County Commission establishes Committee for Public Transportation

All three county commissioners: David Schoolcraft, Duane Legg, and President Joyce Johnson were present for the final commission meeting for the month of April. By all measures it should have been a short and eventless meeting as the agenda appeared to have only a half-dozen items on it, and of these, most were routine business.

The meeting started out with a joint statement from Sheriff Alan King and his tax collections department. The Sheriff's department will be \$1,100 under budget for the publication of delinquent taxes published in the paper of record as required by law. Further, they will need an additional \$1,300 to print tax statements for mailing. He asked the commission to please meet this need. They told him that presently, like most counties where coal severance income has dried up, they are struggling to meet present needs, including keeping utilities paid on the county courthouse, but they would try to see what they can do.

The Sheriff also told them he was concerned about deputy pay. None had received pay increases in years, and they are losing many deputies to other counties who pay better. He said Clay was at least \$4 an hour under the lowest paying of these counties, he stated that, "And the first of the year, Calhoun will give their deputies another dollar an hour." He added that Clay has lost their last grant for a new sheriff's deputy vehicle because they did not have the funds to meet the ten percent matching fee. They were applying for a new grant for a vehicle of \$150,000 and would need \$15,000 as a matching fee. "I guess I was frustrated when the opioid money came in and I wasn't even asked. You put it all on the jail bill. And that is like putting a drop of water in a bucket."

"You are right," Commission Joyce Johnson agreed, "It is a drop in the bucket. But without putting a dent, even a drop, in that huge debt, it is so high and we have to make some kind of effort, or we will be in trouble and they will pull the plug on it."

All three commissioners expressed regret and frustration that they could not help him at this time.

The commission then took care of routine business: bills, purchase orders, budget revisions, erroneous assessments, and fiduciary appointments as presented by the County Clerk, who was represented at this meeting by Deputy Clerk Judy Scott.

The commission took up a change order for the Judicial Annex, presented by Terry Martin, who was not present, as they wanted to address changes in both plans and costs as they arise during this, the interior construction phase. They hope to have the judicial annex completed and operational by the end of the year.

Two weeks after pulling the Special Emergency Ambulance Service Fee off the agenda to give more time and consideration to it, the Fee was back on the agenda at this very next meeting. This time no representatives from the tourist industry were present. All three commissioners voted to approve the fee. Commissioner David Schoolcraft, after having conversations with a number of people affected by it, offered a compromise. He suggested they make the fee effective in July of 2026, as opposed to this July. Commissioner Duane Legg agreed and the item was amended before being approved.

The final item on the agenda was to create a public transportation board, a committee to explore the implementation of public transportation in the county. Tim Thomas of the Mountain Transit Authority was introduced and spoke briefly on the public transportation proposal.

"We are proposing to come into Clay County and provide public transportation for all. This includes for medical appointments, shopping and more. It would be five days a week. Public transportation is a need, regardless of wheth-

er you have a vehicle or not, you can ride public transportation, it is not dedicated to one individual group. It came up in the meeting a few weeks back that there is a number of people in the county that need transportation. It is going to be a demand response system, and we will provide matched funding. It is also an economic boost to your county. For every dollar that goes in to public transportation through the American Public Transit Association, a study shows over these past few years, five dollars is returned. We will hire people within the community, house their vehicles here, and we will provide the service. I want to thank the commission for allowing us

to come in and speak and get the ball rolling. The state was at the meeting and they are going to provide federal funds so that it is not the burden of the county or the individuals. We are looking at two routes, and we are looking at \$80 to \$100,000 per year, per route and that should be covered by federal monies. The county would need to come up with \$200,000, an investment, really, in your own county," said Thomas.

The committee will begin the task of making it all feasible. There is optimism that Clay County will have an opportunity for economic growth.

The first commission meeting next month is scheduled June 9 at 9 a.m.

-Thursday, July 3: Friday through Sunday lunches will be provided. At Clay Elementary, distribution is from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m., either sent home on the bus or available for pick up. At Clay High School, meals are sent home on the bus ONLY from 1 to 3 p.m.

-Thursday, July 10: Friday through Sunday lunches will be available. Clay Elementary distribution will take place between 10 a.m. and 12 p.m., either sent home on the bus or available for pick up. Clay High School will send meals home on the bus ONLY from 1 to 3 p.m.

-Thursday, July 17: Friday through Sunday lunches will be provided. At Clay Elementary, meals will be sent home on the bus or available for pick up from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. At Clay High School, meals will be sent home on the bus ONLY from 1 to 3 p.m.

-Thursday, July 24: Meals for Friday through Sunday lunches will be distributed. At Clay Elementary, meals will be sent home on the bus or available for pick up from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. At Clay High School, meals will be sent home on the bus ONLY from 1 to 3 p.m.

-Thursday, July 31: Friday through Sunday lunches will be provided. At Clay Elementary, meals will be sent home on the bus or available for pick up from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. At Clay High School, meals will be sent home on the bus ONLY from 1 to 3 p.m.

From the Superintendent

Roughly a week ago, Clay County lost two beloved pillars of the community and longtime champions of its school system. Bobby Stover passed away at the age of 88, and Jim Dawson at 89. Words cannot fully capture the profound impact these two men had on the students. staff, and citizens of Clay County. Nearly everyone who has attended school, worked within the district, or grown up in the area has a cherished memory or story involving either Mr. Dawson or Mr. Stover.

Mr. Jim Dawson served as Superintendent of Clay County Schools for 22 years, a period during which the school system flourished. Under his leadership, Clay County became a model for how a rural district could thrive despite challenges. From 1988 to 1993, three Clay County schools were honored with the prestigious National School of Excellence designation by the U.S. Department of Education. This recognition is reserved for schools that demonstrate exceptional leadership, effective teaching practices, strong community engagement, and high or rapidly improving student achievement. Having not just one, but three schools earn this distinction during Mr. Dawson's tenure is a testament to his visionary leadership and unwavering commitment to education. In honor of his contributions, the Clay County Schools Academic Hall of Fame bears his name, a fitting tribute, not only because he founded the annual awards ceremony, but also because he would be a unanimous first-ballot inductee.

Mr. Bobby Stover began his teaching career at Widen High School in 1958. After graduating from Morris Harvey College in 1964, he joined Clay County High School, where he taught physical education and social studies. Though he coached several sports, including football and baseball, he is best remembered as the longtime wrestling coach. Mr. Stover founded the wrestling program at CCHS and led it for an incredible 37 years. He was twice named AA Wrestling Coach of the Year (1979 and 1980), and during his career, he coached ten state champions and twelve runners-up. In 2004, he was inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame in Stillwater, Oklahoma. Before retiring in 1989, he also served as athletic director and vice principal at CCHS. Even after stepping away from the school system, Coach Stover remained dedicated to mentoring youth and promoting the wrestling program he built. The annual wrestling tournament at Clay County High School, named the Bob Stover Classic, stands as a tribute to his legacy.

Though we are deeply saddened by the loss of these two icons, there is no doubt that Clay County and its school system are far better because of their service, passion, and leadership. The Clay County School System extends heartfelt gratitude to the Dawson and Stover families for sharing these remarkable men with generations of students, educators, and community members.

Bobby Stover

Bobby Monroe Stover, the son of Clarence Monroe and Hazel Leah Whaling Stover, entered into his eternal home with our Lord and Saviour on Monday, May 26, 2025 at the age of 88 years old. Bobby was a member and trustee of the Clay United Methodist Church in Clay, West

Virginia. Born on March 1, 1937, Bobby spent his childhood at his birthplace in Red Dragon, Boone County, WV where he spent his childhood. Eventually, he moved to Clay where he graduated from Clay County High School in 1955. This is where he met the love of his life, Rozella Fay Wilfong. The couple married on December 26, 1959. He attended Marshall College where he was chosen to be on the baseball and wrestling teams.

He started his teaching and

coaching career at Widen High School where he taught from 1958-1963.

In 1964, he finished his Bachelors degree from Morris Harvey College, and in the same year, he moved to Clay County High School to continue teaching physical education and social studies. In 1965, he began coaching football where he had the first football team to have an 8-2 season. Additionally, he coached baseball for 13 years.

Coach Stover, as he was lovingly known, was chosen as "Man of the Year" by the Clay County Youth in 1967. He also started the first wrestling program at Clay County High School. Coach was chosen AA wrestling coach of the year in 1979 and 1980 by the WV Wrestling Coaches Association and then again in the 1987-88 school year. Over the years, he had ten state champions and twelve runners up. He continued to coach wrestling for 37 years.

Coach Stover eventually took over the roles of athletic director and vice principal before retiring from Clay County High School in 1989. However, he returned to coaching in 1990 to keep the wrestling program alive. In 1998, Coach started working with children at Ivydale Elementary School to revive interest in

the program.

In 2004, he was inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame in Stillwater, Oklahoma where a plaque was placed in his honor. He very proudly wore his green jacket that had been awarded to him to commemorate this accomplishment. Coach Stover was fur-

ther honored when Clay County Youth Wrestling named their local tournament the Bob Stover Classic. He loved attending the matches each December and reliving some of his glory days.

Besides wrestling, Coach Stover enjoyed his family, the outdoors, playing golf, fishing, hunting, and spending time with his beloved wife Rozella of 65

He was preceded in death by his sister, Norma Stover Daniel and her husband Frederick Daniel, and son-in-law, Gary Dean Walker. He is survived by his wife, Rozella Wilfong Stover, his daughter Kim Annette Stover Hanna (husband William Franklin Hanna) his son, Brett Monroe Stover, (wife Kara) his sister, Carolyn Stover Young, (husband

Mickey, deceased), brother Jerry, and brother Kent Stover (wife Patricia). 

Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program Vouchers Now Available in West Virginia

Vouchers for the Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) are now available to eligible seniors across the state through their county senior services. The SFMNP is a federally funded initiative that provides low-income seniors with access to fresh, locally grown fruits, vegetables, herbs, and honey from authorized farmers' markets and roadside stands.

Vouchers are valid from June 2 through October 31, 2025, and support both senior nutrition and local agriculture. Seniors must receive vouchers in the county where they reside, but they may redeem them at any participating market statewide.

"The SFMNP supports two vital needs-improving senior nutrition and strengthening our local farming economy," said Commissioner of Agriculture Kent Leonhardt. "We encourage all eligible seniors to take

advantage of this opportunity to access fresh, West Virginia-grown products."

Each eligible senior will receive a booklet of vouchers worth \$30, containing three \$10 vouchers. Vouchers can be redeemed at participating farmers' markets and farm stands across the state. A list of authorized locations is available on the West Virginia Department of Agriculture (WVDA) website and through local se-

Participants must be 60 years of age or older and meet income eligibility guidelines. To apply, seniors should contact their local senior center or county ag-

Appalachian Power to use helicopters to maintain some power line rights-of-way

June 5, 2025

Weather permitting, Appalachian Power (APCo) will begin an aerial maintenance program this week. This program is necessary for maintaining the rightsof-way for some power lines in West Virginia, and it will be executed by applying herbicides via helicopter.

Lines scheduled for maintenance in West Virginia include Bright Coal Company Tap 46kV in Clay County. A transmission line on wood structures beginning at a tap off the Belva-Clendenin 46kV line, running west approximately one mile and ending at a dead end.

"The company generally makes aerial maintenance applications only in less populated areas where terrain and accessibility make it difficult for ground-based crews to safely clear rights of way," said Christopher Hoffman, utility forester. Rights of way in populated areas, as well as near parks, ponds and other sensitive areas, are maintained by other means.

Herbicides used by AEP and Appalachian Power have been registered for use on rights-of-way by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the West Virginia Department of Agriculture (WVDoA). Herbicides used are imazapyr, metsulfuron methyl, fosamine, triclopyr, aminocyclopyrachlor and aminopyralid; the manufacturer, colleges and governmental and independent research laboratories have extensively tested each. Questions concerning these herbicides may be addressed to the EPA and the WVDoA.

As part of APCo's commitment to safety, helicopter pilots conduct thorough visual checks of all areas to

Right-of-way maintenance agreements between APCo and landowners are available to landowners who prefer to accept responsibility for clearing the right-of-way crossing their property instead of the company's aerial application of herbicides. The agreement compensates the landowner by an amount equivalent to the cost of aerial herbicide application, provided the work meets APCo's specifications.

Customers with questions about the company's aerial maintenance program can call a toll-free number (1-800-642-3622) for information. Customers also can write for information at Appalachian Power, Attn: Transmission Forestry, 346 Raymond Peak Way, Hurricane, W.Va., 25526.

Residents who have questions about the program or who want to alert the company to the location of sensitive areas near power lines, such as springs, wells, streams, lakes, ponds, orchards, crop areas, gardens, pastures, meadows, year-round dwellings, public recreation areas and Christmas tree farms, should also contact the company. To ensure accurate reporting of the sensitive areas, provide the number of the nearest pole or tower. These numbers are posted on utility poles and one leg of utility towers.

After the maintenance program begins, 24-hour telephone service at the above number will provide information daily on locations scheduled for maintenance.

Complaints about possible damage resulting from herbicide applications should be made by contacting Appalachian Power at its toll-free number or the above address. Complaints also may be directed to the WVDoA, Pesticide Regulatory Programs Unit, which can be reached in Charleston at (304) 558-2209.

This Week in West Virginia History

June 4, 1971: A former Boone County coal miner hijacked a plane that had flown out of Charleston and demanded the plane be flown to Israel. After the plane landed at Dulles Airport in Washington, the man allowed the passengers and flight attendant to dismount, but he held the pilots and flight engineer at gunpoint for hours before they disarmed him. It is the only documented hijacking in state history.



June 4, 1975: Clark Kessinger died in St. Albans, Kanawha County. Kessinger was among the most prolific and influential fiddlers of the 20th

century, and one of West Virginia's most important traditional musicians.

June 5, 1859: A great frost killed crops in the Preston County fields. The fields were replanted with hardy buckwheat, which was successful and became a staple crop, celebrated in the annual Buckwheat Festival in Kingwood.

June 5, 1915: Four young people were killed at Rock Springs in Hancock County when the Old Mill ride caught fire.



June 6, 1919: Historian Otis Rice was born in Hugheston, Kanawha County. Rice was named

West Virginia's first Historian Laureate in 2003.

June 6, 1979: One of the oddest events in West Virginia's history, the "pot plane" crash, occurred on June 6, 1979. An old Douglas DC-6 cargo plane carrying 12 tons of marijuana plummeted over a hillside at Kanawha (now Yeager) Airport in Charleston. Hundreds of bales of marijuana spewed from the plane before it caught fire. Onlookers looted the marijuana, and law enforcement officials struggled for days to dispose of it all.

June 6, 1989: During the Pittston strike, about 60 miners embarked on a four-day march from Logan County to Charleston, retracing the path of the 1921 Armed March on Logan.

June 7, 1899: Congresswoman Elizabeth Kee was born in Radford, Virginia. She became West Virginia's first female member of Congress in 1951.

June 7, 1905: Fiddler "French David Frank Carpenter was in Clay County. A notable member of a famous musical family, he learned most of his music directly from his father, Tom, the "fiddling preacher." He influenced the great fiddler and fellow Clay Countian Wilson Douglas likely more than any other individual.







Thousands of West Virginians could lose SNAP in federal cuts. State politicians haven't offered solutions.

A federal cost-sharing proposal for food stamps could cost West Virginia from \$60 to \$100 million. State legislative leaders said it's too early to talk about how they would pay for it.

As Congress moves toward cutting crucial funding that helps West Virginians — many of them elderly or disabled or children — get the food they need, state elected officials so far have no plan to reduce the harm.

Under a plan passed by the U.S. House of Representatives last week, funding for SNAP, formerly known as food stamps, and Medicaid would be cut to pay for tax cuts that disproportionately go to the wealthy.

On the day the bill passed the House, Sen. Amy Klobuchar, a Democrat from Minnesota, who sits on the Senate Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry Committee, which oversees SNAP legislation made a statement.

"House Republicans are pulling the rug out from under millions of families by taking away federal assistance to put food on the table," she said.

Sen. Jim Justice, who sits on the same committee, did not respond to questions about the legislation.

Since its inception, SNAP has been 100% paid for by the federal government

Under the current proposal, states would be required to chip in 5% to 25% of the cost, based on their rate of errors, meaning percentage of overpayments or underpayments of benefits. The changes would go into effect in October 2028.

The U.S. Senate is expected to start working on the bill when it returns to business on June 2. While moderate Republicans and hard-nosed deficit watchers are at odds over cuts to Medicaid, cuts to SNAP haven't been a big topic of conversation.

Sen. Shelley Moore Capito, who sits on the powerful Senate committee that decides how federal dollars are spent, said the cost-sharing arrangement was news to her during a press call last week.

"I am not sure how I feel. I don't know how it would impact the state of West Virginia if it was a match," Capito said. "I need to do my home-

work on that."

Excluding COVID years — when West Virginia expanded SNAP to more families with children — the program has on average over the last decade served 280,000 people in the state at a cost of \$484 million per year. However, the average payment error rate over that same time period would result in the state paying 15% of the cost, which equals roughly to \$72.6 million to keep assistance going to the same number of people.

The amount states pay will vary from year-to-year, because the error rate changes. For instance, the state's error rate in 2023 was higher than it's been in the last decade, and under the new proposal, it would result in a 25% cost share or around \$141 million.

In addition to sharing the cost of the assistance, the bill would require states to take on more of the program's administrative costs.

But the governor's office was already projecting about a \$400 million shortfall in the next budget year, and that's without the additional cost of food stamps.

"This is a brand new problem for

the state," said Sean O'Leary, a budget analyst for the West Virginia Center on Budget and Policy.

Ideally, O'Leary said the state could raise taxes to pay for the new cost. But given the income tax cut passed on the state level and vows by the state's Republican controlled Legislature to avoid raising taxes, that's highly unlikely.

Instead, lawmakers could keep the same amount of people on SNAP by cutting other areas of the budget, like pay raises for employees or other social service programs, O'Leary noted. Or they could change eligibility requirements and reduce the number of people who get assistance.

And it's not just beneficiaries who could lose out.

For every one dollar spent in SNAP, the United States Department of Agriculture estimates \$1.50 is put back into the economy. That means SNAP spending can generate between \$700 and \$800 million in the state's economy per year, either through people spending their food stamps, or being able to pay for other goods because they don't have to spend cash on a certain amount of food.

But even with potential budgetary and economic losses coming down the line, state leaders have been mum about the changes.

In a joint statement, West Virginia House Speaker Roger Hanshaw and Senate President Randy Smith said they are monitoring what's happening in Congress and staying in communication with decision makers in D.C.

"Any discussions of additional fiscal implications are premature," the politicians said.

House Finance Chair Vernon Criss said he's waiting to see what "the sausage factory" turns out in D.C, too.

Gov. Patrick Morrisey, who is charged with introducing the framework of a budget every year, did not reply to questions. Not that SNAP isn't on his mind – last week, he announced that he was asking the federal government to stop West Virginians from using SNAP money for pop.

But up in D.C., West Virginia's two U.S. Representatives, Carol Miller and Riley Moore, were busy congratulating themselves in helping move the bill forward. Amid the praise for tax cuts, neither said a word about the threat to SNAP.
