The logs should be stored in a dark, moist location out of sunlight. The spawn will grow in the logs throughout the winter, and in spring, we'll hopefully see white mycelium on the log ends. A flush of mushrooms can be encouraged by soaking the $\log$ for 8-12 hours to replicate typhoon conditions, and within 10 days, there will be the fruiting bodies of shiitake mushrooms.

## Report: Continuous Eligibility for Medicaid, CHIP Benefits WV Kids

Despite economic uncertainty of the pandemic, the number of West Virginia kids with health cov erage remained roughly the same between 2019 and 2021, according to a new report.
The Georgetown University Center for Children and Families report finds the number of uninsured kids nationwide dropped by $5 \%$ in the last three years.
In West Virginia, Julianne Yacovone - director of child health with West Virginians for Affordable Healthcare - said the number of kids statewide with no health insurance has kept steady, a around 13,000.
She said the state's 12 month continuous eligibility for Medicaid and CHIP has kept more kids and their caregivers healthy
"We have seen," said Yacovone, "that when parents go in for those necessary appointments, and parents are getting the care, the prescription they parents are getting the care, the prescription " She added that children in low-earning familie were more likely to gain coverage due to pandem ic-era polices, noting households of three making under $\$ 55,000$ a year saw the largest gains. under has had the second-lowest median household in come among the states.

Yacovone added that rates for flu and RespiraYacovone added that rates for flu and Respira-
tory Syncytial Virus - RSV - across the state have climbed high enough to temporarily shut down schools.
She said
She said she believes more families have been able to receive flu shots and other medical care this fall without worrying about their health insurance lapsing.
"I could only imagine," said Yacovone, "how much higher our rates of flu and hospitalizations for flu would be if people didn't have access to that coverage that ensured that they got those vaccinations.'
Executive Director of Georgetown University's Center for Children and Families Joan Alker explained that while West Virginia families benefit from continuous coverage, states that haven't implemented similar protections will likely see a spike in uninsured kids in 2023
"This continuous coverage protection is likely to expire early next year," said Alker. "And we have estimated that the child uninsured rate is very possibly going to double when that happens, which is a very scary thought.
Seventeen states and the District of Columbia currently do not have continuous eligibility for kids covered through Medicaid or CHIP.

## Love Not the World

One thing is certain in the Scriptures, Christians are not to love the world (1 John 2:15-17). But what does that mean? I know what the words mean, but what did John
mean? We could do a word study mean? We could do a word study and look up the definition, but that
doesn't help us because the word doesn't help us because the word
world is broad in its meaning and has many definitions. We could has many definitions. We could look at the original Greek, but since we aren't original Greeks that doesn't help (not to mention the
Greek word is as broad as the EnGreek word is as broad as the English). How are we going to figure this out? It's vitally important since John tells us this is a distinguishing characteristic of a child of God. We can start by looking at how John uses the word in other places. If we narrow the usage to First John, we find 14 instances where he mentions "world" and one more in second John. Looking at the context, you could divide the usage into three categories of meaning

- the people, the system, and the place. "World" refers to the earth and all the possessions in it. It's also used to describe the worldview derived from human nature apart from God. Human nature is wicked, and the "world" is the way of the people who live in it, and that
brings us to the last usage, the peobrings us to the last usage, the peo-
ple. Sometimes it refers to all the ple. Sometimes it refers to all the
people on Earth and other times, people on Earth and other times, a subset of people. It's easy to say "world means world" until you consider that Jesus is the Saviour of the
world (1 John 4.14) but the sam world ( 1 John 4:14) but the same world hates Christ and his people (1 John 3:13). So it's as broad or narrow as the author intends it to be, and we must rely on the surrounding context to determine who or what is being referred to
Now that we have identified the possibilities, let's consider the text. "Love not the world," cannot be referring to people. Jesus tells us that we are to love fellow Christians, and
also to love our enemies who are not. That pretty much covers everyone. What is John telling us not to
love? I believe the love of the world Iove? I believe the love of the world
is a misplaced love of things in the is a misplaced love of things in the world that centers on the worldview full of the luved heart. The world is full of the lust of the flesh and the eyes and the pride of life. When a person loves the world and lives
for the things in the world, their for the things in the world, their affections are out of order. Rather than enjoying the blessings of God, loving the world makes the gift the supreme desire. It's idolatry, loving the created more than the Creator and loving self more than others. It's a world without God and the Lord Jesus Christ making the creation the object of our worship and affections, with lust and pride being primary motivations. The love of the world is contrary to the love of the Father and is proof that God's love doesn't reside in the heart
