Did the county commission illegally change the agenda, appoint person to board?

Monday morning's Calhoun County Commission meeting should have been a "yawner" with the only thing taking place being listening to reports and paying the bills.

But it wasn't.

Instead, it was handed an amended agenda which had not been publicly posted for a period of three working days prior to the meeting.

Commission President Craig Arthur, while posting the original agenda, had madae the notation that items VI through IX would not be dealt with until the January commission meeting as a courtesy to Calhoun County Clerk Jean Simers who had undergone a medical procedure.

Those items were:

VI new business

VII old business

VIII personnel items IX appointments to boards and authori-

Therefore, according to the only legally posted agenda there would be no action on any of those four items until January.

However not long prior to the meeting a county official contacted Arthur via the internet instructing him to go ahead and act on the amended agenda, especially the part about appointments, specifically the appointment to the Civil Service Board.

The opening on that board had been made when democrat Jacob McCumbers resigned after winning election to the county commission.

Multiple people had applied the open-

ing, but the commission decided to name Diedre Purdy the former chairman of the Calhoun Democrat Executive Committee. She had resigned the post to be considered for the Civil Service Board opening. She was approved on a party line vote of the commissioners.

Former commissioner and expert parliamentarian Roger Propst questioned the legality of amending the agenda with such a short notice.

"May I amend an agenda? Yes. The agenda may be amended up to two business days before the meeting," he noted. "If you amend the agenda, you must repost the agenda following the procedure you used to post the original agenda. The only circumstances under which a governing body may amend an agenda during a meeting is if a true emergency

"Posting the changed agenda on Friday violates the two business days' requirement.'

So, in other words action taken on the parts of the original agenda which were changed which had been specifically put on hold probably will need to be redone since it did not follow open meeting guidelines and probably were not legal.

That means when the commission meets again of Jan. 13, 2025, it will have to take up the appointment of Purdy to the Civil Service Board again after getting clarification from people at the West Virginia Secretary of State office about the legalities and how to handle them.

In other action the commission did listen to reports and pay bills.

Town Citizens Meeting Set

Glenville State, Marshall coaching connection continues

The symbiotic coaching relationship between Glenville State and Marshall continues.

Back on Feb. 5, 1890, Eli Camden Henderson was born in Joetown, W.Va., in Marion County. In 1911 he graduated from Glenville Normal School (now Glenville State University) and began a coaching career which by 1935 brought him to Marshall College (now Marshall University).

He coached football and basketball for several years for the Thundering Herd posting a 164-91-13 record as a football coach including a 68-46-5 record as coach at Marshall, but it was on the basketball court when he gained his fame.

His overall record as a college basketball coach was 621-234 overall and 362-159 at Marshall including the 1947 small college national championship.

But his innovations and progressive recruiting set him apart from other "very good" coaches.

Henderson is credited with the creation of the 2–3 zone defense and the fast break in basketball.

He also signed NBA Hall of Fame guard Hal Greer to a scholarship out of Huntington Doulas High School. Greer was the first African American athlete to play sports at any of West Virginia's "white" colleges back during the days of segregation. He also recruited players

such as Leo Byrd, Andy Tonkovich, Charlie Slack, Walt Walowac, Jules Rivlin, Bill Toothman and Marvin Gutshall and all were All-Americans or professional basketball players.

In football he coached and recruited players such as Jackie Hunt, Frank Gatski and Bill Smith. Gatski is in the Pro Football Hall of Fame and Hunt is in the College Football Hall of Fame.

Henderson is in several college halls of fame including Glenville's and Marshall's and the Thun-

dering Herd's basketball

arena is named after him.

Oh, yes, he was also the head baseball coach at Marshall for a year too.

Fast forward about half a century and another Glenville State graduate and coach traded in the Pioneer Blue and White for the Kelly Green and White of Marshall and stood the Thundering Herd on its head with the best season in women's basketball history.

Kim Stephens Caldwell came to Marshall after winning the NCAA Division II women's national title at Glenville State in 2022. She was the head coach of the Pioneers for seven seasons and won six Mountain East Conference regular season titles and four tournament titles. She also got to two final fours.

In her one season at Marshall, she led the Thundering Herd to the Sun Belt Conference regular season and tournament titles while making some progress in the NCAA tournament before getting

beaten. Her fast-breaking, full

court pressing mass substituting attack attracted the attention of Tennessee and a three-quarters of a million yearly contract made her a Volunteer. Incidentally she is now

6-0 as head coach of the Volunteers. Enter Tony Gibson.

After winning the Sun

Belt Conference championship with a 31-3 victory over Louisiana Lafayette Saturday night head football coach Charles Huff announced his resignation as Marshall's head football coach to take the same position at Southern Missis-

sippi leaving the Thundering Herd without a leader.

About 20 minutes later Marshall Athletic Director Christian Spears announced that Van native and Glenville State graduate Tony Gibson was being hired as Marshall's 32nd head football coach.

It was, Spears said, an easy choice.

Gibson has been an assistant coach thus far at the college level serving at Glenville State, West Virginia, Michigan, Arizona and North Carolina State where he has been for the past six seasons.

Although Gibson has never been a head coach at the college level, he was the head coach at Gilmer County in 1995 before going into the college coaching ranks.

At Marshall Gibson will have an early challenge since some Thundering Herd players will probably follow Huff to Southern Mississippi while others will enter the transfer portal so he will have a depleted roster he will need to address.

But he will have time as Marshall offered him a six-year contract.

Local residents were among those getting letters advising them that the gas lines from which they purchased gas to heat their homes are going to be abandoned and that the company, Hope Gas (or in some instances Diversified Energy), would convert the home to either propane or electric heat. All this is part of a proposal before the PSC (Public Service Commission) to allow the big boys to cease providing natural gas service to 600 customers in several counties. On Friday one fellow went to the PSC office to see the maps to see just what was really involved with the proposal. He was told that the maps were confidential, and he could not look at them. It is nice to know that the PSC which is supposed to look after the interests of the state's citizens do not let the taxpayers see what they are doing for the utilities so actually the PSC works for those they "regulate". It was learned that about 1,000 miles of gathering lines are proposed for abandonment and these have been owned by the utilities for decades or, in some instances, for a century. The story is the "EPA is on them about methane leaks" and the poor darlings can't afford to fix the leaks. It would appear that the plan is to abandon the old Hope (DTI) gathering system, the old EQT gathering system and perhaps the Columbia (TCO) gathering system. This, of course, would leave most independent oil and gas companies who operate "legacy" wells with no way to market the natural gas that they produce even though most of the gas is the valuable "wet" gas rich in ethane, propane, the butanes, natural gasolene, etc. The PSC said that the companies should hold meetings in areas that are to be impacted by the plan. A meeting was held in Wood County and there are meetings in Weston and Clarksburg. However, on Tuesday, December 10 at 5 p.m. there was a meeting at the Hope office in Grants-ville. This is the big building at the south end of the bridge in Grantsville as one turns to go over the Pine Creek hill. At least some producers have not been notified of the abandonment of the gas lines that are being discussed. Hope Gas told some Calhoun folks that they don't own gas wells and that they are not in the pipeline business. It was noted that the "old" Hope Gas Company was based in Clarksburg and now the "new" Hope Gas Company is headquartered in Morgantown. Of course, the meeting is in the "old"

that part of the intent is to put small oil and gas producers out of business.

At the same time Rusty Hutson Jr.'s Diversified Energy announced that the company plans to sell 40 bcf (billion cubic feet) of natural gas as LNG to the foreign market where the price is best. His company checks are now mailed without detail which creates problems, especially when one must file reports and pay royalties.

The state has made it clear that the emphasis is on the production of Utica & Marcellus gas and others are "just a bother". Studies of production reports make it obvious that the volumes turned in sometimes are "questionable" at best. The state does not check the meters [unlike oil and gas states] so reporting is "voluntary". The state tax revenue shortfall for October was a catalyst for folks to check these meters as royalties, county and state severance taxes are all impacted — now, no one would cheat. The "powers that be" have now made it clear that these meters are not to be checked for accuracy "because we can't find anybody to do it — we can't get people to be state police, they get \$17/hour to flip burgers." Translation is "We are bought and paid for and we do not represent the citizens of West Virginia.' Of course, the "meter readers/ checkers" could be paid six figure salaries and the state would have much more

The story now is that Broadway Joe is going to be "el presidente" up at WVU which has all sorts of problems. Now a football professor was "let go" and the taxpayers are on the hook for \$6 million to help him through his "declining years". Huge sums have been spent taking over health care facilities state wide [and out of state] and, it is said, enrollment is down.

It was reported that the W. Va. Supreme Court in a ruling in a class action suit against Antero that the company cannot deduct costs from leases that do not specifically allow for costs to be deducted from royalties which historically were free and clear of all costs. Since this is a boon for the companies there is no move to correct the problem. Sorry taxpayers we don't answer to you.

Dec. 12, 1931: Attorney George Daugherty, better known as the comic singer, storyteller, and songwriter "The Earl of Elkview," was born upstairs over a Mannington silent movie house.



Dec. 12, 1942: Internationally known jazz pianist and recording artist Bob Thompson was born in Jamaica, Queens, New York. He studied music at West Virginia State College (now University) and is the house pianist for the Mountain Stage radio program.



Dec. 12, 1953: Chuck Yeager set a speed record by flying two-and-a-half times the speed of sound in a Bell X-1A. Yeager, who grew up in Hamlin, had broken the sound barrier six years earlier on Oct. 14, 1947.

Dec. 13, 1861: The Battle of Allegheny Mountain, one of the bloodiest conflicts of the Civil War's first year took place in Pocahontas County.



Dec. 13, 1926: Wheeling radio station WWVA-AM began broadcasting. The 50-watt station operated from the basement

of John Stroebel's house for most of its first year. Stroebel was a physics teacher and wireless pioneer.

Dec. 14, 1910: The accidental death of a Chesapeake & Ohio Railway engineer near St. Albans led to the popular train song "Billy Richardson's Last Ride."



Dec. 14, 1857: Coal operator Justus Collins was born. He owned mines at Glen Jean and Whipple, and the octagonal Whipple company store survives today as a local landmark.

Dec. 15, 1879: Roman Catholic Bishop John Joseph Swint was born in Pickens. He was responsible for building many religious institutions in the Diocese of Wheeling (now the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston).



Dec. 15, 1953: Blacksmith Jeff Fetty was born in Spencer and later graduated from Spencer High School. In 2012, he was named one of the world's top metal designers by the International Metal Design Annual—becoming only the sixth American to receive the honor.

Dec. 15, 1967: The Silver Bridge at Point Pleasant collapsed, killing 46 people. The Silver Bridge was opened to traffic on May 19, 1928. The accident led to the passage of legislation for a national bridge inspection and safety program.



Dec. 15, 1972: An explosion at a Weirton Steel coke plant on Browns Island killed 19 men and injured 10 others. It was the worst industrial accident in Weirton's history.



Dec. 16, 1893: Alexander Martin died at the age of 71 in Greencastle, Indiana. Martin was the first president of the Agricultural College of West Virginia, which was renamed West Virginia University at his recommendation in 1868



Dec. 16, 1897: The last public hanging in West Virginia occurred in Ripley. John F. Morgan had been convicted of murdering Chloe Greene and two of her three children in the Grass Lick area of Jackson County.

Dec. 17, 1957: The J. L. Stifel & Sons calico plant at Wheeling closed. For

most of its history, Stifel & Sons produced indigodyed prints and drills for clothing manufacturers. At its peak, the plant produced 3.5 million yards of cloth per month.



Dec. 18, 1842: U.S. Senator Nathan B. Scott was born. By 1900, Scott had become one of West Virginia's four richest and most powerful men.



Dec. 18, 1864: General Harry Hill Bandholtz was born in Michigan. Bandholtz was commander of the federal troops that intervened to end the West Virginia Mine Wars in



Dec. 18, 1816: Lewis County was formed. It was named for Colonel Charles Lewis, killed at the Battle of Point Pleasant





Muzzleloader deer season to open December 16

Additional deer stamp must be purchased prior to season

The West Virginia Division of Natural Resources (WVDNR) announced that the state's muzzleloader deer hunting season will run from Dec. 16-22 and reminded hunters to purchase an RM or RRM stamp before the season starts if they want a chance to harvest an additional deer during the season.

"West Virginia's muzzleloader season offers an exciting opportunity to enjoy one last hunting adventure in our beautiful outdoors, fill your tags and make memories that will last a lifetime," said Brett McMillion, WVDNR Director. "We encourage all of our deer hunters to get out into the woods and take advantage of this special season."

Hunters are also reminded that bucks harvested during the muzzleloader season are eligible for entry into the WVD-NR's Big Buck Photo Contest. Hunters are invited to submit a photo with a buck they harvested during a 2024 hunting season along with a short account of their hunt for a chance to win prizes. Detailed rules and entry forms are available at WVdnr.gov/photocontest.

Rules and Regulations

During West Virginia's muzzleloader season, antlered deer are legal in all counties that have a buck firearms season, and deer of either sex are legal in all counties or parts thereof that have a Class N/NN antlerless season. Logan, McDowell, Mingo and Wyoming counties are closed to all firearms deer hunting, including the muzzleloader deer season.

In Berkeley, Greenbrier (south portion), Hampshire, Hardy, Jefferson, Mineral (east portion), Monroe, Morgan and Wood counties, hunters are required to take an antlerless deer within the county, during any regular deer season open to antlerless deer hunting, before harvesting a second antlered deer within the county. Hunters are also reminded that beginning with the 2024 deer seasons, no more than two antlered bucks can be harvested during the regular deer seasons and the 2025 Mountaineer Heritage Season combined, except that three antlered deer may be taken in a West Virginia CWD Containment Area or by Class XS license holders. All hunters afield during this week are required to wear a minimum of 400 square inches of blaze orange.

A single-shot muzzleloading pistol or rifle, having a bore diameter of .38 caliber or larger, using an encapsulated propellant charge that loads from the breech and the projectile is loaded from the muzzle, is legal for use during the muzzleloader deer season.
