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Boggs Walking Trail Project Continues Development

In the last few years a special area has been developing in Clay County. Dr. Christine Jones realized the two acre level space adjacent to the Big Otter Clinic could be better utilized as a beautiful therapy area and walking trail with plants, benches, and a peaceful feeling for patients and the community. The first successful grant allowed for excavating, leveling, and graveling a path in the space.

The Braxton/Clay Master Gardener group became involved with the project and was able to successfully earn the "Outside Classroom Grant" from Elk Conservation District. Suzie Legg, Melissa Dennison, Christi Boggs, and Aine Slabaugh prepared the grant and were very excited when it was approved! The grant funds will be utilized to purchase plants, display signage to identify plants, and add American Disabilities Act signs for the walking trail.

The Braxton/Clay Master Gardener group entered the "Boggs Walking Trail Project" and won the WVU Extension Project of the Year Award, which includes grant funds for additional plants and signage. The Master Gardener group is memorializing past members for their

West Virginia is still figuring out exactly how it wants to improve broadband. A new report shows some early priorities

The 90-page draft report previews how officials plan to expand internet access and affordability in the Mountain State.

Accessing the internet is often a complicated issue in West Virginia, and the state historically ranks as one of the worst in the country for broadband. After years of failed internet promises, missed opportunities and funding struggles, state officials hope that a \$1.2 billion infusion of federal cash will finally help West Virginians connect.

As it prepares for that federal money, the state is starting to provide more clarity on the exact issues the cash might address. Earlier this month, the West Virginia Office of Broadband released a draft of its digital equity plan, explaining how various disadvantaged groups in the state struggle with internet access and the improvements that could make things easier. The 90-page report specifically focuses on the needs of these communities, and members of the public have been encouraged to submit feedback on the draft during a 30-day comment period that will end in late August. The state is also encouraging residents to fill out a broadband survey by the end of July, which will be used to better understand the types of issues people face with internet access and what improvements they want to see.

The digital equity plan will also likely be part of a larger five-year broadband expansion plan currently in the works. Both reports will be submitted to the federal government in the near future.

"This is a generational opportunity that comes around once in a lifetime, and we're going to utilize this money to its fullest extent," Mitch Carmichael, secretary of the state Department of Economic Development, told an audience at this week's West Virginia Broadband Summit.

Here's what you need to know about the state's newest broadband report, and what the draft plan reveals about West Virginia's internet priorities moving forward.

Plans for improving broadband are still under development — but some early priorities are becoming

Because the state is still very early in the planning process, much of the current draft report focuses on explaining the state's current problems rather than highlighting specific solutions. But the draft plan does offer some insight into what are likely early priorities for state officials seeking to better understand exactly what's

wrong with West Virginia's internet coverage.

For example, the report focuses heavily on how West



Aug. 9, 1916: A storm front from the northwest dumped nearly six inches of rain in less than five hours on the headwaters of Cabin Creek in eastern Kanawha County; 71 people died, and 900 homes were destroyed in the

Aug. 9, 1954: Don Chafin died in Huntington. As sheriff of Logan County, Chafin was a bitter foe of union organizers and, with financial support from coal companies, used his many deputies to keep labor organizers out of the county.


Aug. 10, 1920: General Frank Kendall "Pete" Everest Jr. was born in Fairmont. Everest was a military aviator and a pioneer in U.S. rocket plane flying. In 1956, he flew the X-2 at Mach 3, exceeding 1,900 miles per hour and breaking the record of Chuck Yeager, his rival and close contemporary.

Aug. 11, 1844: Emanuel Willis Wilson was born at Harpers Ferry. He served as the seventh governor of West Virginia from 1885 to 1890.

Aug. 11, 1994: The Canaan Valley National Wildlife Refuge became the 500th refuge in the National Wildlife Refuge system. It is one of the largest and most diverse freshwater wetland areas in central and southern Appalachia.

Aug. 12, 1937: Author Walter Dean Myers was born in Martinsburg. In January 2012, Myers was named the National Ambassador for Young People's Literature by the Library of Congress. He died in 2014.

Aug. 12, 1997: The Wheeling-Pittsburgh Steel strike ended when 79 percent of the workers approved a new contract. The 10-month walkout was the longest steel manufacturing strike on record when it concluded.



Aug. 13, 1900: Railroad mogul and founder of Huntington, Collis Potter Huntington, died. Raised in poverty, Huntington went west when gold was discovered in California. There he became rich,

not from mining but by selling supplies to miners.

Aug. 13, 2018: The House of Delegates adopted articles of impeachment against all sitting justices of the Supreme Court of Appeals.

Aug. 14, 1894: Entertainer Ada Beatrice Queen Victoria Louise Virginia "Bricktop" Smith was born at Alderson. She performed in Paris in the 1920s and opened her own club, called the Music Box, in 1926.



Aug. 14, 1943: Astronaut Jon Andrew McBride was born in Charleston. McBride became an astronaut in 1979 and piloted the space shuttle Challenger on an eight-day mission in 1984.

Aug. 15, 1867: The cornerstone for the first building of the Fairmont Branch Normal School was laid at the corner of Adams and Quincy streets in the heart of town. The first class of students occupied the new building in April 1869. That school became Fairmont State University.





NOTICE is hereby given that MOUNTAINEER GAS COMPANY, a public utility, has filed with the PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION OF WEST VIRGINIA, an application containing decreased rates, tolls and charges for furnishing natural gas service to approximately 218,000 customers at various locations in the Counties of Barbour, Berkeley, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Calhoun, Clay, Doddridge, Fayette, Gilmer, Grant, Greenbrier, Hancock, Hardy, Harrison, Jackson, Jefferson, Kanawha, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Marion, Marshall, Mason, Mc-Dowell, Mercer, Mineral, Mingo, Monongalia, Monroe, Morgan, Nicholas, Ohio, Pendleton, Preston, Putnam, Raleigh, Randolph, Ritchie, Roane, Summers, Tucker, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Wetzel, Wirt, Wood, and Wyoming.

The proposed decreased rates and charges will become effective November 1, 2023, unless otherwise ordered by the Public Service Commission, and will decrease revenue approximately \$50,389,000 annually, a decrease of approximately 24.2%. The average monthly bill for the various classes of customers of MOUNTAINEER GAS COMPANY will be changed as follows:

Virginia's unserved areas, the parts of the state where there is little or no internet access at all, desperately need to be connected. State officials have previously noted that these communities are a priority in the broadband effort. An estimated 35% of West Virginians live in an area that is either unserved or underserved when it comes to internet access.

The report also focuses on affordability and accessibility, noting that increasing access to the internet will mean little if it's still unattainable for a large number of people. The draft report suggests that the state sees the existing Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP), a federal program that allows qualified households to pay far less — and in some cases nothing at all — for internet, as one possible solution to the problem. But also crucial is improving internet skills, be that in the basic digital knowledge of West Virginians, or in their improved comfort with devices like laptops and smartphones.

Access to the internet and internet-capable devices are a major problem

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, almost every West Virginian (97%) falls into one of eight groups, or "covered populations", that have historically used the internet at lower rates. These groups, which include older individuals, veterans, incarcerated people, rural residents and communities of color, are being targeted by the federal effort to help disadvantaged communities. West Virginia has the highest percentage of covered groups in the country, marking it as a state that desperately needs improved internet access.

The draft plan highlights a key problem plaguing these groups and the Mountain State's broadband more broadly: many people don't have access to the internet, and even when people can connect, their internet is often low-quality, slow, and inconsistent.

But understanding exactly how many people are affected by these problems and where they live has been difficult. Earlier this year, West Virginia officials challenged how the federal government maps out the number of households with internet access in the state, arguing that the federal maps missed more than 100,000 people. State leaders eventually opted to create their own maps in addition to the updated federal ones.

And in a very rural state, geography is another big problem when it comes to determining how to expand broadband. "Metrics that just count the number of people in a square mile don't work in West Virginia because of the geography," said Joshua Meadows, the director of Data Driven WV, a group of WVU professors and students helping to analyze data about internet access and potential areas of need.

The problem, he notes, prompted his group to find new ways to determine how people in the most rural parts of the state struggle to access the internet.

Meadows' group is part of the state's Core Planning Team, a large group of organizations working with the West Virginia Office of Broadband to help analyze data, collect feedback from regional listening sessions and state surveys, and connect with other state agencies. Members of the group, which includes nonprofits, institutions like West Virginia University and Marshall University, private companies, and the state's Department of Economic Development, are also looking into best practices to expand internet access.

Unfortunately, the issue isn't just about access. Just 88% of West Virginians have internet-capable devices like laptops, smartphones, desktops and tablets. That's lower than the U.S. as a whole, where 93% of people have a device that can access the internet.

West Virginia already has early goals for how many people it wants to connect

A clearer picture of exactly how the state plans to connect people will likely emerge in the coming months, but the state has already made some of its early connection goals clear. The draft report includes some targets for how many people the state wants to help, especially when it comes to internet affordability, increased access to devices, and building basic digital skills and knowledge.

One goal, for example, calls for the state to increase the number of households participating in the Affordable Connectivity Program. More than 300,000 households in West Virginia are eligible, but many people still do not know about the program. Officials want to increase the number of participating households from just above 100,000 to roughly 250,000 by 2028, the report notes that the state is working with local colleges and universities to help increase awareness of the program and is also using the new FCC maps to reach areas with coverage gaps.

State officials have also pinpointed the need to improve residents' digital literacy skills so that more people can not only access the internet but know how to use it effectively. The report notes that the state will aim to improve the basic digital skills of West Virginians by at least 15%, adding that officials hope to partner with public libraries and community organizations to provide training to state residents. Officials have used public listening sessions, paper surveys, and other methods to help collect information about what skills West Virginians need, and plan to do more outreach in the future.

The state will release more information about its broadband effort in the future, and the first part of the broadband money could arrive next year. As things get underway, those working on the state effort say the goal is ultimately to help expand access to a crucial service.

"Broadband is the 21st century utility, it's part of how we engage in society," said Elizabeth Vitullo, the assistant dean of strategic initiatives at the WVU Chambers College of Business and Economics and the lead of Startup WV, another member of the state's Core Planning Team. "I think that when we get this connectivity issue solved, we're going to see the state be propelled forward in incredible ways."

The West Virginia Governor's Highway Safety Program (GHSP) is urging drivers on West Virginia roads to buckle up during the statewide *Click It or Ticket* high-visibility enforcement mobilization that runs from August 4-20, 2023. This mobilization is part of the GHSP's continual efforts to increase seat belt usage in West Virginia.

"We want seat belt use to be an automatic habit for drivers and passengers alike," said Gov. Jim Justice.

In 2021, 40 percent of all passenger vehicle occupants killed in crashes in West Virginia were unrestrained. To help save lives, we need to step up seat belt enforcement, day and night.

Rural drivers may believe that their crash exposure is lower, but in 2021, 62 percent of total vehicle fatalities in West Virginia occurred in rural locations, compared to 38 percent in urban locations.

"We will keep working to spread the message that seat belts save lives until every person in every vehicle is correctly buckled up. Too many people die on our roads because they were not buckled. Just one death is one too many," said GHSP Occupant Protection Program Coordinator Amy Boggs. "A seat belt is your best protection against death or injury should you be in a vehicle crash."

Law enforcement officers across West Virginia will be out in full force, ticketing drivers who are caught traveling without a correctly buckled seat belt or transporting unrestrained children. This statewide seat belt campaign is aimed at enforcing seat belt use to help keep all vehicle occupants safe.



DHHR Reminds Parents of West Virginia Immunization Requirements for Back-to-School


The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR) reminds parents of West Virginia students of the importance of remaining up to date with vaccinations as the back-to-school season approaches. Children who are current with their vaccinations will automatically meet school immunization requirements.

All children entering school in West Virginia for the first time in grades K-12 must show proof of immunization against diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, polio, measles, mumps, rubella, varicella, and hepatitis B unless properly medically exempted. All children entering school in West Virginia in grades 7 and 12 must show proof of immunization against diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, and meningococcal disease unless properly medically exempted.

"As families, students, educators, and county school systems prepare for the upcoming school year, it is important to receive vaccinations in a timely manner to help prevent potentially fatal or severe illnesses, including diphtheria, measles, mumps, rubella, polio, tetanus, whooping cough (pertussis) and others," said Dr. Matthew Christiansen, Commissioner for DHHR's Bureau for Public Health and State Health Officer. "Parents are encouraged to discuss their child's vaccination status with their primary care provider or local health department."

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
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Rail Explorers awarded contract for Dundon rail excursions

Summersville Lake to become West Virginia's newest State Park

177 acres on the state's largest lake to become the 36th West Virginia State Park



Gov. Jim Justice announced this week that West Virginia will soon be opening its 36th state park, Summersville Lake State Park. The northern shore of the state's largest lake in Nicholas County will be transformed into a premiere outdoor adventure park in one of West Virginia's most iconic spots.

A bill that will offi-

cially designate the land as a state park was sent to the West Virginia Legislature by Gov. Justice. Once the bill is passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor, new recreational opportunities at the park will be opened to the public. As the state's first new park added in more than 30 years, this designation is symbolic of the recent growth in West Virginia's tourism industry.

"I couldn't be more proud to announce our newest State Park," Gov. Justice said. "Summersville Lake is an iconic place in our beautiful state filled with a lot of special memories that span generations of families. Now, all those who travel to Summersville Lake will be treated to the greatest outdoor adventure park in the country on the shores of our state's largest lake.

"The opportunity to add another State Park is a testament to the major impact that our investments in tourism and in our parks is having in West Virginia. I thank the Legislature for agreeing with me and supporting these investments, and I thank all those that work hard every day to operate our parks and market our state to the world. I can't wait to see people from far and wide enjoying Summersville Lake State Park very soon."

The 177-acre park is perched on the northern shore of the state's largest and most picturesque lakes. The lake has been a national and international destination known for its clear blue waters and unique rock formations since opening in

1966. Estimates show more than 1 million visitors enjoy watersports there each year. The new park, just off US-19, will immediately open the lake to additional recreational activities such as hiking, biking, and picnicking. The new park also includes an additional parking lot for those coming to enjoy the incredible views and world-class outdoor recreation.

The site is slated to be developed through a public-private partnership and the amenities will make it the greatest outdoor adventure park in the country. Planned amenities include additional climbing and bouldering opportunities, hiking and biking trails, water activities, aerial sports, camping, cabins, and more. The Division of Natural Resources will host a public meeting in the near future to receive input from the public.

This development comes on the heels of a historic investment in our state park system. State Parks are completing more than \$150 million in improvements, which include upgrades at every single state-operated lodge and every cabin across the state. Last year's state park revenue was the fourth year of record-breaking revenue, showing growth

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An event will be held in the near future to officially designate the park and open it to the public.

"Our state parks would not be where they are today without Governor Justice's vision. When he came into office, we had tens of millions in deferred maintenance and declining revenues" said Secretary of the West Virginia Department of Tourism Chelsea Ruby. "I'm thrilled to stand beside him today as we celebrate more than 150 million in investments, record revenue, and our first new state park in more than 30 years. We could not be more appreciative of the Legislature's continued support of our investments in expanding and improving recreation in our great state. West Virginia has truly be-
