## SUPPORT LOCAL **FARMER'S MARKETS**

October is the last month of the farmer's market season where locally grown fruits, vegetables, meats, eggs, honey and even homemade breads are for sale. Some farmer's markets have craft vendors too so you never know what useful handmade, not just food, items you may find for sale, perhaps a gift for yourself or for someone on your Christmas list. So, stop pulling weeds, take a break and go out to your local market. There will be less vendors in October, but there is still plenty of ripe tasty garden produce includ-

ing vegetables that store well for winter like butternut and acorn squash, potatoes, garlic, and onions plus some frost sensitives like tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, greens, zucchini and patty pan summer squashes because many of the vendors have greenhouses. Some markets also have musicians performing and craft activities for children. The most amazing thing is that many things taste so much more flavorful when picked ripe ready to eat rather than shipped to WV from California or South America. This makes me wonder if the tomatoes at the grocery stores are plastic or

cardboard spraypainted red or if the celery is just light green crunchy Styrofoam.

The West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine's Center for Rural Community Health (WV-SOM CRCH) through the Greenbrier County Health Alliance provides grant money for lower income seniors to receive coupons to use just like cash at the Alderson farmer's market. There are Healthy Senior Market Basket coupons for baked goods like breads and local honey or syrups. Plus, Senior Savings coupons for meats and eggs. Inquire early in the season next year at the manager's table at the Alderson farmer's market where you will be spending them. The Alderson market even has Carrot Club coupons in the summer for children to get fruits and vegetables, a brilliant idea for training children to eat real food! Also, by early summer, check at your county's Committee on Aging for WV Dept. of Agriculture coupons usable at all the farmer's markets with approved vendors for fresh vegetables, fruits and honey. All these coupons add up to a ton of produce at no cost to us older citizens from local growers and lots of delicious, nutritious healthy eating! These programs are all about the fact that what you eat greatly affects your health, wellbeing, body weight, longevity and basic wellness. This is better than feeling sluggish and dull mentally from all those processed, chemically laden, sugared and salted up items labeled as food at stores. Take the time to cook real food, eat well and stay vital. Call your local town hall or check Facebook pages or Hashtag calendar to confirm the day of the week, time and location of the markets which are generally located on the main street in a town near you.



## The Lunch Box

I recently had the opportunity to talk with Erin Lovell about her journey to opening up The Lunch Box and The Cake box in downtown White Sulphur Springs. She previously owned B Sweet but decided it was time for a change. Therefore, she completely changed courses in 2019 and started a soap and skin care business, Sweet Cedars, with her daughter Sophie Bowes. They remodeled, opened, and then had to close after just two days due to COVID lockdown. During this time, the company went viral, and they started shipping merchandise all over the country. It became a massive success. Then, around this time last year, the shop was getting inundated with people looking for a bite to eat. The brewery had closed, and it was hard for people to find a place to just grab a quick sandwich. When it was open, B Sweet had a small lunch menu that consisted of soups and sandwiches. Erin said "I started thinking that I'd like to open something like that back up, but I thought my daughter would think I was crazy. I couldn't stop thinking about it. After a few weeks or so I mentioned it to her, and she said that she wanted to do it!" Erin already owned the building that housed the lab for Sweet Cedars. They had a space, and they had a plan. They officially opened their doors about one month later. Because of the following they had built up over the years between B Sweet and Sweet Cedars, The Lunch Box was slammed from the start. Sweet Cedars was also going strong, but their hearts were no longer in it, at least not in the way that their hearts were in food and beverage. For those of you who don't know that food and beverage feeling...it's a certain kind of passion inside you.

They found a buyer for the soap and skin care company and focused on The Lunch Box, then people started asking about cakes. It was the impetus they needed to turn the place into what it is today: sister companies The Cake Box and The Lunch Box, with a full commercial kitchen in between. The Cake Box is in front, and The Lunch Box is in the back. They brilliantly put a big metal handle on the roof of the back building, so it even looks like a lunch box! The Lunch Box menu features a wonderful selection of soups, sandwiches, salads, and ice-cold drinks. Only take-out is available but there are tables outside if anyone would like to eat there. The Cake Box is filled with gorgeous and delicious confections.

The plan is for Sophie and her boyfriend Nolin Cox to eventually take over The Lunch Box. Erin admits that she has been hard on them since the beginning. It takes a lot of hard work, determination, and creativity to run a successful food and beverage business. While Erin has been 100% in charge from the start, they are now taking on more and more responsibilities. When Sophie and Nolin do assume control of The Lunch Box, The Cake Box will turn into Erin's cake


## FROM THE EDITOR



# Visit the Greenbrier River Trail for a relaxing "Cowboy Breakfast" and enjoy a slice of bacon with the delightful Greenbrier Goats



The Greenbrier Goat is not only the first pack goat trekking company in West Virginia but also on the East coast. The owner and guide of the Greenbrier Goat, Aaron Coleman, told Hashtag; after moving back to the family farm in Greenbrier County, he explored many different agricultural opportunities in the area. A family member raises female goats for dairy, but males are typically sent to a slaughterhouse. After careful consideration and research, Aaron decided to give male goats a home and start pack goat trekking.

"We turned the agricultural opportunity something that is agritourism," said Aaron, "We have done something special in creating a new experience, sponsibly, while working with Forestry Department and their guidelines as the pack goats travel the Greenbrier River Trail." He emphasized his love for nature and the outdoors, finding purpose as the leader of the Greenbrier Goat.

The Pack consists of three Alpine pack goats who are well trained, responsive to command, and gentle. They are each named after famous Vikings in history, Ragnar being the lead pack goat, just one step behind Aaron; Athelstan in the middle, and "Floki the Follower" who brings up the rear. Weighing around 230 pounds, each pack goat carries approximately 45 pounds of gear. Special saddles and packs properly distribute the

weight and keep it off their spine to ensure that everyone can safely enjoy more time on the trail. One pack always holds a First Aid Kit, in case of an emergency.

To show appreciation of the community's support and kindness, The Greenbrier Goat will host Bacon Days, a free all-weather, pack goat meet-and-greet event at the Greenbrier Goat Trail Shelter. Visitors can meet the goats and enjoy a cowboy breakfast featuring delicious bacon from Swift Level, cooked over the campfire along with

a hot cup of coffee or a bottle of water. Fresh pressed apple cider will also be available for children.

While indulging in a unique experience along the trail, do not forget to snap a photo with the goats and feed Floki an apple from Aaron's ample supply. He believes this event will foster community connections while promoting the enjoyment of nature. The Greenbrier

Goat trail camp is located a short walk from Spring Creek at mile marker 22.5. Aaron stated he wanted to make the trip to the trailhead safe and quick, as they care about their trail guests. Look for barrels along Route 219 marked with The Greenbrier Goat logo to find the location. The event will take place every Saturday in October from 8 a.m. until 2 p.m. Do not miss your

chance to meet the Greenbrier Goat pack!

#### What do you do as an artist?

Over the last seven years, she has show-cased her work at the Tamarack and has been recognized in the annual WV DNR Wildlife Calendar Competition multiple times. Her art has also been displayed at the Greenbrier Visitors Center, and she occasionally sells pieces directly from her home. Also, having been a proud member of the Greenbrier Artist Group for about 15 years, she looks forward to celebrating their 50th anniversary on October 4.

#### What made you decide to become an artist?

Art has always been a part of Shelby's life.

Growing up as the middle child among five siblings, she found passion in creativity and watching others paint. Shelby began painting, coloring and competing in art contests at a very young age. Early achievements, such as winning her first blue ribbon in second grade, fueled her enthusiasm for art. She quickly began selling her artwork at fairs and festivals, gaining recognition along the way. She then began selling her art at fairs and festivals and won many more ribbons. When in school, she also helped with art for school plays and events such as prom.

#### Do you have any advice for aspiring artists?



## **UNPLUGGED: KIT LINDSEY**

Kit Lindsey grew up in Landrum, South Carolina, and moved to Lewisburg a few years ago. She often visited Greenbrier County before relocating to the area and fell in love with it. Kit explained that Lewisburg has a similar feel to her hometown and is as close to home as possible. She informed Hashtag that she was raised in a musically inclined household and has been singing her whole life. At four years old, she joined the adult choir at her local church, and by the age of 17, she began performing musical theatre in Spartanburg, South Carolina, where she attended college.


#### What do you do, musically?

Kit is a singer and songwriter who picked up the guitar two years ago. She performs an interesting blend of genres from her musical past, including Bluegrass, Classic Country, and Folk, and consolidates them into cohesive pieces.

Kit credits her parents for her musical talent; her late father used music as a form of praise throughout his life. She expressed immense gratitude for her dad, who encouraged and supported her dream of becoming a musician. Her mother played the piano, and her father



#### What draws you to music?

Kit stated that she needs music to express her feelings, and it has been valuable during her lowest moments. "Music is a vehicle to connect people," she said. "Knowing someone has gone through the same hardships helps you overcome them." She added that music doesn't always have to be about positive experiences; it can also provide solace to those who feel alone. Kit writes the lyrics for each song first, as she believes people look for a story in music. According to her, there is a profound message in music, and its beauty lies in that.

#### Do you have an idol?

Kit told Hashtag that her biggest influence is Bonnie Raitt, the American blues rock singer. Sierra Farnell is also one of her favorites. as she has watched her grow as a musician and inspires Kit to continue advancing her career. She mentioned her friend Tucker and the blog Country Chord, of which she has been included in multiple times, has been incredibly supportive and generous. Kit hopes to someday extend a helping hand to new artists in the same way Tucker has helped her.

### Do you have any advice for aspiring musicians?

Though she considers herself an aspiring musician, Kit advises other aspiring musicians to play music with others and treat people with kindness. She emphasizes the importance of networking in a musical career. "It's hard for me to think of music as a business because I rely on it so much; I can't imagine life without it. It's intrinsic to human nature," she said. "But it's all about opportunity." Kit

never realized the significance of the business side of the industry until she began working in a development position with Carnegie Hall, where she learned understanding the booking side of music is essential for success. She also noted that there will be criticism of your music, regardless of its quality. People may express dislike,

but it's important to acknowledge everyone's effort and worth.

#### Do you have any albums out?

So far, Kit has released a few singles but plans to record a debut album in Nashville soon, featuring a compilation of childhood experiences, humorous songs, one true bluegrass song, and much more.

Kit has performed many shows over the years in various locations, including Tennessee, South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia, and of course, West Virginia. She complimented West Virginia residents for their love of music, deep appreciation for it, and respectful nature. "What more could an artist ask for?" she said.

## MOUNTAIN STAGE WITH HOST KATHY MATTEA KICK OFF CARNEGIE HALL'S MAINSTAGE PERFORMANCE SERIES SUN-DAY, OCTOBER 6

Carnegie Hall begins its 41st Mainstage Season on Sunday, October 6, at 7 p.m. with Mountain Stage with host Kathy Mattea. Guests are invited to come early for the free Mainstage Lounge Preshow Reception from 6-6:45 p.m. in the Board Room located adjacent to the Hamilton Auditorium. A cash bar and snacks are available.

Host Kathy Mattea will welcome guest artists American Patchwork Quartet, Kyshona, The Brother Brothers, Stephanie Lambring, and more. Attendees will be a part of Mountain Stage's live radio audience as they record a new episode for NPR Music.

Mountain Stage has been known as the home of live music on public radio for 40 years, growing to be a household name and a bucket list event for many musicians and live music fans from around the world.

The show was created by Andy Ridenour, Larry Groce, and the late Francis Fisher and began regular production in December 1983. All three of the show's founders continued in their original roles until 2011 when Executive Producer Ridenour retired after 28 years, passing his role down to Adam Harris, who began his tenure with the program as an intern in 2005. The show continues to grow each year, and in 2021, long-time host Larry Groce passed the hosting baton to West Virginia native, country music star, and Grammy-award-winning musician Kathy Mattea. Larry Groce continues in his role as Artistic Director.

"Over the years, Mountain Stage has garnered respect and support from the artists they've championed, and it's a privilege and an honor to keep this train going and give Larry some much-deserved time off," said host Kathy Mattea.

For four decades, Mountain Stage has been West Virginia's calling card to the world and has reached hundreds of thousands of people around the globe with live music from the Mountain State. Produced by West Virginia Public Broadcasting and distributed by NPR Music, each two-hour episode of Mountain Stage can be heard every week on over 290 stations across America, and around the world via NPR Music and mountainstage.org.

With an average annual production of 24 live events with over 110 guest artists, Mountain Stage has grown from a state-wide, regional music ex-

perience to a showcase of world-renowned talent. Today the show features performances from seasoned legends like Bela Fleck and Patti Smith and emerging stars like Tyler Childers and Sierra Ferrell in genres ranging from folk, blues, and country to indie rock, synth pop, world music, alternative, and beyond. In addition, international acts regularly perform—in 2022, 11 guest artists traveled from Ireland, Haiti, Columbia, Canada, and Italy.

Most shows are recorded at the Culture Center Theater in Charleston, West Virginia; however, Mountain Stage has traveled to New York, NY; Boston, MA; Philadelphia, PA; Ann Arbor, MI; Ashland, KY; Athens, GA; Athens, OH; Bristol, TN/VA; Winnipeg Folk Festival (Canada), Lexington, KY; Pittsburgh, PA; Kerrville Folk Festival (TX); Harrisonburg, VA; Fairbanks, AK; Pittsburg, KS; Glasgow, Scotland; and many more venues throughout West Virginia.

Currently, there are a limited number of tickets available to the performance. Tickets start at \$35/ adult and \$20/student, and discounts are available for Carnegie Hall members, students, senior citizens, and military.



# Going Wild: The Hunting Dad

October is upon us!

It is the season of harvest and Halloween costumes. Cutting hay and cutting class.

Oh... and hunting.

For me, hunting season is a season of acceptance, season of truth, season of chasing the wild in myself, and a season to process what is uncovered.

In West Virginia, we are fortunate to have incredible youth hunting opportunities that start in October. As a conservationist and as an educator, I have a profound respect for the teachers and parents out there that seek to guide and educate our next generation of conservationists and hunters. With a shared commitment to ethics and sustainability, we can help the next generation of youth protect our natural resources.

Today, I got on a golf cart and cruised around the woods with my friend George Altizer- someone I am going to embarrass by calling 'The Hunting Dad'.

I asked him a few questions about raising two bada\*\* female hunters, ethical hunting practices, his October hunting tactics... oh and we found some edible mushrooms!

Hey George.

I rolled up on your property today as you were sighting in your bow. You seem to shoot a lot. Talk me through your thought process. How is that important for the young hunter?

It's a matter of ethics and preparation. The most important thing is an ethical hunt. Make sure your equipment is sighted in and keep your body ready for the shot- that includes preparing with your young hunter. When the time comes that you or the child may harvest an animal, you are ensuring an ethical hunt.

You and I spent this afternoon scouting and tracking around the mountain-just trying to figure out what sign might lead us to deer. What observations have you made?

This year, the white oak acorns are dropping early. It's a heavier mast than usual. The more mast, the more deer you find. Same with bear, turkey, etc. But you need to know where to look. This year, September seems to be the new October. The acorns have been dropping early. There

is a drought, and it is influencing deer patterns. If you scout and track, the deer will tell you where to hunt.

Over the years, I have introduced kids to the world of hunting by way of squirrel hunting. I know you grew up doing the same. Share with us a few tips for an adult taking a kid out on their first squirrel hunt.

Simple: find the tree that they're cutting on. Most of it is hickory at this time of year. Find the hickory trees. Early in the morning or right before dark are the best times to catch squirrels cutting. My personal preference is to wait for a couple frosts before I hunt squirrels- easier to find them through the leaves, and less likely to come across warbles.

Turkey season is another great opportunity to bring a kid out hunting. I've seen both of your daughters get their first turkeys in the Fall. In fact, you helped me get my first Fall turkey way back when. What are some of your Fall turkey tactics?

When the season first comes in, I'm looking for scratching, try to find out where the turkeys are feeding the most, try to set up a blind before they've been

moved to another area. They'll use up an area quickly before moving on (laughs). The "fastest with the mostest" is the name of the game.

Trail Cameras help a lot with that. You see them come in one day you almost have to beat feet to the spot. They'll be back, but not forever. You've got a day or two maybe to cash in on that.

You and Sharon raised two girls- one is in collegiate athletics and the other competed for Miss West Virginia this year. They are now off to college, but they come home every Fall to pursue the next hunt with you. You've instilled the love of the outdoors in your kids and it's beautiful to see. What advice would you give other parents?

If you are a mom or dad who wants to take their kids out hunting: Get your kids out in the woods. Hunt as often as you can. They won't be kids for very long. I feel blessed with two young girls that love to hunt. They're both in college now, so they

don't get to hunt and fish with Daddy as much as they used to but whenever they get the chance, they're eager to come in and hunt.

It all falls back on this: if you teach your kids to hunt, you don't have to hunt for your kids. Keep that in mind that your children don't have to hunt deer or squirrels. Teach them to forage for mushrooms, plants, whatever. Just get them in the woods.

By the way, George, look over there...

(As George finished his sentence, we drove by a beautiful chicken-of-the-woods mushroom on a rotted oak tree. It was a fitting end to our golf cart chat.)

West Virginia is a truly incredible state for hunting opportunities- especially for kids. There are youth-specific seasons starting as early as this month. See the WV DNR website for dates & regulations.




