Calhoun BOE levy wins by one vote in recount

One vote!!!

What is the power of one vote?

Enough to be the difference between a school levy passing or failing.

This time on a recount it passed 1,362-1,361 and was certified by the Calhoun County commission putting an end to a highly contentious election that featured illegal signage and an ongoing investigation by the West Virginia Secretary of State's office and law enforcement per-

Calhoun County Superintendent Michael Fitzwater lauded the process.

"First, I want to express my sincere gratitude to everyone who came out to vote for the levy," Fitzwater said. "Regardless of whether you supported it or not, this is a tremendous opportunity for our students and our community. It's inspiring to see our community come together, and we are truly thankful for the

support

"We are committed to showing the citizens of Calhoun the incredible potential of our students and how this investment will positively impact not only our students and staff, but also our entire community."

Here are some key points about what the levy supported:

School Safety and Security: The levy will provide funding for, but not limited to, a school nurse, a preventative resource officer, and a Technology System Specialist.

Facilities and Equipment: Funds will go toward playground equipment for CMHS, improvements and maintenance of county-wide athletic facilities, and compliance with local, state, and federal regulations. Additionally, it will support maintenance and custodial supplies.

Extracurricular Support: The levy will help fund extracurricular trips, providing

Grantsville awarded 60 per cent water increase

The Grantsville Municipal Water Department has been awarded a requested 60 per cent rate increase in Case No. 24-0755-W-MA.

According to an order dated November 22, 2024, from the WV Public Service Commission, their staff found reason to recommend the 60% rate increase, stating the Town 's adopted rates and charges, which would generate an increase in revenue and Cash Working Capital Reserve increment of approximately \$151,267 or 29.84 per cent over rates existing prior to this case. Recommended Rates would be sufficient to cover total cash requirements of \$465,508, total debt service requirements of \$136,387, Cash Working Capital Reserve allowance of \$57,978 and a cash surplus of \$9,247 to meet the Town's renewal and replacement reserve requirement. The resulting debt service coverage factor is 151.54 per cent.

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This approval came after a petition was filed by local residents believing the rate increase was unjustified.

Ridgeview news reached out to the 2025 Calhoun County Commissioners, asking what their view of the increase was.

Commission President Craig Arthur: "The fixing of some of the big leaks I'm sure will help the town big time. I

have not revisited the budget since a couple big leaks that were not known about were fixed."

Commissioner Jacob McCumbers: "I myself would like to take a bigger look at the financial report, especially since a couple of major leaks were fixed recently. So, at this time, I'm going to defer until I have heard more from the water board and Town of Grantsville reports and only being appointed last week. I will need time to review."

Incoming Commissioner Eric Lupardus: "Having met with many residents of the town, I feel this economy is not stable enough to put the years of mismanagement on the backs of its citizens. While I understand the consolidation will likely incur raises, it gives citizens an opportunity to prepare for it. I fear good folks on fixed incomes who are raising their children and grandchildren simply are maxed out. A good will effort by the town to seek out new businesses to provide livable wage jobs for its citizens would go a long ways to help people afford the raises, first sewer now water and soon 1% city tax on retail goods. A welcoming effort towards Dollar General would be a great start in hopes they would relocate back to Grantsville. I am willing to work with the town on their plan to bring business back here. We only move forward if we work together!'

Hope told to hold three public hearings before acting on farm taps

Hope Gas has been wanting to shut off all its farm taps by forcing those with them to either change to propane or electric heat instead of natural gas.

Hope has said it will pay for the propane or electricity in the future to make up for cutting off the supply of free gas.

Hope has maintained it is too expensive to these lines and that the lines were also dangerous.

We have some "free gas" here in Calhoun County, but they perform the maintenance on their own lines even in the winter when the lines sometimes freeze off according to the users known to the

Grantsville and Calhoun County are getting into the holiday spirit and certain events are bringing those feelings closer and closer to the surface whether it be for



Local residents were among those who attended the Thanksgiving meal Saturday at the Minnie Hamilton extended care unit. It was a big success. Others went to the cornbread and bean dinner at Morristown.

Monday was the opening day of firearms deer season. Everyone is "looking for the big buck" although it is very difficult to eat antlers. There are lots of deer and several big bucks.

Sgt. Thomas Fluharty, USA, retired, remains a hospital patient but is out of ICU.

Gary Floerke, head honcho of MPLX (formerly called Mark West), noted that his firm now fractionates 8 bcf/day (billion cubic feet/day) of "wet" natural gas with 2.9 bcf/day from the huge Sherwood facility in Doddridge County. Each day 800,000 bbl. Of natural gas liquids are processed and 2 million bbl./day of propane is exported. In fact, 2/3 of all the stuff going through their facilities is exported rather than being used here to make finished products, provide employment and generate wealth for West Virginia and surrounding states. Perhaps a new administration in both Charleston and Washington will have a different outlook on what to do with our resources. Gas from Creston is 18% ethane.

In one recent week there were 26 loads of LNG (liquified natural gas) shipped to other parts of the world. This was 97 billion cubic feet of natural gas. 2 bcf/day goes through the line that crosses W. Va. 5 between Creston and Burning Springs.

Broadway Joe Manchin helped the Senile One pass the "Inflation Reduction Act" otherwise known as the Green New Deal and all sorts of rules have been promulgated to shut down the oil patch. The last one is a proposed \$1,500/ton tax on methane. There was an old fellow who lived in an upriver county who always said, "It takes a big hog to weigh a ton" but how much natural gas does it take?

"Peanut" Bunch was attending to business in Elizabeth.

An outfit from Bridgeport that is not authorized to do business in West Virginia sent out 600 letters to oil and gas owners in Troy District of Gilmer County wanting to buy the minerals. It is understood that at least two companies are planning to start drilling horizontal Marcellus wells there. The letters told folks their taxes were delinquent, and the Gilmer County Sheriff's office noted that their telephones rang off the hooks for two weeks. Now, everyone knows.

The price of local Pennsylvania grade crude slipped to \$65.87/bbl. With condensate, or super mountain high test, brought \$49.87/bbl. While Marcellus & Utica light was \$56.87/bbl. The Henry Hub [Louisiana] price of natural gas rose to \$2.90 but, of course, the price here is much less.

I am the one that cast the deciding vote for the BOE levy passage

I cast the one vote that made the difference in the Calhoun Board of Education's levy passing 1,362-1,361.

And I am proud of it. Proud, you hear me. Proud because it was the right thing to do and if took a recount after failing in the first run through, so be it. And I will always be proud.

So, thank me or blame me it really doesn't matter because I know how much good passing this school levy will do for the schools, the people and the county.

Actually any one of the 1,362 yes votes was the vote that made the difference between doing the right thing and doing nothing. I just went ahead and said, "I did it and thank you!!!"

Frankly the vote should not have been that close and only was – in my opinion – because of a cowardly and illegal posting of signs across the county attacking the school levy, Republican commission candidates Roger Propst, Eric Lupardus and business owner Crystal Mersh. Originally it appeared these illegal unsigned signs were able to bring down Propst and the school levy only to have the levy loss reversed on a recount.

To show how cowardly the signs and the people who put them up were is as easy as one, two, three.

One, they were put up secretly one Friday night appearing mysteriously on Saturday morning at various locations across the county.

Two, the signs were unsigned without either the individuals or organizations paying for the signs printed on them. Political signs must be signed with the payee's name and to not do so makes them illegal. To not do so is a cowardly attempt to attempt to influence an election illegally. (Ironically the same thing happened a few years back when unsigned campaign signs saying to vote no on a school levy mysteriously appeared in the same manner.)

Three, once word spread on the internet that the Calhoun County Republican Executive Committee had contacted the West Virginia Secretary of State and found out the signs were illegal, the signs mysteriously disappeared showing the cowards that were afraid to take credit for the signs removed them.

Everything involved with these signs was cowardly from printing them up, to putting them up, to taking them down.

If the folks that were against the BOE levy and these candidates had any courage whatsoever they would have taken credit for them. They did not and that says it all. They were cowards!!!

Someone asked why such signs would be put up?

My answer: FOLLOW THE MONEY!!!

Who had the most to gain by defeating the two GOP candidates and the BOE levy?

The WVSOS's office is continuing its investigation into the sign incident and if it finds out I hope they continue to go all the way and prosecute those responsible for printing and putting up the signs no matter what those penalties may be even if it involves, fines, incarceration and vacation of election victories. This is the second time these cowardly signs have appeared, and it is time to put an end to it forever in this county.

That is the case number of the West Virginia Public Service Commissions' case involving the town's 60 per cent water rate

increase.

Basically, what is going on is that the town rushed through a rate increase it said it needed to make ends meet financially that was opposed by some citizens who

that was opposed by some citizens who filed a complaint with the PSC. This -- 24-0755-W-MA – is the result.

Should the PSC after its hearings and investigation into the town's financial re-

cords agree with the town the rate increase will go into the effect basically saying, "no harm, no foul."

find any reason or enough reason to approve the rate increase then the town must pay back the money the citizens have had to pay since the rate increase went into effect.

Complicating all this is reports the town has needed to dip into the money being set aside to repay the citizens should the town lose. This has been done just to pay the town's bills.

Complicating this even more has been the fact the county commission has given the town bailout money on more than one occasion.

And as further complications they are

in the process of combining the Town of Grantsville water department with the Mount Zion Public Service District and the Pleasant Hill Public Service District into one entity and hiring a director to be in charge of the entire operation. Monies have been appropriated to all three current entities to facilitate the merger.

All of those things muddy the waters of the town's financial records and make the PSC's investigation of the financial records much more important. How bad was/is the town's financial condition? The PSC investigation will determine that.

Stay tuned.




Dec. 2, 1859: John Brown was hanged at Charles Town in Jefferson County. Maj. Thomas J. Jackson, later nicknamed "Stonewall," was among those commanding the Virginiaforces standing guard at the execution of the abolitionist who led the raid at Harpers Ferry.

Dec. 2, 1933: The Charles Town Race Track opened shortly

Capito Nominates 36 West Virginians for Admission to U.S. Service Academies

The recount of the levy was held following the regular county commission meeting and took most of the day.

In a statement by now former commissioner and former school superintendent Roger Propst on the Ridgeview News, "The original count of the School Levy was five more votes against than for. The provisional ballots could not be counted until the canvassing of ballots which occurred five days after the general election. The Election Commissioner accepted five of the provisional ballots. When opened and counted, four of the five had "for" votes, immediately reducing the five to one. An example of what was found is one regular ballot was that a voter had placed a checkmark in the bubble, rather than darkening the whole bubble. The computer did not pick up the yes vote because of the checkmark did not cover the whole bubble. All three commissioners looked at the ballot, determined it was the clear intent of the voter to vote for the levy, and approved adding that vote to the total "for" votes."

When the recount occurred, a day long

process of reading and hand county each vote, it was determined that the levy had passed by one vote. That one vote belongs to one of the citizens of Calhoun County, as well as all 2,723 individuals who cast their vote for or against.

Following a request for a recount by the Calhoun County Board of Education when the school levy lost by just a few votes on November 5th, 2024, a recount found the final count 1362 for the levy and 1361 against.

With the narrow margin of one vote, Calhoun County has joined several other historical events (from How Stuff Works) including:

1. 1910 Election for the 36th Congressional District of New York

In the only Congressional election to have been determined by a single vote, Democratic challenger Charles Bennett Smith, a newspaper editor by trade and an advocate of Prohibition, faced Republican incumbent Rep. D.S. Alexander. According to a Nov. 20, 1910, New York Times article, after the initial counting of the returns, the two candidates were tied at 20,684. But the election board noticed an error in the total on a tally sheet from one district. When it was corrected, Smith received the single vote needed to

elect him. According to his Congressional biography, Smith became chairman of the House Committee on Foreign Affairs and was elected three more times to Congress before losing a re-election bid

2. 2000 Seat Pleasant, Maryland, Mayoral Election

This Maryland city had one of the strangest one-vote elections ever was decided by a vote that wasn't cast. A woman showed up at her polling place on the evening of the election, and all though she was registered to vote, her name didn't show up in the records because she had changed her address. Officials didn't allow her to cast a ballot for the candidate of her choice, Thurman D. Jones, Jr., and Jones lost the election by 247-246 to incumbent Eugene F. Kennedy. Jones later filed a lawsuit contesting the result. But in a 2001 ruling, the Maryland Court of Appeals overturned a lower-court ruling and left Kennedy as the winner, because it hadn't been shown that fraud had been committed.

3. 2008 Alaska House of Representatives District 7 Election

Republican Rep. Mike Kelly won reelection by a vote of 5,018 to 5,017 over Democratic challenger Karl Kassel but only after overseas absentee ballots were counted.

4. 2012 Democratic Primary for 87th Legislative District in Missouri

Because of redistricting, Rep. Stacey Newman was pitted in a primary against a fellow legislator, Rep. Susan Carlson. On election night, Newman prevailed by a single vote, 1,823 to 1,822. But the St. Louis County Election Board declined to certify the results, saying that 102 voters at one polling place had mistakenly been given ballots for a neighboring district. But in a do-over primary seven weeks later, the result was unchanged. Newman again won, this time by 95 votes.

5. 2013 Election for 12th Legislative District in New York

In the 2012 race in Oswego County, New York, Richard P. Kline and John W. Brandt faced each other in both the Republican and Conservative party primaries, with Kline winning the Conservative party nod and Brandt winning as the Republican standard-bearer. When the results were tallied on election night, Kline appeared to be on top by just seven votes, but Syracuse.com reported that his margin eventually shrank to just one vote, 371-370.

6. 2017 Clyman, Wisconsin, Board

The tiny village of Clyman, Wisconsin, population 488, isn't a place that's in the news much. But in April 2017, Clyman had an extremely tight race for the post of board chairperson. David Blank, a local fire captain, received 101 votes to 100 for runner-up Mark Othmer.

According to a report on WVMetronews.com "there are 479 farm-tap customers on the gathering system and another 150 farm-tap customers served by Diversified pipelines in Barbour, Braxton, Calhoun, Clay, Doddridge, Gilmer, Harrison, Jackson, Kanawha, Lewis, Marion, Mason, Monongalia, Pleasants, Ritchie, Roane, Taylor, Tyler, Upshur, Wetzel, Wirt and Wood counties.

"The total area includes 3,000 miles of pipelines that serve 15,000 customers, and the area to be converted impacts 1,000 feet of pipeline and three percent of the customers.

Hope maintains the current condition of the pipelines are unsafe, unreliable, and/or uneconomical for the company to continue to maintain, operate, or replace.

Hope says it will provide those customers with propane or electric heaters and would pay for the installation and supply of propane in the future. The estimated cost of those conversions was \$10,000 for the units and \$2,000 for propane stor-

mission said there is too much confusion about the proposed conversions and has ordered Hope Gas to hold three public hearings on the issue. DoHS Extends Application Period for Low Income Energy Assistance Program

The West Virginia Department of Human Services (DoHS), Bureau for Family Assistance (BFA) has extended the application period for the Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) by two weeks. Applications will now be accepted through December 13, 2024. This federally funded program provides financial assistance to eligible households to help cover

the cost of home heating.

LIEAP eligibility is determined by household income, size, and responsibility for paying heating costs. For fiscal year 2025, households with incomes up to 60% of the state median income, for household sizes up to seven members, may qualify. For larger households, income eligibility increases to 150% of the federal poverty level. Applicants must meet all program criteria to qualify.

Applications have been mailed to residents who are most vulnerable, including those who received LIEAP benefits last season. Residents can also access applications in the following ways:

Online: Visit wvpath.wv.gov to download and complete an applica-

In Person: Applications are available at local DoHS county offices, community action agencies, or senior centers operated by Area Agencies on Aging.

Completed applications must be submitted to the local DoHS office in the applicant's county by December 13, 2024, or postmarked by this date. A list of local offices is available here or by calling (304) 356-4619.



Snow Thrower Safety Tips: Keep Best Practices in Mind This Winter



Clearing snow and ice from driveways, sidewalks and parking lots is no small job. You rely on your outdoor power equipment to do the heavy lifting, and it's important to keep safety in mind. The Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI) reminds home and business owners to use snow throwers, often referred to as snow blowers, safely and offers

"Weather today is unpredictable. You need to have your snow thrower serviced and ready to power up," says OPEI President and CEO Kris Kiser. "Review your owner's manual so you can use your equipment safely." Kiser says preparation is key and that home and business owners should consider the following:

Review the owner's manual. Check the owner's manual for safe handling procedures. If the manual cannot be found, look it up online, and store a copy on your computer so it's available to reference in the future. Review how to operate controls. Be able to shut off equipment quickly. Check equipment. The snow thrower should be powered off when being checked over. Adjust any cables and check the auger.

Charge batteries. Locate the batteries for your snow thrower and charge them fully before it snows.

Purchase fuel. Be sure to use the correct fuel recommended by the equipment's manufacturer. For most gasoline-powered snow throwers, that is E10 buy gasoline in advance of storms. Fuel that is more Operate in visible conditions. Never operate the

Place gasoline in a proper fuel container and label it with the date purchased and the ethanol content. Store fuel safely and out of the reach of children. Fill the fuel tank outside before starting the engine and while the engine is cold. Never add fuel to a running or hot

Clear the area. Snow can sometimes hide objects. Doormats, hoses, balls, toys, boards, wires, and other debris should be removed from areas you intend to clear. When run over by a snow thrower, these objects may harm the machine or people.

Dress for winter weather. Locate safety gear now, and place it in an accessible closet or location. Wear safety glasses, gloves and footwear that can handle cold and slippery surfaces when operating the snow

KEY SAFETY TIP: Never put your hands inside the auger or chute. Use a clean out tool to unclog snow or debris from the snow thrower. Your hands should never go inside the auger or chute. Turn OFF the snow thrower if you need to clear a clog. If you need to remove debris or unclog snow, always turn off the snow thrower. Wait for all moving parts to come to a comor less. Often fuel stations are closed after a storm so plete stop before clearing any clogs or debris.

snow thrower without good visibility or light. Aim with care. Never throw snow toward people or cars. Keep children or pets inside and away from your snow thrower when it is operating. Use extreme caution on slopes and hills. Use when changing directions slopes. Do not attempt to clear steep slopes. Know where the cord is. If using an electric powered snow thrower, be aware of where the power cord is at all times. Avoid tripping.

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

Glenville State University's Debate Team Finishes second at **Record-breaking Fall Tournament**

Glenville State University's Pioneer Debate Team competed in the National Educational Debate Association's (NEDA) "Fall Flyer Fling" at the University of Dayton November 15 - 16. The tournament featured more than 80 competitors from schools that included: Wayne State, University of Dayton, Ball State, Capital University, Slippery Rock University, Oberlin College, IMSA North, and Glenville State.

Pioneer Debate's Alena Gray (Freshman Biology Major) and Graylin Floyd (Senior Psychology Major) placed 2nd in the highly competitive Crossfire Division. This was the second competitive tournament for Glenville native Alena Gray.

"The whole tournament was so much fun, but it wasn't easy by any stretch of the imagination," said Gray, adding "Our hard work paid off and it's evident in our placing. I encourage anyone who has any amount of interest in debate to just try it."

Although the team of Gray and Floyd lost to Oberlin College in finals, they beat Oberlin College earlier in the tournament and finished with the better record of 8-1.

Freshman Education Major, Johnathan Hornbuckle also traveled with the team and competed in six Novice Rapid-Fire debates. This was Hornbuckle's first competitive tournament, but not his last having notched an impressive 26 out of 30-point scoring average in his debates for a 3-3 record.

Graylin Floyd, GSU Student Government Association Representative and mid-fielder for GSU soccer stunned the tournament with her 1st Place Speaker finish.

"This tournament was not merely competitive, it was record-breaking competitive given the number of teams involved," explained Pioneer Debate Director and Coach Dr. Brian Johnston: "I knew she was good. But I didn't think anyone could do what she did in only her second tournament and against this caliber competition."

Floyd graduates from GSU in May 2025, and she is intent on concluding her undergraduate career as a Pioneer Debater this spring for the team's last tournaments of the season: "I loved that Alena and I were able to showcase our potential," said Floyd: "To say the least, I am super proud of our team. This tournament showed us that we are very

capable of debating against tough competition."

Earlier in the month, Glenville State University's Pioneer Debate Team competed in the National Educational Debate Association's (NEDA) Fall Online Tournament. The tournament featured 47 competitors from six universities, including: Penn State, Grove City College, University of Dayton, Wayne State, Oberlin, and GSU.

Pioneer Debate's two teams competed in the Novice Rapid-fire division. Graylin Floyd notched an impressive fourth place team finish with a record of 3-1. Alena Gray tied for fifth in overall individual points. This was the first debate for Floyd, who also competes for GSU's soccer team: "My first experience debating was exciting. For the first time in my life, I got to argue with someone in a situation where no one for the most part, was mad at me!" Gray, also competing in her first tournament, emphasized the spirit of healthy competition: "Not only did I learn how important it is to deliver your best facts, but also, at the end of your match when you and your opponent are just two people and not competitors anymore, how fun it is to hear feedback and agree on what a good match it had been."


Pioneer Debate hosts the NEDA National Championship Tournament April 4-5 during the spring 2025 semester. "Last year's hosting of our first tournament at GSU's campus was the most meaningful professional experience of my career," said Johnston. "We don't have the resources that the bigger schools, like Penn State and Wayne State have, but we have something they don't have: Pioneer Pride."

Johnston, in his third year as Assistant Professor of Communication at GSU, explains he witnessed Pioneer Pride when faculty, staff, students, and City of Glenville community members volunteered their time to serve where needed to organize and produce the event. "We need your help again, for our second annual Pioneer Holler Debate Tournament," said Johnston, adding, "Let's
