## Treasured Traditions Continue for Generations Young and Old at TMF

For 51 weeks a year, a main committee, a plethora of subcommittees, a thin line of volunteers, and others who support the Treasure Mountain Festival labor tirelessly. They form plans, debate maintaining some traditions while starting new ones, raise money, and figure out how to turn 51 weeks of hard effort into four days of fun for all.

Many worried as rain fell on and off all week that it might interrupt the festivities.

A number of local non-profits and service organizations see TMF as one of their big fundraisers of the year. The South Fork Ruritan holds a regular pork and beef barbeque with all the fixings. Meanwhile, just a few blocks away, the Pendleton County Library transformed their lower floor into a huge bookstore.

The Friends of the Library receives donations of books all year long for both the library and book sale fundraisers. On Thursday, book buyers swarmed the sale for great deals on any non fiction subject, plus fiction and children's books.

All funds go to the library itself. Proceeds from TMF sales will go to in part to support the summer kids reading program in 2025.

Others saw TMF as an opportunity to showcase a new busi-

ness. Sofia Wayne received use of a conference room in the community building. She provided a place for kids and parents to cool off inside while showing off her business.

Wayne said, "We're just getting the kinks worked out" in her business, called Party In a Flash Rentals. She explained that at TMF there were very few things for small children to do. Her business sets up a huge play area with an inflatable castle, a small fence to keep toddlers from roaming free, and lots of balls.

Others took the time to show off their artistry. The Sew and Sews Quilt Guild held both a show and a contest. The main room of the community building was decked out in hanging homemade quilts.

Those who stopped in could see quiltmakers busy at work assembling their art. Also, as guild member Pam Sexton from South Carolina explained, they put together a "challenge display."

Each member who took on the challenge received four pieces of fabric and the assignment of a log cabin theme.

Across town, Katie and Jared VanMeter played their roles to perfection. They hosted the traditional tea room at the Historic McCoy House, a pre-Civil War mansion located across from the

courthouse. During the past year, they have poured their effort and talent into restoring the home into its original condition as closely as possible.

Design and history are the VanMeter's art and they both donned period costumes to entertain guests and give them a sample of Pendleton County's old fashioned traditions.

The traditions of neighborly assistance also involved the Pendleton County Sheriff's Department. On Saturday, they reported the possible theft of "a full body coyote mount and mule deer shoulder mount" from the vendor area near the helipad.

Fortunately, no one stole the items. A helpful citizen moved them under cover when weather threatened. Again, this exemplifies the best traditions of Pendleton County and Franklin – neighbor helping neighbor.

On Sunday, the final events occurred and ended, vendors moved on to the next festival as the smoke cleared from the re-enactment of the burning of Fort Seybert.

And a lot of bellies were filled with amazing food.

Very soon, the Treasure Mountain Festival committee and subcommittees will meet again, discussing what went right, what went wrong, and how to make the 2025 version even better, thus carrying on the tradition for coming generations.

The deserving men and women who individually made so many sacrifices for this country were presented with Comforters of Valor. As Patty Sickler read each name, the veteran stepped forward to be presented a small token of appreciation for their service to Pendleton County and the United States of America.

"In 2017 the Sew and Sews Quilt Guild of about 30 members decided to start a project to honor the military veterans living in or from Pendleton County. Members try to visit and present a one-of-a-kind Comforter of Valor to each veteran," commented Elizabeth Mitchell, committee chairperson.

The ladies in the guild gather to piece the tops together, sew them, knot the comforters and add the labels. One comforter is often the work of several women. Currently, 360 heroes have been honored with a Comforter of Valor.

"We want to thank all the veterans that we have had the pleasure of meeting. You truly have been a hero to give your time and to serve our country by protecting our values and freedom," said Jamey Wimer, Sew and Sews Quilt Guild president. "In one of the many thank you notes that we have received, one of the veterans shared this quote: 'To be born free is an accident, To live free is a privilege, To die free is a responsibility.'"

## County Commissioners Report Progress After Quiet Zone Meeting

With Starlink now cooperating with the National Science Foundation on creating dead spots and areas of reduced internet capacity, momentum has picked up on organizing local officials to support affected areas receiving waivers, funding, or outright dissolution of the zone.

Pendleton County's commissioners have reached out to their colleagues in other counties, as well as emergency management and economic development officials, to provide resolutions and documents of support for ways to either mitigate or end the National Radio Quiet Zone.

Roger Dahmer, Pendleton County commissioner, opened the meeting with the traditional invocation, in which he prayed, "We just praise You Lord" while thanking God for the beneficial rains soaking the area.

Carl Hevener, Pendleton County Commission president, shared that he and Dahmer attended a meeting in Elkins along with other county government officials affected by the Quiet Zone. Jimmie Bennett was ill and could not join his fellow commissioners. Bruce Minor accompanied the Pendleton County contingent to the meeting, which also included all Randolph County commissioners, county emergency management officials, and a field representative from the office of United States Senator Joe Manchin.

Hevener said, "I didn't realize that it affects Randolph County as much as it does," sharing that towers in Harman, Valley Head, and elsewhere face similar restrictions as some serving Pendleton County. He added that Pocahontas County officials may take a more accommodating line with the NSF, putting a priority on maintaining good relations with them.

Dahmer added, "It was a very productive meeting. It was well worth getting everyone together." Hevener shared that he would next reach out to county officials in Grant and Hardy to see if they will also pass the same

resolution as Pendleton, Upshur, Webster, and Tucker.

Karen Pitsenbarger, Pendleton County administrator, delivered reports on different structural issues that have developed in the county courthouse. First, she shared that she had not yet heard from a structural engineer tasked with examining the cracks in the first story floor. The new storage shed for salt and tools was also installed.

Pitsenbarger then informed the commissioners that the recently constructed ramp had problems with the slope and other features. She explained that the company that constructed it wished to repair it piecemeal, but Pitsenbarger stated, "I would prefer . . . that they rip it out and start over."

She said, "If you start cutting a piece here and a piece there," that it could compromise the entire ramp. Hevener stated that "we need to be in the decision-making, not just (the contractors) telling us what they're going to do."

Construction may begin soon. When it does, likely the metal detector and public entrance will temporarily move to the rear of the building.

Also related to courthouse construction Pitsenbarger told the commissioners that "we got the letter of conditions from USDA for you to sign so we can get our money." This represented the final step in obtaining financing for the construction of the courthouse annex.

Bradley Kimble, Pendleton County Sheriff, presented the commission with the names of two people under consideration for part-time security positions at the courthouse.

Finally, Mike Alt, Pendleton County Emergency Rescue Training Officer, discussed upcoming mental health training. The trainings will take place on Nov. 15, 16, and 17 at the community building in Franklin. The training is for fire, EMS, and other first responders. It will run from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and involve Potomac Highlands Guild.

"Anyone who wants to attend, let us know," said Alt.

## Attendance Focus Paying Off For Pendleton County Schools

The Pendleton County Board of Education convened its second regular meeting of the month last week. To mark the second day of welcomed precipitation, J. D. Wilkins, board president, included in his invocation "thank You for the rains . . . may they gently come."

Charles Hedrick, Pendleton County Schools superintendent, addressed the threats of violence that rocked 44 counties in the state. Other school systems across the nation saw the same problems. Fifteen arrests have been made so far and the

incidents are being investigated by both the United States Department of Homeland Security and the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Pendleton County was not specifically mentioned in the series of threats.

Late in the meeting, but with the topic high on the board's list of priorities, Carrie Nesselrodt, director of student services, delivered the attendance report for the first month of school.

Hedrick shared that research confirms that a system must "improve attendance to improve academics." He went on to say

A 1978 graduate of Franklin High School, Mr. Simmons had worked at B&H Hardware, did construction work and was a retail sales clerk at Franklin IGA.

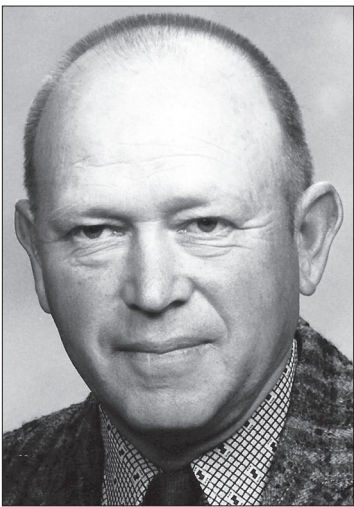

## Pendleton County to Establish New Sports Tradition with Wrestling Squad

In the history of the West Virginia State Wrestling Tournament, one county and all of its former and current high schools form a glaring omission. Not one high school wrestler from Pendleton County has ever competed in it.

Athletic accolades have come a plenty in other sports, but wrestling has not served as a major part of area sports traditions – until now.

The idea to form a wrestling program for middle and high school students “started with my father,” says Jacqueline Propst, athletic director for Pendleton County Middle/High School. He competed almost 50 years ago.

Another prompt to Propst came from her nephew. “He plays football, but not basketball,” she said, adding that “he wanted another off-season sport.”

For those who love competing in wrestling or others seeking to stay in shape during the winter by competing in another sport, Pendleton County will have a wrestling squad this season.

Wrestling has a strong history in the Potomac Highlands. Keyser and Petersburg have fared well over the decades, while Moorefield has enjoyed success more recently.

Propst explained that one of the allures of wrestling lies in the lack of a tryout. Unlike basketball, which has a limited number of roster positions, athletes get on the team to battle for the privilege of wrestling in a match and representing the school.

## Wildcats Stumble Against Cougars, Win Silver in Weekend Tournament

After a tightly scheduled series of games to open the season, Wildcat volleyball faced a relatively light two weeks where they took wins over Highland County, Virginia, and Tygarts Valley. Neither team pushed Pendleton County competitively, although both had shown improvement over 2023.

Last Thursday, however, the Wildcats brought a number one state ranking into Baker to face the always strong East Hardy Cougars. East Hardy consistently brings strength and athleticism to any contest in any sport in any season. The state tournament qualifiers last season played their absolute best against the Wildcats and took the game in three sets.

Next, Pendleton County traveled to Greenbrier County to compete in a major tournament that invited teams of all sizes from every part of the state.

Compared to East Hardy, the Wildcats' next opponent in some ways looks like a quad A Goliath versus a single A David. Capital High School, nearing its fourth decade of existence after Stonewall Jackson and Charleston High schools consolidated, was at one time expected to dominate across the board in sports.

That did not happen. Capital brought only two wins into the tournament. They eked out a tie with the Wildcats in the first game of the tournament for Pendleton County. Notably, they lost two sets to one earlier this month against the single A top tier team, the Buffalo Bison.

Bluefield, with a one and nine record, came up next for the Wildcats, who easily dispatched them in two sets.

In the third game, Pendleton County took on likely their toughest opponent of the year. Class AAA Greenbrier East, after last weekend, holds a gaudy 18-8-2 record. Like Pendleton County, they tied Capital, but earlier in the season easily dispatched mutual opponent Moorefield two sets to none. The host team defeated the Wildcats two sets to one, putting Pendleton County in the silver bracket.

During the next two games, Pendleton County defeated Pike View and Princeton each two sets to none to set up a silver championship game against Wyoming East. The Warriors won 15

Corbin Dove had two catches for 43 yards while Travis Owens had a breakout game, hauling in three passes for 64 yards. Harvey caught one pass for 21 yards while Britton Lough had a 21-yard catch and a touchdown.

Seventeen different players recorded at least one tackle with Will Smith leading the count with seven. Liam Simmons and Ty Heavner each recorded a sack.

The Wildcats will use their open date this week to prepare for an apparently fully relocated Tucker County on Oct. 4, which will be homecoming. The Mountain Lions have gorged on lower ranked teams, with the exception of a 20-7 win over East Hardy.

Pendleton County and its three wins against one loss record will serve as their first true test of the season.

that “it certainly makes sense, but the data shows it.” He explained that attendance would remain a top priority.

Nesselrodt’s overall assessment started with “it’s going pretty good,” then focused on the improvement shown by North Fork Elementary, saying they “have a really great attendance percentage” and adding that “they’ve been working very hard to boost attendance.”

Boosting attendance involves each school developing its own attendance plan. Nesselrodt explained that these plans will “address attendance at different levels of support. All students occupy one of three tiers. Tier one includes the vast majority of students who present few or no challenges. They can thrive in a traditional classroom setting. Tier two includes students who occasionally present problems while tier three has students who present the highest level of challenges in a classroom setting.

Nesselrodt then showed the breakdown of attendance percentages for each school and grade. The county as a whole enjoyed

94.912 percent attendance. Brandywine Elementary School took top attendance honors for schools with 96.174 percent. BES first grade had an astonishing 99.772 percent. Across the county, second grade scored best with a 97.671 percent attendance score.

The board approved signing a memorandum of understanding with Davis and Elkins University to continue the Upward Bound program. Hedrick shared that the program “initially started in 1997 or 98. Wilkins added, “It’s been beneficial to a lot of our kids.”

Upward Bound assists certain groups of high school students in finding better opportunities to attend college.

J. P Mowery delivered the financial and treasurer’s reports which once again reaffirmed the strong financial basis for the county school system. Although a revenue stream related to COVID funding ends, the school system has spent responsibly and sits in a good position as those funds dry up.







## Archery Season Opens Saturday

Gov. Jim Justice reminds hunters to prepare for archery and crossbow seasons for white-tailed deer and black bear, which will open on Saturday.

Hunters are encouraged to purchase their license and stamps at WVhunt.com before the seasons start.

"With the start of archery and crossbow seasons, West Virginia's fall beauty will be on full display, giving hunters the perfect opportunity to experience the thrill of the outdoors," Justice said. "I encourage everyone to get their licenses early and make the most of this incredibly exciting season. As a lifelong outdoorsman, I can tell you this is one of my favorite times of the year."

Hunters may harvest one deer with a base license and up to two additional deer with a Class RB or RRB stamp. Resident landowners hunting on their own property and Class DT

license holders don't need to purchase additional stamps. In nine counties, hunters must harvest an antlerless deer before taking a second antlered deer. In archery-only counties (Logan, McDowell, Mingo and Wyoming), hunters may take up to two deer, with only one being antlered.

Hunters may take two bears annually if at least one is harvested in Boone, Fayette, Kanawha, Logan, McDowell, Mingo, Nicholas, Raleigh or Wyoming counties. The daily bag limit is one. A base license and Bear Damage Stamp (Class DS) are required for residents, while nonresidents also need a Bear Hunting License (Class EE), Conservation/Law Enforcement Stamp (CS/LE) or Class EE-L and a National Forest Stamp (Class I) if hunting on national forest lands

Hunters are also reminded that all big game must be tagged and electronically registered. Hunters harvesting two deer in one day do not need to check the first before taking the second.
