

Melting down and drying up - the drought of 2024

There is no doubt or any statistic that doesn't say that this summer has been hot and dry. People have lamented that it was so hot that water buffalos were evaporating into thin air. Of course, this is somewhat ridiculous but entirely believable as the sun has continued to melt ambition and shades are no longer a cool place to sit. On top of that, yellow jackets came in like a plague, and it has been a struggle just to get to your vehicle or mow the yard without a trip to the medicine cabinet or the hospital, in some cases. In June, the rain started holding off little by little, and in the knife hardening heat among the vellow jackets, we enjoyed life the best we could but...

Pretty soon the grass started turning brown, and there was more wildlife appearing on the roads as they made their exodus toward the rivers and creeks. However, the creeks are drying up and the rivers have nearly dried up in some parts of the state. The mighty Elk River has become nearly stagnant as it has slowed to a crawl. The leaves are changing at least a month early as fall colors come in the last of August instead of October. A lot of people are asking about the colors, but with the rain nonexistent, the leaves are likely to just turn brown on many trees and take an early tumble.

Drought conditions started wrapping their arms around this state and not letting go. When it did rain, at times it came down like it was Noah's flood but quit

soon as it started while the sun dried up any moisture faster than the plants could drink it. By July, some of our state was in extreme drought conditions according to the U.S. Drought Monitor labeling some counties in D3 conditions. When August came around, nearly all of West Virginia was experiencing D3 drought conditions, which haven't been present since 1988. According to a map from the U.S. Drought Monitor, D4 conditions - referred to as exceptional drought, have crept into northern parts of Clay County, drying up springs, creeks, cisterns and wells. The local surrounding lakes - Sutton, Summersville, Tygart, and Stonewall - are starting to lower water levels and change their typical fishing and recreation cycles.

Rainfall totals have been nonexistent, falling over six inches short of normal here in Clay. When a drought gets to the D4 status, it starts to affect the ecosystem, farming and wildlife survival. The forests have become so dry that the forest floor seems to crack under human weight and is susceptible to future growth problems according to the USDA. Foresters warn that if a fire starts in the woods, it would not only burn the woods but also the top soil because of the lack of rain. If this happens, future growth would be hard over the next year.

Farmers who have livestock are not getting the hay cuts they normally expect and are having to buy feed. It upsets the cycle of survival for the WV farmer who not

CCHS Boys' Cross Country Team Takes Third at Braxton Invitational

Cross country season is well underway at Clay County Middle School and Clay County High School. The teams opened the season at the Beckley Chick-Fil-A Invitational on August 24. For CCMS, in a field of 110 runners, Marissa Atha and McKinley Mahan medaled, placing 5th and 20th respectively. Tara Conley and Danae Stricker also put forth strong efforts. Jackson Stricker ran a solid race for the boys' team. For the CCHS girls, Cheyanne Taylor was the highest finisher, followed by Abigail Grandon, Ashley Roberts and Jaylyn Holcomb. Finally, for the high school boys' team, Sawyer Dobbins medaled placing 7th in a field of 115 runners. The team also placed 7th overall with strong contributions from Kane Nida, Kaden





Fitzwater, Trent Hinkle, Andrew Tanner, Isiah Woods and Evan Bass.

On August 31, the teams traveled to Cabell Midland High School to compete in the Midland XC Festival under the lights. This night race is consistently one of the most competitive meets on the schedule. Marissa Atha was the highest finisher for the CCMS girls placing 17thin a field of 173 athletes. Jackson Stricker ran for the middle school boys. For CCHS, top finishers were Sawyer Dobbins and Cheyanne Taylor.

This past Saturday, the teams competed at the Braxton County No Excuses Invitational at Holly Gray State Park in Sutton. This course is a challenging one, with the longest climb dubbed "kill hill." For CCMS, Atha and Mahan again each earned medals placing 5th and 12th respectively. Cheyanne Taylor was top finisher for the high school girls. In the high school boys' race, athletes from fifteen schools competed. CCHS earned third place overall, impressively placing three runners in the top 15 - Dobbins placed 6th, Nida came in 8th, and Fitzwater finished 14th. Hinkle, Tanner and Woods also substantially contributed to the team's success.

Several meets are scheduled in the coming weeks. The teams travel to Doddridge County High School on September 17 and Little Beaver State Park on September 21.

Sawyer Dobbins led the CCHS boys' team with his 6th place finish at Braxton.

Marissa Atha led the CCMS girls' team finishing 5th at the Braxton Invitational.

The following week they go to Lincoln County High School on September 25 and Pikeview High School on September 28. Based on their continued improvement and success so far, the coaches expect great results.

Rabies Vaccination Clinic upcoming

The 2024 Rabies Vaccination Clinic is set for Saturday, Sept. 28, from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. at the Clay County Courthouse. The purpose of the clinic is to vaccinate your dogs and cats for rabies. This clinic is a combined effort of Elk Vet Hospital, Dr. Katie Kobyra and the Clay County Assessor's Office.

This year the clinic will be held as a Drive Thru at the Courthouse starting at 10 a.m. The Assessor or a Deputy Assessor will be available to collect dog tax. The dog tax is \$3 per dog and the rabies vaccinations will be \$16 per animal. Dog 6N1-DHLPP \$16, Cat 4N1-FVRCP \$16, and Kennel Cough Bordetella \$16.

All animals must be on a leash or in a pet taxi for the protection of all animals. We will not be responsible for any animal.



This installation of the exhibit will feature West Virginia wildlife. Submissions will be accepted through Friday, Nov. 8, 2024.

The exhibit will open Sunday, Jan. 12, 2025, at 2 p.m. with an awards ceremony and reception at the Culture Center, State Capitol Complex, in Charleston and will be displayed through mid-May 2025.

Inspired: A West Virginia Series of Juried Exhibitions is a four-part series in honor of the upcoming 250th anniversary of the founding of the United States, highlighting visual representations of West Virginia themes. The final installation will feature West Virginia Historic Figures. Previous shows have focused on landscapes, as well as historic buildings and structures. All parts of the series will be displayed in the Commissioners Gallery of the Culture Center.




and Richard, and a doting and encouraging grandfather and great-grandfather to 18 grandchildren and 26 great-grandchildren. In service to his country, Gale joined the United States Coast Guard on November 11, 1943, graduated from Capital Radio Engineering Institute in February of 1945, and was assigned as radio technician among the inaugural crew of the LST 1148. The 1148 was initially planned to be a part of the second wave force to invade Japan had the Japanese not surrendered to save Tokyo from the third atomic bomb. He arrived in Japan after the War had ended and was sent ashore to confiscate electronics equipment from Japanese warplanes. Here, he was exposed to ionizing radiation and suffered its effects aboard ship during the return home. Four years after his honorable discharge, he lost sight in both eyes (temporarily in his left eye and permanently in his right). He went on to live a life dedicated to helping others overcome disabilities and obstacles in their lives Gale served his community as a teacher for 36 years: 15 years integrating those experiencing blindness into public schools in the state of Maryland, 10 years as head of the special education program at Clay County High School, three years teaching special education at the elementary and junior high school levels in Clay, two years as a math and English teacher at Clay County High School, six years as a teacher at Brown Elementary School, two of which in a dual role as its principal. He was a Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) service officer for 35 years, garnering deserved benefits for count-

less veterans and their families. He spent 22 years as a swimming instructor and lifeguard, several of those running special programs for seniors and individuals with disabilities. He ran numerous summer camps for individuals with disabilities through the years. He raised the American Flag at every home football game of the Clay County High School Panthers for 48 straight years without missing a single game. In his retirement he tutored many of Clay County's successful citizens, and conducted a vibrant, 20-year flag program in all of the county's elementary schools. He served in various leadership roles in several of the community's service organizations, VFW and Lions Club to name a couple. He received the Melvin Jones Fellowship and Leonard Jarrett Awards for service in the area of sight conservation, meeting the needs of innumerable individuals in their quest to over-

WV Department of Education Releases 2024 Balanced Scorecard Results

The West Virginia Department of Education (WVDE) released West Virginia's Balanced Scorecard (Balanced Scorecard) results for the 2023-24 school year during the September meeting of the West Virginia Board of Education (WVBE). The data represents the accountability ratings for public schools in the Mountain State as part of West Virginia's School Accountability System (WVSAS).

Each public school in the state receives a scorecard that measures student progress across multiple indicators. The Polencard Scorecard provides appual unders Last school year, CTE students achieved a 64% passage rate on the NOCTI exam, with students in several areas having higher rates including Education at 98%, Health Sciences at 92% and STEM at 87%.

Homeschool Assessments:

The WVDE also updated the WVBE on the 2023-2024 assessments for West Virginia's homeschooled students. Once a child is moved to homeschool, West Virginia code requires the family/guardian to submit an assessment or portfolio of the child's work by June 30 following their 3rd, 5th, 8th, and 11th grade year. The assessment can be the West Virginia General Summative Assessment, one of the family's choosing that meets the policy requirements, or it can be a sample of the child's work that is reviewed/assessed by a certified teacher. Last school year, 57.7% of the homeschooled students presumed to be in grades 3, 5, 8 and 11 submitted assessments by the June 30 deadline. This is an increase from the 37.1% submission rate from previous years. Chronic Absenteeism Challenge: Superintendent Blatt, in collaboration with 13 state education leaders across the country, is taking a stand to cut chronic absenteeism by 50% over five years. The effort is a part of the 50% Challenge initiative and will be among the WVDE's collaborative approaches to increase student success. West Virginia's chronic absenteeism rate for full academic year public school students last year was 23.5% which is down from 27.6% in the 2022-23 school year. It is an urgent issue across the country that peaked during the Covid-19 pandemic and remains elevated. If not addressed, chronic absenteeism can have long-term impacts on students, families and the state's economic health Chronic absenteeism is defined as missing more than 10% of school days for any reason. Data shows a decrease in the achievement scores of chronically absent students. The most profound effects of chronic absenteeism are seen in low-income communities and communities of color. More than 9 million students across 14 states could be affected by the 50% Challenge which was initiated by a partnership between Attendance Works, EdTrust and the American Enterprise Institute (AEI).


According to the 2023-24 school year data, 36 districts in the state improved in mathematics and 46 districts made gains in English language arts proficiency. Additionally, 55 districts experienced a smaller percentage of students being chronically absent, and 26 districts suspended fewer students for minor infractions.

"Our educators and districts are working diligently to support student achievement and school success," said State Superintendent of Schools Michele L. Blatt. "Key indicators are trending in a positive direction thanks to our combined efforts and recent legislation addressing literacy, numeracy, student discipline and attendance. THIS WEEK IN West Virginia History

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to *e-WV*: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

Sept. 18, 1947: Historian and journalist Minnie Kendall Lowther died. Born in Ritchie County, she was one of the first West Virginia women to become a newspaper editor.

Sept. 18, 1989: Playwright Maryat Lee died in Lewisburg. She established Eco Theater in Summers County as an indigenous mountain theater, using Summers County people as actors.




Sept. 19, 1862: The two-day Battle of Shepherdstown opened with an artillery exchange between Union and Confederate troops. Following the Battle of Antietam, it ended Robert E. Lee's Maryland Campaign and helped convince Abraham Lincoln to issue his preliminary Emancipation Proclamation.

Sept. 19, 1892: William "Bill" Blizzard was born in Cabin Creek, Kanawha County. Blizzard became one of West Virginia's most influential and controversial labor leaders of the 20th century.



Sept. 20, 1910: Dorothy Johnson Vaughan was born in Kansas City but moved at a young age to Morgantown, where she was valedictorian of Beechurst High School. Like fellow West Virginian Katherine Johnson, Vaughan became a mathematician and computer expert for NASA and made key contributions to the U.S. space program.

Sept. 20, 1914: Ken Hechler was born on Long Island, New York. Hechler served 18 years in the U.S. Congress and four terms as West Virginia's secretary of state.



Sept. 21, 1895: Samuel Ivan Taylor was born in Mercer County. Taylor was the first member of the West Virginia state police. He was part of the force that faced off against union miners during the 1921 Battle of Blair Mountain in Logan County.

Sept. 21, 1937: The West Virginia Conservation Commission acquired 6,705 acres in Kanawha County to create Kanawha State Forest. Redevelopment of the land, which had been heavily mined and timbered, began the next year by the Civilian Conservation Corps.

Sept. 21, 1970: Filming began in Moundsville on the movie Fools' Parade, based on the novel by Davis Grubb. The filming concluded one month

later when Grubb came to Moundsville for a dinner, accompanied by his dog, making the \$750 round trip from New York City in a taxi.



Sept. 22, 1856: Albert Blakeslee "A. B." White was born in Cleveland, Ohio. He was West Virginia's 11th governor, serving from 1901 to 1905. He was the fourth person to serve as governor from Wood County, his adopted home.

Sept. 22, 1894: Louis Bennett Jr. was born in Weston. Bennett was West Virginia's only World War I flying ace. With 12 combat kills, including three aircraft and nine balloons, Bennett placed himself ninth on the roster of aces. This record was accomplished in just 10 days after assignment to his combat unit.

Sept. 22, 1970: The "Brinkley Bridge" in Wayne County collapsed under the weight of an overloaded truck. The bridge was named for newscaster David Brinkley who had filmed a 1960 news report about the poor condition of the span.

Sept. 23, 1922: Five men were struck and killed at the Glen Rogers mine in Wyoming County when equipment fell during the construction of a deep shaft.

Sept. 23, 1923: Folk artist Herman Hayes was born in Elkview. His woodcarvings were displayed in Washington and New York City, and he twice won the top award in the West Virginia Juried Exhibition.



Sept. 23, 1938: The Mingo Oak was cut down after succumbing to the fumes of a burning coal refuse pile. The Mingo


Oak, which stood near the Logan-Mingo county line, was more than 500 years old and may have been the largest white oak in the world.



Sept. 24, 1911: Laura Jackson Arnold died in Buckhannon. The sister of Stonewall Jackson, she was a staunch Unionist during the Civil War, opening her home to care for injured Union soldiers.

Sept. 24, 1918: George Spencer "Spanky" Roberts was born in London, Kanawha County. He entered aviation cadet training with the first class of Tuskegee Airmen and became the firstBlack military pilot from West Virginia.

lakes – Sutton, Summersville, Tygart, and Stonewall - are starting to lower water levels and change their typical fishing and recreation cycles.

Rainfall totals have been nonexistent, falling over six inches short of normal here in Clay. When a drought gets to the D4 status, it starts to affect the ecosystem, farming and wildlife survival. The forests have become so dry that the forest floor seems to crack under human weight and is susceptible to future growth problems according to the USDA. Foresters warn that if a fire starts in the woods, it would not only burn the woods but also the top soil because of the lack of rain. If this happens, future growth would be hard over the next year.

Farmers who have livestock are not getting the hay cuts they normally expect and are having to buy feed. It upsets the cycle of survival for the WV farmer who not only runs livestock but gardens. The WV Department of Agriculture has information for drought assistance resources you can access by calling or going to https://agriculture.wv.gov/divisions/executive// drought-assistance-resources/. There you can find a variety of resources for drought relief for farmers.

One thing that has helped ward off a disaster for this region is the fact that we have had so many years before this that were frog strangler seasons. Five of the previous years since 2002 were the wettest on record which saturated the ground far below post hole digContinued from Page 1

ger distance. In prolonged droughts at what is considered D3 level, water flow hardships on people who depend on wells or cisterns are increased, and at times, wells need dug deeper if there is no end in sight of the drought conditions.

According to meteorologist Brandon Stover of WCHS TV, "If the tropics don't wake up soon, or this pattern remains the same, the Appalachian region, as well as parts of Ohio, will likely see a historic season of fires."

Bottom line, this drought is a big one, and it's going to hurt for awhile ecologically and personally for those that have wells or depend on creeks or springs for water that is drying up. There is aid for the farmers in need, but for the individual that depends entirely on springs and cisterns, the only help available, unless things change, are people who haul water for those in need. Facebook and word of mouth are the only options to find a water hauler at this point. If I am made aware of people who do haul water, I will post the information to the Clay County Free Press website and include contact information in next week's paper. This drought, like all things, will pass eventually and be a thing of the past. Rain is expected a couple of days this week but not enough to end the drought as of this writing, but as we all know, the weather changes depending on how the wind blows and not the meteorologist.

The line then enters into Clay County crossing CR 38/1 W Fork Rd, CR 38 Clinic Dr, SR 16, Interstate 79 and Big Otter Creek, CR 19 Ossia Rd, Deadfall Run Rd, CR 16/2 Otterlick Rd, James Dunfield Rd, SR 4 Duck Rd, the Elk River, CR 11 Widen Ridge Rd, CR 11/4 Lantz Rd, Rock Camp Rd, CR 15/2 Swandale Rd, CR 52 Rush Camp, Buffalo Creek, and CR 15/4 Taylor Fork Rd.
