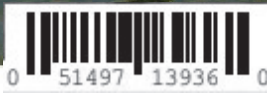

Clay County Schools announces attendance numbers

The flu virus had a huge impact on our student attendance during the 6th school month. It also impacted our teachers and service personnel. Our younger student population was widely affected, but Clay County High School had a 92.98% for the school month, followed by Clay County Middle School with a 92.88%.

Our teachers offer attendance incentives to students who attend regularly, but children who are suffering from the flu would only infect entire classrooms. By teaching our students the importance of good

attendance, we are helping them develop a positive habit that will aid them throughout their lives.

Shawn Krajieski's Clay County High School students continued to lead the county with a 97.50%, followed by Catherine Vaillancourt's students at Clay Middle School with a 94.74%. Dylan Vaughan's third grade students at Big Otter Elementary held third place with a 94.33% and JoAnn Metheney's Pre-K students at Clay Elementary were fourth with a 94.17%.

Clay County Commission announces upcoming dates for Ambulance Service Fee public hearing, Spring Clean-Up dates, and more

The Clay County Commission met in their second regular monthly session on Monday, Mar. 24 at 9 a.m. All three commissioners were in attendance: Commissioner David Schoolcraft; Commission President Joyce Johnson, and Commissioner Duane Legg.

In the last article regarding the Commission, it was erroneously reported that, "Two items were tabled. The E911 Wrecker Rotation Service schedule was tabled because Logan Wrecking had not filed all necessary paperwork by this meeting. They were given five days to finish to remain in rotation." Commissioner Legg stated that this item was not tabled and Logan Wrecking was always in the rotation pending the paperwork, which was met within the deadline. We apologize for any confusion this error caused.

The commission then took care of routine business approving minutes from the previous meeting, approving bills and purchase orders, fixing assessments, appointing administrators, and probating last wills and testaments. They appointed Josh Downy as Clay County's Fiduciary Commissioner for the county. They made the Clay County Board of Health Audited Financial Statements available for public inspection.

The commission also appointed Patricia White as the Clay County Ambulance Service Director.

This Week in The House of Delegates

For the week ending March 28, 2025

Members of the House of Delegates began meeting twice a day this week as the legislative deadline for bills to pass from the House of Delegates to the Senate draws near.

The House overwhelmingly voted Tuesday to pass Senate Bill 199, which was more than a year in the making. The measure would address student behavior intervention and teacher safety. It would

establish guidelines for the re-entry of a student who has been excluded from the classroom or school bus for disorderly conduct. A behavioral plan, developed by a school counselor, school social worker or school psychologist, would need to be developed before the student could return. It also would require the counselor or social worker to participate in a conference and implement a behavioral plan before a student who had been excluded

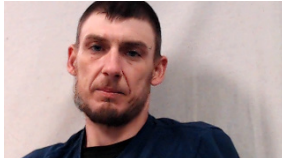

Governor Patrick Morrisey announces collaboration with Trump Administration to bring broadband investments to West Virginia

Governor Patrick Morrisey announced that West Virginia has been granted a 90-day extension to submit its final proposal to the National Telecommunications and Information Administration’s (NTIA) Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) program. This action comes after the Governor met earlier this week with U.S. Commerce Secretary Lutnick to discuss the Trump Administration’s plans to make changes to the BEAD program.

The BEAD program is a partnership between the federal government and states that aims to get all Americans on-line by building the infrastructure necessary to increase the adoption of high-speed internet. Toward that end, West Virginia has been working diligently to develop a proposal that meets the State’s specific needs. President Trump and Secretary Lutnick have stated their intention to implement changes to the BEAD program that give states greater flexibility to tailor the investment of BEAD funding to their unique needs, promote more technology-neutral approaches, and eliminate a variety of administrative mandates on states that do not advance the BEAD

program’s core goals. West Virginia will use the additional time that NTIA has granted the state to work closely with federal partners and West Virginia BEAD stakeholders to expeditiously finalize the proposal in a manner consistent with the program changes being proposed by the Trump Administration. Doing so will best position West Virginia to submit a final proposal that successfully addresses the program’s new focus and brings the desired BEAD funding to the state. This extension will give West Virginia the opportunity to further focus on how BEAD funding can be most efficiently invested and most effectively leveraged to advance the state’s broader economic development goals, including attracting investment from AI hubs, microgrids, and data centers. Getting broadband service across West Virginia is essential to making this happen — allowing the state to evaluate a broader range of technology options, including satellite and mobile wireless technologies, in addition to fiber, will help West Virginia maximize the coverage of high-speed internet.

Reminder: Poultry Exhibition and Sale Events Suspended in West Virginia

As the fair and festival season begins, the West Virginia Department of Agriculture (WVDA) reminds the public that all poultry exhibitions, shows, swaps, meets, and sales at flea markets or auction markets are suspended due to the ongoing threat of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI). This decision follows an extended outbreak of HPAI cases in commercial and backyard poultry operations nationwide. Additionally, federal and state wildlife agencies have identified the virus in wild bird populations through ongoing surveillance, coinciding with the peak spring bird migration in the contiguous United States, which runs approximately between March 1 and June 15. “This is a serious threat to West Virginia’s poultry industry which is the largest overall contributor to our state’s animal industry economy – this action provides added safeguard,” said West Virginia Commissioner of Agriculture Kent Leonhardt. “This nationwide outbreak has been ongoing since 2022, and we have worked closely with poultry industry stakeholders and our interagency partners to prepare for and respond when needed to a West Virginia outbreak.” The WVDA is monitoring waterfowl activity, as these birds naturally carry and spread avian influenza, and will advise of any status changes. West Virginia has had two positive cases of AI in back-

yard flocks, one in Kanawha County in February of 2024 and another in Pocahontas County in January of 2025. For detailed information on HPAI detections in the United States, please refer to Commercial, Backyard, & Wildlife cases in the United States (USDA APHIS). As a reminder, to prevent the spread of the disease, WVDA urges poultry owners to: Limit, monitor, and record any movement of people, vehicles, or animals on or off the farm. Permit only essential workers and vehicles to enter the farm. Avoid visiting other poultry farms or unnecessary travel off the farm. Disinfect equipment, vehicles, footwear, and other items in contact with flocks. Change clothes before entering poultry areas and before exiting the property. Keep flocks away from wild or migratory birds, especially waterfowl. Isolate any ill animals and contact your veterinarian immediately. For additional precautions against the virus, visit the CDC’s Avian Influenza Guidance. Poultry owners should report unusual death loss, a drop in egg production, or any sick domestic birds to WVDA’s Animal Health Division at 304-558-2214.

to them from the Board of Education of \$42,000. Refer to WV Code 8-13-6, 7-15-18 & 7-15-17. If you have questions or concerns please attend the public hearing on Apr. 28 at 10 a.m.”

In other news, Terry Martin was going to provide an update on the Big Otter/Nebo/Walker Road Water Line Extension to the Commission, but was delayed and will possibly present at the next regular meeting.

Commissioner David Schoolcraft noted that the annual

Clay County Cleanup this year will take place on Apr. 26 from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. across from Pierson Lumber as it has been in years’ past. Metal tire rims will be taken, but all tires must be removed from rims before either will be accepted. The County Assessor added that the Annual County Cleanup will precede this on April 22 and April 23, and many county entities, including Clay County High School students, will be picking up trash and bagging it for DOH workers to pick up by Saturday in dump trucks and taken to the Pierson site for collection on the 26th. Commissioner Schoolcraft also announced that the annual county-wide Yard Sale will be held on May 3.

Donna Salisbury with the Family Resource Center announced that they had had their County-Wide Baby Shower and was a success and that they were planning the annual Easter Extravaganza at the Maysel Park for Clay County children on Apr. 12 at 2 p.m. They have plenty of eggs, prizes, and treats, but they are looking for donations of candy.

All week people have been seeing cable trucks working through Clay County, in town and down through Route Sixteen. Commissioner Legg clarified that the trucks in town were Frontier, the trucks out of town were Citinet. This is broadband cable being installed in Clay County.

The Health Department announced that a Health Fair will be held on Apr. 29 from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. Most tests and screenings are free, but an A1C, for example, would cost \$5. If you have a particular test you need done, call the Health Department prior to the fair to see if it is available that day and ask what it would cost if you showed up that morning.

Finally, the Clay County Rail Explorers announced that their tourist season will begin on Apr. 19 and that for the month of April and May they are offering a 35 percent discount for all Clay County residents who want to ride the rails.

The next Clay County Commission regular meeting will be held Tuesday, Apr. 15 at 9 a.m. The second monthly meeting will be on Monday, Apr. 28 at 9 a.m. There will be a special public hearing at 10 a.m. that morning explaining the Special Emergency Ambulance Fee. The public is encouraged to attend all these meetings.

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THIS WEEK IN West Virginia History

April 2, 1900: Marlinton, the county seat of Pocahontas County, was incorporated. The town is generally considered to be the site of the first European-American settlement in the Greenbrier Valley.

April 3, 1755: Frontier scout and “long hunter” Simon Kenton was born in Fauquier County, Virginia. Upon leaving home, Kenton first traveled north through present West Virginia to Pittsburgh and then explored, hunted and trapped through much of the Ohio Valley.



April 3, 1908: Samuel Starks died in Charleston. Starks became the first Black state librarian in the nation when he was ap-

pointed to the position in 1901 by Governor Albert B. White.

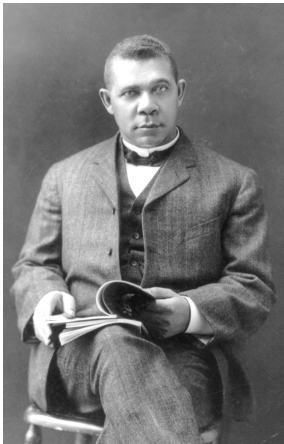
April 4, 1948: Renowned gospel singer Squire Parsons was born in Newton, Roane County. A graduate of Spencer High School and West Virginia Tech, he is best known for his song “Sweet Beulah Land.”



April 4, 1980: Musician Red Sovine died in Nashville. Sovine, born Woodrow Wilson Sovine in Charleston, gained country music fame for his recitations, especially those incorporating sentimental truck-driver themes.

April 5, 1856: Booker T. Washington was born enslaved in Virginia. In 1865, he moved with his family to Malden, in Kanawha County, to join

his stepfather, who had escaped from slavery during the Civil War. He became one of the most influential educators in U.S. history.



April 5, 1920: Gifted hand weaver Dorothy Mayor Thompson was born. She taught generations of people about fiber arts. For her dedication to preserving folklife traditions, she was named a National Heritage Fellow in 2000. She died in Tucker County in 2008.

April 5, 2010: An explosion at the Upper Big Branch Mine in Raleigh County killed 29 workers. Only two men escaped from the mine alive. It was

the state’s worst coal mining disaster since 1968, when the Consol No. 9 Mine at Farmington exploded, killing 78 workers.

April 6, 1938: The Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) established Camp Kanawha in Kanawha State Forest. The CCC removed all the abandoned houses, coal tipples, and other structures no longer in use, and constructed roads, the forest superintendent’s residence, office, maintenance building, and picnic shelters.

April 6, 1944: Guitarist and singer David Morris was born in Ivydale, Clay County. With his brother John on fiddle, the Morris Brothers founded music festivals, supported union and environmental causes and promoted West Virginia traditional music nationwide. He died in 2016.

April 6, 1964: Brad Smith, the former head of Intuit, was born in Huntington and then grew up in Kenova. In 2021, he became the 38th president of his alma mater, Marshall

University.



April 7, 1927: A. James Manchin was born in Farmington. In 1984, the longtime secretary of state was elected state treasurer but soon fell into trouble. With a stock market downturn in 1987, Manchin bore much of the blame when the state lost nearly \$300 million in investments. He died in 2003.

April 7, 1947: Medal of Honor recipient Thomas W. Bennett was born in Morgantown. Believing it was wrong to evade the draft while others had to serve in Vietnam, he volunteered as a noncombatant medic. He was killed

by gunfire while dragging a wounded soldier to safety.



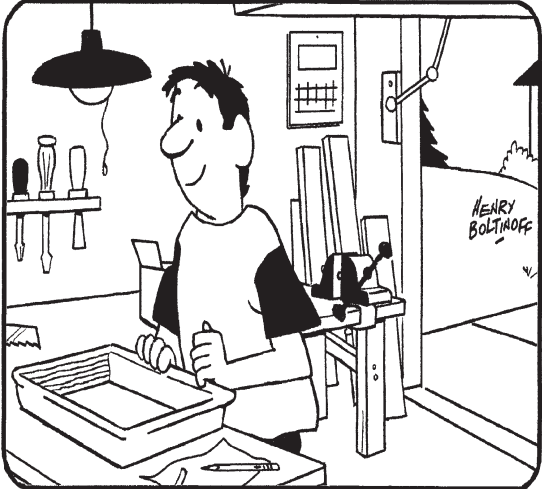
April 7, 2004: Gov. Bob Wise signed legislation that transformed four colleges into universities: West Virginia State, Shepherd, Fairmont State and Concord.

April 8, 1891: The town of Paw Paw was incorporated. Strategically located on the Potomac River, the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad and the C&O Canal, Paw Paw was named for the banana-like paw-paw fruit that grows in the area.

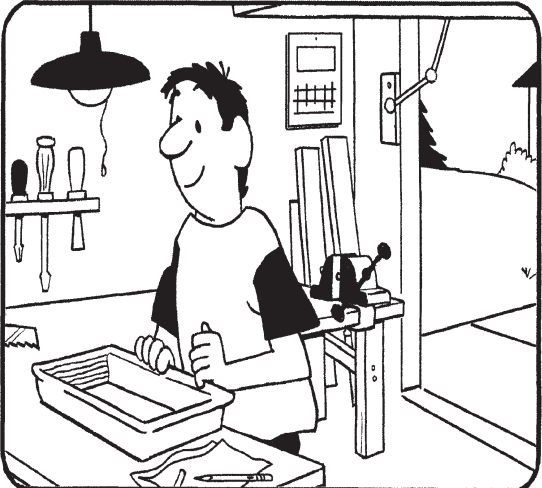
April 8, 1951: An Air National Guard transport plane crashed near Kanawha (now Yeager) Airport, killing 21.

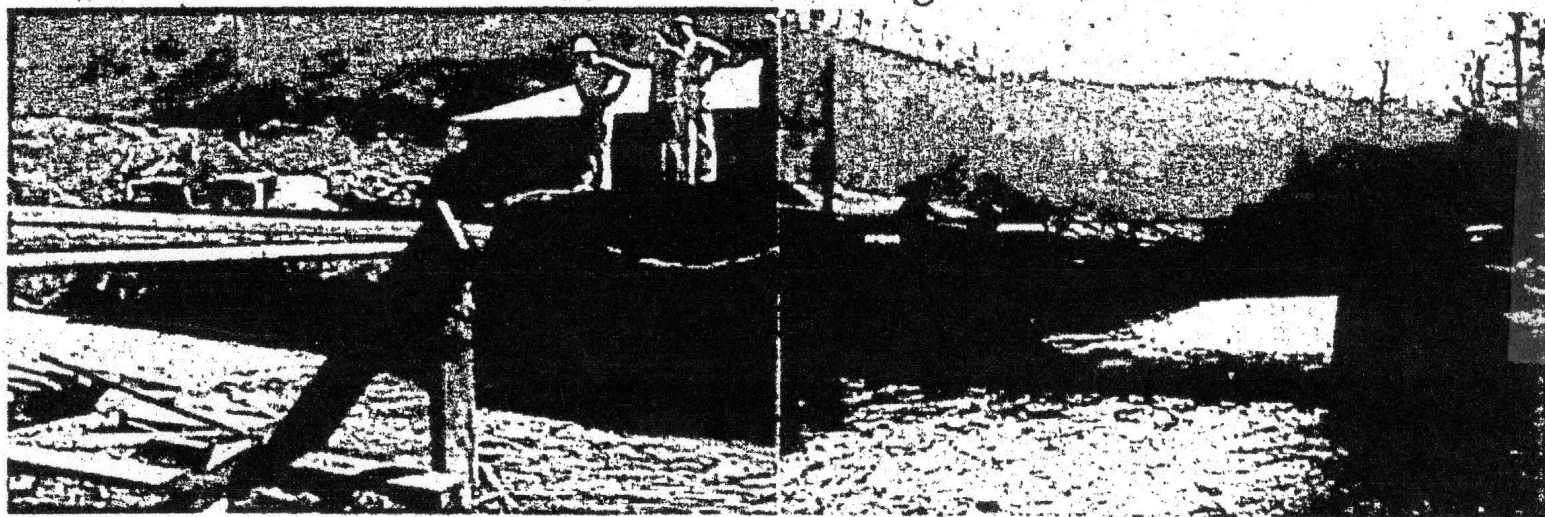

Plans for the coming year are incomplete at this time, but will be announced later.

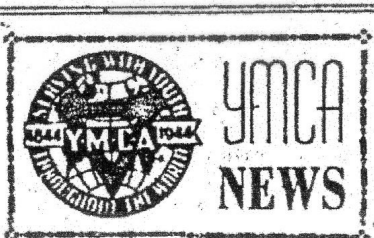
CLUB WOMEN INVITED TO CAMP DEDICATION
