Clay County children will be delighted this coming Saturday, Dec. 14, when, thanks to the efforts of Clay Mayor Jason Hubbard, Casie Boggs, and Donna Salisbury of the Clay Family Resource Center there will be Christmas events free to all Clay County children.

Beginning at 3 p.m. they will get to meet Santa at the Clay Family Resource building for photos, popcorn, and a quality Christmas gift- one of the \$10,000 worth of STEM or STEAM gifts gathered to delight, educate, and entertain any and all children. Free to all Clay County children, Casie Boggs has orchestrated this Christmas adventure, a walkthrough with many 'Bethlehem stops' along the way. One of the first actions at the regular Board of Education meeting was to recognize Coach Ron Starcher and the seven students who qualified for the WV State Cross Country Meet. For girls it was Cheyanne Taylor and Abigail Grandon. For boys it was Andrew Tanner, Sawyer Dobbins, Trent Hinkle, Kane Nida, and Kaden Fitzwater. Each student was acknowledged at the meeting with a certificate and was congratulated by the board.

"At the beginning of the year we outlined our expectation," Ron said at the meeting, clarifying that the program had not been in the top ten teams in over 10 years, "and we couldn't ask for a greater group of guys." He suggested the defeat of

Roane and Nicholas county teams set them on a course to be regional champions. "The boys finished as Number 11 just outside the top ten in the state. The two young ladies we have this evening also qualified for state performance, and If we had one more girl on our team, it would also have qualified."

He assured the audience, "These students showed up every day and did workouts over an hour long. They would run up hill behind Tudors Biscuit World and all the way the Maysel Park and back. 

Mary Free Bed Partnering with Vandalia Health to Bring Expert Rehabilitation to West Virginia

Mary Free Bed is expanding its rehabilitation services to West Virginia with the announcement of a partnership with Vandalia Health at Charleston Area Medical Center (CAMC). Vandalia Health is headquartered in Charleston, WV, with locations in Maryland, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Virginia. "We are excited to work together with Mary Free Bed Rehabilitation to enhance clinical expertise and patient experience in rehabilitation

care in West Virginia." Despite the geographical distance between the two organizations, their mission and values are closely intertwined. Mary Free Bed Rehabilitation and Vandalia Health both focus on patient-centered care, working to improve access, outcomes, and quality of life for all the communities they serve.

"In health care, alignment of mission and values is essential for successful partnerships," said Bruce Brasser, Chief Operating Officer at Mary Free Bed. "This collaboration represents a shared vision of expanding access to world-class rehabilitation care for those who need it most."

The joint operating agreement will be known as Mary Free Bed Rehabilitation at Vandalia Health CAMC General Hospital. It was developed out of a working relationship with the Mary Free Bed Advisory Group, which is dedicated to building national partnerships and consulting with organizations that share the same value and mission as Mary Free Bed.

Meet the 2024-25 West Virginia Folklife Apprenticeship Participants

Ten pairs have been selected to participate in the 2024-25 West Virginia Folklife Apprenticeship Program. The program celebrates and supports traditional artists in passing on cultural knowledge, stories and techniques to their apprentices. This time-tested model of one-to-one study allows dedicated apprentices to learn from recognized experts in their traditional art forms and better understand their communities and history. Hosted biennially since 2016, the program has increased in size over four rounds. These 10 pairs from across the Mountain State are carrying on important traditions in old-time music, fiber arts, storytelling and

The ten participating pairs are as follows: Tim Bing (Cabell County) will teach clawhammer banjo playing to his apprentice, Edwin McCoy (Monroe County). Margaret Bruning and her apprentice, Nevada Tribble (both of Randolph County), will practice weaving and fiber art traditions. Richard Eddy will teach his apprentice, Katie McCoy (both of Monongalia County), how to repair fiddles. Bill Hairston (Kanawha County) will share storytelling techniques with his apprentice, Aristotle Jones (Monongalia County). Ginny Hawker (Randolph County) will study traditional unaccompanied Primitive Baptist hymn singing with her apprentice, Mary Linscheid (Monongalia County). Dural Miller will teach urban farming to his apprentice, Linesha Frith (both of Kanawha County). Nancy Nelson will train her apprentice and nephew, Kenneth "KD" Jones (both of

Kanawha County), to make family candy recipes. Tay-

lor Runner and his apprentice, Annick Odom (both of Monongalia County), will practice square dance calling. Judy Van Gundy will share traditional Appalachian white oak basketry techniques with her apprentice, Andrea

Brandon-Hennig (both of Randolph County).



thanked Superintendent Phil Dobbins who not only supported the teams but helped coach them for the last two years, on their way to the state meet.

All board members were present. They approved the Volunteer Commitment/Agreement application of Anatlia Williams, and Barry Curry at Clay High School. They accepted the resignation of Brenda Griffin McCutcheon as Extra-Mile Delivery Driver. They approved Anissa Collins as Afterschool Homebound Instructor. They approved Pamela Haynes as Cook II at Clay Elementary and Ashley Smith as Substitute Cook.

The Board signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Community Care of West Virginia to provide Mental Health Services to students from Clay Elementary, Clay Middle and Clay High School. And they approved a Resolution Urging the State of West Virginia to stabilize the Public Employee Insurance Agency (PEIA).



This Week in

West Virginia History

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.

Dec. 11, 1905: "Pare" Lorentz, known as "FDR's filmmaker," was born in Clarksburg. In 1933, Lorentz created The Roosevelt Year: 1933, a pictorial review of




FDR's first year in the White House.

Dec. 12, 1931: Attorney George Daugherty, better known as the comic singer, storyteller, and songwriter "The Earl of Elkview," was born upstairs over a Mannington silent movie house.

Dec. 12, 1942: Internationally known jazz pianist and recording artist Bob Thompson was born in Jamaica, Queens, New York. He studied music at West Virginia State College (now University) and is the house pianist for the Mountain Stage radio program.

Dec. 12, 1953: Chuck Yeager set a speed record by flying two-and-a-half times the speed of sound in a



Bell X-1A. Yeager, who grew up in Hamlin, had broken the sound barrier six years earlier on Oct. 14, 1947.

Dec. 13, 1861: The Battle of Allegheny Mountain, one of the bloodiest conflicts of the Civil War's first year, took place in Pocahontas County.

Dec. 13, 1926: Wheeling radio station WWVA-AM began broadcasting. The 50-watt station operated from the basement of John Stroebel's house for most of its first year. Stroebel was a physics teacher and wireless pioneer.

Dec. 14, 1910: The accidental death of a Chesapeake & Ohio Railway engineer near St. Albans led to the popular train song "Billy Richardson's Last Ride."



Dec. 14, 1857: Coal operator Justus Collins was born. He owned mines at Glen Jean and Whipple, and the octagonal Whipple company store survives today as a local landmark.

Dec. 15, 1879: Roman Catholic Bishop John Joseph Swint was born in Pickens. He was responsible for building many religious institutions in the Diocese of Wheeling (now the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston).

Dec. 15, 1953: Blacksmith Jeff Fetty was born in Spencer and later graduated from Spencer High School. In 2012, he was named one of the world's top metal designers by the International Metal Design Annual—becoming only the sixth American to receive the

Dec. 15, 1967: The Silver Bridge at Point Pleasant collapsed, killing 46 people. The Silver Bridge was opened to traffic on May 19, 1928. The accident led to the passage of legislation for a national bridge inspection and safety program. Dec. 15, 1972: An explosion at a Weirton Steel coke


plant on Browns Island killed 19 men and injured 10 others. It was the worst industrial accident in Weirton's history.

Dec. 16, 1893: Alexander Martin died at the age of 71 in Greencastle, Indiana. Martin was the first president of the Agricultural College of West Virginia, which was renamed West Virginia University at his recommendation in 1868.



Dec. 16, 1897: The last public hanging in West Virginia occurred in Ripley. John F. Morgan had been convicted of murdering Chloe Greene and two of her three children in the Grass Lick area of Jackson County.

Dec. 17, 1957: The J. L. Stifel & Sons calico plant at Wheeling closed. For most of its history, Stifel & Sons produced indigo-dyed prints and drills for clothing manufacturers. At its peak, the plant produced 3.5 million yards of cloth per month.

PUBLIC NOTICE OF CHANGE IN RATES

WITH PROPOSED EFFECTIVE DATES Notice is hereby given that Appalachian Power Company and Wheeling Power Company (the Companies), public utilities, have filed with the Public Service Commission of West Virginia a tariff containing increased rates, tolls and charges for furnishing electric service to approximately 460,921 customers in their service territories in the counties of Boone, Brooke, Cabell, Clay, Fayette, Greenbrier, Jackson, Kanawha, Lincoln, Logan, Marshall, Mason, McDowell, Mercer, Mingo, Monroe, Nicholas, Ohio, Putnam, Raleigh, Roane, Summers, Wayne, Wetzel, and Wyoming. This filing is a replacement of Case No. 24-0669-E-42T that was dismissed by the Commission on September 18, 2024. The rates, tolls, and charges proposed in this filing are in lieu of, and NOT in addition to, those proposed in the dismissed Case No. 24-0669-E-42T.

The proposed increased rates and charges will become effective December 1, 2024, unless otherwise ordered by the Public Service Commission and will produce approximately \$250,493,835 annually in additional revenue, an increase of 14.12 percent. The average monthly bill for the various classes of customers will be changed as follows:

A residential customer using 1,000 kWh would experience a monthly increase over current rates of \$23.74 or 13.54%.

Resale customers of Appalachian Power Company include Old Dominion Electric Cooperative, City of Radford, Craig-Botetourt Electric Cooperative, City of Salem, Kingsport Power Company, Black Diamond Power Company and Virginia Tech Electric. Resale rates are subject to the jurisdiction of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and are not affected by this West Virginia jurisdictional rate filing. The increases shown are based on the averages of all customers in the indicated class. Individual customers may receive increases that are greater or less than average. Furthermore, the requested rates and charges are only a proposal and are subject to change (increases or decreases) by the Public Service Commission in its review of this filing. Any increase in rates and charges will not become effective until authorized and approved by the Public Service Commission. If a hearing is scheduled, notice will be given of the time and

Anyone desiring to intervene should file a written petition to intervene prior to January 31, 2025. Failure to timely intervene can affect your right to participate in the proceedings. Requests to intervene must comply with the Commission's rules on intervention. Anyone desiring to protest should file a written or electronic protest at any time prior to the start of the evidentiary hearing. Customers may also make verbal protest at a public comment hearing scheduled in this case. 
