Feral Cat Colonies

The Welfare of Animals Group (WAG) is asking Calhoun county residents to help us address a long-observed problem with our animal community - feral or community cats. If you feed a feral cat colony in your neighborhood, or know someone who does, please call Linda at 304-354-7506 or notify us via our email calhounwag@yahoo.com.

Our humane and effective Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) program's volunteers will live trap the cats, take them to the vet to be spayed or neutered, vaccinated for rabies, respiratory disease, worms, and fleas, and returned them to their outdoor home, at no cost to the colony's caretaker. The colony will be healthier and no longer producing unwanted kittens.

At four months old a female kitten can start breeding, and can have 2 or 3 litters per year. A mother cat nursing a litter of kittens goes back into heat when the kittens are only 3-4 weeks old. Removing cats from an area (i.e. catching and killing) is useless. When cats are removed from an area, then new, unsterilized cats move in to take advantage of available resources - and begin reproducing. This well-documented natural trend is known as the "vacuum effect."

Trap-Neuter-Return stops the breeding cycle and eliminates mating behaviors, such as yowling, spraying, roaming, and fighting. Trap-Neuter-Return also benefits public health because community cats are vaccinated against rabies.

We can only trap once a month, so please contact us soon if we can help with a colony. Thank you.

This Week In Calhoun History

The following reports are taken from the Calhoun Chronicle Archives.

1924, 100 YEARS AGO: Aunt Jinny Lee's Old fashioned jelly roll like they make down in Virginy is a great favorite of mine. Here's the recipe I like best 'cause it has such a meltin' flavorful taste. Beat two eggs very light and add a half cup of sugar slowly, then put a half cup of sifted self-rising flour in and a teaspoon of vanilla flavoring or lemon extract. This mixture has to bake in a shallow pan about ten minutes and then the jelly is spread while it is still hot. It has to be rolled very quickly and then wrapped in a towel until it cools. Run the roll over a sugared board too. I can't resist makin' this every once in a while when Luella sends over a jar of her wonderful plum or cherry jelly.

A Nice Dish for Lunch. Mary Sue is a little bride who is just learning how to cook and the pretty child does get some good ideas sometimes. She even attempts to teach as old hand like me how to make things! Well she did show me a new way to fry apple fritters the other day and we had 'em for lunch.

They were delicious and this is the way she showed me: Sift a cup and a third of self-rising flour and gradually add two-thirds cups of milk and an egg well beaten. Make a smooth batter. Pare and core two medium sized apples cut into slices and sprinkle with powdered sugar and dip in batter. Drop into deep fat and fry until golden brown.

Games and Goodies

"Sandman" is a jolly game and the kiddies love to play it. The way to play it is like this: Put several chairs in a circle and then give to the one who has been chosen as the Sandman a large cone filled with scraps and bits of tissue paper. Then one other is chosen to keep score. All of the children are seated and it is the duty of the Sandman to put them to sleep, one at a time. He stands in back of their chairs and sprinkles the tissue paper "sand" on their lids and all over their faces, meantime making funny remarks in order to make them laugh. But everyone who laughs or opens his eyes after the sand has touched them must pay a forfeit. The one who is keeping score marks "forfeit" every time anyone laughs. Be dure to choose the funniest person to be the Sandman so that there will be lots of forfeits.

1974, 50 YEARS AGO: Knotts Memorial Methodist Church To Consecrate New Sanctuary: February 24, eleven o'clock is the date for consecrating the new sanctuary of the Knotts Memorial United Methodist Church at Grantsville. The pastor, Rev. Gerald T. Daniel, will serve as liturgist and Rev. Basil A. Hensley, superintendent of the Weston District of the West Virginia Conference, will deliver the sermon and the act of consecration.

In ages past the pious servants of God have had their chosen places set apart to worship God. This Godly custom and purpose created a desire in the hearts of the faithful of God's family to build the Knotts Memorial Methodist Church in 1889. Grantsville was a very small town; however, here lived a people who loved God and requested a quarterly conference for the purpose of erecting a church building. The request was granted and the following trustees were named: J. M Hamilton, George Silcott, J.J. Mathew, Jesse Gainer, and the Absolom Knotts. Lot NO. 24 1/2 was purchased from Simon P. Stump for forty-five dollars. The deed was made in February 1889.

Work on the building began immediately. Absolom Knotts furnished, without cost, all the building materials and delivered it. For this reason it was only fitting that the church be named "The Knotts Memorial Methodist Church." Most of the labor was freely donated, One fairly large room was erected as the sanctuary. Thus building served as a place for divine worship, class meetings, Sunday School, and at times quarterly conferences. The church became a part of a large circuit which was made up from most all Methodist Churches in the county. Three of the earliest ministers were J.M. Peters, S.E. Simpson, and Hill Smith. In those days, five-hundred dollars was considered a large salary. Some still feel, "Lord! Keep the minister humble and we will keep him poor."

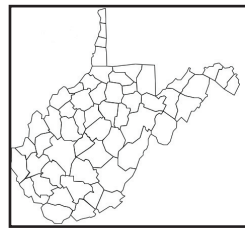
The church was built for a minimum amount of money. On dedication day, the largest amount of money was requested was ten dollars. Some of these responding were: Attorney Lynn, J.M. Hamilton; J.J. Mathew, Collin, Betts, Allen Hardman, a Thomas family, a Cook family, Jesse Gainer, and Absolom

Knotts. Others who contributed were not listed. The early church had forty-five members, all now dead, but their faith and loyalty lingers with some of those who still attend the church. These are interested in continuing the heritage for future generations. In , the church was remolded and Sunday School rooms were added as well as a kitchen and dining room for the purpose of fellowship and to congregate around the table as in Jesus' time. The basement used as a place to meet for worthy causes.

In the eighty-five years of existence, the Knotts Memorial United Methodist Church is still a place where the gd news is preached and the people still worship the Divine Creator. The trustees; Walter E. Smith, chairman, Hobert Lynch, Ronald Layfield, George Lambiotte, Orville Kight, and Richard Stalnaker, have provided the leadership in making the house of God an attractive and beautiful place for worship. Lancaster Construction Company is builder of the new sanctuary.

Thorne, W.G. Nutter, D.C. Wilhelm, C.C. Jarvis, S. Paris Bell, J.Q. Guiger, O.E. Mercer, William Richards, B.M. Mitchell, WD. Winters, C.C. Perkins, Perry Rood, C.H. Backus, Mack Boggs, Noble Crew, Herman Ross, Manley Collins, Judge Layne, Harold Grandstaff, J.M. Peters, S.E. Simpson, Hill Smith, C.G. Worrell, E.W. Goff, and Sam Robinson.

A covered dish dinner will follow the consecration service.

Feb. 22, 1927: Longtime Agriculture Commissioner Gus R. Douglass was born in Mason County. Douglass, a Democrat, was first elected commissioner in 1964. Reelected nine times, Douglass was the longest serving agricultural commissioner in the country.

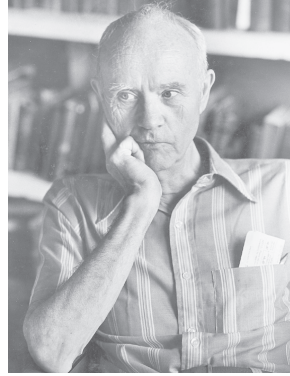


Feb. 23, 1945: Harrison County native "Woody" Williams distinguished himself during the Battle of Iwo Jima by neutralizing seven concrete pillboxes. This act of heroism earned Williams the Medal of Honor.



Feb. 25, 1903: An armed posse ambushed striking miners in their homes in the village of Stanaford near Beckley. Six miners were killed; federal judge B. F. Keller exonerated the posse.

Feb. 25, 1911: Newspaperman Jim Comstock was born in Richwood. In 1957, he ounded the West Virginia Hillbilly, a weekly newspaper that circulated inside and outside the state.



Feb. 27, 1871: Summers County was established from segments of Fayette, Greenbrier, Mercer, and Monroe counties. The county was named after George W. Summers, one of West Virginia's founders.

Feb. 27, 1871: The West Virginia Legislature approved an act incorporating the city of Huntington.

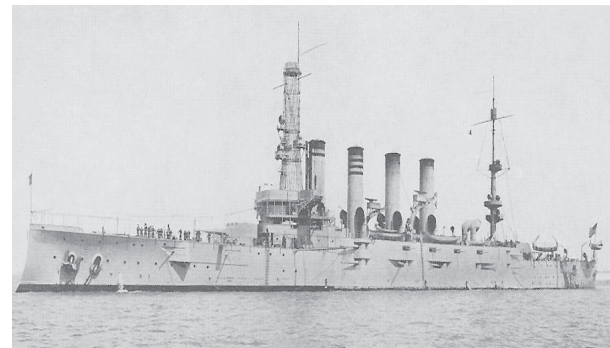
Feb. 28, 1831: Fayette County was formed by the General Assembly of Virginia from parts of Kanawha, Nicholas, Greenbrier, and Logan counties. The county was named for the Marquis de Lafayette, the French military officer who served under George Washington during the Revolutionary War.

Feb. 22, 2018: 33,000 schoolteachers and service personnel walked off the job over wages and health benefits. The strike drew national attention, and teachers in five other states organized work stoppages.

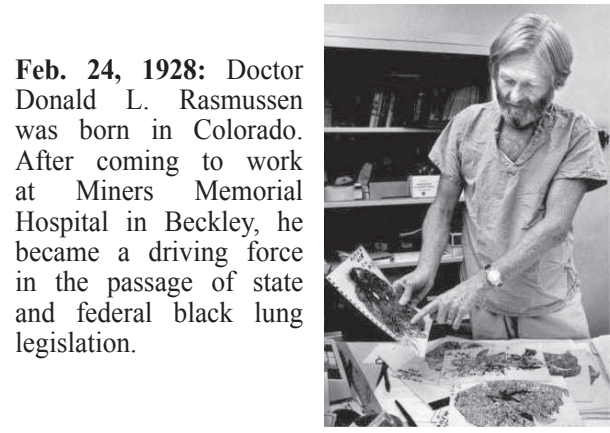


Feb. 23, 1867: Lincoln County was formed from Boone, Cabell, Kanawha and Putnam counties. The county was named for Abraham Lincoln.

Feb. 23, 1905: The first USS West Virginia was commissioned. The armored cruiser was renamed the USS Huntington in 1916 to allow the transfer of the original name to a newly authorized battleship.



Feb. 24, 1918: Judge Kenneth Keller "K. K." Hall was born at Greenview, Boone County. Hall spent 47 years on the state and federal benches.



Feb. 26, 1869: The legislature approved a bill moving the state capital to Charleston.

Feb. 26, 1972: One of the country's worst mining-related disasters occurred on Buffalo Creek in Logan County. A coal waste dam collapsed, sending 132 million gallons of water, coal refuse and silt into the valley. In the end, 125 people, including entire families, were killed, and 1,000 people were injured.

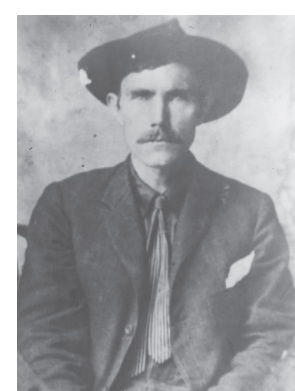

Calhoun Circuit Court Actions on Thursday, February 15th

JAMES KEITH HARDMAN: James Hardman appeared before Judge Anita Harold Ashley in Case 24F2 with his attorney Calvin Honaker. Prosecuting Attorney Michael Hicks summarized that a plea agreement had been reached with the defendant in which Mr. Hardman will plea guilty to the charge of Failure to Register as a Sex Offender, count 2 of the indictment will be dismissed and his possibility of a 1-5 year sentence, (yet to be determined), will run concurrent with his current sentence of 5 years and 91 days that he is serving for revocation for violation of terms of prior sentencing for the same charge of failure to register. Hardman's case is Continued for 2:30 p.m. April 18th, 2024 for sentencing

JAMES PAUL HANLEY: James Paul Hanley appeared with Attorney Daniel Minardi, 24F15 for a Pretrial conference relating to the charge of Failure to Register as a Sex Offender. The case was continued until March 5th, 2024 for Pretrial.

KRISTINA KIRKBRIDE: In Case 24F14, Kristina Kirkbride appeared before Judge Ashley with her Attorney, Mark Plants. She entered a plea of not guilty to Possession with Intent to Deliver a Controlled Substance and her case was continued until June 6th, 2024 at 1:15 p.m. Attorney Plants informed Judge Ashley that he did not believe this case would be tried. Bond was transferred from Calhoun Magistrate Court.

CHARTER BADGETT: In Case 23F19, State vs. Charter Badgett, being charged with Sexual Abuse by a Person in a Position of Trust to a Child and Sexual Abuse in the 1st Degree, Badgett appeared before Judge Anita Harold Ashley for Pretrial.

Prosecuting Attorney Michael Hicks called Trooper J.D. Richards to the stand to determine whether or not a Motion to Suppress information would be allowed during trial. Trooper Richards testified as to the procedures leading up to the arrest of Charter Badgett.

Through questioning, Trooper Richards stated that he had contacted Mr. Badgett in September of 2022, and that he visited the home of Mr. Badgett December 8th, 2022 on Oka Road. During that visit Badgett had willingly invited the officer into his home without objection. When Trooper Richards questioned him about the allegations of Sexual Abuse, Mr. Badgett denied the charge and was willing to take a polygraph the following day, December 9th, 2022.

Prosecutor Hicks asked "To your knowledge did the defendant make statements to another officer?" To which Trooper Richards Responded, "Yes."

Defense Attorney, Daniel Minardi, questioned Trooper Richards as to whether there was an interview on his person at all times, to which Richards confirmed. The attorney the asked if he had the camera running on a December 9th, 2022 interview with Mr. Badgett, which the Trooper stated that he did, but that nothing was recorded on the December 8th, 2022 interview. The Trooper also confirmed that the defendant had been mirandized during the December 9th conversation that he had with Mr. Badgett on that date.

On three occasions, Attorney Minardi asked Trooper Richards how many cases he had won and lost or the percentage of losses of cases. Prosecutor Hicks objected and Judge Ashley sustained the objection saying that it was neither relevant, nor was it a cross examination.

Prosecutor Hicks submitted State's exhibit A as evidence, which was the video from the body camera of Trooper Richards during his interview on December 9th, 2022 of Charter Badgett.

Cpl. M. Jarvis of the Brureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) was brought in Trooper Richards to conduct a polygraph examination on Mr. Badgett on the 9th of December 2022. But prior to the polygraph exam the defendant made an incriminating statement that causes Cpl. Jarvis to call for Trooper Richards. Cpl. Jarvis had been conducting a pretest interview that determines the eligibility and questioning of a defendant. During that time Mr. Badgett had been mirandized and initialed the following statements:

YOUR RIGHTS SECTION;

- Understanding his rights
- Right to remain silent
- Anything you say can be used against you
- Right to talk to an attorney
- Receiving a Court Appointed lawyer if you cannot afford one
- If you answer questions you have the right to stop at anytime.

He was advised he was not under arrest and free to leave at any time. He was explained as to what coercion was and confirmed that he was not being coerced.

The polygraph was not videoed, as it is illegal for such to occur, but during the pretest, Charter Badgett indicated that he had touched the victim over the clothes for sexual gratification. Once that statement was made, Cpl. Jarvis stopped the interview and disclosed to Trooper J.D. Richards what had been said. It was decided at that point for a statement to be taken, at which time Trooper Richards began recording with the knowledge of all involved. The 6-8 video was played before the court. Mr. Badgett was seen and heard describing what he had one to the young girl saying "I did not unbutton her pants or go inside her pants. He apologized and told the Trooper it was "just a came of being a dumbA**." He said he asked the girl if she was going to tell anyone to which she replied no. He then made statements about his mental state and the possibility of having saying that there was a chance he was mentally impaired.

When Prosecutor Hicks asked Cpl. Jarvis how he would characterize the interaction between Badgett, he said it a "Friendly and joking interaction." Hicks told Judge Ashley that he believe the State had met it's burden that the interview, statement and mirandizing in no way violated the defendant's rights and that he entered into it voluntarily. ttorney Minardi objected saying that it was clear that Badgett was confused and questioned if he could competently waive his rights and should have had an attorney present. Judge Ashley denied the motion to supress and the trial date of April 16th, 2024 was set. A Pretrial will be held on April 11th, 2024 at 9:30 a.m.

Martin Luther King's mother could not know while pregnant nor when she gave birth what lay ahead for him. About ten years before he was assassinated he received a threatening call. It was nearly 24 hours later when I first had something to eat.

Let's Talk with Aryeh White



At the most recent meeting of the Mount Zion PSD, the engineer we work with regularly on water system issues presented a preliminary analysis of the technical feasibility of a southerly expansion of our system. This step, and it is only an early step, towards such a project was the result of questions, discussions, and effort on the part of several people.

For my part, since shortly after I was appointed to the PSD board last year, I found myself confused by the location of the southern end of our system. It runs to the Upper West Fork Park, where it was needed to provide water to the Fire Department. That it was not continued a mile further into Chloe seemed strange. Stranger still was finding out that there had been funding for a bulk fill station near the Upper West Fork

Park but it had never been constructed because the land needed for it could not be secured. I began asking questions about what would be required for a modest extension of one to one and one-half miles into Chloe, where we would be more likely to secure a property for a bulk fill station.

On the part of my fellow PSD board member, Anita West, she filled me in on the background of the indefinitely stalled bulk fill station project and suggested possible extensions up Walker and Walnut Run Roads. Both those roads have dense groupings of potential customers and iron water.

On the part of Commissioner Arthur, he had already been in discussions with important figures in Charleston regarding an expansion of the Mount Zion PSD system five and one-half miles to the county line. On the part of Eric Lupardis, who is currently running for the other county commission seat being voted on in the next election, he made me aware of Commissioner Arthur's efforts and the interest in Charleston in seeing this project completed.

And the interest is quite warranted! With contamination incidents over the last decade, including the major ones on the Ohio River recently and on the Kanawha River a decade ago, there's quite a bit of interest in improving the resilience of water systems in this state. All three water systems in this county draw from a single plant in Grantsville that draws from a single source, the Little Kanawha River.

The Clay PSD recently secured funding to extend their system to the county line. If we meet them there, it creates the possibility of moving water between their system and the three systems in this county, both of which are currently islands with a single point of failure in the form of a single treatment plant drawing water from a single river.

Such a connection would be an emergency measure. Neither treatment plant has the capacity to fully supply the normal needs of both systems. In an emergency, with water restriction measures, it would greatly extend how long we could stretch our limited storage capacity.

I spoke with our engineer, asking him to look into the technical feasibility of such an expansion and whether our system would be capable of moving water in either direction on an emergency basis. He assured me that, with small modifications, we would be quite capable of moving water from Grantsville to Clay or vice versa.

He also informed me that the topography of the southern end of the county is unusually agreeable for an extension. Our extant pressure reducing valve at Millstone is at roughly the same elevation, about 910 feet, as the county line and there are no higher points between the two. Additionally, the most populated roads that branch off of that stretch of 16 stay below that elevation for much of their densely populated length. This means that such an expansion can be accomplished without the need for booster stations. Only a tank somewhere along the new stretch or near the end of the old stretch would be needed.

Our system has roughly ten customers per mile currently. Maintaining that average is key to preventing a price increase. Potential customers are greater than that density along 16 to the county line and along many stretches of roads off of that stretch of 16. How far we can go, how far we can get funding to go, will be determined more by who signs up than anything else.

The next steps to bringing water to this part of the county is circulating petitions to determine who wants to be on the system. There was no better time for securing funding for a project like this than last year. Next to then, there is no better time than now.

Soon the PSD and volunteers will be looking for signatures. We already know where it is technically feasible to supply water, soon we will also know where it is economically feasible.

Together we can bring water down the West Fork all the way to the county line. Together we can go up many small roads, following the West Fork's tributaries. Together we can have a bulk fill station convenient and centrally located for people in the southern end of the county. Together we can bring water to the southern end of the county. Together we can foster the conditions that will let opportunity flourish.

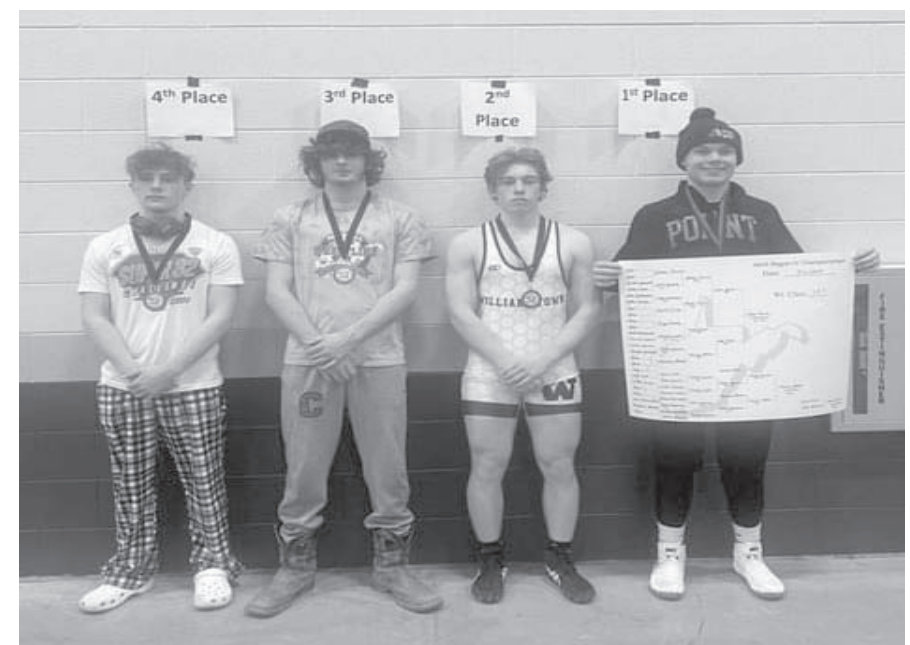

The Calhoun Red Devils will head out on the road to take on the Point Pleasant Big Blacks at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday. The teams are rolling into the game with opposing streaks: Calhoun has struggled recently with five defeats in a row, while Point Pleasant will arrive with four straight victories.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF GRANTSVILLE: The following rates and charges are hereby fixed, determined and established for municipal water services provided to all customers of the Town of Grantsville's Municipal Water Treatment Plant and Mt. Zion and Pleasant Hill PSD water sales, commencing upon the effective date as hereinafter provided, and in accordance with the following Rates and Schedules:

DELAYED PAYMENT PENALTY

The above schedule is net. On all current usage billing not paid in full within twenty (20) days, after the billing date, ten percent (10%) will be added to the net current amount unpaid. This delayed payment is not interest and is only to be collected once for each bill where it is appropriate.

TAP FEE

The following charges are to be made whenever the utility installs a new tap to serve an applicant: A tap fee of \$300.00 will be charged to customers who apply for service outside of a certificate proceeding before the Commission for each new tap to the system.

SECURITY DEPOSIT

Not to exceed two-twelfths (2/12) of the annual usage of the applicant's specific customer class, or fifty (\$50.00), whichever is greater. This fee may be changed by applicable statutory provisions.

CONNECTION FEE

The connection fee shall be 500.00 for each new water service line one inch and smaller, and shall include the tap of the main line, the service line from the main to the property line or curb stop, and the meter installation, including the meter pit or vault.

The connection fee for service larger than one inch shall be the actual cost of the installation, and shall include the tap of the main, the service line from the main to the property line, and the meter installation, including the meter pit or vault. Upon receipt of an application for a service connection larger than one inch, the utility will provide an estimate of actual cost, which amount must be deposited by the applicant in advance of installation. Upon completion of the installation, a final settlement of the actual installation cost will be prepared and submitted for payment to the applicant. The amount of payment due will be reduced by the amount of the advance deposit. In the event of an excess in the amount deposited over the actual installation cost, the amount of excess will be promptly refunded to the applicant.

DISCONNECTION FEE

If any bill is not paid within sixty (60) days after the due date, water service to the customer will be discontinued. Water will not be restored until past due water bills have been paid in full and all accrued penalties plus a reconnection charge have been paid.

RECONNECTION FEE

There shall be a \$30.00 reconnection charge for re-established service.

RESALE SERVICE RATE

\$8.59 per 1,000 gallons per month.

LEAK ADJUSTMENT RATE

An incremental charge of \$1.46 per 1,000 gallons per month shall be charged for all water billed in excess of the customer's historic usage for a water leak that is determined by the Public Service Commission to be eligible for an adjustment of the water service charge.

READ METER AT CUSTOMER REQUEST

Customer shall remit an amount equal to the estimated cost incurred, but not less than \$25.00.

RETURNED CHECK RATE

If a check is returned by the bank for any reason, the bank's charge to the utility shall be the utility's charge to the customer for such a bad check, but such charge to customers shall not exceed \$30.00.

SECTION 2 - TARIFF EFFECTIVE DATE

The rates, charges and penalties provided herein shall become effective as provided herein, or as soon thereafter as the same may be approved by the Public Service Commission of West Virginia.

SECTION 3 - SEVERABILITY; REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES

The provisions of this Ordinance are severable, and if any clause, provision or section hereof shall be held void or unenforceable by the West Virginia Public Service Commission or any court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not affect the remainder of this Ordinance. Upon the effective date hereof, all ordinances, resolutions, orders or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of such conflicts, hereby repealed, and to the extent that the provisions of this Ordinance do not touch upon the provisions of prior ordinances, resolutions, orders or parts thereof, the same shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 4 - STATUTORY NOTICE AND PUBLIC HEARING

Upon introduction hereof, the Town shall cause to be published a copy of this Ordinance once a week for two (2) successive weeks within a period of fourteen (14) consecutive days, with at least six (6) days between each publication, in the *Calhoun Chronicle*, a qualified newspaper of general circulation in the Town of Grantsville, and said notice shall state that the Ordinance has been introduced, and that any person interested may appear before Council on March 4, 2024, at 6:00 p.m., which date is not less than ten (10) days after the date of the first publication of the Ordinance and notice, and present any comment or protest thereto, following which hearing, Council shall take such action as it shall deem proper. The Chafin Law Firm establishes scholarship for students challenged by the opioid epidemic

HUNTINGTON, W.Va. - The Marshall University Foundation has announced the establishment of The Chafin Law Firm Scholarship, generously endowed by Truman and Letitia "Tish" Neese Chafin. Both have marketing degrees from Marshall, graduating in 1967 and 1986, respectively.

The Chafin Law Firm is a small, specialized practice in the heart of the West Virginia coalfields in Mingo County and has represented West Virginia counties seeking damages from drug manufacturers due to the opioid epidemic. The Chafins created this scholarship to support students whose families have been adversely affected by the opioid epidemic.

"We're honored to have represented the counties and cities in this terrible situation, particularly what's happened to southern West Virginia," said H. Truman Chafin, founder of The Chafin Law Firm. "We wanted to do anything we can do to help the community who helped us."

Truman Chafin served in the West Virginia State Senate from 1982 to 2014 and served as majority leader from 1998 to 2010. Truman Chafin founded the law firm after graduating from Michigan State University College of Law in the late 1970s.

Tish Chafin received her law degree from West Virginia University College of Law and began working at the firm shortly afterward. She was appointed to Marshall's Board of Governors by then-Governor Bob Wise in 2005 and served two terms. She also previously served as president of the West Virginia State Bar Association from 2010-2011.

Truman Chafin said the decision to establish the scholarship was an easy one, as the older you get, the more important you realize the importance of giving.

"That's where your real happiness is, to give and not receive," Truman Chafin said. "We wanted to be able to help someone who is really talented and has the grades and give them the gift that keeps on giving, which is education."

Amy Saunders, managing director for Marshall's Center of Excellence for Recovery, said the scholarship will have a positive impact. The Center of Excellence for Recovery aims to increase the well-being of West Virginians through behavioral health, education, prevention, outreach, recovery and applied research initiatives.

"We are grateful for the Chafins' generosity for creating this funding for our students from Mingo County," Saunders said. "Many West Virginia youth and families have been affected by opioids and other substance use disorders. This funding will allow us to assist a student who has already worked very hard to overcome challenges in their family and community to provide support to reach their academic dream."

The scholarship recipient shall be a full-time student and has financial need per the standards of the Office of Student Financial Assistance. First preference is to a student from Mingo County, West Virginia.

The award shall be renewable up to four years, or eight semesters, if the recipient maintains good academic standing of 2.0 GPA or higher. The director of the Center of Excellence and Recovery shall select the recipient and renew the award in cooperation with the Office of Student Financial Assistance.

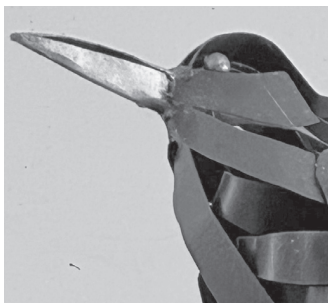

Trump MAGA vs. Western Democracy

The MAGA Republicans are playing a dangerous political game that threatens America's place in the world and the precarious balance of world power. In thrall to Donald Trump, they refuse to appropriate \$60 billion to aid Ukraine's defense.

If Ukraine falls, it would be a huge self-imposed strategic defeat for the US. We would risk a larger and costlier war in Europe. Our ability to deter other conflicts would be diminished. We would normalize the atrocities of Russian aggression, war crimes and autocracy. No country would trust us to be their ally.

Article 5 of NATO's founding treaty commits all allies to help any member who comes under attack.

Last weekend at a campaign rally, Donald Trump recounted a conversation. This, Trump claimed, was the president of "a big country" who asked, "Sir, if we don't pay and we're attacked by Russia, will you protect us?"

For Trump everything is transactional. You pay to play. So of course, his answer was, "You didn't pay? . . . No, I would not protect you. In fact, I would encourage them to do whatever the hell they want."

A US presidential candidate encouraging Russia to "do whatever the hell they want" to our allies is a terrifying escalation in Trump's kowtowing to Putin and disdaining our allies while calling losing "winning" and appeasement "peace."

Trump repeatedly boasts he would end the Ukraine war in 24 hours. No details are available, but the obvious Trumpian solution would be to give Putin everything he now holds in Ukraine.

He overlooks Putin's stated goal to take all of Ukraine back into Russia. For Putin, Ukraine is just a runaway slave, like a runaway slave, that needs to be returned to its master. Putin intends to eliminate Ukraine.

Reconstituting Russia and then the Soviet Union drives the war. It is Putin's nativist Russian ideology, his worship of Great Russia fighting the western beast.

Putin explained that to Tucker Carlson, who remained clueless. If Trump gives Putin part of Ukraine, he will say thank you and take the rest. Would there then be peace? NATO members bordering Russia don't think so. Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia are now erecting joint fortifications against Russia.

Anxiety is high in NATO member Poland, which was controlled by Russia, partitioned by Russia, and eliminated by Russia - all in different eras over the last 600 years. Ukraine is a hot war on Poland's border and if Russia takes Ukraine, Poland fears it is next.

Russia has trashed international law through armed invasion of Ukraine. In the zone of Ukraine that Russia now controls, it has massacred civilians, its soldier's rape and torture while Ukrainian children are forcibly abducted, and prisoners of war are tortured and mutilated.

The International Criminal Court has issued an arrest warrant for Vladimir Putin for war crimes. Trump encourages Putin "to do whatever the hell he wants." Even if it were about money, the US is getting a great deal. Almost 90% of the money appropriated for Ukraine aid is spent in the US. On 117 production lines in at least 31 states and 71 cities, American workers are producing major weapons systems for Ukraine.

Meanwhile it's Ukrainian soldiers who are fighting and dying for western freedom and democracy - not Americans.

If we don't support Ukraine now, American soldiers could be fighting Russian, Chinese, Iranian, or N. Korean aggression. And our oceans don't protect us anymore.

President Biden has demonstrated American strength in pulling together the coalition supporting Ukraine's defense against the Russian invasion.

This week, the Senate passed a bill with \$60 billion for Ukraine defense. Trump has told his MAGAs in the House to kill it.

Recipe Corner

BEST EVER LIGHT AND FLUFFY DINNER ROLLS

- 4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 package dry yeast
- 1 1/2 cups hot tap water
- 1 egg
- 1/3 cup softened butter or vegetable shortening (I used margarine today)

Sift together two cups of the flour with the sugar, and stir in the yeast. With mixer at low speed, blend shortening or butter into the flour mixture. Add the hot water (the hottest it comes from your tap, all at once, with mixer running. Add the egg, and continue mixing.

Add in the remaining two cups flour to make a soft dough.

(At this point, I changed my mixer beaters for dough hooks and let the mixer knead the dough for about ten minutes and then put it into an oiled bowl to rise.)

OR YOU CAN DO IT THIS WAY.

Knead lightly on a floured board and shape into a ball. Put into an oiled bowl, cover with a towel, and allow to rise in a warm spot until doubled, about two hours. Punch dough down. At this point it can either be refrigerated or shaped in rolls or loaves and allowed to rise a second time until doubled. Bake in a preheated 375 degree oven until barely brown. May be frozen after baking and reheated to serve.

Individual Chicken Pot Pies!!

Chicken Mixture

- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 1 lb boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut into bite-size pieces
- 1 medium onion, chopped (1/2 cup)
- 1/2 cup chicken broth
- 1 cup frozen peas and carrots
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon ground thyme
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese (4 oz)

Baking Mixture

- 1/2 cup Original Bisquick® mix
- 1/2 cup milk
- 2 eggs

Heat oven to 375°F

DONOR RECIPIENT SPOTLIGHT

My name is Tanya Marie Cunningham and I am a liver transplant survivor. My story started when I was seventeen. I had a lot of issues that couldn't be diagnosed until my doctor decided that my liver was the problem. At eighteen I was diagnosed with cirrhosis of the liver with no known cause. I was given a life expectancy of five years without a transplant. In 2000 I was diagnosed with an obstruction in my bowel resulting in a bowel reduction with a colostomy bag. Later that year the bag was removed and things returned to normal. I still needed a transplant though and a few years later I had the veins in my throat and stomach rupture and everyone thought I was dying. With excellent care from the doctors in Pittsburgh and a lot of prayers I pulled through. After that, my health deteriorated rapidly with me being hospitalized at Minnie Hamilton and Pittsburgh on different occasions. Finally, we went to the hospital to see if I qualified for a transplant and on the morning of my appointment I was unresponsive and admitted immediately. I was at the top of the list. While I was technically in a coma for about a week, a liver became available. As family waited we discovered that I wasn't a match so back to square one. A couple of days later they called my family back in with a match. It was touch and go and I actually died for the second time on the table but the doctor brought me back and a few short weeks later I was home and healthy. Since then I have adopted three children and actually had a miracle baby boy at forty-two years old. I have coached cheerleading, watched my daughter win countless titles and trophies, volunteered on several committees and have been married to my husband for almost twenty-nine years. I have a full and happy life and none of it would be possible without my donor. We have never met the family but we owe them so very much. Please consider being an organ donor because you never know what you may mean to someone's husband, wife, daughter, son, father or mother. Thank you.

The Creston area received snow Friday evening. By Sunday a lot of it was gone.

Ellen Hedge ended up back in the hospital. Each time she had PT she felt worse, Then it was discovered that, in addition to the back fractures, she had a fracture in her hip.

A fellow who was dining at Shade Tree recalled that when he was a little boy they would go to Cap Boice's service station in Creston to get gasoline. Cap had a hand pump that worked back and forth and put the gasoline in a glass container that was marked and held 10 gallons. Then the gasoline flowed out of the container into the tank on the automobile. He noted that he was amazed at how all that worked. Speaking of Shade Tree, their St. Valentine's Day special was a great success and they ran out of steak.

Antero announced that the firm is now producing 3.4 bcf/day of natural gas & 193,000 bbl./day of natural gas liquids. EQT announced that the firm produces 5.52 bcf/day of natural gas and that if the price stays low the firm will shut in production. The NYMEX price for natural gas dropped to \$1.58/MMBTU. Bcf means billion cubic feet equivalent.

The price of local Pennsylvania grade crude rose to \$78.19/bbl. while condensate fetched \$60.19/bbl. and Marcellus & Utica light brought \$69.19 and medium \$78.19/bbl. It can be noted that the price of gasolene has taken a significant jump.
