Raleigh judge rules against West Virginia school board in vaccine lawsuit

Froble grants plaintiffs may attend school with religious exemption to state's vaccine law

BECKLEY — Dealing another legal victory to Gov. Patrick Morrisey and his executive order, a Raleigh County judge on Thursday granted a preliminary injunction allowing three Raleigh County students to attend school with a religious exemption to the state's strict compulsory school vaccination law.

Circuit Judge Michael Froble ruled that the state's mandatory school vaccine law is invalid without a religious exemption to the law. If there were any question, he said, the state's Equal Protection for Religion Act of 2023 makes it clear the law should make exceptions for religious beliefs.

The lawsuit was brought on behalf of Miranda Guzman, Amanda Tulley and

The Clay County Middle and High School TSA teamsrecently traveled to Nashville, Tennesseeto compete in the Technology Student AssociationNational Competition. They earned the right to compete there based upon their success at the WV State Competition held in March. At nationals, Clay High earned a third-place trophy, top ten finalist honors in three events, a top twelve semifinalist spot, and a top twenty-four semifinalist spot. The Middle School came home also with a third-place trophy and a top ten finalisthonor.

At Nationals, more than 10,000 students competed in over 70 events. Thirty-six states were represented, and students came from as far away as Germanyand American Samoa to compete. The conference theme, Tune InTo Technology, aligned with TSA's competitions, activities and programs that provide members with enhanced exposure to topics in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM); opportunities for personal and leadership development; and career awareness.

For CCHS, Keira Asbury and Avery Brouillard placed third in the nation in

Forensic Science. In this event, participants take a test of basic forensic science to qualify for the semifinal round of competition. Semifinalists examine a mock crime scene and demonstrate their knowledge of forensic science through crime scene analysis, with the findings synthesized in a written report/analysis. Also, for CCHS, Jaxon Brown placed fourth in Music Production; Ariel Dobbins and Lillian Starcher placed sixth in Children's Stories; and Ariel Dobbins and Sawyer Dobbins placed tenth in STEM Mass Media. Additionally, Parker Taylor was a top twelve semifinalist in Extemporaneous Speaking. Finally, Jaxon Brown, Alivia Gilliland and Morgan Payton were top twenty-four semifinalists in Geospatial Technology. Asbury, Brouillard, Brown, Gilliland, and Starcher were also recognized for earning the Gold Achievement Award. To earn the award, the studentsengaged in enumerated activities relating to service leadership, STEM immersion, and personal and professional development.

For the Middle School, Gunner Dobbins and Hannah Gandee earned a thirdplace trophy in Challenging Technology



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

WV Board of Education Statement on Raleigh County Circuit Court Decision

On July 24, a decision was issued by Raleigh County Circuit Court granting a preliminary injunction to three Raleigh County students allowing them to attend public school without required vaccinations. This court's ruling was based on the families' claims of religious objections.

While the West Virginia Board of Education is disappointed by the ruling, members of the board will decide

next steps in the near future. This injunction is limited in scope and applies only to those named in this lawsuit. It will have no impact on other students in Raleigh County or throughout the state.

As students prepare for the upcoming school year, families are encouraged to comply with West Virginia's compulsory vaccination laws (W. Va. Code § 16-3-4) as required by legislative statute.

Utilities required to file notification plans

We are in the process of having all utilities file plans with the Public Service Commission on how they will notify customers about outages in service.

Utilities across the state have been given a 30-day deadline to file those plans with the Public Service Commission.

The Legislature passed a bill this year to require each utility to tell us how it will alert its customers in cases of planned or unplanned outages.

The bill was signed into law by Governor Morrisey on April 29.

They must tell us how exactly they are going to let customers know of these planned and unplanned events.

Furthermore, they must tell us what they intend to include in these messages, what content and terms they will use.

They must also estimate the duration and end of the outage.

This legislative effort dovetails precisely with an or-

der issued by our Commission last October fourth.

In that order, we required all cable and nonmotor carrier utilities to have a process in place to notify customers about outages. We said the notifications must be made by email or text.

We also required those utilities to update their customer lists.

The new law expands on what the Commission ordered to include all utilities and requires more detailed plans.

The loss of utility services of any type is a troubling event. And this is particularly true in a mountainous and forested state like West Virginia. We have a great deal of outages caused by storms, animals, and even human error.

It is frustrating to be at the end of the utility line and

to be left completely in the dark, so to speak, about when the lights are going to come back on.

This new law resulted from a severe service interruption that involved two utilities on Charleston's West Side. Hundreds of customers for a time were without two vital utility services.

We're trying very much in this to get ahead of those problems and be prepared in the future.

The plans should be available for review in August on our website.

This Week in **West Virginia History**

July 30, 1973: The Frederick Hotel in downtown Huntington closed to transient trade. After it was built in 1905, it was touted as the most elegant hotel between Pittsburgh and Cincinnati.

July 31, 1932: Actor Theodore Crawford "Ted" Cassidy was born in Pittsburgh but was raised in Philippi. He was best known for his role as Lurch on The Addams Family.



Aug. 1, 1921: Baldwin-Felts detectives shot and killed Sid Hatfield and Ed Chambers as they approached the McDowell County Courthouse in Welch. As Matewan's police chief, Hatfield had assisted the United Mine Workers' campaign to organize Tug Fork miners. The assassinations set in motion an armed miners' march ending with the Battle of Blair Mountain.



Aug. 1, 1940: Justice Franklin Cleckley was born in Huntington. In 1994, he became the first Black justice to serve on the West Virginia Supreme Court. The Supreme Court once referred to Cleckley's handbooks on evidence and criminal procedure as "the bible for West Virginia's judges and attorneys."



2, 2009: Golfers Sam Snead and Bill Campbell became the first two inductees into the West Virginia Golf Hall of Fame.

Aug. 3, 1897: Fire destroyed much of down-Lewisburg. town

Aug. 4, 1897: Musician William Jennings "Billy" Cox was born near Charleston. Cox, known as the "Dixie Songbird," ranked as one of West Virginia's premier country music vocalists and songwriters during

1930s.

Aug. 4, 1930: Lewisburg set the record for the state's hottest temperature ever: 112. Six years later, Martinsburg would tie it.

Aug. 5, 1958: Jennings Randolph defeated former governor William Marland in the Democratic primary for U.S. Senate. Randolph soon became the senior senator from West Virginia and served for 26 years.

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

On May 30, 2025, Hope Gas, Inc. (Hope) filed its Annual Pipeline Replacement and Expansion Program (PREP) Filing with revised PREP Rates, pursuant to W.Va. Code § 24-2-lk, which authorizes the Public Service Commission of West Virginia (Commission) to approve cost recovery of projects to replace, upgrade, and expand natural gas utility infrastructure that are deemed to be just and reasonable and in the public interest.

In its PREP Filing, Hope projects PREP capital investment for calendar year 2026 of \$115.5 million, as part of its General Program (core distribution system) and Gathering Program (gathering facilities), under its multi-year plans. The PREP Filing also contains a true-up for actual versus projected 2024 calendar year PREP capital investment activity for both the General Program and the Gathering Program. The PREP covers several categories of plant asset replacements and improvements, including mains, service lines, regulator stations, and other plant equipment. These plant investments are proposed to be made in Hope service territories throughout the State. These projects are identified in the PREP Filing, which is on file and available for public inspection at the Commission's offices at 201 Brooks Street, Charleston, West Virginia.

Hope proposes to recover costs associated with these investments through an increment within the fixed or volumetric, base rate component of its rates depending on the applicable rate schedule under which service is rendered, to be effective on November 1, 2025. Hope projects that the average monthly bill for the various classes of customers will be changed on November 1, 2025, as follows:



Carley Hunter, whose children were issued a religious exemption to the school vaccine mandates by the state Department of Health.

All states require students attending school to be vaccinated against certain diseases. West Virginia had been one of only five states that allowed only medical exemptions to those requirements. Morrisey issued an executive order in January requiring the state to allow religious exemptions to its school vaccination laws. The order is based on the 2023 Equal Protection for Religion Act. State lawmakers this year did not pass Senate Bill 460, which would have established those exemptions in state code.

The West Virginia school board voted not to comply with Morrisey's executive order and to instruct county boards of education to require all vaccines and allow only medical exemptions to those vaccination requirements.

"The court finds that only requiring school kids in the public school to have vaccinations, but not requiring adults and other people and having learning pods and having athletic activities that does occur really diminishes any kind of argument that compelling state interest in only making sure that children in the public school or attending public schools are receiving their mandatory vaccinations, and that they are disregarding their rights for exercising their religion," Froble said.

Speaking for Guzman and the other plaintiffs, attorney Chris Weist argued that barring the students from attending school would violate the state's Equal Protection for Religion Act and cause

them irreparable harm.

"These plaintiffs are being forced to either give in to the state's demands of vaccination, contrary to their religious beliefs, or not send their kids to school, which is a guarantee under the West Virginia Constitution for the West Virginia Supreme Court, a fundamental right.," he said. "So I think we do have unquestionably a substantial burden on these plaintiffs' religious exercise."

Chris Smith, an attorney for the state Board of Education, said the governor's reading of the Equal Protection Act is too broad. The Legislature is required to name bills according to what they do, he said. Lawmakers did not contemplate the Equal Protection for Religion Act amending the state's school vaccination laws, he said.

The judge's ruling applies to only the three students bringing a lawsuit against the state and Raleigh County board of educations, but is likely to have broader implications. Froble said the next step in the case should be a hearing on a permanent injunction in the case, preferably set in the next 14 days. That hearing might not happen if parties in the case decide to file a written appeal, he said.

Froble said he purposely didn't take up the issue of whether Morrisey's executive order is legally valid, though he said he would take it up at a future hearing on the permanent injunction.

Speaking to reporters after the judge's ruling, state School Board President Paul Hardesty said he was disappointed and said there is a lot to digest in the ruling with the rest of the school board.

"For our counties that are now scratching their heads trying to figure out what to do, the department, as we speak, is working on putting out a statement to all 55 counties as well as the press, and we'll have that by the close of business today,"

In the school board's statement later Thursday, it reiterated that Thursday's ruling is limited and will not apply to other families in Raleigh County or throughout the state. It said the school board would decide the next steps in the coming days.

"As students prepare for the upcoming school year, families are encouraged to comply with West Virginia's compulsory vaccination laws (W.Va. Code § 16-3-4) as required by legislative statute," the board wrote.

Health care organizations, including the West Virginia Immunization Network, the state Nurses Association and the West Virginia Medical Association, issued a group statement Thursday commending the school board for "continuing to follow state code" and stressing the importance of maintaining high vaccination rates.

The organization West Virginia Families for Immunizations said it was disappointed in the ruling, and that it means West Virginia's children will have less protection from preventable diseases when school starts.

"West Virginia has a proud track record of maintaining high vaccination rates, and the longstanding law that allows only medical exemptions for school required vaccines plays a role in that success,"

they wrote. "For students and teachers who have legitimate medical reasons to forgo vaccination, their lives are now at risk as we see the resurgence of diseases once thought eliminated. We applaud the Board of Education for their strong stance on this issue, and we will continue to work to support them going forward."

In a statement Thursday, Morrisey said the ruling is "another legal victory in the fight for religious freedom.

Kanawha County Circuit Judge Kenneth Ballard on Wednesday dismissed on procedure grounds a separate lawsuit filed by the American Civil Liberties Union of West Virginia and Mountain State Justice over Morrisey's executive order. Ballard agreed with an attorney for the state that the ACLU failed to give the state 30-day notice of the legal action, as required by law.

"No family should be forced to choose between their faith and their children's education, which is exactly what the unelected bureaucrats on the State Board of Education are attempting to force West Virginians to do," Morrisey said in his statement. "My administration will continue to grant religious exemptions to compulsory vaccine requirements and uphold West Virginia's Equal Protection for Religion Act until this case is fully settled."




