## 2026 election season under way in Calhoun

The 2026 election season in Calhoun County is officially under way with only the mail which may have some late candidate papers keeping things from being official.

As of Jan. 31, 2026, the Calhoun County Clerk’s office had 15 different candidates filing for office with two of them filing for two different spots.

The unofficial candidate list for the May 12<sup>th</sup> 2026 Primary Election has been released, showcasing a diverse group of individuals vying for various offices.

However, one notable absence is the lack of democratic candidates filing for the Calhoun County Executive Committee. The Republican Party has a robust list of candidates, including some which may meet in the primary since the executive committee must be made up of a male and a female member from each of the magisterial districts – Center, Sheridan, Sherman, Washington and Lee – along with any at-large members the chairman (Shari Johnson) may want to select.

## More Questionable Behaviors by Town of Grantsville

The Town of Grantsville has habitually made questionable decisions, behaved unprofessionally, refused to provide minutes and ignored the Sunshine Law with regard to notifications of Council meetings.

The release of an agenda for a Tuesday, February 3, 2026, meeting (which was posted on the door of the City building) has brought further questions as to how the Town conducts business and what it will take to get the State of West Virginia to investigate what’s happening in our City.

At a January meeting, two Town council members walked out after feeling pressured to appoint Courtney Alexander as Recorder. On the new meeting agenda, Alexander is listed as needing approved for check signing, and an executive session is listed without the reasoning behind it. The agenda items were not approved by council members.

Any question of the Town Staff regarding a \$12K check that was allegedly attempted to be cashed in the State of Virginia last month, leads to more questions. The Town has reported the money was returned, but the circumstances and evidence as to how it was obtained, or cashed are highly questionable.

## Answers not yet forthcoming on fraudulent check

Its been more than a month now and we still have no answers on the fraudulent \$12,850 check written on the Town of Grantsville checking account.

While we have had other controversies – lots of controversies – a major felony has seemed to be lost in the fog.

Why?

Because of the smoke from other fires.

How?

Because there has been other fires.

And that’s why attention needs to be paid to the felony that happened a couple of days before Christmas before it does actually become lost in the smoke and fog.

It was and is (until it is solved) a major crime that affects all the citizens of the town and the county and all the officials in the governance of both,

And there needs to be some clarification of what is going on now.

There are still some important questions that need answered about the fraudulent \$12,850.00 check that was written on the Town of Grantsville.

To background a little bit on Dec. 23,

2025, the town was informed that a person named Elaine Washington or Augusta, Ga., had cashed a \$12,850.00 check on a Bank of America bank in Richmond, Va.

From the original story reported by *The Ridgeview News*:

“The Mayor and council members informed Ridgeview that there had been an attempt, or possibly a successful cashing of a \$12,850.00 check at a Bank of America in Richmond Virginia. The check, written to Elaine Washington from the General Account of the Town Of Grantsville, was dated December 22nd, 2025, and cashed December 24th, 2025. The person for which the check was allegedly written to, was from Augusta, Georgia.

“According to Mayor Villines and council members they were first informed that the check cashing attempt was not successful, but later received an overdrawn notice from Calhoun Banks. Calhoun Banks told them that it was an automatic letter and not an issue. But because the Town has been locked out of their online access, they do not know if it was cashed or not. The matter of fraud

several terms.

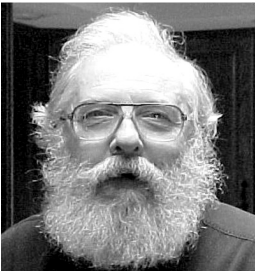

There will be Bingo at the Creston Community Building on February 7 with the kitchen opening at noon. All are invited to come, visit and have a good time.

The Creston area currently has real winter weather with lows near or below zero, icy roads, frozen water pipes, no school or church services, etc. The windbags like Albert Gore, Jr. and John Heintz-Kerry (Jon Carry) are maintaining low profiles at their beach front villas as they know the oceans are not going to rise from their now debunked "global warming". Even BlackRock's Larry Fink is now talking about using hydrocarbons, coal, oil & gas to supply reliable power. While the snow came last Saturday, Friday evening the road scraper & truck from Calhoun County came to deal with treacherous conditions on the Richardsonville Road.

In the northeast oil had to be used to provide power as the electric from hydropower from Canada was cut off as it was needed in that nation. Power rates there are very high because of "climate mandates", money spent on windmills & solar panels and the closing of reliable coal plants. Then some of them had the audacity to blame President Trump for high electric bills. Across the line in the Old Dominion, Gov. Spamberger, a former CIA agent just raised electric bills \$1100/year by forcing the power companies to pay the "carbon tax". She had run as "a moderate" but she has now shown her true colors going after legal gun owners and raising all sorts of taxes for the 'worker's paradise'.

Some Creston folks attended the investiture ceremony for Arch A. Moore Capito as the United States Attorney for the Southern District of W. Va. at the Robert C. Byrd federal building down at the Mouth of the Elk. The court room was packed with judges, lawyers, sheriffs, police chiefs, local politicians, poohbahs and nabobs. Local folks had to take off their shoes and belts to enter the federal court house. This time there was a chair.

Spencer newspaperman David Hedges died after having major health problems. From the local prospective

he was a member of the dePue family.

Several Wirt County residents motored to Parkersburg for the meeting at Greens [the old K-Mart on Division Street] where the Governor talked about a proposed 10% reduction in the state income tax. Joining him was Grover Norquist, a nationally famous tax expert.

The gendarmes were calling in Creston the other day.

Those who follow the news are now aware that there is what is called "a color revolution" happening in the country with trained, paid demonstrators funded by foreign nations and NGOs that get their \$\$ from the taxpayers. The cause had been "destroy Israel" but not it is " keep the illegal aliens in the country". Apparently 600 had been rounded up in W. Va. But now Judge Joe Bob Goodwin told law enforcement to turn two back out on the street.

The W. Va. Intermediate Court ruled that Arsenal's proposed force pooling for Marcellus wells in Harrison County cannot proceed since the company did not "negotiate in good faith". With world class oil & gas formations the royalty should be 25% with no deductions.

There has been lots of hype about the Fidelis facility in Mason County. First it was said that the firm would take coal and make all sorts of new products that would go on the train or barge to users. Now it seems that the facility is to be a gas fired power plant and AI data centers. For certain it seems no one "is interested" in the proposed similar facility on the Wirt/Calhoun line.

Because of the cold weather and treacherous roads some folks have had trouble feeding their animals let along providing water for them to drink.

Because of the bitter cold the spot price of natural gas rose to \$7.46/MMBTU but local producers did not get to share in the bonanza. After all, don't we know 'our place'? The price of local Pennsylvania grade crude was \$64.21/bbl. With condensate fetching \$46.21/bbl. And Marcellus & Utica light bringing \$53.21/bbl.

# The Chronicles of Violet

To my siblings, she is Mom, but to me she has been “Mother” for a few decades. I’m not sure why, other than the fact that my deep respect, awe and admiration for her brought on that title. She wasn’t a perfect Mother. But she was very, very near. Her work ethic was bar none to anyone I knew. Her creative talents were vast, and her creativeness came out of necessity, and her desire to save money. Everyone knew she pinched pennies so tight that all of the eye’s bulged on her money.

I used to poke fun at her about her aluminum foil drawer, until I ran out of foil one day, and came to her to borrow some. She wouldn’t let me use the new foil. She said, “I’d learn to appreciate how she saved if I used her slightly used pieces.”

I determined late last night that I would occasionally chronicle my life with Mother. Mostly for my own therapy, and perhaps to help someone else in the midst of the trials of dementia. And so as not to forget these precious days that I get to spend with her.

She calls me, the girl next door, which cracks me up. I deserve that. For years I seldom spent much time with Mother, who lived next door. I’d run in and out when I needed to tell her something or someone would come for a visit. I was far too busy you know and truthfully I am somewhat of a recluse when I get the opportunity. But visiting was a big deal in the Hardway home. It was not just something people did if they were in our neighborhood. They deliberately came to our neighborhood because it was always good for the following:

Conversation, genuine, let’s talk about how your life is going conversation.

A cup of coffee and something “sweet.” Like applesauce pie or peanut butter cake.

The next meal may not have been planned but it was on the table in unlimited supply, and you ate it at the table. Nobody was permitted to eat on the furniture, because that furniture had to last.

Long distance guests were always encouraged to spend the night, and often did.

The men folk watched sports in the living room, with the sound off, as Mother didn’t like sports and Dad loved Mother.

The women sat around the table, as

they were the last to eat and it was the order of that day. Children got their plates first, men sat in the best seats and finished their meal quickly so they could catch the game, and women could spin tales at the table and clean up the dishes.

Dinner started with prayer, and Bible conversations were far more in depth and common than sports.

Golly I miss those days.

Mother asked me yesterday if that man next door was married? She spoke of David, my husband. I said, “Yes, to me.” Her reply ... “Really, that’s nice.” She asked me a couple of more times within that hour. Every meal I fix she tells me it’s good. I know then that she doesn’t like it, because if she likes it she tells me it’s great! But she is far too polite to tell me she didn’t like it. I’ve discovered that politeness has made Mother a habitual liar. In the nicest, classiest way.

I realize that there are as many forms of dementia, Alzheimer’s and age related diseases as there are flowers... well maybe not, but everyone’s different the way it plays out. My Grandmother Vada, who had Alzheimer’s, was occasionally grumpy, and would pinch someone who got on her last nerve. Mother has really only been contrary with Claire. A young lady who came for a while to help care for her. She was angry because she didn’t believe she needed help, and anyone new was obviously there to replace me, the girl next door.

Mother doesn’t know, she doesn’t now, until she does. Most of the time she just lives life in the present. But occasionally she will realize that there are words and memories missing. We laugh together about how both of our minds are slipping. She gets frustrated that I cook, clean and wait on her hand and foot. She really has only herself to blame, that’s how she raised us! Violet is from another era of time that no longer exists in most American homes. A life of service. She served her husband, family, community and most of all, the Lord.

I needed to write this last night to begin the Chronicles of Mother Violet. I hope it causes you to reflect back on a sweeter time in your own life, and cause you to appreciate the people in your life.

is being investigated by the Virginia State Police and the FBI.

“According to the Mayor they are continuing to pay bills and staff.”

Thus far there have been no definitive answers to any of the questions or statements.

Much of that may have been from the confusion created by the fiasco of the town’s refusal to pay the salary of Brian Arthur the newly hired director of the Operating and Management (OEM) agreement between the town and the Mount Zion and Pleasant Hill public service districts.

The town had been given \$80,000 by the county in order to pay his salary. The refusal to pay and the town suggesting it was not a legal member of the OEM nor had Arthur officially been hired. Both has been ascertained in the positive – the town is officially in the OEM and Arthur had officially been hired.

But that mess has almost been settled to the point of letting the legalities play out.

The fraudulent \$12,850.00 check has not.

And some questions need answered before moving on.

They are:

Has anybody seen any reports from the legal authorities including the FBI, the Virginia State Police or the federal bank examiners?

Has the money been refunded to the town’s bank account?

If the check was cashed where is the money for the refund coming from?

What is the bank’s policy on this type of things?

Why was the town’s account locked to viewing?

Has the county, which has given several hundred thousand dollars to the town, sought an accounting?

Has any state entity asked for an accounting or to see the financial records?

Has anybody or any entity filed a FOIA request to see the financial records? They are public records.

Why did nobody say anything about the fraudulent check until it was brought up by *The Ridgeview News* during a town council meeting?

Is there any timeline for answers and the resolution of this problem?

And probably the biggest question of all, if nothing has been addressed publicly, why?

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**Feb. 5, 1784:** Nancy Hanks (Lincoln), the mother of Abraham Lincoln, was likely born in Hampshire County, Virginia, on Mikes Run at the bottom of New Creek Mountain in what is now Mineral County, although historical records of her early life do not exist.



**Feb. 5, 1889:** Fiddler and self-taught physician James Franklin "Doc" White was born near Ivydale, Clay County. White served the community as doctor, dentist, and midwife, delivering more than 1,800 babies.



**Feb. 5, 1890:** Coach Eli Camden "Cam" Henderson was born in Joetown, Marion County. He is a revered figure in Marshall University sports history.

**Feb. 5, 1941:** Actor David Lynn Selby was born in Morgantown. His stage and screen credits include the outdoor drama *Honey in the Rock* and the television shows *Falcon Crest* and *Dark Shadows*.

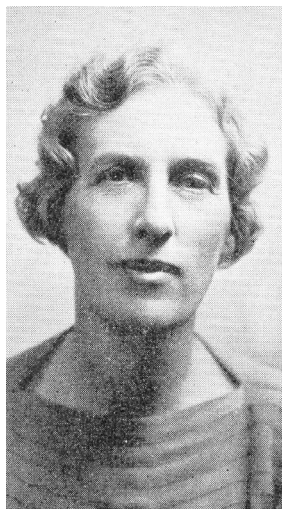
**Feb. 6, 1732:** Revolutionary War general Charles Lee was born in England. Late in his life, during the war, he moved to what is now Jefferson County.

**Feb. 6, 1882:** Poet Anne Spencer was born Annie Bethel Bannister in Henry County, Virginia. In 1886, she and her mother moved to Bramwell, where she spent most of her childhood and adolescent years.

**Feb. 6, 2007:** Selva Lewis "Lew" Burdette,

a native of Nitro, died in Florida. Burdette was an outstanding major league baseball pitcher who spent most of his career with the Milwaukee Braves. In 18 major league seasons, he won 203 games and lost 144. He was MVP of the 1957 World Series.

**Feb. 7, 1867:** West Virginia University was established by an act of the West Virginia legislature. The college, originally called the Agricultural College of West Virginia, opened its doors in September 1867.



**Feb. 7, 1889:** Nell Elizabeth "Pistol Nell" Walker was born at Sewell Mountain. Known as the "First Lady" of Fayette County, she served 12 terms as a member of the House of Delegates.

**Feb. 8, 1892:** Cartoonist Irvin Dugan was born in Huntington. For many years, his "Adam" cartoon character was a feature on the editorial pages of the *Herald-Dispatch*.



**Feb. 8, 1915:** Photographer Volkmar Kurt Wentzel was born in Dresden, Germany. He immigrated with his family to the United States at age 11. As a teenager in West Virginia, Wentzel took up with an eclectic group of people who had retreated to Youghiogheny Forest, a Preston County artists' colony.

**Feb. 8, 1918:** Medal of Honor recipient Herbert Joseph Thomas Jr. was born. He excelled as a football halfback at South Charleston High School, and Herbert J. Thomas Memorial Hospital (now part of WVU Medicine) in South Charleston is named for him.

**Feb. 9, 1843:** Republican leader Nathan Goff Jr. was born in Clarksburg. In 1888, Goff lost West Virginia's most controversial gubernatorial election to A. B. Fleming. Goff's initial 106-vote majority was challenged by Fleming, and both men were sworn in on inauguration day. The case dragged on until 1890, when Fleming was determined to be the rightful winner.



**Feb. 9, 1900:** "Aunt Jennie" Wilson was born near Henlawson. Wilson was a Logan County traditional musician, considered a master of clawhammer-style banjo playing.

**Feb. 9, 1938:** Multi-instrumentalist, songwriter, and sound engineer Wayne Moss was born in Charleston. He recorded with Brenda Lee, Roy Orbison, Dolly Parton, Bob Dylan, and many more, performed in the band Barefoot Jerry, and played a key role in developing Nashville's studio system.

**Feb. 9, 1950:** U.S. Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's speech to a group of Wheeling Republicans launched the 1950s red scare. McCarthy, a Wisconsin Republican, claimed in his speech to have a list of 205 communists who worked in the U.S. State Department.

**Feb. 10, 1904:** Jay Legg was shot and killed by his wife, Sarah Ann, in their home in Clay County. The trial, conviction, appeal, and acquittal of Sarah Ann led to a popular West Virginia folk ballad, "The Murder of Jay Legg."

**Feb. 10, 2010:** Frederick Appleton "Fred" Schaus, West Virginia University basketball All-American, coach, and athletic director, died at age 84 in Morgantown. Schaus coached WVU,

1954-1960, to a 146-37 record, and lost by one point in the 1959 national championship game.

**Feb. 11, 1903:** Artist Grace Martin Taylor was born in Morgantown. She produced an immense body of work in various styles and enjoyed a lengthy career at the Mason College of Music and Fine Arts in Charleston.

**Feb. 11, 1904:** Clarence Watson Meadows was born in Beckley. His mother hoped he would become a Baptist minister, but he ultimately entered politics, becoming the 22nd governor of West Virginia.



**Feb. 11, 1911:** The Charles Town Opera House opened. The 500-seat theater ushered in an era of entertainment and service lasting more than 30 years.

**Feb. 11, 1923:** Eight members of the Black Hand were arrested in Harrison County. The Black Hand was the name and symbol of an underworld society of Italian immigrants that extorted money from other Italian immigrants.

**Feb. 11, 1935:** The first houses in the Tygart Valley Homesteads were ready for occupancy. One of three resettlement projects in West Virginia, the homesteads were intended to provide a new start for unemployed farmers, miners, and timber workers.

**Feb. 11, 1949:** Singer and pianist Ethel Caffie Austin was born in Bluefield and raised in Mount Hope. As "West Virginia's First Lady of Gospel," she performed around the world, taught countless students, earned the Vandalia Award, and founded the West Virginia Black Sacred Music Festival.

# Commission Continues to Face O&M Concerns

Calhoun Commissioners Eric Lupardus, Craig Arthur, and Lee Rush met for the rescheduled regular second monthly meeting at 4 p.m. on Thursday, January 29th, 2026

Under delegations Dana Godfrey spoke to the Commission about his concern regarding the safety for Mt. Zion and Pleasant Hill PSD staff whom he recently scene working on along the road in the Arnoldsburg area with what he considered to be inadequate safety equipment.

Commission President Eric Lupardus commended the PSD staff for their recent work on leaks in frigid temperatures and requested that the PSD’s get safety regulations on road work procedures for staff and drivers that are followed by the Department of Safety.

Dana Godfrey asked the Commissioners why the O&M Manager, Brian Arthur, recently resigned as well as what happened to the funding given to the Town of Grantsville for his salary. Commissioner Lupardus responded that Arthur had resigned due to non-payment and that there were likely legal procedures in play between Arthur and the O&M Board in charge of the consolidation. The Commission is also looking at taking action.

The *Ridgeview News* commented to the Commission that “Someone from the State of West Virginia needs to take an emergency action on the current water company situation and the safety of Calhoun water customers. The recent Wayne County vandalism incident brings attention to the necessity of having proper management staff.”

Commissioner Lupardus replied that the Commission is moving ahead to create an emergency plan that includes public water and other community agencies during a natural disaster.

Sheriff Graham Knight requested the approval of the Commission for the purchase of 2018 Dodge Durango Pursuit AWD, with 84,260 miles for \$16,795.00. The vehicle is outfitted with all police equipment with the exception of a radio. Sheriff Knight said that the free shipping

offered by Chicago Motors, Inc will cover the cost of the radio.

Commissioner Lupardus made a motion to transfer \$7,500.00 from the money received from the insurance for a Sheriff Department totaled vehicle claim, which will be added with \$10,000 available in the Sheriff’s budget to cover the cost of the vehicle. Commissioner Arthur seconded the motion, and the matter was unanimously approved.

The Mt. Zion PSD agenda request for the Commission to consider Emergency Funding was tabled due to the inability of the Board members to appear and the results of a request for help from the Governor’s office that was made by Mt. Zion PSD.

The Animal Shelter project continues to move forward. The Commission agreed to deposit \$5,000 into the Animal Shelter’s checking account to keep it from closing. The Animal Shelter Committee continues to actively meet and plan for the project opening. Jennifer Randolph, County Administrator also requested that money be transferred for the payment of the property survey from the animal shelter funds. Commission Craig Arthur asked why all of the money that had been set aside for the Animal Shelter could not be transferred. Commissioner Lupardus said that it could, but they were waiting on it to be done through actions at an animal shelter board meeting.

Commissioner Lupardus discussed Emergency Shelters, Law Enforcement, Fire and EMS emergency preparedness, saying, “We have a need to keep the discussion going to have existing or new facilities in place if emergencies arise. We also plan to use grant funding through State and Federal Resources to accomplish it.

Commissioner Arthur recommended that the commission look toward the use of local parks in each community and Commissioner Lee Rush agreed with that approach.

Commissioner Lupardus stated that although in the recent storm, we did not lose power as expected, we did have agencies that stepped up and were prepared to provide emergency shelter.

Calhoun County Park President Donald Pitts informed the Commission that the park board had discussed it, but they currently do not have an emergency generator and would need to seek funding for it. Other than the generator, the park is fully equipped with showers, restrooms, kitchen and are ADA compliant.

Steve whited, CEO of Minnie Hamilton Health Systems stated that the Hospital has certain sites designated but would be open to having other locations as well. He also said that there was emergency grant funding for a generator.

The Calhoun County Park has been working toward providing internet to park visitors which would allow communication at that location, which is currently unavailable through cell phone providers. Donnie Pitts has been working with Melissa O’Brien, External Affairs Manager for Citynet as well as Adam Mills to determine the best method of installation. The matter was tabled until further research is complete.

Pitts also informed the Commission that at the current kitchen appliances in the park barn are no longer safe to operate and in need of replacement. Suggestions were made to consider the appliances at the Annamoriah Army Reserved Center as well as those that will be replaced within the next six months during the Minnie Hamilton Health Systems renovations. Donnie Pitts said that the park would be willing to consider any of those to replace what they have. It was also mentioned that the West Fork Park is in need of new appliances and should be considered among the donations.

Commissioner Lupardus made a motion for the Commission to provide \$2,000 to pay for the trout stocking of Calhoun County Park for the youth fishing day. The motion was approved by all commissioners.

With the upcoming election, both the Democrat and Republican parties were to appoint Ballot Commissioners. The Democratic Party appointed Melissa Hixon, and the Republican Party appointed Mason Snider. The Commission approved both.

Under Resignations/Appointments to Boards and Authorities, Paula Carter and Hope Carter were appointed to the Calhoun County Park Board.

Craig Hickman was appointed to fill the open board position of the Pleasant Hill PSD which expires June 30, 2031.

The Commission approved the hiring of a Tax Deputy for Sheriff Graham Knight’s office. Megan Bopp was hired at \$15.00 an hour.

County Administrator, Jennifer Randolph wrote and received a REAP Grant for \$80,174. The grant will pay for a fork lift, garage doors and a surveillance camera for the Cabot Recycling Center on Route 5 West.

The *Ridgeview News* questioned if this grant was a separate grant application or did it compete with funding also recently applied for by the Cabot Recycling Center Director, Lisa Cooper. Administrator Randolph replied that the two funding requests were entirely separate, Cabot Recycling had applied for \$150,000 and received a partial grant but did lose \$25,000 in salary funding. The Commission applied for \$100,000 and were awarded the \$80,174. Neither effected the outcome of the other.

The Commission went into executive session for the discussion of legal matters. They returned with no action taken during that time.

Commissioner Lupardis requested that the Commission budget \$1,200 for marketing of Calhoun County events, then later rescinded the request and requested \$5,000 be budgeted by the Commission for Marketing. The matter was approved by all three Commissioners and will focus on Way Point Zero, the adventure travel camp ground that will open June 6th, as well as Festivals and other local events.

# Calhoun County Hunters Harvest 13 Black Bears in 2025

Hunters in Calhoun County harvested a total of 13 black bears during the 2025 archery and firearms seasons, according to the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources (WVDNR). The harvest included 2 bears taken with bows or crossbows, 1 bear during the September-October gun season, 9 bears during the buck gun season, and 1 bear during the December firearms season.

Other nearby counties also reported their harvest numbers for 2025:

**Clay County:** 42 bears (4 bow/crossbow, 5 September-October gun, 4 buck gun, 29 December firearms)

**Roane County:** 13 bears (5 bow/crossbow, 0 September-October gun, 8 buck gun, 0 December firearms)

**Wirt County:** 12 bears (4 bow/crossbow, 0 September-October gun, 6 buck gun, 2 December firearms)

**Ritchie County:** 12 bears (1 bow/crossbow, 1 September-October gun, 6 buck gun, 4 December firearms)

**Gilmer County:** 25 bears (5 bow/crossbow, 4 September-October gun, 8 buck gun, 8 December firearms)

**Braxton County:** 60 bears (12 bow/crossbow, 5 September-October gun, 8 buck gun, 35 December firearms)

Statewide, hunters harvested a total of **2,469 black bears** during the 2025 seasons, with firearms accounting for the majority of the harvest. The top five counties for bear harvests were:

**Webster County:** 146 bears

**Randolph County:** 145 bears

**Pocahontas County:** 115 bears



**Boone County:** 196 bears

**Kanawha County:** 163 bears

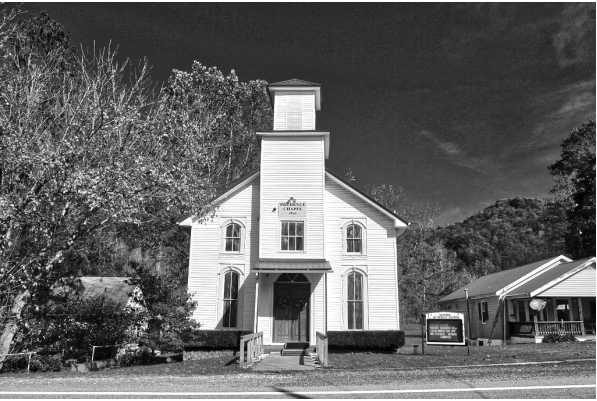

Minutes for the December 8, 2025, Special Joint Operations and Maintenance Meeting of the Mount Zion PSD

A special meeting of the Board of the Mount Zion Public Service District was held on Monday, December 8, 2025, at 6 PM at the county courthouse. The President and Secretary being present, the meeting was called to order at 6:15 PM and, per the special rules previously adopted, presided over by Hon. Comm’r Craig Arthur, President of the County Commission.

Initially the Town of Grantsville lacked a quorum of Town Counsellors. Proceedings were delayed until a third Town Counsellor could join the meeting by way of telephone.

Mr. Brian Arthur was interviewed second. He presented his credentials and answered a series of questions from all three entities. Mr. Arthur subsequently laid out his terms of employment: a \$90,000/year salary, medical insurance for himself and his family, and a continuation of his state retirement in the new position.

Mr. White moved that we enter executive session at 7:14 to discuss personnel matters. Mr. Trenten Cunningham of Pleasant Hill seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously viva voce.

At 7:22, the executive session was ended.

Mr. White moved that we accept the two resumes as nominations for the position of General Manager.

Mr. Tony Arthur of Pleasant Hill seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously viva voce.

Mr. White moved that nominations be closed and the means of selection be written ballot. Mrs. Hughes seconded. Motion carried unanimously viva voce.

## Mollohan shaped Calhoun and Calhoun shaped Mollohan

Robert Homer Mollohan, born on September 18, 1909, in Grantsville, West Virginia, was deeply rooted in the history and politics of Calhoun County. His family lineage and upbringing in the region played a significant role in shaping his political career and legacy.



Mollohan was the son of Robert Perry Mollohan and Edith Witte Mollohan. His father, Robert Perry, moved to Grantsville in 1908 and became a prominent figure in the community. He operated a store and was appointed Deputy Assessor by Robert J. Knotts in 1910. At the age of 21, Robert Perry became the youngest Justice of the Peace elected in West Virginia. He later served as the Calhoun County Clerk from 1939 until his death in 1946. Robert Homer’s brother, Ernest Mollohan, also contributed to the community by operating the Calhoun Super Service and serving as the President of the first Calhoun Board of Education.

The Mollohan family’s history in Calhoun County dates back over 150 years. Robert Homer’s grandfather, Perry Mollohan, was a farmer and co-founder of the first general store on the West Fork with R.J. Chenoweth. His great-grandfather, Nathan Mollohan, was an early settler in Washington Township, owning 5,000

acres in the West Fork region. Over the years, the Mollohan family intermarried with other prominent Calhoun families, including the Ellison, Boone, Shock, Huffman, Hamrick, Duffield, Knotts, Boggs, Westfall, Hamilton, Witte, Jarvis, Stump, and Vanhorn families. These connections helped establish the Mollohan family as a significant force in Calhoun politics.



Robert Homer Mollohan’s political journey began in Grantsville, where he demonstrated a natural flair for politics at a young age. He started ringing doorbells to rally votes and became a Precinct Captain at just 23 years old. His early political involvement laid the foundation for a career in public service. Mollohan married Helen Holt of Gilmer County, further strengthening his ties to the region.

Mollohan’s career included various roles that showcased his commitment to public service. He worked for the Internal Revenue Service from 1933 to 1938 and served as District Manager for the Works Progress Administration (WPA) from 1939 to 1940. During his tenure as WPA Administrator, he oversaw the planning of the current Calhoun jail and courthouse. He also served as Superintendent of the Industrial School for Boys at Pruntytown from 1941 to 1948, where he worked to improve the lives of young boys in the region.

Mollohan’s political career reached its peak when he was elected to the

U.S. House of Representatives for West Virginia’s 1st congressional district in 1953. He served nine terms in Congress, interrupted only by an unsuccessful bid for governor in 1956. Despite setbacks, Mollohan remained a prominent figure in West Virginia politics, known for his ability to secure funding for local projects and his dedication to his constituents.

The 1956 West Virginia gubernatorial election took place on November 6, 1956, marking a significant political shift in the state. Republican Cecil H. Underwood defeated Mollohan, becoming the first Republican governor elected in West Virginia since 1928. Underwood, who had just turned 34 years old a day before the election, became one of the youngest governors in U.S. history. He won the election with 440,502 votes (53.88%) compared to Mollohan’s 377,131 votes (46.12%), securing a decisive victory with a margin of 63,371 votes.

Underwood’s campaign focused on reforming the state’s political system, which he believed was plagued by corruption. His first act as governor was to announce on television that all state employees were fired, aiming to dismantle the “machine” system. He later advocated for an organized civil service, a retirement pension system, and temporary employment relief for low-income families. Despite the ongoing national debate over educational desegregation following the Brown v. Board of Education decision, Underwood continued his Democratic predecessor’s efforts to desegregate West Virginia schools and supported civil rights legislation.

In Calhoun County, the race was particularly close. Mollohan narrowly won the county with 2,100 votes (51.05%), while Underwood received 2,014 votes (48.95%). The margin of victory for Mollohan in Calhoun County was just 86 votes (2.09%). Despite losing in Calhoun County, Underwood’s strong per-

formance in other counties secured his statewide victory.

Ironically Underwood too had ties to Calhoun as he married Hovah Hall, a native of the county.

Throughout his life, Mollohan maintained strong ties to Calhoun County and Grantsville. He frequently returned to connect with friends and express his gratitude for the support he received from the community. His legacy in Calhoun County is marked by his old-style political approach, where he prioritized helping people in need and building alliances within families and constituents. Mollohan’s contributions to the region, both as a politician and a businessman, left a lasting impact on the community he cherished.



Robert Homer Mollohan passed away on August 3, 1999, at the age of 89 in Fairmont, West Virginia. He was laid to rest at his wife’s family cemetery in Gilmer County, leaving behind a legacy of service, loyalty, and dedication to his roots in Calhoun County and Grantsville.
