Clay County Commission holds short February meeting

The Clay County Commission Meeting held on Monday, Feb. 24 was about the shortest and sweetest meeting on record. The commission took care of typical county business approving minutes from the previous meeting, bills, purchase orders, budget revisions, and estate appointments.

Shay Edgar was going to make a presentation to the commission regarding Clay Gymnastics but was a no show, so that item on the agenda was the only item tabled. The commission, reacting to a letter of resignation from Michelle Bodkins, accepted it

Commission President Joyce Johnson briefly left the room while commissioners David Schoolcraft and Duane Legg considered another matter. Joseph Johnson, the interim director of the E911 center, was discussed and appointed as the new Director of E911.

Terry Martin presented invoices totaling more than \$109,000 for the Judicial Annex. He also gave an update on the Big Otter Water Project, saying that the bid was accepted and construction could begin as soon as March of this year.

Donna Salisbury of the Family Center across from the courthouse announced

they got their \$10,000 grant and that this past weekend the two of them unloaded 8,000 pounds of food. Some of that will be taken out of the county for flood relief where it is badly needed.

The next meeting of the Clay County Commission will be at 9 a.m. on March 10, 2025.

The runner-up students also had excellent scores: Caitlyn Holcomb's first grade students at Big Otter Elementary at 98.12%, John Brown's students at Clay County High School studying electricity at 96.25%, Doug Wayne's band students at Clay Middle School at 96.11% and Hannah Hannah's first grade students at Clay Elementary at 95.52%.

This Week in the House of Delegates

As members of the West Virginia House of Delegates continue to implement their new, two-day committee process for deliberating potential bills, many passed the full body with nearly universal, unanimous

A total of 11 bills passed the full House this week, with fewer than half a dozen "nay" votes against any

Members of the House voted to move some food additives out of reach with their approval of House Bill 2354. The measure would eliminate certain food additives from school nutrition programs starting Aug. 1 and would prohibit the sale of food products containing seven specific color additives or food dyes within the state after Jan. 1, 2027.

"We live in a state where many of our elementary school kids are medicated dealing with ADHD or some type of autism symptoms and what the studies have begun to show is that these additives that add no value to the nutritional value, only appearance to it, are actually feeding into hyperactivity and ADHD," said Adam Burkhammer, R-Lewis, and lead sponsor of HB2354. "So as we consider bills on down our list, and one of them has been a really hot topic when we talk about elementary school behavior and how we're going to tackle this, we're tackling it right now: Better foods, better ingredients, better behavior, better for everybody."

Delegates this week also voted to increase the criminal penalties on parents or guardians convicted of child abuse or neglect resulting in injury with House Bill 2123, and House Bill 2047, to largely prohibit cameras or recording devices in the bedrooms and bathrooms of

"We have to do everything we can to protect our kids," said Delegate Doug Smith, R-Mercer, and lead sponsor of HB2123, which has unanimously passed the

full House five out of the past six years. Members of the Energy and Public Works Committee dug deep this week for an intense discussion on utility services and the establishment of microgrids in West Virginia. Their work across two meetings lasted nearly five hours with no legislation on the table.

Various representatives from the energy industry spoke to the economics and other aspects of microgrids in the state during the meeting, allowing the committee to go in-depth on the key question of how West Virginia can continue to lead in energy generation and

economic development. "When we're able to talk through a problem, a concept or an opportunity without anyone in the room trying to defend or fight any specifics of a bill, we have the latitude to learn," said Delegate Clay Riley, R-Harrison. "We got a wholistic view of microgrids in just one meeting, hearing from fuel sources, coal, natural gas, renewables, from the regulated utilities, the mer-

chant utilities and the end users." Riley said the format lends itself to gaining perspective rather than being pigeonholed.

"It helps us all to understand the 'why' behind what someone believes without feeling like we must line up behind one bill or another," he said.

A total of 1,051 bills have been introduced in the House; the last day to introduce bills is March 18. The 60-day, regular legislative session ends at midnight April 12.



West Virginia's skilled trades drive over \$8B in economic impact, new report show

A new report from the Marshall University Center for Business and Economic Research (CBER) highlights the powerhouse economic contributions of the West Virginia Building and Construction Trades (WVBCT), which has generated an estimated \$8.1 billion total economic impact over the 2022/2023 years.

The study, which examines the wages, benefits, and employment supported by West Virginia's skilled construction workforce, underscores the critical role of union trades in the state's economy. The report found that WVBCT members worked an average of 17.4 million hours annually, with wages and benefits contributing \$2 billion in total labor income.

According to Justin Williams, Director of the Affiliated Construction Trades, the research arm of the WVBCT, the findings reaffirm what industry leaders have long known: skilled tradespeople aren't just building infrastructure—they're building West Virginia's economy.

When you invest in skilled trades, you invest in West Virginia's future," Williams said. "This report confirms that our members do more than show up at a job site. We create real economic impact, support local businesses, and ensure every dollar earned is reinvested in our communities." Building a Stronger Workforce, Strengthening Communities Beyond wages, the study found that union-negotiated deductions generate \$58.3 million in additional economic activity. These funds support workforce training, safety programs, and industry advocacy, helping sustain 366 jobs statewide.

These funds help sustain programs like:

- Apprenticeship training centers in South Charleston and Huntington
- Safety and workforce development initiatives in Parkersburg, Wheeling, and Scott Depot

Philanthropic programs supporting veterans and

community service efforts Williams emphasized that these investments set union trades apart, ensuring young

workers have career paths, not just jobs. "Our apprenticeship programs produce the next generation of skilled workers who are debt-free and ready to contribute to their communities," Williams said. "Unlike other industries where training falls on the worker,

we ensure our members have the tools they need to succeed—without raising student loan debt." The study also highlights how WVBCT workers represent nearly half of all construction jobs in West Virginia, with 46% of the industry's workforce coming from union labor. Their impact extends beyond the construction sector, generating growth in retail, healthcare, trans-

portation, and professional services. "Through our research and analysis, it is shown that WVBCT members aren't just workers—they're a driving force behind economic stability and expansion in West Virginia," noted Justin Matthews, Senior Research Associate at CBER.

Williams echoed the sentiment, emphasizing the broader implications. "Every project we take on-from roads and bridges to schools and hospitals-helps move this state forward," he said. "This study shows that investing in our workforce is the key to growing our economy and keeping West Virginia strong." As West Virginia continues to attract significant infrastructure investments, Williams believes that union labor will be key to delivering high-quality projects on time and on budget.

"Whether it's new energy projects, broadband expansion, or commercial development, the demand for skilled labor is only growing," Williams said. "Now more than ever, West Virginia needs a well-trained workforce ready to build the future.

West Virginia History

March 5, 1856: Calhoun County was created from neighboring Gilmer County and named for John C. Calhoun, who served as vice president under John Quincy Adams and Andrew Jackson.



March 5, 1963: Country musician Hawkshaw Hawkins was killed in a plane crash in Tennessee, along with Patsy Cline, Cowboy Copas, and Randy Hughes. Hawkins was born in Huntington.

March 6, 1820: Joseph H. Diss Debar was born in France. Diss Debar was the designer of the Great Seal of West Virginia and the state's first commissioner of immigration.

March 6, 1828: Johnson Camden was born in Lewis County. In 1861, he opened one of the state's first oil wells, in Wirt County, and a refinery in Parkersburg in 1869. He was elected to the U.S. Senate in 1881.



March 6, 1900: A mine explosion at the Red Ash Mine in Fayette County killed 46 men. It was the state's first major mine disaster of the 20th century. Five years later, another 24 men were killed at the same mine.

March 7, 1856: Tucker County was formed from Randolph County and named for Henry St. George Tucker Sr., a Virginia soldier, statesman and jurist.

March 7, 1929: The legislature adopted the official state flag. The state's coat of arms is emblazoned in color in the center. Above the seal is a red ribbon lettered "State of West Virginia," and a wreath of rhododendron surrounds the lower part of the seal. The white field of the flag is bordered on four sides by a strip of

March 7, 1990: West Virginia teachers went on strike after negotiations with the governor's office and legislature failed to produce an agreement on a pay package. Teachers in 47 of the 55 counties were involved in the 11day strike.



March 8, 1926: An explosion killed 19 miners at Eccles in Raleigh County. Ten men were saved by barricading themselves in the mine.

March 8, 1963: The state colors of blue and "old gold" were adopted by the legislature.



March 9, 1832: George Robert Latham was born. At the onset of the Civil War, Latham turned his Grafton law office into a recruiting station, and he led the first Union troops in north-central West Vir-



March 9, 1953: Football player Dennis Harrah was born in South Charleston. In the NFL, Harrah played in 168 games for the Los Angeles Rams (1975-87), was a six-time All Pro, and played in one Super Bowl.



March 9, 1965: President Lyndon Johnson signed the act establishing the Appalachian Regional Commission



March 10, 1910: Ker-

mit McKeever, considered the father of the modern West Virginia state park system, was born near Renick, Greenbrier County.

March 10, 1915: West Virginia's first Rotary International club was established in Wheeling.

March 10, 1920: West Virginia became the 34th state to ratify the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which guaranteed the right of women

March 11, 1847: Boone County was formed from parts of Logan, Kanawha and Cabell counties and named for Daniel Boone. March

11, Putnam County formed from portions of Kanawha, Mason and Cabell counties. It was named in honor of Gen. Israel Putnam, a leading commander at the Battle of Bunker Hill during the Revolutionary War.

March 11, 1856: Roane County was created from parts of Kanawha, Jackson and Gilmer counties. It was named for Judge Spencer Roane, a son-inlaw of Patrick Henry.



Petition to abandon facilities

NOTICE OF FILING AND HEARING

On October 1, 2024, Hope Gas, Inc. (Hope), a public utility, filed with the Public Service Commission of West Virginia a Petition for prior consent and approval to abandon approximately 1,068 miles of pipelines and related facilities, or "Red Lines." On January 15, 2025, Hope filed an Amendment to its Petition stating that Diversified Midstream LLC had agreed to non-binding terms to acquire all of the Red Lines from Hope. The Red Lines proposed to be abandoned are located in the counties of Barbour, Braxton, Calhoun, Clay,

Doddridge, Gilmer, Harrison, Jackson, Kanawha, Lewis, Marion, Mason, Monongalia, Pleasants, Ritchie,

Roane, Taylor, Tyler, Upshur, Wetzel, Wirt, and Wood. The Red Lines and locations are identified in the Petition, which is on file and available for public inspection at the Commission's offices at 201 Brooks Street. Charleston, West Virginia, and on the Commission's website, www.psc.state.wv.us. Hope maintains that from Hope's perspective the pipelines can no longer provide safe, reliable, and

economical gas service to the farm-tap customers or are in jeopardy of being unable to continue providing service. The pipelines are no longer necessary or useful to Hope's provision of service to Hope customers and are uneconomical to continue to operate, maintain, or replace. Hope estimates that the cost to operate and maintain the pipelines will far exceed \$10 million per year, and replacing the lines with new plastic pipelines will cost over \$600 million. Hope does not seek a rate increase in this proceeding.


A hearing will be held by the Public Service Commission, which will begin at 9:30 a.m. on May 14, 2025, in the Howard M. Cunningham Hearing Room at the Commission's offices at 201 Brooks Street, Charleston, West Virginia. The Commission may cancel the hearing for good cause shown. Interested persons intending to attend the hearing should monitor the web docket.

Anyone desiring to protest the relief requested by Hope may file a written protest or request to intervene in Case No. 24-0789-G-PC, online, through the Commission website using the "Submit a Comment" link, by mail addressed to: Executive Secretary of the Public Service Commission at P.O. Box 812, 201 Brooks Street, Charleston, West Virginia 25323, or may appear at the hearing.

Anyone desiring to protest the relief requested by Hope may file a written protest or request to intervene that briefly states the reason for the protest or request to intervene. Requests to intervene must comply with the rules on intervention set forth in the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure and must be filed within ten (10) days following the date of this publication unless otherwise modified by Commission order. The Commission will receive public comments throughout the entirety of the proceeding. 


