## Public bus service comes to Clay County

Clay County now has a public bus service thanks to Tim Thomas, a former Clay County resident who now serves as CEO of the Mountain Transit Authority. County Commissioner Duane Legg hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony on Wednesday morning of Aug. 6 where MTA had a bus at the courthouse, and even a cake for anyone who wanted to participate.

"I am able to bring public transit into a community that there is a need. We are community oriented as a transit authority," Tim says, "And just to bring it here it's just a little bit of pride." Tim would give those in attendance a ride, driving riders himself to Go-Mart and back. The bus, which is distinctive, has twelve comfortable seats. "Twelve and two," Mike says from the driver's seat, "twelve seats and space for two additional wheelchairs." There is a wheelchair lift in the rear of the bus.

And while the bus service is designed to carry people to appointments, service contracts under MotiveCare state the service is also for any residents, regardless of status, age or anything else, who would love to take advantage of transportation.

Transportation to where?

"We are based out of Summersville, and we take busses into Summersville, Braxton, Fayetteville, or Montgomery. In Montgomery they can meet KRT busses into Kanawha County and beyond." Mike says. For those with appointments, work, or for just shopping, the service is open to all riders.

The schedule is a work in progress. Medical demand is separate from regular public bus service. Right now, they will have one bus headed north to

Braxton County and one bus southeast to Gauley Bridge. They have established a meet up with KRT in Montgomery but could in the future, if demand and negotiations with KRT are fruitful, meet KRT at Elkview at their schedule. That would open even more opportunities for Clay County residents in that region.

Commissioners Joyce Johnson and Duane Legg were present as well as Donna Salisbury, who has been a big supporter of the project. WSAZ Television News was also present and filmed the ribbon cutting.

This is an opportunity for local groups to schedule shopping trips, or perhaps lunch at Shoney's in Summersville or even Chinese buffet at OK Chinese restaurant in the Oak Hill Shopping Center. And now Wal-Mart shopping is assessable to senior groups with a comfortable ride with friends there and back.

# County Commission approves appointees to boards, hires employees for Ambulance Service

The last meeting of the Clay County Commission for July was short and sweet. Commissioners Joyce Johnson and David Schoolcraft were in attendance, and Commissioner Legg was absent. In fact, because of so many anticipated commission activities in the month of August, the commission adopted only one meeting date in August. Monday, Aug. 18, is the only date scheduled for their next regular meeting. Commissioner Johnson said that regular business would continue, including meeting county payroll, and regular bills and purchases.

The July meeting was mostly regular business: approving minutes from the previous meeting; bills and purchase orders; budget revisions; erroneous assessments; fiduciary appointment as presented by the county commission, affidavit, waivers of final settlement, and last will and testaments.

There was a presentation expected by Rhona VanKirk of West Virginia Goes Purple, but she was unable to attend.

The commission appointed Shawna Taylor to the Parks and Recreation Board, and Donna Salisbury to the Business Development and Authority Board.

They accepted the Sheriff's Settlement for the period of July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025.

The commission hired two new employees for the Ambulance Service. Both men passed their screening, and will begin immediately as EVOC Drivers at \$11

### **Appalachian Power warns customers** about scam attempts during heat waves

Appalachian Power (APCo) urges customers to be on high alert for utility-related scams with temperatures soaring across the region. Scammers often take advantage of extreme weather conditions to prey on vulnerable individuals, using high-pressure tactics to demand immediate payment, threaten disconnection or claim to partner with APCo to lower your bill through solar installation.

APCo reminds customers that it will never:

- Call and demand immediate payment using prepaid cards, gift cards or digital payment apps like CashApp, Zelle or Venmo (scammers often spoof caller ID to appear as if they are calling from APCo, adding to the deception).
- Visit a customer's home or business to request payment to avoid service disconnection or attempt to sell products, such as solar panels. Anyone claiming to represent APCo in this way should be considered suspicious.

"We typically see a rise in scam activity during weather extremes because scammers know people are more anxious about losing power," said Alan Bragg, director of customer service and business development. "They specifically target senior citizens, business owners during high-traffic times, non-native English speakers, and others who may be less likely to question suspicious calls."

APCo encourages all customers to remember the following tips:

• Never give out personal or banking information to

an unverified caller.

- Hang up and call APCo at the number on your bill to verify any suspicious contact.
- If someone comes to your door claiming to represent APCo, ask to see their official identification.
- Report scam attempts to your local police department and APCo.

"Customers who are unsure about the status of their account are encouraged to check through our website or free mobile app," said George Porter, director of communications. "Additional scam prevention resources are also available online at AppalachianPower.com/Stop-Scams."

"Education and awareness are the best tools we have to fight back against these types of fraud," Bragg added. "We ask our customers to stay cautious, and when in doubt, call us directly."

## This Week in West Virginia History

Aug. 13, 1900: Railroad mogul and founder of Huntington, Collis Potter Huntington, died. Raised in poverty, Huntington went west when gold was discovered in California. There he became rich, not from mining but by selling supplies to miners.

Aug. 13, 2018: The House of Delegates adopted articles of impeachment against all sitting justices of the state Supreme Court of Appeals.

Aug. 14, 1894: Entertainer Ada Beatrice Queen Victoria Louise Virginia "Bricktop" Smith was born at Alderson. She performed in Paris in the 1920s and opened her own clubs, the Music Box and Bricktop's, a favorite hangout of songwriter Cole Porter.

Aug. 14, 1914: Five burglars robbed the Glen Alum Coal Company payroll in Mingo County. In the chase that followed, eight men-including all the robbers-were killed. All but \$20 of the stolen blood-stained \$7,000 was recovered.

Aug. 14, 1941: Singer Connie Smith was born in Indiana but was raised in Summers County. She became the first female country artist to have a number one record for eight weeks. Dolly Parton once said, "There are only three great singers: Connie Smith, Barbra Streisand, and Linda Ronstadt. The rest of us are just pretending."



Aug. 14, 1943: Astronaut Jon Andrew McBride was born in Charleston. McBride became an astronaut in 1979 and piloted the space shuttle Challenger on an eight-day mission in 1984.

Aug. 15, 1867: The cornerstone was laid for the Fairmont Branch Normal

School (now Fairmont State University).



Aug. 15, 1906: The Niagara Movement began a five-day meeting at Storer College in Harpers Ferry. The organization was founded the previous year by a group of Black intellectuals, including W. E. B. Du Bois.

Aug. 15, 1946: The first FM radio station in the state, WCFC of Beckley, began regular programming.

Aug. 16, 1851: William Hope "Coin" Harvey was born in Buffalo, Putnam County. Harvey, a social reformer, was nominated for president of the United States by the Liberty Party in 1932.

Aug. 16, 1913: Helen Holt was born in Illinois. In 1957, Governor Cecil Underwood appointed her to fill the secretary of state's unexpired term, making her the first woman to hold statewide office in West Virginia.



Aug. 17, 1944: Staff Sergeant Stanley Bender of Fayette County earned the Medal of Honor in southern France. Bender rushed through intense machine gun fire and grenades, and knocked out two German machine guns with rifle fire. His actions inspired the rest of his company to take out a German roadblock, kill 37 enemy soldiers, and take 26 prisoners.

Aug. 17, 1946: Oldtime musician Dwight Diller was born in Rand but spent most of his life in Pocahontas County, documenting, teaching, and performing traditional

Aug. 17, 1976: The National Mine Health and Safety Academy opened at Beaver, near Beckley. The academy, located on a 76-acre campus, is the world's largest educational institution devoted solely to safety and health in mining.

Aug. 18, 1749: Explorer Celoron de Blainville buried a leaden plate at Point Pleasant, after burying another at Wheeling, to claim the Ohio Valley for France.

# West Virginia will finally study how to protect communities after deadly 2016 floods

Gov. Patrick Morrisey announced his office would fund two studies aimed at identifying projects to mitigate damage from flood events. This includes a study of the Kanawha River Basin, which was originally requested almost a decade ago.

Nearly a decade after the deadly 2016 floods, West Virginia officials are moving forward with a study to look at flood mitigation measures across the Kanawha River Basin.

Last month, Gov. Patrick Morrisey announced that the state will work with the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers on a study that thoroughly examines flood risk management strategies across 20 West Virginia counties, most of which were impacted by the June 2016 floods.

Morrisey's announcement comes nearly four years after the study was initially funded by the federal government.

West Virginia Sen. Shelley Moore Capito requested the study in 2016, following the deadly flooding that swept across the state and left 23 dead. Federal funding for the project was later secured in the 2021 Bipartisan Infrastructure Law.

But these types of studies require the state and federal government to split the cost equally. And the state didn't put forward its \$1.5 million share for the study until last month, indicated by Morrisey's July announcement.

In addition to the money for the Kanawha River Basin study, the governor's office also put \$1.5 million toward the Upper Guyandotte Flood Study. That study will look at the flood risk and possible mitigation measures across Wyoming County and parts of Raleigh, which are especially vulnerable to flooding.

These two studies are the first major investments in several years by state leaders to address the growing threat of flooding, underscoring the state's slow progress in tackling this issue.

Securing the funding spanned two Governors' administrations, according to Morrisey spokesperson Drew Galang. He said after the Legislature allocated funds, Gov. Jim Justice's administration worked on it and the Morrisey administration determined the final amount.

A spokesperson for Justice, who is now a U.S. senator, did not respond to questions.

West Virginia's mountainous terrain and thousands of rivers and creeks — along with decades of strip mining and timbering — make the state especially vulnerable to flooding. This is likely to only get worse as climate change continues to increase the risk. And with an in-

creasing frequency of floods, mitigation efforts are crucial to lessen the damage caused by them.

But it will likely be awhile before any projects stemming from the two studies are executed. Both studies are anticipated to take three years, and there's no guarantee funding for any potential projects will be immediately available.

Capito did ensure that any project that comes out of the study of the Kanawha River Basin will only require a 10% state match — less than the typical 35%. The rest will be covered by the federal government.

The governor's office is currently working on other flood mitigation projects in the state, including warning systems, improving drain systems and building and repairing culverts, said Galang.

"Governor Morrisey is committed to protecting West Virginians from floods and all options are on the table to best prevent and mitigate these disasters," he said.

#### Lots of plans, no funding

In 2004, after decades of devastating floods, West Virginia officials drew up a flood protection plan that proposed several actions, including suggestions on floodplain and wastewater management as well as improved building codes and flood warning systems. But it was never implemented by state agencies.

Lawmakers revisited that plan in the aftermath of the 2016 floods and eventually tasked the State Resiliency Office, which they created in 2017, with updating the plan.

In 2023, the Legislature designated a special trust fund to help the office protect communities, especially those with low-income households, from flooding as well as to implement recommendations from its updated state flood plan, which the office completed in June 2024.

But lawmakers have never allocated money to that fund.

Robert Martin, director of the State Resiliency Office, told a legislative committee in December 2023 that there were "probably projects right now we'd be able to execute if we had what we were looking to do either with federal or state dollars."

In his final budget proposal as governor last year, Justice asked the Legislature for \$50 million for the flood resiliency fund. But as lawmakers hammered out the budget, they rejected Justice's request, leaving the fund empty again.

As of last November, the office was still looking to secure funding.

Morrisey didn't propose any funding for the trust in his budget earlier this year, just days before flooding in the southern coalfields. And the Legislature voted down an attempt to add money to the

trust during the legislative session.

### Flood risk greater than previously reported

Between 2005 and 2024, West Virginia experienced nearly 2,300 floods events, costing \$342 million in property damage, according to data from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's storm events database. However, damage from smaller-scale floods is often underreported, so the actual cost may be much higher.

Nearly 200,000 West Virginians live in a high-risk flood zone, according to the West Virginia Flood Resiliency Framework created by researchers at West Virginia University.

Through their work, researchers found that the state has no long-term flood recovery plan, which has caused West Virginia's flooding response to be inefficient.

WVU researchers also found of the nearly 100,000 buildings located in high-risk flood zones, a little more than 500 of them are considered essential. This

includes fire and police stations, schools, hospitals and nursing homes.

But those findings are based on data that experts say underreports the risks.

West Virginia researchers used data and flood maps from the Federal Emergency Management Agency. While beneficial, in recent years, experts have been critical of the federal maps, saying that they're often incomplete or out of date and don't account for the way rain moves and pools once it falls.

While FEMA's flood maps account for main river channels and coastal storm surge areas, they don't model heavy rainfall — which is often the cause for flooding in West Virginia.

Under the federal maps, a little more than 9% of properties in the state are considered within the agency's Special Flood Hazard Areas.

But under mapping by First Street Foundation, a nonprofit that studies flood risk, that tries to fill in the gaps left by FEMA, one-third of the properties in the state are at risk of flooding.

# Supreme Court secures grant to sustain Family Treatment Courts through Sept. 30

The Supreme Court of Appeals of West Virginia today announced it has secured a \$280,000 State Opioid Response grant which will be used to fund the operations of Family Treatment Courts through September.

"The Supreme Court is grateful to receive this grant, which will allow us to continue operating our Family Treatment Courts over the next two months while we pursue other funding possibilities," Chief Justice William R. "Bill" Wooton said. "We would like to thank the team at the state Bureau for Behavioral Health, including Interim Commissioner Nicholas Stuchell, along with the staff at the Office of Drug Control Policy for working with the Supreme Court's Administrative Office to secure these critical funds."

Family Treatment Courts are specialized, problem-solving courts designed to support parents in overcoming substance use disorders while working toward the safe reunification of their families.

They offer immediate intervention, intensive supervision and comprehensive treatment services to help parents access recovery resources in a timely manner, which helps reduce the amount of time children spend in foster care prior to their return to a safe home environment with their families. There are currently 14 Family Treatment Courts operating in 18 counties.

State Opioid Response Grants use funds provided by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), and are administered by the West Virginia Department of Human Services (DoHS), Bureau for Behavioral Health (BBH) SOR Team.

The Legislature created Family Treatment Courts as a pilot program in 2019, later making them a permanent program under supervision of the Supreme Court in 2021. Family Treatment Courts function as a collaborative effort among the Circuit Court, Child Protective Services, substance abuse treatment providers, and other key stakeholders invested in the well-being of children and families.

In that time, the Courts have reunited 437 children with FTC-graduate parents and demonstrated notable reductions in the amount of time those children spend in foster care while the cases progress.

The average time a child spends in fos-

ter care under a Family Treatment Court is approximately 10.8 months, compared to 18.8 months for West Virginia children whose families are not in a treatment court program. Only 10.7 percent of those children involved in Family Treatment Courts have re-entered foster care within two years of their family being in the program.

Through this reduced time in foster

care, it is estimated the state has saved approximately \$7 million in foster care or kinship subsidy payments through Family Treatment Courts.

Additionally, there have been 17 infants born during their mother's Family Treatment Court participation, and all 17 were born free of any illicit substances.

Since inception, these courts have been funded through federal grants and McKesson Corporation settlement funds administered by the West Virginia Office of Drug Control Policy. However, the transition of settlement fund distribution from the Office of Drug Control Policy to the West Virginia First Foundation has created a gap in the flow of grant funding

In an attempt to provide some certainty in funding for the treatment courts, the

Supreme Court included an additional \$1 million in appropriations as part of its Fiscal Year 2026 budget request to cover their operations for this fiscal year. Gov. Patrick Morrisey included this funding in his proposed budget bill submitted to the Legislature at the beginning of the 2025 regular session. However, lawmakers did not provide the judicial branch with any increases in funding for the current fiscal year as part of the final approved version of the budget bill.

While the State Opioid Response grant will fund the Family Treatment Courts program through Sept. 30, Supreme Court staff are continuing to work with the West Virginia First Foundation and state and federal grant programs to secure additional funding.

"We believe these courts have demonstrated their effectiveness in returning children to a safe home environment while also showing they can ease some of the burden on our strained foster care system," Chief Justice Wooton said. "We hope to continue working with lawmakers and grant administrators to educate them on the benefits of Family Treatment Courts and why they are a worthwhile investment in our communities."
