

Warner Reminds Voters of Election Deadlines

November General Election is quickly approaching, and WV Secretary of State Mac Warner reminds registered of important election deadlines.

In-person early voting began on Wednesday, October 26. All 55 counties have at least one early voting location, and several counties have two or more. Voters can find a list and an interactive map of early voting locations, as well as sample ballots, at GoVoteWV.com.

Early voting is available all this week from Monday, October 31, until Saturday, November 5. There is no voting on Sundays. Weekday early voting hours are during business hours of each county, which can be found online at GoVoteWV.com, and weekend hours are from 9:00 am - 5:00 pm.

The deadline for eligible voters to apply for an absentee-by-mail ballot is November 2. Absentee applications must be received by the county clerk by the close of business on November 2. To view the eligibility requirements to vote absentee, visit GoVoteWV.

For voters who qualify for an emergency absentee ballot, the application runs from November 1 until noon on Election Day, November 8. Eligibility requirements for an emergency absentee ballot are different than absentee-by-mail ballot, and each county adopts different policies for emergency absentee voters. Voters encouraged to call their county clerk to check the local policies before applying.

State law requires an absentee ballot to be postmarked on or before November 8, or hand delivered to the county clerk's office by

the close of business on November 7, in order to be counted. Military and overseas voters' ballots are accepted until the start of canvass on November 14 regardless of postmark.

"There is plenty of time and opportunity for voters to participate in this election," Warner "We encourage voters to make a plan and educate themselves on the candidates and ballot issues before they vote. All of that information can be found at GoVoteWV.com."

Voters are reminded that they review campaign finance reports for all statewide, legislative, and judicial candidates, well as political committees, electioneering communications, independent expenditures reports, which are available online at cfrs. wvsos.gov. County and local candidates file with the county clerk or the municipality, and reports are available upon request. The last campaign finance report before the 2022 General Election is due by midnight tonight, Friday, October 28.

Finally, Warner reminds candidates, committees, voters, poll workers, and all citizens that election fraud, intimidation, or coercion will not be tolerated in any form or fashion.

"Those who attempt to cheat in any way will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law," Warner said. "Our Election Fraud Task Force, our team of professional investigators, and our Election Day workers will be in every county across the state on Election Day."

In the 1940's, in a far corner of Clay County, West Virginia, in the small settlement of Bomont, and up in a holler, seven young brothers answered the call to fight

youngest, they willingly and bravely chose to leave the family farm. Their names were Hubert, Berlie, Harry, Forest, Frear, Paul, and Fenton Samples.

We, the children and grandchildren, are in awe and so proud of these valiant brothers. They were so young... approximately the ages of what our own grandchildren are

Six of the brothers returned safely. The youngest, Fenton, perished in 1944 when one of our own ships collided with his ship, the battleship USS California (BB-44). Such an unnecessary accident.

The 40's were difficult for everyone in Clay County (and America!). At this time, their father (my grandfather), Howard Samples contacted tuberculosis and entered a sanitarium at Beckley. In early 1943, on the day before leaving San Francisco with the 33rd Infantry Division for the Philippines, my father, Frear Samples, was recalled home to help the family who remained on the farm -- my grandmother and her daughter, Reba. We all wish now we had quizzed our parents about their lives during those worrisome days. How did they manage?

Even though only three brothers graduated from Clay County High School, they went on to have successful occupations. Thankfully, all sons met wonderful women during those war years, married and had beautiful families. We (the 19 children of these brothers and their sister, Reba Samples Engle) love our Samples Holler heritage and our beautiful family cemetery. And we still gather together every other year to have our family reunion which began in 1951, and to visit the cemetery!

We are so thankful to our grandparents, Howard and Ethel Samples, who passed on family values, the love of God, family and country to all of us.

Note: Up in this same Hiram Samples Holler was one other family that sent their sons off to war: Roscoe Samples family, which included sons: Warner Samples, US Army; Buck (Denver) Samples, US Army; and Roscoe, Jr. Samples, US Navy.

One small little section of Clay County... ten young men signed up to protect and defend America. West Virginia alone suffered 5,830 killed in action, while Clay County had 49 lost in the war. So many heartbroken families.

Protecting Your Vote: When Officials Follow the Law, Election Confidence Ensues

Midterm elections are upon us. The US Constitution, first ratified in 1787, prescribed means by which we choose our leadership. On November 8th, this 235-year tradition continues and West Virginians will cast votes for fellow citizens to represent us at the local, state, and federal levels of government.

Article 1, Section 4 of the US Constitution expressly designates state legislatures as responsible for providing the time, place and manner of holding elections. Our Founding Fathers felt state legislatures – as opposed to governors, judges, attorneys general, or secretaries of state – were best situated to set the rules for holding elections. Thus, when a state legislature writes election laws, it is incumbent on officials to strictly adhere to such laws.

Here in West Virginia (WV), our Legislature has struck an appropriate balance between access to voting and security in the process. For example, eligible voters are allowed to vote absentee by mail provided they meet one of the many reasons the legislature authorizes for voting by mail. Similarly, WV has a voter ID requirement, but there are nearly 20 types of acceptable photo and non-photo identifications, along with several exceptions that make secure voting quite easy.

The checks and balances in place in WV – along with election officials following the law - have led to high voter confidence in our elections. In fact, MIT ranked WV in the top 10 states in voter confidence after the 2020 election. States whose voters have low confidence in election integrity have also found themselves in courts recently addressing procedures that are inconsistent with their state's election laws and rules. Several states have started to legally address the veering away of state law following the 2020 election.

The Wisconsin Supreme Court has now declared the use of drop boxes, as used in the 2020 election, to be unlawful without the Legislature's approval. In Pennsylvania, the General Assembly has laws in place restricting the acceptance of absentee ballots received after an election without a postmark. This law has been challenged and left in place by a very recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling and by the State

Supreme Court, but state election officials are still acting in contravention of those rulings. Specifically, the Acting Pennsylvania Secretary of State has given guidance that such ballots shall be counted. One can see the confusion

and resulting lack of confidence in such a situation. Fortunately, clerks in WV have adhered to state law. Nevertheless, as the Chief Election Officer, I continue to implore county commissions and boards of canvassers to closely follow state law when counting votes. Absentee ballot envelopes must be signed and dated, voters' addresses must match voter registration records, and ballots must arrive on time. At the polls, voters must vote in the proper precinct and they must show identification. When everyone follows election laws, confidence grows in both the election results and the people we elect.

We should be concerned with any potential fraud. I'm bothered when I hear people remark, "Well, there wasn't enough fraud to change the outcome of the election." The remark insinuates that we can tolerate some fraud, or that irregularities are acceptable. In West Virginia's 2022 Primary Election, 23 races were decided by 10 votes or less. No amount of fraud or changing rules at the last minute is acceptable.

This commentary is to issue one final recommendation for every voter to know their rights, and to recognize the extent to which state and local election officials go to uphold laws made by the legislature. Anyone who has concerns regarding their eligibility to cast a ballot—whether in person or absentee by mail—should contact their county clerk immediately. Every vote does count, but only properly cast ballots can be counted.

I wish every voter a great experience with voting this election. And I wish every candidate, their families, and their campaigns the very best on Election Day as I know they have invested a lot of time, work, and financial re-

Making Time For The Important Things



Do you respect the Scripture? Most conservative Christians would confess the Bible's inerrancy and infallibility. While fewer and fewer would acknowledge its sufficiency, probably everyone who says they are a Christian would say they respect the Bible. When you respect something, you highly regard it

and esteem it with reverence. Some people won't mark the Bible's pages with pen or highlighter. then go back in time and kill Adolf Hitler.







Annual Open Enrollment for health insurance begins

New rules have greatly expanded who can qualify

The Affordable Care Act's annual Open Enrollment period is here, and new rules have made the program stronger than ever. Last year, a record number of people enrolled in healthcare coverage through the Marketplace. In West Virginia, more than 9 in 10 people that got their insurance on the Marketplace were eligible for a monthly subsidy that helps them pay for the plan they selected. New rules for this year's Open Enrollment have strengthened the program even more so that thousands of families in WV will likely qualify to get coverage as well. Open Enrollment began on November 1, 2022 and will run until January 15, 2023.

Recently, the U.S Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) released a record amount of grant funding to organizations that provide free help to consumers requiring health coverage enrollment assistance.

In West Virginia, First Services Choice awarded \$1,050,000 to continue and expand their WV Navigator program. The program provides free assistance to people finding and selecting health care options through the Marketplace, Medicaid and CHIP. They can assist with enrollment applications and help consumers apply for financial assistance through Health-Care.gov. WV Navigator can assist people over the phone or in their offices in Charleston, Martinsburg, Fairmont, and Huntington. In addition, enrollment events will be held in around the state so that people can walk in and receive assistance without an appointment

"Most people will be able to qualify for substantially lower costs this year if they get their insurance on the Marketplace," said Jeremy Smith, program director for WV Navigator. "We are really urging people to look at the new

plans and prices that are being released this year. In a lot of cases, the plans are more affordable than we have ever seen. Even if you have looked into insurance on the Marketplace in past years and were not very happy, you should definitely look into it again this year." Smith says getting help signing up is important, as many people are overwhelmed by the options or may not realize how to shop for affordable health coverage.

Consumers who come back to the Health Insurance Marketplace this year can expect to see some very important updates and expansions. New rules will expand eligibility to those that had previously been blocked from getting the coverage because they had an unaffordable offer of insurance through an employer. This fix to the "Family Glitch" will expand eligibility to thousands of families. Additionally, the signing of the Inflation Reduction

Act secured enhanced subsidies and locked in lower prices for Marketplace plans for three more years. It also kept in place that higher income earners can continue to enroll in subsidized coverage as

It is important that West Virginians pay attention to Open Enrollment deadlines. For January 1 coverage, sign up must be completed by December 15. Open Enrollment will completely end on January 15. People who already have a plan and need to re-enroll are encouraged to double-check the network and prescription drug coverage for any changes, and to update their information in case they qualify for any additional cost-savings. Gov. Justice announces over \$1.2M in Justice Assistance Grant awards

Gov. Jim Justice announced last week that he has awarded \$1,204,534 in Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) program funds to thirty-nine (39) projects statewide. These funds will be used to assist state agencies, local units of government, and private non-profit agencies in carrying out specific programs that offer a high probability of improving the functioning of the criminal justice

Special emphasis was placed on multi-jurisdictional projects and statewide projects that seek to create and/or retain jobs in the criminal justice system in West Virginia.

"These grant funds will open up more possibilities for the incredible men and women working in our justice system," Gov. Justice said. "I'm incredibly proud to award this funding. I've always said we always need to do everything in our power to help make our criminal justice system better and better, and that's exactly what this funding does."

These funds are provided by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance and are administered by the Justice and Community Services (JCS) Section of the West Virginia Division of Administrative Services (DAS).

Area projects include: Clay County Commission \$25,000. These funds will provide one or more uniformed officers to act as a mentor, role model, and advocate for students at Clay County schools. 




