This Week In History

The following reports are taken from The Calhoun Chronicle archives:

1922, 100 years ago

Work on the Phillips Run state road is progressing nicely, and the contractors expect to have the first mile finished by Apr. 1, so that the high school authorities may be able to get stone from the Jeff Kelly quarry.

Word was received at the local offices of Hope Natural Gas Co. this week that the drilling department office, maintained here for the past four years, would be discontinued after Mar. 15, and the work of this district handled out of the Clarksburg office. The local office has been in charge of foreman J. Frank Baxter, who in more prosperous times, had as many as 60 strings of tools running simultaneously. Lately, the drilling department's work has gone down to only a few strings. It is presumed that the work can be more economically handled from the Clarksburg office.

In addition to Mr. Baxter, Amos E. Morgan, bookkeeper and office man for the drilling department, and several tool-pushers, are affected by the new order. To just what extent changes will be made will not be known until the return of Mr. Baxter from a conference of Hope officials to be held in Parkersburg on Saturday, at which time plans for handling the work will be made.

Some of the machinery for the new Creston mail and passenger packet, Dardanella, was delayed in shipment and did not reach here until a day or two ago. It is being rapidly put in shape by Wade H. Stump and will be ready for its trial trip in a day or two.

A large number of local sportsmen left here on Sunday morning aboard the Steamer Lark, commanded by Capt. Bruce Ferrell, enroute to Marietta to witness the prize fight between Bob Martin and Sergeant Thompson. The match took place on Monday night and Martin defeated his opponent in the third round.

1947, 75 years ago

(Another in a series of articles by Sattis Simmons, president of Little Kanawha Regional Council, explaining the objectives of the organization.)

Here, in the area embraced by the Little Kanawha Regional Council, the first oil well in this section of the country was drilled, the first gravity oil pipe line was built, and Aaron Burr plotted his Southwest empire. Here, too, is to be found the grave of Jesse Hughes, noted border scout; the world's largest shovel plant, the world's greatest Oriskany Sand gas field, and many other things that tourists would desire to see here in this beautiful valley.

This organization has plans, with the help of its county branches, to compile sketches of all such interesting places and things, and to show how tourists may reach them from the main arterial highways. The county branches, which are already organized, are busy compiling such data in their own sections in order that it may be included in the promotional material that will be made up for this area. In addition to all of this, there are many things that tourists would like to obtain while visiting in the territory, and these, too, will be listed, and they will be told where such can be found.

We, who live in this area, know that there are no more interesting places from the tourist's standpoint anywhere in the country. The trouble has been that the world has not been told about it. This organization plans to do just that. In this work, we shall be able to lend a helping hand to the fine work that the Chambers of Commerce are already doing.

1972, 50 years ago

Simon W. Riddle Was Notable Country Doctor, by Bill Umstead

Simon W. Riddle has been the subject of previous articles, but I like to write about this good country doctor. To me, a kid growing up in a remote little village where entertainment was scarce, he provided much, in this respect, towards what I liked. He liked to hunt and he always had good guns, horses and dogs. He was a very good artist and drew pretty pictures.

He owned one of the first automobiles that came to our village, and his mechanical knowledge was so good that he could almost take his car apart and put it back together again. I might state, however, that those early cars were much different than those we have today. In all these things, I either looked on or helped the doctor. Especially was I good at cranking the car or pushing when stuck in a mud hole. I had grown into a very good-sized boy when the car came along, and Doc taught me how to drive. Driver's licenses were not required at that early period of the automobile.

During the summer months, I would go with the doctor, either to learn to drive, push or crank. We had no hard roads in the county and I suppose the doctor was glad to have me along. In this respect, I learned a lot about Doc, and I am able today to write of the many

things that happened.

Doctor Riddle was born on the Little Kanawha River not far below the mouth of Big Root. Like many of our early school teachers, education was obtained by attending one-room country schools and summer classes. Some would further their education by attending some normal or teacher's college. I suppose Doc obtained his in the same way. He entered Johns Hopkins and graduated with a M.D. degree.

He married Hattie Wolverton and three sons were born: James (Jim), Clyde and Forest (Pete). He first started practicing medicine at Arnoldsburg and later moved to Mt. Zion, where he lived until he moved to

Grantsville in his declining years. I did not know Doc's father, but knew his brothers, Tine and John, and his sister, Node, who married Wheeler Chenoweth. I knew his mother and visited her home many times. She remarried after her husband's death and lived across the river where Francis Cain now lives. Both Doc and John served in the Spanish American War. Doc lived to the ripe old age of 86, before he passed away in Grantsville some

10 or more years ago. Doctor Riddle was a person who liked to experiment with things, and he envisioned many things in his profession, far in advance of his time, but

never had the money to carry them out. In those days, a

CURIOSITY CORNER

Question: Why do dogs eat grass? (Asked by a curious dog owner.)

Reply: This is an old canine caper. Most dog owners have probably seen their four-legged friend eating grass at one time or another. There are a couple of theories for this behavior, but nothing definite. No dog has told us why, yet.

The most common explanation is that the dog isn't feeling well, and eats grass for relief. Like humans, dogs can have intestinal problems, such as an upset stomach, nausea, bloating and so on. If a dog is experiencing one of these problems, you might see them eating grass. The grass causes stomach irritation, which leads to vomiting and, hopefully, feeling better.

On the other hand, it is speculated that dogs eat grass simply because they want to . . . maybe even a specific type of grass. The eating may be done more calmly in this case. It may be that a dog eats grass to get nutrients it does not have in its normal diet, like fiber. A study done at a veterinary school found that switching dogs to a diet higher in fiber can curtail grass

Finally, grass eating may be hereditary and normal. Wolves, coyotes and other wild animals are known to eat plants regularly. Maybe domesticated grass-eating dogs have a hidden ancestral trait.

doctor received very little for his service. He delivered babies, and his fee, if in money, would be five or 10 dollars, but more often than not, it would be paid with a ham of meat, chickens, etc. He would ride his horse over the hills, through rain or snow, for several miles, visiting the sick and supply his own medicine, and the fee would be two dollars.

He decided he might improve some on this and he erected a little hospital. It was not much, he did an operation or so, but its main use was sweating machines. He installed two box-like contraptions made of metal and lined with asbestos. They stood on legs, and underneath was a couple of small gas burners. He placed the patient into the box with the head sticking out, then he would light the gas underneath. The box would soon become hot, and as it did--you got warm and started to sweat. The method was good for persons who had lumbago, arthritis and other pains.

I would ask why he was doing that and he would reply, "Sweating the devil out of them." Well, you know the method worked and Doc had several patients. In those days, people were more exposed to the elements, especially during the long cold winters, and backache, lumbago, etc., were very common.

Dear Beloved Mary,

I take the present as a favorable opportunity of transmitting you a short note, which will inform you that I am in good health at present, and my fondest wish is that you may be enjoying the same blessing.

I have sent you a letter since my return by the hands of Mrs. Hunt and fearing you may not have received it I concluded to send you another.

Dear Girl, I cannot help but again express to you my devotedness and love. Mary, my thoughts often turn upon you, and I think of the pleasure that I have enjoyed in your sweet society. Mary, my love to you is still the same unchangable ardent love, and my most devoted prayer is that your mind remains the same that it was when I saw you last, and Oh it is with the most joyful anticipations that I still look forward to the time when this war shall cease and I may be freed from its trammels, and with you to enjoy the sweet seclusion domestic life

I often look upon your beautiful portrait and my heart thrills with the most tender emotions while gazing upon your lovely countenance.

Adieu most lovely maid, write to me when ever you can have an opportunity, and I will do the same

Dear Mary, I would like to see you again, and enjoy your sweet company, loving kisses, and tender embraces. My love to you still remains true and unchangeable and I still wait with patience, the time when I will be permitted to make you one of the happiest of "brides."

Dear Mollie, my prospects are still favorable for promotion to a higher station than that which I now occupy, and I hope I shall have the pleasure before long of informing you of this result. I at this time have the care of the whole of our company devolving upon me, and am busy from morning till night.

Dearest-Girl, I want you to write to me at your earliest opportunity and let me know how you are. I must now close for the present by bidding you Adieu.

Deb Miller, JD, W.Va. Senior Legal Aid Volunteer Goodness gracious, it's income tax time again.

Jean wondered how much her 2021 income tax refunds were going to be, as she looked at the pile of papers on the table in front of her. She had some other

Her friend would be coming soon with her laptop to help Jean file her tax returns online.

Jean wanted to file as early as possible to avoid some sneaky scammer stealing her refund. Her other priorities were to see whether she qualified for the federal child tax credit and the West Virginia income tax credits related to the Homestead Exemption that she got on her property taxes.

Sad to say, some mean scammer in Detroit, or maybe even the Yukon, could simply make up income and tax amounts and fraudulently file her tax returns. The scammer could collect the fake refunds, even in situations where one would not have been owed without the fraudulent amounts.

It just takes some basic identity information to send in the fake returns first and steal Jean's refunds. She won't know it happened until her own tax returns are rejected.

Plus, the scammer can use Jean's identity information for more thefts, leaving her with a lot of paperwork to claim her actual tax refund and stop credit card and other financial losses.

Jean was excited about the income tax credits that she was eligible for. Each dollar of a credit eliminates a dollar of tax. Also, some types of tax credits can increase the amount of a refund when one is owed.

To claim any federal or state credit, Jean has to file tax returns, but does not have to itemize any deductions.

Federal law provides a child tax credit for anyone with certain levels of income, who is raising one or Around the country, many working grandparents

are raising their grandchildren and may be eligible for the 2021 federal child tax credit and the earned income During the past year, the federal government has

made monthly payments for each child to custodial parents/grandparents earning up to certain amounts of income, and they may also receive an income tax credit if the child is 18 or younger.

The amount of the potential credit is included in Letter 6419 sent by the Internal Revenue Service. Learn more at www.irs.gov/credits-deductions/ad vance-child-tax-credit-payments-in-2021.

Federal law also provides an earned income tax credit for anyone with lower income who is raising one or more children of qualifying ages.

Homestead Exemption on their property taxes. As part of our state's property tax system, the Homestead Exemption program is available for homeowners who are age 65 and older or permanently disabled. The \$20,000 exemption, or non-taxable amount, reduces the assessed value and total property taxes owed on owner-occupied residential property.

Each person must sign up at their county assessor's office during the qualifying period, as Jean had. There is no income requirement or limitation for the Homestead Exemption on property taxes.

At income tax time, homeowners qualifying receive my most truest love, also give my best respects for the Homestead Exemption may be eligible for the Senior Citizens Tax Credit to lower West Virginia income taxes. The State Tax Dept.'s Form SCTC-1, sent out in January of each year, will list the amount of the tax credit which can be claimed.

> There is a specific income requirement for Senior Citizens Tax Credit eligibility which is determined when calculating the amounts for the West Virginia tax

The second state income tax credit for homeowners qualifying is the Homestead Excess Property Tax Credit. When a person's or couple's residential property taxes exceed 4% of their income, they are eligible for a tax credit for the excess amount. The

maximum credit is \$1,000. If a taxpayer qualifies for both state credits, the amount of the Senior Citizens Tax Credit will reduce the amount of the Homestead Excess Property Tax

The incremental revenue increase due to the Surcharge is estimated to be initially \$6,545,986 in 2024 when the Surcharge begins and is expected to total \$26,154,891 by 2026 when all the installations are complete. The Surcharge is proposed to be reviewed annually by the Commission beginning September 2024. The Surcharge estimated rates for 2024-2026 by rate schedule are shown below:


