# **Town of Grantsville Report Unmet Reporting Requirements**

The Town of Grantsville, as with all water treatment companies, have mandatory reporting and monitoring requirements to keep in compliance with State Regulations. In a report filed by Chad Drennen, current Operator of the Grantsville Municipal Water Plant on February 28th, 2025, the following violations were reported for the months of January 2024 to December 2024.

However, although it was stated that the fault was on the "previous operator," this was not entirely true. Mr. Drennen began his employment in May of 2024, meaning one half of the year's violations fell to his responsibility. The violations continued from May until December.

To help better understand the violations, below are the violation descriptions.

"Monitoring, Routine (DBP), Major" is a violation type code used to indicate that a public water system failed to meet monitoring and reporting requirements for disinfection byproducts (DBPs).

Explanation

- DBPs are chemicals that form when chlorine or other disinfectants react with organic matter in drinking water.
- Public water systems are required to monitor disinfectant residuals at various locations in the distribution system.
- The results of these monitoring efforts are reported to the relevant regulatory agency on a regular basis.
- Regular monitoring helps determine if drinking water is safe from microbial contamination.
- Monitoring trends over time can help identify health problems or avoid them before they occur.

A Surface Water Treatment Rule (SWTR) violation for a water treatment plant's filtration process can occur when turbidity levels are too high.

What is a SWTR violation for filtra-

West Virginia's water quality standards limit turbidity in streams to prevent excessive suspended matter from entering the water. The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR) and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) monitor public water systems for compliance with these standards.

- Turbidity standards The EPA's standard for turbidity in drinking water is 1 nephelometric turbidity unit (NTU).
- Stream turbidity In West Virginia, streams cannot have a turbidity that exceeds 10 NTU above background turbidity.
- Monitoring The EPA and DHHR monitor public water systems for compliance with turbidity standards.
- Corrective action public water systems must keep records of actions taken to correct violations for three years after the corrective action is completed.

The Long Term 1 Enhanced Surface Water Treatment Rule (LT1ESWTR) builds on the requirements of the Surface Water Treatment Rule (SWTR) and specifies treatment requirements to address Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants in public water systems serving less than 10,000 persons.

# Jenifer Randolph hired as Calhoun County's first administrator

Realizing it is 2025 not 1925, the Calhoun County Commission made a bold decision to step into today when it hired a county administrator.

Jenifer Randolph, who has been a dedicated public servant for over 15 years, serving as the County Administrator for Roane County, became the first administrator in Calhoun County history and as such the first professional put in charge of the business of the county.

Known for her exceptional administrative skills and her ability to navigate the complexities of county governance, Randolph has earned a stellar reputation across the state.

Her name is often mentioned with respect and admiration in Charleston, where her contributions to Roane County are well recognized.

Despite Roane County being a larger and more affluent area, she decided to take on a new challenge. She accepted a position in Grantsville, a smaller community that offered her a salary of \$50,000. This was a significant decision, considering the average salary for a county administrator in West Virginia is \$81,000.

However, for Randolph, the move was not just about the money. According to Calhoun Commissioner

Eric Lupardus he felt she sought a place where she could feel truly appreciated and make a meaningful impact. That is the case in Calhoun where the county is often among the lowest in income and

highest in unemployment.

Randolph's first day in Grantsville is set for March 17th, and she will be working out of the annex building, which is also used for early voting. This location, formerly the old city hall, is conveniently situated on the left as you enter and it offers a good amount of office space and is away from the courthouse's hustle and bustle, providing her with a peaceful environment to carry out her duties.

Her new office space will also grant her a degree of autonomy, which will be beneficial if Calhoun County and Grantsville transition to a metro government structure in the future.

# WV Spring Fire Season, Burning **Restrictions Returned March 1**

The start of West Virginia's annual spring fire season started on Saturday, March 1, with the return of burning restrictions.

The West Virginia Division of Forestry (WV DOF) reminds residents to confine outdoor burning to 5 p.m. to 7 a.m., according to West Virginia State Code Chapter 20-3-5. Fires set during that time must be put out before 7 a.m.

"Even though we have had a wet and snowy winter, it doesn't take very long for our fuels to dry out. Since January 1, we have responded to 29 fires that have burned approximately 161.6 acres. We would like to ask the public to please follow burning restrictions, especially on sunny and windy conditions," said Jeremy Jones, Director/ State Forester of the West Virginia Division of Forestry.

Statewide burning restrictions will remain in effect until the spring fire season closes on May 31. The Division of Forestry has issued burning guidelines on its website at wvforestry.com/fire-laws.

Regulations include:

All fires must have a safety strip.

The safety strip itself must be cleared of burnable material and be at least 10 feet

Fire must be attended until completely extinguished.

Only vegetative materials such as leaves, brush and yard clippings are permitted to be

Spark-throwing machinery such as power shovels or sawmills operating on land subject to fire must contain an adequate spark arrestor.

Inflammable waste disposal areas must annually remove all grass, brush, debris and other inflammable material adjacent to disposal areas to provide adequate protection, preventing the escape of fire to adjacent lands.

"Our fire laws protect one of West Virginia's most valuable resources, our forests," Jones said. "We urge everyone who decides to burn anything outside to be completely familiar with the guidelines available on our website. It doesn't take long for our fuels to dry out and fires to escape easily during the spring months."

Commercial burning during prohibited periods requires a permit, which are issued by local WVDOF offices. A permit is required for each commercial burning site.

Any person or company that causes a fire on grass or forest land must reimburse the state for the costs of suppressing the fire. Fines for forest fires caused by negligence range from \$100 to \$1,000, with an additional civil penalty of \$200.

A local resident had occasion to attend to business in the Morgantown area and learned that the potholes on I-79 put those on I-77 to shame. One Morgantown area resident who has family in Wirt County noted that she was not going to get new tires for her chariot until they were fixed. It appeared that some of the "imperfections in the surface of the roadway" were being addressed near Clarksburg.

The Public Service Commission (PSC) ruled that Mother Hope can change customers on their gathering lines from natural gas to propane or electric. There are said to be 629 impacted families including several Creston residents. The PSC said there would be public meetings in 19 counties but there would not be one in Calhoun County. Mother Hope, part of the Rockefeller Standard Oil empire, wants to abandon 1,068 miles of gathering lines including at least two big lines in the Creston area. A hearing on that



will be held May 14, 2025, starting at 9:30 A.M. at the PSC headquarters in Charleston. At a previous PSC meeting the lines to be abandoned were kept secret. The economic impact of the proposed abandonments would be significant, putting it mildly. At the prior meeting in Grantsville the Hope PR man told about all the woes dealing with the old EQT (Equitable Gas, Pittsburgh & West Virginia, Carnegie Natural Gas/ U S Steel) lines they acquired in other parts of the state. Old Hope men who were at that meeting noted that company biggies were noted for their bloviating skills. The legislature is now in session. Will they speak up and act on behalf of the citizens or will they listen to the slicksters who, in their spare time, sell refrigerators to the Esquime-

Detroit based DT Midstream announced that they would be supplying natural gas to the proposed new power plant in Pleasants County.

It was learned that David Goff passed away. Burial will be at Ground Hog.



March 6, 1820: Joseph H. Diss Debar was born in France. Diss Debar was the designer of the Great Seal of West Virginia and the state's first commissioner of immigration.



March 6, 1828: Johnson Camden was born in Lewis County. In 1861, he opened one of the state's first oil wells, in Wirt County, and a refinery in Parkersburg in 1869. He was elected to the U.S. Senate in 1881.

March 6, 1900: A mine explosion at the Red Ash Mine in Fayette County killed 46 men. It was the state's first major mine disaster of the 20th century. Five years later, another 24 men were killed at the same mine.

March 7, 1856: Tucker County was formed from Randolph County and named for Henry St. George Tucker Sr., a Virginia soldier, statesman and jurist.



March 7, 1929: The legislature adopted the official state flag. state's coat of arms is emblazoned in color in the center. Above the seal is a red ribbon lettered "State

of West Virginia," and a wreath of rhododendron surrounds the lower part of the seal. The white field of the flag is bordered on four sides by a strip of blue.

March 7, 1990: West Virginia teachers went on strike after negotiations with the governor's office and legislature failed to produce an agreement on a pay package. Teachers in 47 of the 55 counties were involved in the 11day strike.



March 8, 1926: An explosion killed 19 miners at Eccles in Raleigh County. Ten men were saved by barricading themselves in the mine.

March 8, 1963: The state colors of blue and "old gold" were adopted by the legislature.



March 9, 1832: George Robert Latham was born. At the onset of the Civil War, Latham turned his Grafton law office into a recruiting station, and he led the first Union troops in north- central West Virginia.

March 9, 1953: Football player Dennis Harrah

was born in South Charleston. In the NFL, Harrah played in 168 games for the Los Angeles Rams (1975-87), was a six-time All Pro, and played in one Super Bowl.



March 9, 1965: President Lyndon Johnson signed the act establishing the Appalachian Regional Commission.



March 10, 1910: Kermit McKeever, considered the father of the modern West Virginia state park system, was born near Renick, Greenbrier County.

March 10, 1915: West Virginia's first Rotary International club was established in Wheeling.

March 10, 1920: West Virginia became the 34th state to ratify the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which guaranteed the right of women

March 11, 1847: Boone County was formed from parts of Logan, Kanawha and Cabell counties and named for Daniel Boone. March

11, Putnam County formed from portions of Kanawha, Mason and Cabell counties. It was named in honor of Gen. Israel Putnam, a leading commander at the Battle of Bunker Hill during the Revolutionary War.



March 11, 1856: Roane County was created from parts of Kanawha, Jackson and Gilmer counties. It was named for Judge Spencer Roane, a son-inlaw of Patrick Henry.

March 12, 1835: Marshall County was created from part of Ohio County. It was named for John Marshall, chief justice of the U.S. Supreme Court.

March 12, 1850: Wheeling Hospital was chartered. During the Civil War, the institution was used as a general military hospital. The Sisters of Saint Joseph were hired as army nurses, treating wounded Union and Confederate soldiers side by

# **Specialty Crop Block Grant Application Deadline Moved to March 10**

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) has extended the deadline to apply for FY 2025 Specialty Crop Block Grants (SCBG) to March 10. The grants are handed out by the West Virginia Department of Agriculture (WVDA) annually to enhance the production, processing, and consumption of specialty crops in the Mountain State. In FY 2024, eight West Virginia agribusinesses were awarded a total of \$301,000 in SCBG.

"Here in West Virginia, we don't have a lot of largescale agriculture operations outside of the poultry and cattle industries. Ninety-eight percent of West Virginia farms are family owned and operated," explained Commissioner of Agriculture Kent Leonhardt. "Many of our farmers, whether they know it or not, grow or produce SCBG-qualifying products. These grants can be a gamechanger for farmers and producers looking to expand their agribusinesses or research ways they can move into the specialty crop market."

The Specialty Crop Block Grant Program is funded by the USDA and administered by the WVDA. Recipi-

ents have two years to plan, implement, and gather data on their respective projects. Specialty crops are defined as fruits, vegetables, tree nuts, dried fruits, horticulture, and nursery crops, including floriculture.

In FY 2023, Sunset Berry Farm, in Monroe County, received \$74,825 in SCBG funding to test market freeze-dried fruits they grew on their farm. Fast forward two years, the farm is now selling their products to West Virginia school systems through the Farm 2 School pro-

In FY 2022, Grow Ohio Valley used part of a \$61,110 SCBG to invest in a youth entrepreneurship program. Budding Wheeling, for youth 13-17, now teaches participants farming and business skills running their own flower farming business.

# Calhoun played Gilmer Tuesday in Class A tournament

This game was played after newspaper deadlines and will be reported in the next edition.

Calhoun is 2-8 against Gilmer County since April of 2021 but they>ll have a chance to close the gap a little bit on Tuesday. The Calhoun Red Devils will face off against the Gilmer County Titans at 7:00 p.m. Calhoun has given up an average of 59.4 points per game this season, so hopefully the team got some defensive drills in this week.

Calhoun is headed into the game out to prove that what happened against St. Marys last Friday (when they were outscored in every quarter) was just a minor bump in the road. Calhoun was beaten by St. Marys 81-46. The Red Devils were in a tough position after the first half, with the score already sitting at 42-22.

Despite the loss, Calhoun had strong showings from Brennen Carpenter, who shot 44% from the field on his way to 20 points and six boards, and Cooper Morris, who went 5-for-11 to rack up 11 points and six rebounds. That was a full 43.5% of Calhoun's points, marking the fourth time in a row Carpenter has posted more than a third of the team's points. Gavin Hicks was another key player, putting up seven points.

Meanwhile, Gilmer County was not able to break out of their rough patch

on Thursday as the team picked up their third straight defeat. They were four points away from ending the streak, but they lost a 64-60 heartbreaker at the hands of Webster County.

Calhoun will need to focus on slowing down Kolten Holbert, one of several Gilmer County players who made an impact when they last played. He went 6-for-7 en route to 21 points in addition to six rebounds and three steals. With that strong performance, Holbert is now averaging an impressive 15 points per game. Another player making a difference was Jacob Mick, who had 16

Gilmer County's loss dropped their record down to 6-16. As for Calhoun, their defeat dropped their record down to an identical 6-16.

Tuesday's matchup will pit two of the most dominant guards against one another: Carpenter and Mick. Carpenter has been dynamite this season: he has averaged 12.3 points, 1.5 steals, and 6.9 boards. For his part, Mick has averaged 15.3 points, 1.7 steals, and 2.9 assists.

Calhoun came up short against Gilmer County when the teams last played back in February, falling 56-44.

# City Council holds March Meeting on Monday

The Town of Grantsville held their March 2025 meeting at the City Office at 4 n m

meeting at the City Office at 4 p.m.

With somewhat low attendance, and very little noti-

fication there were no community concerns.

Under the Mayor's communication:

- Mayor Robert Petrovsky discussed WVR-CAP (West Virginia Rurual Community Assistance Program) receipt of their fire hydrant inspections.
- Mayor Petrovsky informed the council that he had received a call from The 1982 foundation that there will be a new crew on site at the Avalon Campus which will require that the city staff makes sure a new building permit is filed.
- Donna Schoolcraft expressed interest to the Mayor in utilizing the FEMA lots in town for community gardening.
- There continues to be a trash issue on River Street that the Mayor informed staff Jesse Davis that a call or visit should be made.
- In a recent sewer issue the sewer department work crew may have lost their \$2,100 Warthog Jetter

Head that they are continuing to attempt to retrieve.

• In reference to the recent water violations the Mayor stated that much of it was from quite some time ago and that current operator Chad Drennen had only had a couple of the violations during his time as operator because of a telemetry issue.

Under Committee reports Councilwoman Cheryl Sturm stated that she had spoken to the Calhoun Gilmer Career Center regarding the park sign and that they believed that it was too big of a project for them to do. She is now contacting Roane Jackson Vocational Center as well as David Gerlach for a price on the sign which will list park contributors and rules.

Under New Business, Recorder Emily Collins informed the counsel that there will be a budget meeting on March 20, 2025 at 5:00 p.m.

A special meeting for the interviews of the City Water Manager was held on Monday evening.

In the matter of financials, Recorder Collins told the counsel members that from this point forward any budget revisions of 20% or more will require explanation as to why the funding is necessary to be moved.

She also reported that the Town had been charged \$300 in late fees by Mon Power due to a U.S. Post Office error in late delivery of the Town's payment when it was returned to the City as undeliverable to the Mon Power Address.

Also with regard to utilities, Collins said that the West Virginia State Police, who are also housed in the City's building would need to be contacted for their non-payment of their 25% of the utilities in the City Building since December 2024.

According to Mrs. Collins the WV State Auditor's

officer is "cracking down" with the expectation that there be clarity on the payment of bills. Mayor Petrovsky suggested that she send copies of the bills being paid along with receipt information. Divers will be coming on Wednesday, March 5th to

Divers will be coming on Wednesday, March 5th to dive the river and change the intake heads at the water plant because (according to the Mayor) they were installed improperly, unless the rain prevents the dive.

Meeting was adjourned after bill payments at 4:32 p.m.

(Hope), a public utility, filed with the Public Service Commission of West Virginia a Petition for prior consent and approval to abandon approximately 1,068 miles of pipelines and related facilities, or "Red Lines." On January 15, 2025, Hope filed an Amendment to its Petition stating that Diversified Midstream LLC had agreed to non-binding terms to acquire all of the Red Lines from Hope.

The Red Lines proposed to be abandoned are located in the counties of Barbour, Braxton, Calhoun, Clay, Doddridge, Gilmer, Harrison, Jackson, Kanawha, Lewis, Marion, Mason, Monongalia, Pleasants, Ritchie, Roane, Taylor, Tyler, Upshur, Wetzel, Wirt, and Wood. The Red Lines and locations are identified in the Petition, which is on file and available for public inspection at the Commission's offices at 201 Brooks Street, Charleston, West Virginia, and on the Commission's website, www.psc.state.wv.us.

Hope maintains that from Hope's perspective the pipelines can no longer provide safe, reliable, and economical gas service to the farm-tap customers or are in jeopardy of being unable to continue providing service. The pipelines are no longer necessary or useful to Hope's provision of service to Hope customers and are uneconomical to continue to operate, maintain, or replace. Hope estimates that the cost to operate and maintain the pipelines will far exceed \$10 million per year, and replacing the lines with new plastic pipelines will cost over \$600 million. Hope does not seek a rate increase in this proceeding.

# Wednesday Evening Commission Meeting Highlights

The Calhoun County Commission met for their second February meeting on Wednesday, February 26th, 2025. Commissioners Craig Arthur, Jacob McCumbers and Eric Lupardus were present.

A long awaited answer from Jim Hildreth, Engineer, regarding the status of the ten plus year Norman Ridge Water project brought no new information. The citizens in that area of the county have waited far more patiently than warranted for the project to begin, only to be told they'll still be waiting.

Calhoun resident Martha Harris spoke about her need and lack of water.

The Commission has began working on the dilapidated structure issues in Calhoun County by beginning discussions on creating a county ordinance. The County powers (Commission, businesses, FINEX, etc.) have determined to make Calhoun a sought for location for business, industry and new residents.

Another property value reducing issue in Calhoun County is that of non-business Salvage/junkyards. The Commissioners will reach out to the proper agency responsible for enforcement of those areas. Lupardus has spoken with an agency that will be reaching out next week with a plan to move forward on working to get those matters cleaned up.

During a previous Commission meeting the Commissioners discussed

a discrepancy in Deputy C.R. Stephens' pay that occurred when Sheriff Graham Knight requested and approved that he be paid time and a half for a holiday worked. The County Clerk, Jean Simers, paid Stephens regular pay, having determined that it was proper. All three Commissioners voted to approve back pay for holiday pay in which Deputy Stephens had been shorted. (This was corrected by Commissioner McCumbers where I had previously stated only two voted to approve). State code states that law enforcement is to receive time and a half for holidays.

During the discussion on that topic, Commissioner McCumbers told the Sheriff he did not see why he (the Sheriff) didn't work holidays himself to save the budget. Commissioner Lupardus stated that the Commissioners cannot determine the Sheriff's schedule, as he is an elected official.

Commissioner McCumbers then said "Yes, but we can control his budget." The rather contentious conversation does not address the fact that West Virginia had the fourth lowest annual wages for police in the nation, partly reflective of the low cost of living in the state. Altogether, West Virginia spent less per capita on police than every state but Kentucky in 2017. Calhoun County could likely rank among the lowest of the low for county budgets for a sheriff's department. Calhoun has struggled in keeping qualified deputies in the past due to low salaries. Any cuts in the sheriff's department budget could be critical to that branch of law

In 2013, Dr. Bone was nominated for a Grammy Foundation award and received the 2017 Outstanding Faculty Award from Glenville State.

His dedication to music education is evident in his mentorship of student ensembles, many of which have performed at the International Tuba and Euphonium Conference, where Dr. Bone has also been a guest artist. Additionally, he is the author of "Guide to the Euphonium Repertoire," the first comprehensive text on euphonium music.

Glenville State University President Dr. Mark A. Manchin commended Dr. Bone's recognition, stating, "Dr. Bone is an exceptional faculty member who truly takes the time to not only provide excellent instruction to our students, but also to get to know them on a personal level. The Pioneer family joins me in congratulating him on this well-deserved recognition".
