



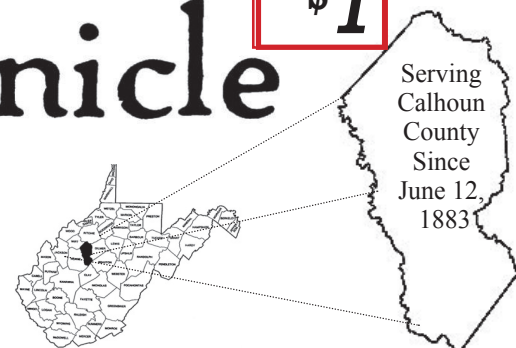

1982 Foundation Weekly Update! Well it has been another busy week on site and elsewhere, and week of emotional highs and lows. We are working hard to secure construction grants for the projects which to date the two large ones that we applied for have not been awarded. Grants are planned to be one third of the total funding. One cited that the reason the was not granted was that this was a “social welfare” project. You might imagine my reaction to that. I think we have two things working against us. First, this project spun up so fast and had significant match that the grant organizations were a little caught off guard despite tons of communication. The other matter we are fighting and we must overcome is not unlike WV as a whole, we are fighting an image issue. Yes we may be at the bottom on many lists but that does not define who we are or our capabilities. People evidently cannot believe that Houser’s are willing to take the bull by the horns and bring change due to the preconceived stereotypes. Now you might also imagine the reaction I had to this when I realized this was as issue. As they say “them fightin’ words”, especially if you do not take the time to come and see for yourself. But long story short, the week ended on a much better note on this topic than it started. Life lesson confirmed: You gotta stand up and fight for what is right, then pray. God didn’t promise us a harvest if we drop the potatoes in the ground and then pray he will cover them and do the rest. We have to do our part and a lot of times we have to do what is uncomfortable. He didn’t say it would be easy.

On the construction front, the swimming pool is a couple weeks away from being done. I believe the projected completion data is October 16. Next week the plastering starts, then it has to cure before the paint is applied. The diving stands finally came in. They were lost in transit for a bit and that had us concerned. Continuation of the installation of pump house electrical and plumbing progressed well this week as well.

On the main building, lots of demolition inside and out. Removal of side walks, concrete pads, and old foundations were a major accomplishment. Rear wing interior walls were demolished to elevation. Structural steel will be installed in this wing when the steel arrives. The old concrete was crushed and the aggregate used to fill in the mud pit on the back side of the school. Demo of old fire suppression is advancing on all three floors. Next week the team will demo for the eight wall penetrations for the apartments as well.

We will also be starting on the gym next filling by blocking off crawl space and removing the stage flooring which we will either try to save or salvage. The structure underneath needs replaced so we have to do this to get that done.

Big preparations are under way for the Fall Festival. We have a big schedule lined up for kids of all ages starting in the morning at 10:00am to noon with a bow clinic by Eric Hoskins, International Bow Champion. We will have two other clinics for kids: fishing at 1:00 and goat handling/showing at 3:00. Lunch will be our first launch of Tiki Tacos serving beef, chicken and fish

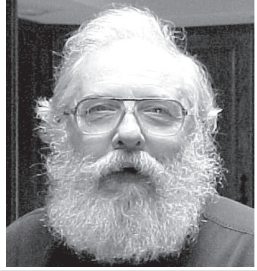
A funeral service was held at Stump Funeral Home & Cremation, Inc., Grantsville, on Sept. 26th with Pastor Clark Samples officiating.

There were 262 riders on the Creston ATV Poker Run. Nancy Wright who had been helping her sister Linda move is heading back to her home in Florida.

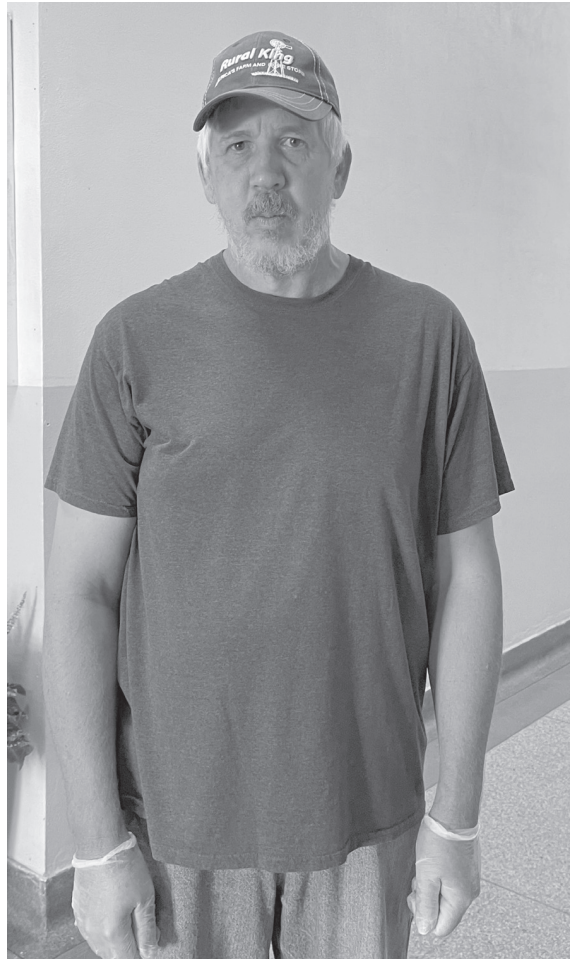
Local folks participated in and dined at the Wirt County FFA beef barbecue. Next weekend it is Pioneer Days.

1923, 100 YEARS: Local Happenings: Ellsworth Stump, merchant, farmer and business man of Apple Farm, was attending to business matters here Monday.

W. B. Stalnaker, a leading farmer of Altizer, was a pleasant visitor at the Chronicle office Saturday while in town on a business mission.

Gilbert Haddox and Al Gainer passed through Grantsville Wednesday with a likely looking drove of cattle which they were purchasing for market.

Uniforms and equipment for the High School football team arrived this week and the boys are resplendent in their new regalia.

The Glenville Normal School football team passed through here Friday enroute to Spencer where it played the High School team Saturday. The result of the game was a tie 0-0, Glenville being unable to match the swiftness of the Spencer lads.

The Ford truck belonging to the Smith Store was taken from in front of the store sometime Monday night by some young ruffians and driven up Phillips Run where it was wrecked and abandoned. The top, windshield and one wheel were broken, and it is a mystery how the occupants escaped severe injuries.

Former Governor William A. MacCorkle is back in his office on Summers Street in Charleston. He has been abroad for the past six weeks for health issues that he has had for six months. Just before his return home his wife, passed away and he learned of her only when he landed back in the country several days ago.

1948, 75 YEARS: Calhoun High School News: Calhoun High's 1948 Football team emerged victorious for the third straight time Friday night as they overcame a stubborn Wirt County High team 25-7 in a game which saw the inauguration of the lights on the Calhoun Field. Wirt put up an inspired game against Calhoun team that appeared slow and sluggish at times, especially on defense.

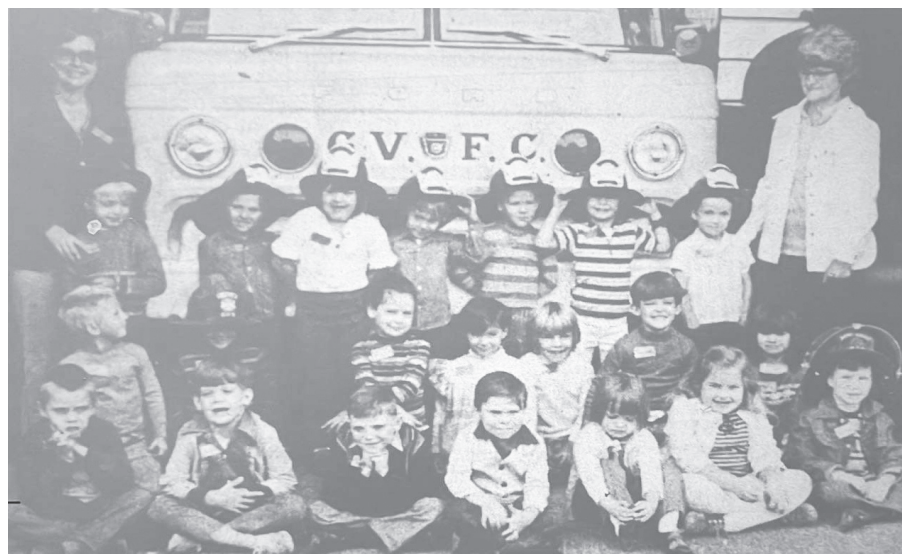
Riddel, J. White and Lennis Johnson scored for Calhoun, while Wirt exhibited a tricky offense which showed the effects of good coaching by their new coach, Al Lilley, for luminary of Glenville State College.

Perhaps Calhoun's listless showing might be explained in part by the fact that they were playing with one eye on this week's encounter with Spencer High School. According to eyewitnesses of the 13-13 tie game between Spencer and Clendenin last Thursday, Calhoun will have to be "up" for the Spencer game if they expect to emerge victorious. Spencer was surprised by once-beaten Clendenin, and only a last minute desperation pass enabled Spencer to tie the score on the final play of the game. The Yellow Jackets will be on the rebound and Calhoun will need to show her best.

1973, 50 YEARS: Kindergarten Class visits Grantsville Fire Dept.: Children enrolled in the Kindergarten program at Cabot Station visited the Grantsville Fire department last Thursday; seeing the big new truck and other fire fighting equipment. They also visited at the Board of Education offices.

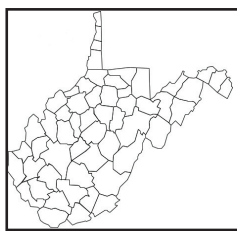

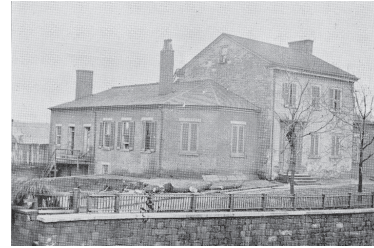
This Week In West Virginia History

Oct. 5, 1992: Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in Grafton was designated as a National Historic Landmark, one of only 16 in the state.

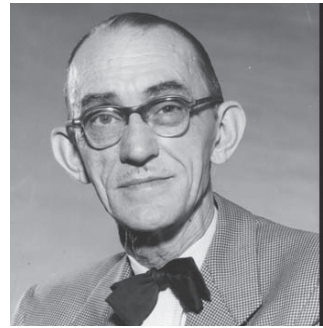
The first Mother's Day observance took place at the church on May 10, 1908.



Oct. 7, 1747: Pioneer Ebenezer Zane, the founder of Wheeling, was born on the South Branch of the Potomac River near present Moorefield in Hardy County.

Oct. 7, 1900: Poet Roy Lee Harmon was born in Boone County.

He was the founder of the West Virginia Poetry Society and served as the state's poet laureate for 38 years.



Oct. 7, 1957: Musician Michael W. Smith was born in Kenova. One of the top-selling artists in gospel music history, he has recorded 25 albums, had 35 number-one songs, and written over a dozen books.

Oct. 8, 1993: The Rev. Bernard Coffindaffer died unexpectedly of a heart attack. Starting in 1984, Coffindaffer began erecting clusters of crosses in West Virginia and other states. He was buried in Nicholas County, just across the highway from a set of his crosses.



Oct. 9, 1877: The Episcopal Church created the Diocese of West Virginia. The initial convention of the new diocese met at St. John's Episcopal in Charleston, with 14 clergy and 16 lay delegates.

Oct. 9, 2014: Following court rulings and announcements by the governor and the attorney general, same-sex marriage was effectively legalized in West Virginia.



Oct. 10, 1774: Shawnee warriors led by Cornstalk were defeated at the Battle of Point Pleasant.

It was the only major engagement of Dunmore's War and the most important battle ever fought in present West Virginia.

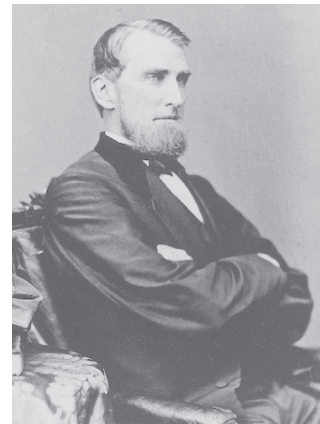
Oct. 10, 1872: Architect Rus Warne was born in Parkersburg. Warne designed many notable buildings in Charleston, including City Hall and the Masonic Temple.

Oct. 10, 1878: Blanche Lazzell was born in Maidsville, Monongalia County.

She was one of West Virginia's most notable artists and is recognized as one of America's leading abstract painters and print makers.



Oct. 10, 1948: During a boat-racing event in Charleston, Chuck Yeager flew a Lockheed P-80 Shooting Star under the South Side Bridge, surprising boaters, audience and news media at the event.



Oct. 11, 1811: State founder and U.S. Senator Waitman Thomas Willey was born near Farmington. Willey proposed the West Virginia Statehood Bill in the Senate and saw to its passage and later signing by President Lincoln.

He was then elected as one of West Virginia's first two U.S. senators, serving from 1863 to 1871.

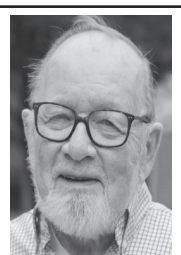

CURIOSITY CORNER

Question: What is a ten-gallon hat? (Asked by a curious cowboy.)

Reply: Well, pardner, this is the name applied to the broad-brimmed hats with the tall, round crowns that were once commonly worn in the Southwest and in old cowboy movies. The ten-gallon notation had no relationship to the liquid capacity. (If you're into metric, that would be about a 38-liter hat.)

It seems the Spanish in the old Southwest used braids to decorate their broad-brimmed hats. A tall hat could accommodate several braids: six, seven, eight... and a really tall one might even hold ten braids. The Spanish word for these braid is galón. So, a really tall hat would be a ten-galón hat. The spelling and meaning got mixed up along the way.

Question: Someone told me there are male trees and female trees. Is this true? (Asked by a curious lumberjack.)

Reply: In a sense, that designation is gender correct. Flowering fruit trees require pollination to produce fruit. The flowers that trees bear function as "male" and "female." the male part of the flower produces pollen and that carries the sperm cells to the female part of the flower. When fertilization occurs, the flower produces seeds that develop a fleshy fruit coating.

The flowers of most trees contain both the male and female fertilizing parts. However, some trees bear the flowers of only one function, and are referred to as "male," or "female" trees.

For such trees to bear fruit, cross pollination is required. This means something must carry the male pollen to the female flower, such as the wind or bees. So, "female" trees bear fruit and "male" trees do not. In case you want to know, the technical name of such trees and plants is "dioecious." Examples of dioecious trees are the persimmon tree and the mulberry tree.

About five percent of plant species are dioecious, including such crops as spinach and marijuana. I wouldn't know about the latter and I don't eat much spinach.

On Sunday, October 8, 2023, the Welfare of Animals Group (WAG) will be humanely trapping feral cats in the Grantsville and Big Springs areas to have them spayed/neutered, vaccinated, and ear tipped (the universal sign that a cat has been part of a Trap-Neuter-Return program). We would appreciate if you would not put food out for them on Saturday, October 7 as we will be trapping on Sunday morning. Once the cats have recovered from anesthesia (at least 24 to 48 hours) we will return them to their exact location. They will be healthier, happier, and not reproducing and fighting. Thank you for your cooperation. So far we have spayed and neutered 812 community cats (452 females and 360 males).

Please keep your personal cats indoors or put a collar on them on Sunday the 8th. If you have any questions, please call Linda at 304-354-7506.

If you are aware of a feral cat colony in your area, please let us know. Female kittens can begin breeding at four months old, so the best time to spay/neuter a colony is when there are only 5 or 6 cats. Trap-Neuter-Return is provided to Calhoun County residents at no cost to the caretaker. BUCKHANNON—This Friday, October 6, at 6:30pm, the West Virginia Humanities Council and West Virginia Wesleyan College will commemorate the launch of the Council's new traveling exhibition, Born of Rebellion: West Virginia Statehood and the Civil War. A reception will be held at the college's Annie Merner Pfeiffer Library on campus, accompanied by light refreshments. Attendees will be able to tour the exhibition during and after the reception. The event is free and open to the public, no RSVP required.

The short reception will feature remarks by former Wesleyan history professor Dr. Stephen Cresswell, who taught at the college for several decades. Cresswell edited the published edition of We Will Know What War Is, the Civil War diary of Upshur County teenager Sirene Bunten, which was published by the college in 1993. The diary and other Bunten artifacts are preserved in the college library's special collections.

"Sirene Bunten's diary was so helpful in the development of Born of Rebellion," says Council program officer Kyle Warmack. "We wanted to ground the complicated events of the Civil War in the perspectives of everyday West Virginians, and what is more relatable than the reflections of a teenage girl who is witnessing all of this uncertainty and danger around her?" Warmack adds that the diary's publication highlights the important work of historians like Cresswell and oft-overlooked preservation efforts of university libraries.

Also featured during the October 6 event will be a screening of the 1977 short film, For Liberty and Union, originally produced for West Virginia Independence Hall. "It's quite a time capsule," says Warmack. "Viewing the film five decades later showcases how our understanding of history and ourselves is always evolving—both through continual new research, and the interpretation of that research."

After its debut in Buckhannon, the exhibit will move on to Morgantown, Wheeling, and other locations throughout 2023 and 2024. TREASURER MOORE ANNOUNCES MORE THAN \$3.7 MILLION IN WEST VIRGINIA CASH NOW CHECKS MAILED TO RECIPIENTS

CHARLESTON, W.Va. – State Treasurer Riley Moore today announced checks totaling more than \$3.7 million have been sent to more than 3,000 individuals as part of the second year of the "West Virginia Cash Now" program, which automatically reunites certain individuals with their lost or unclaimed funds.

"The West Virginia Cash Now program has revolutionized how we reunite people with their lost and unclaimed money," Treasurer Moore said. "Now in its second year, we've been able to automatically send nearly \$7 million in unclaimed property to its rightful owners without the need to file claims with our Office. It's one of the many ways we've modernized and streamlined the State Treasurer's Office to better serve our citizens."

West Virginia Cash Now launched last year as a new, automated system for sending unclaimed property to its rightful owners – without the need for those individuals to file paperwork with the State Treasurer's Office.

Borne out of House Bill 4511, an unclaimed property modernization bill that Treasurer Moore proposed to lawmakers during the 2022 legislative session, this program allows the Unclaimed Property Division to quickly issue checks to residents who have addresses and contact information that are readily verifiable in legal databases.

The Treasurer's Office mailed letters to potential recipients in July to notify them they should be receiving a check through the new program. In addition to informing the individuals they would be getting a check, the letters were also used to verify addresses. Letters that came back undeliverable were removed from the West Virginia Cash Now check distribution.

A total of 3,314 individuals will receive checks as part of this year's distribution, totaling \$3,762,666 returned to rightful owners.

The checks were mailed by the Office at the end of the last week, so they should be hitting residents' mailboxes as early as today.

"I urge everyone: If you receive a letter from our Office, be sure to open it and deposit the check that's inside," Treasurer Moore said. "One of the biggest challenges we often face with the unclaimed property program is that people think it's a scam or too good to be true – it's not. This is your money, and it's our job to return it to you, so deposit that check with confidence and use the money as you see fit."

West Virginia's unclaimed property laws protect the public by ensuring money and property owed to them is returned, rather than remaining permanently with financial institutions, business associations, governments and other entities. The Treasurer seeks to reunite the unclaimed property, which often comes from uncashed checks, refunds, stocks or safe deposit box contents, with its owner.

The Unclaimed Property Division regularly receives property remittances from holders, and now has more than 3 million listings valued at more than \$400 million in its database.

The West Virginia Cash Now program applies to one of the most common types of claims: Individual property owners with claim amounts ranging from \$500 to less than \$5,000 will be receiving checks this year through the program.

Information on the Cash Now program is available by clicking on the "WV Cash Now" tab at the top of the page.

While the Cash Now program created a new automated process for certain claims, it does not apply to all claims. Businesses, government entities, estate claims and securities are not covered by the program because additional documentation is required to verify the owner. Individuals with claims less than \$500 or more than \$5,000 will also still have to file paperwork with the Office to receive their claim.

Since the West Virginia Cash Now program will not cover all types of claims, or because certain claim information might not be able to be matched with individuals in available databases, Treasurer Moore emphasized that individuals should still regularly visit www.WVUnclaimedProperty.gov to search and see if the Office is holding any assets in their name.

NEWS FROM THE DEMOCRATIC VIEWPOINT

It's not a "Government Shutdown," it's a MAGA Shutdown.

MAGA Republicans, a small but disturbingly powerful group in the US House of Representatives, have been on a steady march to shut down the United States government. Their supposed leader, Speaker Kevin McCarthy, is afraid to cross them and refuses to work with Democrats.

There's no way to pretend both parties are involved. It's solely Republicans' failure to govern. Why do the MAGA Republicans refuse to fund our government? Because they now oppose the federal funding plan that they signed in May. They say the spending (they agreed to) is out of control.

Even Republicans call this "the first-ever shutdown about nothing." "The weirdest thing," said an economist from a right-leaning think tank, "is that the Republicans don't have any demands. What do they want? We simply don't know."

This is legislative terrorism. If we can't get our way, we'll create chaos and tear the whole thing down. Comparison to toddlers is unfair to 2-year-olds who don't understand the trouble

Attorney General Morrisey Seeks to Intervene in Lawsuit Filed to Remove Trump from West Virginia Ballots

Release Date: Oct. 2, 2023--CHARLESTON — West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey's Office has moved to intervene on behalf of the State in a lawsuit filed in the United States District Court for the Southern District of West Virginia, which seeks to keep former President Donald J. Trump off the ballot for the West Virginia Presidential Primary and General Elections. This case is one of many, as activists across the country are suing to prevent Trump from being on 2024 ballots.

Activist and longshot presidential candidate John Anthony Castro filed the lawsuit, citing Section 3 of the 14th Amendment of the United States Constitution as the basis of his case. Castro contends that Trump is ineligible to be a candidate for President of the United States on the grounds that he allegedly "engaged in or provided 'aid or comfort' to an insurrection."

"Excluding an eligible candidate from the ballot deprives citizens of the choice for themselves who they want to represent them in every level of government and impedes a fair and free election process," Attorney General Morrisey said. "Any eligible candidate has the right to be on the ballot unless legally disqualified, and we will defend the laws of West Virginia and the right of voters and candidates to the fullest."

As the motion explains, Attorney General Morrisey has sought to intervene on behalf of the State to ensure that West Virginians will in fact have the "right to cast a vote for the candidate of their choosing."

To date, states that have similar cases include Arizona, Colorado, Maine, Michigan, Minnesota, New Hampshire, and Oklahoma. Similar challenges are anticipated in the near future as the 2024 election cycle begins in January.

"Every eligible candidate, including Donald Trump, has the constitutional right to have their name on West Virginia's Primary Election ballot unless legally disqualified," Warner said. "Seeking to remove voters' opportunity to nominate a candidate to be the next President of the United States is not to be taken lightly. As West Virginia's chief election official, every eligible candidate and registered voter can trust that I will follow and enforce the Constitution," Warner continued.

The lawsuit filed in West Virginia was by Texas resident John A. Castro. Castro and others have filed dozens of similar lawsuits in other states. The West Virginia lawsuit names Secretary Warner and former President Donald Trump as co-defendants in an attempt to deny Mr. Trump access to West Virginia's Primary Election to be held on May 14, 2024.

Secretary Warner is a graduate of the United States Military Academy at West Point and the WVU College of Law. He also holds a Master's Degree in International Law from the University of Virginia. He is a veteran of the United States Army with 23 years of service and served five years in Afghanistan with the U.S. State Department.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Today, U.S. Senator Shelley Moore Capito (R-W.Va.), Ranking Member of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies (Labor-HHS), announced funding from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to support renovation and construction of health care and educational facilities, as well as support in the fight against opioids in West Virginia. These awards were secured through Congressionally Directed Spending (CDS) requests made by Senator Capito.

This facility is estimated to serve over 10,000 annual in-person visits, as well as thousands of virtual appointments, and will remove the burden from patients who would otherwise have to travel to receive care.

“I am proud to have delivered resources for Potomac Valley Hospital to build this satellite site. As the telehealth industry continues to grow as a viable option for health care in West Virginia, the new cardiology and dermatology suites deliver treatment to people right in their homes,” Ranking Member Capito said. “This facility has the potential to reach the Keyser community both virtually and in-person, creating a new outlet for care that will serve thousands of West Virginians in the future.”

Shepherd University Chemistry Department CDS Funding: Ranking Member Capito also secured a \$609,000 CDS award for the revitalization of the Shepherd University Chemistry Department, including the upgrade of lab and collaborative spaces, installation of additional equipment and tools like fume hoods.

“The new opportunities available with better tools and more optimized space at Shepherd’s chemistry department will help students and professors achieve more in the classroom and find success. This is great news for our students in Shepherdstown and I look forward to seeing the impact these upgrades will make,” Ranking Member Capito said.

Huntington CARA CDS Funding: Ranking Member Capito also secured a \$500,000 CDS award for the Huntington Comprehensive Opioid Addiction and Recovery Approach (CARA) Program, which will aim to support an expansion of staff and program resources to better connect and coordinate multiple public health, first responder, social service, medical, and other agencies in a holistic initiative to address the disproportionate impacts of illicit opioid use in Huntington, W.Va.

“The opioid crisis has devastated far too many West Virginians, their families, and their communities across our state,” Ranking Member Capito said. “I was proud to secure this funding for Huntington CARA so we can help fight back against the drug crisis with a holistic and coordinated response. This funding will help bring local resources together and help combat the scourge of addiction.”

Minnie Hamilton Critical Access Hospital Renovation Project CDS Funding: Ranking Member Capito also secured a \$339,000 CDS award for the Minnie Hamilton Critical Access Hospital Renovation Project, which will provide the resources required to renovate and update the facility, which is more than 60 years old. Lost in the outdoors of Wild, Wonderful West Virginia? Here are 10 expert tips to stay safe and find your way home.

CHARLESTON, WV — Getting lost, especially in the wild woods of West Virginia, can be overwhelming, but with the right knowledge and preparation, you can increase your chances of survival and find your way back to safety.

From the West Virginia Emergency Management Division’s (WVEMD) Search and Rescue Coordinator, these tips can help you stay calm, make informed decisions, and ultimately, make it out of the woods safely. Whether you’re a hunter or just an occasional hiker, this information could be a lifesaver when you find yourself facing the unexpected while in the woods.

Here are 10 important tips from WVEMD’s Search and Rescue veterans about what people can do if they become lost:

1. **Stay Calm and Stay Put:** The moment you realize you’re lost, STOP moving. The best course of action is often to stay put. Panic and wandering can make it harder for search teams to locate you.

2. **Signal for Help:** Use items such as whistles, mirrors, bright clothing, or a flashlight to attract attention. Three short whistle blasts, flashlight beams (flicking flashlight on and off), or other signals repeated in a series of three represent the universal distress (SOS) signal.

You may build a fire to signal rescuers, but only if it is absolutely safe to do so.

3. **Tell Someone Your Plans:** Always inform a friend or family member about your planned route and estimated return time. This information can greatly assist search teams in locating you if needed. Make sure to include where you’ll park your vehicle.

4. **Carry Essential Supplies:** Pack a small survival kit containing water, food, flashlights (more than one), a first aid kit, multi-tool, an emergency or “space” blanket, and a whistle. An extra survival supply is a filtration straw which allows you to drink water more safely from creeks or streams in an emergency. These items can support you until help arrives.

Include medications vital to your health, such as epi-pens, asthma inhalers, diabetes supplies, etc. A cell phone does not replace survival items like a map or flashlight. Always carry essential supplies in your survival kit.

5. **Stay Visible:** If you need to move to find help, stay in open areas and make yourself visible. Avoid dense vegetation or steep terrain that might hinder your movement.

6. **Follow Waterways:** If you’re in an unfamiliar area, following a river or stream can often lead you to people.

7. **Stay Hydrated and Rest:** Conserve energy by staying hydrated and resting when needed. Overexertion can lead to exhaustion and disorientation.

8. **Use Landmarks:** If you have a map and can identify landmarks, you might be able to navigate yourself back to safety. Always carry a map and compass when venturing into unfamiliar territory.

9. **Stay Warm:** Hypothermia can set in quickly, even in mild weather. Dress in layers and use your survival kit to stay warm. Carrying an emergency or “space” blanket can keep you warm and help signal for help.

10. **Stay Positive and Stay Vocal:** Maintain a positive mindset and keep talking to yourself or to searchers. This not only boosts your morale but can also help search teams locate you.

Please note that these are general guidelines and may need to be adapted based on the environment and situation you find yourself in. Always prioritize your safety and follow any instructions provided by local officials or search and rescue teams.

Automatic Supplemental Payment for Low Income Energy Assistance Program Recipients

CHARLESTON, W.Va. – The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR) announced an automatic supplemental payment will be issued to individuals who received LIEAP (Low Income Energy Assistance Program) in the 2023 program year. The payment will range from \$25 to \$47 and will be based on the amount of LIEAP assistance paid to the utility provider or to the client for bulk fuel.

The supplemental payment will be issued to the company that provided the main heating source for the individual’s home (i.e., electric company, gas company, etc.). Individuals who received LIEAP for bulk fuel will receive a check by mail.

This is a one-time payment. All clients should receive payment by mid-October.

Flu season/RSV season and vaccines

Oct. 2, 2023--Fall is here, and the Mid-Ohio Valley Health Department encourages everyone to make an appointment to get their seasonal flu vaccine, as well as an RSV vaccination.

The CDC recommends everyone 6 months and older receive their flu vaccine, generally before the end of October.

“Getting a flu vaccine is important for those who are at higher risk for getting severe cases, such as those with chronic health conditions, those that are 65 and older, pregnant women and young children,” said Amy Phelps, Public Information Officer. “A flu vaccine will help protect yourself, your loved ones and your community.”

Respiratory syncytial virus, or RSV, is a common virus that generally spreads around the same time as the flu. It can cause other serious infections, such as lung inflammation and pneumonia, and is the most common cause of serious infections in children under the age of 1.

The new vaccines reduce the risk of developing serious cases of the illness.

Food For Thought

This week I am going back to apples and the late 1960's. We lived in the community and I was divorced.

My three older sons were 11, 12 and 13 years old. The twins were five years old (girls) and my youngest son was three years old.

My older boys had two or three bikes and rode all around our country roads at their free will. One day the oldest son came in eating an apple and holding his t-shirt up like a pocket that was full of apples. I asked him where he got them and he told me down the road that was almost across from the road our house was on. I thought that he stole them and sent him down to the place he got them from to ask for forgiveness. He came back and said that we could have all we wanted. Boy, did we ever.

I sent all three boys to the orchard with bags and even pillow cases. They made a few trips

and got every good apple that they could find on the ground or could reach on the trees. The bees and the deer had enough.

I put my biggest pot (full of water) on to boil. I washed the apples and threw them in the water to cook. When they were done I drained them and put some of them in a gizmo my mother gave me. It's cone shape with lots of holes in it. It sits on a stand. I used a wooden server and rolled it around inside the gizmo.

The apple sauce came out of the holes and into a container underneath. The peels, core, stems and seeds stay in the gizmos. They got dumped out and more apples put in my freezer. Oh, my freezer was never full, I had room to store apple sauce. I added sugar to each container as it cooled and sprinkled cinnamon on top. I used every container I could find. These were a help

to meals as my added side dish. One container, one meal's help.

I made apple pies too. But the best dish I made is my mother's recipe for Apple Brown Berry. Grease a casserole dish with butter, break pieces of white bread over the entire bottom, cover bread pieces with peeled apples, put lots of butter on top of apple slices, sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar. Continue to layer all the way to the top.

Put as many layers as you can cram into the casserole as it cooks down. Bake at 325 degrees for at least an hour or until apples are done. It will require at least one half loaf of white bread. I use home made bread and it required less.

Hard bread works really good. Serve warm with ice cream, milk or cream. It's really good.

WAG : HELP with FERAL CAT COLONIES

The Welfare of Animals Group (WAG) is asking Calhoun county residents to help us address a long-observed problem with our animal community - feral or community cats. If you feed a feral cat colony in your neighborhood, or know someone who does, please call Linda at 304-354-7506 or notify us via our email calhounwag@yahoo.com.

Our humane and effective Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) program's volunteers will live trap the cats, take them to the vet to be spayed or neutered, vaccinated for rabies, respiratory disease, worms, and fleas, and returned them to their outdoor home, at no cost to the colony's caretaker.

The colony will be healthier and no longer producing unwanted kittens. At 4 months old a female kitten can start breeding, and can have 2 or 3 litters per year. A mother cat nursing a litter of kittens goes back into heat when the kittens are only 3-4 weeks old. Removing cats from an area (catching and killing) is useless. When cats are removed from an area, then new, unsterilized cats move in to take advantage of available resources - and begin reproducing. This well-documented natural trend is known as the "vacuum effect." Trap-Neuter-Return stops the breeding cycle and eliminates mating behaviors, such as yowling, spraying, roaming, and fighting. Trap-Neuter-Return also benefits public health because community cats are vaccinated against rabies. We can only trap once a month, so please contact us so we can help with a colony.

Little Arrested for DUI and Speeding

In a complaint filed in the Magistrate Court of Calhoun by Trooper J.D. Richards, he stated that on Saturday, September 23rd, 2023, shortly after midnight, he observed a tan Chevy pickup traveling at 47 miles per hour in the 40 mph zone in Arnoldsburg. He initiated a traffic stop at which time the truck swerved to the left side of the roadway, sliding on gravel and kicking up a fair amount of dust. He then came to rest near the Family Dollar Store in the 400 block of Arnoldsburg, WV.

The Trooper identified Dylan Paul Little, age 31, as the driver and upon contact at the drivers side of the vehicle noticed watery, bloodshot eyes, slow—slightly slurred speech and an overwhelming odor of intoxicants emanating from Mr. Little's breath.

After asking the defendant to step out of his vehicle the officer conducted a series of standardized field sobriety tests. It was noticed by Trooper Richards that Mr. Little was unsteady and shifting back and forth on his feet as well as leaning on the vehicle. In the bed of the truck was a cooler along with several crushed beer cans. Being that the officer was aware that Mr. Little was on parole, and knew him to be fully searchable, he then inquired about the cooler which contained liquor and several beers. The sobriety test having been performed, determined that the driver was impaired.

Trooper Richards arrested Dylan Paul Little on suspicion of Driving under the Influence of alcohol and transported him to the WV State Police office where he was read his implied consent form, but refused to sign it, saying "I'm not signing anything. The Trooper then drafted a search warrant for the blood of the accused which was signed by Magistrate Lora Davis and executed at Minnie Hamilton Health System.

Little was arrested for Driving under the influence of alcohol and speeding. All defendant's are innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

Orma Accident a Result of DUI

On Wednesday, August 27th 2023 at around 8:55 p.m., Corporal D.C. Moore was dispatched to a single vehicle accident along Chenoweth Drive, off of Nicut Road, near the Ebenezer Church in the area of Orma, WV.

When Cpl. Moore arrived on scene he found the defendant, Adam Turner, sitting in the ambulance being examined by EMS. When he approached Mr. Turner he detected a strong odor of alcohol at which time the defendant advised he probably had a 6 pack of beer while he was driving and submitted to a field sobriety test.

After performing several of the field sobriety test steps, and taking a PBT for a breath sample, which registered a preliminary of .213, the defendant failed. He was then placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI and

transported to the WV State Police office in Grantsville for a breath sample on the WVSP Intoximeter. The breath sample registered .202, well above the limit to operate a vehicle and above the limit for aggravated DUI. The defendant also confessed to drinking alcohol while he was driving and open containers of beer were observed in the vehicle at the scene of the accident.

Mr. Turner was arrested for DUI 1st offense, and driving too fast for Road Conditions. All defendants are innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

Heiney Arrested on Multiple Counts

On Thursday, September 21, 2023 at around 9 a.m., Corporal D.C. Moore was advised by Zachary Stump, that when he had arrived for work at the Calhoun FRN building, Matthew Heiney was waiting for him. Stump stated that before he could get out of his vehicle, Heiney was trying to assault him through the window. According to the complaint, Heiney then went to the front of the car and started pounding on the hood, causing large dents in the car, while screaming that he was going to kill Mr. Stump.

Once out of the vehicle Mr. Heiney punched Mr. Stump in the face, repeating again that he was going to kill him.

Mr. Stump advised the officer that he believed the incident occurred because he was dating Heiney's ex-girlfriend.

Matthew Wayne Heiney was charged with Assault, Battery and Destruction of Property and a warrant was served by Sheriff Graham Knight on September 25th, 2023. He was released on a \$3,000 personal recognizance bond to appear on October 23, 2023 for a hearing. All Defendants are innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

Town Council held Meeting Oct. 2nd

The Grantsville Town Council met on Monday, October 2nd, 2023 in the Grantsville City Office on Main Street.

Mayor Robert Petrovsky called the meeting to order and following the Pledge of Allegiance the meeting began with the approval of two September meeting minutes.

Community member Gayle Ford spoke to the council to discuss what the protocol for selling products in town on the side of the road entailed. The Mayor and council advised that a business license was needed and the costs depended upon the size of space necessary to accommodate their sales.

Mayor's Communication: Mayor Petrovsky advised the Council that New Housing of West Virginia, a business currently located in the J & B Drug Store building on Main Street was requesting to rent the second story of the City Office building for \$900 monthly, utilities included.

The Mayor also provided an update on the City Park, reporting that the the Roof on the Bathroom and pavilion, a garage door and fencing around the tennis court would be completed before winter.

The local Pickleball Club has reached their fundraising goal of \$6000 for the resurfacing of the tennis/pickle ball courts. This is what happens when our community works together. They saw a need and they jumped in to help.

The 1982 Foundation will be providing paint for the WV State Police side of the City Office Building which will likely be painted WVSP Green and Gold. The large County map that is on the front of their side of the building will be repurposed by giving it to the County Government to use at their discretion. The Mayor wanted his appreciation known to B. Miller for donating the lift that assisted in painting the Town's side of the building.

Mayor Petrovsky has been seeking information regarding the lease of an excavator to be used by City Utility staff. The City has currently been borrowing an excavator from the Pleasant Hill PSD, which has been much appreciated, but the Mayor feels that the City needs one that will be there at all times when necessary. The cost of the lease would be \$846 monthly, not including the trailer for transport.

The trailer would be an additional \$8,000. The current larger excavator will remain at the Water Plant for the removal of sediment bags, the John Deer Tractor will be sold and replaced with a smaller mower, and the side by side, used for shuttling street staff will possibly be sold at a later date. After discussion the excavator was tabled for further consideration.

Councilwoman Cheryl Sturms reported that their committee had received \$16,944.29 in Donations for the City Park renovations. There is still a possibility of funding for playground equipment to come from a Sisters of St. Joseph Grant that the city applied for.

Jake Frady, of the Mid Ohio Valley Regional Council presented an invoice for payment on the Water Project from Steptoe & Johnson, Attorneys which was approved for payment. Frady also informed the Mayor and Council that the future Water project for which the City continues to seek funding, did not get funded by the Army Corp of Engineers.

They do continue to have hopes for 2 million in Congressional funding that is still available. In closing Mr. Frady informed the Council that he is leaving MOVRC for a job working for the City of Parkersburg.

Mayor Petrovsky questioned Mr. Frady if he had any knowledge of the 3M Class action suit. The Mayor was also interested to know if the Grantsville water system is eligible for the proposed PFAS class action settlements and does not opt out before the deadline, which may be as early as November 2023, it will automatically become a settlement participant.

However, the system will not automatically receive a share of the settlement payments unless they've completed the appropriate steps and submit claim paperwork within the allowed timeframe.

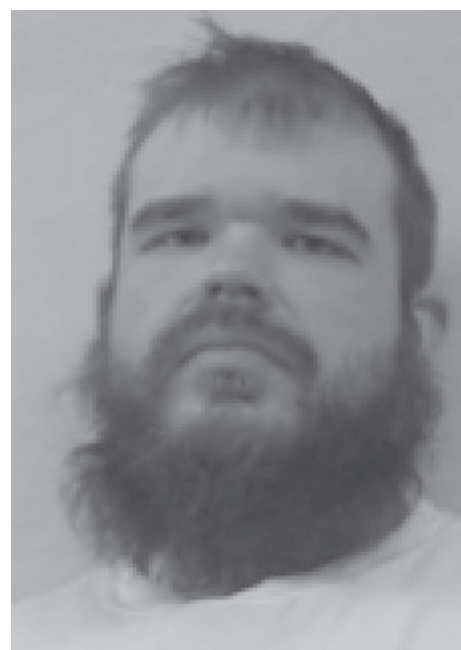
Furthermore, settlement participants will not be able to file additional lawsuits against 3M or DuPont over PFAS water contamination, even if they do not receive settlement payments. The chemical and manufacturing giant 3M reached a \$10.3 billion settlement in June with U.S. cities and towns over their claims that the company contaminated drinking water with so-called forever chemicals used in everything from firefighting foam to nonstick coatings. Mayor Petrovsky said he intended on following through with filing for the Town of Grantsville.

All council members approved the lease of the City Building 2nd floor by New Housing of West Virginia of \$900 monthly to begin in November.

Trick or Treat in Grantsville was determined to be on Saturday, October 28th, 2023 between 6:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. Arnoldsburg will hold their trick or treat on October 28th, between 3:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. in the Arnoldsburg area. There will also be a Halloween Trunk or treat and activities at the Arnoldsburg Community Building October 30th.

The last item of the meeting taken by the Town Council was to accept an Audit proposal from Steven Glacier to do a single yearly audit for \$7125.

A separate audit was also approved following a proposal by Book Keeping and Tax Solutions, LP to audit the yearly financial records for \$1,500 which will include General, Coal Severance and ARPA funding for 2022 and 2023.

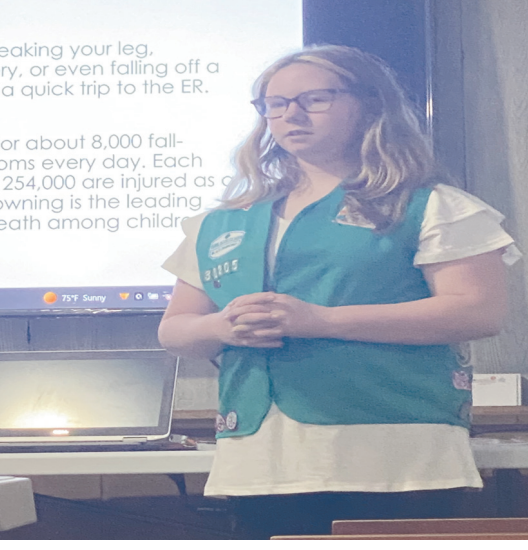
