Indictments Returned by Grand Jury held by **Judge Anita Harold Ashley**



RYAN ANDREW SNIDER

An indictment was returned on Ryan Andrew Snider on January 2, 2024 by the Calhoun Circuit Court Grand Jury. Snider was charged in the indictment with Manufacturing a Controlled Substance (Marijuana). The indictment stated that in October 2022, Snider did unlawfully, knowingly and feloniously manufacture, a controlled substance, to-wit: marijuana, a schedule I nonnarcotic and that Ryan Andrew Snider was not a licensed medical practitioner acting in the course of a professional practice administering or dispensing a controlled substance or incidental to research, teaching, or chemical analysis, in violation of West Virginia Code 60A-4-401(a)(ii), a felony against the peace and dignity of the State of West Virginia.

Mr. Snider appeared in Calhoun Circuit Court on January 4th, 2024 before Judge Anita Harold Ashley for his first appearance relating to 2024-F-1. Appearing with his Attorney, Public Defender Daniel Minardi, Snider was released on a \$10,000 cash, property or surety bond which must be posted for his arraignment date of January 31st, have it posted before arraignment date of January 31st, 2024 at 1:45 p.m.

JAMES KEITH HARDMAN

An indictment was returned on James Keith Hardman on January 2, 2024 by the Calhoun Circuit Court Grand Jury in case 2024-F-2. Hardman was charged in Count 1 of the indictment with Failure to Register as a Sexual Offender or Provide Notice of Registration Changes. The indictment stated that James Keith Hardman did feloniously and knowingly fail to provide a change of required information pursuant to Chapter 15, Article 12 of the West Virginia Code, to wit: He failed to provide or update the West Virginia State Police with information related to the address at which he resided as required by WV Code 15-12-2(d)(2) and 15-12-3, and James Keith Hardman is required to register as a sex offender for the duration of his life by virtue of a prior conviction in Calhoun County, WV in violation of WV Code 15-12-8(c), a felony, against the Donegan, peace and dignity of the State of West Virginia.

James Keith Hardman was indicted on Count 2, of the indictment with endangerment involving Failure to Register as a Sexual Offender or Provide Notice of Registration a Changes, having committed this crime when he did feloniously and knowingly Grantsville, fail to provide a change of required information pursuant to Chapter 15, Article S. 12 of the West Virginia code, to-wit: failed to provide or update the WV State Richard Police with information related to the license plate on a 2011 Honda CRV Preliminary driven by James Keith Hardman who is required to register as a sex offender Waived. for the duration of his life by virtue of a prior conviction in Calhoun County, WV in violation of WV Code 15-12-8(c), a felony, against the peace and dignity of the State of West Virginia.

Found upon the testimony of Corporal Brian E. Young, WVSP, duly sworn endangerment involving

in the presence of the Grand Jury.

Mr. Hardman appeared in Calhoun Circuit Court on January 4, 2024, before Judge Anita Harold Ashley for his first appearance related to two aforementioned counts where he was released on bond to appear January 31st, 2024 at 1:50 p.m.

RYAN AND ELLIO HARDMAN

In Case numbers 2024-F-3 and 2024-F-4, Ryan Hardman and Ellio Donegan, Hardman, were indicted by the Calhoun Circuit Court Grand Jury on January 2, 2024 of Count 1, Child Neglect with Risk of Serious Bodily Injury or endangerment involving Death, with the indictment stating that on or about July 2023 in the County of a Calhoun, State of West Virginia, they did unlawfully, feloniously, and grossly Grantsville, neglect OJH, a minor child, while serving as parents, guardians or custodians S. to the minor child, and the said gross neglect created a substantial risk of death Richard or serious bodily injury to the minor child OJH as defined in WV Code 61-8D-1(6) a felony in violation of WV Code 61-8D-4(c), against the peace and dignity of the State.

Count two of the indictment against Ryan and Ellio Hardman stated that on or about July 2023 in the County of Calhoun, State of West Virginia, they did intentionally and feloniously conspire to commit the crime of Child Neglect with Risk of Serious Bodily Injury or Death, a felony, with each other and that one or more of Ryan Hardman and Ellio Hardman committed some act in furtherance of said conspiracy, by committing the crime of Child Neglect with Risk of Serious Bodily Injury as alleged in Count 1 herein, said act being a felony in violation of WV Code 61-10-31 and being against the peace and dignity of the State of West Virginia.

Found upon the testimony of Corporal Brian E. Young, WVSP, duly sworn in the presence of the Grand Jury.

Brian and Ellio Hardman appeared before Judge Anita Harold Ashley on January 4th, 2024 for their first appearance. Both are incarcerated in the WV Central Regional Jail, Bonds were continued and the defendants will return for arraignment on January 31st, 2024 at at 1:55 p.m.

JOSEPH EARL YOAK

An indictment was returned on Joseph Earl Yoak on January 2, 2024 by the Calhoun Circuit Court Grand Jury in case 2024-F-6. Mr. Yoak was charged in Count 1 of the indictment with the crime of Possession of a Firearm by a Prohibited Person when he did knowingly and feloniously possess a firearm when he was previously convicted of a felony sexual offense in the State of Kentucky in 2006, a felony, in violation of WV code 61-7-7(b)(1).



Recipe Corner

Recipe is from Jinny Lee's Plantation Recipes: Mammy used to call them 'goobers," those rich, nourishing peanuts., and how we loved the peanut cookies she'd make with them!

Nearly everyone knows the tastiness of goof, fresh, roasted peanuts. For candies and cookies they're about the most delicious confection I know. If you use a cup of peanuts, chopped coarse, and 2 tablespoons of butter, a cup of sugar and 3 eggs, 2 tablespoons of sweet milk and enough self-rising flour to roll, you can make some of these plump little cookies. Just mix dough in the usual way for cookies and add the "goobers."

Bake for about ten minutes. The children will love them. Hickory Nut Cookies Have Fine Flavors. And thinkin' of peanut cookies reminds me of the hickory nut cookies that Madge loves to make for her boys.

Bobby always demands them around this time of the year. She uses a half cup of butter creamed with a half cup of sugar, adds three eggs well beaten and a half cup of sweet milk and enough self-rising flour to roll thin. To this is added one cup of chopped hickory nuts. The mixture is chilled before rolling and a stiff dough avoided. This is baked in a quick oven and when they come out golden brown and fragrant with that hickory and flavor, you ought to see the kitchen fill up with girls and boys.

Easy Crock Pot Potato Soup. 1 30 oz. bag of frozen diced hash browns

1 32 oz. box of chicken broth 1 10 oz. can of cream of chicken soup

1 8 oz. package cream cheese

3 oz. bacon bits

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese Salt and pepper to taste

Put the potatoes in the crockpot. Add in the chicken broth, cream of chicken soup and half of the bacon bits. Add a pinch of salt and pepper. Cook on low for 8 hours or until potatoes are tender. An hour before serving, cut the cream cheese into small cubes. Place the cubes in crockpot. Mix a few times throughout the hour before serving. Once the cream cheese is completely mixed in, it's ready to serve. Top with cheddar cheese and some additional bacon bits.

1924, 100 YEARS: Games and Goodies: When you finish with this newspaper (after you have taken your little scissors and carefully cut out the recipe below for grandma) you can have a "Newspaper Race." Tell the other boys and girls to get their papers too. Be sure the papers are all of the same also and you'd better play the game outside so that if things get messy nobody will scold. Everyone starts on a line and when the signal to "go" is given, each drops the paper in front of him, steps over it, picks it up, drops it in front again and keeps doing this over until the finished line is reached. The first one over the line wins!

Jelly Cake is nice to Bake: Grandma makes such good jelly, doesn't she? You'd love to dig your little silver spoon right down into the jar and et it that way. I know you would. But mercy me, that isn't good for little girls and boys! But if grandma really wants you to enjoy her good jellies ask her to make some jelly cake for you, just like this!

1 cup self-rising flour

1 cup powdered sugar

3 tablespoons sweet milk

She must sift the flour three times, then heat beat the whites and yolks of eggs separately and mix the sugar with the yolks adding the sifted flour gradually. Next come the whites of the eggs and the milk. This is all mixed good and poured into cake tin to bake for 10 minutes. When it is done spread the layers with jelly and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

NEWS FROM THE DEMOCRATIC VIEWPOINT

Whose Life, Whose Liberty? By Deirdre Purdy

The election of 2024 is critical to saving our democracy. We face a likely dictatorship if we allow Trump to be re-elected.

But what if Trump is thrown off the ballot for insurrection, or he is not the Republican nominee, or he simply loses?

If Trump as tyrant is defeated, is there still a compelling reason to vote for Democrats rather than Republicans?

YES: The principle that women have equal rights – equal to those of men and of fetuses - must be made law.

Democrats support women's rights Republicans deny them.

The Dobbs decision overturned Roe's holding that abortion was a fundamental right. It is a meanspirited, misogynist opinion that brushes aside concerns of real women as if they were no more than one class of citizens who happened, by a grievous error of the Roe court, to be gifted a right that they in no way deserved.

According to Dobbs, a fundamental right is one that is essential to our history and raditions, which pretty much ensures women's rights are not and will never be fundamental. Black men were given the vote in 1868.

Women's right to vote was finally guaranteed by the 19 th amendment in 1920. Women stopped being so engrossed in my book I didn't even notice when a husband's property in 1882, but couldn't own property in all states until 1900. A woman couldn't open her own bank account

Why are the rights of living women not superior to the rights of fetuses? Well, Dobbs doesn't speak about women's rights, so the question doesn't really

There's a throwaway line here and there, like saying women's reliance interests on a right to abortion are vague compared to reliance interests in property and contract. (I am not making this up.)

But basically, women's rights do not figure in the most destructive abortion case in 50 years. A woman's right to abortion was rescinded without a mention of women's rights.

Would the Dobbs result be different if the Equal Rights Amendment had passed?

(The ERA has been passed by 38/38 states Democrats to finalize it by congressional action.)

Dobbs mentions the argument that equal protection might support a right to abortion but dismisses it in the next sentence because (you may be surprised to learn), "a State's regulation of abortion is not a sex-based classification.'

The United States has a history of slowly providing rights to disadvantaged groups.

Somehow though fetuses have jumped the queue ahead of women. It is now constitutionally permissible for the state to supersede a woman's right to life and liberty for those of a fetus.

The 13th amendment abolished involuntary servitude except as punishment for a crime. And intercourse without intending procreation has not (yet) been criminalized.

Nevertheless, a woman carrying an unwanted required to incubate the fetus.

Under Dobbs, a state may use a woman of childbearing age as a means to an end rather than an end in herself. She belongs to a biologically determined sub-class of individuals with fewer rights and freedoms than other citizens and on whom greater burdens may be imposed.

Dobbs calls into question American women's equality, their equal standing in the citizenry, and whether they have constitutionally protected

Question: What are the origins of the phrase "goodbye?" (Asked by your friend and editor.)

Reply: Goodbye is a common expression we use when someone is leaving. "Goodbye! See you soon." But what does the word "goodbye" actually mean, or what are you saying or wishing?

We know what "good" means, but what about "bye?" As sports fans know, a "bye" is the position of someone in a tournament who advances to the next round without playing, e.g. "the player drew a first-round bye." That example doesn't imply a parting expression,

so we have to dig a little deeper. In doing so, we

find that "goodbye" developed from a phrase used

in the 1500s, "God be with ye" (or "with you," as we would say today). It was a brief parting prayer of sorts. Over time, the phrase was abbreviated to "God b'wi'ye," and still further to "God b'ye." Eventually, "good" was substituted for "God," and we end up with "Goodbye." So now you know the original, sincere wish of "Goodbye," and I think it is now time for me to say goodbye. That is, after an over forty-year run,

the Curiosity Corner is saying goodbye. Yes, it all began 40 years ago. When teaching at Lander, I gave numerous science talks to school classes and various community groups and organizations. This was the time of space exploration, the introduction of microwave ovens, cell phones and so on. As I continued teaching, writing and giving

talks in the community, people would stop me on the street or in a store and ask something like, "I have always wondered about so and so... could you tell me how it works?" I got to thinking. Rather than trying to answer all these individual questions for individual people,

why not publish them in the paper for all to see? So, I wrote up a question-and-answer column and went to see Bill Collins, the managing editor of the Index-Journal at the time, to see if he might publish it. He did, and the Science Corner (as it was originally known) was born in 1982.

The first question was on the Jupiter Effect, which was a prediction that the alignment of the planets of the solar system would create a number of gravitational catastrophes, including a great earthquake on the San Andreas Fault in California. (Obviously, it didn't.)

The article was well-received, and Bill said to send in more questions and answers that he might use from time-to-time. From there, the Science Corner was promoted to a weekly column, and eventually, the name was changed to the Curiosity Corner to better reflect the range of questions I received on various topics. The Curiosity Corner has appeared in several area newspapers throughout its history: the Laurens County Advertiser, the Clinton Chronicle, the McCormick Messenger, the Saluda Sentinel, the Newberry Observer and even the Calhoun Chronicle in Grantsville, West Virginia (my wife's hometown).

While at Lander, I wrote the Curiosity Corner as a public service of the University, and I continued doing so after my retirement in 1992. In the digital

age, the column's focus shifted. We now have unfettered access to both information and misinformation, and as we all know, there are still lots of questions that aren't as simple as just "Googling" for the right answer.

And, as new technologies take shape that have the potential to muddy the waters even further. it's clear to me that our hometown newspapers. and columns like the Curiosity Corner, still have a relevant place in our world today. For now, I take leave, but maybe I'll write a guest column every now and then if I hear or find something curiously interesting.

Of course, I am indebted to the many staff members of Lander University who have assisted me with the writing and proofreading over the years (you all know who you are). Lastly, I am indebted to all of you: my readers! I hope you all have benefited from the Curiosity Corner in gaining knowledge and understanding of different subjects.

Thank you for the decades of questions, comments and support. I have enjoyed writing and have had the pleasure of learning right along with you as I research the answers to your many questions and topics of discussion.

TREASURER MOORE ANNOUNCES 17th ANNUAL SMART529 'WHEN I GROW UP' STATEWIDE ESSAY CONTEST

Entries must be submitted by Friday, Feb. 23, 2024, to qualify.

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. – State Treasurer Riley Moore yesterday kicked off the statewide 2024 SMART529 "When I Grow Up" student and teacher essay contest at Mountainview Elementary School in Morgantown.

The annual essay contest gives students the chance to win up to \$5,000 in SMART529 savings for higher education. Teachers have an opportunity to win a \$2,500 cash prize.

"The goal of our contest is to inspire children to begin thinking about potential career opportunities and explore how they can achieve their dreams by attending college or a trade school," Treasurer Moore said. "Last year, more than 3,000 students from across the state participated in the contest, working with their families and educators to discover job pathways that spark their interests and can lead them to a fulfilling future career."

In its 17th year, the SMART529 When I Grow Up essay contest gives kindergarten through fifth-grade students a chance to win both SMART529 savings for higher education and cash prizes for their schools. Essay entries will be judged among five regions in three age groups (K-1, 2-3, 4-5), making for a total of 15 regional winners.

The regional breakdown is as follows: Region I – Beckley/Bluefield area, Region II – Charleston/Huntington area, Region III – Clarksburg/Weston area, Region IV – Martinsburg area, and Region V – Wheeling area

The 15 winners will be awarded \$500 invested into SMART529 college savings accounts. Out of the regional winners, one grand prize winner will be randomly selected to receive a total of \$5,000 toward a SMART529 account during an awards ceremony this fall at the state Culture Center in Charleston. Each winner's school will also receive a \$500 cash award.

Teachers of grades kindergarten through fifth also have the opportunity to compete in the teacher portion of the essay contest. This year's winning teacher will receive a \$2,500 cash prize.

The SMART529 When I Grow Up essay contest allows students to submit, in 200 words or less, an essay that explains what they want to be when they grow up. Entries will be judged on originality, creativity and the importance of post-secondary education.





January major electric power case

CHARLESTON - State regulators are encouraging public comments through January on a \$207.4 million rate increase proposal filed by Monongahela Power Co. and The Potomac Edison Co.

The Public Service Commission of West Virginia has set aside three days for hearings on the companies' proposed 15 percent increase in residential rates, commonly called base rates. The evidentiary hearing starts at 9:30 a.m. January 24 at the PSC headquarters at 201 Brooks St., Charleston. The case was filed May 31, 2023.

Those public comments can be filed by email on the Commission's website, or they may be mailed to the PSC. Be sure to reference Case No. 23-0460-E-42T in your comments. Written comments should be addressed to Karen Buckley,

executive secretary, 201 Brooks St., Charleston, WV, 25323. "We encourage and actively seek comments from those affected by any rate increase pending before the Commission," PSC Chairman Charlotte R. Lane said. "But these larger cases seem to attract more notice than smaller cases."

If approved by the Commission, the average retail customer would see an increase of \$18.07 in monthly rates, while the overall rate increase being




