearing completion in the next few weeks on a project to construct new sidewalk along the section of southbound Route 11 Road) (Williamson Plantation Road and Peters Creek Road. Drivers in the Hollins area can expect periodic right closures on southbound Williamson Road between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. As work progresses, occasional nighttime lane closures also will be scheduled. The sidewalk project is expected to be completed in summer 2024.

HIGHLAND ROAD CLOSED FOR GREENWAY CONSTRUCTION - Beginning June 18, Highland Road will be closed between Hogan Road and Rutrough Road for construction of the Roanoke River Greenway through the Blue Ridge Parkway underpass by Roanoke County. The roadway will reopen by August 14, 2024, before the first day of school for Roanoke County Public Schools.

Flagging operations will be in place daily from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Occasional rolls nighttime hours are possible. I love to take road trips in this beautiful region. There's something that feels extra special about loading up Betsy in my car in the darkness of early morning and driving empty streets, then slowly watching the light return to the landscapes I'm traveling through. Going on a road trip is always fun — well, almost always. There are many things that can make or break your trip, and one of them is the food you take along the way. Whether you are going on a day trip or travelling to Myrtle Beach, a road trip can't happen without road trip snacks. Sometimes you need a little energy boost, sometimes you need to stabilize your blood sugar, and sometimes you need to munch on something just to stay alert and keep blood flowing to your

Our family rule on vacation was to eat one take out full meal a day. When you're sitting in a car for hours, it's more fun to snack and it's nice to end the day with a big meal, rather than eat takeout multiple times and feel overstuffed and sleepy in the car. This method also saves money since we didn't have to buy overpriced snacks and sodas at every bathroom stop. I prefer to spend my food budget on local food once I reach my destination.

The general rule is that road trip food should be easy to access and easy to consume; no sticky, crumbly foods. Also keep in mind when you buy or make road trip snacks that the driver will be hungry too. So, have at least some road trip snacks that can be easily eaten with one hand. I always have hard boiled eggs, peeled, and stored in a resealable bag, washed fruit like apples and oranges, and bags of cut carrots and celery. I also take muffins to eat as a dessert or a quick breakfast. I will always make a sandwich if I plan on being gone all day, so I don't have to buy takeout and wreck my diet.

Or take a chance at a sketchy diner on the way. Of course, I will always pack Betsy a snack too. I take a small cooler with water to drink, and I forgo the soda while traveling. Betsy and I have had many car picnics along the Blue Ridge Parkway and look forward to more.

Morning Glory Muffins Ingredients:

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 1/4 cups white sugar
- 2 teaspoons baking soda 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon salt

1 apple - peeled, cored and shredded

- 2 cups shredded carrots
- ½ cup raisins ½ cup chopped walnuts
- ½ cup unsweetened flaked coconut
- 3 large eggs
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease a 12-cup muffin tin or line cups with paper liners. Mix flour, sugar, baking soda, cinnamon, and salt together in a large bowl; stir in carrots, apple, raisins, walnuts, and coconut. Beat eggs, oil, and vanilla together in a separate bowl. Stir egg mixture into the carrot mixture until just moistened. Spoon batter into the prepared muffin cups, filling each 2/3 full. Bake in the preheated oven until tops spring back when lightly pressed, about 20 minutes. Cool in the tin for 5 minutes. Transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

Road Trip Roll Ups Ingredients:

1/2 pound deli turkey slices, 1/2 red onion, sliced thin

- 1 medium cucumber, sliced
- 1 green bell pepper, sliced
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder, 1/4 cup light cream cheese,
- 4 cups shredded lettuce,

1 medium tomato, sliced thin 90 Calorie Italian Flatout wraps

**You can use any wrap, lunchmeat, or veggies that you wish!

Mix the cream cheese and garlic powder together. Spread the cream cheese mixture onto the wraps. Top the cream cheese layer with sliced tomato, bell pepper, and cucumber. Add about a cup of lettuce onto each wrap. Add a slice or two of turkey onto each wrap. Roll the wraps up tight. Cut the wraps into thirds and put them in a road trip container. You can wrap them individually in tin foil to make them single servings. They stay together pretty well if you don't overstuff them. If they're flimsy, use a toothpick to keep them together.

The Committee on Administration I serve on is trying to protect our elections, investigate weaknesses, and restore election integrity and voter confidence in our elections.

Last year I introduced H.R. 4460, the NO VOTE for Non-Citizens Act, requiring only eligible American citizens to participate in federal elections. The bill withholds some federal dollars that go to localities that allow non-citizens to vote in their elections.

Washington, DC and New York City are examples where non-citizen voting in local elections is being advocated.

I was one of six Members of the House who voted to send the Safeguard American Voter Eligibility (SAVE) Act to the full House for consideration. This bill prohibits non-citizens from voting by requiring states to obtain proof of citizenship when registering individuals to vote.

Further, the Committee explored the influence of "Zuckerbucks" on elections, where private entities funded voter mobilization efforts.

An investigation showed that Democrat-likely districts received 90% of "Zuckerbucks" awarded, Republican-likely whereas jurisdictions obtained 10%.

Last week, the Committee issued subpoenas to fifteen Biden Cabinet officials requesting documents related to a March 2021 Biden Administration Executive Order on Promoting Access to Voting.

The subpoenas target officials from various federal agencies, including the Department of Commerce, the Department of Homeland Security, the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Health and Human Services, among others. According to a Roll Call article,

Executive Order 14019 instructs executive agencies to create strategic plans to partner with local officials: "to protect and promote exercise of the right

to vote, eliminate discrimination and

other barriers to voting, and expand

access to voter registration and accurate election information." That statement looks noble on its face. And the federal government does have a role in protecting the exercise of the right to vote, eliminating discrimination and voting barriers. But it should not have

"accurate election information." Again "accurate election information" sounds noble and benign on its face. But is it?

a role in pushing people to exercise

their rights, or in deciding what is

I don't know!

Are Biden agencies his new campaign tool?

Why don't we know?

Because the Administration will not willingly hand over what their agencies are doing under Executive Order 14019. This information was requested in early 2022. Outside groups have tried to get information. But the Biden Administration will not tell the American people what they are doing in regards to voter registration and "accurate election information" under the Order.

One must assume they have something to hide.

While I could be wrong, I fear that Biden's phrasing of "accurate election information" really means the government is going to decide what is misinformation in the upcoming Presidential election. We have already seen the

government trying to tell us what is accurate and what is misinformation during COVID-19 and currently on the southern border. Freedom of the press means freedom, not government manipulation or control of non-classified information. While Congress passed the "Motor

Voter" National Voter Registration Act in 1993, it was limited to specific areas but NOT voter turnout and "accuracy of information."

In this case, Congress has not debated or passed any legislation delegating specific or explicit authority to these executive agencies. Particularly, authority related to pushing voter turnout in various regions and making determinations on "election information accuracy."

Any activity by these agencies to directly or secretly affect the

election is wrong.

How can Americans have confidence in their elections if federal government agencies are ordered by one candidate (Biden) to seemingly use the power of the federal government to turn out the people they want to vote?

I am a believer that everyone should get out to vote. I have never failed to vote in an election where I was eligible.

It is the role of activists to encourage everyone to vote. Government agencies, however, should not be directly involved in what is essentially a campaign activity. It is unacceptable for any administration to use their government agencies to push targeted areas to go to vote.

Accordingly, I wonder how agency plans will affect rural areas. Are rural areas even considered in these federal government strategic plans? Or are federal agency campaigns focused on urban areas, where more Biden and Democrat votes tend to

As we saw with "Zuckerbucks", rural areas did not receive a fair

Without full disclosure, this Biden Executive Order feels to me like it serves a similar purpose.

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Virginia farmers brace for drought as hot, dry weather persists

While summer drought conditions are not uncommon in pockets of Virginia, farmers statewide are expressing concern about the forecast. An ongoing string of hot days with low humidity will likely affect their crops.

Those abnormally dry drought conditions are persistent throughout the commonwealth, according to a recent crop progress report from the National Agricultural Statistic Service's Virginia Field Office. Temperatures are expected to reach highs in the upper 90s in coming weeks.

"We were getting rain, rain, rain every weekend," said Danielle Bappert, regional crop agent for Virginia Farm Bureau Crop Insurance. "Then it just cut off. The farmers I talk to are nervous, looking at their weather apps, with not a drop of rain in

However, some crops thrive in this weather. 'There was a very

good first cutting of

hay around the state, and some farmers have already gotten a good-quality second cutting," noted Robert Harper, Virginia Farm Bureau Federation grain division manager.

Since Virginia's wheat and hayfields received significant rain in the spring, they are faring

"Everyone is telling me it's their best hay crop in years," explained Bappert. "And it's ideal for wheat to be dry when it's cut. Last year it rained a lot during that time frame, which lowers quality. But for most farmers, corn and soybeans are the big money makers."

With long summer days, "photosynthesis is wide open," Harper said. "When water cuts off, it puts those crops under stress."

The lack of rain already has prevented some growers from double-cropping growing two or more crops in the same area during a single crop year, like planting soybeans after harvesting winter

"Farmers are telling me they are not planting them," Harper said. "They are waiting for rain because they can't hammer seed into ground that's hard as a brick!"

The unusual weather may be attributed to the shift from El Niño to La summer will

The bring a climatic pattern change, said U.S. Department of Agriculture meteorologist Rippey. El Niño is the

climate phenomenon warming equatorial waters in the Pacific.

"The transition has already begun to the opposite conditions, known as La Niña, with colder-than-normal waters in the same region," he said. "The

shift is coming." The climate transition can result in "super-dry conditions" followed by a highly active hurricane season predicted this year, Bappert noted.

July Fourth celebrations coincide with troubling traffic safety statistics

RICHMOND—The first week of July is typically one of the busiest American travel periods of the year. It's also one of the deadliest.

Seven individuals lost their lives in Virginia traffic crashes during the two-day statistical counting period over last year's July Fourth holiday, according to data from the Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles Highway Safety Office.

Virginia State Police urge motorists to practice safe, sober and distraction-free driving to avoid becoming a statistic in 2024.

the summer travel season, so traffic safety should be of the utmost importance for all Virginians," said Col. Gary T. Settle, state police superintendent. "Excessive speeding, drivers passengers failing to buckle up, and distracted driving continue to put all at risk traveling on our highways. We need Virginians to put forth the extra effort and comply with speed limits, buckle up and put the phone down, and avoid distractions."

During 2023's holiday state investigated 377 total traffic 'We are in the height of crashes statewide. Troopers cited 2,051 speeders and 980 reckless drivers. They also issued 254 citations individuals for failing to buckle up, and another 74 citations for improperly secured children.

Virginia troopers cited 124 drivers for being in violation of Virginia's "hands-free" law that took effect in July 2021. To limit distractions, motorists are advised to program GPS and hands-free devices before departure.

"Pull over to a safe place when you are doing something that will take your eyes or mind off the road," said Virginia Farm Bureau Mutual Insurance Co. senior actuarial manager David Tenembaum. He serves as treasurer for DRIVE SMART Virginia, a nonprofit partner charged with raising awareness and changing behavior to improve roadway safety.

"When free of distractions, a driver can be prepared for the unpredictability of other motorists who may be distracted themselves," he said.

Arranging transportation is another preventable action motorists can take to keep themselves and others safe during the celebratory weekend.

Troopers arrested 36 drivers for operating under the influence of alcohol or drugs during the July Fourth holiday period last year. DRIVE SMART reported that 4,400 people were injured and 293 were killed as the result of alcohol-related traffic crashes

in Virginia during all of 2023. "With just a few drinks you could be too impaired to safely drive," Tenembaum noted. "So, designate before you celebrate! Plan to use a rideshare app or designate a sober driver before kicking off the holiday weekend."

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

This fall Craig will have 8U and 10U football and, for the first time in 10 years, Craig will field a 13U team. Close to 50 kids have already signed up to play recreation football.
















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
