WAG Trap-Neuter-Return on September 24 in Grantsville area

On Sunday, September 17, 2023, the Welfare of Animals Group (WAG) will be humanely trapping stray and feral cats in the Orma area to have them spayed/neutered, vaccinated, and ear tipped (the universal sign that a cat has been part of a Trap-Neuter-Return program).

We would appreciate if you would not put food out for them on Saturday, September 23 as we will be trapping on Sunday morning. Once the cats have recovered from anesthesia (at least 24 to 48 hours) we will return them to their exact location. They will be healthier, happier, and not reproducing and fighting. Thank you for your cooperation. So far we have spayed and neutered 812 community cats (452 females and 360 males). Please keep your personal cats indoors or put a collar on them on Sunday the 17th. If you have any questions, please call Linda at 304-354-7506. If you are aware of a feral cat colony in your area, please let us know.

Female kittens can begin breeding at four months old, so the best time to spay/neuter a colony is when there are only 5 or 6 cats. Trap-Neuter-Return is provided to Calhoun County residents at no cost to the caretaker.

Partial funding for Trap-Neuter-Return is provided by The Oakland Foundation, The Bernard McDonough Foundation, the West Virginia Department of Agriculture, and the Calhoun County Commission.

there are not other options for providers. Shentel is providing service in Calhoun County that many of their customers are extremely satisfied with. Shari Johnson (Ridgeview News) has Shentel on Mt. Zion Ridge and is currently running 148.0 mbps download, and 25.2 mbps upload, and yet when she had Frontier, barely got out of single digits. Melissa West of the Chronicle has to utilize satelitte internet because her only option is dial up. Shelia Burch said that the FCC says that the Southern end of the count was covered because a few houses actually have internet and that the Northern end of the County has less. Several questioned that theory.

Commissioner Helmick announced that the audit was received from the Grantsville Volunteer Fire Department making all audits accounted for. However, Clerk Jean Simers informed him that the West Fork had vet to provide their audit. Jaso Wilson advised that Calhoun EMS' audits had been received and he would be forwarding those to the commission soon.

A Request for funding was received from the Calhoun Livestock Organization to update their kitchen and do plumbing repairs. When Shelia Burch ask if financial statements were requested by those asking the county for money to determine need and fiscal responsibility, Commissioner Helmick said he didn't think they should be. After all, these organizations don't have any money. Alice Holmes amended her request to the Commission for assistance in building repairs for her non profit telling the Commissioners that she would advise them of the amount necessary to repair the roof rather than replace it, Mt. Zion PSD amended their request for funding at which time the commissioners wanted the public to know that a rumor regarding \$250,000 given to the Pleasant Hill PSD was not true. All requests were tabled.

An approved hire was made for Cynrthia Steele for Calhoun E911, and Mitchell McKown for the Calhoun Sheriff's Department to go from part-time makes for better sleeping to full-time effective immediately.

This Week In Calhoun History

The following reports are taken from the Calhoun Chronicle Archives.

1923, 100 YEARS: High School Gets Good Start: The second year of the Calhoun County High School opened Mondaymorning in the new building in South Grantsville, with a fine turnout of students from all sections of the county. The effect of work of Principal Marvin Cooper, since his selection several weeka ago, is reflected in the large number of boys and girls who assembled Monday for the opening of school. Principal Cooper extends a cordial invitation to the general public to visit the high school and witness the work of the students. It's really worth one's while to go over about the noon hour and watch the students leave the assembly hall in order.

1973, 50 YEARS: Air Mail Parcel Post Is Effective: According to the local postmaster, parcel post will be accepted for mailing to most any part of the world effective September 1. These new rates are far less than those in effect at the present time. The rate of 5 cents per ounce will continue to apply (until otherwise instructed) to all domestic air mail weighing up to 8 ounces regardless of distance or zone. The zone rates for parcel post (parcels weighing over 8 ounces) will run somewhat as follows: 1 st and 2 nd zone, 55 cents for first pound and 4 cents for each additional pound, 3 rd zone, 60 cents for first Sept. 23, 1922: Five men were struck and killed at the Glen Rogers mine pound and 8 cents for additional pound etc. Previous to the new rates, a parcel weighing 4 pounds would have cost you \$3.20 to mail whereas the same may now be mailed in 1 st and 2 nd zone for 67 cents. Parcels to territories and U. S. Possessions are 80 cents per lb. Consult your post office for the new rates Sept. 23, 1938: The Mingo Oak was cut effective September 1.




Riley Gerlach gave a short presentation on the history of the View-Master. Members reminisced about this toy while viewing slides through one of the devices.

Last week's Curiosity Corner concerned phrases involving the heart. This week, I thought I would address some of the customs associated with weddings.

State of holy wedlock: "Wed" is an old Anglo-Saxon word meaning to assign property to the bride's father as payment. "Lock" means a pledge. Hence, wedlock is a promise to pay for the bride. Of course, "holy" implies the church. There are the secular kind of marriages, like those done by magistrates and justices of the peace. I understand that, in South Carolina, notaries can perform marriage ceremonies.

Engagement and wedding rings: The engagement ring symbolizes a promise or pledge, and rings have been used to pledge bargains since ancient times. Also, it shows the lady is taken.

Diamonds have become common engagement stones, but only in the last century. Cecil Rhodes established diamond mining in South Africa in the 1880s, which came to be known as the DeBeers Company. They gave us the phrase "a diamond is forever."

The wedding ring seals the bargain: an unbroken band is an emblem of continuity and undying love. The wedding ring is placed on the third finger of the left hand because it was once believed that a "love vein" ran from the heart to the end of that finger.

Bride: In old English, this was the word for cook.

Groom: Derived from the word meaning male child. That would make the bridegroom a male cook, but it is thought that this term comes from German and means the person marrying the bride. (Sounds reasonable to me.)

Best man: (Shouldn't this be the groom?) In very early times (AD 200), if a guy couldn't find a wife in his own community, he would go to a neighboring town and abduct one. There may have been a little resistance to this, so a good friend would be taken along to help get the bride and stand guard during the wedding. This friend became known as the best man (the one who forgets the ring). Bridesmaids and ushers: These relate to an old Roman law that required ten witnesses to help keep away evil spirits who might upset the wedding ceremony. The bridesmaids and ushers were dressed like the bride and groom, so the evil spirits wouldn't know who was getting married. Later, the ushers, or groomsmen, were helpful in standing watch during the honeymoon period. Honeymoon: It was once customary for the newlyweds to drink a potion containing honey on each of the first 30 days of their marriage. During this time, the moon went through all its phases... hence, a honeymoon. June weddings: The Roman month of June was named after Juno, the goddess of women. They believed she blessed marriages that took place during her month. Throwing rice: Rice is a symbol of fertility, health and prosperity. The custom began in Eastern countries, and the Romans adopted it, sometimes using nuts instead of rice. Confetti is sometimes used, and in these environmentallyconscious times, bird seed! Old shoes tied to the honeymoon car: This comes from the custom of the father of the bride giving the groom his daughter's shoes as a symbol that he was now responsible for her. Carrying the bride over the threshold: This was to prevent the bride from tripping or using the wrong (left) foot when stepping over the threshold of her new home. Both were considered to be a sign of bad luck.

Borscht

Borscht is deep red and looks like a good soup for Christmas with a dollop of sour cream and fresh green herbs on top when it's served. With lots of optional ingredients and the fact it can be eaten hot or cold surely makes an idea for someone in 'Readerville." It is said to be the National dish of Ukraine and a staple in other Slavia countries such as Poland and Russia.

Ingredients: cup of diced onions, cup of diced celery, 1 cup of chopped cabbage, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 can diced tomatoes (didn't specify size) 2 cloves of garlic-grated or pressed, 8 cups of wither water, beef broth or chicken broth, 1 or 2 medium carrots, peeled and grated, 2 or 3 medium or large beets, peeled and half of them diced – half of them grated, 1 medium potato - peeled and diced, 1/2 cup fresh dill weed, salt and pepper to taste. Optional ingredients: bay leaf, green beans, peas, beet greens, and shredded pork or pork sausage.

Sauté onions, celery and cabbage in butter till soft and translucent. Add diced tomatoes, garlic and all 8 cups of water or broth, bring to a boil then reduce to simmer. Add carrots, beets and potato and any optional ingredients and simmer about 15 minutes till beets and potatoes are soft Stir in fresh chopped dill weed, salt and pepper. Serve with a dollop of sour cream, bread and butter. (Rye is recommended).

Other famous Ukrainian dishes you will recognize are Chicken Kyiv (fried, stuffed chicken breast) Easter bread, potato pancakes, filled dumplings and cabbage rolls.

The very popular tradition of coloring Easter eggs came from Ukraine, it is the world's largest producer of sunflower seeds, as one of the largest producers of wheat. Ukraine has sometimes been referred to as the "Breadbasket of Europe."

Ukraine is about 233,000 square miles and larger than France. Their languages are Ukrainian with 20 other languages spoken there including about 18% speaking English. Their population was 40million of which more than 8 million have fled. Would to God that peace was as easy to make as a pot of soup. Someone let me know if "Borscht" is as good as it looks!

Last Friday night, the Calhoun County football team made its second consecutive ong road trip of the season to Bachtel Stadium in Mason. The host Wahama White Falcons thoroughly dominated the first quarter of play en route to a 56-20 victory.

The first quarter could not have been more disastrous for the Red Devils, as Wahama scored six touchdowns (three rushes, a pass, a fumble recovery and an interception return) to take a 43-0 lead. The game was so lopsided at that point that the officials shortened the remaining quarters to eight minutes each.

With only 24 minutes of game time to work with, the Red Devils battled back and made the remainder of the game a close contest.

After a scoreless second quarter, Wahama scored another touchdown on a 17-yard run. Calhoun County then answered with its first score of the game late in the third quarter. Facing a third down on their own 16-yard line, the Red Devils got a huge boost when Owen Taylor skirted around the left end and raced 62 yards down the sidelines before being hauled down at the White Falcons' 22. Three consecutive rushes by Jayton Gibson netted the Red Devils their first touchdown of the game. Gibson then took a handoff and passed to Taylor in the end zone for the extra points.

The Red Devils tallied again in the fourth quarter after another long drive. This time Jayton Gibson provided the long runs, carrying the ball 23 and 22 yards on successive plays to move Calhoun out of the shadow of its own goal line and into Wahama territory. The team moved the ball to the White Falcons' 15-yard line, and then Brennan Carpenter tossed a pass to Gibson for a second Red Devil score.

After the try for the extra point failed, Gabe Waldron kicked off to Wahama with only 3:54 remaining in the game. The ball caromed off a White Falcon helmet and Brennan Carpenter fell on the ball, giving the Red Devil offense possession inside Wahama territory.

It took the Red Devils only five plays to score the final points of the game, Gibson finding the end zone on an 11-yard run.

The Red Devils have much to be proud of despite the result of the game. After the rough first quarter, the defense buckled down and held Wahama to only two more scores the rest of the game. This was an impressive feat considering that Wahama kept its starters in the whole game and continued to throw long passes even after the outcome of the game was decided.

workflow. With this integrated suite, all treatment stages – from planning to treatment and follow-up – occur in a single suite, with no need to move the patient.

"Combining CT with fluoroscopy allows for procedures that are not possible in other suites, including combined embolization/ablation procedures to treat cancer and complex drainage procedures," said Amy Deipolyi, MD, PhD, FSIR, Director of Interventional Radiology. "We can now offer high level procedures that otherwise patients would not have access to or must travel out of state for.

The first patients were treated in this state-of-the-art image-guided procedure suite Tuesday, Sept. 5. Only 28 such suites are in use in the United States. This is the first in West Virginia.

The combination of CT and fluoroscopy provides unique opportunities to perform complex procedures in less invasive ways and allows for definitive procedures to be performed in one setting, rather than having to stage procedures with multiple visits.

Many types of patients may benefit from the new equipment. Patients with cancer and portal high blood pressure are most common. But we also treat women with pelvic pain and vaginal bleeding, patients with biliary obstruction and patients needing decompression of biliary and urologic obstructions.

that Biden's ARPA Tax Cut Limit Was Unconstitutional

--Victory Helped Allow West Virginia to Pass Major Tax Cuts--

CHARLESTON — West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey on Friday said the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 11th Circuit in Atlanta denied the U.S. Department of Treasury's motion for a full panel review of the court's January decision. That decision, which West Virginia argued in September 2022, stemmed from the Biden administration's appeal of a November 2021 victory that had protected the well-established authority of states to lower taxes for their citizens.

The Attorney General co-led a 13-state coalition in April 2021 in suing the Biden administration to stop the "tax mandate" buried in the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

West Virginia's victory in this case empowered states to pass tax cuts just like the major tax cut legislation passed in the state in March 2023.


"This case is about state's sovereignty, and I'm pleased the court reiterated the January ruling," Attorney General Morrisey said. "Our lawsuit was designed to protect West Virginia from federal overreach. We have fought back against that overreach with the November 2021 win in district court, but the Biden administration kept on insisting their interpretation of the law is correct."

"It was not, and the court agreed."

The coalition argued federal treasury officials cannot force states to relinquish control of their taxing authority in return for economic aid related to COVID-19. By broadly preventing all 50 states from exercising their tax powers effectively, the stimulus bill provision amounted to one of the most egregious power grabs by the federal government in the nation's history.

The district court in November held the tax mandate violates the U.S. Constitution's Spending Clause. The court ruled that Congress must be clear if it intends to impose a condition on the granting of federal monies — that is, it must do so unambiguously. The U.S. Department of the Treasury and the Secretary of the Treasury appealed that decision in January of last year.

West Virginia co-led the coalition with Alabama and Arkansas with support from Alaska, Florida, Iowa, Kansas, Montana, New Hampshire, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota and Utah.

While teams and cheer squads do their best each week to celebrate the school competitions the students are encouraged very little to feel as thought they're apart. A empromtu Friday afternoon thuse was an apparent afterthought, when the Career Center was closed and the school needed something to occupy students. The Cheersquad Coach and Band was notifited late afternoon of the event without any time to prepare. School pride may seem trivial to some, but it is an important part of building a successful school community. When students have pride in their school it gives them a sense of ownership which sets in motion a range of positive behaviours. The Cheersquad recently wore their uniforms on game day and were promptly removed from class and asked to put on pants to cover their legs because the uniforms didn't comply with dress codes. While in theory this may have been true, their reasoning was to encourage school spirit and the uniforms are viewed as appropriate for school event.

A longtime complaint against Calhoun Schools has been the inability to make parents and volunteers feel welcome. A case in point is boosters and volunteers not having access (via keys) to the areas of the school needed to perform their duties overseeing their perspective events. When the school was recently re-keyed, access was denied to many areas. It is understood that School Business Official keys had gotten handed out to many undeserved individuals creating security risks, but removing access to trusted individuals should not have happened and creates feeling of distrust. The final parent complaint Mrs. Johnson share was the request of middle school parents to get recognition for 8th grade athletes through banners for outstanding achievement which was denied. The reason given (unsubstantiated) was because it detracted from the High School Acheivements. Also a matter of complaint was their inability to celebrate their foot ball homecoming.

Calhoun Middle School Band was recognized by the Calhoun Board of outside. Currently, because of the mud, it's not feasible to use the grassy areas. Education for their 2023 Spring Adjudication where they received a Superior Other purposes for the levy would be transportation for extracurricular events Rating under the direction of Band Director Michael McHenry and Assistant and activities, supplements for teachers, replacement of the HVAC and paid lunches for staff and service professionals. Calhoun is one of very few school in the state that does not have a County levy to assist in funding.

> Graduation date has been a matter of contention for several years with it's falling on the annual track and field state competition. However the matter was put to vote and was overwhelmly decided that graduation would remain the same time, being May 17th, 2024. This issue has been discussed by parents at numerous Board Meetings. Why should our kids who work hard have to choose to walk across the stage and receive their diploma with their classmates or participating in sports? These kids work hard and shouldn't have to choose.

> The school drug testing policy was discussed, as some board members were not satisfied with the vagueness of the policy, but no action was taken.

As none of these matters were addressed by the board due to the matters not being on the agenda and being spoken of during delegation time.

Board member Hortz Motz, who sits on the board of the Calhoun Gilmer Career Center, reported that two new hires have occurred. Mr. Huffman, who spent seventeen years in law enforcement in Gilmer county has been hired as instructor of the Criminal Justice program and Mr. White who is now instructor of the culinary program. He eplaced and was highly recommended by Liljon McCormick who left the Career Center for a State Board of Education position.

The Career center recently sustained serious damgage to the roof over the commons area of the school. The roof drains were clogged causing water to pour into the commons area of the building causing damage and closing the school for one day due to clean up. There is progress on the repairs following a cleaning company being brought in as well as an electrician. Board member Jenna Jett asked if equipment was damaged to which Motz response was the damage stayed mainly in the commons area, not offices or classrooms.

Mr. Fitzwater gave his Superintendent's report, telling the board that there is a couple of big projects to discuss. A new score board has been installed at the Football field, donated by Hope Gas. Earlewine Concrete and B. Miller also donated their time to the installation. Jeff Houchin donated his crew to help with rock work on the baseball field. They are currently waiting for First Energy to hook up a transformer for the newly installed score board donated by Calhoun Banks for the field.

A new school bus has been purchased and is set to arrive next month along with four buses in limbo. Fitzwater said that the school had gotten behind on bus replacement with a 2003 bus still in use, far exceeding the expected time of use. As school started buses began to break down causing the need for Roane and Gilmer County Schools to loan Calhoun replacements. "We're good right now," Fitzwater said, "We're read to rock and roll."

Facility wise he reported that they're trying to address the humidity issues at Calhoun Middle High school with the need to replace two boilers and one chiller in the facility. CMHS was opened in 1998 and much of the equipment is at the point of needing replaced. He said that as far as the three facilities are concerned the age of the building are forgotten with CMHS still being referred to as a new school, when in fact it's 25 years old. Although Arnoldsburg Elementary is the newest school, Pleasant Hill is likely in the greater condition because of the new roof and recent renovations there.

With school improvements on the heart of Mr. Fitzwater he went on to discuss their plans to put forth a school levy on the next ballot of 2024. "Thirty Seven votes" he said, "that's what we missed having a levy by." His intention is to speak with staff and students about helping to promote the levy. "It was never about the football team," he added, "With an astroturf field the school can utilize the area for recess and activities allowing the students more time



Local Calhoun Law Enforcement News By Shari Johnson

Keener Incarcerated for Home Confinement Violation



Brooklyn Keener was originally arrested on June 16th, 2023 for Domestic Assault and Battery. Having been released on a Home Confinement agreement, she has since been re-incarcerated for violation of that home confinement to await a hearing before Judge Anita Ashley on the charge. She was arrested on September 12, 2023 for the

violation.

Hager Arrested on Driving Suspended Charge



According to a complaint filed by Trooper Brian E. Young of the West Virginia State Police, on April 27, 2023, Dustin C. Hager was stopped and cited for Driving on Suspended Operators and an Expired Motor Vehicle Inspection Sticker on February 23, 2023.

In an assist with then Sheriff Warren Basnett, ustin Hager, driving a Ford Cargo van, traveling south of Grantsville on Route 16 was stopped by Sheriff Basnett. When ask to produce his license, registration and insurance information, it was discovered that that his license had been surrendered for unpaid citations on May 18th, 2022. A uniform citation was issued at the time of the incident, but it was not until this time that he was arrested on the charges. Hager is currently in the WV Regional Jail having been placed there on September 12th to await trial for the misdemeanor charges. He is currently on a \$500.00 bond. Although innocent until proven guilty, penalties for which he is facing is being fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$500 for Driving Suspended.





In a criminal complaint filed in Calhoun Magistrate Court by Brian E. Young of the West Virginia State police, the charges of two counts of "Taking the Identity of Another Person" and "Fraud in connection with Access Device" lodged against Lilly Marie Knopp the 12th of September, 2023.

In his complaint, Trooper Young stated that at about 5:30 p.m. on June 12th, 2023, hehad met with the victim, James Wyer at his residence in Chloe, WV.

The victim had contacted Trooper Young after he'd received evidence that Lilly Knopp had taken his identity to gain money and merchandise without his permission.

When Trooper Young met with Mr. Wyer, he presented the trooper with a copy of his Equifax Credit Report dated June 5th, 2023 and a credit collection notice from Resurgent Capital Services for the amount of \$443.52 with the original creditor being MVR Banks.

Wyer then pointed out that there were two addresses listed on the report in Ivydale, WV belonging to Lilly Knopp, the accused. After he had received the report, Mr. Myers contacted Resurgent Capital Services who advised him that the original debt was from a Visa card issued for that account. When Mr. Wyers attempted to sign up for a Kredit Carma Account to check his activity, he was notified there was an account already active, registered in his name with a gmail account email address belonging to Lilly Knopp.

On Wednesday, June 14th, 2023 at around 11 a.m. Trooper Young recorded a statement from Mr. Wyer where he stated that Resurgent Collection Agency had informed him that the credit issue had originated in November of 2022.

At that time, Mr. Wyer informed them that he was living at his current address, and told Trooper Young he had never lived at the addresses listed on the report.

He further stated to Trooper Young that Ms. Knopp is the mother of his 15 year old daughter and he has known her since she was 14 years of age. He knew the addresses listed in Ivydale to be hers and he denied having ever given her permission to use any of his information to apply for creditor the other documents or accounts. He advised that he had not opened any accounts for credit because he didn't believe in using credit. On or about June 2023, Nigel Jeffries, Prosecutor of Calhoun County sent a subpoena to the Resurgent Capital Services in reference to the victim and the account opened in his name. On or about July 18th, 2023, Jeffries received the response stating the two addresses associated with the account. The first address was that of Mr. Wyers, and the second address was that of Ms. Knopp. The first credit card statement f rom REVVI, with transactions listed on November 29, 2002 through December 12, 2002, list purchases made on November 26, 2022 from the Ebay Company for \$84.79. An administrative order was issue to the Ebay company in reference to the purchase for which Ebay responded with the purchase order listing the buyers email address as that of Lilly Knopp. The purchase was for a set of three 2022 Monster Day Out Frankie Stein. On August 4th, 2023, Trooper Young filed for a search warrant for the Google account information of two google accounts, lillysims72@google.com and llyknopp1@google.com. "Sims" is the maiden name of Lilly Knopp. The trooper also filed a search warrant for the Ebay account of Lillysims72. On Tuesday, August 29th, 2023 Trooper Young received the return from Ebay LLC from the search warrant he had submitted. The account holder, physical address where packages were received and email were listed to Lilly Knopp. Through the investigation, Trooper Brian E. Young discovered that the accused used a credit card she obtained illegally to make a purchase on Ebay for the amount of \$84.79 and had created a Credit Karma account using the victim's information to monitor access to the victim's credit information for financial gain, credit and merchandise. Lilly Knopp, age51, was incarcerated in the WV Central Regional Jail for the charges listed above on September 14th, 2023. She is being held on \$15,000 bond for felony case number 23M07F00039 and is awaiting trial. She is innocent, until proven guilty in the court of law.

No Cause of Death listed for 29 Year Old found Dead in Arnoldsburg area

According to the West Virginia State Police, On September 10th, 2023, Austin Wiss, age 29, was found dead in the residence of Tony McCune on Arnoldsburg Road.

The cause of death has yet to be released due to the Medical Examiners report having not been returned; there is however no foul play suspicioned.

This story will be followed up when more information is made available.

Altercation at Foodland Under Investigation

An altercation that reportedly started at Baker's Mart in Grantsville, was shortly thereafter reported to be occurring at Grantsville Foodland.

The West Virginia State Police began their investigation on Sunday evening, September 17th, 2023 as to why two young men were reportedly into a confrontational conversation that ended in violence. James Winkler and Caden Sweat, both of Grantsville are being investigated as to why the fight happened, but no charges have been filed.
