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This Week In History

The following reports are taken from The Calhoun Chronicle archives:

1922, 100 years ago

News from Mudfork -- Yes, the melancholy days are here. Corn husking, sowing wheat and picking apples seem to be in order at this time.

"Aunt" Sene Sharp, who has been on the sick list for the past two or three months, is reported to be no better.

J.L. Coen and little son, Lovell, were visiting relatives at Ivydale, the first of the week.

Forebodings of high-priced turkeys this year are seen in agriculture department announcements that, despite a steady increase in the price of turkeys production, has steadily decreased. The average price received during October to January, 1915-16, was 15 cents a pound. The average price received during a similar period of 1920-21 was 32 cents per pound, according to the department's figures.

In 1900, the census figures showed 6,594,695 turkeys on farms in the United States, while in 1910, there were only 3,638,708, and in 1920, there were 3,627,028. During the last six years, the price of turkeys has increased to the producer more than 100 percent, while during the past 20 years the number of turkeys produced has decreased about 50 percent, the department states.

A lot of folks talk about retiring and settling down to a life of peace and quiet on a farm. That is exactly what Obert Fowler, Master Sergeant, U.S. Marine Corps (Retired), is doing over in the Hog Knob section of Calhoun County.

Mr. Fowler spent 23 years in the Marine Corps. He was with the First Marine Division, the outfit that made the first landing at Guadalcanal, one of the toughest engagements of World War II in the Pacific Theatre. Last year, he and Mrs. Fowler settled down on a 238-acre farm and now are making some big plans for the future.

They are enrolled in this year's "Farming for Better Living" program and are following many of the practices recommended through that program.

Mr. Fowler's principal planning revolves around hogs. Last spring, he raised 14 pigs and sold them all. He is buying two registered Berkshire sows and plans on raising purebred Berkshires next year.

Most of the farm is in woods, but 50 acres are available for pasture, along with five acres of soybeans, four acres of meadowland, and three acres of corn and grain. This year, 31 tons of lime was used on the meadows. Mr. Fowler also plans on starting some alfalfa this year and intends to further improve the land with lime and phosphate, and treat all pastures and meadow-clipping.

A young orchard of apple, peach and cherry trees was set out last spring. Three cows furnish a surplus of milk and cream for market. Also being raised are 175 young chicks.

Mr. Fowler is a Farm Bureau member and also

belongs to the American Legion.

The Cee-Bees, owners of a 6-2 record, ran like a steamroller over the visitors, sending the Red Devils home on the short end of a 40-6 score.

Clay-Battelle won the opening coin toss and elected to receive. Nearly four minutes later, the Cee-Bees scored on a oneyard run for a 7-0 lead.

After the two teams traded punts, C-BHS embarked on another scoring drive that culminated in a nine-yard run at the start of the second quarter. The Cee-Bees kicked the extra point to make the score 14-0.

Jayton Gibson returned the ensuing kickoff 21 yards to set the Red Devils up at their own 39. Gibson, Owen Taylor and Ian Persinger took turns moving the ball into Cee-Bee territory, but after two incomplete passes, the drive stalled.

Facing a fourth-andseven, Persinger took a pitch out, scampered around the left end and raced 41 yards to register the Red Devils' first score. The kick for the extra point failed, but Calhoun had cut the lead to 14-6.

That is as close as the game would get. The Cee-Bees immediately answered the Red Devil score with a five-play, 59yard touchdown drive, and tacked on another score late in the quarter to take a 26-6 lead into the half.

The hosts scored two more touchdowns in the closing minutes of the third quarter to set the final score at 40-6.

Calhoun had an excellent drive, highlighted by a 35-yard Persinger







Michael A. Ayers--A Calhoun Native In the Civil War

(Continued from Last Week)

The committee presented the following Preadopted:

Whereas, our late Brigade Commander, Col. Daniel Frost, 11th. W.Va Infty., and our Associate in Arms, Lieut Thomas Morris, 15th. W.Va., were stricken down while at the head of their respective commands, gallantly encouraging those who surrounded them by voice and example, and whereas it is befitting that their Brother Officers who knew them well who respected them for their many merits as officers and who knew them for their kindness and affability as men, should hear testimony to their worth therefore.

Resolved that in the death of these gallant soldiers for the Union the country has lost the service of two true and trusted patriots who in life manifested by every word and act the most unselfish zeal in its behalf and their glorious death sealed their devotion to the cause for which they struggled.

Resolved that as Commanders and Associates we ever found them skilfull, brave and true, reliable in every emergency, prompt in every difficulty and courageous in every danger, men and soldiers in whom we placed implicit confidence and in whose death we feel that we have sustained a personal loss.

Resolved that we sincerely sympathise with the widows and families of our deceased Brothers in arms the greatness of whose bereavement we can only faintly estimate by the poignancy of our own grief at their departure.

Resolved in testimony of our respect for the deceased it is requested that crepe be placed over the flags of the Regiments comprising the Brigade at the time of their death and a copy of the resolutions be published in the Wheeling Intelligencer, Buchannon [Buckhannon] Gazette and Kanawha Republican.

On motion the meeting adjourned.

weeks. My wound is doing very well. I was pretty badly wounded at Cloyd's Farm. Had two ounces of shell taken from my right

Write to me when at Wheeling, and let me know who are aspirants for Major.

I have rec a letter from Mr. Taylor who informs me that the most prominent business men are using their influence in my behalf for the position. I understood that Lieut. Kirby had petitioned for it. If he is appointed over me I shall promptly resign.

I shall leave the 4th ultime. for Parkersburg. Will have an opportunity of seeing my "special" Friends.

I regret to hear of the death of Col. Frost. He was a noble man. We will never look upon his like again in that Regiment.

ACA Open Enrollment

The Affordable Care Act's annual open enroll-

ment period began Nov. 1.

Last year, a record number of people enrolled in healthcare coverage through the marketplace.

In West Virginia, more than nine in 10 people who got their insurance on the marketplace were eligible for a monthly subsidy that helps them pay for the plan they selected. New rules for this year's enrollment have strengthened the program so that thousands of families will likely qualify to get coverage as well.

Open enrollment will run until Sunday, Jan. 15. U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services released a record amount of grant funding to organizations that provide free help to consumers requiring health coverage enrollment assistance.

First Choice Services was awarded \$1,050,000 to continue and expand its West Virginia Navigator program, which provides free assistance to people finding and selecting health care options through the marketplace, Medicaid, and CHIP. It can assist with enrollment applications and help consumers apply for

financial assistance through HealthCare.gov. W. Va. Navigator can assist people over the phone or in its offices in Charleston, Martinsburg, Fairmont, and Huntington.

In addition, enrollment events will be held around the state, so that people can walk in and receive assistance without an appointment.

"Most people will be able to qualify for substantially lower costs this year, if they get their insurance on the marketplace," said Jeremy Smith, program director for Navigator.

"We are really urging people to look at the new plans and prices that are being released this year. In a lot of cases, the plans are more affordable than we have ever seen. Even if you have looked into insurance on the marketplace in past years, and were not very happy,

you should definitely look into it again this year." Smith said that getting help signing up is important, as many people are overwhelmed by the options or may not realize how to shop for affordable

New rules will expand eligibility to those who had previously been blocked from getting the coverage because they had an unaffordable offer of insurance

through an employer.

For Jan. 1 coverage, sign up by Dec. 15. Open enrollment will end on Jan. 15. For free assistance, the W.Va. Navigator program is available by calling 356-5834 or visiting www.ACANavigator.com.


