### Saturday was a double competition day for the Calhoun Marching Red Devils

Friday, this group went to school all day and then played pre-game and stand tunes for Friday night game at 7 pm plus performed their halftime show. Most arrived home sometime after 10 pm, some as late as 11 pm.

you -- we competed up a class at this competition instead of our usual Class D. And the Calhoun Marching Red Devils' performance outscored both Roane County High School and Parkersburg

### (MHHS) and (RCES) Explore Enhanced **Emergency Medical Services/911 Services** in Calhoun County

Minnie Hamilton (MHHS) and Roane County Emergency Squad (RCES) are actively exploring collaborative efforts to enhance emergency medical services (EMS) coverage for our community. These discussions aim to address the challenges posed by the federal PEAKS Act not being passed, which would have allowed cost based rewhich would have allowed cost-based reimbursement for critical access hospitals. Despite the PEAKS Act being stalled at the federal level, we remain committed to providing high-quality EMS coverage while maintaining fiscal responsibility.

The collaborative approach under review seeks to ensure that emergency services in our community are not only maintained but expanded. Importantly, all levy dollars will continue to be allocated solely for Calhoun County services. By partner-

ing with regional organizations, we are focused on delivering the highest quality of care to our residents.

While no agreements have been finalized, preliminary discussions suggest that RCES would hire additional personnel to serve Calhoun County, with a 24-hour crew stationed at Arnoldsburg. At the same time, MHHS will maintain a 24hour transport crew, supplemented by additional daytime transport coverage. This partnership will enable both organizations to effectively respond to 911 emergencies and enhance service availability.

The Grantsville Town Council was scheduled to meet at 6 p.m. Monday night but the meeting was postponed, and no makeup date had yet been scheduled.

There has been no agenda posted but Barbara Duskey, who has sent the town, mayor and council members a letter of application for the open recorder's position

was invited to speak to the council.

The recorder's position became open when Shannon Waldron, who was elected as a write-in candidate, resigned effective Aug. 18, 2025.

She made the following statement:

"For the sake of transparency, I feel it is important to outline the PRIMARY reasons contributing to this decision.

Following Waldron's resignation an attempt to name former council member and failed mayoral candidate Courtney Yoak Alexander to the position was defeated on a 3-2 vote with Chastity Bell, Tanya Cunningham and Jess Metz voting no.

Instead the search began again with Erin Springston applying then withdrawing her application.

## Backstory on rescue of missing Left Fork resident

Becky Keener spoke with the Ridgeview News regarding the location and rescue of David Deiter, who had been reported missing on Sunday, September

Becky reported that she was scared and alone when she found Mr. Deiter along the edge of the field at the bottom of the hillside below Left Fork Road. The sounds she had heard from Mr. Deiter's house were "like an animal moaning, like a dog," she said.

"So I thought I would at least go to the bottom of the right-of-way road and see if I could hear anything,: she continued. "Then I beeped the vehicle a couple of times and sat still, listening and looking. I heard a noise louder that sounded like it was on the left side, so I decided to drive along the creek through the field, thinking that he could be in the creek. The further I went, I beeped, and the louder

"Then finally, I saw a leg move, and I took off, jumped out, and ran up to him," she said. I recognized it was Dave, who I had been looking for him since Sunday, and started hollering his name. I asked him what he thought he was doing and told him who I was. I could tell he was confused, but he did know who I was. I asked him who my husband was, and Dave hollered, 'Philly, where is he?' That's what he called Phillip. I went on talking to him. He asked if I would help him up. I tried to, but as soon as he pulled on my hand, he started hollering

"Dave asked me not to leave him, 'Pleaseee!' I said, 'I won't, but I have

and crying that he was hurting.'

to go get service to call for help.' So I did. Finally, I got a bar of service on my phone to call 911, message his niece in Missouri, and call my husband Phillip to come help me and try to reach 911 too because I couldn't get through when I tried. Then I went back to Dave. I waited and kept talking to him, listening to his stories. He was telling me what happened, and then I saw the ambulance, the fire department, and a buggy. But still, no one came to us, and I told him I had to leave to bring help because they couldn't find us. I saw my husband, and he followed me along with the fire department to where Dave was."

Becky spoke with Mr. Deiter's doctor, and she said he said, "Physically, he's okay other than scratches and dehydration. He said he wasn't down there for more than a couple of days. Some small spinal fractures in the lumbar region, but nothing that will cause trouble. He did say he shouldn't be driving anymore or living so isolated."

Mr. Deiter still does not recall the


list. Jack & Debbie Griffin were calling on Dr. Dan Cain & Debbie was also calling on Dr. George in Parkersburg.

Enron, a/k/a EOG or Enron Oil & Gas, now has over 1 million acres of Utica leases in Ohio and has solved the puzzle about extracting oil from the oil window of the Utica shale which is also under West Virginia. The firm is now going to establish a regional office near Colum-

Royal Dutch Shell which is associated with the Rothschild family and had been "going green" now is facing reality and is big in LNG (liquified natural gas). The firm indicates that demand for LNG is to increase by 60%.

Oct. 9, 1877: The Episcopal Church created the Diocese of West Virginia. The initial convention of the new diocese met at St. John's Episcopal in Charleston, with 14 clergy and 16 lay delegates.

Oct. 9, 2014: Following court rulings and announcements by the governor and the attorney general, same-sex marriage was effectively legalized in West Virginia.



Oct. 10, 1774: Shawnee warriors led by Cornstalk were defeated at the Battle of Point Pleasant. It was the only major engagement of Dunmore's War and the most important battle ever fought in present West Virginia.



Oct. 10, 1872: Archi-

tect Rus Warne was born in Parkersburg. Warne designed many notable buildings in Charleston, including City Hall and the Masonic Temple.

Oct. 10, 1878: Blanche Lazzell was born in Maidsville, Monongalia County. She was one of West Virginia's most no-



table artists and is recognized as one of America's leading abstract painters and print makers.

Oct. 10, 1948: During a boat-racing event in Charleston, Chuck Yeager flew a Lockheed P-80 Shooting Star under the South Side Bridge, surprising boaters, audience and news media at the event.

Oct. 11, 1811: State founder and U.S. Senator Waitman T. Willey was born near Farmington. Willey proposed the West Virginia Statehood Bill in the Senate and saw to its passage and later signing by President Lincoln. He was then elected as one of West Virginia's first two U.S. senators and served from 1863 to 1871.

Oct. 11, 1923: Science fiction and fantasy author Doris Piserchia was born Doris Summers in Fairmont. She was a pioneer in a genre that has become

known as feminist science fiction, authoring 13 novels and 17 short stories between 1966 and 1983.



Oct. 12, 1877: Howard Mason Gore was born in Harrison County. He served as U.S. secretary of agriculture and the 14th governor of West Virginia.

Oct. 12, 2020: Actress Conchata Ferrell died. Born in Loudendale. Kanawha County, Ferrell was best known as Berta the housekeeper on the CBS sitcom Two and a Half Men. She enjoyed a long career on stage, film and television.

Oct. 13, 1863: The Battle of Bulltown took place. The location was valuable during the Civil War because the Weston & Gauley Bridge Turnpike crossed the Little Kanawha River on a covered bridge at this site.

Oct. 14, 1943: The army began transforming parts of Dolly Sods into an artillery range to train military troops bound for duty during World War II. The operation ended on July 1, 1944.

Oct. 14, 1947: In a Bell X-1 rocket airplane dropped from a B-29 bomber, Chuck Yeager broke the sound barrier by flying 700 miles per hour. He set another speed record on December 12, 1953, by flying two-anda-half times the speed of sound in a Bell X-1A.

Oct. 14, 1949: WSAZ-TV went on the air on channel 5. Early shows included the first telecast of a Marshall College (now University) basketball game on December 3,

Oct. 14, 1985: Kanawha Airport was renamed Yeager Airport in honor of Chuck Yeager.

Oct. 15, 1839: Aretas Brooks Fleming was born in Fairmont. In 1888, Fleming won the Democratic nomination for governor and then won West Virginia's most controversial gubernatorial election.

Oct. 15, 1874 or 1876: Civic leader and businessman James Cubert Campbell was born in Charleston. He would become Charleston's first Black licensed undertaker and first Black city council member.

Oct. 15, 1952: During the Korean War, Greenbrier County native Ralph Pomeroy was killed in action near Kumhuwa, Korea, while helping his unit contain an attack. The next year, he was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for his actions.

### WAG Trap-Neuter-Return Program on October 27, 2025

The Welfare of Animals Group (WAG) is conducting a Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) program on Monday, October 27, 2025, in the Five Forks and Arnoldsburg areas. This initiative aims to humanely trap feral cats, have them spayed/neutered, vaccinated, and ear-tipped (the universal sign of participation in a TNR program).

Important Information for Residents:

Do not feed feral cats on Sunday, October 26, as trapping will begin early Monday

Personal cats should be kept indoors or wear a collar on Monday, October 27, to avoid accidental trapping.

Trapped cats will be returned to their exact location after recovering from anesthesia (24-48 hours). This process ensures they are healthier, happier, and no longer reproducing

How You Can Help:

If you know of a feral cat colony in your area, please contact Linda Buchanan at 304-

Female kittens can begin breeding as early as four months old, so early intervention is crucial. The best time to spay/neuter a colony is when it consists of only 5-6 cats.

Program Achievements: To date, WAG has successfully spayed and neutered 1,053 community cats (573 females and 480 males), significantly improving the welfare of these animals and the community.

Cost and Funding: The Trap-Neuter-Return program is provided at no cost to Calhoun County caretakers. Partial funding is generously provided by The Oakland Foundation, The Bernard McDonough Foundation, the West Virginia Department of Agriculture, and the Calhoun County Commission.

Three Calhoun County FFA members have earned their American FFA Degrees and will have the honor accepting their Degree Award at the 2025 National FFA Convention in Indianapolis, Indiana later this month!

Trista Arnold, Jaelyn Jett, and Lindsey Schoolcraft have spent countless hours working towards this degree. Within the National FFA Organization, members have the opportunity to earn degrees at various levels based on their work ethic in their Supervised Agricultural Experiences (SAEs). These degrees range from Greenhand and Chapter degrees earned at the local level, to state level State degrees,

and the golden key of the American FFA Degree at the National level.

SAEs are an integral part of agriculture education and allow members to expand their learning outside of the classroom. ## Red Devils fall to Buffalo, travel to Clay Friday

Calhoun County's football team hosted the Buffalo Bisons in just its second home game last Friday. The Red Devils scored four touchdowns on the night but had difficulty stopping the Bisons' offense and fell by a 63-26 score.

Neither offense did well in their first possession of the game. Buffalo gained only I yard on four plays and surrendered the ball on downs. Calhoun County moved the ball only three yards and turned the ball over after a bad snap on its punt attempt. Buffalo scored quickly on its next possession, then twice more to build a 20-0 lead.

Calhoun County scored its first points on a short drive midway through the second quarter. Rome Riddel shot through the middle of the Buffalo line and barreled 19 yards for a touchdown. Trevor Mayle kicked the extra point to cut Buffalo's lead

Buffalo answered immediately and tacked on two more touchdowns for a 42-7 halftime score.

The third quarter was dominated by offenses. Both teams scored on all of their possessions in the quarter for a total of five touchdowns combined.

Calhoun scored first in the third quarter after a two-minute drive. Charter Cottrell covered the final seven yards on the possession. Chase Schoolcraft (10-yard run) and Gavin Hicks (on an 18-yard pass from Brennen Carpenter) accounted for the other Red Devil scores during the quarter.

The fourth quarter was less eventful, and a single Buffalo touchdown set the final score at 63-26.

The game featured a historic performance, sadly from the Bisons. Buffalo's Hunter Rutan completed 29 passes for 479 yards. This breaks the previous high for passing yards against the Red Devils (455), set by Gilmer's Patrick Morrison in 1998. The Bisons' 632 yards of total offense fell one yard shy of the all-time record by a Red Devil opponent, set in 1940 by Parkersburg High.

Brennen Carpenter and Charter Cottrell both rushed for more than 100 yards in the contest. This marks the first time two Red Devil backs eclipsed the century mark in the same game since Ian Persinger (194) and Owen Taylor (102) did so against
