#### DALLAS RAY BALL




#### 1947, 75 years ago

All American Aviation's air mail and air express "pick-up" routes, which provide direct air service to this community, along with 121 other cities in Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Ohio, Kentucky, New York and Delaware, may be suspended in whole or in part, according to an order recently handed down by the Civil Aeronautics Board in Washington, D. C.

The order, which was issued without prejudice to All American's proposed passenger services now awaiting a board decision, instituted a proceeding "to determine whether the public convenience and necessity require that the Air Pick-up route be suspended in whole or in part, and, if so, for what period and to what extent."

Since 1939, All American, developer of the Air Pick-up system, has pioneered direct air mail and air express service to intermediate communities in the Middle Atlantic Area.

Although many of the communities on the Air Pick-up routes lack commercial airport facilities, they are provided with direct air mail and air express service four times daily through the use of equipment that permits the transfer of air cargo between ground stations and aircraft in full flight. Where airports are available, All American provides service in the conventional manner. All American recently inaugurated service on two of its route segments with new twin-engine Beechcraft D18C airplanes, which not only afford greater cargo capacity but maintain service at a speed of 150 to 175 miles per hour.

Question: Does bottled water go bad? (Asked by a curious H<sub>2</sub>O drinker.)

**Reply**: Bottled water has become a big thing. It's estimated that Americans used about 50 billion bottles last year. The short answer to your question is, no, bottled water does not generally go bad. You may get a bottle with an expiration date, but this is because a state may require all foods and beverages, including water, to carry an expiration date on the packaging. You may also see a bottling date, or a "best by" or "sell by" date. This is manufacturer merchandising.

Although water, in itself, does not go bad, the plastic bottle may expire. In other words, the bottle will eventually start leaching chemicals into the water. This doesn't necessarily render the water toxic, but it might make it taste somewhat less than "spring fresh." Incidentally, much of the bottled water we drink is purified municipal water.

A "plastic" taste is not necessarily an indication that the water is bad. Bacteria and algae will not grow in sealed, bottled water, but after opening and drinking partially, the water can become contaminated, if left setting around.

The cost of bottled water is another consideration. This has come down since the introduction of the bottle fad. Even so, it is still a lot more expensive than regular tap water, which is as safe as bottled polka music than any water. For example, one calculation shows that for the recommended eight glasses of water a day, at U.S. tap rates, equal about 49 cents per year. That same amount in bottled water would cost about \$1,400.

Finally, there are environmental concerns. It takes thousands of barrels of oil to produce our plastic bottles. Then, when the water bottles are empty, what do we do with them? Burning them puts the toxic chemicals in the air, and only 23 percent of plastic bottles are recycled. This leaves many bottles going into landfills, where they take hundreds of years to deteriorate. Not to mention the glass bottles and aluminum cans.

Aug. 1, 1921: Baldwin-Felts detectives shot and killed Sid Hatfield and Ed Chambers as they approached McDowell County Courthouse in Welch. As Matewan's police chief, Hatfield had assisted the United Mine Workers campaign to organize Tug Fork miners.



Aug. 1, 1940: Justice Franklin Cleckley was born in Huntington. He was the first African-American to serve on the West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals. In 2001, the court referred to Cleckley's handbooks on evidence and criminal procedure as "the bible for West Virginia's judges and attorneys."

Aug. 2, 2009: Golfers Sam Snead and Bill Campbell became the first two inductees into the West Virginia Golf Hall of Fame.

During the war, Air Pick-up was adapted to military uses, such as the launching of gliders and personnel rescue.

Since 1944, All American has been prosecuting applications before the board for authority to transport passengers between airport cities on the Air Pick-up routes and other points in the general area. Board decision is now pending on these applications.

#### 1972, 50 years ago

Mr. and Mrs. Bernard McDonald have been chosen as Calhoun's Conservation Farmers for 1972 by Little Kanawha Soil Conservation District. The McDonalds own and operate a 252-acre farm at Mt. Zion. About one-third is in pasture and hayland, well-managed to support a small beef cattle herd.

Conservation practices that have been applied on this part of the farm include pasture and hayland planting, application of lime and fertilizer, brush control, and controlled grazing. Two spring developments and one pond have been built to provide water for livestock.

The remaining two-thirds of the McDonald farm are in woodland. This part has also received serious considerations of conservation practices. McDonald has harvested a lot of timber and says that a lot of it is ready to cut again. He has also planted an additional 14 acres of trees on the farm.

Wildlife has not been overlooked either. Many chestnut trees, autumn olive and evergreens have been planted to provide them with food and cover. Squirrels. chipmunks, rabbits, and a dozen different kinds of birds can be seen around the McDonald home at any time of the year.

Native shrubs and trees, such as holly, cedar, dogwood, azalea, and others, have been used to landscape the residence. Mrs. McDonald said, "I think that more people should take advantage of the native shrubs that are beautiful, disease resistant, and free.

### Michael A. Ayers--A Calhoun Native In the Civil War

(Continued from Last Week) Journal entries from the Spring Campaign of 1864 in West Virginia continue.

Tuesday [May] 10th. Though fatigued from our long march, nothing can stop the bold and daring Crook. We are in motion at 5 A.M. and move down the line of the Va. & Tenn. Railroad burning culverts macaroni, and tearing down the telegraph lines, till we arrive at New River Bridge, when suddenly we are greeted by a shell from a rebel battery on the opposite shore. This occured 9:30 A.M.

The General reconnoiters and discovers the whole force of the enemy to be on the opposite side of the river, he therefore disposes of the artillery to good advantage and soon a grand artillery duel is in 16 on a Spencer radio progress, which continues for about 2 hours, when the rebels are compelled to give way.

Our boys are already in the cut to the bridge and have applied the match and the dark rolling column of smoke tells that the bridge is on fire. In fifteen minutes, the structure nearly 900 feet in length trembled and fell.

Our gunners threw several shell into the central depot about 2 miles below and set some buildings on fire. A barn on the opposite shore was fired, and the woods in several places were set on fire. We lost two men killed and a fiew wounded to day.

At 3 P.M. we left the field and marched down to Peppers ferry with the anticipation of meeting the enemy at this point but he did not come. We crossed the river and camp on the opposite shore for the night.

It is due here to the men who set fire to the bridge that they should be known Company B of the 11th. Regt. WVa Vols and Co. B of 15 WVa Regt were the men who did it. Lt. Marlin Parke, Co. B. 11th took the match from his vest pocket and gave it to Capt Eagen of Co B. 15 WVa, who ignited and set the match to the bridge. Our march to day was 9 miles and another victory.

The railroad and telegraph are destroyed for 20 Give-away, Brohard Commiles. The loss in the 11th in both engagements was 1 killed and 15 wounded. As it was not deemed prudent to move further to the east our course was now turned to the North and West.

A serious damage has been done the enemy, which will take them some time to repair. We are expecting to be joined by Gen'l. Averells command of Cavalry, which went via Logan C.H. toward Wytheville. The country about Dublin is level and rich. Some excellent farms lay along the line of our march after crossing Cloyd Mountain. A rebel camp of instruction was burned near Dublin.

We found a considerable amount of stores at the Depot, which answered a very good purpose, for rations were growing scarce. At New River bridge we burned a set of log cabins, quarters of the rebel soldiers. Also secured two large seige guns in a fort on the west bank of the stream.

looks larger than Kanawha does below Charleston. The troops were ferried across in a flat boat, which carried about 50 men. The wagon and ambulance train cured forded the stream two miles above the ferry, which was a difficult job. The current being swift and strong, and it was not till next morning before everything got over.

Wednesday [May] 11th. March at 5 A.M. We are wagon guards to day, pass over an undulating country; foraging parties are on the flanks picking up cattle and horses of which we find considerable numbers. I stopped at a house this morning and got a few cucumber pickles, and about a half a pint of fit to eat.

The lady of the house thought "the yankees" treated her very badly, but I presume if she had been a Union lady, and lived in the country visited by the rebel raiders under Jones in 1863, she would have thought the rebels were just about as apt to steal what they wanted to eat as the "yankees" are.

It set into raining about noon, which continued falling heavily till evening, making the road very muddy. We went into camp at Blacksburg, a pretty little town in Montgomery County, surrounded by a beautiful country. There is some splendid farms here.

We expected the enemy to offer us battle here, and spread our camp out all around the town, but they had received too severe a chastisement to meddle with us any more. I was ordered to take charge of a party of foragers who went over into town, did so, and a sweet time we had of it. The mud was shoe top all over town which we had to "split".

Just after we got in a darkey came and told us where there was a bunch of "Apple Jack". We started to "raise" it, but another party were in before us. I however secured enough to give my men a "pull" and the town of Ripley, Va. a taste my self; and a canteen full which I took to camp and gave Cols. Frost & Bukey a "snort" out of it.

We next went to a house to get some milk. Got permission of the guard to enter the house, found a young lady in charge, who was kind enough to give us a good drink of sweet milk for which we gave her a dollar in confederate money. She said that she "did not like us one bit".

We then went back to camp, our search resulted in getting about 30 bushels of potatoes. It continued to rain during the night and rendered it very uncomfortable in camp.






