State fire marshal recognizes PCHS heroes





As a matter of fact, our local county DOH supervisor, just like the Town of Marlinton, received zero notice before the start of the current and on-going traffic control project.

Approximately 18 to 24 months ago, Charleston Department of Highways staff was in Town with notice of a new traffic control replacement project. Which, by-theway, was about a year after the corners were busted up to upgrade the handicap accessible approaches at the intersection corners on Main Street.



He had her will and thought her estate was likely to fit under the rules of the new small estate law in West Virginia at WV Code sec. 44-1A-1 et seq. This law authorizes a simpler administration of probate property when \$50,000 or less of personal property and a maximum of \$100,000 of real real estate solely in her own estate is owned by the decedent on the date of death. The small estate is charged lower probate fees, involves simpler procedures, and no closing report is needed.

Joe reviewed some information about the classifications of probate property and non-probate property, broken down into real and personal property categories.

Carrie's \$4,000 checking account and the \$350 he found in her apartment would count in the personal property of her probate estate.

and Tribal Consistency Fund (LATCF) payments. These funds were also provided under a provision of the American Rescue Plan Act.

The county has already received the first half of the LATCF money, with the remaining to be received in 2023.

The commission plans to utilize those funds as follows:

• \$500,000 toward the courthouse annex building.

• \$7 million toward building a new 911/EMS building near the hospital

• \$40,000 toward establishing a drug dog unit in the Sheriff's Department, pro-

vided the Sheriff wants to do that.

Since there are no limitations on how a county spends LATCF funds, the commission intends to keep the remaining \$45,767.80 as a reserve in the county's general fund.

• asked Commissioner John Rebinski to obtain estimates of the cost to prepare the site for the new 911/EMS building – which is the cost to level the ground and clear any trees that need to be removed.





Preserving Pocahontas

Camp Seneca – Winter 1935



CAMP SENECA (S 51), built by the Civilian Conservation Corps, was located in Seneca State Forest between Huntersville and Dunmore near the present forest headquarters. The camp was established in June 1933 and closed in June of 1938. This aerial view shows the barracks on the left, administration buildings and the water tank in the center, and the road leading off the main highway. The Superintendent was R. W Griffith. The project was under the supervision of the W. Va. Conservation Commission and the U.S. Forest Service. Between the years 1934 to 1937 picnic areas, eight cabins, and the dam that formed Seneca Lake were completed. The recreation facilities opened to the public in 1937 and by 1938 Seneca was reported to have the largest game population of any similar area in the state. 



Capuchin monkeys will rub crushed millipedes onto their fur. Millipedes contain benzoquinone that repels insects and reduces topical bacterial and fungal infections.

If you are one of those lucky people who spends time with our canine buddies, you no doubt have noticed that they often eat grass. There are a number of theories on why they do this, ranging from dietary supplementation to the need to regurgitate.

There is no scientific consensus yet on why dogs eat grass, but most scientists feel that the behavior is instinctual rather than learned.




