

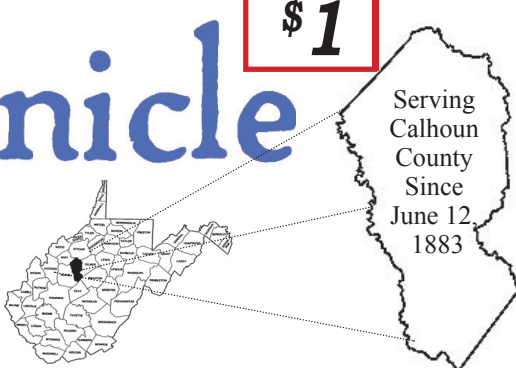

County Commission hold Special Meeting May 11th - Nathan Allison Hired as New Sheriff

The Calhoun County Commission met on May 11th for a Special Meeting with a very short agenda and only lasted just under 10 minutes. Following the Pledge of Allegiance and opening procedures, Commission President, Matt Walker made the motion to appoint Graham Knight as Sheriff effective after Carl Ballengee's 30 days is over. Walker asked for a second to the motion, and received no comments, it failed.

Commissioner Kevin Helmick made a motion to hire Nathan Allison as interim Sheriff, which was quickly seconded by Commissioner Walker. The motion carried after Helmick and Walker both agreed to hire Allison as interim sheriff to take office once Carl Ballengee's 30 day position is complete.

It was noticed that Commissioner Craig Arthur did not vote or comment on either motion. Commissioner Helmick then spoke to Commissioner Arthur and asked him to clarify why he did not vote.

Commissioner Arthur responded by saying, "I think we are at a point, just so people understand my decision, I think we are at a point where there's a lot of things that need cleaned up. I understand that Mr. Tucker has not been for that long a period of time, but based on his experience of 22 and 1/2 years retired from the military and 5 years as a Deputy Sheriff. I think we need someone that can help cleanup a mess that can put us in a better place for '24. I did a lot of thinking and a lot of praying on this, this

has been a very tough decision we had some fine candidates, but based on what I've heard from the majority of people, I based on interviews, this is what I felt was the best decision I could make.

A citizen in the audience asked if she could ask a question about the meeting, with Commissioner Helmick saying go ahead. She asked Craig Arthur why Mr. Helmick had to ask you to clarify your position. It was at this point, Commissioner Helmick responded that he "didn't realize that was what he was going to say". The citizen remarked that it didn't matter what Craig said. Helmick continued, "I thought he was going to say because he couldn't vote for Nathan. Anyway, I wanted to speak, I'll speak something like that, I didn't really have anything prepared because I didn't really know what was going to happen, like Craig said that we have a lot of, I mean we had three good candidates, two I had very close scores on and ultimately it came down to a very slim margin to me, what I felt who was most electable and that's how I ended up separating the two". Someone in the audience repeated "electable" to which Helmick responded "that's the way I decided, made my decision".

Commissioner Walker for the second to the motion to be voted on, which carried and Nathan Allison was hired as the new Sheriff for Calhoun effective once the 30 day term is complete for Carl Ballengee.

The Commission discussed Old Business

as follows:

1. Solid Waste Authority had a request of \$9,317.04 for the purpose of paying wages, taxes, utilities and fuel costs. Commissioner Arthur made the motion to give them the requested money with a second by Commissioner Helmick. The motion carried. It was discussed that if the Commission was going to consider allotting them money monthly they requested a letter of request be made each month.

2. Agreement - MHHS - Ambulance Service: The issue was not discussed at this time and was asked to be placed on the June 12th Agenda to give more time to get everything in order.

3. Redirection - Levy Monies from EMS to Minnie Hamilton: Commissioner Helmick made the motion for the Monies to be available to Minnie Hamilton effective immediately and Commissioner Arthur made the second, with the motion carried.

4. Stabilization Fund: Commissioner Arthur made the motion to move \$250,000 to the fund and Commissioner Helmick made the second, with the motion being approved.

The Commissioners discussed meeting to hire a new 911 Director from the four candidates who have applied.

Next Commission meeting is June 12, 2023. Meeting was adjourned.

It must be noted that following the meeting, citizens had concerns regarding the wording that Commissioner Helmick and Walker used when the motion to hire Nathan Allison as interim Sheriff was stated instead of the correct wording of the motion to hire Nathan Allison as Sheriff. Calhoun Prosecutor Nigel Jefferies was looking at the issue to ensure there was no variance in the notice posted and what the Commissioners voted on in the special meeting. If a variance is found to have occurred, a new meeting must be scheduled, properly noticed to fill the vacancy.

Nathan Allison did acknowledge that he was told of a meeting of correction for his appointment. A Special County Commission Meeting is scheduled for May 16th.

Calhoun County Special Commission Meeting May 16th Agenda was as follows:

I. Pledge of Allegiance

II. Personnel

1. Appointment to Fill Unexpired Term of Sheriff

IV. Adjournment: Next Meeting June 12th.

Commissioner President Matt Walker opened the meeting explaining that the meeting was held to fill the unexpired term of the Sheriff. Walker spoke to the crowd, "if anybody needs somebody to blame for the last week, you can blame me, obviously that agenda was sent out, I just really didn't pay attention, so you can blame me for the wording on there, I'll take the blame no problem".

Walker went to explain to the small crowd in attendance that there is only one item on the agenda and that is the appointment to fill the unexpired term of the Sheriff.

Walker started to make a motion for the Sheriff Candidate, when a citizen in the crowd spoke up and asked Commissioner Arthur if he had anything to say. At this point, Commissioner Arthur asked if he could speak to the crowd to clarify some things from last week's meeting.

Commissioner Arthur informed the crowd that he wanted to explain in more detail of his decision from the last meeting. Arthur went on to say, "According to the W. Va. Ethics Commission and the W. Va. Ethics Acts and the numerous legal representatives I have spoken with, I had to recuse myself from an interview on a particular candidate and further recuse myself from

voting anyway on the matter of appointing a sheriff. I admit, I should have been clear and more concise on my decision and kept my personal feelings on the matter to myself. I apologize for any confusion I have caused".

Commissioner Walker asked Commissioner Arthur if he had anything else to say, at which he asked if there would be any delegations allowed to speak, to which Walker stated there are no delegations on the Agenda.

Walker made the motion to appointment to fill the unexpired term of the Sheriff to Nathan Allison. He asked for a second to which Commissioner Helmick made the second. Walker was in mid sentence stating there was a second to appoint Allison to the unexpired term when he was informed by Arthur and a citizen in the crowd that Nathan Allison had something to say.

Nathan asked how he would be able to speak if there is no delegations allowed to speak. Commissioners Walker and Helmick informed him that they hadn't officially voted and if he had something to say he could speak.

Allison spoke to the crowd, "To the Commission Systems of Calhoun County, as you all know, I have applied for the vacant

Sheriff position for Calhoun County. On Thursday, May 11th, I was appointed Sheriff to fulfill the remaining portion of Warren Basnett's term. The public was notified and noticed the process used Thursday was invalid and would have to be redone. Although, this was upsetting to me, I understand the need to do things the correct way within our county government. With that being said, I myself completed further research to learn what the W. Va. Ethics Act and its procedure for voting. As many know Commissioner Craig Arthur and I own and operate A&A Monument Services together. Due to the business relationship and friendship, Craig will not be able to vote to any matters that pertain to the Sheriff's office, as a whole as long as I am in there; no budgets, no hiring of deputies, nothing whatsoever. I do not want to prohibit any commissioners as far as that goes from not being able to vote on issues that can arise in this office as they have now and probably will later on. We can all see what kind of mess it's in now. I think across the board everybody needs to be able to vote that's on our commission to fix the issues that are at hand right now. Because of this, I have regretfully decided to take my name from further consideration for the position. While this is not an easy decision, and not one I wanted to make period. It is in the best interests of the citizens of Calhoun County. I don't want to, like I said prohibit any commissioner from voting, that's my whole thing here, we can not do that with the matter and the problems we are facing right now. In

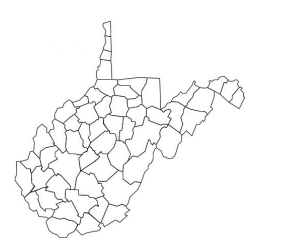
The total number of points won for Cabot Station School was 131. The pupil winning the most points for the school was Gayford Williams, 8th grade.

On Thursday evening the P.T.A met in regular session. Officers for the coming year were installed as foloows: Mrs. Minnie Hefner, President; Mrs. Grace Weaver, Vice-President; and Mrs. Margaret Hawkins, Secretary/Treasurer. Mrs. Verda Campbell served as installing officer.

A program of readings, musical numbers and moving pictures followed. At the close of the evening ice cream and cake were served to 80 people.

1973, 50 YEARS
(Minnora School Dinner Sunday) - A dip and donate dinner was held Sunday, May 13, at Minnora school, with proceeds to be used for the Exceptional Children program of the school and community.

Following the dinner, a special P.T.A. was held, with School Supt. Paul Siegrist, the speaker. He complimented the school personnel and patrons on the excellent condition of the school, and then led them in an informed discussion of possible improvements. He outlined projects being undertaken at Brooksville and Arnoldsburg, for construction of a gym, of a multi-purpose room. He said that funds from the school board would not be sufficient to build any such additions, except with the help of the local community. This help, he related, was usually for about one third of the total cost, plus free labor being donated. He gave an estimate of \$15,000 as the approximate cost of such an addition. Later it was decided the PTA would form a committee to further discuss the project.



The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history.

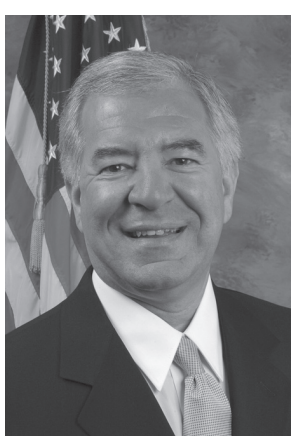
May 18, 2012: Ice Mountain in Hampshire County was named a National Natural Landmark by the U.S. Department of the Interior at a ceremony to mark the 50th anniversary of the program.



May 19, 1920: Ten people were killed in a shootout sometimes referred to as the Matewan Massacre. Baldwin-Felts detectives came to Matewan to evict striking miners and their families, but Police Chief Sid Hatfield tried to stop the evictions as being unauthorized by law.

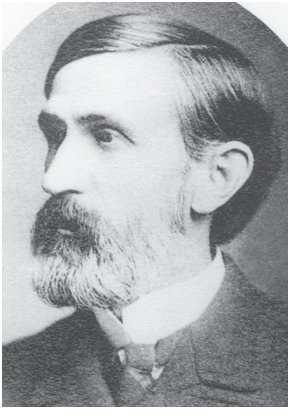


May 20, 1949: Nick Joe Rahall II was born in Beckley. When Rahall first entered Congress in 1977, he was its youngest member.

May 21, 1853: William M. O. Dawson was born in Bloomington, Maryland, just across the Potomac River from what is now the Eastern Panhandle of West Virginia. In 1905, he became the 12th governor of West Virginia.



May 22, 1947: Supreme Court Justice Margaret “Peggy” Workman was born in Charleston. In the election of November 1988, she became the first woman on the West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals and the first woman to be elected to statewide office in West Virginia.



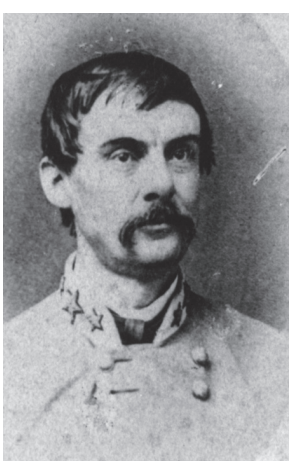
May 23, 1862: In what became known as the Battle of Lewisburg, Union troops repelled a Confederate advance, killing 38 and wounding 66, while losing only 13 men.

May 23, 1941: Rod Thorn was born in Princeton. Declared by the legislature a state “natural resource,”

Thorn attended West Virginia University, where he was an All-American guard. Thorn had a distinguished NBA career as a player and executive, which included drafting Michael Jordan.



May 24, 1896: Confederate General John Echols died in Staunton, Virginia. Echols served in the Kanawha Valley in 1862 and commanded Confederate forces at their defeat at the Battle of Droop Mountain in November 1863.

Food For Thought

I thought our readers just might be tired of Waste Not/Want Not, so I thought I’d give something new a shot. I hope you like it.

Many years ago, when I was married the first time (I’m a slow learner, so I tried it again). I got not only a husband, but I got a new family. His mother was adopted so had no family to speak, but the McCartney side was awesome; there was grandpa and grandma McCartney and their daughter and her husband. That would be aunt Ruth and uncle Bill. Grandma’s only son was killed in the Second World War.

When I walked into their very old, but very comfortable, and small house, I went into culture shock. I was an only child. I thought every house had a bathroom and running water. Nope, not grandma, she had a pitcher pump in the

kitchen and outside the kitchen door to the left of the back porch was an outhouse. An outhouse!! I’d never been near one, let alone in one. But to my relief, as it turned out, aunt Ruth lived at the top of the drive way next to grandma’s house; ahhh, indoor plumbing.

The first recipe that I’m using was taught to me by aunt Ruth. As long as the growing season and summer lasts, I’m doing garden recipes.

Wilted lettuce is easy and so very inexpensive. I really don’t like vinegar, but I like it in this case. First, you pick your best garden lettuce and wash it good.

Then aunt Ruth would soak it in a big pan of cold water with a few ice cubes in the water. You don’t want to freeze the lettuce, just keep it cool.

While doing the lettuce she would have about five strips of bacon frying until crisp. She’d

put them on a paper plate or paper towel to drain. She would add about a cup of water to the hot bacon grease, turn the heat on low and add some cut up green onions to simmer. When the onions are tender (add more water if needed), add them, and add a little bit of vinegar and a teaspoon of sugar.

When it’s nice and hot, pour it over the lettuce, break up the bacon and put it on top.

Serve it right away before it gets cold. Depending on your taste, you can add more vinegar or less if needed. Do the same with the sugar. You’ll work it out.

You can serve it with a baked chicken breast and hot roll, and a dessert of your choice.

I was glad that I learned this recipe from aunt Ruth 60 some odd years ago. I’m glad she that she was in my life.

My dear little soldier you sed that you long for the time to roll around when we would have no need of writing letters to each other but when we could have the pleasure of enjoying each other society peace and happy-ness oh Dear Michael you cant long for that time worse than I do oh may that time speedily roll around is my most sinseer prayer. Oh how I would like to see you oh my dear little Michael do come back just as quick as you can get out of the service. I am sadisfied that you will come just as quick as you can.

Jonee Boner3 he got out of prison som way he dont no how but he thinks they let him out.

Well it is reported that John N Nutter Rote home that you had got a letter from John Delins you will pleas write and let me no if that is so as I would be very glad to hear from him and more. I heard that B G Hyman was ded pore fellow I was very sorrow to hear of that for him and I youst to be school mats. If he is ded I hope he has gon to rest wear parting is no more.

SEWER SERVICE CHARGE
A charge of \$25.00 will be made for re-establishing a disconnected service having been cut off to collect a sewer bill.

TAP FEE
The following charges are to be made whenever the utility installs a new tap to serve an applicant:
A tap fee of \$300.00 will be charged to customers who apply for service outside of a certificate proceeding before the Commission for each new tap to the system.

SECURITY DEPOSIT
Not to exceed two-twelfths (2/12) of the annual usage of the applicant’s specific customer class, or fifty (\$50.00), whichever is greater. This fee may be changed by applicable statutory provisions.

RETURNED CHECK RATE
If a check is returned by the bank for any reason, the bank’s charge to the utility shall be the utility’s charge to the customer for such a bad check, but such charge to customers shall not exceed \$30.00.



Meanwhile Russia is working to be the world's largest exporter of LNG. It has been noted numerous times that Fauxohauntas likes to have her wigwam heated with clean Russian natural gas.

Attorney General Morrisey Issues Statement Following EPA Release of Proposed Rule on Power Plants

CHARLESTON — West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey issued the following statement Thursday, May 11th shortly after the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency released its proposed new rule on power plants.

“Based upon what we currently know about this

proposal, it is not going to be upheld, and it just seems designed to scare more coal-fired power plants into retirement—the goal of the Biden administration,” Attorney General Morrisey said. “That tactic is unacceptable, and this rule appears to utterly fly in the face of the rule of law. The U.S. Supreme Court has placed significant limits on what the EPA can do—

we plan on ensuring that those limits are upheld, and we expect that we would once again prevail in court against this out-of-control agency.”

“We urge everyone not to fall for this clear attempt to accomplish what the law doesn't allow,” Attorney General Morrisey continued. “We need the plants to stay open.”

Ranking Member Capito Pledges Formal Challenge to EPA’s Newest Power Plant Regulations Targeting American Energy Production

Capito will introduce Congressional Review Act resolution of disapproval to overturn the administration's “most blatant attempt yet to close down power plants and kill American energy jobs”

WASHINGTON, D.C. – May 11, 2023, U.S. Senator Shelley Moore Capito (R-W.Va.), Ranking Member of the Senate Environment and Public Works (EPW) Committee, issued the below statement on the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) latest set of proposed power plant regulations that will force the closure of coal and gas-fired power plants.

Capito announced plans to lead efforts through the Congressional Review Act (CRA) to overturn this attempt by the Biden administration to revive the illegal Clean Power Plan.

“The Clean Power Plan 2.0 announced today is the Biden administration's most blatant attempt yet to close down power plants and kill American energy jobs. The EPA has already tried this illegal overreach, which was ultimately overturned by the Supreme Court, but

not before it devastated communities in West Virginia and across the country.

“Whether it's through policies like the Inflation Reduction Act or an onslaught of executive branch regulations like those announced today, Americans are well aware that the left continues to wage war on the energy sources that actually power this nation. At a time when millions of Americans are struggling to fill up their tanks and pay their utility bills under President Biden, it's reprehensible that this administration would clamp down even further on domestic energy production while advancing policies meant to increase demand for electricity. I plan to introduce a Congressional Review Act resolution of disapproval to protect workers and families from the disastrous impacts of these latest job-killing regulations.”

In 2015, Senators Capito and Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) successfully challenged then-President Obama's original Clean Power Plan, which the Supreme Court later overturned, with CRA resolutions of disapproval on the administration's rules targeting both existing and new power plants.

The Senate approved both resolutions: S.J. Res 24 introduced by Capito, and S.J. Res 23 introduced McConnell. The resolutions were vetoed by President Obama.

BACKGROUND ON EVERY SENATE DEMOCRAT VOTING TO ALLOW THIS REGULATION:

In August 2022, during floor debate of the Democrats' Inflation Reduction Act, Ranking Member Capito filed an amendment to eliminate a provision that would have given the EPA \$45 million in additional funding to use eight different sections of the Clean Air Act to issue regulations on greenhouse gases like the ones announced today (Sec. 111 of the Clean Air Act). That amendment failed 50-50 with every Senate Democrat voting “no.”

Ranking Member Capito then successfully challenged the provision as violating the requirements of the Congressional Budget Act.

The damaging provision was stripped out of the bill after the parliamentarian determined it violated the “Byrd rule” of that statute.

Attorney General Morrisey Warns Consumers of

Medicare Scam

CHARLESTON — West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey is warning consumers to be cautious of Medicare scams that seek to steal personal and sensitive information.

Scammers are known to pose as a Medicare representative or an affiliate and ask for bank account, credit card, Medicare and/or Social Security information, and in some instances seek payment for the consumer's newly issued Medicare card.

The Attorney General's Office's Consumer Protection Division fielded numerous reports of consumers having received such calls in recent weeks, including at least five West Virginia consumers who recently reported falling for the scam.

"There are many people who unfortunately target and exploit the elderly for nefarious purposes," Attorney General Morrisey said. "People who fall prey to this scam often do so because they are scared to lose their benefits, but

that's a threat scammers use to trick consumers into handing over personal, identifiable information.

"Don't give into intimidation tactics—bullying or intimidation tactics is an immediate red flag."

This scam has been continuing since after 2018 when distribution of new Medicare cards began. The new cards contain a new beneficiary number, instead of the recipient's Social Security number, to limit fraud. There are no new updates planned.

The initial scam morphed into the "new Medicare card scam." Reports have indicated scammers identifying themselves as employees of the Social Security Administration, Medicare or the Department of Insurance are calling consumers to say the person needs a new Medicare card or that they need to turn in their paper card for a plastic one. They then request personal information.

Another variation is the scammers call consumers telling them there's been an issue with their Medicare number

and they need to clarify it by providing their personal identifiable information.

Medicare representative, or for that matter, Social Security officials, will not call anyone uninvited to threaten the cancellation of benefits, request money and/or ask for personal information such as his or her new Medicare beneficiary number.

Always remember Medicare already has all the information about participants. Should Medicare require additional information, they will send a letter telling the participant what specific government agency they should contact to provide it.

The 2023 grant application, application tips and guidelines, and other helpful resources are available on the WVDEP's AMLER web page. Completed applications are due Friday, June 30, 2023.

All projects must receive final approval from the U.S. Department of the Interior's Office of Surface Mining, Reclamation, and Enforcement (OSMRE).

An advisory committee composed of representatives from the WVDEP, state Departments of Commerce, Tourism, and Transportation, and the Governor's Office, is responsible for determining project eligibility and advancing

recommended projects to OSMRE.

Recent projects that have received AMLER funding include Renaissance Village in McDowell County, Appalachian Abattoir in Kanawha County, I-79 Technology Park in Marion County, Rustic Ravines in Wayne County, and several HatfieldMcCoy Regional Recreation Authority projects in Boone and Lincoln Counties.

Since 2016, the AMLER Program has committed \$181 million in grant funding to assist projects all across the West Virginia coalfields.

DURANGO, Colo., On May 4, 2023, Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that the Biden-Harris Administration is investing \$63 million from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and the Inflation Reduction Act to expand wildfire barriers, known as fuel breaks, to protect communities and firefighters across the West.

Fuel breaks slow a fire's spread, create a safe zone for firefighters to work, and a safer place to conduct hazardous fuel reduction treatments like prescribed burns.

This new round of investments will support projects in Colorado, Montana, Oregon, South Dakota and Wyoming to improve firefighter response, protect critical infrastructure and natural resources, ensure clean drinking water, support local timber industries, enhance rural economies and create jobs.

"For nearly a decade, scientists at the USDA Forest Service and risk management experts have tested and refined building these defensible spaces before a wildfire starts," said Secretary Vilsack. "With climate change fueling the wildfire crisis, we are investing in this work through President Biden's Investing in America agenda on an even larger scale as one of the many actions we

are taking to protect the people and communities we serve."

These opportunities were identified through a cross-boundary process that brings together Tribes, local wildland fire managers, business owners, elected officials and scientists to plan for future fires. In addition to using the best available science about fire operations and risks to communities, ecosystems and responders, this process supports the National Cohesive Wildland Fire Management Strategy as well as complementary fuels treatment efforts.

Through this planning process, the Forest Service works with local communities to identify fire barriers such as roads, rivers and other landscape features that can prevent wildfires from spreading. In 2015, scientists at the Forest Service's Rocky Mountain Research Station began work with research universities, federal agencies, states, and independent land and resource management partners to identify these fire barriers in the development of wildfire strategies.

Reinforcing these barriers and constructing adjacent fuel breaks will help reduce the risk of high-severity wildfires in the project areas, all of which are in, or adjacent to, high-risk fire sheds that are outside of the initial 21 Wildfire Crisis Strategy landscapes.

This announcement

is part of President Biden's Investing in America agenda to grow the American economy from the bottom up and the middle out by rebuilding our nation's infrastructure, driving over \$435 billion in private sector manufacturing investments, creating good-paying jobs, and building a clean energy economy to tackle the climate crisis and make our communities more resilient.
