Savannah Cunningham Victorious In Four Events, Sets Three Records

After some members of the CCHS track and field team had been missing via basketball season and COVID-19 protocols, the squad was near full strength on Saturday in the Panther Invitational at Roane County High School.

With team members limited to four events in the sport, Calhoun junior Savannah Cunningham won all four of her competitions, and earned the “Girls High Point Award” with a perfect 40 points.

Having competed in only one previous meet this season, Cunningham won the 100-meter dash with a time of 13.6 seconds, .45 of a second ahead of her Roane

County opponent, as 15 runners competed from seven schools.

In her closest margin of victory, Cunningham made up three strides in the last 15 yards to edge out a Wayne County opponent in the 400-meter dash, with a time of 1 minute, 3.16 seconds, .09 in front of second place and 4.61 seconds ahead of third.

Her third competition of the day was in the 800-meter run, where she outlasted another Wayne County opponent, with a time of 2 minutes, 38.05 seconds, crossing the finish line 2.25 seconds ahead of second place.

Cunningham's last event was the demanding 3200-meter run (20 yards short of 2 miles), which came at the end of a long day. She turned in a time of 14 minutes, 11.17 seconds, 8.08 seconds ahead of her closest Braxton opponent.

According to CCHS sports historian Robert F. Bonar, three of Cunningham's timed-events were new school records, established in 2019, the school's previous season, since last year's was wiped out by the coronavirus.

The previous records in the three events were set by Cunningham when she was a freshman. Those records (along with the new times) are as follows: 100, 13.91 (13.6); 400, 1:4.91 (1:3.16); and 800, 2:44.68 (2:38.05). Her

2019 record in the 3200 is 13:13.76.

Dani Cunningham also helped the girls' team set a season high of 78 points, as she won the high jump (4 foot, 2 inches) and tied her own school record that she shares with five other athletes.

County Has 40 More Cases; 22% Of Total In Two Weeks

Calhoun County has registered another 40 coronavirus cases in the last week.

After hitting a daily high of 12 cases on May 12, the numbers went from 9, 5, 4, 2 to 1 through May 17, but the Dept. of Health and Human Resources reported seven additional cases on Tuesday morning.

The county's total since the pandemic began is now 366, which includes 81 in the past two weeks, 22.1 percent of its total cases.

COVID-19 cases in Calhoun and surrounding counties decreased from 185 last week to 135 in the past seven days.

Following Calhoun's

40 cases were: Clay, 36; Braxton, 21; Gilmer, 14; Ritchie, 12; Roane, 8; and Wirt, 4.

Calhoun had dropped to gold for one day on Monday, but returned to orange on the DHHR map on Tuesday, a color it had maintained since May 6.

At least for now, the county's 366 cases remains the lowest in the State, followed by Wirt, 428; Webster, 501; and Clay, 535.

The percent positive for

Calhoun is now at 5.09, down from 5.67, with infection rate at 44.21, the highest in West Virginia, up from 35.17 last week.

West Virginia cases on the year total 158,888, with 2,763 deaths, including 2,013 new cases and 29 deaths in the past week, compared to 2,324 cases and 39 deaths the previous week.

The United States had 232,092 new cases and 4,354 deaths in the last week.

Face Covering Requirement Lifted For Vaccinated Only

During Friday's briefing, Gov. Jim Justice outlined the CDC's recent announcement that anyone who is fully vaccinated can participate in indoor and outdoor activities without wearing a mask or physically distancing, regardless of crowd size.

The governor said that he would sign an executive order to immediately modify West Virginia's face covering requirement to follow the updated CDC guidance for fully vaccinated West Virginians.

“Our face covering requirement no longer applies to you, if you are fully vaccinated,” said Justice.

The governor emphasized that the lifting of the face covering requirement

only applies to those who have been fully vaccinated.

That means that at least two weeks have elapsed since the administration of a second dose of the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines, or that at least two weeks have elapsed since the administration of a first dose of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine.

The Statewide Indoor Face Covering Requirement is still in effect for all West Virginians who are not yet fully vaccinated, and will remain in effect for these individuals until Sunday, June 20.

Any private business or school system can still require individuals to wear a mask, regardless of the CDC's new guidelines.

Broadband Benefit Application Listed For State Residents

U.S. Sen. Joe Manchin has announced that applications are open for the \$3.2 billion Emergency Broadband Benefit Program.

Eligible West Virginians can apply to offset the cost of receiving broadband access at home during the COVID-19 pandemic, and can receive \$50 off their monthly internet bill and a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers.

“Expanding broadband access to all West Virginians continues to be a top priority for me, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic that

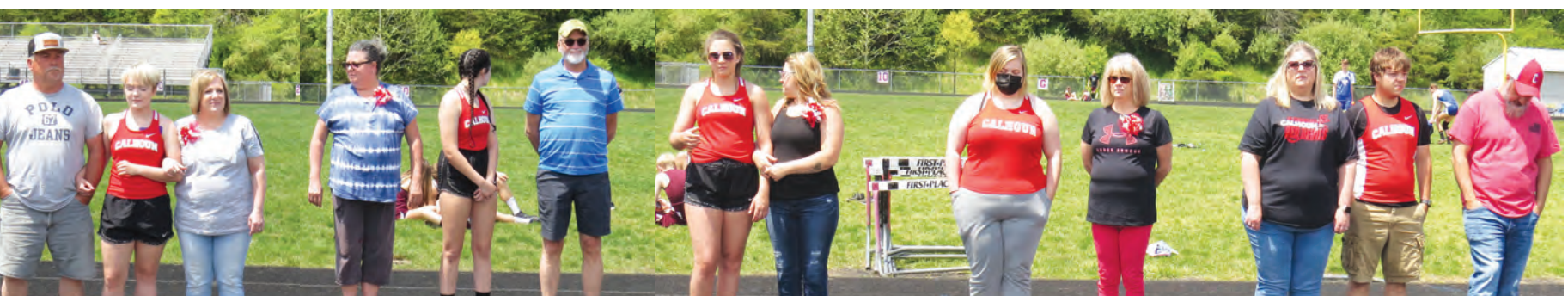
has shone a light on the necessity of broadband access in the 21st century,” said Manchin. “The Emergency Broadband Benefit Program will help West Virginians get connected during the pandemic, so they can complete their homework, apply for jobs, and attend telehealth appointments.”

“I encourage every eligible West Virginian to apply for the program, and my office will assist anyone who has questions about applying.”

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This Week In History

The following reports are taken from *The Calhoun Chronicle* archives:

1921, 100 years ago

Victor Hamilton, whose funeral was held here on Friday afternoon, was a son of the late John M. and Minnie Hamilton. He was born April 18, 1896, and was killed in France on July 22, 1918, at the age of 22 years.

On Apr. 30, 1917, 24 days after America's entering the then called European War, he enlisted in the U.S. Regular Army, and was assigned to the 28th Infantry Regiment of the First Division. On June 8, 1917, he sailed with the first contingent of American soldiers to France, prior to which he had been made corporal in a machine gun company. In October, his division moved into the Toul sector, being the first American unit to occupy a front line position. In the following May (1918), his outfit moved north where the Spring drives were beginning to rage.

On May 29, the world was thrilled with the news of America's first real engagement, when the 29th Infantry, supported by the machine gun company of which Victor was a member, marched into Cantigny. The American troops withstood the more serious counter-attack, and from then the First Division took its place by the side of seasoned veterans of France and England. The movements of this division, as well as of the others which had come from America, were swift, until on July 18 it held a sector from Soissons almost to Chateau-Thierry.

Four days later, on July 22, the battle was reaching the climax, and Germany had begun to sicken with the thought that perhaps, after all, a nation 3,000 miles away could halt their dreams of empire. A new feeling of security came to those who had fought against imperial domination, and the hope that civilization was not to be smothered was quickened.

On July 22, therefore, there was a complete reversal of the military situation. Death could not have fittingly ended Victor Hamilton's life until that condition had been brought about. In his usual vocations, he would not have left the field of action while the cause for which he fought was going backward. But on the 22nd, when the armies of righteousness were on the long, but certain march to victory, a machine gun bullet found its way to his heart. In the middle of a command to his squad while moving to an advanced position, the soul sped from its tenement of clay.

The task for which Victor Hamilton died was not completed that day. It was not completed on Nov. 11, when the armistice was signed, nor is it yet finished. The cause is old, but it will never be a complete realization so long as men place a higher value on material things than on eternal principles.

Those who live in merely a bickering sphere, more anxious to destroy than better a fellow man's condition, are not in touch with the things for which Victor died. He surrendered every obligation the world might have owed him. He tossed to the winds his ambition to a place in a profession. He gave his life and all that life held for him, that the things which make life worthwhile might remain for his friends. "Laid down his life for his friends."

Those who knew him are aware of the continuous effort he made to develop his intellect. He believed, with Emerson, that the world, after all, existed for education, and he got more satisfaction from learning a thing, than later from knowing it.

Courage was not to him a synonym of "boldness." Physical bravery was a superfluity if not necessitated by a moral cause, and did he ever find that he had committed an error, he deemed it more an act of courage to retrace his step, than to defiantly cling to his wrong.

He possessed the true independence that does not dare. He did not consider it necessary to be independent of the opinions of others than to be independent of his own prejudices. Independence to him meant freedom to accept or reject; a duty at all times, as well as a right. In a very great sense, Victor is not dead. It is true that his smile is gone and his voice is stilled, but the principles for which he so usefully lived and so nobly died are still among us, the things which he personified.

The funeral was conducted at the M.E. Church, South, on Friday afternoon by Rev. J. Smith Dye, pastor of the local Baptist Church, who drew from the life and death of the young man a most impressive lesson. A brief, but eloquent eulogy was spoken by Hon. Albert G. Mathews, superintendent of the Methodist Sunday School, and teacher of the class of which Victor was a faithful and consistent member. His remains were then borne by his comrades, members of the American Legion, to Bethlehem Cemetery, and deposited by those of his father and two brothers.

1946, 75 years ago

R.H. Marshall, game protector, calls attention to the following fishing laws:

Fishing Out of Season Prohibited, Article 6, Section 2, Chapter 20.

No person shall, in any county of this state, fish for, catch, take, kill, destroy in any manner, or have in his possession, and fish for other aquatic life, except during the open season fixed by the director for that county, or for the streams, as the case may be.

Art. 6, Sec. 5. No person shall kill, catch or attempt to kill or catch any fish at any time, by: The use of seines, nets or traps, or devices of like nature without the written permission of the director; Draining water out of any pool, pond or stream with intent to take or injure fish; The use of dynamite or any like explosive mixture; The use of a poisonous drug or substance; The use of electricity or lime; The use of firearms; Giggling, spearing, gaffing, or grappling, except the director may permit giggling of non-game fish in a stream under the supervision of a representative of the director, other during the months of April, May and June; Any other means other than by rod, line and hooks, with natural or artificial lures.

The provision of this section shall not prevent the director from using such methods of catching fish as he shall find necessary and proper for the purposes of propagation and protection.

CURIOSITY CORNER

Question: Why are people told to say "cheese" when having a picture taken? (Asked by an anonymous amateur photographer.)

Reply: Say cheese! And snap, a photo is taken of your smiling face. Saying cheese has been around for a long time. When saying cheese, articulation of the long "e" sound requires us to draw back our lips and show our teeth, hopefully in a pleasant smile. "Breeze" or "please" would also work, but "cheese" seems to have won out in popular usage.

Be careful! Don't give a cheesy grin when not having a picture taken. This implies insincerity.

Another common practice is for a photographer to tell a group of people to, "together, say one, two, three!" You get the long "e" for the grin, and if said in unison, everyone smiles at once.

Question: Dr. Wilson, I know what "point blank" or "point-blank range" means, but where does this phrase come from? (Asked by a curious hunter.)

Reply: Yep, point blank means you can't miss, and point-blank range means you are too close to the target to miss. This derives from archery, with "blank" coming from the French word "blanc," which means white. The target in archery at one time was often a piece of white cloth. It is believed that the "point" refers to the point or tip of an arrow about to be fired.

In aiming, if the point coincides with the target, it will be hit as long as it is within "point-blank range."

In ballistics, point-blank range is the distance between a firearm and a target, such that a bullet in flight is expected to strike the target without adjusting the elevation of the firearm.

In academics, point blank might mean a student didn't have a clue about a point being made. (I've seen a lot of point-blank expressions in class.)

1971, 50 years ago

Tom Gainer was the one lucky hunter in a party of five from Calhoun, bagging a wild turkey at Big Run in Pendleton County. The turkey weighed 15 lbs., 10 oz., and had a 9.5-inch beard.

The Welfare Dept. employee killed the turkey on Saturday, May 15, which happened to be his birthday.

This Week In West Virginia History

The following events happened from May 20-26 in West Virginia history. To read about West Virginia's people, history, places, science, arts and culture, visit www.wvencyclopedia.org.

May 20, 1949: Nick Joe Rahall II was born in Beckley. When he entered Congress in 1977, he was its youngest member.



May 21, 1853: William M.O. Dawson was born in Bloomington, Md., just across the Potomac River from what is now the Eastern Panhandle of West Virginia. He became the 12th governor of West Virginia.



May 22, 1947: Supreme Court Justice Margaret "Peggy" Workman was born in Charleston. In the election of November 1988, she became the first woman on the West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals and the first woman to be elected to statewide office in West Virginia.

May 23, 1862: In what became known as the Battle of Lewisburg, Union troops repelled a Confederate advance, killing 38 and wounding 66, while losing only 13 men.

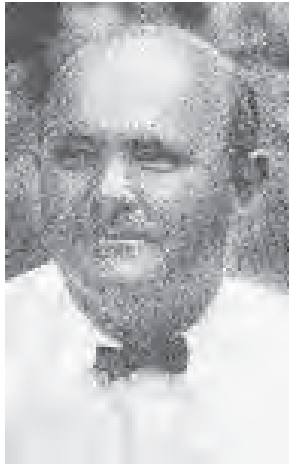


May 23, 1941: Rod Thorn was born in Princeton. He attended

West Virginia University, where he was an All-American guard. He has had an extended and distinguished career in the National Basketball Association.

May 24, 1896: Confederate Gen. John Echols died in Staunton, Va. He served in the Kanawha Valley in 1862 and commanded Confederate forces at their defeat at the Battle of Droop Mountain in November 1863.

May 25, 1903: Industrialist and philanthropist Bernard Patrick McDonough, Jr., was born in Texas, to an Irish railroading family. Starting with a Parkersburg construction business in the 1930s, he built a Fortune 500 company with operations in hand tools, building materials, and barge building. The Bernard P. McDonough Foundation remains one of the largest private foundations in West Virginia



May 25, 1937: William H. "Teepi" Kendrick died in Morgantown. He was a pioneer in West Virginia's 4-H program. He broadened the program to emphasize more than just agriculture, and he was primarily responsible for establishing the state 4-H camp at Jackson's Mill.



May 26, 1895: Athlete Ira Errett "Rat" Rodgers was born in Bethany. He was among the greatest Mountaineer football players, lettering in 1915-17 and 1919.

It is a great way to finish up the year.

Amie Sexton Silcott Letter Collection

Most of the writing is by Amie Evaline Sexton Silcott, who provides a history of the people and places in and around Calhoun County, Arnoldsburg in particular, during the mid-1800s.)

(Continued From Last Week)

Dr Chapman said if those things did not cure me he would try other remedies, & that the sooner I got help the better. I have for some time been taking bitters¹ three times a day. Brandy with cherry & dogwood bark & poplar bark, & now I have some Peruvian bark. I think the bitters benefit me, yet the doctor said it could not reach the disease.

I am afraid I am not going to endure warm weather very well, for when it is warm I feel much weaker. I would like to be at home, but Louisa says I shall not go now, that I have employed Dr Chapman, & he shall cure me if he can. If I do not get better before long, I think I will come home. I am becoming very anxious to see home, & all that my heart holds dear.

The children are enjoying themselves playing out of doors. Louisa is extremely kind, & so is Tom. Both are afraid I will do too much work, of which there is not a particle of danger.

I believe you half think I am going to marry Tom. What on earth could have put so wild an idea in your head? Not my nonsense I hope. I just write as I have been doing just for fun. Dont harbor the thought for a moment.

As to presents I guess I will take all I can get. That's his look out, not mine. I have been making him some shirts & as remuneration, I suppose, he brought me a very nice cashmere dress from the city, & a gold ring with nice sets of different colors.

We have got a little nice salt fish Tom brought over from California. Come to night & you shall have some supper. In great haste I have written. Dont be frightened as to my health. Please to write soon & often to your daughter.

Amie writes to her mother shortly before her 22nd birthday.

Arnoldsburg
May 21 1858
My Dear Mother

Your kind epistle of the 17th was received on the 19th, only one day intervening between the day it was written & the day it was received. I think Jack² a much better letter carrier than the one who weekly traverses the mail route.

I am sorry you appear so uneasy about my health. I think you are unnecessarily alarmed. Although I am feeble, & my health delicate, I am not so much as an invalid as you seem to think. And I feel quite well some days. I think my health is improving. I certainly feel much better than I did some time ago. I think I am able to go home, but Louisa does not wish me to until I get quite strong & well again.

I have no disease of which I am going to die of. It is not that, but the fear of never being healthy again, of always being delicate & unable to undergo any fatigue. I do not think I shall ever be stout, & perhaps never do much hard work or ever know perfect health again. Yet I may be as healthy as many other ladies, who are always rather delicate.

Do not be uneasy, I am sure you need not be. I think it would be very pleasant to be at home again, more pleasant to me than anywhere else. Yet I think I will not go at present. You need not any of you come for me. Perry can take me home any day, after the election, if I wish to go.

The election will be the 27 of this month. Perry & George have just rode down to G. Lynch's³. Elliot Hays⁴ staid here last night. I am taking some bitters which I think help me very much. And Perry says, when I get a little house of my own to take care of I will get well. I suppose he thinks it great encouragement to a girl to get a husband, but I am not partial to the sex.

I suppose Almira is in favor of marrying. What does she & Jack say about marrying, & when is the wedding to come off? Please state the particulars.

I should be very happy to see either Freeman or Worthington⁵. I do think some one of you might visit us. When I get settled down here I shall never forgive you all if you treat me as coolly as you do Louisa. F. or W. certainly might come. Or why couldn't you come Mother? I think you might. I suppose I may look to Jack to account for Almira's coming or staying.

I dont feel in the mood for writing this morning. I cannot think what I wish to write, & I believe my letter is about as long as yours was. The weather is pleasant but we have had a great deal of rain. Have you a good garden? & have you a prospect of fruit?

Tell all who enquire when I am coming home that whenever Jack & Almira's wedding comes off they might expect to see me. I don't know whether Louisa is going home soon or not. She declares sometimes her determination of going, yet I think things would go on here at a great rate if mistress were gone.

She would certainly come & make you a visit if she could easily leave. She says if she does not come home by the first of June, you must not look for her, but must come by yourself here in June, as you wrote once you would. She says you must keep your promise. I think June would be much the pleasantest time for you to come.

¹Bitters: Popular "medicine" at the time; mostly distilled liquor with herbs as a tonic.

²Jack: Robert Jackson Ball of Glenville. He worked at the post office in Glenville and was able to keep informed on the latest romances.

³G. Lynch: George Lynch, Jr., county surveyor of Calhoun County and close personal friend of Perry Hays. It is interesting to note that Lynch had daughters named Louisa, Amy and Almira.

⁴John Elliott Hays, brother of Perry; lawyer; lived on Little Kanawha above Glenville; died in 1892.

Financial Assistance Up To \$9,000 To Aid With COVID Burials

Too many American families have not only faced the ravages of COVID-19, they have also ended up needing to pay unexpected funeral expenses.

Under the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2021 and the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is providing financial assistance for COVID-19 related funeral expenses incurred after Jan. 20, 2020.

The person who paid the funeral expenses can be reimbursed through this new program.

The process for making a claim for funeral assistance funds from FEMA starts by calling a toll-free number. The general number is 844-684-6333. The TTY number is 800-462-7585. Hours of operation are Monday-Friday, 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.

Information for the funeral assistance application will be taken on the phone, and all follow up will be available through FEMA staff.

Sad to say, scammers have been contacting people and claiming to be able to help them get funeral assistance. Instead, their purpose is to cheat those needing reimbursement, and no money will be provided through the scammers. Only FEMA can handle these claims.

To be eligible for funeral assistance, the death must have occurred in the U.S., and the death certificate must indicate COVID-19 as a direct or indirect cause of death.

The official death certificate and documents proving the amounts spent must be made available to FEMA.

The individual making the claim must have paid the funeral and burial/cremation expenses with their own funds. A maximum of \$9,000 per death can be reimbursed through the program.

FEMA assistance cannot duplicate benefits received from prepaid funeral contracts, from burial or funeral insurance policies, or from financial assistance received from government agencies, voluntary agencies, or other sources.

However, proceeds from a life insurance policy, which was used to pay for funeral or burial/cremation costs, can be reimbursed.

Those approved for reimbursement of funeral expenses will either receive a check in the mail or a direct deposit into a financial account.

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School Update

Superintendent Kelli Whytsell announced on Wednesday, May 12, the return to in-person learning as follows:

--Students in grades 6-12, Friday, May 14, except for a few sixth graders still quarantined, who will return on the date given.

--Students in fifth grade, Monday, May 17.

--PHS, except for one kindergarten class, Tuesday, May 18.

Whytsell said, "I appreciate how hard everyone has worked, as we continue to navigate this COVID-19 pandemic. I also want to stress to you that the most important thing is the safety of our students and staff. To accomplish this, I need all of your help.

"When students return, we will be reviewing all of the COVID-19 protocols. These are to be enforced. The only exceptions are students with a doctor's note or severe disabilities that make wearing a mask impossible.

Contact tracing is a very time-consuming task and we need to help Nurse Trudi (Anderson) as much as possible by wearing a mask and social distancing."

Click It or Ticket

The Public Service Commission has joined forces with the Governor's Highway Safety Program, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, and other law enforcement agencies in the Click It or Ticket blitz that runs through Memorial Day weekend.

The annual program reminds motorists that seat belts not only save lives, but failure to wear one could result in a ticket. PSC's enforcement officers will concentrate on delivering the seat belt safety message to drivers of commercial motor vehicles.

"Our officers work every day to improve safety on West Virginia's roadways for commercial vehicles," said PSC chairman Charlotte Lane. "The Click It or Ticket campaign gives us the opportunity to remind the traveling public that seat belts save lives.

"Our officers take a no-excuse approach to seatbelt law enforcement, they enforce the laws and, if necessary, write citations day and night."

According to NHTSA, in 2019, 9,466 unbuckled vehicle passengers were killed in crashes in the

United States. That same year, 73 West Virginians lost their lives, because they did not buckle their seatbelts.

Even though the blitz was not held in 2020 due to the pandemic, PSC officers recorded 299 seat belt violations while inspecting commercial motor vehicles.

With funding provided by NHTSA and GHSP, the PSC and other law enforcement agencies are able to conduct these focused patrols for seat belt safety and encourage citizens to drive safely and legally.
