



I suppose it would come as no surprise to you that most of the comments we receive at the Public Service Commission are from people who are complaining about their utility services or the rates they must pay.

We invite the public to comment on any and all cases before the Commission. It certainly is your right, and the Commission

welcomes your comments.

We have multiple ways
by which you can file
comments with the Commission. These include
filing online, by mail, or
physically coming into the
Commission to state your
mind while we are in sesnion

Today, I would like to spend a little time talking with you about what we call formal comments.

These are comments filed in cases that are dock-

eted by the Commission as regular cases, or what we term as formal cases. In those instances, they are given a case number and proceed through our entire process, the details of which I need not get into right now.

In such cases, we publish the information that is involved.

For example, when a sewer company seeks a rate increase, that company must file a petition with us, opening a case. The company tells us what it is seeking. We give that case a number to track it, and it becomes a formal case. We generally then require the utility or petitioning party to publish a notification in your local newspaper about what the company is seeking.

We then invite the public to comment on that case and any other that becomes a formal proceeding

Last year, the public filed a total of 1,467 formal comments with the Commission.

Of that number, 1,168

were in the form of a protest against what the utility was seeking.

Another 299 were fil-

ings made in support of what was being asked of the Commission. The largest number of

complaints - 895 - came

in cases involving electric power rates.

The second-highest category was cases involving

natural gas companies.

I suppose it is not surprising that fuel companies such as electricity and gas have so many complaints. Their rates tend to fluctuate more than others.

Last year we also had 240 informal complaints filed with us. Those are observations of a general nature and are not tied to a specific case before the Commission.

Again, complaints against electric rates led the list at 85, followed by complaints about water service and gas.

The Commission takes close heed of your comments. We file them in each case where we can properly identify what your comments are concerning. We take notice of what you say.

So, please let us know how you feel and what you think. We always like to hear from you.

when they were arriving. He wanted to know when the shrubs were coming down. Clay County Health Director Anna Brown told him volunteers were coming June 20 (West Virginia Day) to dig out the shrubs and wanted to know when the fence would be on site. Joe did not have a date but asked commissioners who was liable if someone got hurt on site during any possible gap before the fence went up. Commissioner Legg offered that because the county still owned the old courthouse property that the county would be the responsible party.

Curiously, this very subject came up at the last Clay County Historical meeting. Jerry Stover said at the meeting that the courthouse and other locations currently house in storage historical documents and artifacts for a possible museum and the site was supposed to be offered to them for that purpose by the commission. Another member cued that another window in the courthouse was recently lost to the ravages of time and weather and more needed to be done to keep maintenance up. Oscar Hutchinson, the society's Parliamentarian said, "The Judicial Annex is being finished even now and will be at least six months before the old courthouse can be closed." That dampened any hope of an early museum.

The commissioners told Joe Lanham it was unlikely someone would be there trespassing at the memorial site. Joe told them a year ago that while they were working on the memorial a young boy came crashing through the shrubs and fell likely twenty to thirty feet to the ground. Fortunately he was not seriously hurt. Commissioner Johnson said they would put up orange plastic

ness approving previous minutes, approving bills and purchase orders, budget revisions, acknowledging erroneous assessments, accepting fiduciary affidavits and waivers of final settlements as presented by the county

The commission reappointed Joyce McLaughlin to the Clay County Board of Health. They accepted bids for projects out at Maysel Park to add top soil to the soccer fields and erect a new multi-purpose building for park picnics and family gatherings.

The commission previously held a public meeting explaining the new Special Emergency Ambulance Fee, and was about to adopt it when someone in the room wanted to speak. Commissioner Legg gave him the opportunity.

Daniel Tanner of Nebo introduced himself. He is a manufacturer in the county and also the owner of Walker Creek Farms. They are a tourist attraction in the county offering cabins and fishing and boating on a number of well stocked ponds. Tourist industries of this type are the target of this 2% tax added to the cost applied to customers

Daniel argued that he is already maxed out on what he can charge. And he is erecting four more cabins increasing his overhead. He argued this is not the time to tax tourists just as Clay is struggling to enact a thriving tourist industry. Commissioner Johnson suggested that 2% seems minimal for a good cause: a needed new emergency vehicle. But Commissioner Legg suggested they table the approval and take another look at it. Commissioner Schoolcraft agreed and the special tax was tabled.

The commission set the next meeting for the day after the fourth Monday of the month to Tuesday, May 27 at 9 a.m. because that Monday is Memorial Day.

May 21, 1853: William M. O. Dawson was born in Bloomington, Maryland, just across the Potomac River from what is now the Eastern Panhandle. In 1905, he became West Virginia's 12th governor.



May 22, 1947: Supreme Court Justice Margaret "Peggy" Workman was born in Charleston. In November 1988, she became the first woman elected to the West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals and to statewide office in West Virginia.

May 23, 1862: In what became known as

the Battle of Lewisburg, Union troops repelled a Confederate advance, killing 38 and wounding 66, while losing only 13 men. Following the battle, Confederate dead lay in the sanctuary of the Old Stone Presbyterian



May 23, 1941: Rod Thorn was born in Princeton. Declared by the legislature a state "natural resource," Thorn attended West Virginia University, where he was an All-American guard. Thorn had a distinguished NBA career as

a player and executive, which included drafting Michael Jordan.





May 24, 1896: Confederate General John Echols died in Staunton, Virginia. Echols served in the Kanawha Valley in 1862 and commanded Confederate forces at their defeat at the Battle of Droop Mountain in November 1863.

May 25, 1903: Industrialist and philanthropist Bernard Patrick McDonough Jr. was born in Texas. Starting with a Parkersburg construction business in the 1930s, McDonough built a Fortune 500 company with operations in hand tools, building materials and barge building. The Bernard McDonough Foundation remains one of the largest private foundations in West Virginia.

May 25, 1937: William H. "Teepi" Kendrick died in Morgantown. Kendrick was a pioneer in West Virginia's 4-H program. He broadened the program to emphasize more than just agriculture, and he was primarily responsible for establishing the state 4-H camp at Jackson's Mill.



May 26, 1895: Athlete Ira Errett "Rat" Rodgers was born in Bethany. He was WVU's first football All-American, lettering in 1915-17 and 1919.

May 26, 1923: Playwright Maryat Lee was born in Kentucky. In 1970, she moved to Summers County and developed her Eco Theater into a national organiza-

WV Board of Education Issues Immediate Intervention of Nicholas and Tyler Counties

The West Virginia Board of Education (WVBE) recognized Teacher Appreciation Month with a special performance by the Rock Branch Elementary School Choir prior to the May meeting in Charleston today. The choir, under the direction of the 2025 West Virginia Teacher of the Year Seth Skiles, performed several selections. Skiles shared the importance of music education and its impact on student success across all content areas.

Special Circumstance Reviews

The WVBE voted to release Berkeley County Schools from the State of Emergency issued in April 2024 at Martinsburg North Middle School. New county and school leadership initiated significant changes that have resulted in improved outcomes at the

The WVBE voted that extraordinary circumstances exist in the Tyler County and Nicholas County school systems and issued the immediate intervention of both counties.

The WVBE voted that the contract of the current Tyler County Superintendent will remain valid through June 30, 2025, and State Superintendent Michele L. Blatt will appoint a county superintendent of schools thereafter.

Additionally, the Board voted to vacate the offices of the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent of Nicholas County. Superintendent Blatt appointed Terry George to fill the county superintendent position.

House Bill 2755

The WVBE voted to pursue litigation of HB 2755 passed during the 2025 Regular Session of the West Virginia Legislature.

The Board supports the ongoing efforts of the State Superintendent in working with the Governor's Office and the West Virginia Legislature in establishing vaccination requirements for West Virginia schools. This issue will be discussed again at the June 2025, WVBE meeting.

The proposed increased rates and charges will become effective March 1, 2026, unless otherwise ordered by the Public Service Commission. The Company proposes implementing the increase in two steps: the first step under Addendum Period 1 with rates effective March 1, 2026, and the second step under Addendum Period 2 with rates effective March 1, 2027. The step 1 increase for water service in Addendum Period 1 is \$31,816,550, or approximately 15.1 percent over present rate revenues, net of DSIC and inclusive of the wastewater to water allocation. The step 2 increase for water service in Addendum Period 2 is \$14,559,483, or approximately 5.7 percent over Addendum Period 2 going level revenues, net of DSIC and inclusive of the wastewater to water allocation. The step 1 increase for wastewater service in Addendum Period 1 is \$767,720, or approximately 13.6 percent over present rate revenues, net of WSIC and inclusive of the wastewater to water allocation. The step 2 increase for wastewater service in Addendum Period 2 is \$685,960, or approximately 10.8 percent over Addendum Period 2 going level revenues, net of WSIC and inclusive of the wastewater to water allocation.

The Company is further proposing a Universal Affordability Discount Tariff for water and wastewater service that includes multiple tiers of discounts based on different levels of household income stated as multiples of Federal Poverty Level ("FPL"). 
