Governor's Updates

Hospital Surge Plans & Elective Procedures

During Monday's briefing, Gov. Jim Justice and state health experts announced that they have asked all hospitals and hospital systems across the state to re-evaluate the surge plans that they originally created several months ago, as part of the governor's West Virginia Strong--The Comeback re-opening initiative.

The updating will account for the recent increase in COVID-19 case numbers across West Virginia, and to consider temporarily reducing the number of elective medical procedures being performed.

"Our state health experts are genuinely concerned about the possibility of our hospitals becoming overrun if things get worse," said Justice. "Every day that we have these briefings, we are asked where we stand on hospital beds and where we stand on capacity.

"We've been in talks with the West Virginia Hospital Association and many of the state's hospitals, and we all believe that some level of reduction of elective surgeries may be needed to ensure that we will

This follows last week's announcement that pharmaceutical company Pfizer applied for the same authorization, and that its vaccine is expected to arrive in West Virginia in

have hospital space."

"This is accelerating all across the country and we're starting to see the first signs of that acceleration in West Virginia," said State coronavirus czar Dr. Clay Marsh.

"We are starting to see the first surge that we've seen in this state related to the hospitals. We will be able to maintain capacity at this moment, but what we see is that perhaps the worst days are still ahead of us as everybody goes inside.

"This morning, we had a call with the hospital association, our largest group of hospitals and hospital systems in the state, and what we agreed to was that each system has their surge plans, and so we asked them to update those to where we are now--looking at surgeries that will be done over the next 45 days or so as the initial time frame.

"Also, to look at not doing the kinds of surgeries that can be put off, or that aren't urgent or emergent, and to look at prioritizing, particularly, putting off those surgeries that require an inpatient stay that would take up a hospital bed.

"Each system will submit their plans for how they will do that through the hospital association, and we will then look at those plans to make sure that we are all communicating and helping each other out."

Covid-19 Case Numbers

Justice reported that the current number of active cases in the state has also reached a new record high of 16,787. The number of total patients hospitalized also hit a record high of 597, with 162 patients in the ICU.

The cumulative percent of positive cases is now 3.64%, up from 3.53% last Wednesday, and the highest such rate seen in West Virginia since Apr. 23.

As of Monday morning, the statewide rate of COVID-19 transmission--also known as Rt--was 1.00; tied for the 15th-best such rate of any state in the country.

West Virginia continues to outperform the national average--as well as the rates of all of its bordering states--in lowest percentage of population positive, and lowest percentage of positive test results.

Active Church-Related Outbreaks

West Virginia now has 21 active church-related outbreaks across 15 counties: Berkeley, Cabell, Fayette, Harrison, Jackson, Kanawha, Logan, Marion, Mingo, (Continued on Page 5)

1945, 75 years ago







Mr & Mrs Perry ¹
My Cousins

From a far off spot, on this quiet evening will you permit an old friend to breathe a few heart-felt wishes for the health & happiness of her two dear cousins, who so lately have stood at the Hymeneal alter & offered up their vows of love & constancy. Although she was not present on that happy occasion, yet her thoughts are often busy soaring over the wide expanse of hill & dale to that dear spot blessed by reciprocal love & esteem.

Harriet, on that day, when surrounded by those your heart held most dear, & you was gladdened with kind wishes & congratulations, did you once think of her, who would have given so much to have made one of that happy, assembled band?

I could have only asked one thought, such as you would have bestowed on an absent sister (for do I not love you as a sister?), one thought! Oh! How it would gladden me to know that you bestowed one thought, or perhaps that my name had passed once around that bright circle.

For Harriet, although I have long been away, yet I would not be entirely forgotten, but would be remembered as I shall ever remember you, with a true sisterly affection.

October 5th 1853

Brother Worthington

After the elapse of many months, I again appear before you in the form of a few brief lines. I have been looking for letter from home for several weeks, but parent Emmaleigh Carper custodian. have been disappointed. I have also been looking for Badgett, 5th grade; parent father, as I understood that he was going to Kanawha Melanie Degen, William ASPIRE: Julie Summers, [County].

I wonder if you have had cold weather on French Cr. for the last two days as we have here. We have had no frost here yet of any notice, but the fog has kept it off. The air is very cold, this evening especially, & on the bough hangs there sere and yellow leaf. Soon the trees will be bereft of their green foliage, & our lofty hills will look still taller & more sublime in the bareness & desolation around.

I had a very pleasant ride over some beautiful Drivers: Education, Mccountry last Monday & Tuesday. I was over to the little village California², in Jackson [County], at an exhibition. The town is most beautifully situate on an elevated plain, commanding the scenery for some distance around. I think of it as one of the most beautiful places I was ever in.

The exhibition was an animal & circus show. I Health; saw a woman in the show who weighed three hundred & forty pounds. Was born in Salem, Connecticutt. Was only eleven years old the 14th of last February. I staid over night in California. George was my pilot.

Our family are all well excepting Perry. He has been unwell for some time. Is much worse to night. He says he must go in to Glen[ville] along with George I can write and send those Christmas cards. Harriet was born in 1831 and died in 1887, buried at French Creek Presbyterian Cemetery. Harriet and Hubbard were married in 1853. Hubbard served in Co. E, 4th Reg. W.Va. Calvary, reenlisted in Co. M, 3rd W.Va. Calvary.

²California, village in Jackson County, Va. When Roane County formed in 1856, California became the county seat, later renamed Spencer.

³Sarah: possibly Sarah Marshall of Glenville, who married Robert A. Johnson in 1856; lived in Calhoun County.

⁴Squire Arnold: possibly James W. Arnold, who was interested in Amie, which was the reason for his visits. He was much older than Amie. She may have been flattered by his attention, but a relationship was unlikely. She did write a poem called "An Old Man's Darling."






