# Clay County cross country teams off to strong start

The Clay County cross country teams are off to a strong and promising start to their 2025 season, with multiple medalists and continued improvement from both middle and high school runners. After competing in four challenging meets across the region, the runners from Clay County Middle School (CCMS) and Clay County High School (CCHS) are showing grit, growth, and determination.

The season kicked off at the Cornfield Crawl Invitational at Riverside High



Gunner Dobbins earned the first medal of his cross country career at the Braxton No Excuses Invitational.

School on Aug. 23. Leading the charge for the CCMS girls was Marissa Atha, who claimed her first medal of the season with a third place finish out of 59 runners. She was joined by Danae Stricker and Tara Conley, who put in strong efforts of their own. For the middle school boys, in his first ever cross country race, Gunner Dobbins was the top Clay finisher, placing 21st in a competitive field of 100 runners. Sam Hubbard and Holden Reed also represented the team well. In the high school

# Luke Hill named a National Merit Scholarship Semifinalist

Earlier this week, officials of National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) announced the names of more than 16,000 Semifinalists in the 71st annual National Merit Scholarship Program. Locally, Luke Hill from Clay County High School has been named a Semifinalist.

These academically talented high school seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 6,930 National Merit Scholarships worth nearly \$26 million that will be offered next spring. To be considered for a Merit Scholarship award, Semifinalists must fulfill several requirements to advance to the Finalist level of the competition. About 95 percent of the Semifinalists are expected to attain Finalist standing, and

approximately half of the Finalists will win a National Merit Scholarship, earning the Merit Scholar title.

NMSC, a not-for-profit organization that operates without government assistance, was established in 1955 specifically to conduct the annual National Merit Scholarship Program. Scholarships are underwritten by NMSC with its own funds and by about 300 business organizations, higher education institutions, and individual donors that share NMSC's goals of honoring the nation's scholastic champions and encouraging the pursuit of academic excellence.

# Linda Rhodes passes away days after from being appointed to BDA Board

The first regular meeting of the Clay County Commission for the month of September was held on Monday, Sept. 8, at 9 a.m. and was marked by catching up on mostly regular business since only one August meeting was held. All three commissioners were present: David Schoolcraft; Joyce Johnson, president; and Duane Legg. County Clerk Shelia Stone was also present. Routine business included approving minutes from the previous meeting, bills, purchase orders, budget revisions, and erroneous assessments as presented by the Assessor. Other regular duties of the county's highest government officers included fiduciary appointments as presented by the county clerk, affidavit and waivers of final settlements, and last will and testaments.

The county acknowledged that Ambulance Service employee Aiden Taylor had a major status change advancing from Basic to an Advanced EMT. This comes with a pay raise. At the same time they accepted resignations of Paris Williams and Brittany Pierson from the 911 Communication Center. Vickie Gency was approved for employment by the Clay County Circuit Clerk.

Despite Terry Martin's absence to announce and explain it, the Commission approved payment request #11 for \$210,044.55 for the Big Otter Nebo Waterline Extension Project.

Probably the most important, or at least, most moving moment of the meeting was the Clay County 2025 Childhood Cancer Awareness Proclamation. This was read by Commissioner Legg, and in part, says:

"Whereas, to date, childhood cancer remains the leading cause of death by disease in children under the age of 19 in the United States, and whereas in the US forty-six children, between the ages birth through age 19 will be diagnosed with cancer every day, totaling more than 16,000, and in West Virginia alone there

are more than 70 children diagnosed with cancer a year. WV children are being treated at WVU Children's Hospital in Morgantown, Edwards Comprehensive Cancer Center at Hoops Children's Hospital in Huntington/Cabell Huntington Hospital in Huntington and CAMC Children's Cancer Center in Charleston..."

And later finishes with:

"Whereas all children affected by cancer, their families, medical professionals, caregivers, and friends join West Virginia Kids Cancer Crusaders, Inc., to continue the collaborative efforts to provide support network, raise awareness, and funds for those affected by childhood cancer, and make a positive difference for patients, families and survivors in the future. Now therefore, be it resolved that we, the Clay County Commission, do hereby proclaim September 25 as National Childhood Cancer Awareness Month. We ask all citizens in Clay County to participate and are encouraged to join us in this observance."

There are very few Clay County citizens who do not know, or are related to someone presently receiving cancer treatment. Those who cannot contribute financially can offer prayer for all these children.

The commission also approved new members to the Clay Business Development Authority and includes: Sierra Marling, Samantha Ramsey, Sara Blankenship, and Linda Rhodes.

Three days after being appointed to the Clay Business Development Authority, Linda Rhodes suddenly passed away. Linda has functioned over these many years on various boards, including being an active member of CAEZ of WV, Inc. She also worked with the FFA and her special passion was for 4-H. In a world where too many people are self-centered and do not participate in any community efforts, Linda was diamond in a field of glass. She will certainly be missed by many.


Students at Big Otter Elementary School are excited to be using brand new iPads in the classroom! Each student received a school iPad to help make learning more

# **Updated Child Care Access Data Dashboard** highlights growing gaps and urgent need for action

Team for West Virginia Children and the West Virginia Association for Young Children have announced new updates to the Mapping the Gap: West Virginia Child Care Access Dashboard, a first-of-its-kind tool launched in 2023 to provide real-time insight into child care supply and demand across the state.

The dashboard was created to shine a light on the persistent challenges families face in finding child care, particularly in rural communities. Since its launch, it has become a trusted resource for policymakers, child advocates, and families to better understand where gaps exist and how access to care is changing over time.

Key Updates in 2025:

The newly updated data, current as of this month, reveal several concerning trends:

· Decline in Family Child Care (FCC) providers: About 1 in 6 Family Child Care homes (an individual who provides regular, ongoing child care for a small group of children in their own private home) have closed since last year, declining by 15.6 percent from 918 Family Child Care Homes in January 2024 to just 775 today. This decline hits rural areas especially hard.

Persistent access gaps: While some counties such as Marshall and Roane have made progress in reducing their child care access gaps, others, including Preston and Barbour, have seen the gaps widen significantly.

Counties most under-resourced: Wood, Kanawha and Berkeley have the most total children without access, according to the model. Tyler, Ritchie, Wetzel, Doddridge, and Pleasants counties continue to face the most severe shortages of child care slots per capita.

· High percentages of children without care: In counties such as Wetzel, Calhoun, and Clay, the majority of children under six with working parents still lack access to licensed child care.

These findings are reinforced by county-by-county data, allowing state and local leaders to better see where progress is being made and where urgent intervention is

In Clay County, numbers from the dashboard show that there are 193 children in the county under the age of six, and of those 193, there are 186 who need but cannot access childcare. There is only one provider listed who serves infants, toddlers, and pre-K students, with a total licensing capacity of 27 children in that age range.

"These numbers tell a story we can't ignore," said Jim McKay, Director of Prevent Child Abuse West Virginia, a project of Team for WV Children. "When child care providers close their doors, families lose more than a service—they lose stability, opportunity, and peace of mind. The data shows that this problem isn't going awayit is only getting worse. Without meaningful action and policy changes, more children and families are going to

fall through the cracks." Kristy Ritz, Executive Director of the West Virginia Association for Young Children, added: "The dashboard makes clear what families already know: access to child care in West Virginia is uneven, and too many children are left without options. Policymakers have the opportunity—and responsibility—to use this data to strengthen the workforce, support providers, and ensure every child has the care they need to thrive."

About the Dashboard

The Mapping the Gap: Child Care Access Dashboard was launched in 2023 through a partnership between Team for West Virginia Children, the West Virginia Association for Young Children, and Child Care Aware of America, which provided expertise and support in building the tool. The dashboard draws on state data updated regularly, with new enhancements allowing for near real-time tracking of changes in child care access and availability. By combining state-level data with Child Care Aware's proven methodology, the dashboard gives West Virginians a clear picture of where the greatest child care needs exist.

National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2024 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT), which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of Semifinalists, representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state. The number of Semifinalists in a state is proportional to the state's percentage of the national total of graduating seniors.

To become a Finalist, the Semifinalist and a high school official must submit a detailed scholarship application, in which they provide information about the Semifinalist's academic record, participation in school and community activities, demonstrated leadership abilities, employment, and honors and awards received. A Semifinalist must have an outstanding academic record throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by a high school official,

write an essay, and earn SAT or ACT scores that confirm the student's earlier performance on the qualifying test. From over 16,000 Semifinalists, more than 15,000 are expected to advance to the Finalist level, and in February they will be notified of this designation. All National

Merit Scholarship winners will be selected from this

group of Finalists. Merit Scholar designees are selected on the basis of their skills, accomplishments, and potential for success in rigorous college studies, without regard to gender, race, ethnic origin, or religious preference.

National Merit Scholarships

Three types of National Merit Scholarships will be offered in the spring of 2026. Every Finalist will compete for one of 2,500 National Merit \$2500 Scholarships that will be awarded on a state-representational basis. About 830 corporate-sponsored Merit Scholarship awards will be provided by approximately 150 corporations and business organizations for Finalists who meet their specified criteria, such as children of the grantor's employees or residents of communities where sponsor plants or offices are located. In addition, about 150 colleges and universities are expected to finance some 3,600 college-sponsored Merit Scholarship awards for Finalists who will attend the sponsor institution.

National Merit Scholarship winners of 2026 will be announced in four nationwide news releases beginning in April and concluding in July. These scholarship recipients will join approximately 389,000 other distinguished young people who have earned the Merit Scholar title.

# West Virginia History

Sept. 17, 1848: Artist Lily Irene Jackson was born in Parkersburg. Jackson was best known as a painter of animal portraits and floral arrangements, and as an advocate for the

Sept. 18, 1947: Historian and journalist Minnie Kendall Lowther died. Born in Ritchie County, she was one of the first West Virginia women to become a newspaper edi-Sept. 18, 1989: Play-

wright Maryat Lee died in Lewisburg. She established Eco Theater in Summers County as an indigenous mountain theater, using Summers County people as actors. Sept. 19, 1862: The

two-day Battle of Shepherdstown opened with an artillery exchange between Union and Confederate troops. Following the Battle of Antietam, it ended Robert E. Lee's Maryland Campaign and helped convince Abraham Lincoln to issue his preliminary Emancipation Proclamation.

Sept. 19, 1892: William "Bill" Blizzard was born in Cabin Creek, Kanawha County. Blizzard became one of West Virginia's most influential and controversial labor leaders of the 20th century.

Sept. 20, 1910: Dorothy Johnson Vaughan was born in Kansas City but moved at a young age to Morgantown, where she was valedictorian of Beechurst High School. Like fellow West Virginian Katherine Johnson, Vaughan became a mathematician and computer expert for NASA and made key contributions to the U.S. space program.



Sept. 20, 1914: Ken Hechler was born on Long Island, New York. Hechler served 18 years in the U.S. Congress and four terms as West Virginia's secretary of state.

Sept. 21, 1895: Samuel Ivan Taylor was born in Mercer County. Taylor was the first member of the West Virginia state police. He was part of the force that faced off against union miners during the 1921 Battle of Blair Mountain in Logan





Sept. 21, 1921: Musician Rex Parker was born in Maplewood, Fayette County. He performed on radio stations WCHS in Charleston and WJLS in Beckley. In 1941, he married Eleanora Niera, and they performed on radio and TV as Rex and Eleanor Parker until his death in 1999.

Sept. 21, 1937: The West Virginia Conservation Commission acquired

6,705 acres in Kanawha County to create Kanawha State Forest. Redevelopment of the land, which had been heavily mined and timbered, began the next year by the Civilian Conservation Corps.

Sept. 21, 1970: Filming began in Moundsville on the movie Fools' Parade, based on the novel by Davis Grubb. The filming concluded one month later when Grubb came to Moundsville for a dinner, accompanied by his dog, making the \$750 round trip from New York City in a taxi.



Sept. 22, 1856: Albert Blakeslee "A. B." White was born in Cleveland, Ohio. He was West Virginia's 11th governor, serving from 1901 to 1905. He was the fourth person to serve as gover-

nor from Wood County, his adopted home.

Sept. 22, 1893: Elizabeth Simpson Drewry was born in Virginia but soon moved to Elkhorn, Mc-Dowell County. In 1950, she became the first Black woman elected to the legislature. In 1956, she introduced a constitutional amendment that would allow women to serve on juries in West Virginia.

Sept. 22, 1894: Louis Bennett Jr. was born in Weston. Bennett was West Virginia's only World War I flying ace. With 12 combat kills, including three aircraft and nine balloons, Bennett placed himself ninth on the roster of aces. This record was accomplished in just 10 days after assignment to his combat unit.



Sept. 22, 1970: The "Brinkley Bridge" Wayne County collapsed under the weight of an overloaded truck. The bridge was named for newscaster David Brinkley who had filmed a 1960 news report about the poor condition of the

Sept. 22, 1975: Charleston native Sara Jane Moore failed in her atto assassinate President Gerald Ford in San Francisco. She later served prison time at the Federal Penitentiary for Women in Alderson.

Sept. 23, 1922: Five men were struck and killed at the Glen Rogers mine in Wyoming County when equipment fell during the construction of a deep

Sept. 23, 1923: Folk artist Herman Hayes was born in Elkview. His woodcarvings were displayed in Washington and New York City, and he twice won the top award in the West Virginia Juried Exhibition.

Sept. 23, 1938: The Mingo Oak was cut down after succumbing to the fumes of a burning coal refuse pile. The Mingo Oak, which stood near the Logan-Mingo county line, was more than 500 years old and may have been the largest white oak in the world.



#### WEST VIRGINIA SCENERY IS FIRST IN POPULARITY

West Virginia's mountain scenery ranks first in popularity among out - of - state tourists but there is an increasing number who would like to see better facilities for enjoying it, according to Don Crislip, executive director of the West Virginia Industrial and Publicity Commission.

Crislip bases his conclusions on information obtained from post card questionnaires which the Industrial and Publicity Commission collects each year from visiting tourists as a part of its annual tourist trade survey.

Although this year's survey is not completed, Crislip said, a random selection of questionnaire cards shows a large number of visitors wanting more and better roadside parks, with drinking water and toilet facilities; more pullells, where motorists can set off the highway and enjoy the scenery, more roadside signs, pointing to scenic and historic spots; more tent and trailer camps; and more publicity, so that the people in other states will know more about what West Virginia has to offer.

Cards tabulated so far indicate that nearly half of the tourists come to West Virginia to enjoy the scenery with the hospitality of the state's residents and the state park system each drawing about ten percent of the popularity vote, Crislip pointed out. Roads and the inadequacy of various types of tourist trade facilities were the subjects of most complaints, he

The list of satisfied tourists seems larger this year than usual, Crislip declared. Such words of praise as "Don't change a thing," "It is a wonderful state," or, "We 1 cup shortening (2 sticks oleo) liked everything about your state," are found on many questionnaire cards, he explained.




The Panther defense did a respectable job not allowing this game to go into a special page in the history
