

Craig New Castle PSA Waterworks issues boil water notice

On Friday, June 28, as required by law, the Craig New Castle Public Service Authority Waterworks released the following statement.

"State Health Officials have advised us of a failure to meet the Primary Maximum Contaminant Level (PMCL) for Escherichia coli (E. coli) in accordance with the Virginia Waterworks Regulations. Water served to our customers during June 2024 did not comply with the PMCL because E. coli was detected in a sample collected from our distribution system on June 11, 2024."

"E. coli are bacteria whose presence indicates that the water may be contaminated with human or animal wastes. Human

pathogens in these wastes can cause short-term effects, such as diarrhea, cramps, nausea, headaches, or other symptoms. They may pose a greater health risk for infants, young children, the elderly, and people with severely compromised immune systems. We violated the standard for E. coli, indicating the need to look for potential problems in water treatment or distribution. When this occurs, we are required to conduct a detailed assessment to identify problems and to correct any problems that are found."

General guidelines on ways to lessen the risk of infection by microbes are available from EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

Residents and businesses on the PSA Waterworks system are advised to boil water before use for drinking, beverage, and

food preparation, brushing teeth, and making ice. While it is safe to use water when it is not ingested, care should be taken with babies and small children during bathing not to allow the water into their mouths. Bottled water is recommended if boiling water is not available.

The statement was distributed primarily on Facebook by the Craig County Virginia Sheriff's Office, Supervisor Jordan Labiosa, Craig Botetourt Electric Cooperative and concerned citizens. Several posts provided further information about an inspection expected on Friday, June 28 but no further information is available. The PSA anticipates solving the problem within 10 days of the notice. For status about the water situation, contact Donald Jones at 540-864-6368.



Huddleston charged with felonies related to infant's death

On June after consultation with Craig County Commonwealth's Attorney Matthew Dunne, the Virginia State Police, Bureau of Criminal Investigation arrested Natassia Huddleston, 41, of Roanoke. Huddleston was charged her with the following felonies in the death of the 4-month-old infant: One count of Child Endangerment, one count of Child Abuse and Neglect, and 2nd degree Felony Homicide.

Huddleston was processed at the Craig County Sheriff's Office and transported

18, of an unresponsive 4-month-old male. When EMS arrived, they found the child was deceased. The child's remains were transported to the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner, Western District for examination.

Office The of the Chief Medical Examiner determined that the Cause of Death was a Homicide and contacted the Craig County Sheriff's Office with the findings.

At the request of Sheriff Craddock on June 5, the Virginia State Police Bureau of Criminal Investigation, Salem Division, began the investigation into the Homicide.

On June 5, 2024, the Virginia State Police arrested Trevian Demalle Carruth, 26, of Francisville, LA and charged him with Second Degree Murder.


Of course you'll need one more team, as the league will have six divisions of five. Maybe put the Redskins in there, because that will be pretty weak division and maybe they can win a few games.


It's just so stupid it might work. In fact, it's no more stupid than having Phoenix in the NFC East and Atlanta in the NFC West.

They may not read the funnies, but dairy cows seem perfectly amenable to using newspaper as bedding in their stalls.

Recent experiments in Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Pennsylvania show that compared to straw, shredded newspaper keeps cows drier and saves farmers money, said Jerry Jones, Extension dairy scientist at Virginia Tech. Not only that, it provides another use for the low-grade paper that's becoming a recycling albatross.

Right now, some recycling dealers on the East Coast are paying up to \$40 a ton for someone to take it off their hands, said Mike Murphy, director of the State Division of Recycling.

"There's very little market for newspaper," he said. "We're simply oversupplied." One reason for the glut, he added, is that some landfills are no longer accepting newspaper.

Newspaper that does not end up in landfills can take decades to decompose in the often-anaerobic environment. And the amount of newspaper that makes its way to such landfills is enormous.

The typical American household discards more than five pounds of newspaper a week, Murphy said. Multiply that by the approximately 88 million households in the US, and Americans are throwing away more than 440 million pounds of newsprint every seven days.

A typical dairy farm might use seven pounds per week of shredded newspaper for every cow, said Bob Appleman, an Extension dairy scientist who has conducted research on the subject at the University of Minnesota.

With 10 million dairy cows in the United States, that could add up to 60 million pounds -or a not-too-shabby 16 percent -of the newspaper.

Virginia has approximately 143,000 dairy cows, yielding a potential use of more than 1 million pounds of paper per week.

Because it is a new idea, not many dairy farmers have ventured into using newspaper as bedding, Jones said, although studies have found it to be mores absorbent than straw. It takes only about 80 percent as much newspaper to provide the same dryness as straw.

And the newspaper is extremely easy to dispose of. As it gets mixed in with manure, it simply decomposes. A farmer can spread the residual product on his fields as fertilizer, jones said.

So, what's keeping the farmers from trying the new(s) practice? One possible hindrance is the needs to shred newspaper to the desired size.

"Straw is already baled when you buy it and

sawdust is ready to use, but newspaper needs to be chopped," Jones said. "Most farmers would have to modify a conventional feed chopper to chop more finely, creating a machine that also takes some extra power to run."

Farmers may have to do a little scouting around to find a steady, reliable supply of dry newspaper. "The biggest problem is how to et hold of the stuff. I can think of various places," Jones said. "But one possibility would be a landfill looking to get rid of newspaper. I also know one farmer who was buying it from local Boy Scouts. He was paying them so much a ton, and they were collecting it on Saturdays and actually delivering it to the farm."

Finally, scientists are still looking into any possible side effects of cows eating newspaper or of any chemical residuals that end up on fields as fertilizer.

At this time, Jones said he knows of no significant problems with using newspaper as bedding.

"It's actually getting to be a problem to find conventional bedding-sawdust is in demand for particle board, and many farmers don't have access to straw," he said. "So I think we're going to see more and more interest in newspaper."

Recipe of the Week

One thing I remember growing up was making ice cream on the Fourth of July. We made it every year. Our ice cream churn was hand cranked, and I would sit on the top while my dad cranked it to hold it down. The cranking took forever and as the ice cream froze it became harder and harder to crank. Dad would replace the melted ice every so often and add a little more rock salt to the churn. When we got an ice cream churn with an electric crank to do the cranking It was not as much fun. Once it was done, we would immediately eat it. It was the best soft serve ice cream. Sweet, full of vanilla, and melted quickly. The closest store bought I have found is Chick Fil-a's ice dream.

This week's recipe is for that ice cream. My mom got it from our preacher in Toledo, Ohio. Summer meant Sunday evening ice cream socials at the church. There would be 8 or 9 ice cream churns cranking away in the church yard while we kids ran around getting our church clothes dirty. Every family had their own recipe. Some were made with eggs in a custard base, and some were flavored with fruits or chocolate chips. My family always made vanilla. My mom would smash up strawberries to put on top when it was finished. Our churn was a 6-quart churn that used rock

salt and ice to freeze the ice cream base. Modern countertop ice cream makers have a 1.5 to 2 quarts insert that you freeze before churning the ice cream base. I have included the amounts for both sizes in this recipe.

Vanilla Ice Cream –1 quart, (4-6 quart)

4 cups (10 cups) half and half -Do not use fat free $\frac{1}{2}$ & $\frac{1}{2}$.

³/₄ cup (3 cups) granulated sugar

1 Tablespoon (3 tablespoons) vanilla extract

1 pinch (¹/₄ teaspoon) salt

In a large mixing bowl, whisk together the half and half and sugar until the sugar is dissolved. Stir in a pinch of salt and the vanilla. Pour into ice cream maker and churn according to the directions of your machine. The ice cream will have a soft texture immediately after churning, similar to soft serve. It's delicious that way, but I like it even better after 2+ hours in the freezer. Use a spatula to transfer the soft ice cream from the ice cream maker into a quart-size airtight container. If you like, press a piece of plastic wrap or foil into the top of the ice cream to prevent ice crystals from forming. Freeze for at least 2 hours and for up to a month. The ice cream will be easy to scoop on the first day, but after that, you may need to let it sit at room temperature for several minutes before you scoop it. It gets firmer after more time in the freezer. Always use full fat half & half; it's the fat content that makes the ice cream creamy.

taught Thomas Jefferson law. His name appears first among Virginia's signatures.

Carroll County's namesake, Charles Carroll of Carrollton, represented Maryland. He was the only Roman Catholic signer and the last survivor among the fifty-six, living until 1832.

In 1785, Virginia gave birth to Franklin County. Honoring one of the most famous Founding Fathers, Benjamin Franklin was a renowned intellectual respected in the United States and the Western World.

The Declaration was a big step, but some had demanded independence before 1776. One of the boldest was Patrick Henry, who famously declared before the Second Virginia Convention, "Give me liberty or give me death!" He has two county names honoring him: Patrick and Henry. For a time, Henry resided in Leatherwood, Henry County.

To make independence real, it needed more than the Declaration. It needed individuals who were willing to fight and, if necessary, die for the cause. Two such patriots are honored in our area by county names. Richard Montgomery led the invasion of Canada and died at the Battle of Quebec in 1775.

Casimir Pulaski was a Polish count. Like the French-born Marquis de Lafayette and the Prussian Baron von Steuben, Pulaski

was a European nobleman who was drawn to the American cause. As he wrote to George Washington, "I came here, where freedom is being defended, to serve it, and to live or die for it." Pulaski fell at the Battle of Savannah in 1779.

William Grayson also fought in the war, serving as an aide to Washington and rising to colonel, but he survived the war to become one of Virginia's first U.S. senators, and now has Grayson County named in his memory.

Furthermore, the City of Martinsville was founded by Brigadier General Joseph Martin who contributed to American Revolutionary battles at Kings Mountain and Cowpens.

Russell County was named for William Russell, but which one, the father or the son? Both were soldiers of the Revolution. The elder Russell's service included Point Pleasant, when frontiersmen led by Andrew Lewis defeated Shawnee Chief Cornstalk and helped clear the way for Daniel Boone and others to settle beyond the Appalachians.

William Russell's son was one of the Overmountain Men, frontiersmen who rallied from hundreds of miles away to fight the British. Their victory at Kings Mountain helped turn the tide of the war in the South. The Abingdon Muster Grounds, where 400 of the militiamen began their journey, marks the northern trailhead of the Overmountain Victory National Historic Trail.

Then there is Washington County. George Washington led the Continental Army to victory against the powerful British Empire. That victory led to a sense of liberty in the colonies and in 1782, the Village of Liberty (now known as the Town of Bedford) was formed.

Later, Washington served as president of the Constitutional Convention and subsequently as our first president under the new Constitution. After two terms, he returned home. Truly, Washington was:

"First in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen."

That description came from Washington's colleague Henry "Light-Horse Harry" Lee, who, sure enough, is the namesake of Lee County.

In Southwest Virginia, we are proud of our patriotic heritage. The names of the fifty-six signers of the Declaration, the other statesmen who worked for independence, and the soldiers who fought for it hold an honored place in our memory. But their legacy consists of more than names in history books or on maps. It is found in our democratic republic, in the freedoms we enjoy, and the great nation we have become.

TRAFFIC SHIFT ON EXIT 140: Drivers may experience periodic lane closures that require a quick merge into traffic onto Thompson Memorial Drive from the southbound exit ramp of exit 140. Work zone located at bottom of the ramp for work on the I-81 bridge at the underpass.

RAMP CLOSURES: Ramp closures are possible during nighttime hours, 12 a.m., to 5 a.m. Drivers should watch for message boards dates and times the ramp will be closed.

LANE CLOSURES: Alternating left and right lane and shoulder closures during nighttime hours between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m., Sunday through Thursday, are possible. Lane widths will be reduced to 11 feet. Nightly lane closures may be in place along the right lane with possible nightly ramp narrows as needed for guardrail and shoulder strengthening. The project also includes replacing six bridges, widening two bridges, installing approximately 2.6 miles of sound barrier walls along northbound I-81, improving the southbound exit 137 off-ramp intersection at Wildwood Road and adding interchange lighting at exits 137, 140 and 141. Expected completion in early 2026.

AT PEAK CREEK MILE MARKER 95.7 - Repair work is underway on the northbound and southbound bridges on I-81 over Peak Creek near mile marker 95.7. This repair work will require nighttime single lane closures for the duration of the project. Lane closures may occur nightly from Sunday night through Friday mornings between the hours of 8 p.m. and 6 a.m. For the deck overlay process, lane closures may be in place between Sunday nights through Friday mornings. For the southbound lanes these will occur between the hours of 7pm and 10am, and for the northbound lanes between the hours of 6pm through 9am. Details on these closures will be listed below on a weekly basis. Estimated completion is scheduled for end of 2024.

APPALACHIAN TRAIL BRIDGE OVER ROUTE 311 -A new pedestrian bridge is under construction over Route 311 at McAfee Knob trailhead. The trailhead parking lot is currently closed and will remain closed during construction. Bridge beams were placed across Route 311 on the new bridge on June 11. Flagging operations will be in place daily from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Occasional slow rolls during nighttime hours are possible.
