### Craig County students had a few extra days of summer

Craig County Public Schools kicked off the 2024-25 school year with a bang – or perhaps more accurately, a delayed start. After a storm postponed the initial opening day, students were eager to return to the classroom on Monday, Aug. 12.

"They were ready to come back," said Craig County High School Principal Susan

Stimeling. The school hallways quickly filled with the familiar hum of teenage life. A new chapter also began with Virginia's statewide cell phone policy. While some anticipated chaos, Stimeling said the school was prepared. "We were ready," she said. "Card games are available at lunch, and we're seeing kids talking to each other." The policy seems to have created a more engaged atmosphere,

### Weather, wildlife affect local vendors at the farmers market

Come down Main Street in New Castle on any Saturday for the farmers market and a nice hometown surprise. A variety of vendors fill the spots with tasty treats, plenty of information and loads of experience to share. The corner has filled in nicely with the addition of the mural wall, stating the obvious "Craig County, Your Next Adventure Awaits."

One of the vendors, Josh Thompson of Landis Legacy Farm, has been participating since the beginning of the market earlier this year. His Newport enterprise brings eggs, chickens, pork, and maple syrup to the market along with garden produce. Thompson has a collection of private customers in the area, and sells consistently at the New Castle market and in Giles County at the Narrows market. Thompson is expanding the work on fencing begun at his 200-acre property with funding from the Natural Resources Conservation Service. He found, as many farmers do, that three strands only keep in some animals. Adding more strands in key areas makes for safer animals.

Sally Farrell is another vendor at the market, bringing eggs and lamb.

Her farm produces eggs, replacement ewes, lambs, lamb meat and mutton. Farrell faced an unexpected challenge recently, with a fox in her chickens. She found that electric netting for protection over the flock has been very helpful.

Then, there's the sourdough. Lazywoods Homestead baker, Casey Peters, creates sourdough loaves in classic plain, Jalapeño Cheddar or Pepperoni Cheddar. Other offerings include sourdough pasta and delicious cinnamon pecan buns on occasion.



#### Virginia Western awarded National Science Foundation grant focused on agricultural technology

ROANOKE – Virginia Western Community College has received a \$343,209 Technological Advanced Education (ATE) grant from the National Science the Foundation, U.S. government's independent science agency, according to a release from the college.

The three-year grant will fund the college's project, "Cross-Pollination Skillsets: Growing Mechatronics and Agricultural Collaborations for Producing Skilled Agricultural Technicians," which will test Virginia Western faculty members' ideas to improve



technician education. "We are very grateful to



receive this substantial grant from the National Science

Foundation," said Dr. Robert Sandel, Virginia Western's president. "Our faculty are always seeking innovative ways to equip our students to meet community needs, and this collaboration builds on that The

start types.



Industry Leadership Team (BILT). Contributing as members of the BİLT are: Matthew Lohr, Virginia Secretary of Agriculture; Arturo Gomez Mazatan, Red Sun Farms; J. Scott Lowman, the Institute for Advanced Learning and Research; Gus Brennan, Greenswell Growers; Jared Heffron, Novenesis; Stefanie Manbeck, Cattlemen's Insurance Agency; Kate Stevens, James River High School – FFA advisor/agriculture teacher; and Walter Grigg, TORC Robotics. "This project has been shaped by our community

partners, and we are so grateful for their support," said Dean of STEM and Workforce Solutions Amy White. "Our faculty investigators were very open and flexible as we began the planning process, and so we were able to be very nimble to respond to the BILT's input." Industry members outside the BILT also note

the value of the project's synergies. "Integrating agriculture and technology into college curriculums is essential for businesses like MOVA Technologies Inc or Vegg Inc, which offer climate-smart ag-tech solutions," said Luke Allison, director of advancement and communications for MOVA Technologies, Inc. "The next generation of workers must be leaders in environmental stewardship while advancing technological progress. Higher education needs to ignite their imaginations, fostering a proactive approach to creating innovative solutions for challenges that have yet to arise."

Through teamwork with Shelley Lyons, Virginia Western's grant coordinator, and Dean Amy White, investigators Berry and White began preparing the grant proposal with mentoring and technical support from Mentor-Connect, which provides mentoring and technical resources to help two-year college faculty write competitive grant proposals. Mentor-Connect is an ATE project led by Florence-Darlington Technical College in partnership with the American Association of Community Colleges. Virginia Western was one of 24 community colleges nationwide selected to participate in Mentor-Connect's year of training and mentoring sessions to

prepare the grant application. 'Much of the credit for our winning proposal must go to the Mentor-Connect program. I was initially skeptical that the program would properly address our focus area. The focus on agriculture is just gaining momentum and I wasn't certain any mentor

would have experience with the subject matter," said Berry. "However, the mentors worked with us continually, pushing us to make progress even though were swamped with other responsibilities. The result of this experience wasn't only a winning proposal; our internal team, our external network and our focus has been strengthened significantly."

Mallory White pointed to the need this project will fill. "This is new territory. However, our urban college is uniquely poised to instruct the community about hydroponics and controlled environmental agriculture," she said. "We have a strong science department, so it's important to take advantage of our existing programs, incorporate new courses, and think of the future to meet the growing need for more advanced agricultural techniques required to ensure more crops can be successfully and sustainably grown."

Students will be able to combine coursework from Mechatronics and Agriculture programs, plus new courses being developed, to receive an Associate of Applied Science in Technical Studies. Because these programs already existed, there is a much smoother on-ramp than the longer process of having a completely new program approved at the state The NSF grant will aid staffing, course development

and equipment to better target the focus on controlled environment agriculture. For example, the project is developing a course in vertical growing and hydroponics, which will include equipment that will also benefit the College's Horticulture Program as well. "We'll literally be able to cross-pollinate the mechatronics and ag fields – the mechatronics with the sensors and pH meters, giving students more practice with data analysis and the ag field through understanding the technology behind the hydroponics," Mallory White said. The program also plans outreach to benefit K-12 students.

Another mode of cross-pollination involves increasing gender diversity among the Mechatronics and Agriculture programs' current populations. The Mechatronics Program enrolls more male students, while female students comprise the majority of

Agriculture Program enrollees. "One of our target outcomes is to create a more diverse population in

the programs and have men and women explore

ideas within this developing field of controlled

environment agriculture," Berry said.

The ATE program focuses on the education of technicians who work in high-tech fields that drive the nation's economy. Because two-year community and technical colleges are the leading sources of technician education in the United States, faculty from these higher education institutions have had leadership roles in most ATE projects since the

program began in 1993. We are thrilled to work within our community to support the growing field of agriculture and look forward to the outcomes of this valuable project. We strive to be good community partners, and this project is yet another way Virginia Western can be a leader in providing opportunity and resources to our students," said Dean Amy White.

### Recipe of the Week

My mom's mother, Mimi, did not cook. She wasn't the type of grandmother that made homemade treats for me. But she could shop like a star. One thing I remember is that she always had Little Debbie snack cakes. Banana Marshmallow Pies, Star Crunch Cakes, Nutty Buddy bars, and Oatmeal Creme Pies. I knew exactly which cabinet she stored them in. On road trips, they were always in the front seat, and if they came to visit us, Mom would buy them to have on hand. My mom did not buy them except for

O.D. and his wife, Ruth, founded McKee Foods in 1934. In 1960, O.D. McKee was trying to produce a catchy name for their new family-pack cartons of snack cakes. Inspired by a picture of his 4-year-old granddaughter Debbie, he decided on the name Little Debbie®. Each Little Debbie package features an illustration of a cheerful little girl in a straw hat who looks like she would enjoy jumping rope and would never throw a remote at the TV. The first family pack was produced in August of that year and consisted of the original snack cake, the Oatmeal Creme Pie. Family packs were one of the first multiple-item baked goods available with individually wrapped snacks. While the Oatmeal Creme Pie was the original Little Debbie snack cake, there were 14 different varieties by 1964. Now, more than 75 varieties are available. Little Debbie snacks are available in all 50 states, Canada, Mexico, and Puerto Rico, as well as on U.S. military bases throughout the world. And little Debbie? She is still involved with the business and currently holds the position of Executive Vice President and serves on the McKee Foods Board of Directors.

When it comes to my opinion, my favorite is the Nutty Buddy Bars. I used to eat them one layer at a time, to make them last longer. Oatmeal Creme Pies and Glazed Doughnut Sticks reside at 2 and 3 on my Little Debbie power rankings. Although, the Christmas Tree Cake is also on my list. I don't understand how Little Debbie can turn her regular boring snack cakes into a magical holiday staple with some frosting and sprinkles. But those Christmas Cakes taste at least 10,000 times better than the January-November Cakes. As my coworkers will attest, I can never pass a holiday display of Little Debbie snacks without buying some. **Iced Oatmeal Cookie Bars** 

**Ingredients for Bars** 

½ cup unsalted butter, melted

1 large egg

1 cup light brown sugar, packed 2 tablespoons medium, dark, or full-bodied

molasses 1 tablespoon vanilla extract

½ teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon cinnamon

1 cup instant oats, not old-fashioned or whole-

34 cup all-purpose flour Ingredients for Frosting

½ cup unsalted butter, softened 1 ½ cups confectioners' sugar

one 7-ounce jar marshmallow creme

1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon salt, cuts some of the sweetness Instructions

#### Bars

Preheat oven to 350F. Line an 8x8-inch baking pan with aluminum foil, spray with cooking spray; set aside. In a large, microwave-safe bowl melt the butter, about 1 minute on high power. Wait momentarily before adding the egg so you don't scramble it. Add the egg, brown sugar, molasses, vanilla, salt, cinnamon, and whisk until smooth. Add the oats and stir to combine. Add the flour and stir until just combined, don't overmix. Turn batter out into prepared pan, smoothing the top lightly with a

spatula. Bake for about 24 to 25 minutes, or until done. A toothpick inserted in the center should come out clean, or with a few moist crumbs, but no batter. Place pan on top of a wire rack to cool completely before frosting. Don't frost warm bars or the frosting will melt.

To the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment (or large bowl and electric hand mixer), add the butter, confectioners' sugar, and beat on medium-high speed (start on low so you don't spray sugar everywhere) until light and fluffy, about 3 minutes. Stop, scrape down the sides of the bowl, and add the marshmallow creme, salt, and beat on medium-high speed until well combined, about 1 minute. Turn frosting out over bars and lightly smooth it with a spatula or offset knife.



### News from the 9th: Our region, birthplace of soft drinks?

Virginia's Ninth District is home to an array of nationally iconic items. Previously, one of my columns discussed the significance of the Crooked Road and the D-Day These monuments Memorial. demonstrate that our regions have profound roots in country music and service to the U.S. military.

What is lesser known to some is this District has deep ties to the soft drink industry.

The early days of mixing soft drinks are filled with cloak-anddagger intrigue and accusations of stolen formulas.

One soda of notable prominence is

Texas claims credit for Dr Pepper's incarnation. A young pharmacist, Charles Alderton, worked at Morrison's Old Corner Drug Store in Waco, TX and allegedly liked to experiment with different fruit syrups in his free time.

After multiple trials, Alderton offered his formula to the store owner, Wade B. Morrison.

Morrison didn't always live in Waco. He originally worked in a pharmacy in Rural Retreat, Virginia

for a "surgeon" named Charles Taylor Pepper.

Å 1996 article from the Virginian-Pilot noted that Pepper happened to mix mountain herbs, roots and seltzer into a fizzy brew and allowed Morrison to mass produce his beverages.

A coincidence that Morrison, who

worked with Pepper to sell a soft drink, moved to Waco and founded his own drug store, and in that very store, a soda named "Dr Pepper" is

conceived?

Local lore, as I've heard it, is that Morrison took one of Dr. Pepper's formulas to Texas with him along with Dr. Pepper's daughter. That is not the official company line, but that is what local storytellers have While the soda's origins are

disputed, Charles Pepper's gravesite remains a Wythe County attraction to this day. I have made multiple stops by it during my travels. One county over, in Smyth County,

the town of Marion is also connected to the creation of a popular soda, Mountain Dew. The Hartman brothers, Barney and Ally, opened Hartman Beverage Company in Knoxville, Tennessee.

The Hartmans allegedly explored

different recipes for a lemon-lime soda, until they created Mountain The term "Mountain Dew" can be traced to Appalachian slang for mountain-brewed moonshine. The talented Stanley Brothers out of Dickenson County recorded the song "Mountain Dew."

However, it is disputed who should get credit for the final recipe. At one time, the Hartman brothers joined forces with William "Billy" Jones, President and General Manager of Marion's TIP Corporation. Ally Hartman became an investor in TIP at one point.

Some claim that Jones obtained the rights to Mountain Dew during this time! Marion was one of three total sites

in the country to begin marketing Mountain Dew, according to PepsiCo. The Hartman brothers sold the beverage locally in Virginia and

Tennessee until 1964, when PepsiCo purchased the brand and production rights. PepsiCo acquired TIP, making Jones a lot of money. In fact, Steve Smith, CEO of Food City, has told me as a young man

he saw a photocopy of the check when working for his father's grocery stores. One book by Dick Bridgforth documents the history of Mountain Dew and recognized Marion as

having a hand in the beverage's

origins. While the Hartman brothers

receive credit for creating the soft drink, Marion town leaders have successfully pushed for a Virginia Historic Marker acknowledging Bill Jones and his contributions to the founding of Mountain Dew. The marker will read "The Birthplace of Modern Mountain Dew.'

A unique beverage that also has ties to Southwest Virginia and Tennessee is one of my personal favorites.

Dr. Enuf, a vitamin-enriched concoction that tastes like a soda but produces the boost of an energy drink, was first bottled in 1949 by Tri-City Beverage Corporation in Johnson City, Tennessee. Because of Tri-City Beverage Corporation, also bottling Mountain Dew, Johnson City was one of the other early marketing sites for "the Dew."

Unlike Hartman Beverage Company, Tri-City Beverage Corporation retains the rights to Dr. Enuf to this day.

While I typically drink the regular green version, they also have an herbal red version and diet versions.

Also, Pepsi Bottling Company's plant in Wytheville bottles the popular sports-themed beverage, Gatorade.

There are other soft drinks with ties, but these are currently the most significant.

The rich history of the Ninth District's contributions to the soft drink industry is well documented. And no one can argue that Dr Pepper and Mountain Dew have nationally become a part of America's culture.

So in these hot days of August, have a chilled soft drink of your choice and remember you live in "America's Soft Drink Capital."

### Disease defenders – How epidemiology protects community health

The mission of the Epidemiology Division of the Roanoke City & Alleghany Health Districts (RCAHD) is to monitor and investigate emerging communicable diseases, investigate outbreaks, and provide guidance to stop the further spread of communicable diseases for our community's wellbeing. To put it more simply, epidemiologists are "disease defenders" who use data to answer questions like: Who is getting RCAHD epidemiology (epi) team, sick and why? Where is the problem which includes professionals with occurring? Why are

some people more affected than others? How can we prevent more people from getting sick? optimally То

protect the public's health,

healthcare professionals and laboratories are required to report over 70 diseases or conditions in Virginia. In 2023, the advanced public

health degrees as well as clinical nurses with epi training, investigated over 690 incidences of reportable diseases, excluding COVID-19 and sexually transmitted infections (STI). Since 2020, the team has also included

a dedicated group of COVID case investigators. The COVID team investigated and managed over 9,600 local cases in 2023, including 59

outbreaks. In addition, about 2000 STI were reported locally in 2023, including almost 100 reports of syphilis. Much of the epi team's work is

behind the scenes, carefully following up on each new case reported by local healthcare providers, analyzing and investigating each disease as needed to protect our communities and prevent further spread. They also provide guidance on topics such as testing for communicable diseases or sharing best practices to protect additional people from getting sick after a diagnosis is made. Our team of

epi nurses investigate and manage cases of rabies exposures as well as cases of elevated lead levels in blood, a condition that is particularly concerning in children. There is also a team of experts dedicated to respond to cases of tuberculosis.

The epi team has been vital in helping to protect the community's health during several notable outbreaks in recent years. Working alongside our environmental health

of restaurant inspectors, the epi team investigated the 2021 restaurant-associated outbreak of hepatitis A, where over 50 people were sickened. As the community continued to see a high number of community-acquired hepatitis A cases in 2022, the epi team helped identify common risk factors involved with the spread, noting a higher incidence among people who used injection

The epi team has also been instrumental in monitoring an ongoing increase in cases of community-acquired invasive group A strep (iGAS) since 2022, and the rise of hospital associated infections both here and across the country. The team assists facilities such as nursing homes, long term care facilities and jails with best practices to prevent infections to protect staff

and vulnerable residents from outbreaks.

Recently this summer, the team has noted an uptick in local foodborne illnesses. While the increased number of salmonella and campylobacter infections do not all share a common source, investigations determined that some cases were linked to a nationwide recall of cucumbers in June, and other cases may be linked to consuming

unpasteurized eggs from backyard flocks. As always, washing hands and surfaces often is also key to everyday prevention.

Not all aspects of the job are spreadsheets and data, according to district Epidemiologist Hope White. She and the team also enjoy the satisfaction of direct contact with residents and opportunities to build trust, such as she brought books to share with the children of a newcomer family receiving followcare from the health department. The combination of RCAHD staff efforts to build trust with residents and broader advances in epidemiology have contributed to the more than 20-year increase in life expectancy since the early 1900s and have helped to make the community a healthier

**INTERSTATE 81** INTERSTATE WIDENING CONSTRUCTION PROJECT EXIT 137 TO EXIT 141 – The \$179 million designbuild project to widen both directions of I-81 between mile markers 136.6 and 141.8 from two to three lanes is underway.
