Clay County boys run the 5th Annual Canaan Valley race

It is getting that time of the year when distance races and endurance racing becomes the norm for a lot of people, people who for one reason or another find themselves gripped with staying in shape or just trying to live out their life with a bucket list. The idea of running a half marathon, 10K or a 5K race is not like diving into an apple Bundt cake swimming in melted ice cream; it's more like diving into the unknown world a person only dreams of reaching. Running takes grit, lungs, strength and a desire to be more than just a gas pusher. To each his own, it's said, and for many in Clay County, racing is a lifestyle - whether it's on two legs running over mountains and obstacles or in a seat pushing 90 over a mud caked trail. Some go for air on a tricked out mountain bike or mash the fuel on a humped up big bore bass boat trying to be the first to the best fishing hole. Even couch potatoes race when the dinner bell is hammered. To be the first spoon in the mashed taters and scoop out the pool of melted cow butter is a race worth winning.

It's in everybody's blood to race, but for some it is more. This time of year not only do you have a chance at running for miles but also running in a marathon, Tough Mudder, Spartan or Savage Races from now until fall. Now there are some races that leave a person scratching their heads. Why would anybody put themselves in a position that they would not only have to run for miles but subject themselves to obstacles that have you diving and crawling through muddy water that a catfish wouldn't live in? The only answer I get is, "It's the challenge," or "It's for the fun." Racing has been a thing since time began; who could forget the run Daniel Boone had from Ohio to Kentucky? An endurance run of a little over 160 miles through dense forest and with Indians on his six; he made the run in three days to warn the fort of an up and coming attack. It was truly a race against time.

The 5th annual Canaan Valley half marathon took place this past weekend with people coming from all over to take part in the event. Local runner Geoff Hamrick and Pulmonologist Dr. Lucas Hamrick were among those that participated. The day was cold, and the wind made it colder. Dark clouds loomed on the horizon and left a person wondering if it would snow or rain. Runners hugged themselves as if that was a barrier to the freezing temperatures as they stood in shorts and running shirts. The starting gun sounded, and the runners took off as the half marathon began. Fifteen minutes later, the gun sounded for the 10K and then again for the 5K. Soon the clouds opened up, and the time for runners to get their butts in gear was upon them. The wind came like a tornado and blew most of the vendors' goods hither and yon, and the finish line tunnel was so active it nearly tossed people into the air as they tried to take it down before it became part of the landscape. On the trail, the runners were pasted with pea size hail and a steady combination of heavy rain and 30 mph wind; it was a

perfect day for a race. It was a race they will talk about over a hot cup of coffee for years, once they get over being sick and sore and the chill in their bones finally warms up. When the 13 miles was over and the sun was trying to fight through the clouds, Geoff Hamrick placed 20th in a field of over 150 and was 1st in his age division. Lucas Hamrick ran the 10K and had a personal best time in the six mile race. Both will run again in a June Savage Race with obstacles and welcome any other Clay County runners to join them. Again, racing is in the blood of every human being on this planet, and it's time to get out and give it a try if not just to say you did it. Gov. Justice issues proclamation banning outdoor burning

To reduce the risk of catastrophic wildfires due to drought, Gov. Jim Justice has issued a proclamation that bans all outdoor burning throughout West Virginia, effective, April 17, 2023.

The ban, which is necessary due to dry and windy weather conditions expected in the coming days and an increasing potential for forest fires. will be in effect until conditions improve and the Governor rescinds the order by further proclamation.

This week, the National Weather Service - Charleston issued a Special Weather Statement for High Fire Danger Threat. The Governor's order makes it unlawful for any person in the state to engage in outdoor burning, including fires built for camping, the burning of debris, or warming.

The following items are excluded from the restric-

Fires for the purpose of chemical production, where fire is essential to operation.

Fires for commercial land-clearing, such as mining, highway construction, and development: Provided, that a permit is obtained from the Division of Forestry prior to burning.

Training fires conducted under the direct control and supervision of qualified instructors at a training facility operated by a fire department or government entity: Provided, that a permit for such training fires is obtained from the Division of Forestry prior to burning.

Fires for outdoor cooking conducted for fund-raising events and charitable organizations: Provided, that a water source capable of extinguishing the fire must be present and a permit is obtained from the Division of Forestry prior to the operation.

Liquid fueled gas grills, lanterns or liquid-fueled gas fire stoves.

The Governor has instructed the Division of Forestry to enact a forest fire readiness plan and to enforce the ban on burning as outlined in W.Va. Code §20-1-1, et seq.

"This year, we have experienced a significant period of low humidity and below average rainfall," Acting West Virginia Division of Forestry Director and State Forester Tony Evans said.

"Since January 1, we have experienced 654 different fires in the state, and a current total of 4,121 acres burned. This ban helps ensure we are doing everything we can to protect the public, our forests, and private property from the damage that can occur from a forest fire."

The proclamation orders the Division of Forestry and the Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management to provide continuous information to the Governor and the public regarding forest conditions.

Additionally, the proclamation orders the Division of Natural Resources, the Office of the State Fire Marshal, the Department of Homeland Security, and the State Police to cooperate in the enforcement of this ban.



Church Confidence

Tadamichi Kuribayashi commanded the Japanese army at Iwo Jima. He was a brilliant strategist, and his fortification of the island was so well conceived it was only matched by the grit of the US Marines who took it. The Samurai mindset had given the Japanese a feeling of superiority in battle. As Fred Hayes wrote in The Lions of Iwo Jima, "the mystical Japanese "fighting spirit" -- the mantra of the militarist who ran the Imperial General Staff in Tokyo, would compensate for Japan's deficiencies in logistics, its limited industrial production capacity, and its inferior armor and artillery." The Japanese believed they couldn't be defeated and the Samurai fighting spirit would overcome any obstacle. We know, of course, that wasn't the case. The US Marine Corps knew a thing or two about fighting spirit themselves.

Jesus promised in Matthew 16:18 that the gates of Hell would not prevail against the church. I have great confidence in the truth of this promise. For nearly 2,000 years, Satan has opposed the church of Christ from the inside and from without. Even in the Apostle's own day, men tried to infiltrate the church and corrupt its doctrine. But they did not prevail. Governments tried to outlaw or banish the preaching of Christ and His church, but they did not prevail. The kings of the earth raged and counseled together against the Lord to put an end to the body of Christ, but they did not prevail. I'm confident that the church will not fall because of

the character of the one who promised. Jesus has never failed. He has always kept His word, and there isn't anything surer or worthy of believing than the promise of the King of kings.

Unlike Imperial Japan, my confidence is not the spirit of the Christian to overcome but the Spirit in the Christian who preserves. Christ will keep His church, but not every local church will overcome. Many local bodies have fallen and will still yet fall. Some hold to a mystical promise of perpetuity while ignoring the imperative to persevere. Indeed, the church is the "pillar and ground of the truth," but the man of God is to "preach the word" and is to "study to show himself approved." Through the preaching of sound doctrine, the church is built up, and that's our defense against every wind of false doctrine. Christ calls us to stand for the truth and earnestly contend for the faith once delivered.

This promise gives the church of Jesus Christ the confidence in the battle and the strength to fight, but not overconfidence in ourselves. It encourages pastors to preach the word and rightly divide the Scriptures, knowing this is how God's people grow, the truth is passed on to the next generation, and the church is built up and edified. Don't presume on the Lord's mercies. Any local church is only one generation away from apostasy or shutting the doors for good, if we think we cannot fail simply because we believe we cannot fall.

West Virginia History

This Week in West Virginia History

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go toe-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.

April 26, 1816: General Alexander Welch Reynolds was born in Lewisburg. He served in both the U.S. and Confederate armies. After the war, Reynolds accepted a commission as a colonel in the forces of the khedive of Egypt, which ruled Egypt under the Ottoman Empire.

April 26, 1900: Baseball great Lewis Robert "Hack" Wilson, whose 1930 single season runs-batted-in record stands today, was born in Pennsylvania. He started his pro career with the Martinsburg Blue Sox. He returned to Martinsburg after his retirement and is buried at Rosedale Cemetery.

April 27, 1978: An accident at the Willow Island Power Station on the Ohio River killed 51 men. The scaffolding that had been erected for use in the construction of a new cooling tower collapsed, sending them plunging to the ground



April 28, 1884: Musician Henry Reed was born in Peterstown, Monroe County. Reed was a legendary West Virginia fiddler whose repertory contributed to the old-time music revival in the last half of the 20th century.



April 28, 1914: An explosion at the Eccles No. 5 mine in Raleigh County killed 174 men. The mine connected with Eccles No. 6, operating in another coal seam. Nine men in No. 6 died of injuries and of afterdamp, the deadly gas left after a mine explosion.

April 28, 1920: The Monongahela National Forest was created by presidential proclamation. It is the only national forest completely within the boundaries of West Vir-

April 28, 1924: An explosion ripped through the Benwood coal mine south of Wheeling, killing 119 miners.

April 28, 1948: Watt Powell Park opened in Charleston. About 8,000 people, including Governor Okey L. Patteson, attended the city's inaugural game in the Class A Central League. Watt Powell Park was replaced by what is now known as GoMart Ballpark after the 2004 season, and the old park was demolished in 2005.

April 29, 1863: Confederate General William E. "Grumble" Jones waged a battle at Fairmont that involved a force of 500 regulars, home guards and volunteers. The Confederates prevailed, burning the personal library of Francis Pierpont, governor of the Restored Government of Virginia, and exploding an iron railroad bridge across the Monongahela River.

April 30, 1871: Coach Fielding "Hurry-Up" Yost was born in Marion County. He was a tackle on West Virginia University's football team in 1895 and 1896, while earning a law degree. In 1901, Yost's first season as coach at University of Michigan, the Wolverines compiled an 11-0 record, including a 49-0 defeat of Stanford in the first Rose Bowl.



April 30, 1927: An explosion roared through the Federal No. 3 mine owned by New England Fuel and Transportation Company of Everettville, Monongalia County. The explosion, the subsequent fire, and gas in the mine killed 97 men.

May 1, 1788: Pendleton County was created from Rockingham, Augusta and Hardy counties. The county was named for Virginia statesman Edmund Pendleton (1721-1803).

May 1, 1930: Labor leader and child welfare activist Mother Jones celebrated her birthday in Maryland. Jones, who was 100 years old by her count, appeared before newsreel cameras to condemn the Prohibition Act "as a curse upon the nation" that violated her right to have a beer instead of water.

May 2, 1900: State founder Waitman Willey died in Morgantown. He is remembered for the Willey Amendment, which provided for the emancipation of slaves as a precondition for the creation of West Virginia.

May 2, 1925: Flying saucer investigator Gray Barker was born in Riffle, Braxton County. Barker became interested in unidentified flying objects in the 1950s after investigating sightings of the Flatwoods Monster.





On October 26, 2022, the Clay County Public Service District (CCPSD) filed Tariff Form 11 seeking increased rates for providing potable water under the process established by the Commission for small utilities. CCPSD also requested emergency interim rates.

On March 20, 2023, Staff recommended that the Commission increase CCPSD rates by 25.69 percent over the rates in effect before the filing of this proceeding or 17.91 percent over the interim rates. Staff noted a negative net income of \$41,066 at going level during the test year. West Virginia's foster care crisis: Lawyers representing children say new legislation falls short of fixing the system

New documents offer a rare opportunity to see inside settlement discussions and show why legislation passed this year falls far short of what lawyers suing the state seek to help fix West Virginia's foster care crisis.

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The out-of-state facilities with histories of child abuse. The unwillingness to match kids with the medical treatment they need. The placement of children in situations with high risk of sexual assault.

These are some of the many allegations brought by West Virginia foster children against the Department of Health and Human Resources, a massive state agency that runs the child welfare system. Lawyers representing the kids have been suing the agency for nearly four years, alleging DHHR repeatedly breaks state law and, in the process, endangers children.

"I think it's safe to say that West Virginia has one of the worst systems in the country for foster children," said Marcia Lowry, a lawyer on behalf of the kids and one who has litigated similar cases seeking systemic reforms in 10 other states.

In recent months, U.S. District Judge Thomas E. Johnston, who was presiding over the case, pushed to use pending legislation – largely the split of DHHR – to settle the case. After these efforts and closed-door meetings with lawmakers came to light, Johnston recused himself over concerns that his impartiality could be questioned. Ultimately, the settlement talks failed and the case remains ongoing.

Settlement talks are usually conducted behind closed doors and a lot of the documents are supposed to be kept confidential. However, because the Legislature was involved, Mountain State Spotlight obtained emails and letters between stakeholders in the case through a public records request.

One of those documents offers a rare opportunity to see inside settlement discussions and why the legislation that passed during this session falls far short of what lawyers representing the children are seeking to help fix West Virginia's foster care crisis. It could involve, they write, a settlement where the court enforces current laws, more data reporting from the agency, new legislation and additional funding.

Not all of these fixes fall to state lawmakers, but several do. And while legislators have touted some bills they say will address the foster care crisis, most of the proposals outlined as important by Lowry have not been implemented. She and local experts worry kids will continue to be put in high-risk situations.

Potential changes to current law

In a January letter to Johnston, the judge presid-

ing over the lawsuit at the time, Lowry listed action she believes is necessary to keep kids in the child welfare system safe. The most important action, she has said in interviews, is court-mandated oversight to make sure the state health department follows existing laws.

"The judicial branch is there to make sure that the laws are followed," Lowry said.

Despite that, her letter outlined steps West Virginia's Legislature could take in the 2023 session to improve the foster care system.

Some of Lowry's suggestions became law. State senators and delegates completed a bill to increase pay for and change the distribution of child protective services employees.

Lawmakers also passed a bill to clarify the role of the foster care ombudsman, an office tasked with investigating complaints in the system. And they touted their efforts to pass a major bill that split up DHHR into three separate agencies, which legislative leaders said was intended to fix long standing issues in the department, including the child welfare system.

"The fact that the Legislature now thinks it's better to divide it is fine, is good," Lowry said. "The Legislature, though, has not passed laws that say things have to be improved for children."

Some of those laws, as outlined in Lowry's letter, were provisions that foster kids receive medical screenings within three days of entering the child welfare system, that no one under the age of 10 be placed in a group living facility except in special circumstances and no one over that age be placed in a facility for more than a year.

A law clerk for Johnston sent Lowry's letter to an attorney for House Speaker Roger Hanshaw, R-Clay, and House Health and Human Resources Chair Amy Summers, R-Taylor. Both declined to be interviewed for this story.

In a February radio interview, Summers, the lead sponsor of the split bill, said separating DHHR into three agencies will allow each to focus on issues – such as the foster care crisis – that had previously been neglected. She said the agency split is the "first step of many" changes needed to improve the state's foster care system.

"We, the Legislature, are going to be required from this day forward to give this our utmost attention," Summers said. "Some of these programs have failed too many people and we've got to do better."

Court oversight is

the biggest ask Now that the settle-

ment talks have stalled, Lowry and the lawyers continue to litigate the case. They're pressing for court-ordered oversight that forces the health department to comply with its own rules and terms outlined in a potential settlement or ruling.

A February draft of

a settlement, one that DHHR's lawyers ultimately walked away from, would have required the health department give the ombudsman and lawyers representing the former foster children "all reasonable requests for additional data and information." DHHR

lawyers did not respond to requests for comments.

Marissa Sanders, a West Virginia foster care advocate and a foster adoptive parent, said that with currently available data she fears the severity of many problems remains unknown, like whether the state has enough foster parents for the number of children.

"We don't even know how to make things better for kids until we know what's happening," Sanders

Senate Bill 273, the child protective services worker pay law, also requires DHHR to post federal child welfare system indicators on its existing data dashboard. But it doesn't require the state to report the number of available foster parents, nor the number of foster parents willing to take in children with special circumstances like behavioral disabilities or

medical needs.

The key piece of oversight requested in Lowry's letter is an independent overseer, one she described as a "neutral fact-finding entity." That unit, through court-order, would be able to conduct random testing to make sure the health department was following

During the 2023 legislative session, lawmakers expanded the investigative powers and protected the autonomy of the foster care ombudsman. While January court transcripts indicate Johnston believed the ombudsman would address oversight of DHHR, Lowry's team said it falls short.

the settlement terms every six months.

"It doesn't feel like it has the teeth that we're looking for to actually hold them accountable," said Richard Walters, an attorney representing the children with Lowry. "And 10 years from now we'll be in the same boat."


