Lizemore Lions Making Music

On a recent warm afternoon, Levi Hughes, a fifth grader at Lizemore Elementary School, used rocks to keep his sheet music from blowing away on a March breeze. Levi was joined by his classmates as they scattered around the spacious playground to practice playing "Amazing Grace."

The students were playing a new type of recorder made by the Nuvo company. According to 5th grade teacher Stephanie Gauding, the recorders are easier to play than a traditional recorder.

"Instead of the musician covering an air hole with their fingers, the recorders have silicone keys which the students depress to play individual notes. The instruments also have an adjustable thumb rest to fit different sized hands. There is a lot less squeaking with the Nuvo recorder and they are much easier to play," said Gauding.

The fifth graders are practicing several songs and will eventually use them in their graduation ceremony.

Gauding noted that the recorders are more costly than

plastic recorders. "The music lessons are incorporated in our attendance incentive program, so we were able to get some financial support from the Communities In Schools program."

Attorney General Morrisey Sues Alleged Unlicensed 'Contractor'

West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey has filed suit against a Charleston man who allegedly performed home improvement projects for consumers in Kanawha County without a license.

So far, one complainant was listed in the lawsuit against Larry Morehead, but the Attorney General said in court papers he "has reason to believe many more consumers fell victim to the Defendant's unlawful conduct." The complaint alleges Morehead failed to complete work on her roof.

"This lawsuit should serve as a warning to others who are tempted to conduct their business in West Virginia without a license and defraud their customers," Attorney General Morrisey said. "Our office will vigorously investigate, and if necessary litigate, any violation of the state's consumer protection laws."

The Attorney General is asking the Circuit Court of Kanawha County to bar Morehead from engaging in home improvement or contracting services unless and until he is properly licensed.

According to the lawsuit, Morehead had been doing business as L&M Construction since December 2020.

WVDOT Sec. Jimmy Wriston lays out pothole repair blitz plan



West Virginia Division of Highways (WVDOH) is committed to patching every pothole in the state by Memorial Day as part of an aggressive spring repair blitz.

WVDOH maintenance crews in nearly two dozen counties across more than half of the WVDOH districts have already taken advantage of a few asphalt plants opening early to get a jump start on patching potholes.

"We're seeing the benefit of doing that (patching) at this time of the year," said West Virginia Transportation Secretary Jimmy Wriston, P.E. during Gov. Jim Justice's administration update on Wednesday, March

"We attack them now and we can reduce claims, we

can get this part of the work done before that hot August weather comes and we're not out there sweating to patch these potholes."

WVDOH maintenance crews can't make permanent hot asphalt repairs during the winter, when temperatures are often under 40 degrees Fahrenheit. Temperatures have to be 40 degrees or above for hot asphalt to stick properly.

Cold weather means that most asphalt plants don't open until early April. But a few plants around the state opened earlier based on a mild end to winter.

Pothole milling and filling is just one part of a multifaceted plan to keep West Virginia's roads in the best condition possible. WVDOH has a dedicated core maintenance plan that includes keeping ditches clear to stop water from pooling beside roadways, cutting trees and branches that overhang roads to allow sunlight to dry wet roads, and proper pothole filling – milling out a nice square hole, removing all dirt and debris, putting down a sticky layer of tack to make asphalt stick better, and rolling out new, hot asphalt.

A proper patch on a pot-

A proper patch on a pothole will last for years, meaning there will be fewer potholes to patch next year and the years thereafter.

"We're going to have a great year paving," said Wriston. "We're going to do a lot of bridge work. We're going to have another banner year in West Virginia with infrastructure."



But being famous for being famous is a new thing. Once upon a time, fame and notoriety came because you accomplished something that drew people's attention. Whether a great heroic deed or an infamous act of cowardice, you were known for something you did that was out of the ordinary. Now, you can make a silly YouTube video that gets shared around, and suddenly, you are having dinner with the President of the United States. Greta Thunburg skipped school to protest the weather, and suddenly, she has been bestowed an honorary doctorate and gallivants about lecturing world leaders. 

March 29, 1834: Henry Mason Mathews, the fifth governor of West Virginia, was born at Frankford, Greenbrier County. There were strikes and riots during much of his administration, including the national railroad strike of 1877, which began at Martinsburg.

March 29, 1858: Clay County was created from parts of Nicholas and Braxton counties named for Henry Clay, the U.S. senator from Kentucky.

March 30, 1837: The Virginia legislature granted a charter to establish a private academy at West Liberty, in Ohio County. The first class of 65 students met in the home of the Rev. Nathan Shotwell in 1838. The school is now known as West Liberty State University.

March 30, 1926: Ac-

March 31, 1919: Governor John Jacob Cornwell signed legislation that created the West Virginia State Police. He appointed Jackson Arnold, grandnephew of Gen. Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson and former executive officer of the 1st West Virginia Infantry, as first superintendent.



April 1, 1884: Nurse Florence Aby Blanchfield was born in Shepherdstown. She served in the Army Nurse Corps during World War I, oversaw expansion of the corps from 1,000 to 57,000 during World War II, and became the first woman to hold a permanent commission in the regular army.

April 1, 1934: A sales tax went into effect in West Virginia for the first time. The two-percent tax helped fill the revenue void caused by the drop in

property values during the Great Depression.

April 2, 1900: Marlinton, the county seat of Pocahontas County, was incorporated. The town is generally considered to be the location of the first white settlement in the Greenbrier Valley.

April 3, 1755: Frontier scout and "long hunter" Simon Kenton was born in Fauquier County, Virginia. Upon leaving home, Kenton first traveled north through present West Virginia to Pittsburgh and then explored, hunted and trapped through much of the Ohio Valley.

April 3, 1908: Samuel Starks died in Charleston. Starks was the first African-American in the United States to serve as a state librarian when he was appointed to the position in 1901 by Governor Albert B. White.



Widen Relief Committee met at the offices of Elk River Coal & Lumber Company on Friday, February 22, with Lanty Facemire, Ernie Acree, Doyle Waggoner, Lloyd Btucher, Jr., Joe Truman and Harold Dawson representing the employees and H. L. Beattie, G. D. Craft and R. G. Elliott representing the employer.

There was no change in the list of 29 retired men previously approved for monthly pension.

On the disability list, 11 men received assistance for the entire month and 4 others for a part of the month. Hubert Butler, Bert Hickman and Levy Friend returned to work during February, and J. B. Holcomb was the only new applicant still off duty at the end of the month.

There was one new addition to the list of survivors of deceased employees. Ruby Rogers, widow of Carl Rogers, who died Febraury 20, and their five small children. are receiving relief benefits in accordance with the labor agreement in effect at Widen.

In addition to the regular list account at Charleston General Hospital, bills for eligible employees were paid at Charleston, Clay, Clendenin, Cowen, Craigsville, Dunbar, Gassaway, Marmet, Philippi, Richwood, Summersville, Sutton, and Weston, W. Va., and Akron, Ohio; West Salem, Ohio; Fountain City, Tenn.; and Washington, D. C. Because of the great length to which the monthy hospital list has grown, the list of names will not be published and eligible employees who submitted bills for action of the relief committee should consider those bills paid in due course unless the individual emhas been notified otherployee wise. With only one exception, the presented at the February meeting were paid. The exception was the case of an employee whose baby was born less than ten months after the employee went to work at Widen and was not covered according to the ruling of the Relief Committee on November 22, 1955, when the ten-month rule went into effect.

ployment at Widen is terminated for any reason whatsoever will be allowed thirty days after the date of his last work to submit any relief claims he may have. Any bills or other matters submitted after thirty days will be rejected with-out consideration by the Commit-




