# Gov. Justice announces fall trout stockings and return of Monster Trout Contest

The WVDNR will stock trophy-size and monster trout at 40 lakes and streams during the weeks of Oct. 21 and Oct. 28

Gov. Jim Justice announced the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources will begin fall trout stockings during the weeks of Oct. 21 and Oct. 28. The third annual Monster Trout Contest will also return at the same time.

During these two weeks, the WVD-NR will stock 35,000 pounds of trout

weighing 1-2 pounds and 6,500 pounds of monster trout weighing 3-6 pounds at 40 lakes and streams around the state.

"This is absolutely one of my favorite times of the year," Gov. Justice said. "Our trout program keeps getting bigger and better, and this year will be no exception. It's a great opportunity for folks to enjoy our beautiful waters and try their luck at catching trophy-sized or even monster trout for some amazing prizes. West Virginia is truly a world-

# Mountain State Spotlight: West Virginians get tax cut after lawmakers pull millions from agencies overseeing foster care, Medicaid and child care

In a special session weeks before the election, lawmakers approve a tiny tax cut and dole out millions for local projects. But West Virginians struggling for child care got little in the way of help

In mid-September, Gov. Jim Justice told the people of West Virginia he'd be calling the Legislature back into session at the end of the month.

"I promised you I'd fight like crazy for a 5% tax cut, I promised you I would try to help out with child care," he said.

When the gavels slammed concluding the special session on Tuesday, most West Virginian families would get an average of 40 cents a week from the tax cut. Little was done on getting that help

for child care. And the money for the tax break came, in part, from the agency that oversees child care.

How much is the tax cut?

Going into the session, Justice asked the Legislature to pass a 5% income tax cut, on top of a 4% cut that's effective Jan. 1, 2025 and a 21.25% cut last year.

But high ranking members of the Senate, notably Finance Chairman Eric Tarr, bristled at the suggestion, fearing it could put the budget at risk down the road. On Monday, the governor changed his proposal to a 2% cut.

Revenue Secretary Larry Pack, who oversees the state's budget preparation, told the House Finance Committee he didn't have an idea how much the tax cut would actually put in the pockets of West Virginians.

On Senator Capito's Girls Rise Up Program:





### WV's \$5 prison copay called a barrier to care for incarcerated people

New research showed medical copays are preventing incarcerated people from receiving medical care.

West Virginia's \$5 copay is much higher compared with those of many other states.

Wanda Bertram, communications strategist for the Prison Policy Initiative, said families do not always have the funds to cover repeated doctors visits. She contended copays are strategies states use to keep the number of sick calls down.

"That's not because people are making frivolous requests," Bertram asserted. "It's because prisons often don't have the resources and simply don't want to deal with what it would take to actually give incarcerated people the care they need."

Nearly one in five nationwide have not seen a doctor since entering state prison, according to the Prison

Policy Initiative. Federal data show people who are incarcerated are more likely to have high blood pressure, asthma, cancer, arthritis and infectious diseases such as hepatitis C and HIV.

Bertram added pregnant people are no exception to the copay rule. She cited research done in 2016 showing the lack of access to prenatal care, noting while the study did not specifically look at the copay issue, it presents a serious obstacle.

"A shocking number of people were not receiving this really important care," Bertram reported. "Almost 10% hadn't received an obstetric examination. About a quarter hadn't seen any outside specialists."

According to research from Johns Hopkins University, fewer than 10 states have passed laws mandating prisons provide access to prenatal or postpartum health care for incarcerated people.

### Treasurer Moore announces record-breaking \$.62M in Unclaimed **Property returned during September**

Highest Monthly Amount Returned in State History State Treasurer Riley Moore announced his Office's Unclaimed Property Division set a new record for the highest amount of unclaimed property returned during a month, with nearly \$6.2 million worth of funds returned to individuals, businesses and other organizations during the month of September.

"This is by far the highest amount returned to our citizens on a monthly basis since this program began 2,357 recipients during the month. in 1967," Treasurer Moore said. "Since I took office

in 2021, we've returned nearly \$92 million to the people. I'm proud to say we continue returning people's money at the fastest pace in state history."

The Unclaimed Property Division returned a total of \$6,172,265 paid out across 4,208 claims representing 11,143 individual properties during the month of September. About \$2.9 million of that was through the West Virginia Cash Now payments mailed out to

There were several other large claims as well, in-

cluding more than \$360,000 returned to the Putnam County Commission and more than \$94,000 to New River Health Association in Fayette County.

"While we're returning funds at the fastest pace in state history, we're also receiving new listings all the time," Treasurer Moore said. "We have more than \$435 million available in our database to claim today, so I encourage everyone to visit www.WVUnclaimedProperty.gov to see if we're holding anything

### West Virginia Smart529 Plans Named 'Top Of The Class' In New **National Ratings**

State Treasurer Riley Moore announced West Virginia's SMART529 plans have been named 'Top of the Class' in Saving For College's latest 2024 ratings – their highest honor for 529 plans nationwide.

"We're proud that West Virginia's SMART529 plans continue to be recognized among the top college savings plans in the country," Treasurer Moore said. "We strive to make SMART529 the premier college savings option for our families and children and this new ranking demonstrates that."

Saving For College is a national informational service that specializes in providing unbiased data on 529 savings plans. It has provided ratings on plans since 1999, frequently giving SMART529 plans high marks.

This year, the organization unveiled a new "Top of the Class" category to identify "the very best of the best 529 plans," which outscore more than 80 percent of peers in their category. Plans were evaluated based on four categories: Performance, Ease of Use, Savings Success and Program Delivery.

Nine plans out of 54 that are directly sold to consumers, and four plans out of 31 that are sold through financial advisors received the Top of the Class ratings, and all three of West Virginia's SMART529 plans received top honors.

Week in West Virginia History

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.



Oct. 16, 1859: John Brown and his raiders captured the arsenal at Harpers Ferry, but they were soon besieged by townspeople, local militia and federal troops. The raid galvanized the nation, further alienating North and South and drastically reducing any possible middle ground for compromise before the Civil

Oct. 16, 1918: Dale Troy "Stoney" Cooper was born in Randolph County. He, his wife Wilma Lee and the Clinch Mountain Clan played country music on WWVA radio in Wheeling for a decade before spending the next 20 years on the Grand Ole Opry.

Oct. 16, 1922: The Rev. Leon Sullivan was born in Charleston. In 1977, Sullivan initiated the original Sullivan Principles, a code of conduct for companies operating in South Africa. The Principles were among the most effective efforts to end the system of apartheid.





Oct. 17, 1901: Folk artist S. L. Jones was born in Monroe County. He was widely recognized his hand-carved, painted wood sculptures. His works are in the collections of the National Museum of American Art, Museum of American Art, Museum of American Folk Art, and West Virginia State Museum.

Oct. 18, 1941: William "Billy" Cox was born in Wheeling. He is one of two bassists to have played regularly with legendary guitarist Jimi Hen-



Oct. 19, 1894: Historian and illustrator Julius Allan DeGruyter was born in Charleston. A self-taught painter and illustrator, DeGruyter's art appeared in numerous exhibits and is represented in the collections of the State Museum. The artwork includes scenes of early Charleston.



Oct. 20, 1990: The current USS West Virginia (SSBN-736) was commissioned. The USS West Virginia is an Ohio Class Trident ballistic missile

submarine that is 560 feet long, 42 feet wide, and displaces 18,750 tons when submerged.

Oct. 21, 1865: Bishop Matthew Wesley Clair Sr. was born in Union. He was one of the first African Americans elected as a bishop in the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Oct. 21, 1918: Governor Hulett Smith was born in Beckley. In the 1964 gubernatorial primary, Smith carried 53 of the state's 55 counties, receiving more votes than his three opponents combined.

Oct. 22, 1693: Lord Thomas Fairfax was born in Kent, England. He inherited five million acres in Virginia, land that included much of present West Virginia's Eastern Panhandle.



Oct. 22, 1734: Fron-

tiersman Daniel Boone was born in Pennsylvania. In 1788, Boone and his family settled near the mouth of the Kanawha River at Point Pleasant. He represented Kanawha County in the Virginia General Assembly 1791.



Oct. 22, 1821: Collis P. Huntington was born in Harwinton, Connecticut. In 1869, Huntington purchased the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway and set about extending its tracks from Richmond across southern West Virginia to the Ohio River. There, in 1871, he established a new city bearing his name.

Oct. 22, 1922: Fiddler Wilson Douglas was born in Clay County. Influenced by fellow old-time musician French Carpenter, Douglas developed a unique style of playing that continues to inspire younger generations. In 1992, he received the Vandalia Award, West Virginia's highest folklife honor.





Oct. 22, 1977: Construction of the New River Gorge Bridge was completed after three years of work. The Fayette County bridge is one of West Virginia's best-known landmarks. It is the third-highest bridge in the United States and third-longest steel span in the Western Hemisphere.







### Gov. and First Lady Update WV Board of Ed. on Communities In **Schools' Success**

The West Virginia Board of Education (WVBE) welcomed Gov. Jim Justice and First Lady Cathy Justice to its October meeting today in Charleston. They provided the Board with an update on the Communities In Schools (CIS) program in West Virginia. CIS is a comprehensive initiative that surrounds children with the necessary resources to meet their needs allowing them to stay in school and connect to a pathway of post-secondary success.

The Governor and First Lady championed the expansion of CIS throughout their tenure. Through their work with the West Virginia Legislature and the West Virginia Department of Education (WVDE), CIS has expanded to all 55 counties. The program impacts 117,000 students through the work of 298 site coordinators in 285 schools. As a result, 99% of students served have stayed in school with a significant number of them showing improved behavior, academic performance and attendance.

Vulnerable student populations often need assistance extending beyond what schools or any single organization can provide. The site coordinators bring together local resources to meet the unique needs of the child and reinforce supports through consistent and sustained engagement. This allows the child and family to focus on school success.

#### **District Approval Status and Accreditation**

The WVBE also approved the 2024 District Approval Status and Accreditation Report. The WVDE Office of Accountability presented the report that provides critical insights into school district performance across 11 indicators. The report provides a public review of each district's operational efficiency (e.g., Finance, Facilities, Special Education), as well as its performance on the West Virginia Balanced Scorecard Indicators of Academic Performance and Student Success (e.g., English language arts [ELA] and Mathematics Achievement and Progress, Attendance, Behavior).

Key findings from the report include:

For the Attendance Indicator, 91% of districts designated as "On Watch" in 2023 showed a reduction in chronic absenteeism. Additionally, 100% of districts that were designated as "Support" showed a reduction in chronic absenteeism.

For the ELA indicators, 100% of counties designated as "On Watch" for ELA Achievement last year made gains. No counties were designated in the more intensive categories for ELA Achievement or ELA Progress.

For the mathematics indicators, 65% of districts designated as "On Watch" for Math Achievement in 2023 made increases. Also, 33% of districts identified as "On Watch" improved in Math Progress.

Districts that have been identified for the same indicator for consecutive years require increased action by the county and the WVDE. The report and WVBE presentation are available on the WVDE website.

#### **Elementary Alternative Education Grants**

The WVDE Office of Safety and Tiered Support Systems announced the recipients of the Elementary Alternative Education Grants. These awards, \$250,000 each, help counties establish strong multi-tiered systems of support to address advancing and critical needs of students. Smaller grants were awarded to other districts with existing programs.

The WVDE supports counties in addressing needs such as low academic performance, chronic absenteeism, social-emotional and behavioral supports as well as others. Multi-tiered systems are designed on a continuum to provide appropriate responses to deliver evidence-based and focused interventions in the most productive manner possible.

#### **WVBE Policies on Public Comment**

Policy 5202, Minimum Requirements for the Licensure of Professional/ Paraprofessional Personnel and Advanced Salary Classifications establishes the requirements regarding licensure of educators to work in West Virginia public schools. As changes occur in education, certification and licensure policies must be revised to ensure educational needs are met. This proposed policy implements new statutory requirements and current policy drafting protocol.

Policy 8400, The Charter Public Schools Stimulus Fund resulted from the passage of Senate Bill 47 during the 2023 regular legislative session. It gives the WVBE the responsibility to adopt a policy that creates a Charter Schools Stimulus Fund which allows grants of appropriated public funds to assist with charter school start-up costs. The Professional Charter School Board will administer the fund with oversight from the WVBE. The policy addresses criteria and processes regarding grant awards as well as reporting requirements that the Professional Charter School Board is required to follow.

Policy 5202 is on public comment for 30 days, and Policy 8400 is on public comment for 45 days. Both may be reviewed on the WVDE website.

The total cost is \$46 million, of which \$19 million comes from retiring a Wise Administration-era bond.

Most of the money, \$27 million, according to Pack, would come from the cost savings resulting from the breakup of the Department of Health and Human Services into three agencies. The new Department of Human Services oversees a dysfunctional foster care system and a child care subsidy program that could run out of cash by the end of the year.

Lawmakers pressed Pack on just where in the former department's \$1 billion budget the cuts came from. Pack said he didn't have it in that detail.

"Trying to find \$20 million is not very hard," he said.

What did they do for child care?

Twice already this year, lawmakers have come to Charleston and adjourned without doing anything to address West Virginia's child care shortage.

By August, 60 child care centers across the state had closed. A key federal subsidy program is used by thousands of low-income families to afford child care in West Virginia. This program faces a \$23-30 million funding shortfall but state officials have found enough federal money to fund it through the end of the year.

Instead of addressing this budget hole, the governor called for a non-refundable \$1,500 maximum tax credit for child care. It would allow families to get up to \$1,500 taken off their tax bill that had been spent on child care. But if they owe nothing in taxes, they don't get any

But Allen said that wouldn't do much good by only benefiting parents who already have children in child care.

An estimated 20,000 children in West Virginia need child care but can't get it because there are not enough open slots. An analysis from the West Virginia Center on Budget and Policy said it would take around \$100 million to solve the issue.

The governor also proposed \$5 million for a "child care expansion pilot program" which would hire a consultant to study the problem and help develop small child care centers. This idea faced choppy waters on the House floor Tuesday evening as lawmakers took is-

sue with spending money on an outside study of a well-known problem. "If we have \$5 million, we have a list of things the child providers said will actually help,"

said Del. Joey Garcia, D-Marion.

Garcia called for the bill to be postponed indefinitely. By a vote of 47-40, it was. Del. Kayla Young, D-Kanawha, sponsored several bills to address childcare, including

\$4.3 million for the federal subsidy program, \$1,000 refundable tax credits for child care and to subsidize day care workers for their own child care. All those bills were sent to commit-

Plugging the holes in the state budget with one time money

The roughly \$500 million went to a variety of projects. Of that, \$125 million went towards water and sewer projects. Another \$100 million went towards those projects too, but they were placed in the Governor's Civil Contingent Fund.

That fund is the governor's discretionary fund. While some items in that budget are already spoken for, finance committee testimony revealed there's \$81 million that isn't - enough to cover most of the Center of Budget and Policy recommendations for addressing child care.

The \$500 million came out of the state's surplus, the extra money left over from the prior budget year. Over the last few years, the state has enjoyed an unprecedented surplus. Last year, state revenues came in \$1.8 billion over. But these surpluses were largely driven by a flood of federal funding during the COVID-19

pandemic and lowballed estimates from the governor, Allen said. On top of that, in 2022 the severance tax collections went through the roof after natural gas

prices rapidly rose when the Russians rolled tanks into Ukraine. That severance tax is historically volatile and as quick as the prices rose in 2022, they busted the next year. But according to the governor's numbers he sent to the state Senate, the flush times are

coming to an end. In next year's budget, state officials project to have an \$80 million surplus. This, according to both lawmakers and critics, is a result of "flat budgeting" - keeping the

same amount of spending year to year, without fully accounting for inflation.

In the past, Republican leadership has said flat budgeting forces agencies to find efficiencies, but this philosophy also stretches agencies at a time when West Virginia has a wide variety of urgent needs. For example, during a House Finance Committee meeting Monday, state corrections officials said they need \$17 million more each year to keep facilities running.

Billy Marshall, commissioner of the Division of Corrections and Rehabilitation, told the committee that when staffing was short, jails and prisons were using money budgeted for vacant positions to pay for operating costs, like food, medical services and utilities. Now that more than 700 positions have been filled, the agency will no longer be able pull cash out of those accounts.

Lawmakers also spent \$87 million to keep afloat the Public Employees Insurance Agency. PEIA – the source of healthcare benefits for the state's employees – had depleted a required reserve account because the costs of drugs and doctor's visits are outstripping the cash on

Brian Cunningham, director of PEIA, told the finance committee the agency is making moves to reduce costs and raising premiums for state employees, but it really needed the money to avoid a 20% midyear premium hike, or the agency being declared shaky by the

On the floor, Del. Evan Hansen, D-Monogalia, said using surplus money to address ongoing costs won't work, especially as surplus amounts continue to dwindle.

"There's a lot of services that the people of West Virginia expect from their state government and deserve," Hansen said. "If they don't have surpluses anymore, government's not going to be able to take care of those priorities.'

But Finance Chair Del. Vernon Criss, R-Wood, said the surplus items are all "one-time spends." He said while certain revenue streams, like the personal income tax, are decreasing by design, economic growth will offset it.

Meanwhile, as lawmakers sorted out the hole for PEIA, 1,300 road workers gathered on the Capitol steps with the governor to mark the anniversary of Justice's "Roads to Prosperity" highway building program. A loudspeaker blasted Kool & the Gang's "Celebration", rattling the windows of the finance committee room.

As Justice called for the road projects to keep going, he turned around on his stool to the men and women wearing high-visibility yellow shirts. "I mean this, I love every last one of you," he said. "You did the work, you pulled the rope,

you absolutely made all this happen." The next day, PEIA's finance board announced a planned premium increase of about \$30 a month for average state employees like roadworkers

some memories."

The WVDNR will tag 100 monster trout with a bright pink tag. Anglers who catch one of these fish and submit a photo with the tag number online will be eligible to win a prize, five of whom will be selected to win a grand prize, such as a weekend cabin stay at a West Virginia State Park or a Cabela's prize package. Entries must be submitted by Friday, November 22.

"Our fall trout stockings are designed to support West Virginia's fisheries and offer exceptional recreational fishing opportunities for anglers of all skill levels," WVDNR Director Brett McMillion said. "The Monster Trout Contest adds an extra level of excitement and encourages people to get outside and experience our state's natural beauty while enjoying top-notch sport fishing."

### Special Elk River Fall Trout Stockings

In November and December, the WVDNR will stock trout on the Elk River in Webster County for the second year. These stockings, which are part of a program to evaluate the economic impact of trout stocking, will occur at usual stocking locations. The WVDNR will stock 750 rainbow trout each month for a total of 1,500 additional trout stocked in the Elk River.

#### WVDNR Announces Trout Tagging Study During fall trout stockings, the WVDNR will also

conduct a trout-tagging study and is asking anglers who catch a tagged trout to report their catch using information printed on the tag. Trout study tags are yellow and include a four-digit number and an WVDNR email ad-

Anglers who catch a tagged fish should clip off the tag and email the number to the provided address along with the date of their catch and whether they harvested or released the trout. Information collected in this study will be used by WVDNR biologists to understand fish movement, estimate angler catch rates and determine how long stocked fish remain in streams so they can better manage stocked trout waters. All anglers 15 years and older are required to have

a West Virginia fishing license, trout stamp and a valid form of identification while fishing for trout. Licenses and stamps can be purchased at 160 retail locations across the state or online at WVfish.com.
